British Labor Regime Faces Crisis In Ranks

Unions May Revolt Against Higher Devaluation Prices

LONDON, Sept. 21. (AP)—Britain's Labor Government faced a political crisis in its own ranks today. Trade unions threatened to revolt against higher prices resulting from money devaluation. Outside Britain echoes of the continued to jolt the world's markets. In all, 23 nations now have 12 per cent in the Belgian franc, and Portugal, with a 15 per cent cut in the value of the escudo in relation to the dollar, were the latest to join the devaluation parade.

The threat of a British political crisis was raised by the general council of the Trades Union Congress, whose 8 million members are the backbone of the ruling Labor Party.

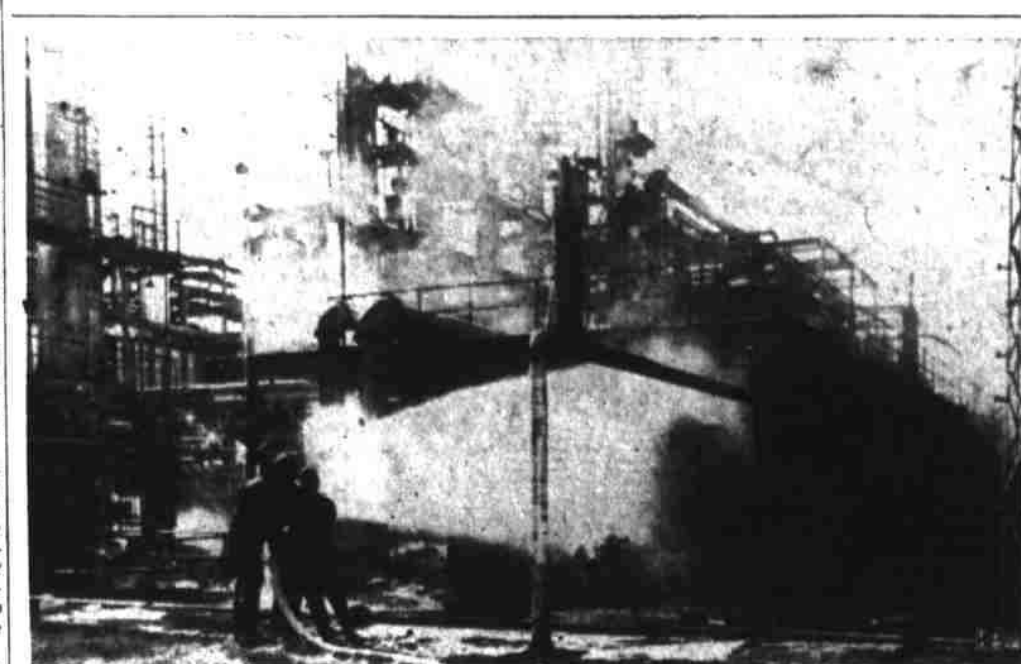
The TUC council—instead of endorsing government policy as it has in the past—decided last night it "could not pass on the necessity of devaluation." It called for assurances from Economic Chief Sir Stafford Cripps that the government would make every effort to limit price rises which will be sure to come from cheaper money.

Observers regarded the TUC reluctance to take a positive stand on devaluation as evidence of a split in labor's own ranks.

Cripps has warned that wage boosts will largely nullify the benefits of devaluation which is aimed at selling goods at cheaper prices in the United States.

Prime Minister Attlee summoned his cabinet ministers to a meeting tomorrow to discuss the political crisis that has been piled on top of his government's economic crisis.

Truman Asks New 6-Day Truce In Steel Dispute

Parties Urged To Bargain On Own

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21. (AP)—President Truman today asked a new six-day strike truce in the steel dispute.

The President also asked that the steel concerns and the CIO Steel Workers Union resume collective bargaining on their own.

He said federal mediators would be available to assist them.

Cyrus Ching, mediation chief who announced Mr. Truman's new truce request, said no reply had yet been received from man's new truce request, said Ching.

The present truce runs out Saturday midnight and the union is poised for a walkout by its 1 million members at that time.

The President asked that the truce be maintained until 12:01 o'clock Saturday morning Oct. 1 in the "national interests."

President Philip Murray of the steelworkers advised Ching that the union will decide on its reply to Mr. Truman's request at a union wage-policy committee meeting at Pittsburgh tomorrow.

Ching said the steel companies promised to reply soon.

Ching said he has no plans now for further meetings with union and companies for the time being—expecting them to go to bargaining with each other on their own as the President requested.

The President's request was made in a letter he sent to Ching in the midst of government-sponsored efforts to work out a settlement of the dispute over pensions and insurance.

His letter stressed the importance to the nation of averting a crippling steel strike.

Every possible move, Mr. Truman said, should be taken to avert such a stoppage; therefore he was asking the new strike deadline extension.

Mr. Truman's letter said he is in "fullest agreement" with the statement made by his steel fact-finding board in recommending a 10-cent hourly pension-insurance program.

Ching had visited the White House earlier in the day to report to Mr. Truman on his efforts to head off a strike.

Presumably Ching suggested at that time that Mr. Truman ask for a new truce.

U. S. READY TO DO PART

Acheson Sees Hope Of Cold War's End

NEW YORK, Sept. 21. (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson today reaffirmed his belief that East-West differences can be ended peacefully, but warned that a solution will not be quick or easy.

In a solemn American policy speech before the United Nations assembly, Acheson promised the

59 national delegations the United States is ready to do its part. As expected, his tone was conciliatory.

