### Dow soars again

NEW YORK — The soaring stock market swept the Dow Jones industrial average to its second consecutive record high Friday, extending a yearend rally that has added more than \$225 billion to the value of U.S. stocks. The Dow average of 30 blue-chip stocks added another 18.56 points to Thursday's closing high to finish at 3,101.52 — its first move above the 3,100 mark. The average, the best-known barometer of the stock market, has racked up 187.16 points, or 6.4 percent, since last Friday, when the Federal Reserve lowered a key interest rate. Broader measures of the market also have set new highs in the runup, which has boosted shares of large and small companies alike.

### Tribute for Alzado

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — Arnold Schwarzenegger, Emilio Estevez and Steven Seagal will be among the celebrities at a tribute next month for former football player Lyle Alzado. Alzado, 42, was diagnosed last year with inoperable brain cancer that he attributes to steroid abuse. Proceeds from the Jan. 11 "Lyle, This One's For You" benefit will go to the Lyle Alzado National Steroid Education Program. The program was developed to educate young people about the damaging and life-threatening effects of anabolic steroids and human growth hormones. The former Los Angeles Raiders star, known to friends and family as the "gentle giant," played professional football for 15 years and was an All-Pro defensive player. Other guests scheduled to attend the black-tie tribute include: Scott Baio, Pat Boone, Larry King, Marlee Matlin, Mickey Rourke, Charlie Sheen, Maria Shriver, John Candy, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Marcus Allen and George Foreman. 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# Duke, Buchanan plan Texas challenge

AUSTIN — Refusing to give Texas to George Bush without a fight, David Duke and Pat Buchanan on Friday announced plans to challenge the president in the primary of his adopted home state.

Republican officials received Buchanan's filing fee and papers by overnight mail on Friday hours after Bush campaign workers traveled to Austin to personally pay the \$5,000 filing fee.

Late Friday, the Duke campaign announced its decision to enter the March 10 Texas primary. Duke spokesman Mark Ellis said the campaign sent a check for the

filing fee and the necessary papers from Louisiana to Austin shortly after noon.

"You can look for him in February," Ellis said of Duke's plans to campaign in Texas.

Bush already has locked up support of the state's Republican establishment — a resolution passed earlier this month by the State Republican Executive Committee endorsed the president for re-election.

At a brief news conference after Bush's filing, State GOP chairman Fred Meyer told reporters, "You know

Texas is Bush Country."

Meyer, who also has endorsed Bush, said Duke and Buchanan will receive the same treatment from the state party as Bush.

"I think it's up to the primary voters in the Republican primary, and I am confident what their decision will be," he said.

Buchanan has complained that national Republican Party officials have not cooperated with him over requests for mailing lists and other organizational support, and Republican officials have tried to keep Duke off the primary ballot in Florida and Georgia. Ellis said

# Fears ease as 2 rivers crest 'low'

## Bush advises town hit hard by Navy cuts

BEEVILLE — President Bush said Friday that Beeville will have to cope with the closing of a local Navy installation, which he attributed to America's winning the Cold War.

Chase Field Naval Air Station, one of 34 U.S. military installations targeted for closure, is scheduled to shut down in 1993.

The president arrived at Chase after surveying flood damage in Central Texas. He will spend the weekend hunting quail at a friend's ranch.

Speaking Friday night to about 3,500 people at a giant community barbecue, Bush urged the South Texas city to seek help from several federal agencies that have money allocated to assist towns with base closings.

"We'll do everything that we possibly can to help Beeville make the tough transition into this post-Cold

■ Relief spreads as flood waters begin to recede.

WHARTON — The Colorado River was beginning to creep up Thelma Allen's driveway about noon Friday when word began to spread through her neighborhood that the river would crest a foot and a half lower than earlier estimates.

"Praise the Lord!" shouted Mrs. Allen, a refrain that was picked up by her friend Patricia Coleman, who had been standing with her in a front yard covered with soggy Christmas decorations. Then both cried out, "We've been saved!"

There was relief throughout southeastern Texas on Friday as the flooding Colorado and Brazos Rivers crested at lower levels than expected.

There were no injuries reported Friday, but about two dozen houses in this town 60 miles southwest of Houston were invaded by the muddy waters of the Colorado; had the early forecasts proved accurate, about 300 homes, a school and two factories could have been damaged, said Robert Miller, the Wharton City manager.

But people living along the Trinity River northeast of Houston will have to wait several days to learn how badly they will be affected as a surge of water caused by heavy rains last week in Central and North Texas works its way downstream.

At least 15 people have been killed in the flooding, which began last weekend, and millions of dollars in damage has

# Yeltsin consolidates grip on power

■ Russian president seizes aircraft carrier; tensions grow about military.

MOSCOW — Consolidating his grip on power, Boris Yeltsin seized the most sophisticated Soviet aircraft carrier for his Russian federation, reduced the authority of his vice president and moved into Mikhail Gorbachev's office, news reports said Friday.

Underscoring the struggle over the future of what was the mighty Soviet military, the aircraft carrier Admiral Kuznetsov docked Thursday in the northern Russian port of Murmansk, the Tass news agency

reported. The ship left Ukrainian waters in the Black Sea on Dec. 2, according to defense magazines. Flight International reported earlier in the month that the ship's departure was intended to assure it did not fall into Ukraine's hands.

Meanwhile, defense ministers of the new commonwealth signed four documents on a unified armed forces, a commonwealth defense council, a military oath and the status of servicemen, the Interfax news agency reported. Few details were released, but the agreements will form the basis for a meeting Monday in Minsk, Belarus, of leaders of the Commonwealth of Independent States.

## Kerrey companies provide little health-care insurance

OMAHA, Neb. — When Sen. Bob Kerrey of Nebraska introduced a bill last summer calling for the government to provide comprehensive health insurance for all Americans, he said the runaway costs of health care were severely hampering the nation's businesses, forcing them to choose between providing jobs

and providing medical coverage for their employees.

Kerrey, a candidate for the Democratic Presidential nomination, knows first-hand the predicament he described. He and his brother-in-law own a chain of nine restaurants and three health clubs in Omaha and in Lincoln, Neb., and most of the employees cannot get health insurance through the Kerrey

## Return of Buckley's body ends U.S. hostage saga

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The remains of slain CIA station chief William Buckley were handed over to the U.S. Embassy on Friday, ending the eight-year saga of American hostages in Lebanon.

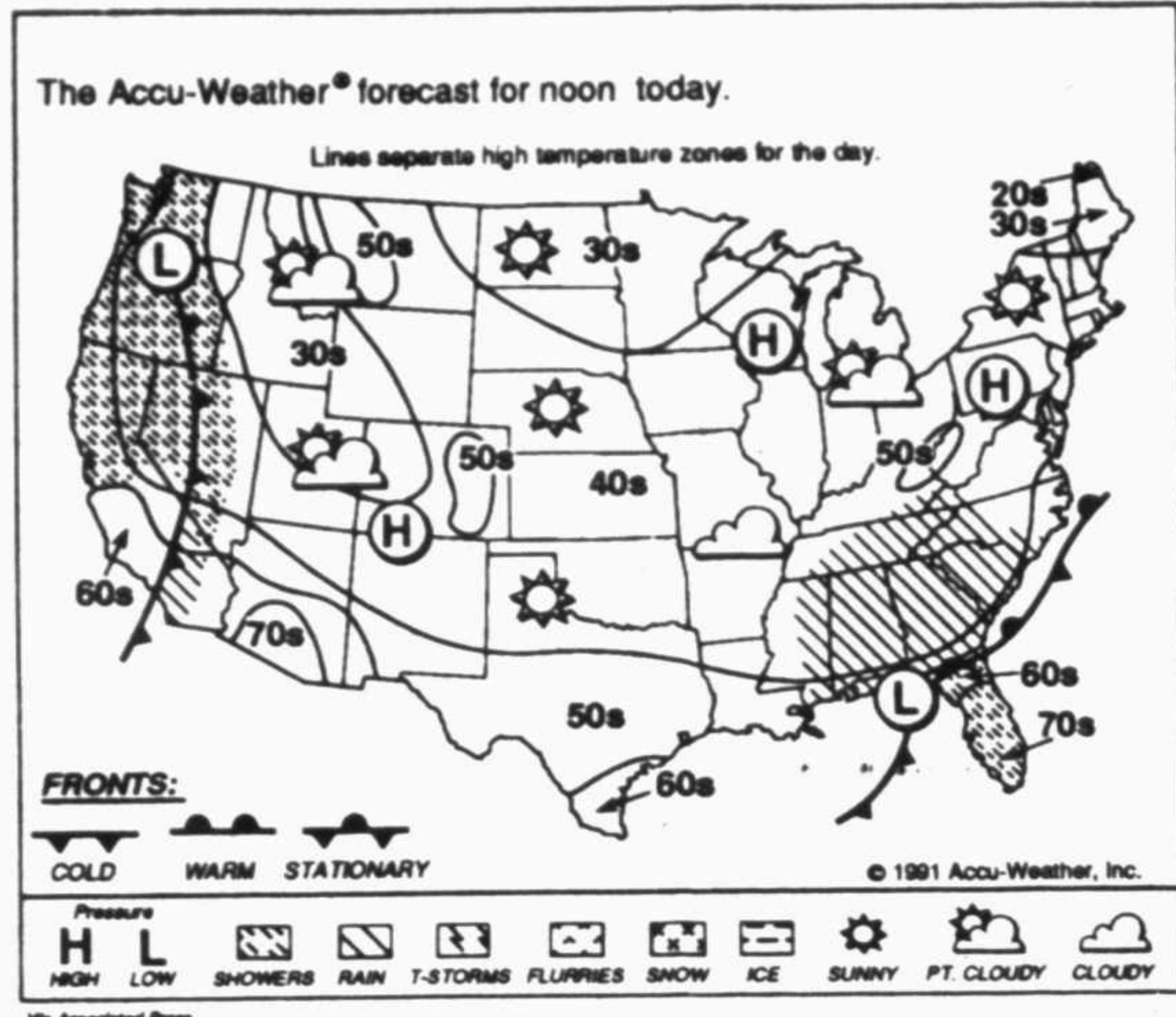
However, the fate of two German hostages remained clouded. Their kidnapers demanded the release of two jailed Shiite terrorists in exchange for their freedom, but Germany rejected the demand.

In Washington, the CIA finally acknowledged that Buckley was one of its own. The agency said Buckley had been a senior CIA official when kidnapped, and that it would make a positive identification in the United States.

The State Department said the remains would be flown to Dover Air Force Base in Delaware today.

Expect a sunny, warmer day

Today's forecast calls for sunny and warmer conditions with a high in the mid-50s, with winds south becoming southwesterly at 5-10 mph, according to the National Weather Service at Midland International Airport.

Tonight should have mostly clear skies with a low in the low 30s, NWS said.

Sunday's forecast is partly cloudy with a high near 60, the NWS said. Yesterday's high was 43, compared to the record high of 75, set in 1970. The record low for today's date is 13, set in 1988.

STATE

It was cloudy and slightly warmer across much of Texas on Friday, while the Panhandle had fog, snow flurries and drizzle. South Texas had clear to partly cloudy skies, except for fog along the upper coast.

