

UNO Delegates Vote Solidly For Commission

Council To Convene
Friday To Consider
Iran, Greece Trouble

LONDON, Jan. 24. (AP) — The United Nations General Assembly voted unanimously today for the creation of a special atomic energy commission, urged by U.S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes as necessary to save the world from an atomic armaments race.

The action came after little more than an hour of discussion during which both Byrnes and chief Soviet delegate, Andrei Vishinsky, urged prompt action.

Almost simultaneously the World Security Council announced it would meet tomorrow to consider complaints involving Iran, Greece and Indonesia.

The complaints will provide the basis for the first major tests of the UNO's machinery to settle disputes.

Byrnes, who came to the UNO meeting primarily to work on creation of the atomic commission, planned to leave probably today and certainly tomorrow, American officials said.

The commission would have no power to control the United States or any other country to disclose any of its atomic energy production secrets or disclose how the atomic bomb is made, according to interpretations given by Byrnes. Its responsibility will be to work out ways of keeping atomic energy from being used destructively.

It will be composed of representatives of the 11 nations on the Security Council and Canada, and will be responsible to the council for its work and policies.

The United States entered an armaments race during the war "not to destroy but to save civilization," Byrnes told the assembly. He added that "if the race continues uncontrolled the civilization we hoped to save may be destroyed."

C. S. Blomfield, chairman of the committee, urged as liberal gifts as possible, recalling that local funds were depleted in aid during the polio epidemic of last summer.

Dust Storm Rages In Central Texas

A dust storm spread over central and south Texas today after coming across the Panhandle and northern parts of the state on a strong, dry, high-altitude wind.

A 4,000-foot blanket of dust partially obscured the sun at Austin this morning. Waco had a 20-mile-per-hour wind at about 2,000 feet, accompanied by heavy dust.

Dust also was reported at San Antonio, Alice, Yoakum, Palacios, and other places.

The winds bringing the dust cloud down from Oklahoma and Kansas struck the Panhandle yesterday afternoon, and continued to move south today.

Retirement Of Judge Sam Roseman Takes Effect February 1

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — The retirement of Judge Samuel I. Roseman as special counsel to the President, effective Feb. 1, was announced today by Mr. Truman.

The President told his news conference that Roseman would return to private life in New York City at that time but that Roseman had agreed "to come to Washington from time to time, without compensation, to continue to render whatever assistance and advice he may be able to."

War Department's Orders

Radar Setup In '41 Slowed, Short Says

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short charged today that the war department delayed setting up radar in Hawaii in 1941 while it completed installations in New York City, Seattle and San Francisco.

Short's charge was bolstered when he read to the Pearl Harbor investigating committee a telegram he said he had received yesterday from Waterloo, Iowa, signed by Maj. George D. Leask of the army signal corps.

Leask said that when he was transferred to San Francisco on Dec. 10, 1941, he found three radar towers "lying on an open pier" there. It was not until several weeks later that he received instructions from Washington to ship them to Honolulu immediately.

Short told the committee the army had hired experts from the Radio Corporation of America to help install radar equipment on the mainland.

"When it came to Hawaii," he said, "it was just a question of the officers digging out what information they could and putting it together. It looked like the war department was more interested in developing radar on the mainland than in Hawaii."

The witness said none of the permanent radar stations on Oahu was in operation at the time of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. A movable station, being operated for practice, picked up the Japanese planes but the information was not correctly interpreted.

Meat Packers Ordered To Await Instructions

CHICAGO, Jan. 24. (AP) — The striking AFL meat packers union today telegraphed all its locals to "stand by for instructions from our general office."

The union, with 70,000 members on strike in the meat packing industry, yesterday had ordered its membership to resume work Saturday when the government is to seize the strikebound properties.

The telegram, signed by Earl J. Jenson, president of the AFL Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of America, and other international officers of the union, said "do not be misled by any news item you may hear on the radio or see in the newspapers regarding government seizure of meat packing plants and the action of the Amalgamated regarding returning to work."

"Disregard all the above (such news items) and stand by for instructions from our general office," it said. "Our organization has the pledge of high government officials that the government will put into effect any wage increase determined by the meat fact finding commission retroactive from the date of government seizure."

"Up to the present time we have not received the official seizure order; therefore, stand by for further instructions."

Hostages Slain After Defeat, French Claim

NUERNBERG, Jan. 24. (AP) — France charged today that the Nazis executed at least 29,000 innocent hostages in their occupation of the fallen republic.

Charles Dubost, the French prosecutor, made the accusation before the international military tribunal and attributed prime responsibility to Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel and former Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering. They are two of the leading 22 Nazis on trial as war criminals.

Concluded for the time being were the individual cases against the 22 defendants, with the exception of Rudolf Hess, whose counsel is incapacitated with a broken ankle.

The condition of Julius Streicher, who suffered a heart attack yesterday, was reported improved today.

German Scientists
'On Carpet' In US
Research Centers

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — The half hundred German scientists brought here last fall to tell what they know about such things as rockets and atoms are being quizzed at some of the nation's leading research centers.

It was learned today that the scientists have been grouped into teams of specialists and taken to such places as a rocket testing ground laboratory in the west and to various air installations.

The War Department has steadfastly declined to amplify its cryptic announcement of last October 1 which said only that "certain outstanding German scientists and technicians" were being brought to the United States. Saying they were selected "from those fields where German progress is of significant importance to us and in which these specialists have played a dominant role," the department added that the Germans came on a voluntary basis.

Guinea Pig Fleet Made Public

NAVY REVEALS DESIGNS
FOR ATOMIC BOMB TEST

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — The navy raised the curtain today on its plans for testing the atomic bomb against a great armada of fighting ships—an experiment expected to revolutionize sea warfare.

A guinea pig fleet of 97 vessels, ranging from carriers and battleships to submarines and transports to small landing craft, will be the atomic target in the vast operation to start in May.

The laboratory selected is the anchorage on Bikini Atoll, one of the northernmost of the Marshall islands.

Vice Adm. W. H. P. Blandy, head of the navy's division on special weapons, ticked off for the senate atomic energy committee these details of the epochal experiment, known by the codeword "Operation Cross Roads":

1. In the target fleet will be two aircraft carriers, four battleships, two cruisers, 16 destroyers, eight submarines and 15 transports from US fleets; a German heavy cruiser; a Japanese battleship and light cruiser; and other ships.

2. The undertaking "is not a combined or international operation, but rather a scientific experiment by the United States government alone." The question of permitting foreign observers has not yet been decided.

3. The unnamed target ships "will be anchored and placed in a manner calculated to give effects varying from probable destruction to negligible damage" in each type.

4. The first test, early in May, calls for detonating an atomic bomb at an altitude of several hundred feet above the target vessels. A second test, tentatively set for July 1, will be an atomic burst at the water's surface in the target area.

5. A deep water test in the open sea is planned later, but technical difficulties preclude its coming off this year.

National Wage Policy Urged By Fairless

Warring Factions
Turn Problem Back
To President

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 24. (AP) — A national wage policy was urged today by President B. F. Fairless of US Steel Corporation as the steel industry and the CIO-United Steelworkers turned anew to President Truman for a solution of the four-day-old strike.

Terming wages "a national problem," Fairless offered "a proposal which I believe might open the way to a solution not only of the steel strike but the other strikes that now plague the country." In a nationwide radio address last night he asked the President to summon "immediately" leaders of industry for their advice on what wage increase "this country can endure without the danger of inflationary spiral."

The 175-member USW wage committee, on the other hand, asked Mr. Truman to turn over "a billion dollars worth" of government owned steel plants for operation by individuals willing to accept "in the interests of the nation" his 18 1/2 cents an hour pay increase suggestion.

There was no immediate comment from the White House on either proposal as the walkout of 750,000 steelworkers stretched paralyzing tentacles toward other industries.

Already the 29-state steel strike had forced 15,000 coal miners into idleness. Fabricating plants were curtailing hours and working forces. Milk deliveries were jeopardized in New York and on the West Coast by container shortages.

There were no new peace movements to contradict the forecast of a "long and bitter" strike made by the trade magazine "Iron Age." CIO-USW President Philip Murray told newsmen he saw no reason why mediators should be assigned to attempt to bring management and union together. The President himself had tried to mediate and the industry refused his recommendation, Murray said.

Fairless, speaking for the American Iron and Steel Institute which represents virtually the entire industry, termed "ridiculous" the repeated charges by Murray of a big-business "conspiracy" to break up labor unions.

"You don't destroy unions by offering them the highest wage increase in history," Fairless said.

Parleys Resumed

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (AP) — Top officials of the nation's three largest producers of electrical appliances resumed negotiations today with representatives of 200,000 CIO electrical workers who went on strike nine days ago in 16 states.

Both Sides Have Too Much Power

Steel Trouble Must Be Settled In Public's
Interest, President Truman Informs Press

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — President Truman said today much current industrial strife was a contest for power between management and labor — both of which, he said, have too much power.

The public interest, he added, demands settlement of the steel strike on the basis of his 18 1/2 cents wage increase proposal.

Mr. Truman said, however, that he did not intend to seize the steel industry at this time although he did not rule out that future possibility.

