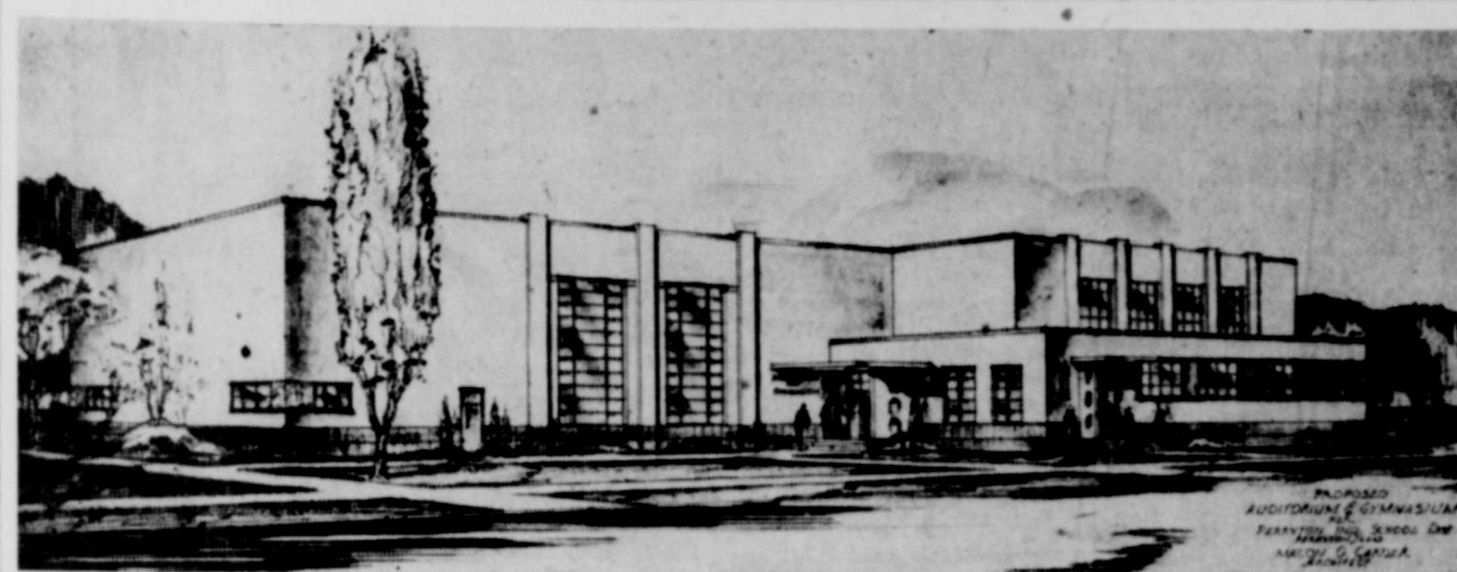

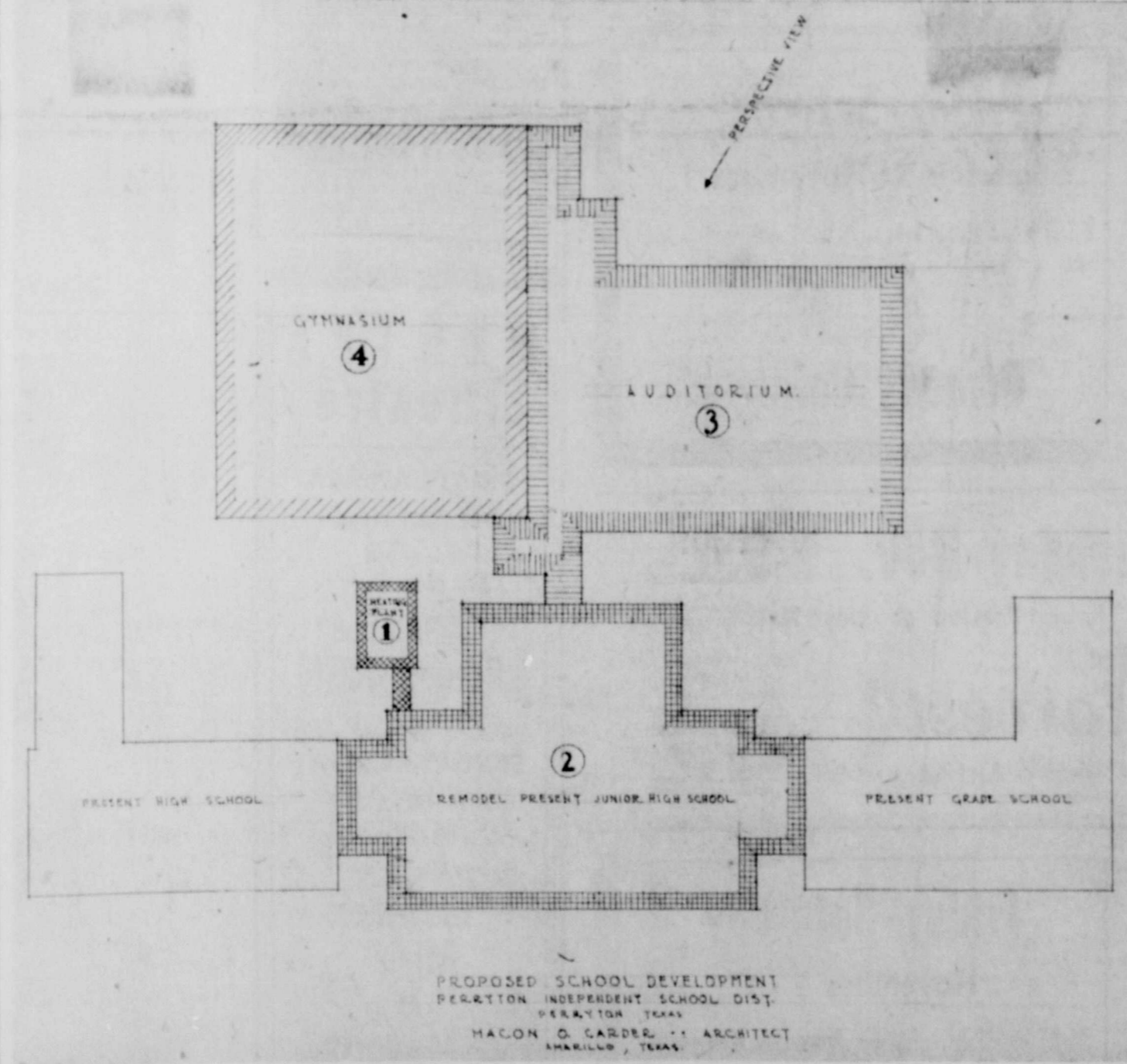

PROPOSED SCHOOL AUDITORIUM AND GYMNASIUM—This architect's drawing of the new auditorium and gymnasium for the Perryton schools shows how the building would look from the front, which faces west. The part on the left is the auditorium, capable of seating 1,400 and the part on the right is the gymnasium, which would seat 1,500. The gymnasium plans call for two full size basketball courts, and movable goals which would be put in place for a game basketball court. A wall separates the gymnasium and the auditorium. The small door at the left is the entrance to the auditorium and the door in the center opens into the lobby connecting the gym and auditorium. This lobby door opens on the northwest. This building would be connected with the present center building, located just behind it, by an enclosed archway.