His declaration blamed Russia for the "profound sense of insecurity" which he said has enveloped large areas of the world and has led to such steps as the formation of the North Atlantic Alliance.

It is the main task of the assembly, he said, to try to solve the problems which lay behind the cold war.

"I pledge for the United States unreserved support and devotion to a concerted effort to this end," he said.

Acheson made no direct appeal to Russia for a general settlement, but did call for Soviet cooperation on several specific problems such as the Balkan dispute and Korea.

Acheson said this session of the assembly comes at a time when the main postwar adjustments have been completed and it is possible to see with more clarity what the real problems are.

Some of them, he said, "are of a terrible seriousness."

"They are too deeply rooted, in many instances, to be rapidly overcome by persuasion or compromise or by isolated diplomatic gestures."

"Any people becoming aware of the depth of these problems, despair of their solution by peaceful means. We have never shared this feeling, and we do not share it today."

He listed the major issues as the Balkan problem, Korea, Palestine, Italy's African colonies, economic development of backward areas, violations of human rights in Communist-dominated countries, atomic control and arms regulations.

"In the charter," he said, "we pledged ourselves to settle our problems by peaceful means, and to build up conditions essential for peace. Disregarding these obligations, a small group has persisted in policies threatening other members of the international community."

Acheson then called on the assembly to "make its contribution" to the solution of "the great problems pressing upon the nations of the world today."

Storm Warnings Are Ordered Up For Puerto Rico

HOUSTON, Sept. 21. (AP)—The U. S. Weather Bureau ordered hurricane warnings hoisted from Corpus Christi to Freeport at 1:30 p. m. today, as a Navy reconnaissance plane in the Gulf reported winds of 60 miles per hour in a storm of increasing intensity moving northwest or west-northwest.

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 21. (AP)—Hurricane warnings were ordered up in Puerto Rico today for a rapidly growing tropical disturbance reported about 100 miles south-south-east of St. Croix.

The U. S. Weather Bureau in San Juan, Puerto Rico, ordered all interests in the Puerto Rican area to take immediate precautions against hurricane winds.

An advisory issued at 8:30 o'clock this morning reported winds of 60 miles per hour near the center of the disturbance and said it was expected they would reach hurricane force in the next few hours.

Northeast storm warnings also were ordered up for the Virgin Islands.

The Weather Bureau said the small tropical storm developed during the night and "is believed to be increasing rapidly in intensity." It was located at 8:30 near latitude 16.3 north and longitude 44.5 west, or about 100 miles south-southwest of St. Croix, roughly 1200 miles southeast of Miami.

St. Croix is a small island about 100 miles east and a little south of Puerto Rico.

The tropical storm had been kept under observation by Navy and military reconnaissance planes since yesterday, along with another "potentially troublesome" area of suspicion in the Gulf of Mexico.

The Gulf area south of the Louisiana coast contained winds of 35 to 55 miles per hour.

REPORT VICTIM INTIMIDATED

Jury To Review Case Of Five Boys Charged With Rape Here

The grand jury will go into session again Saturday morning to review the case against five teenagers charged with raping a 17-year-old girl here Saturday night.

The five, who have been in jail since Sunday, are Tom Norman (Scooter) King, James Faucett, Tommie Morgan, Charles Echols and James Tindol.

Charges against King were lodged shortly after he was taken into custody by Deputy Sheriff C. E. Kiser Sunday afternoon. County Attorney Elton Gilliland got a statement from the victim before bringing charges against the other four.

King was placed in a cell by himself Tuesday after Kiser said he had received complaints that he was not getting along with the other four, all of whom made statements shortly after their arrest.

The sheriff's office also received reports that the girl, who was hospitalized, was being intimidated. She is being guarded 24 hours daily by a special deputy hired by the county.

Authorities said the girl was visiting her father, a plasterer on the Veterans' hospital project here, when the attacks occurred.

In detail, she related how she came to know one of the accused and later accepted an offer on his part to take her home the night of the attacks. She added his conduct toward her was never unbecoming before the acts took place Saturday night but that she knew him only casually.

Father of the girl, shaken by the incident, flew to his home in Miami, Fla., to be with his wife, in bed, and break the news to her. He was to return to town today, if his wife's condition permitted.

Two of the accused, Echols and Morgan, have each been to the state reform school for boys three times. Faucett is a Killeen, Tex., youth who has been staying here.

King, most defiant of the lot, resides with his parents two miles north of Sand Springs. His name has decorated the police blotter several times within recent weeks. He appeared before the grand jury earlier this month on rape charges but was not indicted.

The girl, who police said was raped numerous times, was somewhat improved today. X-rays were to be studied to determine whether she had a broken rib. She also experienced a neck injury.

All five youths have been denied bond temporarily.

Arrangement are pending. The remains are at Nalley chapel. Burial will be in the Ackert cemetery beside the grave of his wife, who died Aug. 14, 1945.

State Officials Face Hearing In Deaths Of Hospital Patients

SANTON, Sept. 21. (AP)—Two state officials must appear before the San Antonio County Grand Jury tomorrow in connection with the deaths of two elderly state hospital patients.

District Clerk J. I. Hamilton issued subpoenas yesterday for Dr. J. B. Anderson, superintendent of the San Antonio State Hospital in which the two died, and Hall H. Logan, chairman of the state board of control.

The two patients, R. A. Sipes and Madison Moore, both of Odem, were in the hospital last spring. Dist. Atty. John H. Miller said Sipes died March 31 at the hospital and Moore died April 13 in San Antonio after being released from the hospital.