It was necessary for the government, Mr. Truman said, to assert the power of the people in preventing strikes against the public interest.

The president disclosed that consideration is being given to federal operation of a government-built steel plant in Utah.

The government built a plant at Geneva, Utah. Mr. Truman's views were expressed at a news conference. Asked about a proposal by Benjamin F. Fairless, president of US Steel, that he call an all-management conference on wages, the president said he was always ready to talk to business leaders.

However, he added, the best thing Fairless can do is send word that he accepts the White House proposal for settling the steel strike.

Mr. Truman said he thought it was not practical to seize the steel industry at the present time. He would not say the industry would not be seized eventually if the strike is prolonged, however.

"Theft Ring" Is Believed Broken Up By Arrest

Big Spring police department may have the solution to a series of burglaries and thefts which have occurred during the past three months in five West Texas counties, including Howard, Chief A. G. Mitchell said today.

One man has been arrested by local police and carried to the jail in Iraan, Mitchell said, after recovery of several electric motors, some of which have been identified as coming from the oil fields there. The sheriff's office in Iraan issued a warrant and telegraphed the police department here.

Warrant for another man has been issued at Fort Stockton, Mitchell said, and officers expect to place him under arrest soon. Several others are believed to be involved as accomplices, as preliminary investigation indicates that an entire "theft ring" has been in operation, the police chief continued.

The police started work on the case early this week, in cooperation with Jake Bruton, county juvenile officer. At first it was believed that most of those involved were juveniles. However, as investigation progressed, it developed that they were adults, Mitchell said, and the case was turned over to police.

Estimated value of the electric motors located amounts to \$1900, Mitchell said. About \$500 worth have been definitely identified as coming from oil fields in the Iraan area, he said.

East Texas Police
Seek Hit-Run Driver

LONGVIEW, Jan. 24. (AP) — Officers in East Texas searched today for a black Ford sedan involved in an automobile collision in which Mrs. C. L. Brazzil, 71, of Marshall, was critically injured last night, six miles east of here.

The automobile sought did not stop after the wreck. Tillman J. Cole, Flint, driver of the other car, Catherine and Velma Fielding, sisters, of Tyler, were all hospitalized with less serious injuries.

Mrs. Brazzil suffered multiple fractures.

U. S. Offers England 11 Ships As Pay For Ferrying Men Home

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — The United States has offered Britain the use of 11 Liberty ships as a substitute for the arrangement under which American troops are ferried home aboard the Queen Mary at a tentative charge of \$100 each.

Government officials said the offer has not yet been accepted. Presumably, the British are weighing the need for troop carriers for their own Tommies and colonials against that of reaching a settlement which would supplement their dollar credit in this country.

Since the end of lend-lease September 2, the Queen Mary has brought home 84,804 American troops. The Queen Elizabeth, before being withdrawn from the US run, carried another 29,392.

Together — unless the present charge is reduced or the American offer of the Liberty ships is accepted — the total charge to this country would be \$11,419,600 as of now.

While lend-lease still was in effect the British bore the cost of transporting GI's as part of reverse lend-lease.

Technically, a fee of 25 pounds, or roughly \$100, was assessed against the government for each man. This, however, was wiped out at the time of the final lend-lease settlement and did not involve any cash changing hands.

When lend-lease ended, the same charge was retained.

As compared with the tentative charge, the price of a one-way, third-class, transatlantic passage aboard one of the Queens before the war was approximately \$66. Third class accommodations then, however, would be regarded as luxurious in comparison with the tier-on-tier arrangement now in effect.

Congress Plans To Pressurize Management

Campaign Inspired
By Foes Of Stern
Strike Regulation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — Congressional efforts to put the heat on management, instead of workers, in the current strike epidemic began to take shape today.

The drive is being sparked by foes of proposals for stern regulation of industrial strife, and some of these lawmakers claim the White House is not adverse to at least one turn on the griddle for struck employers.

This new tack developed as several Senators and Representatives advocated speedy abolition or modification of present laws giving tax rebates to corporations whose 1946 profits drop below pre-war levels.

Sponsors of this plan, including one Congressman with reported White House backing, disclosed a program for frequent floor speeches defending labor and criticizing employers for their position in present strikes.

Presidential support was claimed for a House address in which Rep. Biemiller (D-Wis.) asserted earlier in the week that the US Steel Company would have "made money" if it had accepted the wage compromise advanced by President Truman.

Biemiller said the company would have added \$200,000,000 yearly to its income through a \$4 a ton price boost, while paying out \$180,000,000 in wage increases at the suggested 18.5 cents an hour gain. The \$4 price boost reportedly would have been sanctioned by the administration.

Several of Biemiller's colleagues told a reporter his figures "came from the White House." Biemiller would say only that "they represent a compilation by OPA and the Labor Department" and that "I was asked to make them public so people would know the situation."

Biemiller, along with other close friends of organized labor such as Reps. Hook (D-Mich.), Savage (D-Wash.), Bradley (D-Pa.), LaFollette (R-Ind.) and Marcantonio (ALP-N.Y.), plan to launch a series of similar speeches in the House. Senators Morse (R-Ore.), Kilgore (D-WVa.) and Murray (D-Mont.) are expected to carry on along the same line in their chamber.

These members hope not only to gain supporters, but also to stave off quick passage of several pending labor bills which they consider too restrictive.

Enginemen Will Stand By Law, Johnston Says

CLEVELAND, Jan. 24. (AP) — The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers will observe "whatever provisions the law calls for" in the event the brotherhood's 78,000 members authorize a strike on the country's railroads, grand chief engineer Alvanley Johnston said today.

The brotherhood will hold a committee meeting here Feb. 1 to consider polling the members for a strike. The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen has authorized a strike vote among its 215,000 members, and President A. F. Whitney said yesterday it would take about three weeks to complete the voting, after which a strike might be called "within three days."

The two organizations, three other "operating" brotherhoods and 15 "non-operating" organizations asked the railroads last July for wage increases averaging about 25 per cent, and changes in the working rules.

Washington sources said that in the event of a strike call, the national (railway) mediation board probably would recommend that President Truman appoint an emergency fact-finding board, as provided in the Railway Labor Act. Although the law does not prohibit a strike while such a board is conducting an inquiry, it appeared likely a "waiting period" would result.

Tahiti Offers No Sanctuary For Homeless

AP Newsfeatures
TAHITI — This island paradise has a housing shortage too. Rents have climbed to levels never before experienced, and Utopia-seekers who came here to get away from such things are dismayed. So many of them are clamoring for steamer passage home, and so little passenger space is available on ships calling here, that the would-be exodus is taking on tinges of panic.

Rationing has been discontinued and shops are displaying an unaccustomed variety of new merchandise, but prices are steep and only add to the discouragement of those who picked Tahiti as a haven of picturesque and inexpensive living.

On top of everything else, the driest season in 25 years is parching the countryside and water is scarce, especially for bathing. There is plenty of salt water in the lagoons, but they are too full of octopi for swimming parties.

However, letters are still coming here by every mail from distant mainland cities, inquiring about the low cost of living and other advantages of retirement in Tahiti—away from it all.

Car License Plates Will Be Available On February 1

FOUR MILITARY DISCHARGES HAS 18-YEAR-OLD VET

BALTIMORE—Love of excitement and a bad case of hay fever got Donald J. Robbins four discharges from three different branches of the armed forces at the age of 18—two from the Navy, and one each from the Coast Guard and the Army.

He enlisted in the submarine service at 16 and was sent to submarine school at New London, Conn. Things went fine for six months—practice escapes with a Momsen lung in the Navy's huge pressure tank, practice dives in the school's old S-type subs—plenty of excitement.

Then, "somebody squealed," Donald laments. "They told me to re-enlist in six months when I turned 17."

Came Jan. 12, 1944, his 17th birthday. Donald shipped into the Navy once more, this time legally, but after a scant four weeks came hay fever and another discharge.

"When I became 18," he recalls, "I went through selective service into the Army." With the paratroopers hay fever raised its ugly head in the middle of a parachute jump, the boy's seventh.

The first sneeze hit him just as he had fastened onto the static line, which automatically opens the chute. His attacks had been causing him to become temporarily blind.

