Favor Selling Water For Use By Industry

Twenty-four interested Abernathy citizens attended a special Town Meeting which was called by the City Council for the purpose of discussing the possibility of future sale of water for industrial use. The meeting, held at 8:00, Thursday, April 15, was called after industrial representatives requested that the city consider the possibility of selling water for industrial use from the line from the airport section east of town.

Industrial representatives present indicated that the possibility city water usage would be requested only in a state of emergency. It was stated that an emergency would be classified as a time when sufficient water cannot otherwise be obtained for minimum operational purposes.

Citizens present at the meeting were almost in unanimous agreement that the city should sell water for industrial use. Several points were brought out in favor of same.

It was that no matter how little water Abernathy pumps out of the airport section, the supply eventually may be depleted by routine use. The city itself will use approximately 1 1/3 the amount of water required to irrigate a section of land. While we have the water there, it was decided that we should use it to the best advantage.

If we sell water for industrial use, the revenues on the sale would be used to help pay back the \$300,000 bond voted to obtain water from the section. It was pointed out at the meeting that we should get rid of this bond as quickly as possible because we may have to secure other bonds to get water from other sources in the future.

The consensus of the men at the meeting showed approval of the decision to sell water for industrial use in case it is requested. However, this decision will not be made until the Council acts on it. If you have an opinion that you feel should be voiced before the Council acts, you may express it to Mayor Roy Jones or Alderman Ward, Settle, Smith, Henson or Skipper.

City Council Notes Slow-Pay Water Users

The Abernathy City Council met in its regular monthly session Monday night, April 12, and voted to call a Town Hall Meeting Thursday, April 15. This meeting was held in the City Hall Clubroom.

The purpose of the meeting was to sound out the citizens' feelings about the possibility of furnishing City Water to local industrial plants.

In other action, the Council passed a statement saying that if a water bill is not paid by the tenth of the month, a second notice will be sent to the water user. If it is still not paid by the 17th, the water will be cut off and there will be \$2.50 turn-on charge instead of a \$1.00 charge.

Council members also discussed personnel they have interviewed for the position of City Manager. The position was vacated when Charles Norwood took a similar position in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma. The Council has not reached a decision as to the appointee yet.

Newly re-elected Mayor Roy Jones presided at the Council meeting and all five city aldermen were present. The Council members are W. T. Settle, Dan Z. Ward, Royce Henson, Jim Bob Smith and Billy Skipper.

Preparation For RAFB Training Program Begins

William A. Marlman and W. L. McPherson of Valley Aviation, Inc., have awarded Stout Steel Builders of 2317 34th, Lubbock, and North Highway 87 in Tulsa, a contract for construction of a building at the Abernathy Municipal Airport site. The 40' by 60' building will be used as a classroom for the instruction of student pilots from Reese Air Force Base.

The awarding of the contract for the construction of the building was the first step in the preparation of the airport site for the Reese Undergraduate Pilot Training. Valley Aviation was awarded the contract for the training program on Tuesday, April 13.

The construction of the building must be completed by June 1 to meet with contract specifications. Standardization of the fourteen civilian instructors to be used must also be completed by June 1.

The Federal Aviation Agency awarded Valley Aviation an Air Agency Certificate which gives it the right to have a primary flying school. This was required before the school could begin on August 1.

The school, which will begin on August 1, will have 57 students from Reese Air Force Base. They will receive 30 hours of flying time in the propeller-driven T-41A under the instruction of 14 civilian instructors.

The 40' by 60' building will be constructed of pre-fabricated MESCO steel at a cost of \$10,750.00. It will serve as a ground classroom for the students and also as an office for seven Air Force representatives who will oversee training of the students. Construction began Monday April 19.

Maintenance of the Air Force-owned T-41A's will be handled by Leonard "Skip" Trivett and three helper mechanics. The 21 planes assigned to Reese in the training program will all be stored and maintained at the Abernathy airport. Valley Aviation will provide for their maintenance.

Congratulations should be extended to these men who have brought this economical asset to Abernathy. The community can thank them by offering help in any way it can and welcoming the civilian instructors who will be moving into this area.

IRRIGATION CAN BE RESUMED HERE

City officials early this week gave the green light to Abernathy residents on irrigation of yards and gardens. Restriction on irrigation was lifted after water from one of the wells on the airport section east of town began flowing into the pipeline Sunday.

Other wells on the airport section are to be tied into the pipeline this week, and water from that source will go into the city water system and storage tanks.

INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATION ORGANIZED

The Abernathy Industrial Foundation, Incorporated, held its first meeting since its conception Monday, April 19. The officers of the Foundation were announced to interested citizens present and they will serve until such time as new officers will be elected by Foundation members. E. O. Graham is Chairman of the foundation. Other officers are James R. Smith, First Vice - President; James A. Bruce, Second Vice-president; and Dr. John Hale, Secretary - Treasurer.