Mexican Holiday Delays Processing Of Cotton Pickers

Independence day festivities in Mexico during the past weekend delayed the processing of cotton harvest laborers at El Paso, the Farm Bureau office here has been informed.

The delay, combined with some extra travel involved in bringing the workers here, probably resulted in a postponement of the scheduled arrival here for a full week.

Dale Puckett, president of the Howard County Farm Bureau, who is in El Paso to handle the processing requirements for the local organization, reported late Tuesday that workers scheduled for assignment here are located in Chihuahua City. They must be transported to El Paso before the processing begins.

Indications were that the first group scheduled to come here would be processed next Monday since the El Paso center does not expect to begin actual operation until that date.

The workers are to be processed in groups of 300. The bureau hopes that the first 300 will arrive here Tuesday.

Puckett informed his office yesterday that bonds had been posted and accepted at the El Paso processing center for the workers requested here.

Town Ruins Found In Italian Lagoon

ROME. (AP) — Scientists have discovered the ruins of a Roman town in a lagoon on the North Adriatic Sea. A group headed by Mario Fontani, an authority on Roman and early medieval archeology, may have found the ruins of a legendary town, reportedly sunk in the lagoon-shallow waters, during the first centuries of our era.

When the Hunns headed by King Attila swept across the Alps to the Italian plains, the population of the towns of Aquileia and Bithone fled for their lives. Attila destroyed Aquileia and maybe also Bithone. The inhabitants of the two towns had fled. Part went to Grado in the lagoon north of Trieste and the remainder fled by boat. They were blown by heavy north-eastern Adriatic winds to the site on which Venice was founded.

Of the old town of Bithone only the legend remained. After weeks of searching the bottom of the canal of the lagoon in front of the little town of Marano Fontani, wearing a light diving suit, discovered a wide stone bank with a monumental stairway descending into a greater depth. It may have been the basement of a Roman temple, Fontani said.

WHAT IF IT SHOULD HAPPEN TO YOU?

Keys Quads Recall Rhyme Of Old Woman Who Lived In Shoe

What would you do if suddenly you became the parent of quadruplets?

Would you immediately collapse or take the first train out of town? Would you hit the boss for a 10- or 20-buck raise and would that be enough? Or would you need outside help? Would you try to commercialize your foursome?

Look around the place you're living in now. Imagine that suddenly, right now, today, there are four new but permanent faces there? Would the place be enough? If not, where would you get more room?

Would you need a maid, or a second maid? How about the children already there? Would the old ones resent the new ones? Could you handle the whole problem without creating neurosis?

Now, don't get panicky. The odds against you women giving birth to quads are about 650,000 to 1. (No bet, if you're a man). But, why not be prepared, at least be armed with information on what others have done? Therefore, purely as a public service, we have rounded up the experiences of some families which have produced quads since 1915. Here they are:

The oldest quads in this group are now all wives and mothers themselves. They are the four Keys girls who were born in Hollis, Okla., in 1915. Leota is now Mrs. Robert T. Hall, Oklahoma City; Roberta is Mrs. Roland Torn, Houston; Mona is Mrs. Robert W. Fowler, Oklahoma City, and Mary is Mrs. Jack Anderson, McKinney.

Mr. and Mrs. Flake M. Keys (he died early this year) already had four children when the quads arrived.

But neither their arrival nor survival seemed to be accompanied by undue stress and strain.

"The family was living in a large old-fashioned house at the time," says Leota. "The older children just doubled up in the room they had and we got along all right."

Their father was in the hardware and furniture business. At first the Keys resisted attractive offers to put the quads on exhibition but finally let them appear at the Oklahoma State Fair each year. This was stopped when they were nine because it interfered with their school work.

Later, at school, church and civic affairs, the quads began appearing as a singing and saxophone-playing quartet. They made some profitable summer tours and paid their way through Baylor University. Mona's marriage in 1940 broke up the quartet.

All in all, says Leota, their adult lives have not been unduly influenced by the unusual circumstances of their birth.

The sudden housing problem didn't floor Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Perricone of Beaumont, when their all-male quads arrived in 1929. They already had five other sons but were living in a big house. They simply converted two rooms for the new boys.

The quads, Mrs. Perricone says, didn't bring the family any special financial luck.

"In fact," she says, "it worked the other way. It definitely four times as hard to raise four as one and you need four times as much money."

Mrs. Perricone admits she had some difficulty giving the older boys enough attention after the all-male quartet arrived.

The quads are now diversely occupied. None is married. Bernard works as a driver and helper in a local trucking firm. Don is an engineer's helper with a tugboat company. Carl was graduated from high school last spring. Anthony expects to graduate this summer.

Did the quads bring the family riches? Definitely no, says Carl Morlok. It did help him get elected constable and there were that some gifts from merchants, but was all.

An even more epic job of raising children, quantitatively, has been turned in by Mrs. Fred Schense of Frederick, S. D. She is the step-mother of the Schense quads, whose mother died shortly after their birth in 1921.

The second Mrs. Schense didn't only raise the quads. Her husband had had three other children previously. Later, she had five of her own. Add it all up, she raised 12 children.

And she hasn't complained yet. She doesn't believe raising the quads was more complicated than raising the others.

"I think," says Mrs. Schense, "we had less trouble with the four than some people have with one."

The quads—Jay, Joan, James and Jean—got their high school diplomas this spring.