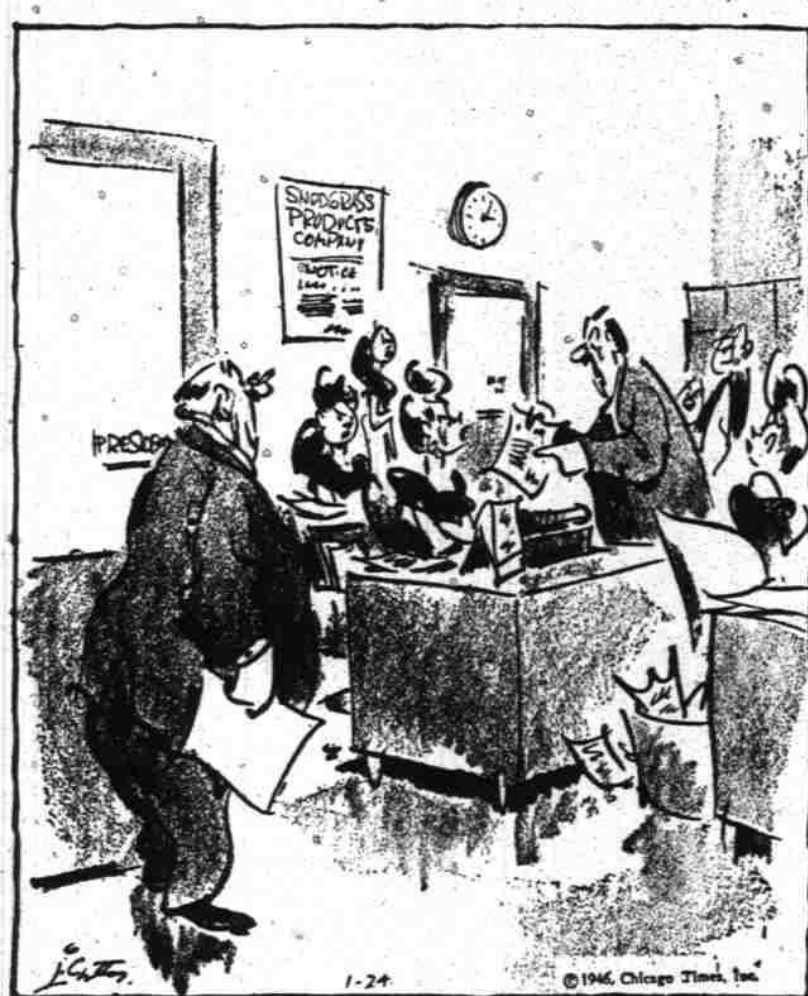
"Halfway down I went totally blind," he says. "Why I escaped with nothing more than a broken ankle, I'll never know. Guys break their backs often with their eyes open."

That's how he garnered his fourth and final discharge, and why he carries a cane as he goes about his work at a Baltimore funeral home.

Philatelic Magazine Lauds Texas Stamp

AUSTIN, Jan. 24. (AP) — The stamp, issued Dec. 29, 1945, has Texas Centennial of Statehood received the praise of philatelic experts as "one of the most artistic and attractive issued by our government in some time."

George C. Hahn, in an article in a weekly philatelic magazine, said "the designer has grasped the story behind the stamp and succeeded in graphically and beautifully portraying an historic event. It is pleasing that a statehood commemorative stamp depicts something else than a state capital, which in few cases is a thing of beauty."

Designer of the stamp is a Texas artist, James Buchanan "Buck" Winn of Wimberly, who says he had little idea when he designed the stamp that it would be of much importance.

He had little knowledge of philately, says he cannot yet pronounce the word, and is astonished at the number of people who do know about it and can pronounce the word. Each day's mail brings him a stack of letters from over the country.

The central design of the stamp comprises the American flag with a ray shining from the 28th star to the simple star of the "Lone Star" state flag. This, says Winn, seemed "the only natural conception" for the stamp to him.

Ray E. Lee, postmaster, reports a total of 397,866 "first day covers" cancelled on Dec. 29. This compares with 424,950 first day covers from the all-time record sale of the Alfred E. Smith commemorative stamp issued Nov. 26, 1945, in New York.

Ike's Draft Call Wins Some Backing On Capitol Hill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (P) — General Dwight D. Eisenhower's call for 250,000 new draftees by July 1 won a conditional endorsement today on Capitol Hill.

The special senate investigators of the demobilization tempest reported that prospective selectees plus volunteers could ensure the 1,500,000-man army which Eisenhower insists is essential to carry out commitments after mid-year.

The army chief of staff emphasized when he testified before the inquiry that only if the "lagging draft" is able to provide the 50,000 men per month we are asking for will the 1,500,000-man army be guaranteed under our present discharge policy.

The senate military subcommittee recommended continuing "the rate of demobilization of the past few months." It also was of the opinion that the current recruiting drive would produce more volunteers than army estimates.

The report filed by the subcommittee yesterday advocated the discharge of all fathers in the army by July 1, except volunteers — something Eisenhower testified could not be done.

The preliminary approval of the plan for bringing the army up to postwar strength with increased draft levies in the ensuing five months evidently did not take into account strong sentiment in congress to let selective service die when the present law expires May 15.

Dawes Entering YMCA School

W. R. (Bill) Dawes, newly elected secretary of the fledgling YMCA, leaves today for Dallas for a brief course of YMCA orientation.

Length of his stay in Dallas, regional YMCA headquarters, was not determined, but the board, in selecting Dawes as the man to administer the program here, authorized such training as necessary to insure effective operation of the activity here.

Dawes had been serving as general chairman of the local YMCA board. In resigning this post, he expressed appreciation to members of the directorate and the organization for efforts exerted in instituting a YMCA program for Big Spring. He had praise for campaign workers who are serving under Dr. R. B. G. Cowper, Robert T. Piner and Mrs. Ray Clark, drive leaders named by J. B. Mull, finance chairman. These, he said, are doing an exceptional job.

The executive secretary, who will become the first for the YMCA here, was named at a meeting of the board Tuesday evening. He said it was his hope "to become an aggressive co-worker" with all who "are interested in achieving the maximum benefits of such a program as the YMCA can offer."

While Dawes is at school, K. H. McGibbon, chairman of the housing committee, will supervise the transfer of equipment purchased from the USO to the YMCA headquarters, which are being installed over Wackers.

GOP Economy Drive Opened In House

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (P) — House republicans aimed a newly-declared economy drive today at the first appropriation bill to come before congress this year — the \$5,594,000,000 independent offices measure.

The GOP members rallied behind a call of their house leader, Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., of Massachusetts, and their policy-making steering committee for cuts wherever they "won't interfere with necessary services."

While the rapidly expanding veterans' administration with its \$4,931,142,415 allotment is down for the lion's share of funds in the pending bill, Martin told reporters "there are plenty other departments that can be cut."

Martin said, however, there would be no effort to apply a specific percentage reduction all along the line when the bill is voted on, probably late today.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (P) — District 50 of John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers plans an intensive drive to organize all railroad workers in the east following its selection as bargaining agent for 1,192 trainmen on the Long Island Railroad.

Howard County Allotted \$72,448 For 1946 Conservation Program

Howard county has been allotted \$72,448 of the funds authorized by Congress for the 1946 agricultural conservation program.

Landlords, tenants and sharecroppers are eligible for conservation assistance if they apply to the county ACA committee before beginning the conservation practice for the amount of assistance needed, carry out the practice in accordance with the printed specifications in the 1946 Handbook of Conservation Practices for Texas, and inform the county ACA committee within the time fixed by the committee of the completed practice.

The amount of assistance will be determined by the committee on individual basis of conservation needs and the funds available to the county for this purpose.

The entire allocation of funds to Howard county is available now. The committee urges farmers to apply for conservation assistance before all the funds have been budgeted.

These conservation practices in Howard county may receive assistance and payments: construction of standard spreader terraces for which proper outlets are provided; construction of earthen dams or reservoirs; drilling or digging wells for stock purposes; deep plowing of sandy cropland to prevent wind erosion; contour listing or furrowing of cropland; leveling on the land as a protection against wind erosion the stalks or stubble of sorghums or millet; deferred grazing; growing green manure or cover crops; control of destructive plants on non-crop pasture and range land.

FEPC Filibuster Not To Be Broken In Senior House

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (P) — A poll by administration aides showed today the Senate will refuse to break the week-old FEPC filibuster by applying its so-called "gag rule."

Nevertheless, Senator Mead (D-NY) said an effort will be made to present a cloture or debate-limiting petition today.

Results of the poll showed "more than 36" Senators lined up against any step to force an end to the debate which has gone on since the measure to set up a permanent Fair Employment Practice Commission was called up unexpectedly a week ago. Four or five other Senators were counted as "probably opposed" to cloture.

Application of the seldom used rule requires a two-thirds majority of those voting. Thus 33 "No" votes would suffice to prevent adoption of the rule even if all 96 members were present.

If the "gag rule" were adopted, no Senator could speak more than one hour in all on the pending bill.

Uneasy Bombay Flares Again

BOMBAY, Jan. 24. (P) — Bombay faced another night of disorders tonight after a riotous day in which police repeatedly fired on bands of demonstrators in futile efforts to restore order.

First outbreak of violence today occurred when police fired three times upon huge, stone-throwing crowds following the funeral procession of a Hindu victim of yesterday's bloody riots.

A police bulletin said twenty-five persons were wounded by gunfire during the day, bringing the number of wounded in two days of disorders to nearly 500.

Ex-Soldier Cleared Of Assault Charges

HOUSTON, Jan. 24. (P) — Albert R. Hill, 40-year-old former rifleman with the 84th Infantry Division in Europe, was found innocent last night in a Goose Creek, Texas, court of assault and battery charges on the chairman of his draft board, F. N. Read.

A six-man jury returned their verdict after deliberating 47 minutes.

WASHINGTON CREAM PIE. Split single cake layer, fill with coffee-flavored custard, decorate with powdered sugar and jelly.