The purpose of the Foundation as stated by Chairman E. O. Graham, is to interest industry in choosing Abernathy as an industrial site. The Foundation will do this by promoting business interest, rendering aid to interested enterprises and expanding present enterprises. The Foundation may render aid to interested industries by acquiring real estate for a suitable factory site, constructing a building for the factory and maintaining the building.

The purchase of real estate or construction of a building would be paid for by the Foundation either by the issuance of bonds or from capital funds of the Foundation. Payment of the bonds issued would be made from revenues obtained from the rent of the real estate or building. Rent would be paid by the company occupying the building or real estate to the Foundation.

Lifetime membership in the Foundation may be obtained by the purchase of one share at the cost of \$10. A person may buy any number of shares, but he still has only one vote in the activities of the Foundation. It is a non-profit organization and no dividend will ever be paid on the shares owned. The purchase of the share is a contribution to the forward growth of Abernathy and no direct benefits will be gained from it. However, if the Foundation is successful, the new industry brought in will bring indirect economic benefits to every member of the community.

Some people may ask what the difference is between the Foundation and the Chamber of Commerce. The sole purpose of the Foundation is to bring industry into Abernathy. It is better prepared to do this simply because it can finance new industry through the issuance of bonds whereas the Chamber cannot. The Foundation works independently of the Chamber, but yet they go hand-in-hand.

It was decided at the meeting that the Foundation's fiscal year would begin March 1 and end February 28. An annual meeting of all members will be held the third Monday in February each year. There may also be called meetings.

The Foundation is not open only to businessmen. ANYONE who wishes to contribute to the growth of Abernathy may become a member and will have an equal voice with anyone else in the Foundation.

All citizens present at the meeting pledged to become members of the Industrial Foundation.

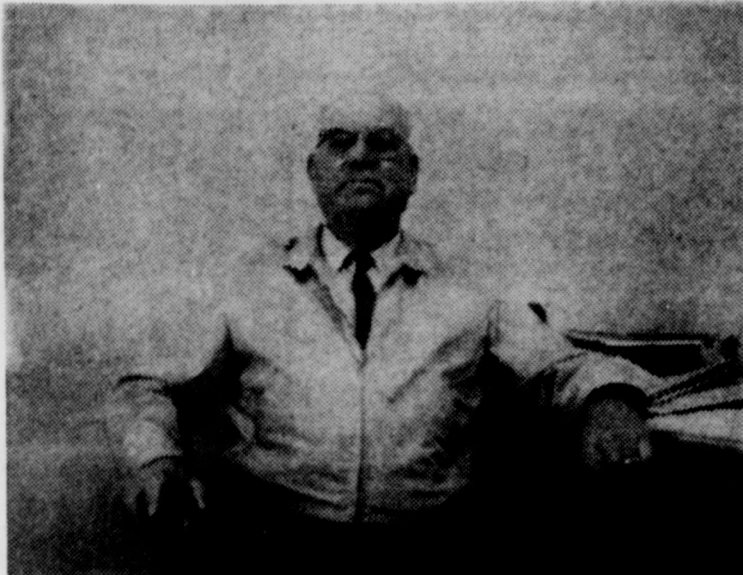

RAFB OPEN HOUSE SET FOR MAY 8

The most complete open house in history is planned for the annual Armed Forces Day observance Saturday, May 8, at Reese Air Force Base. Citizens of Lubbock and the South Plains are expected to flock to the base to see examples of the nation's "Power for Peace."

The morning has been set aside for sports and other activities, with the afternoon devoted to static displays and demonstrations.

On hand for public inspection will be 30 or more types of aircraft—some of the fastest, most versatile and capable in the Air Force, Navy, Army, Marine and Air National Guard inventories—and several missiles and missile models of the Armed Forces.

Virtually every area of the base will be open to visitors and special movies will be shown in the base theatre. A baseball game between the Reese team and the Texas Tech freshmen will open the new baseball field on the base.

Bonzo, the clown, will be on hand to visit with the children during the day.

Plans for Armed Forces Day at Reese call for a comprehensive program aimed at demonstrating to taxpayers how the Armed Forces are ready to protect the nation through "Power for Peace."