"It almost broke me sending them to high school every day," says their father, "but I always wanted them to finish."

Schense, who owns a 450-acre farm and a large house, says he

never received any financial aid. There has been some talk, he says, of giving the quads college scholarships but nothing definite yet.

Next case: The F. W. Badgett of Galveston. They already had two children when four girls arrived in

one package in 1939. Because the Badgett home was too small, Galveston citizens gave the family a large, two-story house. To retain the home, the quads must live in Galveston until they are 18.

The financial burden created by the appearance of Joan, Geraldine, Joyce and Jeannette Badgett was partially eased by a contract the family has with a canned milk company. By this arrangement, the Badgetts are paid for allowing the company to say the quads use its product.

"A child is a child," Mrs. Badgett says, "and you have to give each one about the same attention. Although born at the same time, they are all individualists."

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Greeks End Organized Rebel Resistance On North Borders

NEW YORK, Sept. 21. (AP)—The United Nations Special Commission on the Balkans said today the Greek army has eliminated organized guerrilla resistance along the northern borders of Greece.

The commission warned, however, of "increased gravity of the threat to peace" if Greece's Communist northern neighbors, Albania, Bulgaria, continue aiding guerrillas in defiance of UN assembly resolutions.

The commission concentrated the weight of its criticism on Albania, asking the General Assembly to find Albania "primarily responsible for the threat to peace in the Balkans."

Greece last week threatened to send her troops across the Albanian border unless that Soviet satellite stopped helping guerrillas. The Greek Government said then it would notify the UN that it felt entitled to do so under Article 51 of the United Nations charter, which outlines measures a nation may take in self-defense.

The Greek action drew an adverse reaction in Moscow, which although it has no military alliance

with Albania, regards itself as a protector of the satellite. The Soviet press warned it if an invasion of Albania by Greece would have serious repercussions.

U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin also poured cold water on the Greek plan by announcing they could not go along with it.

The UN Balkan commission statements were made in a supplementary report to the fourth session of the general assembly.

The commission cited as facts:

- 1 - The end of organized guerrilla resistance.
- 2 - A large proportion of the guerrillas and many other Greek Nationals "have sought refuge in or been forcibly taken into" Greece's northern neighbor countries.
- 3 - Albania, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia had publicly announced they had disarmed and interned guerrillas who entered their territories.
- 4 - Yugoslavia had closed its borders with Greece.

The commission then recommended that the assembly again

notify Albania and Bulgaria that international law called for them to prevent use of their territories against the security of Greece.

The commission also recommended that the assembly again ask Albania and Bulgaria to stop aiding the Greek rebels and call on Albania, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia to cooperate "with an appropriate international body" for observation of whether the guerrillas who fled north had been disarmed and interned.

The Soviet satellites have refused from the beginning to cooperate with the UN commission and its observers.

Another commission recommendation called for a new attempt during the current assembly to find a peaceful solution of differences between Greece and her neighbors.

The commission also cited Romania for extending increased support to the Greek rebels and asked the assembly to call on Romania to end all such aid. Romania is regarded as the seat of a "free Greek government" and its radio station.

The report asked the continuation of "appropriate United Nations machinery" to attempt a settlement in the Balkans, to observe border conditions and to keep the UN informed.

Two Air Force Men Sentenced In Robbery

DALLAS, Sept. 21. (AP)—Two Air Force enlisted men were sentenced to a total of 200 years in prison after pleading guilty to robbing five liquor stores.

The men were Pfc. Coley Vernon Cox, 22, and Corp. Dillard E. Henderson, 23.

Judge Henry King yesterday ruled all the sentences should be served together.

Fred Earl Langhorne, a Houston policeman who helped arrest the pair in that city last June, said they were under charges in Fort Worth, Texarkana, Austin, Houston and Waco, as well as Dallas.

They were stationed at Carswell Air Force Base in Fort Worth.

Houston Plans Big Housing Program

HOUSTON, Sept. 21. (AP)—Houston has a \$25,560,000 public housing program on the books.

Application for 2,500 public housing units was approved yesterday by the Public Housing Administration. They are expected to cost about \$22,500,000. Earlier, 340 units had been approved, bringing the total cost above the 25 million mark.

The first group of 1,000 units in the latest approved application is scheduled to be in construction by Sept. 30, 1950, the second by Sept. 30, 1951.

Big Cattle Auction Held At Floresville

FLORESVILLE, Sept. 21. (AP)—Five-hundred Holstein cattle were sold yesterday on the W. M. Donahoe dairy farm. It was one of the largest cattle auctions in South Texas history.

The top cow sold for \$725, top bull for \$710, top heifer with first calf for \$625, and top baby calf for \$90.