You'll like this version of Washington Cream Pie—thin layers of delicious cake put together with a coffee custard filling. Here's the recipe for the cake part, sufficient for six servings:

1-2 cups cake flour
1-2 teaspoons baking powder
1-3 cup shortening
2-3 cup sugar
3-4 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
1-2 cup bottled milk
Sift flour, measure, sift again with baking powder and salt. Cream shortening with the sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Add egg, continue beating. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk. Pour into well-greased pan and bake in moderate oven (375 deg. F.) 25-30 minutes.

Coffee Custard filling: You'll need half a cup of double-strength brewed coffee, made fresh from a vacuum-packed jar. Add this to 1 cup bottled milk, scald in a double boiler. Meanwhile, combine 1-3 cup sugar, 1-3 cup sifted flour and 1-4 teaspoon salt and blend with 1-2 cup additional milk. Add to scalded mixture and cook until thick. Add 1 tablespoon butter. Stir a little of hot mixture into 2 slightly beaten eggs, then add all to double boiler. Cook over low heat about two minutes more. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla and cool.

Assembling Cream Pie: Split cake layer and fill with cooled Coffee Custard. Cover top with sifted powdered sugar and decorate with currant or raspberry jelly, dropped from a teaspoon.

Concoct Meals From These Excerpts From Wallace's Soups, Stews, Chowders



BEef STEW... An all-American favorite at mealtime

As you have often read in these columns, it is my opinion that a soup, a stew or a chowder, well and imaginatively concocted, can stand on its own any day as the main dish of a company meal. Followed by a fine salad and good cheese and a sweet, if you wish, one of these meals-in-a-dish makes a satisfying, delicious dinner.

One of our better book-book writers, Lily Haxworth Wallace, has just done a book entitled "Soups, Stews and Chowders" which is as good a guide as has ever been written for this type of cookery. Below are quoted a few of her excellent recipes.

Potage Dennis
1-2 cup minced onions
1-4 cup minced celery
2 tablespoons fat
1-2 pound chopped beef
1 quart water
2 teaspoons salt
1-6 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon mixed dry herbs
1 cup diced carrots
2 cups tomatoes cut up (fresh or canned)
2 cups sprouted soy beans or cooked kidney beans
1-2 bunch water cross
Saute onion and celery in the fat. Add the meat and cook, stirring constantly, until meat is lightly browned. Add water, sea-

sonings, herbs, carrots, tomatoes, beans, and watercross stems cut into one-eighth-inch lengths. Bring to a boil, simmer covered for about twenty minutes or until the vegetables are tender. Finally, add the watercross leaves, coarsely cut, and reheat.

Steak With Oysters
3 slices bacon
1 1-2 pounds round or chunk steak cut thick
2 cups cooked macaroni
1 stalk celery, diced
1 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon pepper
3 cloves
3 carrots, halved lengthwise
2 cups water or stock
1 dozen oysters
1-2 cup red wine
Dice the bacon and cook just until the fat flows freely. Remove bacon and brown the meat on both sides. Lift out meat, replace bacon and over it lay the cooked macaroni. Put the browned steak on this, sprinkle with celery and seasonings, add cloves, arrange carrots on top, and pour in the water or stock. Cover and simmer very gently two to two and one-half hours. Ten minutes before serving add the oysters and wine and continue cooking just until the edges of the oysters ruffle.

Salmon Chowder
1-8 pound salt pork, diced
1 small onion, minced
2 medium-sized potatoes, diced
1 quart milk
2 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons butter or vitaminized margarine
1 teaspoon salt
1-6 teaspoon pepper
1 tall can salmon
1 tablespoon parsley
Oyster crackers
Fry pork until fat flows freely, remove the scraps, add the onion and cook until light brown. Add potatoes and milk, and simmer until the potatoes are just tender. Thicken with the creamed flour and butter or margarine, then add the seasonings and the salmon carefully picked over, freed from skin and bone, and flaked. Heat thoroughly and, just before serving, sprinkle the minced parsley over all. Pass crackers separately.

Loan Regulations More Liberal, Reveals Boren

A complete change in most detailed requirements for loans to veterans will be effected when the amended GI Bill of Rights is fully interpreted and placed into operation, Ray Boren, veterans administration contact representative, has announced.

For example, a veteran will have 10 years from the official end of the war to apply for a loan guarantee. Boren points out, which is exactly five times the period allowed under the original law.

Under the new law the veterans administration can guarantee up to \$4,000 on real estate loans of \$8,000 or more. The limit for business loans remains at \$2,000, but the amount of guarantee a veteran uses on real estate loan reduces in proportion the amount which can be guaranteed on a business loan.

The new law provides that in order to get a loan guaranteed by the veterans administration, the arrangement between the lender and the veteran must be such that the loan is to be repaid within 10 years if it is a business loan, or within 25 if the loan is to purchase a home or business real estate or within 40 years if it is a loan for farm real estate.

Boren expects to be able to put the new system into practice at the local office some time within the next 60 days.

Jap Repatriates Saved After Ship Sunk By Explosive

SHANGHAI, Jan. 24. (AP)—The dramatic rescue of nearly 4,300 Japanese from their sinking repatriation ship, the Enoshima Maru, was told today when the American freighter Brevard arrived jammed with 99 per cent of the survivors.

The ship sank rapidly after striking a mine 60 miles off the mouth of the Yangtze yesterday.

In only 25 minutes, all the Japanese except about 20 killed in the explosion or in subsequent mishaps were transferred from the 6,000-ton vessel to the Brevard. It appeared likely that the rescue would set a record for speed in handling such a mass of people.

The Brevard's skipper, Lt. John L. Elliott of San Diego, Calif., said the rescue was accomplished with hardly a hitch.

The 5,000-ton Brevard was trailing the Enoshima Maru about three and a half miles. Even at that distance, the American ship trembled so violently from the blast "that I thought we were hit," said Elliott.

"I ordered emergency speed ahead and saw her settling by the stern."

Two lines were thrown aboard and the Japanese began swarming over the sides as the ships nestled together. Two or three persons dropped into the sea, including a woman who had just handed her baby to an American sailor. She drifted under the Brevard's propellers and was cut to pieces.

About 75 people left aboard were brought out to the Brevard in small boats under the direction of Lt. (jg) James L. Bradford of Brownwood and Lufkin, Tex.

(Bradford is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. J. M. Bradford. The Rev. Bradford was former pastor of the Coggin Ave. Baptist church, Brownwood, and at present is pastor of the Baptist church in Lufkin. The lieutenant's wife and daughter reside in Lufkin.)

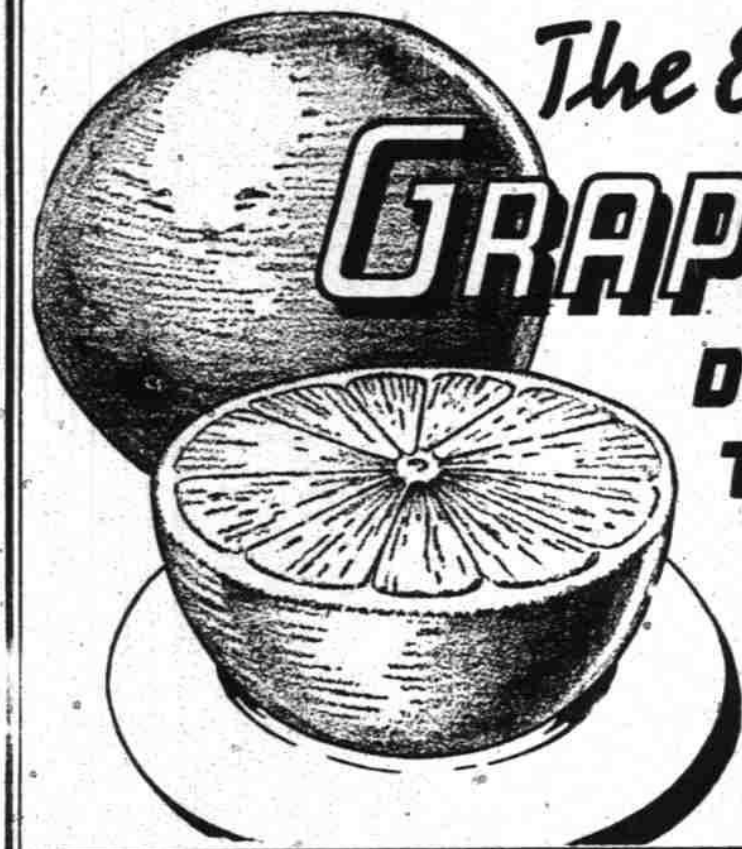

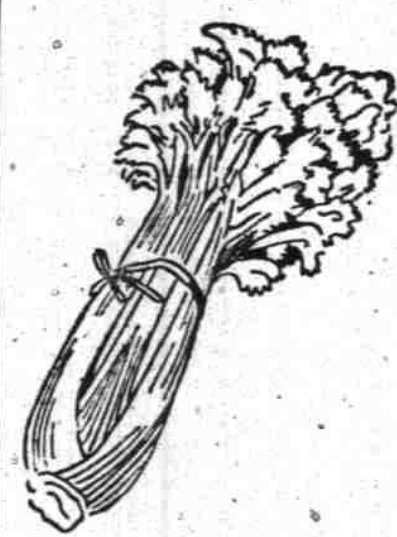

Shortage Of Building Materials May Be A Blessing In Disguise

In one respect, the current shortage of building materials may prove to be a blessing in disguise, Margaret L. Christie, Howard county home demonstration agent, says.