Winds were from the northwest at 5 to 15 miles an hour.

Temperatures rose generally into the 40s to 50s with readings at 3 p.m. ranging from 34 degrees at Amarillo and Dalhart to 60 at Cotulla, Laredo and Del Rio.

The North Texas forecast was for decreasing cloudiness over the weekend, becoming mostly fair Sunday. Highs today were to be near 50s with lows tonight in the lower 30s. Highs Sunday were to be in the mid-50s to near 60 degrees.

West Texas was to have sunny skies today with increasing cloudiness from the West by Sunday. Highs today were expected to be in the 50s with lows in the 30s tonight.

Forecasters said South Texas would have partly to mostly cloudy skies through Sunday with no rain expected. Highs were to be in the 50s and 60s with lows ranging from near 30 in the Hill Country to near 50 on the lower coast.

NATION

A strong storm system approaching the Pacific Coast kicked up dust that closed an interstate highway in California on Friday and spread rain across much of the area.

More than 100 miles of Interstate 5 was closed in California's San Joaquin Valley, south of the area where 17 people died in a pileup caused by a violent dust storm in late November, the National Weather Service said. Wind gusted to 55 mph in the area, reducing visibility to near zero at times.

Showers were reported along the northern and central Pacific Coast. Clouds covered much of the nation west of the Rockies. Fog was reported in parts of Utah, western Colorado, western Wyoming and western Montana.

Showers were scattered from Kansas and Missouri through the central Gulf Coast states to the southern Atlantic Coast. Fog was reported in the upper half of the Mississippi Valley. Snow was reported in the Red River Valley of North Dakota and Minnesota.

A cold front produced strong wind in the Alaska Range, and snow fell in northern interior Alaska.

Temperatures were below freezing from upper Michigan into North Dakota, South Dakota and Nebraska and in northern New England.

been done to residential property, farms and livestock.

President Bush inspected flooded areas of his adopted home state by plane Friday morning on his way to a quail hunt at a 10,000-acre ranch in South Texas owned by his longtime friend, Will Farish III, a Houston oilman.

The hunt, a male-only affair, has been an annual event for Bush at the Christmas holiday for many years. He canceled his trip last year because of the Persian Gulf war.

Arriving at the Chase Naval Air Station at Beeville on Friday morning, Bush said: "I know that this disaster has been a source of great personal tragedy to many here in Texas, a particularly bitter calamity during this holiday season. To those who have lost loved

ones as a result of this catastrophe, Barbara and I send our deepest sympathies."

So far five Texas counties in the central and northern parts of the state have been declared eligible for federal disaster relief, said Gov. Ann Richards' office. Federal officials with Bush in Texas said about 2,500 people would qualify for loans and grants.

Much of the water spilled into fields and forests as it moved down the Colorado, the Brazos and the Trinity on its way to the Gulf of Mexico, and as a result state officials were obliged to repeatedly put off their estimates of crest times and lower their forecasts of flood crests.

Residents of downstream river communities have maintained anxious vigils since Christmas Eve waiting to see how much water

would visit them. And many people simply ignored official advisories that they should evacuate their homes. Under Texas law there can be no mandatory evacuations.

"They were telling us just about all week we should be getting out, but we were not too alarmed because we could see the river wasn't doing much," said Edith Owens, 41, whose house is just two blocks from the Colorado in a low-lying area of Wharton.

She waited and watched until there were several inches of water covering her street and then she left for a relative's house Thursday night with her two sons.

About 75 people spent Thursday night at an emergency shelter in a school gymnasium that had been set up to handle as many as 1,500 people after town officials recommended the evacuation of Mrs.

Owens's neighborhood on the west side of Wharton.

Aside from the slow, anticlimactic nature of the flood, residents blamed fear of looting as a reason for not evacuating.

"I put all my valuables up as high as I could, but I wasn't going to move unless I had to," said Mrs. Allen, 42. "You leave your home and those crack heads will come and take everything they can carry away."

Having failed to get residents of the low-lying west side of Wharton to evacuate voluntarily despite two days of pleading, town officials declared a dusk-to-dawn curfew in the area Thursday night and promised to maintain constant police patrols in this city of 10,000 people.

With these assurances some families moved out.

War world that we live in," Bush said. "Your future really depends on you — depends on the heartbeat of Beeville, Texas."

The president said those who believe foreign and domestic policy are separate are making a mistake.

"You have learned, some might say the hard way, that foreign policy and domestic policy do go hand-in-hand," he said.

Bush also told the crowd he expects his trip to Asia next week will help open trade doors.

"I believe we can compete with everyone in the world if we get a fair chance," the president said.

Many in the crowd at the Bee County Rodeo Arena waited three hours to hear Bush speak from a

stage in front of a huge U.S. flag. The president arrived Friday morning after flying over flooded cities and farmland.

"I know that this disaster has been a source of great personal tragedy to many here in Texas — a particularly bitter calamity during this holiday season," Bush said upon arriving. "To those who have lost loved ones as a result of this catastrophe, Barbara and I send our deepest sympathies."

After Bush's brief remarks to reporters and about 100 well-wishers from Beeville, he was whisked away by motorcade to the 10,000-acre Lazy F Ranch owned by longtime friend and Houston oilman Will Farish III.

For years, Bush has hunted quail at the ranch during the

Christmas holidays. Last year the trip was cancelled because of the Persian Gulf War.

Townpeople said they were glad to see the president return — with his staff, Secret Service contingent and a press entourage that all help boost the local economy.

"We're just glad that he's here," said Lori Manuel, owner of Beeville Boot and Western Wear and LMC Business Products next door. "With the ... entourage that he brings with him, it's good for business."

She and others said the community's approximately 16,000 residents don't blame Bush for the closing of Chase Field, which accounts for 29 percent of the area workforce.

"I think they blame Congress

more than the president," Ms. Manuel said. "Really, us local people think that possibly something better than the U.S. government will come in and supply new jobs."

About 7 percent of the monthly income at her office supply business is generated by the Navy installation, she said.

"That was not something that we wanted to see dissipate," she said. "It was kind of something we counted on."

Teresa Holland, manager of the Bee County Chamber of Commerce, repeatedly has said the city must not dwell on the bad news about Chase.

"We could sit back and cry, but you'll see this community has already sprung to its feet," Ms. Holland said.

that there has been no indication that Duke would be treated unfairly in Texas.

Bush spokesman Jim Oberwetter said the president's Texas campaign will focus on the state's economy and Bush's foreign affairs record. In what appears to be the emerging strategy for Bush, Oberwetter said Congress — not the president — is to blame for the country's continuing recession.

"You know he has had a policy before the Congress for over three years," Oberwetter said of the administration's economic plans. "If Congress had acted on that policy,

which includes a number of issues relating to Texas, we would not be in the shape we are in today."

Duke's effort will focus on the same themes and demographic groups that carried him earlier this year into a runoff for the governorship of Louisiana. Ellis said that Duke is not inhibited by Bush's reference to Texas as his adopted home state.

"As far as it being his home state, I understand his address is a hotel room in Houston," Ellis said. "David's issues are well known: welfare reform, fair trade and an end to all race preference, affirmative action and quota programs."

He predicted Duke will appeal to a broad base of support from working class Texans in all areas of the state.

"David will do well in East Texas and the metro areas of Dallas and Houston," Ellis said. "His strongest base has always been small towns."

Buchanan spokesman Brooke Beyer said that Buchanan is concentrating his effort on New Hampshire and declined to discuss the Texas race.

"At this point we are just starting an organization in Texas, and there's not much to say except we want to be on the ballot," he said. Duke officially has been placed

on ballots in Tennessee, Mississippi and Michigan, but he plans to compete with Bush in every southern state and California, Ellis said.

Earlier this month, Duke pulled out of the Maryland primary.

Friday, he launched his Florida campaign with a rally sponsored by the Cuban Nationalist Association. A statement released by his office said, "Duke knows Cuban-Americans are intensely patriotic and have for many years committed themselves to the struggle against communism. Rep. Duke wants to see stronger action taken by the American government to free Cuba from its communist oppressors."

YELTSIN: Tensions grow about Soviet military

Yevgeny Shaposhnikov, interim military commander of the commonwealth, has been fighting for preservation of a unified armed forces.

But he told central television after Friday's meeting that commonwealth defense ministers have decided to take into account the intention of Ukraine, Moldova and Azerbaijan to create their own armed forces.

Military rivalries were growing in advance of those talks. Ukraine Defense Minister Konstantin Mor-

ozov has issued decrees subordinating troops on its territory to Kiev's command rather than the central commonwealth commander.

Ukraine also has claimed jurisdiction over the main Black Sea naval base in Sevastopol and part of the fleet. The Black Sea has many modern missile warships and escort ships and has been responsible for training forces for duty in the Mediterranean.

One of the crown jewels of the Soviet fleet is the Admiral Kuznetsov. With a displacement of 65,000

tons, it is the only Soviet aircraft carrier that can accommodate modern fighter jets, such as the MiG-29.

While the republics maneuvered to strengthen their military positions, Gorbachev found that the trappings of power are ephemeral indeed.

The former president, who resigned Wednesday, went to his third-floor Kremlin office Friday morning to clean out his desk and remove personal papers. But he found Yeltsin already installed, with his own nameplate on the

door, according to the Izvestia newspaper and the Russian Information Agency.

Yeltsin also issued a decree taking control of Soviet central television and radio, Tass said. It quoted the decree as saying the TV and radio will broadcast news from Russia and the rest of the new commonwealth.

Also Friday, the Russian evening news reported that the powers of Vice President Alexander Rutskoi, who has openly opposed Yeltsin's economic reform program, were sharply reduced.

found the body early Friday near the airport highway. It was wrapped in cotton bandages, shrouded in a brown blanket tied with plastic rope.

At the morgue at American University Hospital, the remains were identified as those of Buckley, of Medford, Mass., kidnapped by pro-Iranian Shiite Muslim radicals in March 1984.

After the two-hour autopsy, the remains were placed in a flag-draped casket and transported to

the U.S. Embassy in the suburb of Aukar.

After the last living U.S. hostage — journalist Terry Anderson — was released Dec. 4, President Bush called for the return of the remains of Buckley and Marine Lt. Col. William R. Higgins. Higgins' body was returned a week ago.

State Department spokesman Joseph Snyder said Friday in Washington the United States will not consider the hostages' issue resolved until the release of remains of two former European hostages, of two German relief workers, and

of information about the whereabouts of several Israeli soldiers.

Islamic Jihad claimed to have killed 57-year-old Buckley on Oct. 4, 1985, to avenge an Israeli air raid on the headquarters of the Palestine Liberation Organization in Tunis.

However, American hostages later freed by the group said Buckley died of torture at least four months before the purported execution. Anderson said he believed Buckley had died in the same room with him, although he was blindfolded and did not know

for certain.

Word of the body's release came from a caller claiming to speak for the Islamic Jihad. "We have dumped Thursday night the body of American spy Buckley," said the man, who called a Western news agency.