PROPOSED SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT—This view shows how the school plant would look with the addition of the new auditorium, gymnasium and heating-plant. As shown, the gym and auditorium would be located just back of the present center building, connected by an archway. The heating plant (1) would be a separate building, with new equipment capable of heating the whole school plant, including the gym and auditorium. The present center building (2) would be remodeled, making the auditorium into classrooms and would house the junior high school. The auditorium (3) would have a seating capacity of 1,400, making it capable of serving as a community gathering place as well as for all school purposes. The gymnasium (4) would seat 1,500 and allow ample space for both boys and girls physical education classes.

We talked about a lot of things—tremendously vital and unimportant things.

Now, as this is written, she is sound asleep with her doll "Paddy" in her arms.

When her doll gets broken or her finger gets cut or her head gets bumped, I can fix them. But when she starts off to school—when she starts across the street—then, Mr. Driver, she is in your hands.

Much as I wish I could, it's not possible for me to be with her all the time. I have to work to pay for her home, her clothes, her education.

So Mr. Driver, please help me look out for her. Please drive carefully. Please drive slowly past schools and at intersections. And please remember that sometimes children run from behind parked cars.

Good Health Habits Should Be Formed In Nation's Schools

AUSTIN, Oct. 27—Every school should have a definite school health program. Situations such as, the kind of drinking water, arrangements for the school lunch, the lighting, seating, ventilation and cleanliness of the schoolroom, and the personal practices of the teachers and children are the bases of the school health program, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Every school has tremendous opportunities to promote the health of its pupils and of its community. From early childhood to early manhood and womanhood, most children are enrolled in schools and are under the supervision of school staffs for a substantial part of the day for approximately half the days of the year. The conditions under which they live in school, the help which they are given in solving their health problems, the ideals of individual and community health which they are taught and the information and understanding that they ac-

quire of themselves are factors which operate to develop attitudes and behavior conducive to healthy, happy and successful living.

Schools alone however cannot enable children to attain all the desirable goals of individual and community health. Considering the magnitude and multitude of the diverse and continuing efforts that must be made to satisfy the health needs of children, it is fortunate that many people and groups, in addition to schools, are greatly interested in promoting health. Parents have

a prime responsibility. Physicians, dentists, nurses, health officers, social and welfare workers, and their official organizations, such as medical, dental and nursing societies, health departments and voluntary health agencies are all rightly concerned with health activities in their communities.

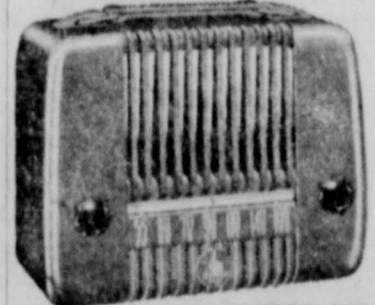

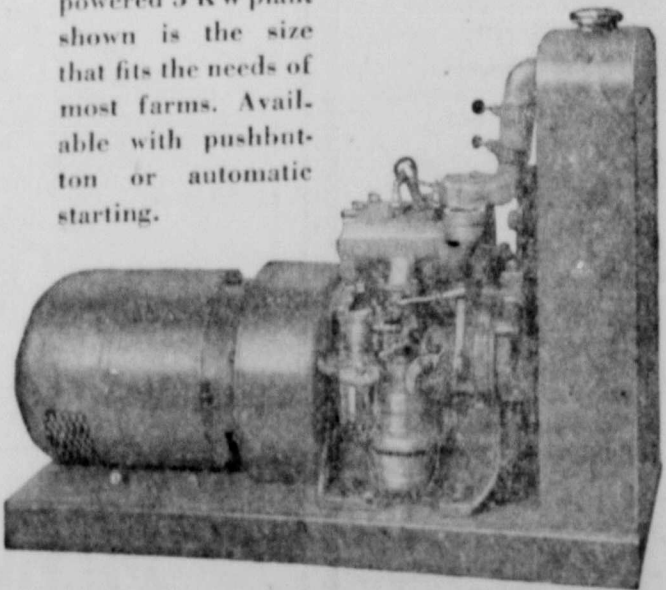

Local Landowners Affected by Boundary Dispute Settlement

A number of landowners in Ochiltree and Beaver counties are affected by the official ending of the 100-year-old controversy over ownership of the strip of land along the Texas-Oklahoma border. The announcement that the boundary had been officially settled was made by the Interior Department.

The strip of land, 156 miles long and ranging from 500 feet to 50 feet wide, has been a subject of controversy since 1850. Rupert C. Allen, Ochiltree county surveyor, assisted the government surveying crew when they were in this area a few years ago and can give the background of the dispute. Allen

surveyed the east and west boundaries of Ochiltree county, and became quite familiar with the boundary claims when he tried to locate the north boundary of the county.

In 1850, the federal government and Texas agreed by contract that the north border of Texas should extend along the parallel of 36 degrees 30 minutes north latitude west from its intersection with the 100th meridian.

Congress authorized two official commissioners in 1838 to establish the boundary and work was started by two civil engi-

neers, John H. Clark for the government, and William R. Scurry for Texas. In 1850 Scurry became dissatisfied with the way Clark was doing, and withdrew.

In 1881, after Clark had finished, another survey was made by R. O. Chaney and W. W. Smith, general land office surveyors. R. O. Chaney and W. W. Smith surveyed the Cimarron land base line to govern the public land strip in Oklahoma, then a federal territory. Later their survey was found to be at variance with that made by Clark, and the 156-mile strip was not included in the US surveyed public lands.