This is because folks may have an added "year of grace" to plan in detail the houses and farm buildings they intend to construct.

Many homes suffer from poor planning, especially low-cost homes, Miss Christie points out, in stressing that a year spent in considering what the family needs and what plans will best meet those needs will pay dividends in convenience and savings. Of course, the family will have to consider what it can afford to spend.

Many farm magazines, magazines for homemakers and construction industries offer booklets of plans which families can obtain for study as they plan their new homes.

Experts believe construction of only 150,000 new farm houses will be started in the nation this year and next. But as supplies and la-

bor become available, and if farm income stays up, that number should be doubled in the years ahead. One other thing experts agree on is that about one-third of all rural houses are beyond repair.

Surveys on housing made by the department of agriculture disclose some surprising facts. For one thing, 70 per cent of the rural families expecting to build new homes will spend less than two thousand dollars. And where houses are being built for tenants, landlords expect most of these to cost no more than one thousand dollars.

Regardless of how much a family intends to spend on a new house, the planning shouldn't be neglected, Miss Christie says. It's just as important when only two thousand dollars will be spent as 20 thousand.

Episcopal Diocese To Meet In Austin

GALVESTON, Jan. 24. (P)—St. David's church of Austin, which will celebrate the centennial of its founding next year, was selected as host for the 1947 council meeting of the Episcopal diocese of Texas by the council at the final session of its 97th annual meeting here yesterday.

The council elected Paul B. Miller of Houston to a vacancy on the Diocese corporation board of directors, included the annual grant of \$3,000 to Sewanee university in the church budget, and increased the salaries of the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor from \$7,200 to \$8,200 and from \$6,000 to \$7,000, respectively.

Nation's Cotton Yield Decreases

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (P)—The census bureau reported today that 8,027,168 bales of cotton from the 1945 crop had been ginned prior to Jan. 1.

Ginnings from the 1944 crop to the same date last year totaled 11,114,107 bales, and from the 1943 crop, 10,933,095 bales.

Included in the ginnings from the 1945 crop were 3,928 bales of American-Egyptian cotton.

MILLIONAIRE CLUB IS OPEN TO HOI POLLOI AT \$41 DAY

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 24. (P)—Once famed as the "Shanghi-La" of 400 millionaires, the luxurious Boca Raton club midway between Miami and Palm Beach has felt the pinch of the nation's dwindling supply of millionaires and put out the public-welcome mat for the first time in 15 years.

So exclusive that it had cost \$5,000-a-year in membership fees, just to get inside the gates, the club was the winter haunt of top-crust socialites.

Now all it takes to bask in the lavish seaside surroundings is a bankroll that can stand the bite of \$41 a day.

Plight of Millionaires
"Millionaires aren't what they used to be," said Gordon B. Anderson, vice-president, in an interview.

Tommy Armour, the club's veteran golf pro and former U. S. open champion, quoted Harold S. Vanderbilt, the yachtman, as having lamented to him recently: "I used to live very well on the

interest of the interest of my capital. Now I have to live on the interest alone."

The Boca Raton passed in 1944 to the ownership of J. Myer Schine, once a Russian immigrant boy, who worked as a factory hand in Gloversville, N. Y., and built up a fortune in movie theaters and hotels.

It Cost 19 Million

Designed by Addison Mizner, brother of the famed wit, Wilson Mizner, the club was completed Jan. 1, 1930, at an estimated cost of 19 million dollars. It encompasses more than 1,200 acres on the Atlantic, 40 miles north of Miami, with three swimming pools, two 18-hole golf courses, six tennis courts, 650 guest rooms, a fleet of 30-foot fishing cruisers, 200 beach cabanas; a 1,200-seat theater and an open-air night club.

Boca Raton officials said they expect it to be a gold mine during the 1945-46 winter season. "There aren't many millionaires any more, but there are plenty of people with plenty of money,"

Truman's Proposal For Settling Labor Disputes Gets Amendment

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (P)—The House labor committee has cut the heart out of President Truman's plan for setting up fact-finding boards to settle labor disputes.

But if the heart's out, why do anything? This is an explanation. Under his extraordinary wartime powers, President Truman has set up such boards in the present labor crisis. The boards are supposed to learn the truth. But they have no authority under

law to examine a company's books. And there's no law saying a union can't strike while the board is working.

So President Truman asked congress to pass a law, which would be a permanent law in wartime or peacetime, to give him or any president this power in a labor dispute:

1. To set up a fact-finding board. 2. To give the board authority to examine a company's books. 3. To forbid a strike for 30 days while the board was working.

Business opposed the part which gave a board power to examine a company's books.

And labor rebelled against the provision which would forbid a strike for 30 days while the board was working.

The bill was sent to the house labor committee. The committee had bottled up the bill for weeks.

A bill generally collapses and dies right there when a committee votes against letting the full congress vote on it. The committee can also change a bill any way it wishes.

It approved, for full house action, a bill which would permit the president to set up fact-finding boards. But—

1. The board would not have power to examine a company's books.

2. It would not forbid labor unions to strike while the board worked.

So that leaves for the full house only a bill giving the president authority to set up fact-finding boards.

Then why would congress go through the motions of voting on it or passing it into law? Here is why:

A board must be paid. So, the bill as it stands would regularize for Mr. Truman or any future president the means of setting up fact-finding boards.

Once a bill providing for fact-finding boards became law, congress would have to make provisions for paying such boards out of government money.

Indications Point To Heated Contests In Mitchell County Political Races

COLORADO CITY, Jan. 24

Early indications point to heated contests in Mitchell county races for political offices in 1946. Announcement of a number of prospective candidates has already turned up interest of the voting "man on the street."

Dick Gregory, who retired two years ago as sheriff after holding that office 16 years and declining to run again, has made formal announcement of his intention to run this year for the sheriff's place. Nick Narrell, present sheriff, has made no commitment. Narrell has been Mitchell sheriff for the past two terms and while he has not expressed his intentions it is generally predicted here that he will probably stand for reelection.

County Judge A. F. King is also "undecided," he says, whether he will make the race for reelection. Should he run he will have at least one opponent, T. R. Hagard, who this week made public announcement that he is a candidate for the county judge post, subject to action of the democratic primary in July.

Three contenders for county clerk have placed their names on the prospective ballot. They are John E. Watson, former school superintendent here who returned from military duty recently as an army major; Watson was appointed by commissioners to fill the unexpired term of Basil Hudson, county clerk, who resigned to accept a position with an oil company. Competing with Watson will be Henry Doss, well-known young ranchman-farmer, and Gilbert Leach, a deputy tax collector-assessor for the past seven years.

Warmest contest for county commissioner, so far, has developed in precinct two (Westbrook area) where J. E. Skilton, veteran commissioner of 16 years continuous service, has announced he will not seek reelection. Four men have announced for the place with C. S. Lambert, W. Newton Bacon, Tom B. Coker and L. Hazlewood

Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District News

J. H. Wolf, cooperator of the East Coahoma Conservation Group, said the terrace system which was constructed on his farm in 1941 has satisfactorily aided in erosion control and water conservation since establishment. Wolf said, "Increase in crop yields alone has more than paid the cost of terracing." The terraces were built to meet minimum district specifications of 24 feet base width, 15 inches settled height, and 4 feet crown width. Terracing is only a part of a coordinated soil and water conservation plan developed on Wolf's farm. Soil Conservation Service technicians of the Big Spring office are assisting in the planning, application and maintenance of conservation practices.

A plan of soil and water conservation is being developed on the Leland Wallace farm which is located in R-Bar Conservation Group. Wallace, convinced of the necessity as well as the profit incentive, desires to hold his soil, take advantage of moisture conservation and improve soil fertility. Benefits of some conservation measures along with desirable management on his farm are indicated by the statement made by Wallace, "Last year 150 acres of cotton yielded 104 bales." Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service are assisting Wallace in planning a conservation program which will be carried out in cooperation with the district.

Soil and water conservation plans are in the process of being developed on several farms including those of R. E. Haney, R. C. Reed, A. Yates and on the ranch of Noble Read.

Applications for assistance received recently include: Troy Gifford, 649 acres; J. A. Burris, 480 acres; Monroe Johnson, 320 acres.

Packers' Strike Fails To Affect Local Business

Strikes in effect at packing houses in the larger distribution centers are not proving to be a curtailing factor at weekly sales of the Big Spring Livestock commission.

In fact, indications at Wednesday's sale pointed to the opposite. Independent buyers and representatives of smaller concerns appeared in large numbers to create one of the heaviest demands for cattle in recent weeks.

Joined by a few buyers from larger companies, they kept purchases moving at a spirited pace, and consequently, the market continued stronger in all classes.

Approximately 900 head of cattle were sold, with a top price of 15.40, reported for butcher cattle. Only one load of hogs was offered, but it sold quickly at ceiling price of 14.40.

