All interested Swine breeders are urged to contact Mitchell County Agricultural Agent, Buddy C. Logsdon if they are interested in attending the 11th Annual Swine Short Course at Texas A & M College Monday and Tuesday, April 2nd and 3rd.

"Raising More Pigs on Less Feed With More Valuable Carcasses at Slaughter Time" is the major objective of the program. This is truly a well rounded program with presentations in all areas important to successful hog production, including feeding, disease, housing, equipment and marketing.

The program will be headed by the Nationally prominent, Out-of-State speakers, Dr. J. A. Whatley, Jr., in charge of swine breeding research at Oklahoma State University, will lead the discussions on the use of production records in swine selection and planning crossbreeding programs.

Bernard Collins, commercial hog producer and President of the Iowa Swine Producers Association, will lead discussions on the breeding programs of Iowa master swine producers grown in the future. This will include a discussion on the size of units and an evaluation of some of the newer programs being advocated.

Mr. W. C. Haase, Swine Specialist for Swift and company in Chicago, will lead a discussion on merit hog marketing. Progress in this area has been especially good and Mr. Haase will make a real contribution in bringing our understanding up-to-date and into better focus.

SOIL ADDITIVES AND CONDITIONERS

As expected in a rapidly changing agriculture, new products such as soil conditioners continue to appear on the market. Jim Valentine, Area Soil Chemist, The Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock, states some may have merit while others are of questionable value or may be entirely worthless. Such materials are sometimes greatly overpriced. Benefits to be derived from their use may be stated in vague or misleading terms and statements may be based on mere opinion or pure fancy.

Valentine further states it is always hazardous to purchase a material that bears no guarantee as to its formulation. By not stating what is in the product the seller is in no way liable, and existing laws such as those governing fertilizers have no jurisdiction over the manufacturer or seller.

The primary soil conditioner for this area is organic matter and if your soil contains a modest one per cent organic matter this is equal to 20,000 lbs. per surface six inches. We have no known bacteria deficiency, and it is estimated that there are 400 to 500 lbs. of live bacteria in an acre furrow slice of soil. The population rises and falls depending on the amount of returned, moisture, and temperature.

Contrary to some claims made for conditioners there is no known practical procedure for changing soil texture since texture refers to the size of the individual soil particles. Structure of clay soils can be improved by the addition of certain materials but the cost may run as high as \$400.00 per acre.

Valentine concludes by saying if your money-consider the products carefully before buying and do not expect them to substitute for the plant food elements commonly obtained thru commercial fertilizers.

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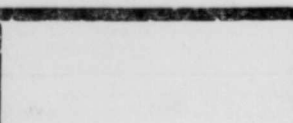

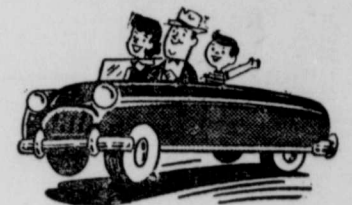

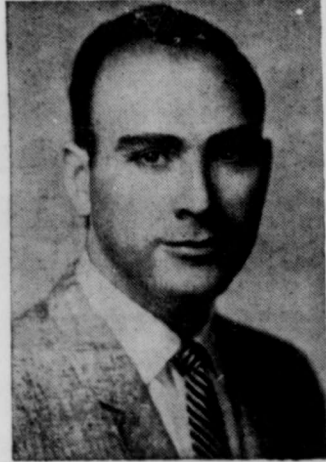

TRUETT LATIMER
SEEKS SENATE POST

Truett Latimer of Taylor County, who has served 10 years in the Texas Legislature, has begun his active campaign for State Senator of the 24th District. Latimer is a Democrat and the senior Representative from West Central Texas.

He is a staunch advocate of the free enterprise system, local self government and states rights with the corresponding burden of state responsibility.

As a member of the Legislature he has held many committee posts, including chairmanships and vice-chairmanships of important committees. He has served on twelve (12) committees including two on Water, three on Agriculture, and four on Insurance.