This later boundary line was a few hundred feet north of the other one.

Although the Clark line was confirmed officially by Congress in 1891, the Cimarron base line was more generally accepted as the proper line and land acquisition was based on that line. Besides, the Cimarron line was easier to locate than the Clark line, since the Clark markers were destroyed.

The road approximately seven miles north of Perryton, which is commonly called the state line road, actually lies a few hundred feet in Texas under the official boundary designation.

Under the Interior Department ruling, regulations have been issued giving longtime occupants of the disputed tracts one year from Nov. 14 to make application to buy their holdings for \$1.25 an acre. The applicants must show occupancy of the tract for at least 20 years prior to Aug. 7, 1946.

Among the local landowners affected by the ruling are D. D. Hummer, Geo. Schultz, A. C. Emberson, Geo. Barnett, Harry Evlins, Mrs. Hattie Newman, J. M. Pruitt and L. C. Skeen.

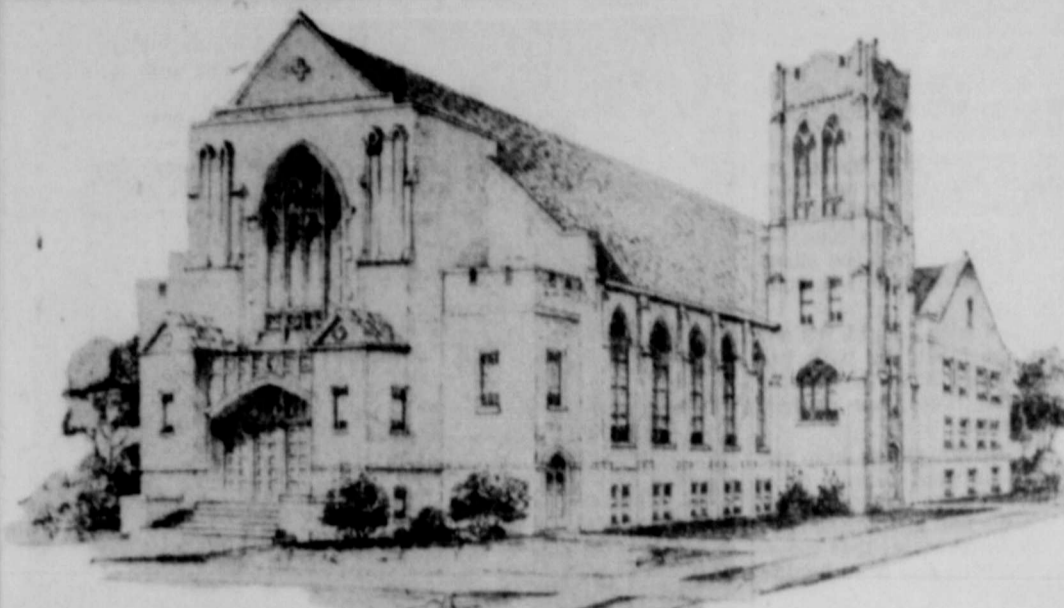
Farnsworth Leads In Weekly Shoot

The new church will be built on the present church basement and will be two stories above the basement. The outside will be of light stone and the brick walls of the basement will be replaced by this stone. When completed, the church will have an auditorium with a seating capacity of 500.

The main entrance to the church will be on the west, facing Baylor street. The main auditorium and balcony will be located immediately above the present basement auditorium and will extend two stories above the ground. Sunday school rooms, the pastor's study and other educational rooms will be located in the basement and for the three stories just east of the main auditorium.

Total cost of the building, excluding interior fixtures, is estimated at \$140,000.

The actual value of the school district is \$20,000,000, and the assessed valuation in 1947 was \$14,000,000. The present tax rate is \$1.00 on the \$100 valuation.

Probably the most urgent need is for a heating system. The heating plant now in use was designed to take care of the center building only, but when the other two buildings were built, this heating system was expanded to take care of all three. Because it is inadequate, there are some fifteen open gas heaters being used in the buildings, creating a fire hazard.

If the bond issue carries, it is planned to install the new heating system first, putting it into a separate building instead of in the basement of the center building.

The present auditorium would be converted into classrooms and the present gymnasium would be retained for physical education classes in the elementary grades.

The new auditorium and gymnasium would be placed immediately back of the center building. The auditorium would seat 1,400 and the gym the same.

Upon completion of the building program the Perryton schools would be able to care for 1,500 students and would have one of the finest plants in the Panhandle. Under such a set-up, the school gymnasium and auditorium would offer the community a gathering place for all sorts of community activity, something which is sorely needed.

