

Shawn Abducted

Banker's Son Released Unharmed

Stan Shawn, 21, son of Colorado City Banker Wayne Shawn, was abducted Saturday morning from a grocery store parking lot in Colorado City by four men who threatened him with a gun and later stole his car.

Shawn, a college student home for the weekend, was locked in the trunk of the car belonging to the abductor's and the abductors escaped in the Shawn car.

Late Saturday afternoon, the Shawn car was found abandoned in Eastland County and it was reported that the four men were being chased on foot by lawmen in that county.

Shawn was not injured in the ordeal.

District Attorney Frank Ginzel called the abduction "an

outrage" and said he is preparing kidnapping charges on four unknown males, between the ages of 18 and 25, two of which are believed to have goatees

and several with Afro-Style hairdos.

Stan had gone to Safeway about 11 a.m. to do some shopping for

his mother and when he was returning to his car, four men asked for a boost. Shawn replied See SHAWN Page 5

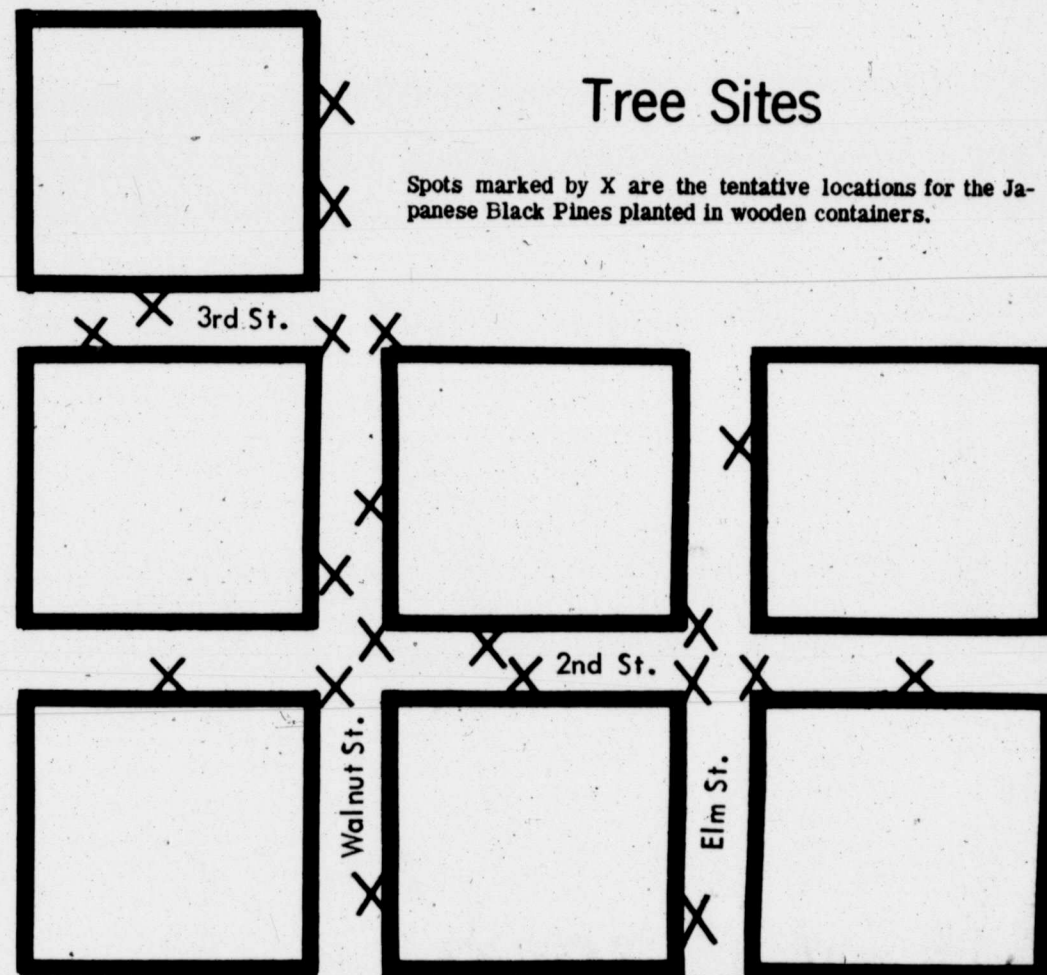

The accident occurred 15 1/2 miles west of Colorado City on Interstate 20.

The couple apparently was en route from Ft. Sill, Okla. where they had visited Warner's brother, to Ft. Bliss in El Paso where Warner was stationed.

The couple's two children, Sherry and Edriene, were not injured.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by Kiker-Rains-Seale Funeral Home here with interment to be on Yap Island, Guam, where Warner was born.