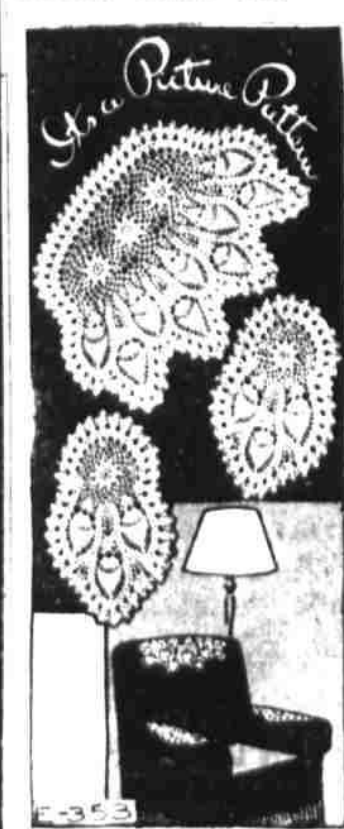

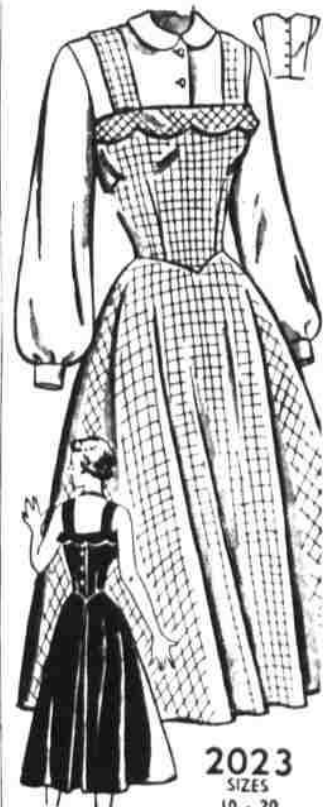

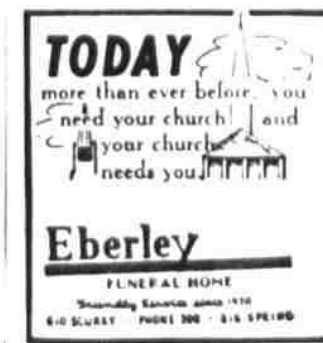

British Laborites Face Test In Next Election

LONDON (U.P.)—With the approach of what is described here as the most vital general election which has ever taken place in Britain, the fortunes of the Labor Government continue to decline.

Faced with rapidly dwindling gold and dollar reserves, a sharp decline in imports, new strikes—stimulated in part by the Communist World Federation of Trade Unions—and the Conservative party's bold bid for support, British socialism is waging a fierce battle for survival.

At the moment, the view here is that labor will win in the next elections, although with a much-reduced majority. Laborites assert that the common people fear Tory promises much more than they dislike the economic and social controls of the socialists.

But, for the first time since the present government came to power four years ago, labor and the lower middle-class—hitherto its main pillars—show signs of deep dissatisfaction.

In an effort to "build socialism

in our time," the Labor Government proceeded to nationalize the basic industries at a fast pace, causing underproduction, inefficiency and the rise of a top-heavy bureaucracy. The government ignored the basic needs of the people.

Thus, four years after liberation and a decade since the beginning of the war which first ushered in the era of economic austerity, the victorious and long-suffering Englishmen are asked to tighten their belts another notch.

A return of the Tories to power would not likely alleviate Britain's plight. The program of the Conservative Party, as contained in a recently-published 68-page pamphlet called "The Right Road for Britain" is, in its own way, as narrow and dogmatic as the "Marxism" of the Labor Party.

The Tories seem to ignore the fact that capitalism as it is understood and practiced in the United States, exists in war-devastated Europe in name only, not in fact. Turning the Conservative program "one of the most dishonest documents that I have ever read," Prime Minister Clement Attlee recently said that the Tories seem to "ask for increases for everybody" but give no indication as to how they are "going to find the money and who is going to find the money."

At every stage possible, Attlee added, they seek to bring back "the profit-maker and the landlord."

Winston Churchill retorted that from "her high and proud position at the end of the war," the Labor Government "brought Great Britain low alike in prosperity and reputation both at home and abroad."

Every one of the countries of Europe outside the Iron Curtain, said Churchill, enjoys a greater abundance of consumer goods than England.

Many impartial observers believe that Britain's present plight cannot be blamed entirely on what Churchill called the "biased and sterile measures of restriction and nationalization of the Labor Government." Much of it is undoubtedly due to the unstable economic and political conditions existing at

present in Europe, restrictions on

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international trade and East-West tension.

But having once embarked on the road of super-nationalization, the government is now faced with two alternatives—either socialist expenditure on the present fantastic scale or deflation and unemployment.

AGE, CONDITION, CONTENT INVOLVED

Old Book Must Be Worthwhile In Itself To Bring Big Price

NEW YORK, Sept. 21—What makes a book valuable?

A newspaper reader asks and I hasten to reply.

Three main points are involved. They are rarely plus condition plus worthiness of content.

No one leg of the stool, or even two, will answer. All three are needed.

Age alone has little or nothing to do with it. But if age is combined with the other two it can and sometimes does have some bearing of value.

A few books have an additional value-creating point—a sentimental or personal interest.

Let's take an illustration. Say "Tamerlane and Other Poems" by Edgar Allan Poe's first published volume. He printed it himself, anonymously, in Boston in 1827.

This ugly 40-page pamphlet had sold as high as \$15,500 at auction and is reputed to have exchanged hands privately at \$20,000.

How does it fit the formula? First rarity. Only a dozen copies are known and no new one has been discovered for years. Second, condition. Pristine copies always have brought high prices; poor copies are at a dizzy discount. Contents: Poe turned out to be one of the world's great literary figures. Therefore his first book, although only an omen of masterpieces to come, has tremendous sentimental, literary and bibliographical interest.

A copy bearing Poe's autograph would have that additional personal interest. Should one turn up a copy described by Poe to his child bride, Virginia Clemm, it would be a key to a veritable mine.

If Harry Dimont has published a similar volume under similar circumstances and it was just as rare today in addition to being in perfect shape, it wouldn't be worth a penny. It would lack content value. Even if Harry's edition was

only one or two copies and was printed in gold on velvet, there still would be no bidders.