"We have thus fulfilled our pledge. The U.N. Secretary-General ... has to bring about the release of our brethren in Israel," the caller said, referring to more than 200 Arab prisoners whose freedom had been demanded by kidnappers in Lebanon.

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# KERREY: Firms provide little insurance

companies.

The companies do offer health coverage to full-time employees. But full-timers account for a small proportion of the companies' total work force.

Kerrey's brother-in-law, Dean F. Rasmussen, president of the restaurant company, Grandmother's Inc., estimates that only 75 to 100 of the company's 700 to 800 restaurant employees get health insurance through the company.

David K. Putensen, general manager of operations at the three health clubs, says only 25 to 30 of the 300 employees have employer-provided health insurance.

"Most of our employees are vulnerable to the high cost of health care, and they are just as unshielded as a turtle without its shell," said Putensen. "We're doing the best we can, and it's none too good."

Kerrey has emphasized health care as the central issue of his presidential campaign, and he often cites his business experience as evidence of his leadership ability. "Investment in the right of every American to quality health care" is a cornerstone of his political platform. But his own businesses have not made a major investment in health care for their workers.

Kerrey and his brother-in-law founded the restaurant chain in 1973. The senator is chairman of the company, and now owns 35 percent of it.

The restaurants make heavy use of part-time workers, including many high school and college students. But the restaurants do not offer health insurance coverage to such part-time employees, who work as waiters, hostesses, cashiers and food preparers.

"It would be exorbitantly expensive," Rasmussen said in an interview at his office here.

Local union leaders say Kerrey is being hypocritical, or at least inconsistent, when he advocates a national health insurance plan, including coverage of doctors' services, hospital care and nursing home care.

"When he's campaigning he gives the impression that he is for the blue-collar worker, but he doesn't even treat his own employees right," said Jenny Brown, vice president of the local Hotel Employees and Restaurant Employees Union.

Rasmussen said he would prefer that his employees not be interviewed, and the employees generally declined to discuss their health insurance arrangements.

A woman in her 20s who works at a waitress at one of the restaurants, insisting on anonymity, said she was applying for jobs at other restaurants where she could get higher wages and health insurance coverage.

But Thomas C. Nielsen, an 18-year-old cook, said he enjoyed working 20 to 30 hours a week at a Grandmother's restaurant in Lincoln. Nielsen, a freshman at the University of Nebraska, said he was in "perfect health" and was covered under his parents' health insurance policy.

Kerrey says his experience as a businessman demonstrates why he wants to "uncouple health care coverage from employment" and why he wants to establish the federal government as the principal payer of all medical bills.

"I don't think it's hypocritical at all," the senator said in an interview Friday. "As a small-business man, I know from experience how difficult it is to get health care on an affordable basis for employees."

What would be hypocritical, he

said, is if he opposed national health insurance after receiving free medical care from the government as a disabled Vietnam veteran and subsidized care as a U.S. senator.

Nationwide, 34 million people have no health insurance.

As a candidate, Kerrey has often complained of government inertia, charging, for example, that the Labor Department "fails to protect workers."

But on Dec. 17, the Labor Department charged that the senator's restaurants had violated child labor laws by flouting limits on the hours that could be worked by employees 14 or 15 years of age.

The government said the violations involved seven of Kerrey's restaurants and 116 employees, or about 15 percent of the restaurants' work force. The Labor Department assessed civil penalties of \$64,650 against the restaurants.

**Water project pits Colorado tribes against 'earth' groups**

TOWAOC, Colo. — For centuries, Indian rights have routinely been superseded by more powerful interests: ranchers, miners, federal and state governments have all claimed to know what is best for the Indian people.

Now the tribes here face a new foe: environmentalists.

The Ute Indians here in southwest Colorado recently won the right to desperately needed water and \$60 million in federal development money in a long-planned water diversion project from the Animas and La Plata rivers.

The river flows, along with hundreds of new construction jobs, would be channeled to parched ranches, towns and reservations in Colorado and New Mexico.

But environmentalists have vowed to wage a court battle to stop the project, citing a peril to the endangered Colorado squawfish, a long, slender species that began dying when dams slowed the Colorado River's flow and caused water temperatures to fluctuate.

It is a battle that underscores the growing clashes between environmentalists seeking to protect Western wilderness and Indians, who also say they love the land, but who are struggling to improve their impoverished way of life.

"Environmentalists like to wrap themselves in Indian blankets when they can," said Charles Wilkinson, a law professor at the University of Colorado, who works with both groups. "And there is some natural alliance. But that alliance comes into collision in the face of such terrible poverty in Indian country."

Two Ute tribes live in this arid mountain region: the Mountain Utes and the Southern Utes, who are just to the east. About 35 percent of the 3,000 Utes are unemployed, according to Federal statistics. But tribal leaders say unemployment is closer to 60 percent.

The Indians, who have scant job opportunities here, believe the project would breathe economic life into the region. They say many Indians would be hired for construction jobs on the project.

And the water could be used to irrigate farm fields for crops, like alfalfa, that they could then market.

In large part, the resentment among many Indians toward environmentalists simply mirrors a sentiment across much of rural America. Indians who log timber in Montana, drive cattle in Nevada or mine for coal in Arizona do not greet environmental constraints, which translate to fewer jobs, any more warmly than their white counterparts who work the land.

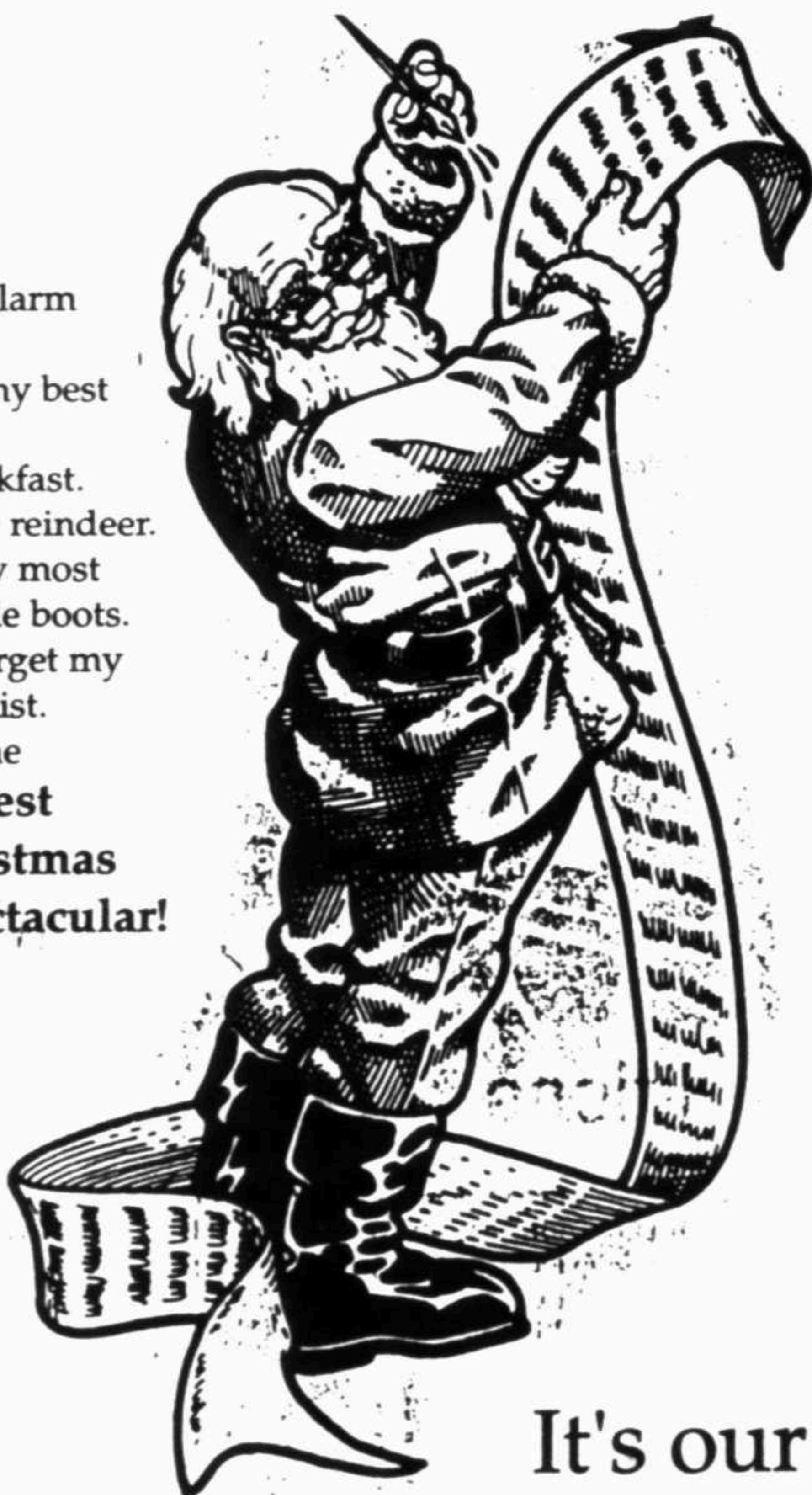

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# Differences bring end to Subic Bay

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The United States will end nearly a century of military presence in this former colony when the Navy abandons the Subic Bay base by the end of 1992, officials of both countries said Friday.

The announcement of a pull-out next year came after officials failed to come to terms on a lease extension.

A U.S. official said equipment already was being removed from the base, the largest American installation in East Asia, and that withdrawal would be stepped up "very very soon." He spoke on condition of anonymity.

The closing of Subic will cost thousands of Filipinos their jobs. Most of the 300,000 residents of nearby Olongapo rely on the base for their livelihood.

The United States returned its five other installations in the Philippines earlier this year. In September, the Philippine Senate rejected a new 10-year lease for Subic in return for \$203 million in annual aid.

President Corazon Aquino then offered the Americans a three-year withdrawal subject to negotiations, but the talks broke down over several issues, including Manila's refusal to allow ships with nuclear weapons aboard to port at Subic.

Subic, a 60,000-acre base 50 miles west of Manila, is home to about 5,800 troops and 4,500 de-

pendents. Together with Clark Air Base, which closed last month, it constituted the United States' largest overseas military installation.

But Subic lost its strategic value with the decline of Soviet and Chinese military threats in the region, and because of damage caused by the eruption of the Mount Pinatubo volcano in June.

The base had been one of the most visible symbols of a U.S. military presence. Non-Communist Southeast Asian nations felt that presence was essential to regional defense and to discouraging Japan from playing a more active security role in an area with bitter memories of World War II.

Mrs. Aquino's chief aide, Franklin Drilon, announced the U.S. withdrawal at a news conference.

In addition to the nuclear ban, U.S. and Philippine officials said other issues included the Navy's refusal to provide a definite withdrawal schedule and allow a gradual Filipino takeover of the ship repair facilities.

The U.S. officials said major units would probably be pulled out after the base's three schools for U.S. children end their academic year on June 12.

# 8 German tourists die in Kenya crash

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Eight German tourists and an American pilot were killed in a light airplane crash in a southwest Kenya game reserve, officials said Friday.

German Ambassador Bernd Mutzelburg declined to identify the victims of Thursday's crash until they were positively identified and next of kin informed.