Fat calves ranged from 14.50 to 16; fat cows up to 12.80; butcher bulls, 9.75 to 11; and fat bulls up to 12.

Stockers were scarce, while several cows with calves brought as high as \$101.

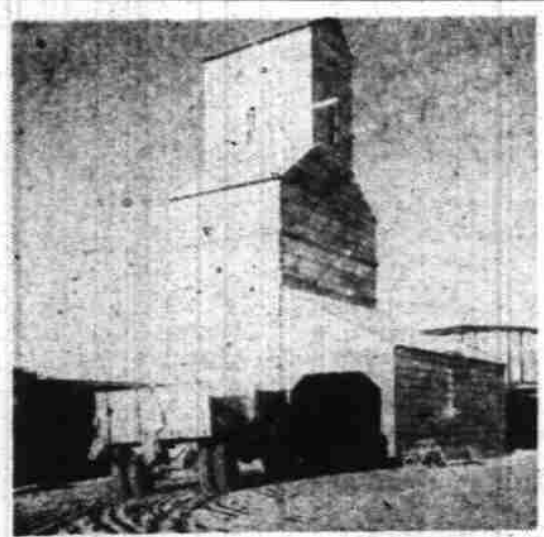

Farm And Ranch News

By WACIL McNAIR.

Pat Bullock, of the Colorado City chamber of commerce, reports that the entry list for the FFA and 4-H club stock show in that city is expected to exceed 300. The chamber of commerce is sponsoring the show, and Feb. 18-19 are the dates set. A registered Hereford breeders show to be held in connection with the event is open to breeders in Mitchell, Nolan, Coke, Sterling, Howard, Borden, Scurry and Fisher counties for competition for ribbons only. All breeders, except those in Mitchell county, are restricted to two entries each.

Prospects point to a large entry list from Howard county 4-H club members for the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock show in Fort Worth. Final date for filing entry fees is Feb. 25. County Agent Durward Lewter expects to carry 17 steers (15 Herefords and two Angus), and about 65 lambs from this county.

A request for the USDA leaflet, "Face the Future With Cotton," in amounts sufficient to supply one copy to every cotton grower in Texas has been forwarded to Washington, Dr. Ide P. Trotter, director of the Texas A&M college extension service, has announced. The

leaflet lists seven steps farmers can take towards more efficient production of quality cotton.

Beginning this week in the Rio Grande valley, where a deadline of Feb. 15 has been set, the 1946 cotton crop insurance program is now underway. Campaigns will be launched in other sections as planting time moves north. Texas is divided into five areas with different sign-up deadlines, because of the wide variance in the times of planting.

A Jersey cow owned by Chester Eliff of Tulia, a former 4-H club member, has been announced national senior three-year-old milk and butterfat champion by the American Jersey Cattle club, according to G. G. Gibson, dairyman of the Texas A&M college extension service. The cow, Welcome Volunteer Tiff, produced 19,416 pounds of milk and 1,077 pounds of butterfat in her third lactation period. Her butterfat production in 1945 is the equivalent of 1,390 pounds of commercial butter.

In efforts to improve utilization of migratory farm labor, the extension service is setting up headquarters for field workers in five West Texas cities. Fieldmen assigned to the various areas are G. F. Price, Lamesa; C. D. Davenport, Lubbock; A. C. Arnim, Munday; Russell E. Patterson, Ballinger, and Herman Porter, Wellington.

Cultivation of pastures shows promise of increasing the production of forage from solid stands of bermuda and native bunch grass in established pastures and meadows, according to R. R. Lancaster, pasture specialist for the A&M college extension service. Experiments show that where grass sod was disked lightly every other year in March an increase of 26 per cent was realized in bermuda. The same treatment increased native bunch grass by six per cent.

Trust Fund Campaign Opened By Vet Group At Texas University

AUSTIN, Jan. 24 (AP)—The University of Texas Ex-Service-men's association will begin a campaign Saturday to raise \$1,000,000 for a trust fund to set up scholarships and permanent housing for veterans as a memorial to veterans of World War II.

The first \$100,000 is to be used for scholarships, Donald W. Way of Houston, acting president of the association, said.

A modern, fireproof, dormitory-style apartment house, with efficiency apartments, is also planned for construction from the trust fund. It will be operated by the university, with the rents to be added to the scholarship fund, Way said.

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Is this a "SCRAP of PAPER"?

The CIO United Steelworkers Union said that its strike does not violate its contracts with steel companies. Here is the "no strike" clause taken from a typical contract. *Let the words speak for themselves!*

"During the term of this Agreement, neither the Union nor any Employee, individually or collectively, shall cause or take part in any strike, or other interruption or any impeding of production at any plant of the Company covered by this Agreement. Any Employee or Employees who violate the provisions of this Section may be discharged from the employ of the Company in accordance with the procedure of Section 8 of this Agreement."

This provision, or one similar to it, is contained in each contract between the Union and the various steel companies.

These contracts continue by their terms until the autumn of this year.

Where Oppression Rests

With The News

(This is the first of two or more columns on Generalissimo Francisco Franco by Dewitt Mackenzie, to whom the chief of the Spanish state has given one of his rare interviews.)

MADRID, Jan. 24 — Generalissimo Francisco Franco, chief of the Spanish state, has granted me an interview which has taken one of the most unusual turns I've encountered.

Highlights of his statements are these:

He is anxious for good relations with the United States. He never subscribed to the policies or to the political views of Hitler and Mussolini and he condemns their persecutions. Spain is developing along her own lines, uninfluenced by either Germany or Italy, and he (Franco) is heading for absolute democratic rule by the people.

As for the hotly debated question of a return of the Spanish monarchy, he says: "It will be approached when this is suitable to the interests of the nation."

At the interview I was encouraged by the most cordial greeting of the generalissimo.

"The people of the United States have fought a great war against nazism and fascism. Thousands of our boys have died for this cause. Rightly or wrongly the American public feels that Spain was in effect an ally of Germany and Italy, and it finds it hard to forgive that. Did you subscribe to or support nazi and fascist policies?" I asked.

The generalissimo shook his head. "No," he declared categorically. "I did not. Spain wasn't influenced by Germany and Italy, but has been developing along its own lines. We condemned all the persecutions which were carried out by those countries. There was no racial trouble in Spain. The Jews weren't persecuted here, nor was any other religion. There is religious freedom for all in Spain."

"Do you subscribe to the political views of Hitler and Mussolini?" I persisted.

He replied emphatically that he did not. "Are you headed for absolute democracy, that is, rule by the people?" I asked.

"Yes," answered El Caudillo. "But we must proceed slowly, step by step, until the people are properly prepared."

The generalissimo didn't amplify his reference to the people being "properly prepared," but I have

Thirteen Northeastern and North Central states, in a recent resolution, held that the ICC order directed at equalizing class rates, "is a dangerous threat to the economic well being of the entire nation."

On the record it might be added that interests in the North and East succeeded in having the rate equalization, schedule to have become effective Jan. 1, 1946, enjoined. Effect of the order would have been to raise railroad rates on manufactured goods by 10 per cent in the North and East and lower them the same amount in the South and West.

But to quote the resolution, "the ICC order is a discriminatory action, placing arbitrary and artificial burdens amounting to millions of dollars on the Northeast and North Central States. It affects the costs of businessmen and farmers, the cost of living of consumers and the wages and jobs of workers. The ICC order was adopted after years of political action by the South and without 'due regard to all the recognized economic factors which constitute the only sound basis for establishing freight rates.'"

The states pledged themselves to fight, by every legal means, the order of the ICC.

Well, it is interesting, although not particularly refreshing, to learn that a semblance of justice to the South is "discriminatory" to the North and East. The very things which the South and West have been waging a long fight for rate justice. All that time the North and East either turned a deaf ear or hooted at the idea. Now that the worm has turned (except for the injunction), it becomes "discrimination." Apparently the color of the horse is determined by whose horse it is.