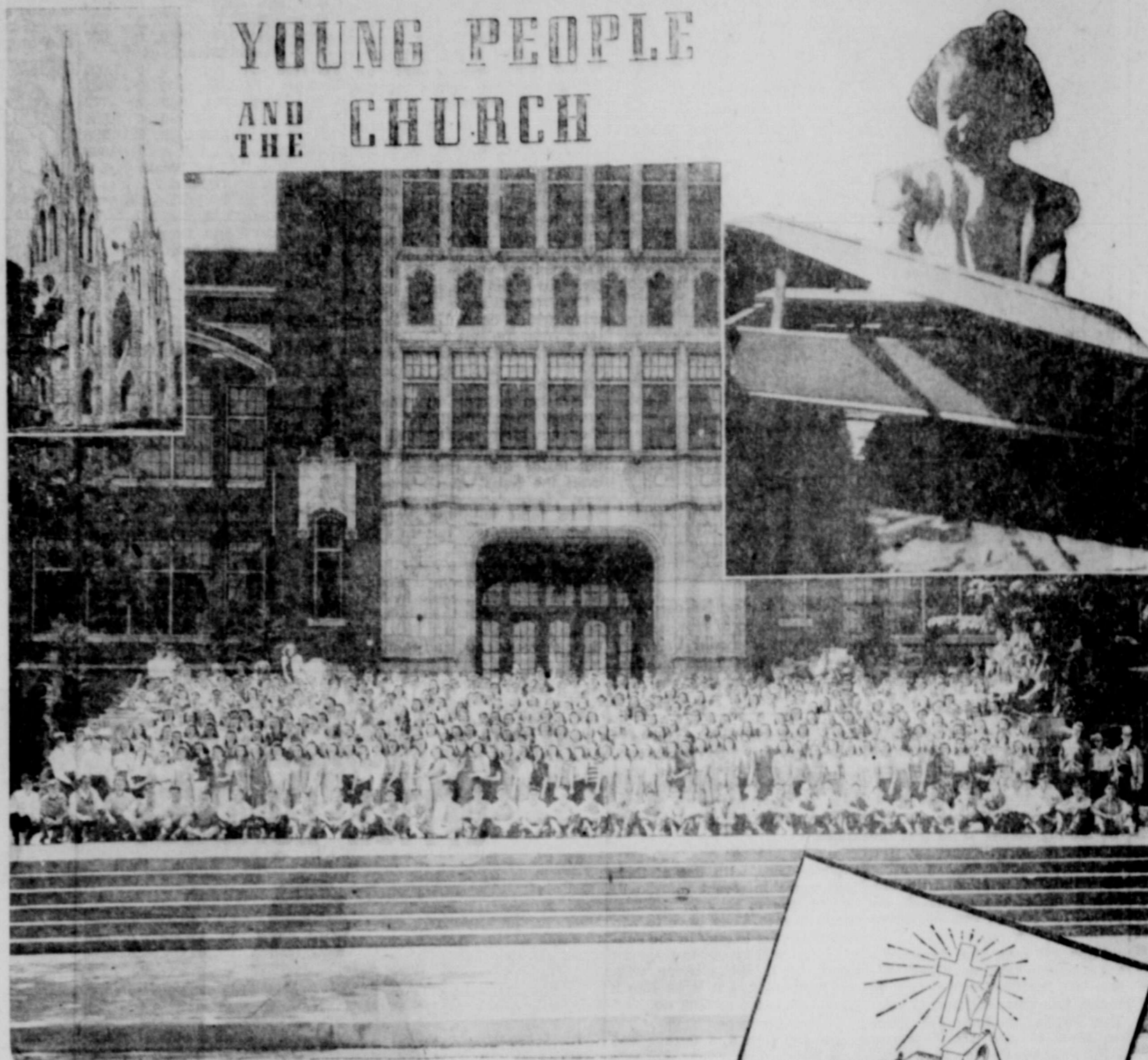

"No Place for Young People"

The avowed purpose of socialism is to equitably distribute a nation's wealth. What it actually does is to spread the poverty. And, in the process, it does an extremely effective job of destroying incentive, opportunity, and ambition, as well as wealth.

An illuminating example of that is found in a recent editorial in the Portland Oregonian. Some time ago the Oregonian's circulation manager carried on correspondence with a printer in Dorset, England, and sent him a number of the paper's big Sunday issues. Now, the printer writes, he and his family have decided to emigrate to Oregon. They plan to come in January, even though he has no assurance of finding a job and will be confronted by a severe housing shortage when he reaches his new home. This reason for making so long and difficult a move is stated in this paragraph: "England today is no place for young people such as mine, who are ambitious. The days of private enterprise over here are numbered. Frustration and inertia have come in with a rush, and everyone emulates Mr. Micawber, just waiting for something to turn up. It is a sorry picture, and not all due to the war. We shall be glad to pull out."

That simple declaration goes straight to the heart of Britain's decay, and cuts deeper than teams of statistics and volumes of economic theory. Socialism means the triumph of the bureaucrat. It means that all the energies and resources of the nation become the property of the politicians in power. It means that the poor, no less than the rich, are getting poorer. Worst of all, it means that the individual spirit and drive which created an empire on which the sun never sets is rapidly being throttled to death.

So the printer from Dorset is bringing his family to a nation where free enterprise still exists, and opportunity is open to all. Other English men and women are emigrating by the thousands to Canada and elsewhere. They love the soil of England still, but they cannot bear to watch the disintegration of the qualities that made her great.

The duty of the American people is to maintain a nation and a political system which will not tolerate the political forces that are destroying England.

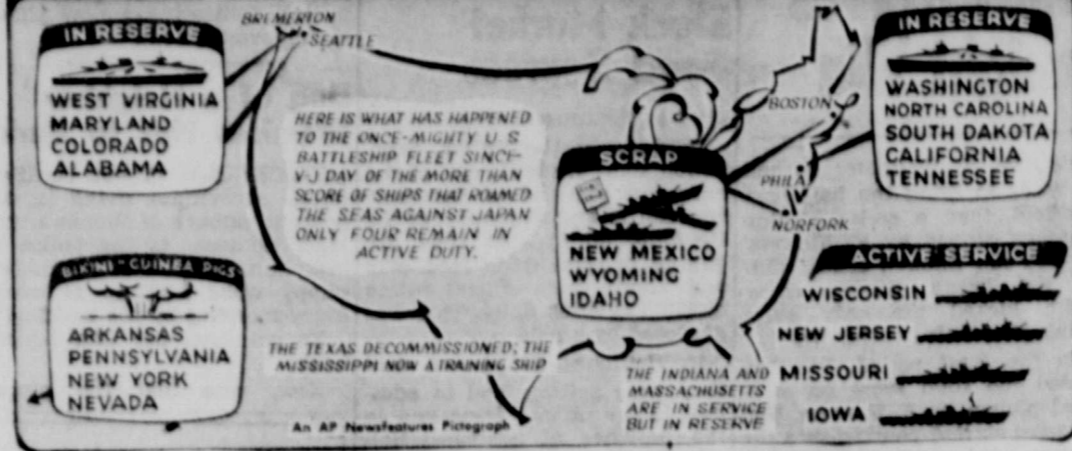

Babson Discusses Vocational Education

ROGER W. BABSON, Editor-in-Chief

EUREKA, Kansas, Oct. 21—The educational business is booming! Schools and colleges across the country are packing them in like so many sardines in a can and turning them out like so many cars from a production line.

How Many Will Survive? Pre-war checks on educational efficiency that of every 100 students who have entered college, 56 never graduated! Why this huge mortality rate? The question of successful college achievement should challenge every taxpayer, parent, teacher and pupil.

A United States Office of Education Bulletin analyzes this figure of 56 "failures" as follows: 18.4% of the students flunk; 12.4 percent leave because of financial difficulties; 6.1% because of lack of interest; 4.0% because of sickness or death; 14.1% because of various miscellaneous causes; and 45% for unknown reasons.

Why Student Mortality Rates Are High Mortality rates are high because too many young people go to college lacking a driving purpose. For example, I asked a sweet young thing on one college campus the other day why she was going to college. Her reply: "Because mother wants me to." When I asked her for her mother's reason, she replied: "So I won't have to work." Certainly, something is wrong here!