Police and a U.S. Embassy spokesman said the pilot was an American, but refused to give his name, age or hometown.

Andre Janssens of Neckermann Reisen, a Frankfurt-based travel company, said the German victims were five men and three women. There were no survivors.

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# Court says writer guilty in ridicule

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A security court has convicted a novelist of blasphemy and sentenced him to eight years in prison, the first time this century an Egyptian author has been jailed for his writing.

The court ordered similar terms Thursday for the publisher-distributor of Alaa Hamid's "The Distance in a Man's Mind" and the owner of the press where the book was printed.

Published in May 1990, "The Distance in a Man's Mind" comprises dream sequences in which the main character meets prophets of the Koran, Islam's holy book, in comic situations. Many of the prophets are revered by Christians, Jews and Muslims.

The blasphemy charges grew out of a report by the Islamic Research Group of Al-Azhar, Cairo's Muslim educational complex considered the intellectual seat of Islam. The group banned the book and recommended that Hamid be tried on charges that his alleged ridicule of the prophets was heretical and blasphemous.

The case recalled the late Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's 1989 death sentence on British author Salman Rushdie, whose book "The Satanic Verses" is considered offensive to Islam.

"This is a shocking sentence," said lawyer Ali el-Shalaky, who was not directly involved in Hamid's case. "It's based on a law that ... has never been used before."

Hamid's case has drawn the attention of International PEN, the London-based writers' group that concerns itself with legal abuse of colleagues.

But Mursi Saad el-Din, PEN's Egyptian representative, described the sentence as not so surprising, under Egyptian law.

"Religion is taboo," he said. "According to our law, blasphemy against any religion is forbidden."

Dr. Sayed Rizk, dean of the College of Islamic Studies in Cairo, told the newspaper El-Wafd that Hamid, a government bureaucrat fired because of the book, is an apostate. Apostasy, a person's rejection of his religion, is punishable by death under Islamic law but not under the Egyptian penal code.

Although Egypt's governing system is largely secular, officials contend that 90 percent of its code corresponds with Islamic law. Al-Azhar's Research Group judges books published in Egypt.

# Pope appoints bishop

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II has named Monsignor John A. Marshall as bishop of Springfield, Mass., the Vatican said Friday.

Marshall, 63, has been serving as bishop of Burlington, Vt. since 1972.

He replaces retiring Bishop Joseph F. Maguire.

Marshall serves in the U.S. Bishops Conference, where from 1975-78 he chaired the Committee on the Formation of Priests.

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# Indians, states fight over game machines

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Indian reservations are taking a gamble with gambling by ignoring government threats and offering bettors computerized games that look and play like slot machines.

The proliferation of the machines in several states, including Florida, Arizona and California, has put Indians at loggerheads with state and federal officials, who contend the devices are illegal forms of one-armed bandits.

Authorities in California seized hundreds of machines from Indian-run casinos. The U.S. attorney

for Arizona vowed to pull the plugs on machines in reservation casinos early next year.

Florida officials have let their opposition to the machines be known.

Indian officials have fought the states, saying the lucrative ma-

chines are legal and the states have overstepped their bounds.

The dispute is part of a larger battle between Indians and states over the \$1 billion-a-year Indian gambling business, which has been on the rise since tribes hit the jackpot with a favorable Su-

preme Court ruling in 1987.

In the background are generations-old animosities between Indians and government. Indians, many placed on barren, isolated reservations, say gambling is their last economic option and now government wants to infringe on it.

"The state of California has been opposed to all forms of Indian gaming from the outset," said Howard Dickstein, attorney for California's Table Mountain reservation, where 100 machines were seized last month before they were returned after a court fight.

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# Governor's Christmas card contains photo surprise

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — Diane Frampton's Christmas card from Gov. William Donald Schaefer had a little present inside — two photographs of her and her children — at an anti-Schaefer rally.

There was no explanation. Just the photos and the governor's signature on a card bidding her a joyous Noel.

Mrs. Frampton is certain Schaefer was trying to intimidate her.

"It doesn't bother me," she said Friday from her Easton home. "It won't stop me" from pro-

testing. "In fact, it might make me protest sooner."

It's a new wrinkle for Schaefer, who is known for dashing off nasty notes to opponents or dropping by a critic's house for an unannounced visit.

Responding to a letter from 63-year-old David Nottingham last year criticizing the governor for increasing the size of his staff, Schaefer wrote: "Dear David Nottingham: Your letter sounds like a frustrated little boy. How old are you?"

To a woman who gave him the thumbs down gesture, he wrote: "Your action only exceeds the ugliness of your face."

Mrs. Frampton, from Maryland's rural Eastern Shore, is the second recipient of photographs from the February rally to step forward.

A Schaefer aide, Daryl Plevy, said the governor told her he mailed four or five cards with photographs to protesters at the Statehouse rally, organized after Schaefer described Maryland's Eastern Shore as an outhouse.

# Group ships baby food to Moscow

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — AmeriCares, the outfit that bills itself as the "Federal Express of relief," used a United Parcel Service cargo plane Friday to ship 103 tons of baby food, formula and medicines to Moscow.

The \$3 million worth of supplies were to be distributed at seven children's hospitals in Moscow, which has been plagued by food shortages during the tumultuous months leading up to the dissolution of the Soviet Union.

"It's just a great feeling to be a part of this evolution process that's happening in the Soviet — well, it's no longer the Soviet Union — in Russia," said Andy Gulick, manager of air charter services for UPS, which donated the plane for Friday's shipment.

Former Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev said earlier this month food deliveries from the other republics to Moscow had been disrupted, creating severe shortages of meat, butter and milk.

Operation Carelift, a mission of Dallas-based Josh McDowell Ministry, donated the supplies for Friday's airlift. AmeriCares' 20th to the former Soviet Union.

This was Gulick's second trip to Moscow for AmeriCares. Gulick, of Louisville, Ky., went a year ago when UPS shipped 95 tons of supplies for AmeriCares. UPS, whose air fleet is based in Louisville, also flew AmeriCares supplies to Armenia after a 1988 earthquake.

"The stigmatism of them being bad to us and us being bad to them was broken in the seven hours we worked together," Gulick said of last year's trip, when he worked with volunteers from the Russian Army to unload the plane.

Ken Wayne of Erie, Pa., who won \$10 million last year in the Pennsylvania lottery, gave AmeriCares's \$100,000 for Russian relief and accompanied Friday's shipment to Moscow.

# Coolant leak frets officials

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — The leak of a small amount of radioactive coolant into the Savannah River has been termed harmless, but officials 90 miles downstream are concerned about plans to tap the river for drinking water.

Coolant contaminated with the radioactive gas tritium leaked from the Savannah River Site's K Reactor near Aiken sometime between Sunday and Wednesday. The government reactor is the country's only source of tritium, which is used in thermonuclear warheads.

Despite assurances from federal officials that the leak is far too small to threaten those living downstream, officials at Hilton Head Island said they are worried.

Hilton Head Island currently gets its water from an underground aquifer, which is becoming tainted by salt water. The resort island, which has 24,000 permanent residents and up to 60,000 in summer, needs a new water source.

A committee decided the Savannah River was the best alternative, and plans were made to begin using river water by 1996.

Bob Huber, head of the committee, wrote to urge the Department of Energy to shut down the reactor if it can't be run safely.

"I don't know what we can do," Huber said. "But we can't remain quiet."