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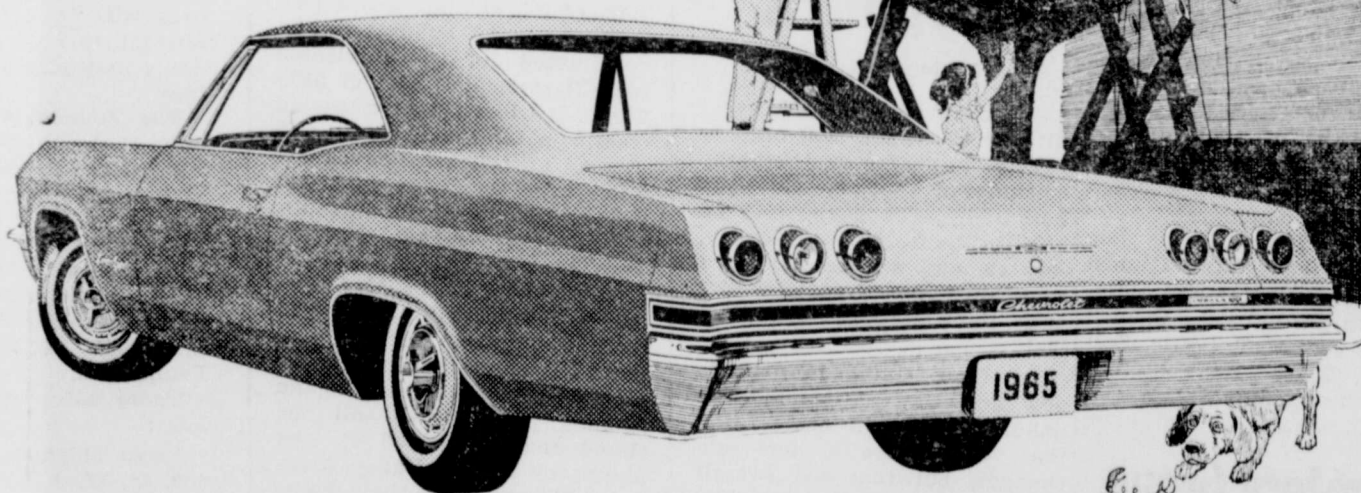

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New Deal

Commissioners Hear RW Draw Project Report

Flip Calhoun of the Soil Conservation Service gave Hale County Commissioners an up-to-date report on plans and problems of the Running Water Draw project at their regular meeting this month.

Calhoun said the planning group tentatively has located all sites in the project, including a multipurpose lake in Hale County on the draw south of Edmonson, and a retaining structure on the north draw close to the Hale-Castro county

line. The multipurpose lake will serve for flood control, recreation, and possibly municipal water supply. Calhoun said Hale Center and Abernathy officials had met to discuss costs of using water from the lake.

Pipeline Costly

One of the largest costs involved would be a pipeline from the lake to the cities, Calhoun said.

At the site in New Mexico to be used by Clovis, engineers found the soil is porous and will have to be lined to hold water effectively, Calhoun said. He said if this were necessary in Hale County they would know well ahead of time because of preliminary testing. Lining would add considerably to the

lake's cost; if only part of the soil "leaked," however, only that part would have to be lined.

Commissioners questioned whether the one lake near Edmonson would be sufficient to control the water for Plainview; at present no retainer is planned between here and the dam, Calhoun said the engineers' present plans to not show one is necessary. "When they get their yields figured, they may have to do something else," he said. "They're afraid they're going to put water on too much land. They have to arrive at a balance between the costs and the benefits."

Calhoun said he felt that there should be a charge for recreation facilities at the lake,

rather than free public access. People will come from a long way to a lake that size, he predicted. The lake will be about one half mile wide and seven or eight miles long.

Due In May

A recreation specialist will be here in May to discuss possibilities with community residents and city officials, Calhoun said.

The commissioners later discussed forming a county planning committee to make a study of county building needs and recommended alterations or improvements where necessary. The commissioners ended their meeting with a tour of the county jail to inspect facilities and see about changes needed. Their tentative decision was that the jail's condition is fair and most necessary improvements are simply maintenance items. County Judge C. L. Abernathy said that the interior recently had been painted throughout.

Bob Hooper, chairman of the Plainview-Hale County Joint Airport Board, came to the court with a report on work needed on runways, taking strips and parking strips at the airport.

Estimate Presented

Hooper said that seal coating was badly needed on the runway and entrance roads, and presented a \$26,000 estimate made by the engineering department of the City of Plainview for the necessary work. In addition, Hooper said the airport administration building needs about \$1,000 worth of repairs.

Hooper also said a needed improvement is extending and paving the concrete ramp from the administration building to the main hanger. This would give more parking space for the larger planes which come in during special events, he said, and also protect the strip from damage when the planes are pulled back up onto it.

This part of the project would cost an estimated additional \$20,000. It was indicated that money probably would come from five-year time warrants; the city and county own the jointly and would divide the costs of the project. No action can be taken unless the City Council and County Commissioners Court both give their approval.

Judge Abernathy said "If we don't save what we have out there now, it will mean a rebuilding job later." The Court authorized the airport board to continue its planning.