But parents cannot be blamed for wanting their children to have some of those things they failed to get. What greater asset has a parent than a good son or daughter? The trouble is that too many parents often fail to see the defects of their offspring. They too often overrate their

abilities or they too often know too little about job requirements. We Must Better Prepare Youth for Work Is it any wonder that employment managers and labor leaders are everywhere talking about the problem of vocational training? Two million young men and women enter the labor market each year. When these youths find themselves facing a hard-boiled job interviewer who asks them what they can do, most of them reply, "Anything." The employer knows this means "Nothing." Yet, I am not for one moment blaming our youth.

Let me ask what you have done to further job training in your community? What do your sons and daughters know about their abilities and interests? How much business information have you given them? Do they know the traits and skills required on various kinds of jobs? What are your local employment opportunities? What are the broad vocational trends, nationally speaking? Our youth simply doesn't know. This is evidenced by all sorts of surveys. Three out of every four young persons never receive any organized guidance from school, college, or any other source.

Too Many Want "Just Jobs" It is significant that almost all of our high school students expect always to work for someone else; it never occurs to them to provide jobs for others. The naked truth is that our present industrial order will not provide enough of these jobs. In order to give future employment to our young people we must start in now to educate the best of them to become employers. This is why I am training people out here in the center of the country to enter definite careers and employ others.

An educational misfit is a tragedy—a waste of human material. Only the man who is happy in his work, who is fitted for it by nature and trained for it through education can make the fullest use of his powers and ultimately provide jobs for others. If school committees and college trustees would appropriate even a fraction of the money in helping graduates to become employers, which they now spend on school sports, bands, etc., our youth might have a chance. Hasn't someone been shortchanging our youth? Perhaps this is a good question to ask as our football season gets underway.

Veterans' NEWS

The Veterans Administration is appealing to veteran students and job-trainees, as well as to schools and job training establishments in which veterans are enrolled under the GI Bill, for assistance in preventing subsistence allowance overpayments.

The veterans and their training establishments are asked to notify VA immediately when trainee-veterans abandon their training programs. When veterans know in advance the definite date on which they will complete or discontinue their training, they should advise VA at that time instead of waiting until they actually stop their training.

Failure to notify VA of training discontinuances usually results in overpayments of subsistence allowances, VA said. Such overpayments must be refunded to the government.

A recent survey disclosed an average lapse of 23 days between the time the veteran stopped his training and the time VA was notified of his discontinuance.

As a result, the veteran continued to receive subsistence allowance payments to which he was not entitled.

Immediate or advance notice of training discontinuances will assist VA materially in reducing the amount of overpayments. In many cases, such notices will eliminate overpayments and the necessity for refunds by veterans.

Veterans who fail to make arrangements to repay subsistence allowance overpayments may be prevented from re-entering schools or job-training courses under the GI Bill.

Veterans are not being forced to turn back full amounts immediately. They need only make arrangements for monthly repayments that cause them no financial hardship and thus become qualified to resume training.

The Veterans Administration now is the custodian of more than 53,000,000 Army chest X-ray films of World War II veterans, which it will use in its long-range anti-tuberculosis program.

VA records show that about 23,000 veterans of World War II are drawing compensation for tuberculosis contracted in the service. Included in the state figures are Texas 817, Louisiana 390 and Mississippi 332.

WROCLAW, Poland (AP)—Reconstruction of war-devastated Wroclaw, former German city of Breslau, is expected to run well over \$10,000,000.

City authorities, appealing to Poles to contribute to a reconstruction fund, said the 100,000,000 zlotys earmarked for rebuilding by the municipality would not cover 10 percent of what is needed.

Wroclaw's mayor said "the problem is not only one of rebuilding the city but also that of redeveloping agriculture of the surrounding countryside. Agriculture in the environs of this Lower Silesian capital is destroyed to such an extent that it cannot feed the city which must fetch its food from distant districts."