In 1955 he helped re-write the Texas Insurance Code. In 1957 he was author of the Texas Water Planning Act, the Texas Feed Control Act and also sponsored legislation calling for study of the state's constitution.

He was house author of the bill creating the Water District which is now constructing a reservoir on Hubbard Creek for the cities of Albany, Anson, Abilene and Breckenridge. As a member of the Water Committee he has helped many local areas through the creation of water districts.

In 1959 the Departmental Appropriations Subcommittee with Truett Latimer as chairman, cut the departmental budget requests 37 million dollars. He also conducted an investigation of the State Health Department. The information he uncovered caused the Health Commissioner to resign, and the entire department was reorganized to cut out waste and duplication.

He has successfully sponsored many pieces of legislation with

local and statewide significance and they are too numerous to mention here.

During his five terms in the legislature, Latimer has been an effective leader who is responsible and conscientious. He is a hard worker who has become well-known for taking positive stands on issues confronting the Legislature.

In asking for a promotion to Senate, Latimer said he believes his broad legislative experience fully qualifies him for the job. He is seeking the office based on his record of legislative accomplishments.

Latimer believes the 2% sales tax should be reduced to 1% straight across the board. This plan will simplify matters for the taxpayer, the retail merchant and the comptroller who collects it.

"Water will always be in the forefront as one of our major problems in West Texas. To insure adequate water supply, we must explore every possible source and work together for the orderly development of our water resources," Latimer stated. Latimer will help each area in every possible way with their particular water problems.

In the Senate Latimer will continue to support agricultural research which has meant so much to the agricultural economy

of this district.

He believes we should have an effective small loan law. This legislation always passes the House and is consistently killed by the Senate. During the recent special session the House passed a bill that would have been the strongest loan shark law in the nation, only to be killed by a 14-16 vote in the Senate.

Latimer will also support an aggressive soil conservation program; a stronger lobby control law; deletion of traffic tickets from the present insurance plan; revision of number one highway system in the nation; and a 70 mile speed limit on four lane divided highways.

He believes we should continue to upgrade our schools and colleges and his support of education is a matter of record.

"We must develop an aggressive program designed to bring more tourists, businesses, and investments, as well as new industry to Texas. Through this type of program our state can grow on a sound basis without increasing taxes," Latimer stated.

He is opposed to a city sales tax and a state income tax.

Latimer was born in Albany, reared at Lueders and received his B. A. degree from Hardin-Simmons University in 1951. He

is married to the former Judy Johnson of Morton and they have two children: Jeff, 3 years old and Laura Gail, 7 months old.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church in Abilene, a Rotarian, and a Jaycee. Latimer operated his own business and since 1955 has directed Ex-Student activities at Hardin-Simmons University.

His widowed mother, Mrs. Zora Latimer, still resides at Lueders.

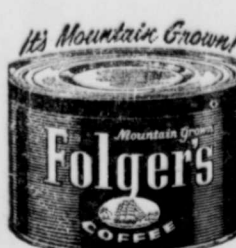

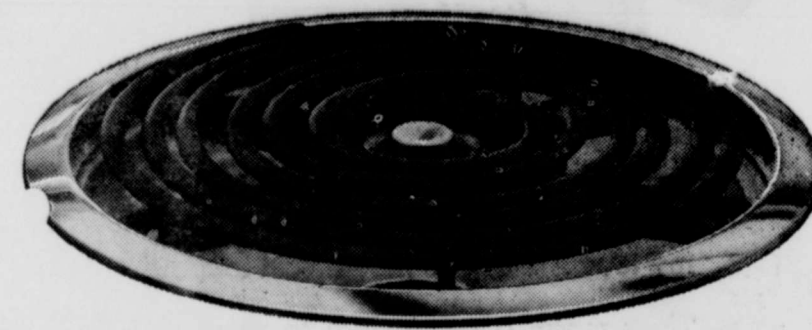