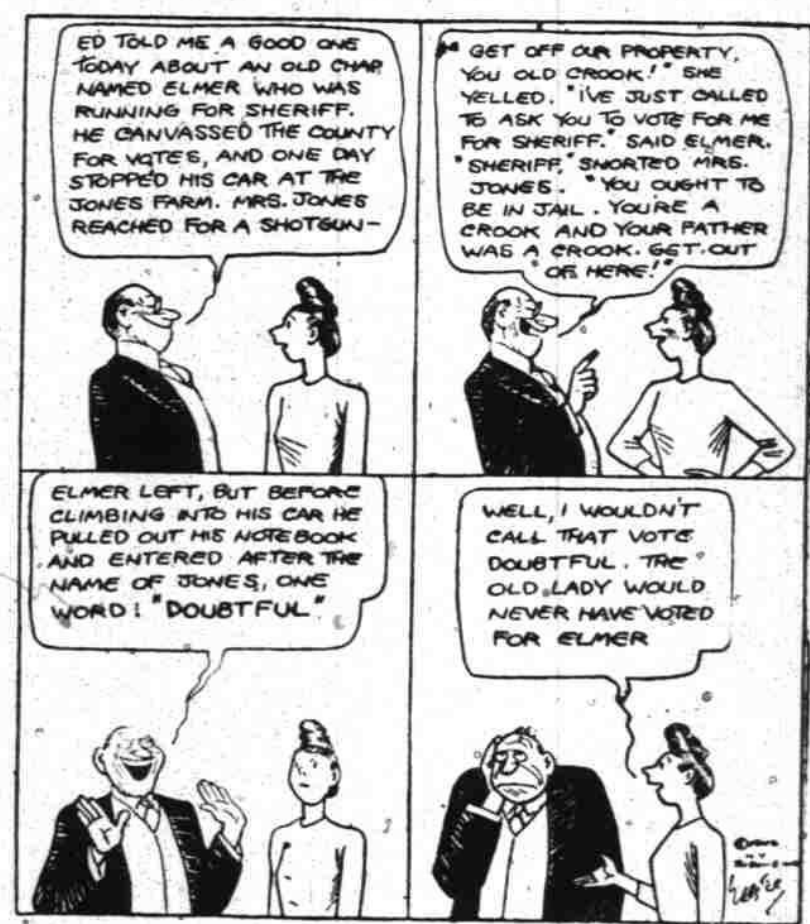
Perhaps a quotation from the Montgomery (Ala.) Advertiser, is well taken on the point: "Their argument was that it would be unjust to take the heavy foot of oppression off the South because the industrial East had gotten so used to resting it there."

You can say that again!

No doubt he had in mind the fact that Spain, being rather set apart from the rest of Europe, has moved slowly through the generations in making major changes.

The chief of state said there was quite a different point of view in the United States with its major political parties. Spain, he continued, had some 20 parties under the late republic, and "foreign countries" got control of Spain's policies. El Caudillo didn't identify the "foreign countries," but the connotation was clear enough that he was referring to communism.

WARMED-OVER PLAYS SATISFY CUSTOMERS ALONG BROADWAY

NEW YORK—Like any resourceful housewife, Broadway managers have discovered that an old play or musical, nicely warmed-over, will satisfy the customers, even on occasion delight them completely. Therefore, of a dozen and a half productions now on the boards, eight have come out of the theatrical refrigerator in one form or another and have been given a little heat, some fresh gravy and maybe a little new dressing and are doing right well with the public's ticket appetite.

The most lavish warmed-over item, of course, is "Show Boat."

Oscar Hammerstein 2nd, asked politely that it not be termed a "revival," and suggests "new production" as a nicer description. Okay, Oscar, it's "new production" with us from now on.

Then there's the fabulous and quite unexpected success which the revival of "The Red Mill" has attained. Originally brought to town for a limited engagement of eight weeks, the public and critics promptly set up such a howl of praise for this 1906 item that the youthful producers, Paula Stone and Hunt Stromberg, Jr., took the only possible course and kept it running. And are making a fortune thereby, too.

It took such an unlikely font of culture as Mike Todd to return William Shakespeare to Broadway this year, and the GI version of "Hamlet," as run up by Maurice Evans, is an exciting and quite successful revival of what is probably the best play ever written in the English language.

The fashionable young English lady of the music halls and less ponderous theatricals, Gertrude Lawrence, shares almost equal billing with George Bernard Shaw in the so-called repertory revival of "Pygmalion," a play which first was presented in this country in 1914, which was the year I was born, and which retains more sharp humor and brash comedy excitement than my parents' production of the same year, I'm sure.

The revival of "The Desert Song," also is slated for a limited Broadway engagement, although it will stay around if the demand warrants.

Bobby Clark has returned to Broadway in the revival, with broad revisions and several interpolated passages, of Moliere's "The Would-be Gentleman."

The others of the eight musical versions of plays presented some time ago on Broadway, are "Carousel," which with music and dancing deleted once was Ferenc Molnar's "Liliom"; and "Oklahoma!" which was Lynn Riggs' "Green Grow the Lilacs" in its original and unmelodramatic form.

Exactly why so many revivals and musical adaptations are the boards at present has been variously explained, with a good many experts noting the absence from the Broadway scene of young talent, a situation which shall be remedied when demobilization occurs in its larger phases.

Until then, however, we're doing quite well, thank you, with what we have and what the revivalists can dig out of the trunks.

Stream-Lined Candies Combat Sugar Shortage

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (P) — Streamlined candies that keep figures streamlined soon can help the beat the sugar shortage.

A new method of making centers for chocolate creams, which may be the boon candy manufacturers have been looking for in the current sugar shortage, is coming out of California, said the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

This new stuff also will be welcomed by candy eaters who, must watch their calories, said the government experts.

Chemists discovered a new mixture which is made from citrus peel.

This mixture, the government experts agreed, "has the taste, texture and appearance of cream centers used in the finest quality candy but requires only half as much sugar."

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Washington Merry-Go-Round—

Fish Appearance In DC a Mystery

WASHINGTON. — It was just a little over a year ago that the late Franklin Roosevelt waged a campaign to defeat Representative Ham Fish, rip-snorting isolationist Congressman from FDR's district along the Hudson.

Roosevelt had tried to defeat Fish time after time. So had Governor Tom Dewey, plus various other important figures in New York State, both Republicans and Democrats. They felt that Fish's ties-up with certain German-Americans, and the renting of his home in New York to the Nazi consulate, was too much. So responsible leaders of both parties went after him.

Finally, in the November 1944 elections, FDR's long campaign achieved its goal. Ham Fish was defeated for re-election.

But, believe it or not, the other day, Mrs. Truman, whose husband ran on the same ticket with FDR, invited ex-Congressman Ham Fish to the White House for tea.

Nobody knows why she did this, and the White House won't explain. Mrs. Helm, social secretary to Mrs. Truman, admits that Fish was present, but flatly refuses to give the reason why.

However, Ham Fish's friends in New York state are rubbing their hands in glee. They figure that this is the first step in staging Fish's carefully planned comeback to Congress. They are planning to play up the White House tea for all it's worth.

British Buffer State

It isn't being advertised, but Marshal Zhukov, soviet commander in Germany, has sent a blistering letter to Field Marshal Montgomery, commander of the British zone in Germany. He charges that several hundred thousand German soldiers are being kept in the British zone, organized in companies and regiments, all ready to fight a war all over again.

Zhukov informed Field Marshal Montgomery that, according to his information, part of these Nazi troops were being drilled regularly by their own officers. He also claimed about 100,000 Germans were being allowed to retain their small arms, that heavy ordnance, including tanks and artillery, was being kept close at hand, available for use.

Zhukov notified Field Marshal Montgomery that he considered this hostile to Russia and in violation of the Potsdam agreement. Marshal Montgomery's reply to Zhukov was equally blistering. He admitted thousands of Germans were still armed, but claimed the number was less than Zhukov alleged. In general, however, the tone of Montgomery's letter was "so what?"

Behind this exchange of letters is a dangerous situation which began with the armistice and has been getting worse ever since. It is the British balance-of-power policy of playing off Germany against Russia. The same thing happened after the last war, when the British played off Germany against France. British money poured into Germany industry, German banks and even German munitions plants. When the French proposed stopping Hitler's invasion of the Rhineland on March 7, 1936, it was the British who discouraged the French.

Today Britain is still following the balance-of-power policy—with a different twist. Instead of playing France off against Germany, she is trying to patch up relations between the two, and play both off against Russia.

Today Britain is trying to consolidate a strong western bloc—Belgium, France, Holland and Germany. That is the real factor behind the policy of saving certain German factories; also behind the keeping of German troops in their original regimental formations.

Aside from colonial troops, Britain always has kept one of the smallest armies in the world. So German troops are now serving as a virtual backdrop in the balance-of-power game against Russia.

Actually, Bethlehem's books show that it went into the red as soon as the war ended. But the real fact is that 1945, despite the tax ledger, was the most prosperous year Bethlehem has seen in years.

Here is what happened: During the third quarter of 1945, Bethlehem earned a profit before taxes of \$22,676,000. However, Bethlehem will pay no taxes on this sum because it will show a paper loss for the period which is legal and will build the three months actual

profits to a cool tax-free \$57,656,000. Ordinarily business is permitted to depreciate property over the life of the property. But back in 1940 when some businessmen were stalling on starting war production, Congress handed business a lush incentive which permitted it to amortize its defense plants over a 5-year period or less if the war ended sooner.

However, lush as it was, this wasn't juicy enough so big business tax lobbyists managed to wangle even more generous treatment in the Tax-Adjustment Act of 1945. This law, passed last July, made it possible for refunds arising from recomputation of amortization of national defense facilities within 90 days.

Then on Sept. 29, 1945, President Truman issued an order ending the war emergency period for amortization of defense facilities without proclaiming the emergency over for other things. He did not terminate the war for the GI's serving under the draft or for businessmen working under government restrictions. He terminated the war only for the purpose of recomputing the amortization period, which, of course, was a big tax help to war contractors.

Thus Bethlehem Steel was able to charge the balance of its un-amortized holdings totalling \$44,100,000 as an expense during the third period of 1945. This meant a paper loss of \$27,218,000, and brought Bethlehem into the theo-

retical "red." Therefore, it has to pay no taxes for 1945, even for the period in which it earned \$22,676,000.