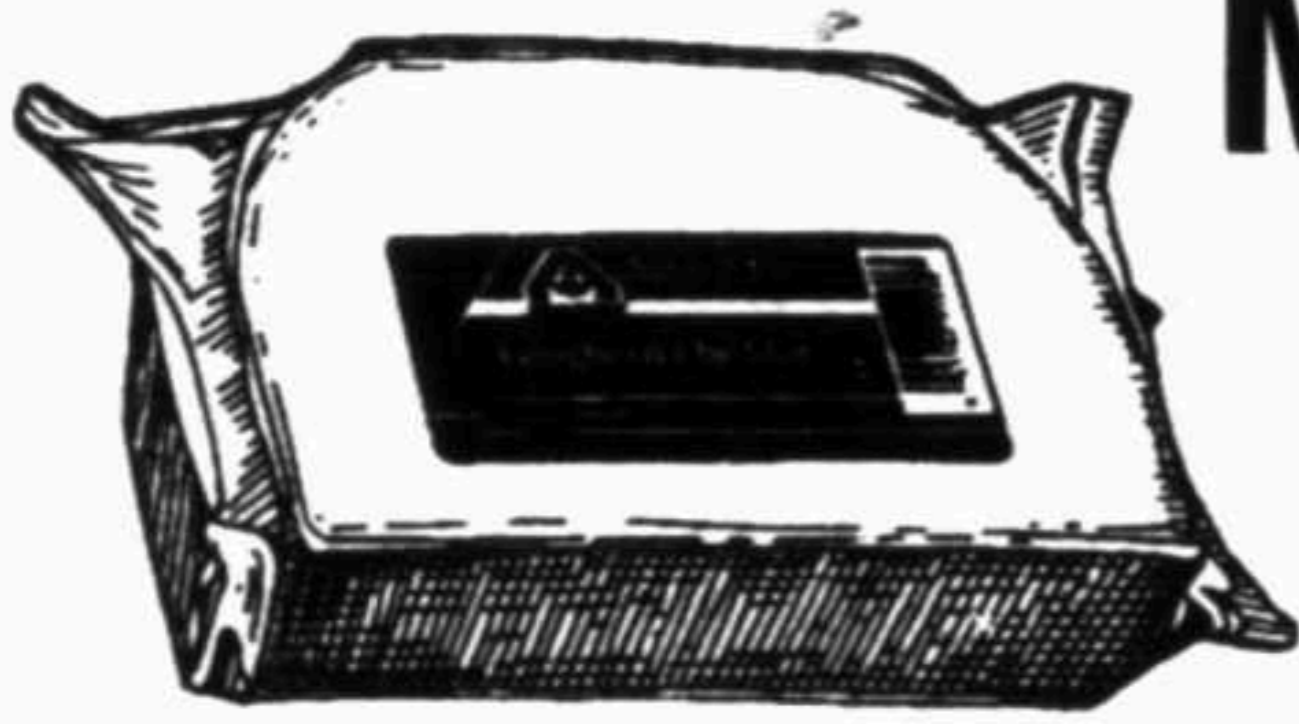

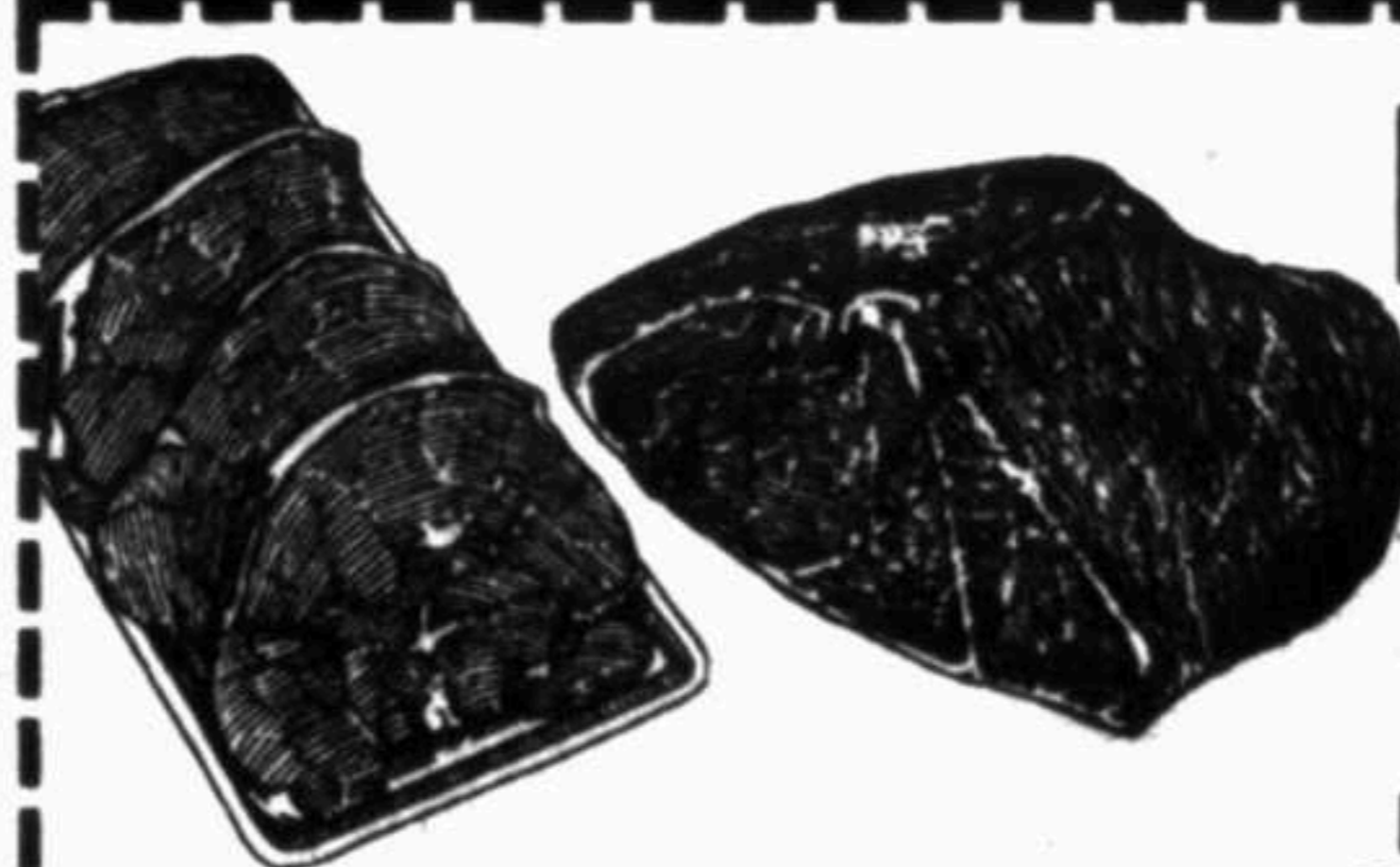

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# Oklahoma governor's son dies of overdose

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Gov. David Walters' son has died 11 days after taking an overdose of a prescription anti-depressant. Authorities ruled the death a suicide.

Shaun David Walters, 20, died late Thursday, said Randy Sachs, spokesman for Baptist Medical Center. He had slipped into a coma soon after taking the drug.

"His heart just simply failed," Sachs said. "The reason that he lived this long was probably due to the fact that he was young and healthy."

The governor and his wife, Rhonda, were at their son's bedside when he died, Sachs said. "Rhonda and I have given up to God our first-born and only son," Walters said in a statement.

"We believe that Shaun is now in an incredible place of constant joy and happiness and abundant love," Walters said. "This belief does not lessen the almost unbearable pain of his loss."

The governor canceled all his appointments when his son was found Dec. 15 and has spent most of his time since at the hospital. Bill Crain, an aide to the governor, said the staff had no idea when the governor would resume work.

"I'm told that he and Mrs. Walters are holding up remarkably well, considering the circumstances," Crain said.

The funeral was scheduled for Saturday.

## 'Iron Curtain' school asks Gorbachev visit

FULTON, Mo. (AP) — Westminster College, where Winston Churchill warned of Soviet domination in Eastern Europe, has invited Mikhail Gorbachev to be keynote speaker at a symposium about the end of the Cold War.

College officials said they haven't received a response from Gorbachev.

Westminster President J. Harvey Saunders said Thursday "nothing is definite. We should know something early in January."

The spring symposium, organized with the Center for Democracy in Washington, will focus on the end of the Cold War.

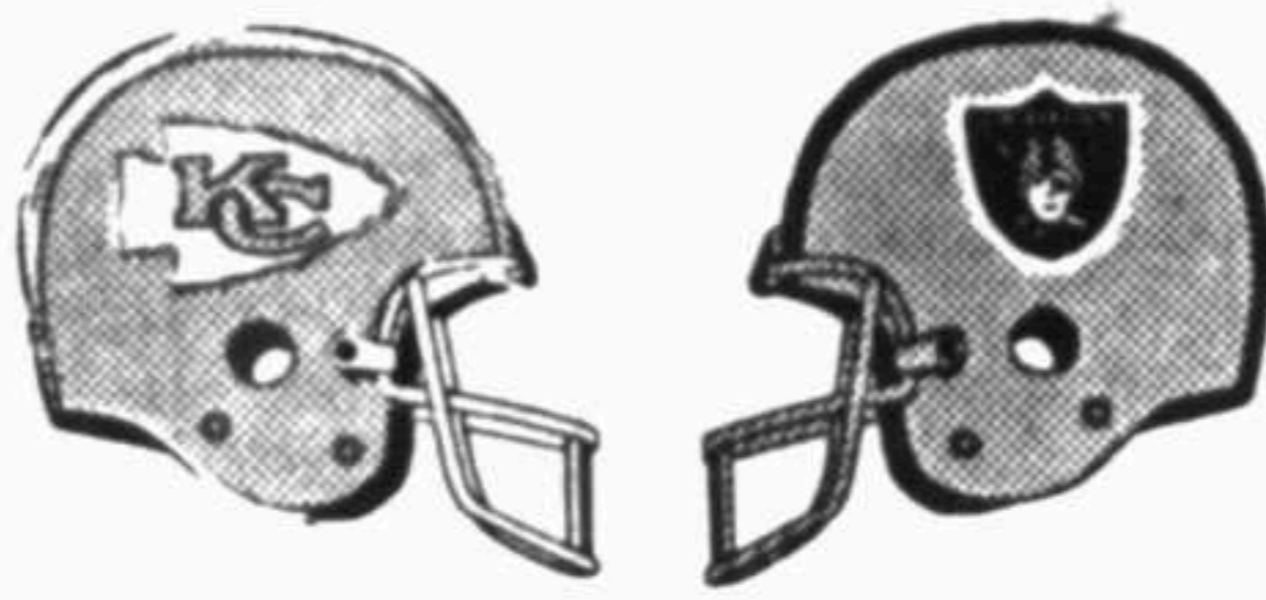

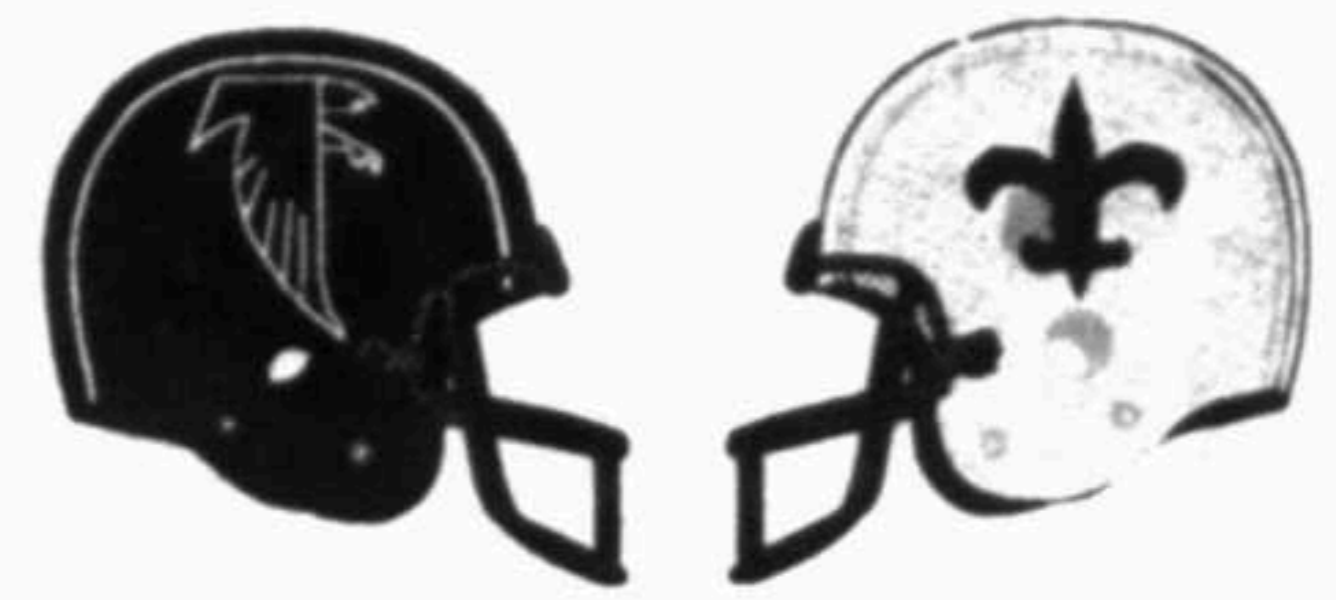
**KANSAS CITY, Mo.** — Twenty seasons after it opened, Arrowhead Stadium finally will host a playoff game.