Hospital Health Club

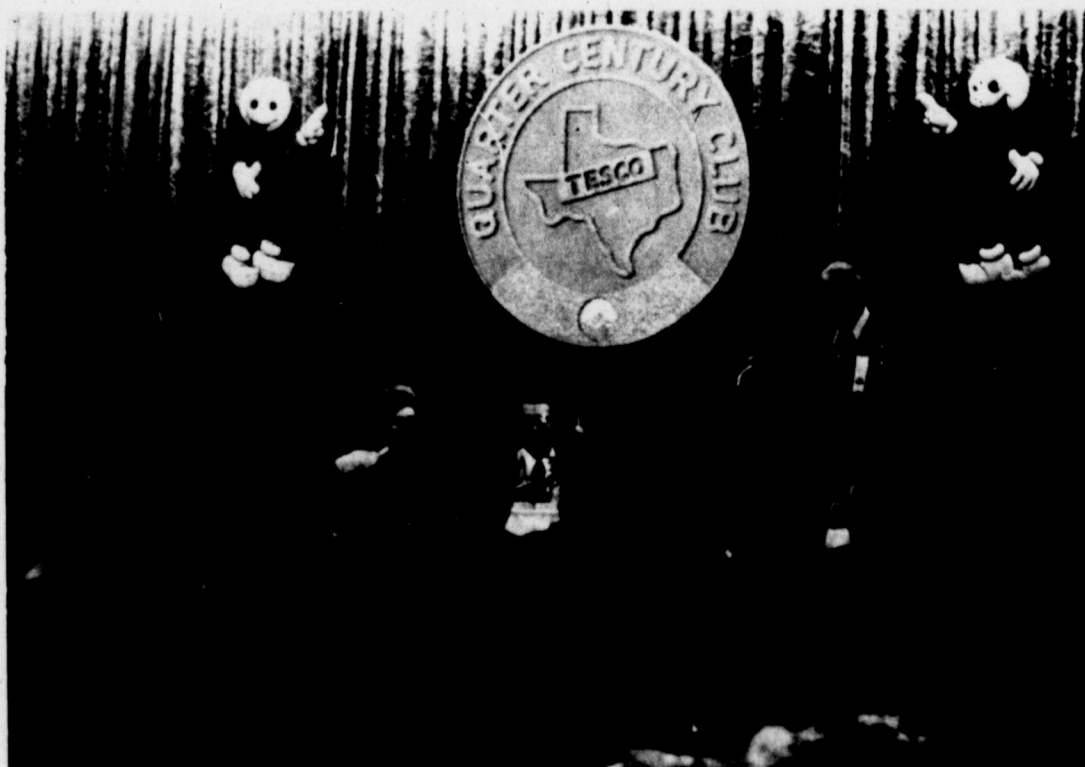
The Root Memorial Hospital District board of directors has voted to establish a health club in the hospital's recently completed physical therapy unit.

Registration for the health club will begin when an open house of the physical therapy department is held from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., Nov. 5.

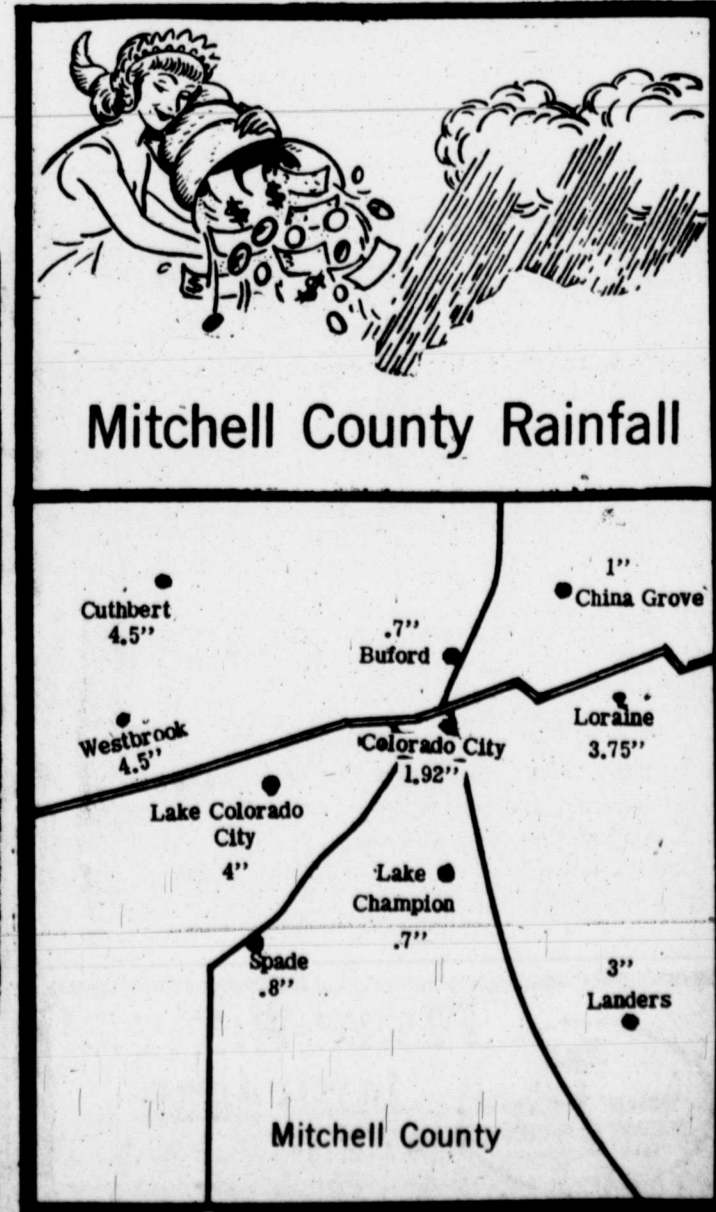
The physical therapy department is located in the southeast wing of Root Hospital. Entrance door for members is provided with a ramp and is in the ex- See CLUB Page 2