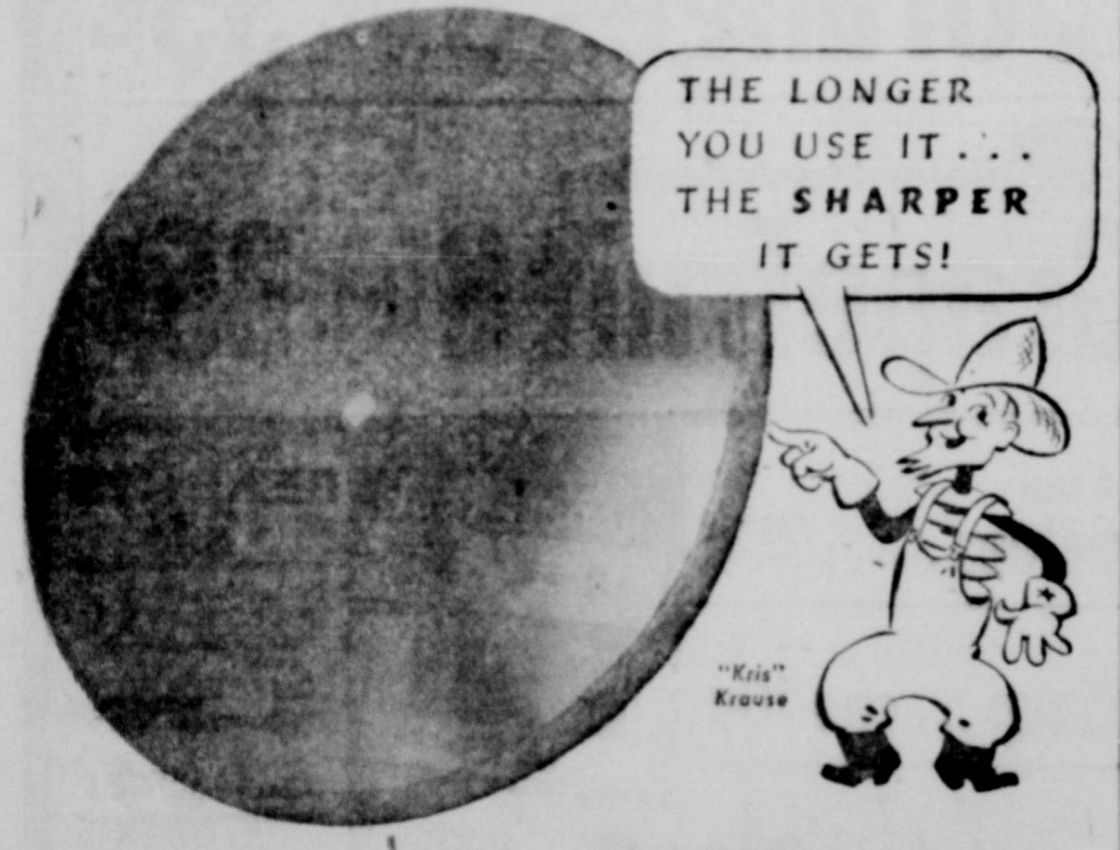

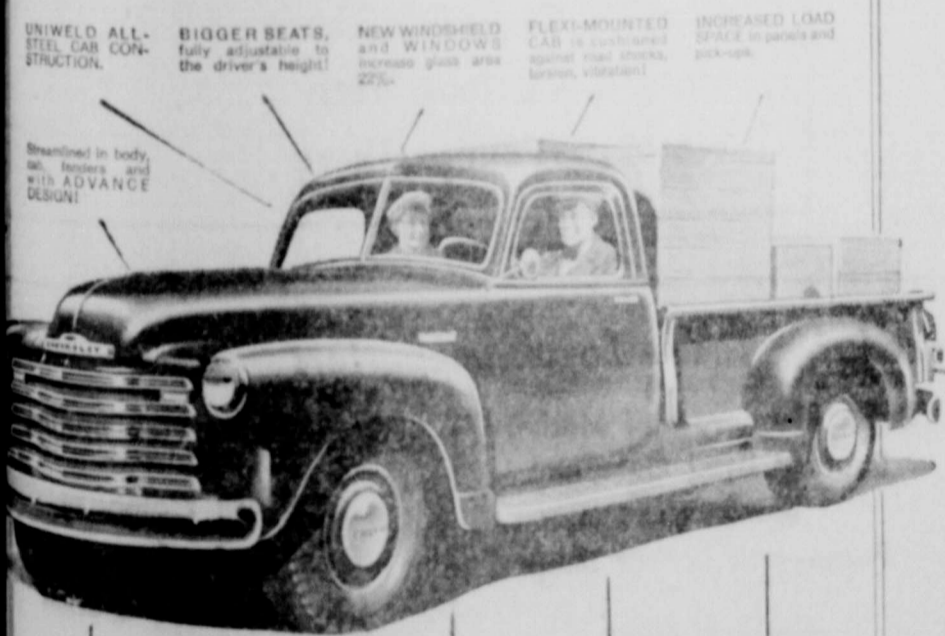

Hartley County Club Women 'Adopt' Higgins Family; Send Canned Food

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 27—There have been many stories of the adoption of destitute European families by Americans. But here is a story of the adoption of a Texas family by a Texas group.

When a tornado hit the little town of Higgins last spring, the destruction was equal to any "blitz." Assistance for the stricken town poured in from all over the country.

Members of the Behm Home Demonstration Club in Hartley county knew that it would take time for family life to recover from the loss of home and property. So they decided to "adopt" a Higgins family.

The ladies of the club met together last month and canned 100 quarts of corn and 30 quarts of green beans to be delivered to their adopted family, a concrete example of the kind of help they are giving.

The project has been very popular with every one in the community. Norma Lee Laniz, county home demonstration agent, says, and other clubs in the

county are adopting families, too.

Veteran Forum

Q. My brother entered the service under the Armed Forces Voluntary Recruitment Act of 1945 and he now wonders if his rights will be affected by the law officially ending the war on July 25, 1947 insofar as veterans benefits are concerned?

A. No, he will lose none of his rights even though his period of enlistment extends beyond July 25, 1947.

Q. Please tell me which non-service-connected disability benefits are available to World War veterans and which to peacetime veterans?

A. The law provides that a pension for non-service-connected disability may be payable to permanently and totally disabled World War veterans. The law does not provide such a pension for peacetime veterans.

Q. May I change the beneficiary of my insurance policy by a last will or testament?

A. No. A change of beneficiary for your insurance policy must be made by written notice to the Veterans Administration over your signature and it shall not be binding on VA unless received and endorsed on the policy by VA.

Q. I am in receipt of peacetime benefits for disability incurred prior to December 7, 1941. Why am I not entitled to wartime benefits for this period?

A. Since the World War II did not start until December 7, 1941, veterans with disabilities incurred in service prior to that time are not entitled to wartime benefits unless their service falls under the provisions of Public Law 359, 77th Congress, which provides that wartime rates would be authorized if the disability was the direct result of armed conflict or was received while the veteran was engaged in extra hazardous service including such service under conditions simulating war.

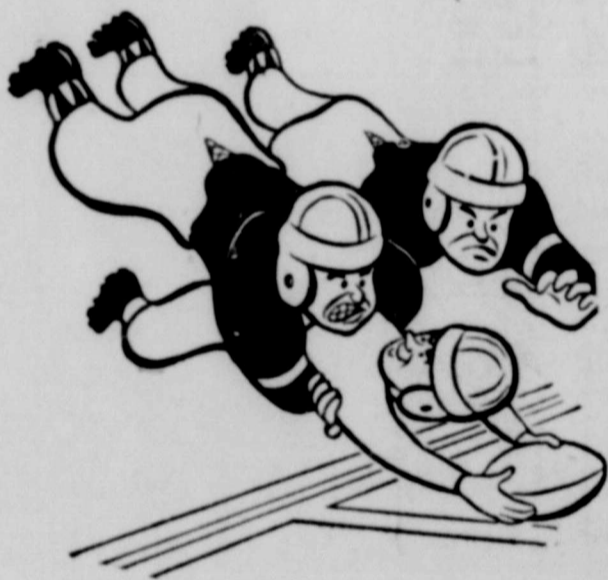

New Facilities Needed Now

This construction and remodeling program is needed now to provide adequate facilities for a well rounded program of education for our boys and girls. The heating system and remodeling is needed regardless of increased enrollment. The need is just as great for the auditorium and gymnasium.

Facts Concerning Financing

No expansion of the present school plant has been made since 1931. During the past 16 years the population has doubled. Community has experienced a great growth and school enrollment has increased accordingly. All available space now in use with many shortcomings.