Nobody gives a whoop about Harry and his awful book.

Conversely, hundreds of editions of Poe's poems have been printed since 1827, but with a couple of exceptions their value is strictly nominal. They are by the same man and may be in splendid condition but they lack rarity.

Other points being equal, it is interesting to know the stress book collectors put on "condition." The finest condition is when a book looks like it had just come from the printers regardless of its publication date.

A soiled cover, cracked spine, foxed leaves, a brownish discolor, mutilated papers, shaken (loose) binding and the like will put the curse on almost any book, regardless of its other virtues.

Some collectors have such high standards they never will touch a book with the slightest blemish.

Others will make an occasional exception and welcome an interior volume if (1) it is so rare and otherwise desirable that the collector expects never to find a better one, or (2) simply as a stop gap until a nicer copy comes to hand. Then the first copy is ditched or traded to a collector whose standards and pocketbook are not so high.

A volume that most collectors are glad to have even if not in perfect condition, is the "First Folio" of Shakespeare's plays (1623). It is not a beautiful book. It is full of typographical and other errors and at least 216 copies are known. But it is one of the noblest monuments of the world's literature and collectors are willing to take it "as is."

The book contains 36 plays and was published seven years after Shakespeare's death. A fine copy was auctioned in 1932 for \$60,000. The very same copy sold in 1945 for \$50,000. In the 1946-47 season a rec-

ord for sales, but not price, was established when five copies went on the block. Prices ranged from \$22,000 down to \$3,200. Condition established the value.

Perfect condition really means two things: (1) that a book's physical being is shipshape and (2) that it has not been tampered with since it left the printer.

If the original book had a plush jacket, many (but not all) collectors insist on such a kimono.

If the book originally appeared in cheap paper covers or linen of a poisonous green, that's the way a collector wants his.

Let's say a paper covered book is worth \$500 and a proud possessor spends \$100 to have the cover replaced by an elegant, leather binding. The new value will not be \$600, but closer to one-tenth of that because the book has been ruined as a first edition.

There once was a practice of acquiring two or more poor copies of a valuable book and making up one perfect copy. The result, however, is only a synthetic book.

Now as to age. Incunabula, meaning the earliest printed books (from 1455 through 1500; may have some value on that point alone, but to hit the jackpot they too must have distinguished contents and be in good condition.

An outstanding example is the Gutenberg Bible, which is not par-

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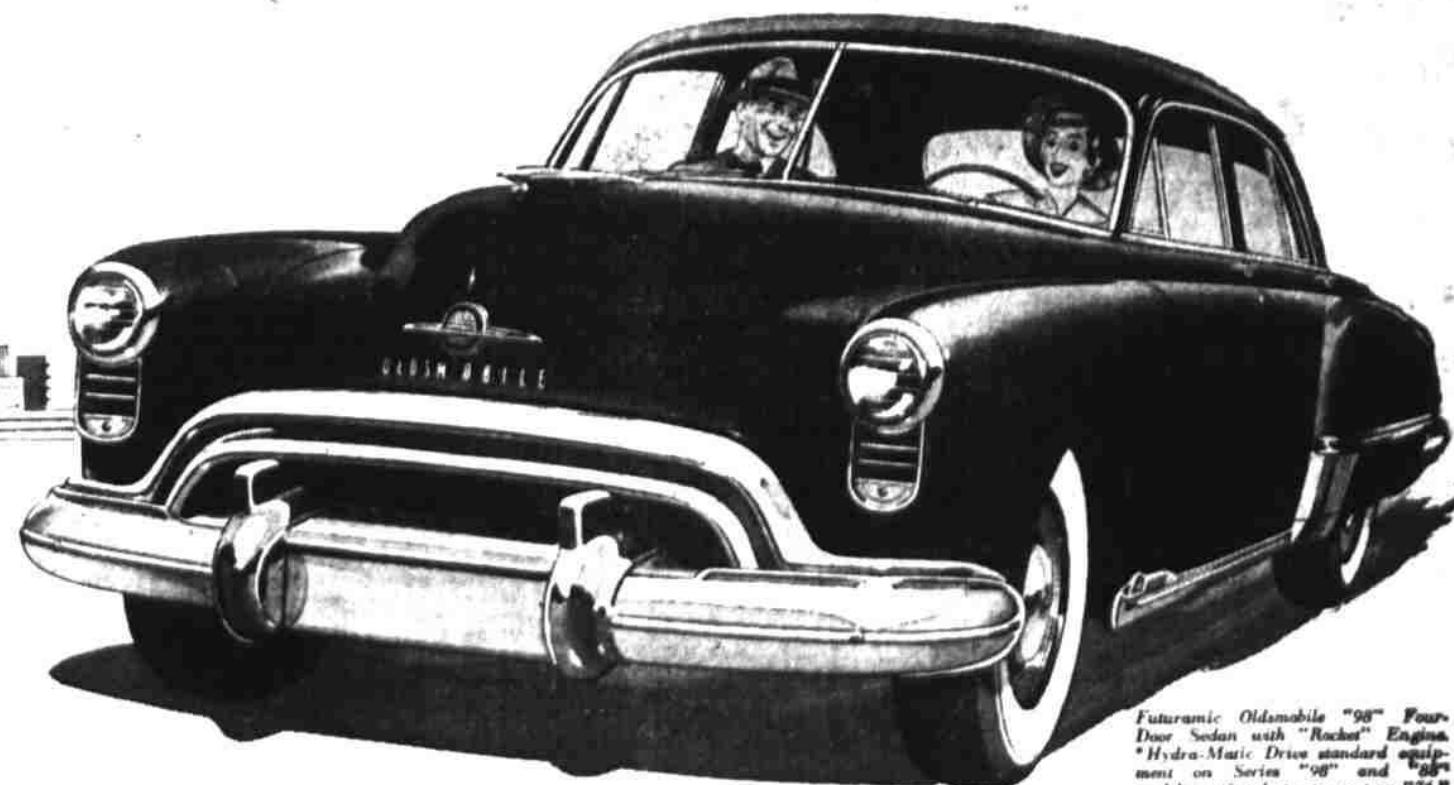