However, this isn't all. Good corporation lawyers make every penny they can for their clients. Bethlehem lawyers figured out that their client had operated during the third period of 1945 at a paper loss of \$27,218,000.

This set the stage for another lush net at Uncle Sam's bankroll. Bethlehem's lawyers and tax experts informed the treasury that, since the corporation had lost money during 1945, it was entitled to a rebate on previously paid taxes under the carry-back provisions. So the treasury actually is kicking back a \$34,900,000 rebate to the corporation. This amount also is tax-free.

Added to the previously mentioned \$22,676,000 profit for the third quarter, Bethlehem actually came out \$57,656,000 ahead for the third quarter of last year, without any obligation to pay a dime of taxes, while still showing a paper loss on operations. It's very simple if you have a tax lawyer, a piece of paper and a pencil. HALF MILLION MEN VOLUNTEER FOR DUTY IN THE MILITARY

By JACK STINNETT

WASHINGTON — With all the impatient rush of the boys to get out of uniform, nearly half a million men have turned their backs on civilian life and signed on the dotted line for specified tours of duty in the armed forces.

The last available official figures for the Army showed that 334,423 had enlisted since the Voluntary Recruitment Act was signed by the President Oct. 6. Navy Secretary Forrestal reported that 80,663 men had enlisted or transferred to the regular Navy since surrender of Japan. In the last week before that date, the Navy had added 6,082 regulars.

Although there are no official figures for the balance of the year and the brass hats here are being very cagey about making any estimates, they do say that the program is continuing to meet expectations. Breaking down the official Army figures throws some light on this stampede. For example, 69 per cent of the new regulars are draftees who have signed to stay in for from one to three years; 11 per cent are original volunteers, and 20 per cent are old regulars, presumably on their way to those new liberal retirement payments.

Some Army officials expect January to be a banner month in enlistment and transfer of men who hold non-com ratings. After Jan. 31, the Army will (under the law) discontinue its assurance that

present or former ratings will be maintained.

This assurance already has brought a headache and the complaint that the "new regular Army" is proving to be an army of sergeants, with not nearly enough privates for the three-stripers to bellow at. After the first of February, with selective service at least two and a half more months to run, this situation will be remedied.

War and Navy department officials will have no part in predicting whether they will reach their June 30 goals in the present intensive recruitment campaign. Roughly two of the eight months of the campaign have produced about one fourth of the objective. The Army needs 1,600,000 regulars by that date, the Navy 500,000 and the Marines, 100,000.

It is assumed that most of the pre-war regulars, the old timers, have already re-enlisted. On the other hand, the military discharges are just reaching their peak and it also is assumed that even those who intend to re-enlist will take advantage of that 20-day civilian period allowed without loss of grade or rating.

One positive indication that the boys who re-enlist aren't fooling is that more than 57 per cent of them have signed up for three years, although enlistments are accepted for as short a period as one year.

Price Regulation Showdown Due

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP) — An administration showdown appears to be brewing over whether government price policies should be eased because of mounting industrial strife.

"This whole price control question is building up to a terrific issue," one government official familiar with the backstage controversy asserted today.

This official, who asked to remain anonymous, said OPA Administrator Chester Bowles has been encountering increasing pressure from some government agencies for a more liberal interpretation of existing price policies.

The greatest pressure has come, the official said, from Secretary of Agriculture Anderson.

To a lesser extent, the official added, pressure has been exerted by Reconstruction Director John W. Snyder and Civilian Production Administrator John D. Small.

Bowles has argued that the only way to prevent inflation is to allow no price increases other than those presently authorized.

Against this stand, those reportedly in favor of relaxation are said to be convinced there should be more "give" in the price policy so the government would have more leeway in wage disputes.

Also they are said to feel that OPA should grant moderate price increases more freely as an incentive to greater output of essential goods.

Wage Agreement At Dallas Plant

A wage agreement has been reached at the Mosher Steel company in Dallas and there was hope today that negotiations would be resumed between the Hughes Tool company of Houston and the CIO steel workers.

CIO employees of the Mosher plant in Dallas voted last night to accept a proffered wage increase, thus averting a threatened strike of 215 workers.

H. W. Beutel, company manager, said the offer was for a general increase of five cents per hour.

Hope that negotiations would be resumed in Houston's steel strike was seen in the announcement by a spokesman of the Hughes Tool company that Hughes "might go one step farther" in inducing its employees to return to work.

He said that Hughes might add two or three cents to an earlier offer of 12½ cents an hour increase, but was sure to back away from the CIO ultimatum of 18½ cents.

There was no change today in the work stoppage at Fort Worth's packinghouse and stockyards strike. Further action awaited the outcome of a conference in Chicago Friday at which union representatives will decide whether to return to work when the government seizes the plants.

New Demobilization Program Announced

HONOLULU, Jan. 24. (AP) — Return from mid-Pacific areas of Army enlisted personnel and officers, both men and WACs, will be speeded under a new demobilization program announced by headquarters of Lt. Gen. Robert C. Richardson, Jr.

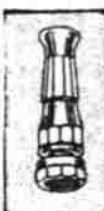

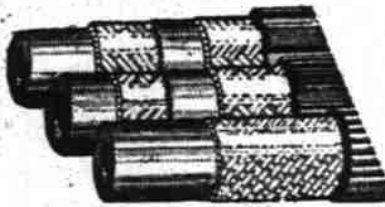

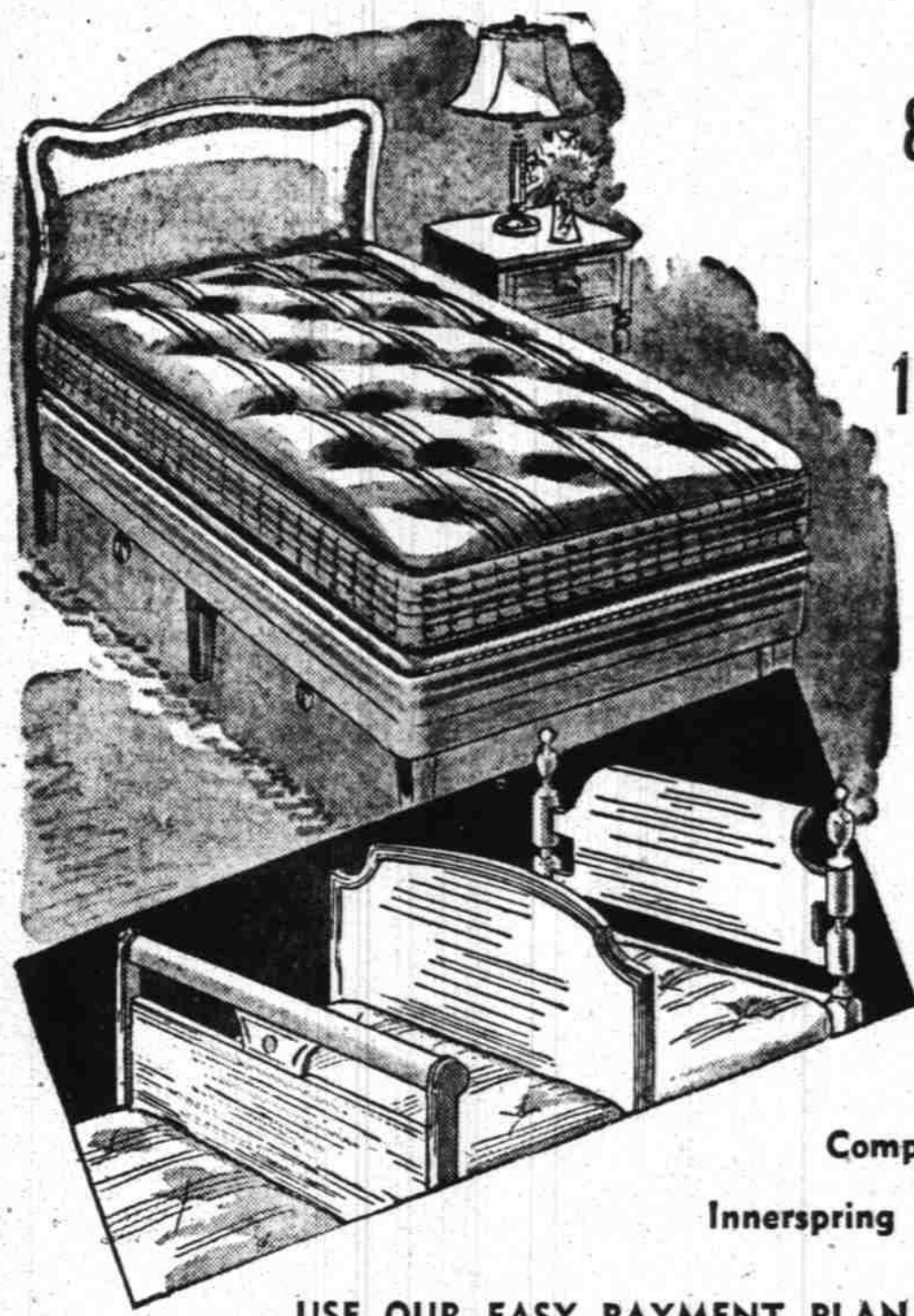