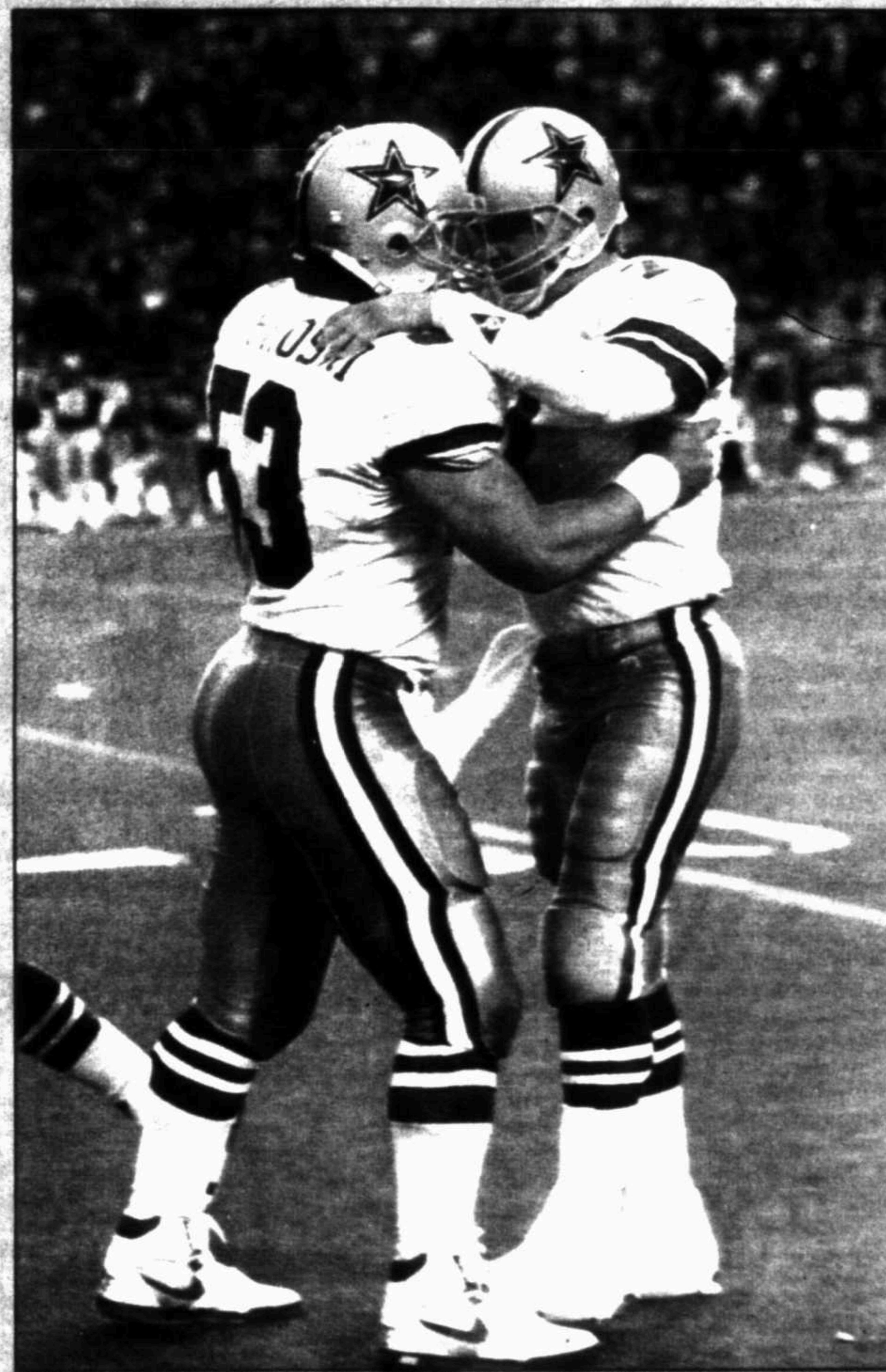
## Which Jet team will show up?

 "Now we're going into the playoffs the hard way," said Harbaugh. "Sometimes the hard way is the way to go."

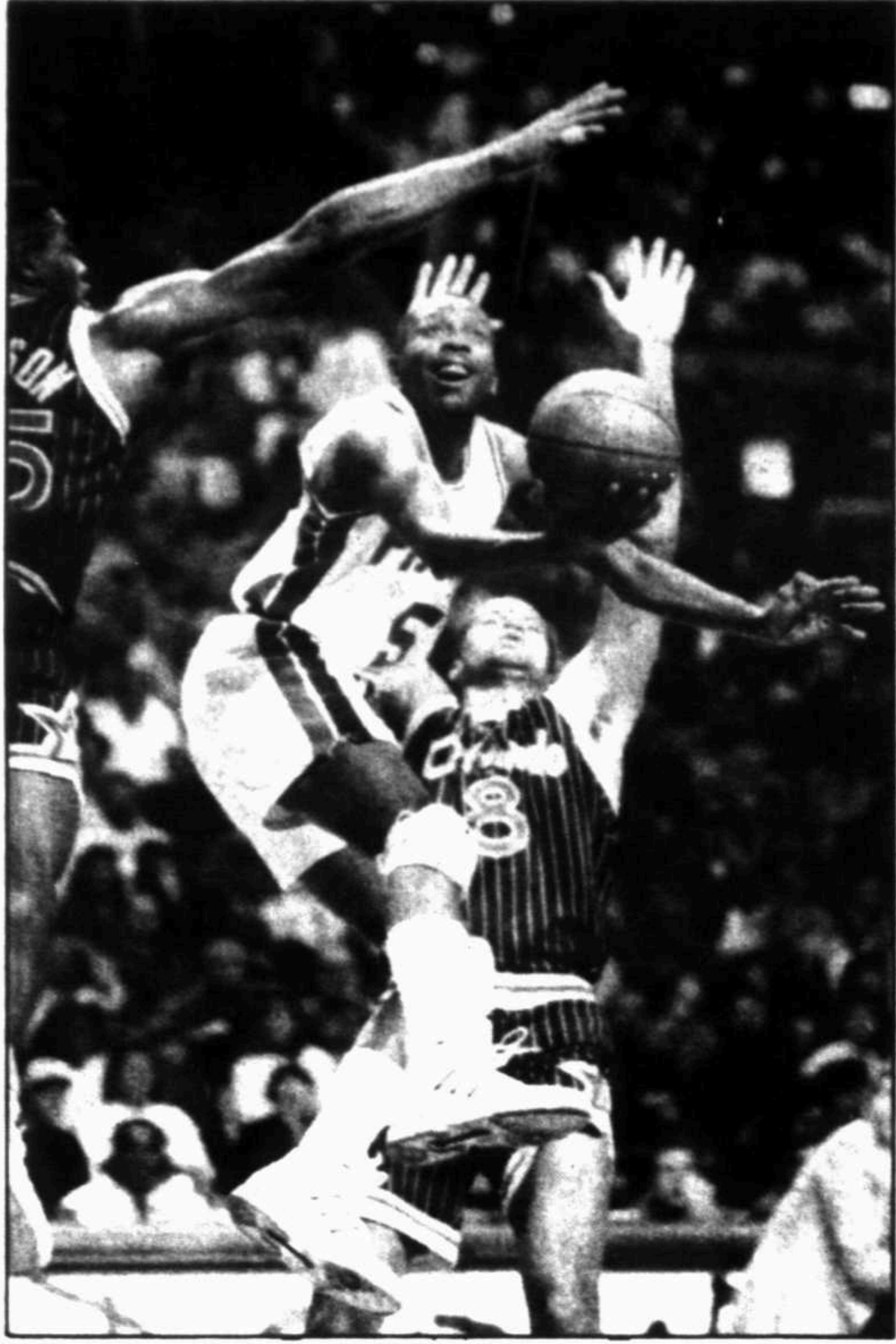

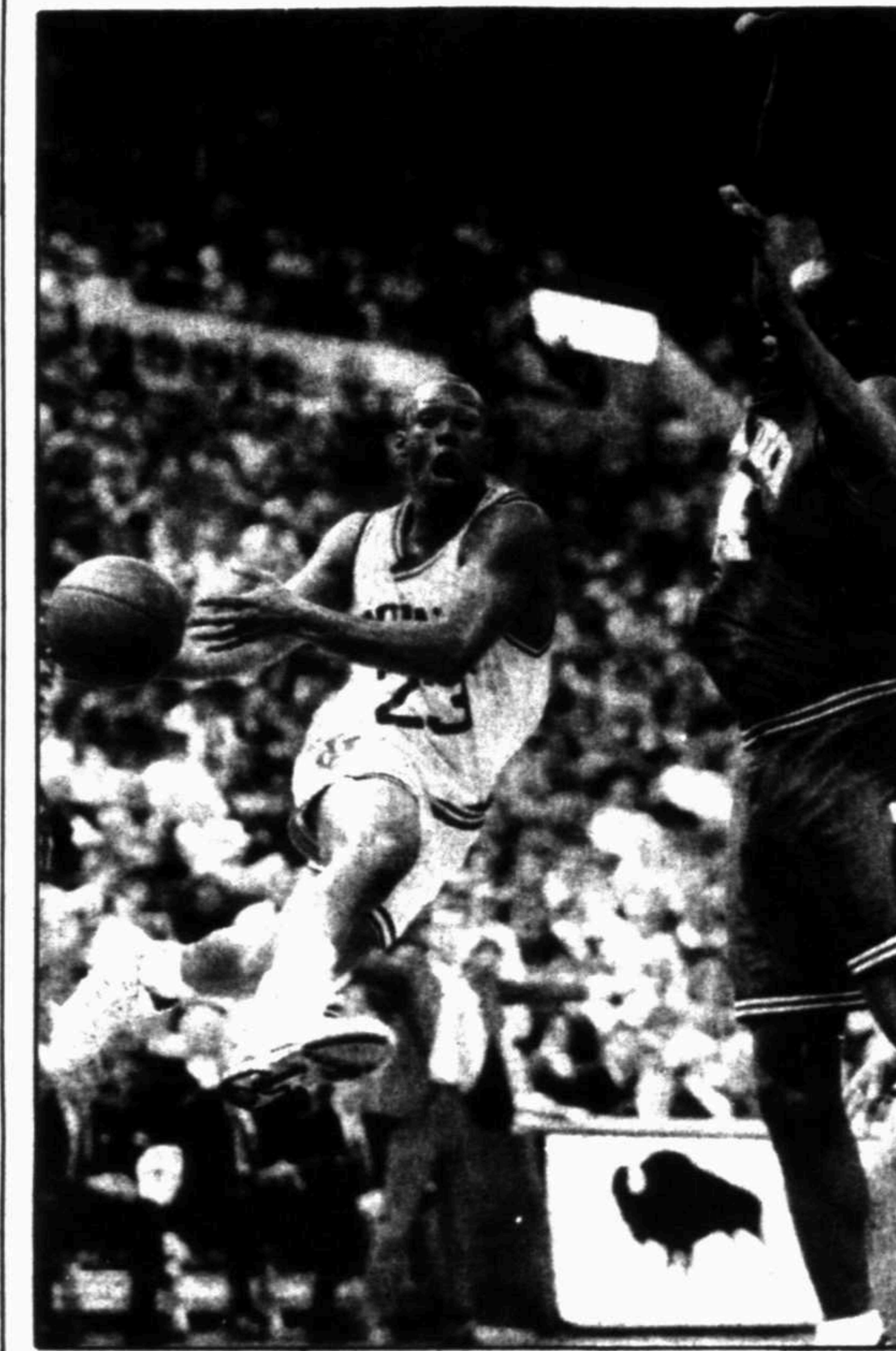

# Russell top offensive rookie

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) — From the time they were tykes, Pat Harlow knew Leonard Russell could fly. But by the time he was in college, Russell felt he had flunked as a football player.

Now they are teammates on the New England Patriots and the rest of the NFL knows what Harlow knew.

Russell, much better at running than rating himself, was named the league's offensive rookie of the year Friday in balloting by 82 media members. He received 34 votes, 20 ahead of Washington running back Ricky Ervins.

The 235-pound pile-driver from Arizona State restored power and productivity to a Patriots running game that was ranked 25th out of the 28 teams last season.

This season, the Patriots improved to 18th, and Russell fin-

"It feels good to say you contributed to that," Russell said. "As a rookie coming in, you want to establish yourself and make yourself known around the NFL with the players and the coaches.