We now have three sections in each of first five grades. Will require four sections in first and second grades next year. This increase will spread from primary to junior and senior high. Present indebtedness of district is \$205,000. Interest rates as follows: \$51,000 at 2 1/4%; \$42,000 at 3 3/4%; \$82,000 at 5%; and \$30,000 at 6%. Can sell bond issue now at 2 1/4 to 2 1/2%. When building costs decline, interest rates will advance, thus present low interest rate will in part, at least, offset high building costs.

Of the 1945 issue of \$80,000, \$60,000 was sold at 2 1/4%. This money was invested in government bonds bearing 2 1/4%. We have retired \$9,000 of this issue, leaving \$51,000 outstanding.

With the present assessed valuation of \$14,000,000, it will require 10¢ additional on the \$100 valuation to retire the proposed bond issue or a total of \$35¢ on the \$100 valuation for all bond requirements. It is possible, due to new construction of taxable property, that total valuations will be increased next year to the extent of taking care of the increased cost of the proposed additional bonds.

The petition and election order stipulates that the proposed issue will be for a 20 year period. Present plans are in anticipation of needs for the next 20 years under normal conditions.

It is our firm belief that if we wait until a later time, we will be forced to pay a higher interest rate. As an example, we will pay \$21,440 on the \$205,000 bonds outstanding . . . but we would only pay \$21,862 on the \$395,000 bond issue, due to the lower interest rate now available.

Rabies are More Prevalent in Cold Days Than Hot

AUSTIN, Oct. 28—Contrary to popular belief, rabies is more prevalent in winter than in the so-called "dog-days" of the hot summer months.

In a statement released this week by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, it was disclosed that of all animal brains submitted for examination by the State Laboratory in January, 1947, 35 per cent tested positive for rabies while in the mid-summer months of July only 18 per cent were positive.

"If all stray dogs were destroyed, and all pets vaccinated for rabies, it would go far toward stamping out this justly feared, and always fatal disease," Dr. Cox said.

The doctor stressed that dogs suspected of having rabies should not be killed immediately, but should instead be confined ten days for observation to see if the disease develops. If a dog sickens and dies during the observation period, the head should be packed in ice and sent to the State Health Department for examination. Freezing the brain, or killing the dog prematurely, or in such a manner as to injure the brain may make cor-

rect laboratory findings uncertain, if not impossible.

Dr. Cox declared that after a dog is confined ten days and then killed, there is still a safe margin of time for a victim of his bite to be treated for rabies prevention, but he cautioned that if the disease is found to be present in the dog, the victim should then begin treatment without further delay.

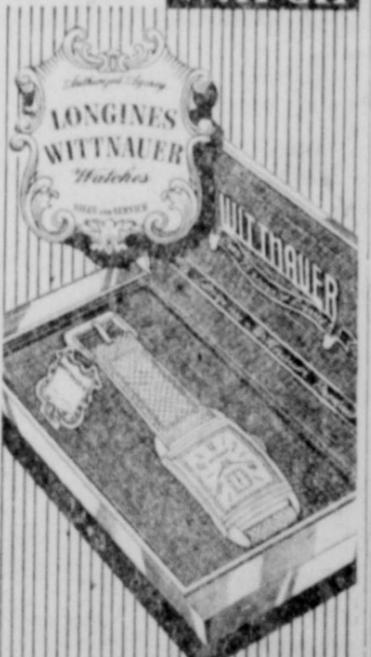

ATHENS (AP)—The reconstruction program of the American Mission for Aid to Greece has been put into effect with two projects in the Salonika and Athens areas, Major W. W. Vance of Galveston, Texas, executive officer of the district engineer corps, announced.

Winter Health Hazards are Just Around the Corner

AUSTIN, Oct. 27—Seasonal health hazards for young children are to be guarded against in the wintertime just as carefully as they are in the summertime in the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Every mother is familiar with so-called summer complaints which affect small children but certain winter diseases can be just as harmful and are just as likely to make their appearance unless proper precautions are used during the approaching season," Dr. Cox said.

In the group of winter diseases Dr. Cox included influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, asthma, and even diphtheria when a child has not had diphtheria immunization. Any such disease affecting a child's respiratory or breathing system is apt to be very serious and all too often fatal.

"These winter diseases are especially dangerous to babies and very young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread from the secretions of the nose and mouth. Children not in vigorous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defense against them is to build up the child's general health, as a power of resistance against disease," Dr. Cox advised.

Piccard Plans Ocean Plunge in Near Future

BRUSSELS, Belgium — Ocean depths of 12,000 feet will be explored for the first time by man if August Piccard completes his "Bathyscaphe" project for which arrangements are nearly complete.