Mosquito Project

Commissioners hired Lee Barnes of Plainview to operate a mosquito sprayer recently purchased by the county. They authorized an assistant for Barnes to be hired later when necessary.

Commissioner Homer Robertson of Petersburg gave the Health Department a truck from his precinct to carry supplies for the sprayer.

Dr. Joseph T. Marshall of the City-County Health Department said work needs to start soon in advance of spraying. He said the agency expects about \$2000 from the state for chemicals. Abernathy said "Last year we used about \$2700 worth of powder; of course, that's no indication of what our needs will be this year."

Commissioners discussed the proposed road in the south part of the county below Halfway. W. T. McEachern, a landowner in the area suggested a meeting with all property owners along the road.

Vehicles Bought

Precinct One Commissioner Marvin Churchwell purchased one car and two pickup trucks for use in his precinct. The car is a Plymouth from Maggard-Nall Motor Co., on a low bid of \$1,870; the Ford pickups were purchased from Hale County Motor Company on a \$3,181.36 bid for the two.

Commissioners also re-invested \$4000 in matured treasury bonds for the capital improvements fund, and transferred \$5000 from the general fund to the City-County Health Department.

"Snakes" Tree Ohio Man Here

Abernathy Police Chief Frank Chapman worked until 12:30 a.m. Friday and went home. At 4:30 a.m., night patrolman Al Duckworth called and said: "Chief, we had a call reporting a man in a tree at a farm residence four miles north of Abernathy." Half asleep, and unbelievably, Chief Chapman asked Duckworth to "run that by again." "Yes, Chief," Duckworth answered, "the caller said a man was in a tree in their front yard."

Duckworth picked Chapman up and they went to the place. Sure enough, there sat a man 14 or 15 feet up the tree in the highest fork of limbs that would hold him up.

"Man, what are you doing in that tree," Chapman asked. "Snakes are after me," came the startling reply. "Can't you see them? Can't you hear them?" the treed man asked. "No, there are no snakes down here," Chapman replied. After the man insisted that he could see snakes, Chapman, thinking he was drunk, humored him by standing between the "snakes" and the tree as the scared man requested. With the Chief between him and the "snakes" the man cautiously climbed down out of the tree.

Noting that the first tree limb was about eight feet from the ground, Chapman inquired of the man how he managed to reach the limb. "I jumped and caught it," was his reply.

The officers took the 20-year-old man, whose home is in the state of Ohio, into protective custody and gave him a few hours lodging in the cross-bar "hotel". "And, the man seemed happy to be in the jail and away from the 'snakes', Chapman said. His only complaint when officers later checked on him in the jail: "The birds are after me in here."

The Ohio man told officers that he had walked from New Deal to the place north of Abernathy where he took refuge in the tree. On closer check, Chapman found that the man had not been drinking. The chief did advance some speculative reasons why the man went up the tree. The Ohio resident at no time was under arrest, nor was he a prisoner while he was in jail. He was placed there, and went willingly for his own safety. After daylight came, the man was given his breakfast and sent on his way. "Climbing a tree to get away from 'snakes' is not against the law," the Chief said. "And, as far as I know he had not broken any laws, and he was not arrested. We just rescued him from the 'snakes', he added.

The Chief, only a few days before the man-tree snake incident, had advised his new patrolmen that they would get a lot of calls, "and some of them will be rather unusual," he added. After the man-tree-snake deal, one patrolman said: "Chief, you sure were right. In this business, you do get some calls about strange things."

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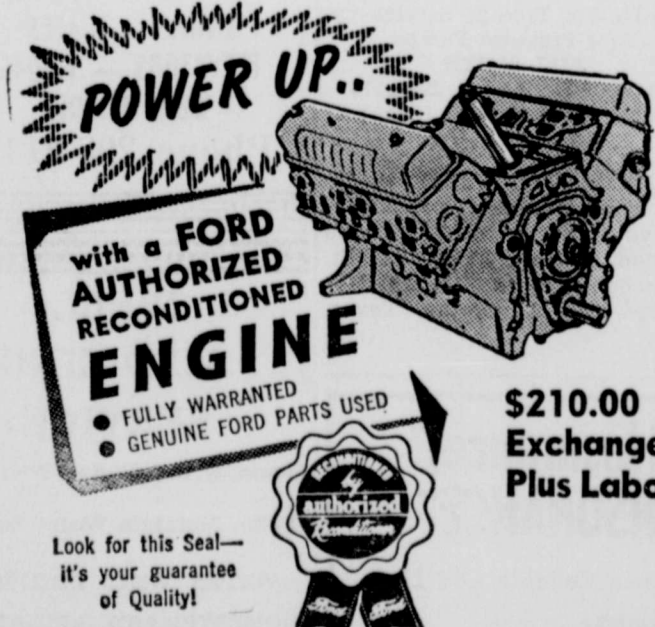