"So it means a lot to be recognized as being one of the top players to come into the league this year. I felt, if given the chance to play, I had a legitimate chance for rookie honors."

He got help from the blocking of Harlow, the 11th pick in the draft who was outstanding at right tackle. Russell was the 14th choice. Both grew up in California.

"I played with him since he was 8 years old, and he probably could

Sweeping their two-game season series a second consecutive year, the Chiefs piled up a season-best 468 yards in offense and did not punt — a first in franchise history.

Steve DeBerg, a 15-year pro benched two weeks earlier in favor of untested Mark Vlasic, played what coach Marty Schottenheimer described as his best game as a Chief.

Even more pleasantly surprising was the way DeBerg went deep, something he hadn't done all year.

speed. DeBerg hit the seldom-used little wide receiver eight times for 188 yards, including touchdown bombs of 53 and 57 yards.

"DeBerg was phenomenal," Shell said. "It was probably the best game I've seen him play against us."

Shell knows the Chiefs probably will have a few new wrinkles planned for rookie quarterback Todd Marinovich, who is expected to start. Shell, though, was trying to keep his choice between Marinovich and Jay Schroeder a secret.

But Marinovich made a dream debut last week, hitting 23 of 40 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns while avoiding sacks and interceptions.

"We're getting both of them ready to play," Shell said.

go quarterback. As far as trends go, the Cowboys (11-5) appear to have the late season momentum with them, while the Bears (11-5) have the playoff experience behind them.

Chicago is in the postseason for the seventh time in the last eight years, while Dallas is making its first playoff appearance since 1985.

"I think playoff experience can be an advantage — just the experience of playing in big ball games helps," said Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson. "But the quality of opposition should help us."

Dallas has won the last five games of the regular season, beating Washington, Pittsburgh, New Orleans, Philadelphia and Atlanta. The Redskins, Saints and Falcons are in the 1991 playoffs.

On the other hand, the Bears all year have been able to beat only three playoff-bound teams, Detroit, New York Jets and New Orleans.

Johnson said his team is excited about the Bears game.

"We got a very young team. Even the veterans we have haven't been in the playoffs for the last few years," he said.

Johnson is going with Steve Beuerlein at quarterback.

"Steve is healthy and he's been playing well. Troy Aikman is not

100 and we've decided to go with Steve," said Johnson.

Aikman suffered a knee injury on Nov. 24 at Washington. Beuerlein has been at the helm down the stretch, completing 65 of 132 passes for 883 yards and five touchdowns since Aikman went down.

"Fortunately for me, Troy did not get injured early in the season, because I needed 12 or 13 weeks just to get used to the offensive system," said Beuerlein.

Chicago coach Mike Ditka, a former Dallas assistant under Tom Landry, said he thinks the Cowboys rate as one of the top playoff teams — wild card or not.

"We're at the bottom until we're proved ourselves," said Ditka. "We've got the biggest strike against us — our loss Monday night."

But Ditka doesn't think the Bears have a whipped dog mentality.

"No, we're Bears, not dogs. But we play like dogs at times," he said. "But Beware! We didn't get to 11-5 with mirrors. We're a good football team. We just weren't a good football team Monday."

Two Bear starters — wide receiver Anthony Morgan (knee) and linebacker John Roper (leg) — were injured and will miss the Dallas game, but expected to return to the lineup was guard Mark Bortz (abdomen), out since Nov. 11.

# Bowden says Aggies have a 'hunger'

DALLAS — Bobby Bowden hopes his team is listening when he tells them that ninth-ranked Texas A&M might be as good as Miami and Florida.

"We've shown them the films and if they can't see A&M has a great team then they are blind," Bowden said Friday as he team held its first workout in the Cotton Bowl.

The fifth-ranked Seminoles (10-2) and the 10-1 Aggies meet on New Year's Day in Florida State's first visit to the Cotton Bowl.

The Florida State coach, who saw his national title hopes evaporate with two close late-season losses to the Hurricanes and the Gators, said A&M's defense "looks as good or better" than Miami and Florida.

"We'll know after the game but A&M might be as good as anybody," Bowden said of the Southwest Conference champions.

Bowden said A&M doesn't have individual players who concern him near as much

as the overall team does.

"You can tell they have a hunger," he said. "They think they ought to be ranked higher. And that makes them mad. They are looking for recognition. That makes you hungry. It makes you dangerous."

Bowden said he sees sign of mental recovery by his team after a one-point loss to Miami and a five-point loss to Florida.

"They were maxed out after those games and we took 10 days off and now I think they look hearty and hale again," Bowden said.

The Seminoles haven't lost three straight games in eight seasons.

He said he believed the Seminoles pride would return during Cotton Bowl week.

"We've got to have some pride," he said.

"We've been a team in the top three the last few years and we've got to get it back to where we belong. This team deserves something good. We don't want to go out with three straight losses."

Bowden talked about the difficulty of carrying the pressure of being ranked No. 1 in preseason.

"When you are picked No. 1 in the preseason there is no room for error," he said. "We had the material but we had one error and we were out. Maybe it's better not being picked No. 1 with everybody shooting at you and just sneaking up on it."

Bowden said there was no doubt the season "took its toll. We hustled, sweated, fought and bled and you just take two plays away out of 1,500 and we're playing A&M for the national championship."

Then he quipped, "I know I'm going to get a doctor's checkup after this game."

The Aggies worked out at Texas Stadium Friday and coach R.C. Slocum said that a shoulder injury being nursed by quarterback Bucky Richardson had healed.

"Bucky developed tendinitis during the week of the Texas game and it bothered his throwing," Slocum said.

# Colorado, Alabama battle in Blockbuster Bowl

MIAMI — Colorado coach Bill McCartney views tonight's game with Alabama in the Blockbuster Bowl as a steppingstone to next season.

Crimson Tide coach Gene Stallings has a different perspective.

"I'm going to build on next year with what we've already done," Stallings said. "This is a reward for a good season."

Either way, the matchup shapes up as one of the closest games.

"I think if you flipped a coin, it

would land on its side," McCartney said.

Southeastern Conference runner-up Alabama (10-1) is ranked eighth; Big Eight Conference co-champion Colorado (8-2-1) is 15th. Kickoff for the second Blockbuster Bowl is set for 9 p.m. EST at Joe Robbie Stadium.

"This gives us a chance to posture ourselves for the future," McCartney said. "The team that wins this game will be highly ranked going into the '92 season and have a lot of attractive things at stake for them."

to bigger stakes than a Blockbuster win. The past two years, they ended the regular season ranked No. 1 and played Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl for the national championship, winning the title a year ago.

A 2-2 start this season quickly dashed any chances of a repeat.

"It's kind of disappointing," quarterback Darian Hagan admitted.

Alabama also was reeling in September after a 35-0 loss to eventual SEC champion Florida. The Crimson Tide regrouped to win nine in a row and now seeks more

recognition.

"We feel we're just as good as any team in the nation," linebacker John Sullins said. "We feel we don't get the credit we deserve."

The Tide also is motivated by its 34-7 loss to Louisville in the Fiesta Bowl last Jan. 1.

"We were plumb embarrassed, and I had to live with that all year long," fullback Kevin Turner said.

This bowl game will be different, running back Siran Stacy predicted.

"I think we'll go out and play our best game of the year," he said.

# JETS: New York's rushing attack ranked No. 5 in NFL

The Jets' rushing attack ranks No. 5 in the NFL and could be their biggest weapon against the Oilers. Johnny Hector gained 132 yards in a reserve role against the Dolphins, and the Jets as a team rushed 231 yards.





# Submarines, border disputes harass Canadian fishermen

PRINCE RUPERT, British Columbia — They sail out for 10 days at a stretch in seiners and trawlers with names like Nemesis, Leslie Ellen and Eliza Joye to catch the sole, perch, cod, halibut, salmon, yellowmouth and rougheye rockfish that abound in some of the world's richest fishing grounds.

They are men like Kelvin Mark, 31, who began his fisherman's life at age 7 and says "I wouldn't know how to do anything else," or Gordon Nicholls, 65, who retired as chief engineer on the Northern Dawn a few years back, but still goes out "because you just can't stop doing what you've been doing for 44 years."

Fluke weather, cold turbulent seas and fluctuating prices for their catch have always made life hard for the fishermen of this British Columbia town of 16,000, about 100 miles south of the Alaska panhandle.

Now there's something else they have to contend with: nuclear at-

tack submarines.

The subs have begun traveling through what the Canadians claim as their waters in the Dixon Entrance west of Prince Rupert to reach a new acoustic testing installation by the U.S. Navy on Back Island just north of Ketchikan, Alaska.

The fishermen do not worry that they will be attacked by Trident and Sea Wolves, armed with nuclear warheads, but that their nets will be snagged and that their small boats might suddenly be dragged under.

"I'm no Greenpeace," Nicholls said, referring to the environmental group that has mounted a campaign against nuclear submarines, "but those subs can be a damn bad danger."

Mark relates the story of another fisherman who swears that a sub got entangled in his nets. To cut them loose before his boat went down, he had to use a welding torch to sever steel cables thick as a wrist.

"Freeing himself," Mark said,

"meant the loss of \$25,000 to \$30,000 worth of gear."

Mark's Danish-born father, Vagn Mark, and six others disappeared on the 118-foot Scotia Cape sometime between Jan. 30 and Feb. 5, 1987, somewhere between the northern tip of Vancouver Island and the Queen Charlotte Islands.

"It could have been the weather," the young fisherman said. "Those were the worst days of the month. The boat could have been hit by a freighter, or kidnapped, or dragged under by a submarine caught in their nets. Whatever happened, happened fast. No time to send out a May Day."

Each week somewhere in the world, according to data compiled by Jim Fulton, the Member of Parliament from this region, a tow boat or fishing boat is snagged or sunk somewhere in the world by a sub.

As one illustration, near the mouth of the Fraser River south of here last August, a U.S. sub tangled in the nets of a Vancouver

fisherman, Mirko Tolja. Tolja's damages were estimated at \$5,000 in lost earnings and \$1,500 to replace the nets.

Particularly irksome to local fishermen is the decision of Prime Minister Brian Mulroney's government in Ottawa last October to grant transit rights through the disputed waterway to the Alaskan installation, which tests the ability of subs to function as noise levels are cut.

The fishermen gripe that the richest fishing grounds have been placed temporarily off limits to clear the way for the subs. The Department of Fisheries and Oceans says a ban, put into effect last Jan. 1, is to allow for the replenishment of fish.

Ottawa said it wants to cooperate with the United States as part of Canada's commitment to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, and contends there was little environmental or other risk because of the excellent safety record of the U.S. nuclear fleet.

Washington insisted it did not need anyone's permission to transit the Dixon Entrance because it does not recognize Canada's claim to the waters. The dispute is one of the oldest between the two countries.

Still, the fishermen see the submarine activity and accompanying rigorous enforcement by the U.S. Coast Guard of fishing rights in Alaska waters as part of what they say are Washington's bullying tactics. So far this year four Canadian fishing boats have been seized by the Coast Guard and brought to Ketchikan to pay fines.