Hurricane Hunter To Probe Squall Area

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 21 (AP)—A Navy hurricane hunter plane was ready today to fly into a squall area from the Louisiana and Texas coasts for 200 miles into the Gulf of Mexico.

The New Orleans Weather Bureau expected the plane to fly from Miami, Fla., through a belt of rainstorms and squalls in the northwestern gulf.

Small craft in Texas and Louisiana were warned to remain in port rather than risk possible damage by venturing out into the Gulf.

The squally weather picked up in intensity yesterday afternoon with the highest winds reported from 30 to 40 miles per hour.

Indian's Flagpole Champion Still Loyal

CLEVELAND, Sept. 21 (AP)—Flagpole Sitter Charley Lupica isn't coming down from his perch yet, even though his Cleveland Indians no longer have even a mathematical chance of winning the pennant.

"I really am burned up when people ask me if I'm coming down," he said. "I don't care what those fair weather friends say about the Indians. I'm still with them."

The drugist climbed up on the pole 114 days ago, vowing he wouldn't come down until the Indians won the pennant or the season ended.

He said he will descend on Oct. 2 when the Indians finish playing.

Homicide, Suicide Verdict Returned

McKINNEY, Sept. 21 (AP)—A verdict of homicide and suicide was returned in the fatal shooting of Clifton Lynn and his divorced wife, both 45.

The shootings occurred yesterday in a cleaning shop where Mrs. Lynn worked.

BEVIN MAKES PLEDGE

UN Told West Won't Use New Weapons Aggressively

NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (AP)—Top United Nations officials from around the world were told last night that the Western Powers never will use their advances in military weapons to attack or destroy any nation.

The pledge came from British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, who spoke at a dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel.

The dinner was given by the city of New York in honor of delegates here for the newly-convened fourth general assembly of the UN.

Bevin said the western nations are determined to take every step to avoid using the destructive powers of atomic energy. Rather, he said, "we must find an antidote to destruction by establishing confidence among the nations of the world."

"We shall take care now that no nations shall be under any delusions that they can get so advanced that they can use their advanced position to destroy the world," he said. "On the other hand, we shall never use our advances to destroy them."

The dinner was attended by 1,000 persons, including about 50 top-ranking UN delegates and other government dignitaries. Seventeen foreign ministers occupied the dais at the front of the room, before a backdrop of flags of the 50 member nations of the UN.

Outside, anti-British demonstrations were met by a barrage of tomatoes from windows of the fashionable hotel. Bevin is staying there. It is now known who threw the tomatoes.

The 200 demonstrators, members of the "American-Irish Minute Men of 1949," carried signs urging a boycott on British goods and removal of British troops from northern Ireland.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei V. Vishinsky was invited to the dinner but sent his regrets. However, other eastern bloc representatives were present.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson told the assemblage that he is encouraged by recent efforts by western nations to solve economic and other problems.

He aimed a jab at those who lay claim to a perfectly ordered society in which there is no struggle or effort.

"To us," he said, "struggle is the thing we live for. If we do not struggle, there is no purpose in life so far as we are concerned."

Brig. Gen. Carlos P. Romulo, Philippine delegate and newly-elected president of the assembly, declared that four years of work in the UN had taught him that the power for peace rests chiefly with the major countries.

"Until they come to terms," he said, "the world will continue to be subject to the dangerous tensions and pressures of political conflict."

New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey said the UN today "stands stronger than ever, the only, the best, the last hope of organized peace."

"It holds not only the hope but the respect of the world," he said.

The invocation was by Francis Cardinal Spellman, Roman Catholic archbishop of New York. Rabbi David De Solz Pool, of the Spanish-Portuguese synagogue, gave the benediction.

Czech Blackmarket Sideline Revealed

PRAGUE, (AP)—When Czechoslovak blackmarketers run out of meats and textiles for illegal sales they have a new sideline racket—selling ration coupons.

The trade unions daily "Prace" reported security police had rounded up a gang accused of selling thousands of such tickets at neat profits. Coupons for 1,200 grams of meat were reported to have brought 33. The tickets were either stolen or forged.