treme southeast corner of this wing.

Cost of becoming a member is \$30 per person per quarter; \$60 per person for six months or \$100 per person a year. For those with two family members in the club, the cost per quarter is \$60; \$100 each six months and \$200 yearly.

All dues are payable in advance.

Each health club member applicant will be interviewed by registered physical therapist Charles Smith and he will provide them with a schedule of exercise, diet and sauna bath treatments.

Periodic interviews will be held with the physiotherapist to determine each member's progress.

For women club members, the hours and days are from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday and from 5:15 p.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

For men, the hours are from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday and from 5:15 p.m. to 9 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

All equipment will be furnished by the Health Club and none is to be brought in by any member unless it is to be donated to the Health Club, Root said.

He further noted that physical therapy equipment including the whirlpool bath is not available to club members except when prescribed by a Root Hospital staff physician and there will be an additional charge for this service.

breeding and artificial breeding program.

From there, the tour will go to Wayne Oliver's place south of Loraine to see a stocker-feeder operation.

Oliver buys stock and keeps it 60 to 90 days and then sells to a feed lot. There will be a demonstration on stocker health and working calves.

Also at the Oliver ranch, those on the tour will see and hear about an improved range before going to the Hudson - Sparks ranch, also south of Loraine.

Points of interest to those on the tour at the Hudson-Sparks Ranch will include improvement on ranges and there will be a discussion, led by George Willis of the Soil Conservation office, on restoring pastures by defer-

red rotation grazing and use of improved grasses.

Also at the Hudson-Sparks Ranch, a free bar-b-que lunch will be served, courtesy of City National Bank, Hudson & Sparks Dirt Contractors, Nobles & Nobles Dirt Contractors and others.

After lunch, if anyone is interested a bus will go to the H & H Feedlot in Roscoe. One bus will return to Colorado City for those who can not go to the feedlot.

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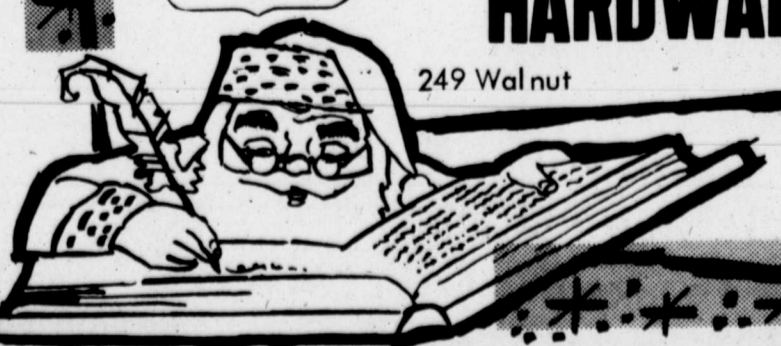
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Methodist Society, Guild To Be United Methodist Women

the loops of the sidewalk so as to be pleasing to the eye and still not hamper sidewalk traffic.

The wooden containers in which the trees will be planted are halves of large barrels.

Nurserymen have said that the rustic - appearing barrels have many advantages as planters. They hold moisture very well, are sturdy, and not easily moved. The pines look good, are green year round, hardy and relatively slow growing.

The Noon Lions Club has named Bob Reilly chairman of this project and now everyone's help is needed, Mrs. Neff said.

Businesses, organizations and individuals can help reach the goal in fund by contacting Reilly or the Chamber of Commerce office and contributing any amount to help pay for the trees.

The Noon Lions have already contributed \$200, the Jaycees have given \$50 and Colorado City Museum has pitched in the cost of one tree, \$33.

naturally, nothing can be very

if there isn't follow through.

Knowing the reputation of the
Texas Agricultural Extension
Service, I believe that those who