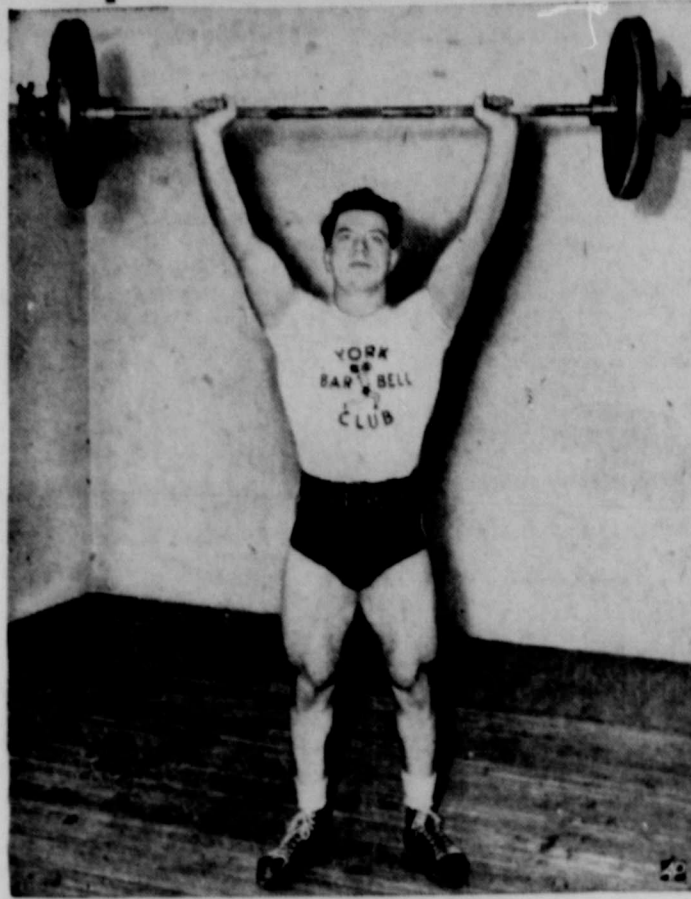
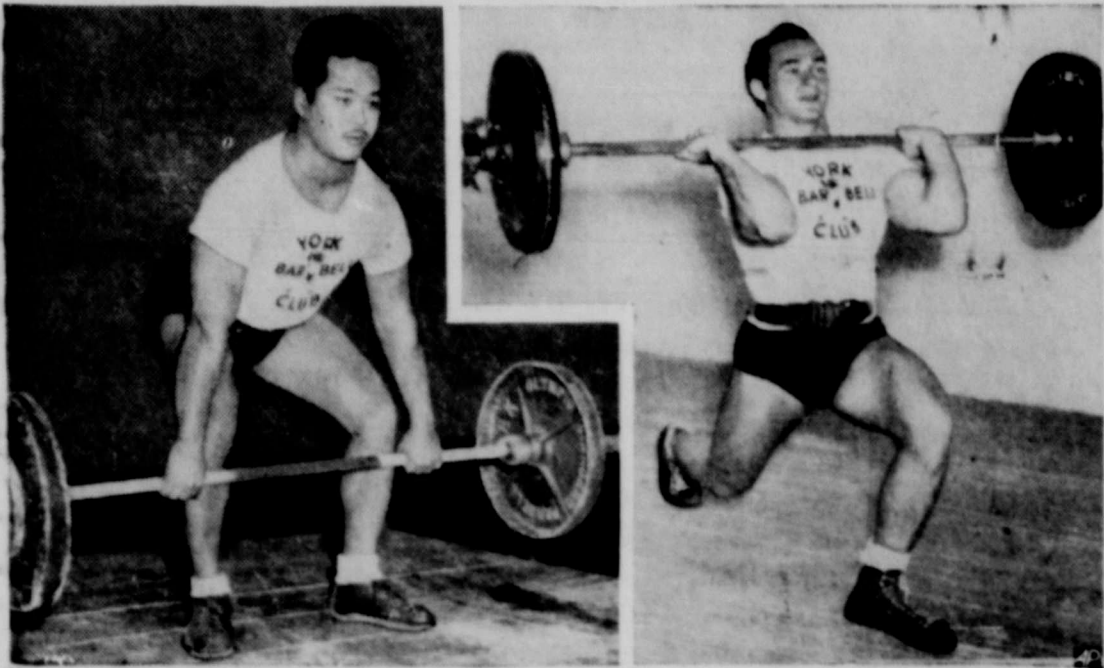

Present Day Weakness of United States Armed Forces Causes Dismay Among Our Leaders

A great deal is being written about the startling decline in the size and potency of our military forces. On V-J Day, we had the most powerful Army-Navy-Air Force team on earth. Now, two years later, we have a good but undermanned Navy, a small Army with a handful of understrength, green divisions, and, according to the experts, practically nothing in the way of a modern Air Force.

One of the most thought-provoking articles on the possible significance of this leads off the October issue of the Atlantic Monthly. Written by Francis and Katherine Drake, it is called "Our Next Pearl Harbor?" And its tone is found in this sentence: "Our land lies naked before a weapon which, in the words of the Smyth Report, is potentially destructive beyond the wildest nightmares of the imagination: a weapon so ideally suited to sudden, unannounced attack that a country's major cities might be destroyed overnight by an ostensibly friendly power." And a little later on the Drakes write: "It is a fact that today the United States is virtually helpless against such an attack (with atomic weapons) and that we have been sliding at increasing speed towards a military impotence that is an open invitation to disaster."

A good many people seem to think that no power would dare to use the atomic bomb against us because of the fear of retaliation—a factor which undoubtedly prevented the use of poison gas in the last war. The point

these people miss, in the Drakes' opinion, is that we are dangerously short of retaliatory instruments. We could stockpile atomic bombs by the thousands, but they would not serve us in war unless we had a ready means of getting them to enemy targets—and getting them there at once. According to Major General Echols, Russia is building some 44,000 military planes this year. We are building 1,300 or so. And it is known that Russia is giving unlimited resources to war preparations of all kinds—with the atomic bomb holding top priority.

Just how strong is the once-great U. S. Air Force? Our best bomber is still the B-29, though most experts consider it obsolete. A while ago the Air Force got together "every operational B-29 in the country" for a demonstration in the East. The total muster produced 130 planes—and of these, 28 didn't get there. General Kenney, the commander of the demonstration, called his tiny armada "a futile force." And, say the Drakes, the demonstration was so unimpressive that onlookers gave it the name Operation FLOP. That, remember, was the force that once numbered 80,000 combat planes, and blasted the Japanese and Germans from the air.

We have some 2,500 B-29s in dead storage. But it would take months, and perhaps a year or more, to prepare them for combat and to train the necessary ground and air crews. We had the time in the last war, thanks to British resistance and the "primitive" weapons then in use. No military commentator thinks we will have it if war comes again.

The Drakes believe that national security demands a modern Air Striking Force equipped with at least 1,000 modern, long-range bombers, which will be kept in combat readiness at all times. Secondly, they continue, we must have an adequately financed research program which will assure us world leadership in aircraft development. There is an old saying to the effect that every military plane is obsolete as soon as built—its superior is on the drawing boards. At present, our research activities seem pitifully inadequate. All we have is a few experimental prototypes of advanced planes. The Air Force asked \$300,000,000 for research and procurement—they were actually given \$33,000,000.

The Drakes deal in some detail with the potential destructiveness of the atomic bomb. They quote the great physicist, Dr. Robert Oppenheimer, who said "atomic weapons might kill 40,000,000 Americans in a single night." The bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki affected only three or four miles of area. The scientists think that future bombs may be able to devastate three or four hundred square miles—an area greater than that of any American city. And even that would not be the end. These giant bombs would release enormous amounts of unshielded radium the effect of which would be unimaginable.

The Drakes touch on the dangerous theory that there will be no atomic war because it would be too horrible—that no nation would bring itself to employ so fiendish a means of destruction. They say in reply to this attitude: "Let us not forget that there has never been a weapon invented in human history, from arrows to flame throwers, that has not been used to the utmost of its capacity. If we, a tolerant and enlightened nation, could bring ourselves to drop atom