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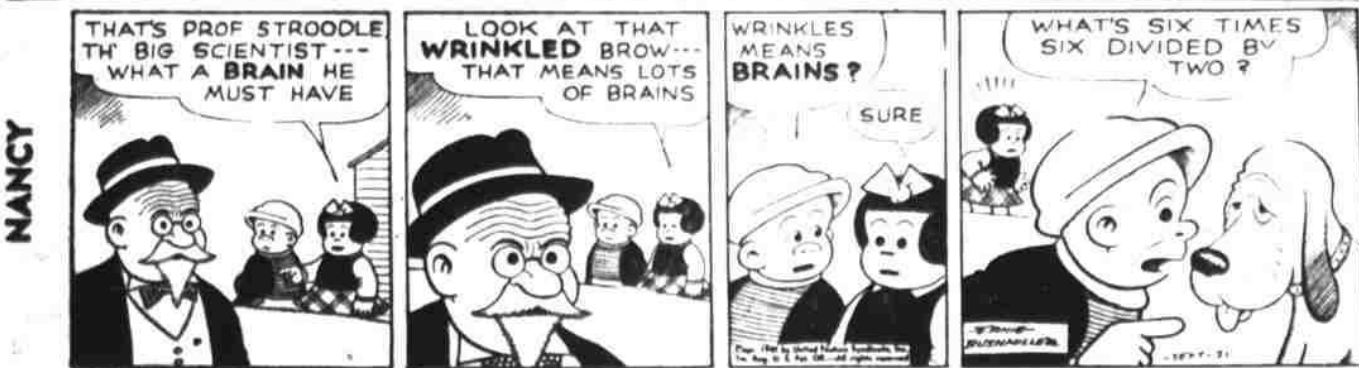

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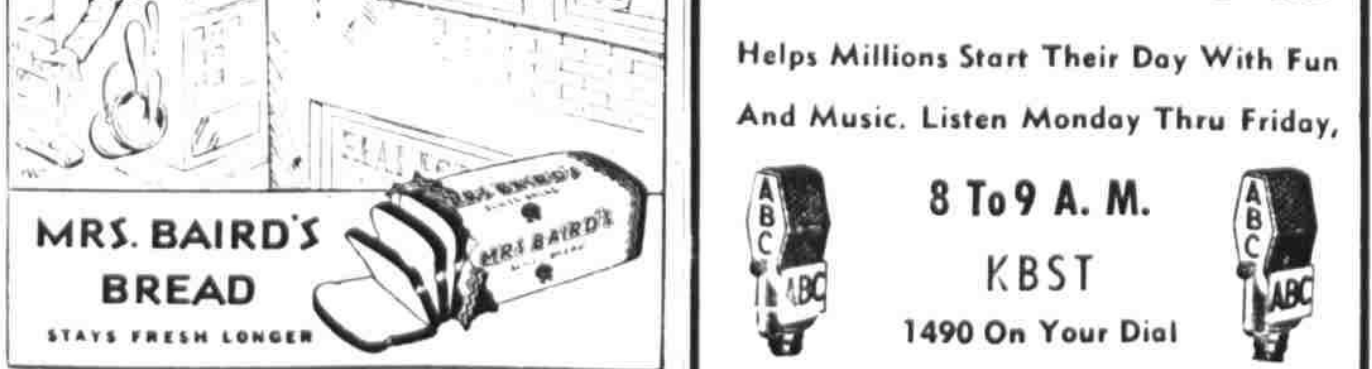

Dunkel Index Will Appear In Herald

Whether it's Michigan, Vanderbilt and California that hold your interest, or whether you are intrigued by Buena Vista, Quachita and General Beadle, the whole nation-wide college football picture forecasts, rankings, and comparisons each week in the Herald during the coming season.

Dick Dunkel's famous Power Index, which assigns a new relative strength rating to each of the nation's 625 teams each week, will appear each Friday. A forecast of games from coast to coast will be presented.

The Power Index enables football fans to pick their own winners with accuracy, to determine how close the game should be and to make comparisons of teams that do not meet.

Based on the principle of differential correlation, the Power Index was invented 20 years ago by Dunkel, and has been over 80 per cent accurate in selecting winners of the 25,000 games played in the United States since that time.

Teams set their own ratings through correlation of two factors: (1) average scoring margin, either plus or minus, and (2) average Power Index of opponents. Ratings scale down from a high of about 120.0 to 0.0. Thus, for example, a team that rates 100.0 has been 20 points stronger per game, against comparable opposition, than one that rates 80.0. If a 100.0 team is scheduled to meet an 80.0 team, it can be said that the 100.0 should win by 20 points, if both play strictly according to past performance.

Until a team has played one game in a new season, Dunkel now shows only its Finch Power Index from the previous season. At one time, he used an adjusted pre-season rating until it was found that the old ratings really did a more accurate job on opening games.

Last week-end's few openers did little to change the picture of the Top Twenty left over from 1948. However, strong starts last week-end on the part of Villanova, California, Kentucky, Stanford Texas and T.C.U. boosted ratings of all six and may give a hint of things to come. 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Master Thief Was Highly Successful Until He Made Mistake About A Woman

— If ever a criminal had cause to regret the old French police maxim about finding the woman, it's surely, handsome Gerard Graham Dennis.

Sleek-haired, blue-eyed Dennis is a retired gentleman burglar, currently residing in the steel-barred Hudson River retreat known as Sing Sing Prison. But for eight years—possibly much longer—he operated freely as one of the most efficient thieves in the history of the nation.

If he had stuck to his well-developed routine he might still be causing police consternation. But being human, Jerry Dennis became a little bit careless about book shops and a lady who talked.

Police and law enforcement officials in Westchester County, New York, the scene of his fanciest operations, frankly described him as "fabulous." They also called him ruthless, cold-blooded and cautious. By the time a careful detective caught up with him in Cleveland, Dennis had acquired illegally jewels and furs estimated in value between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000.

For his work in Westchester, Dennis was sentenced to serve from 18 years to life imprisonment after he pleaded guilty at the outset of his trial. He was sentenced on each of seven counts, the sentences to run concurrently, and will not be eligible for parole until after 12 years.