Fishermen see a process of American intimidation under way that has their government caving in not only on the submarines but on the territorial claims.

A Canadian official who asked not to be identified said in Ottawa

that his government had "no intention" of bowing to the United States on the border issue. On the submarine passage, he said, "the objective is to enhance survivability of the nuclear deterrent, an objective that we don't challenge."

What makes the border dispute of importance to the fishermen is that the 240 square miles of Dixon Entrance waters are home to millions of pounds of fish.

Prince Rupert alderman Foster P. Husoy, a retired fisherman who is business agent of the Cooperative Fishermen's Guild, estimated that 3 to 5 million salmon swim through these waters annually along with at least 3 million pounds of halibut.

Peter J. Lester, mayor since 1968, described strong feelings in the town that Canada was being "Finlandized" — a reference to Finland's subservience to the Soviet Union after World War II.

A U.S. Embassy press officer, Stephen Seche, said that there is "no connection" between the transit of the subs and enforcement of fishing rights and that arguments about American intimidation of Canada "are completely without

merit."

The waters south of Alaska have been in dispute for years, even before Canada's nationhood, going back to the 1840's when President James K. Polk laid claim to the Oregon territory as far north as 54 degrees, 40 minutes north latitude, with a campaign cry that won him the 1844 election: "Fifty-four Forty or Fight."

In those days the United States had not yet bought Alaska from Russia and coveted all the British-controlled territory of British Columbia.

History has turned things around. Now it is Canada that recognizes the 54-40 border — a straight line drawn eastward from the southern tip of two Alaska islands, Dall Island and Prince of Wales Island, that was set by an international arbitration panel in 1903.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — "Bugsy," Warren Beatty's version of mobster Bugsy Siegel, garnered a leading eight nominations Friday for the Golden Globe Awards.

"The Fisher King" and "The Silence of the Lambs" each received five nominations.

"Beauty and the Beast," Disney's new animated film of the classic fairy tale, received four nominations, as did two controversial movies: "JFK," Oliver Stone's look at the John F. Kennedy assassination, and the female buddy movie "Thelma & Louise."

Winners for the 49th Golden Globes awards will be announced Jan. 18 in a program scheduled to appear on cable television's TBS network.

Barbra Streisand's "The Prince of Tides" was nominated for best dramatic film and Streisand received a nomination for her direction, but the Hollywood Foreign Press Association overlooked her performance in the film.

The Golden Globe nominations are the first of the major Hollywood awards, and usually provide a clue about the Academy Awards.

However, the foreign correspondents bestow split nominations for dramatic films and musicals or comedies. So instead of five nominees for best picture, like the Oscar-giving Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, the Golden Globes list 10.

The bulk of the Foreign Press Association nominations in television went to regular Emmy winners "Cheers" and "L.A. Law." Both received four.

NBC shows received the largest number of nominations with 20. CBS was second with 19, followed ABC's 10. Fox Broadcasting Co. and HBO had four apiece and Turner Network Television one.

## Religious rights cases shake precedents

NEW YORK (AP) — As the nation marks the 200th anniversary of the Bill of Rights, its guarantee of freedom of religion is in dispute on two fronts.

At stake are two U.S. Supreme Court precedents: a 1963 decision upholding the free-exercise guarantee, and a 1971 decision against establishing religion. Part of the 1963 decision has been set aside and the U.S. government is seeking to replace part of the latter ruling.

Oddly, the 1963 decision inhibited religious practice of a minority (use of peyote in wor-

ship of the Native American Church), while the latter case would tend to promote popular religion (school graduation prayers).

On the surface, the two cases seem at odds — appearing to swing in opposite directions. "Yet a common thread runs through both, which was to defer to interests of the majority," says attorney Oliver Thomas of the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs. And he notes that the safeguards were designed to protect minority religious groups.

"The specific irony is that on the bicentennial of the Bill of Rights, we are commemorating it by dismantling it," he said. "We are replacing the wall between church and state with a picket fence."

The Bill of Rights, the first 10 amendments to the Constitution, guarantees civil and human rights. It went into effect Dec. 15, 1791. Baptists have a particular affinity to the Bill of Rights, since they applied voting leverage as a persecuted minority in colonial Virginia that got the First Amendment added.

It reads: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, nor prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

The country's varied religious organizations take divergent positions in the two present key cases, particularly in the one now before the high court over graduation prayers at a Providence, R.I., public school.

However, a wide cross-section of most religious groups is behind proposed legislation before Congress to reinforce the free-exercise clause, recently considered clouded by a Supreme Court decision.

In that case, Oregon versus Smith, the court in 1990 upheld the denial of unemployment compensation to two Native American Church members who used peyote in a religion ceremony. Their church sees such use as a link to God.

The court said denial of unemployment compensation did not violate religious rights because peyote was against state law.

## Joyful peals of choir's handbells ring in season

HOUSTON (AP) — The joyful peals of handbells are striking a responsive chord in many churches in Texas and across the nation.

More and more congregations are adding handbell choirs to liturgical music repertoires as the bells establish themselves as easily learned and ear-pleasing instruments of worship. The bells are especially popular at special holiday services.

"It is a veritable explosion," said Christine Anderson of Houston, one of the few musicians in the nation who is a concert solo handbell ringer. "It is amazing how many more churches now have bells, how many more people are involved and how much more (handbell) music is being published."

There is no definitive count of how many churches have added handbell choirs in the past decade. But Houston-area church musicians provide ample anecdotal evidence that handbells are ringing up successes not thought possible a few ago.

Anderson, for example, spends four months a year touring and giving solo concerts, primarily in churches. She performs up to five concerts a weekend and is preparing to film her second concert video in January in Chicago. She is also much in demand nationwide for seminars to help churches begin or refine handbell choirs.

Universities and colleges, particularly those with sacred music studies, are adding handbell courses for students. "Now, to be a full-time, professional church musician, you have to know handbells," said Margaret Tucker, music director of First Congregational Church in the Memorial area and a nationally known composer of handbell music.

The composition and publication of handbell music has exploded. Tucker estimated that eight companies now publish the music, in contrast to 20 years ago when compositions were scarce and musicians lacked a uniform handbell notation system. Moreover, the music itself has become more sophisticated and intricate, as reflected in works by Tucker and Linda McKechnie of Houston.

Membership in professional groups such as the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers has increased, said McKechnie, immediate past president of the guild. Membership rolls of the guild have grown from about 6,500 in 1985 to 8,000.

Handbells were developed in England in the 17th and 18th centuries as learning instruments for ringers of church tower bells, said Brent Ivey, music ministry associate at Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church. The smaller bells helped the ringers to master patterns and techniques used in the various tower-bell peals.

Handbells' popularity in the United States has ebbed and flowed. While the bells have remained favorite instruments of musical worship, they have never seriously rivaled the popularity of vocal choirs or the predominance of the organ, piano and other instruments in sacred music.

That is changing for numerous reasons, ranging from beauty of tonal quality to quick mastery. "The thing I find most appealing about handbells is the innate attractiveness of the sound," said

Phyllis Harris, music minister for St. Pius V Roman Catholic Church in Pasadena.

"There is a joy to that sound. When the bells ring an 'alleluia' to me that's an 'alleluia,'" she said.

While several Protestant denominations — Presbyterians, Methodists, Lutherans — long have made handbells part of their repertoire, Catholic churches are just beginning to adopt them, Harris said. In the whole Diocese of Galveston-Houston, there are only three parish handbell choirs.

Anderson agrees that the bells have a beautiful tone, and adds that bell-ringing is lovely to watch when done by a well-practiced choir.

Handbells are very flexible, Tucker said. They can be used to accompany vocal choirs, organs or congregational singing. They also can be used in highly sophisticated, intricate compositions involving choirs and instruments.

Church musicians say the best feature of handbell choirs is that they can accommodate large numbers of volunteers with little or no musical experience or even talent. The bells can be played by children, the elderly, professional musicians and the disabled with equal proficiency. It takes only a few practice sessions for a choir to perform hymns and anthems.

The handbells are a welcome alternative for church members who cannot sing or lack training in other musical instruments.

The average church handbell choir consists of three octaves of bells — a total of 36 bells — requiring 12 ringers, said McKechnie. That basic set of bells can serve several choirs.

Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church has six handbell choirs including an auditioned choir, known as the Prime Chimers, that requires music-reading ability and a talent for ringing, Ivey said.

Professional-quality performances do require extensive training and a well-knit, disciplined group of players. "Handbell ringing is a small-group experience," McKechnie said. "They get together on a regular basis and get to know each other."

Group cohesion is essential to the performance. "Each person has his own bells, and if you lose your place or a member is absent, the bells are not rung," McKechnie said.

The loss of a member is equal to the absence of certain keys on a piano, she said.

Ringers must master several playing techniques if their choir is to grow in proficiency. "The number of techniques has increased, as well as our knowledge of how to use them," Ivey said. That has improved the quality of music, he said.

Area church musicians predict handbell choirs will get even more popular, with ringers improving in quality. Anderson said there could be a boom in handbell ensembles, usually four of five ringers.

# Volunteers staff church medical outreach

HOUSTON (AP) — Raju Shodavaram, a NASA physicist, credits God and the growing ministry of parish nursing for saving his life.

As in many other parish nursing programs, volunteer nurses at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Nassau Bay conduct monthly blood-pressure screenings after services for Sunday worshippers.

On Sept. 29, Shodavaram, 50, was advised by volunteer retired nurse Elrae Sweet to consult his physician. She was concerned about his high blood pressure reading.

"I thought I was in relatively good health," said Shodavaram, a father of four. "I didn't have any pains." But he followed up on the advice, especially since a brother died of a heart attack three years ago at age 50.

On Nov. 5 Shodavaram underwent triple bypass heart surgery, the day after tests by a cardiologist found 99 percent blockage in one heart artery and 90 percent in another.

He is now recuperating in his League City home, thankful that the screening averted a catastrophe.

Sweet regards the incident as a miracle. "God was working through me to help him," she said.

Shodavaram is not alone in praising the burgeoning parish nurse ministry. An estimated

6,000-plus congregations across the nation have parish nurse programs through which volunteer nurses provide programs ranging from health screenings to prenatal classes.

While churches have long cared for the sick, parish nurses provide free, on-premise medical resources for members.

Shodavaram's case is evidence of the efficacy of parish nursing, said Karen Christoffel, parish nurse manager for St. John Hospital in Nassau Bay.

In two years, Ms. Christoffel has established seven parish nursing programs, serving 20,000 people primarily in Clear Lake-area churches.

Nursing is a common enough profession that every church probably has at least one nurse, she said. "Even in rural areas, there will be a nurse somewhere. If you can find a nurse in a church, then you can have a parish nurse program."

The volunteer nurses can conduct health screenings, such as blood sugar and cholesterol checks, she said. They also can provide CPR training, organize blood drives and tailor health education programs to the specific needs of churches.

Some examples: ■ Parish nurses at St. Bernadette's Catholic Church arranged for St. John Hospital personnel to give a Red Cross program for baby sitters. The program teaches basic

emergency health care skills. The church also sponsored a class on living wills led by an attorney. Sixty-two parishioners turned out to hear about the wills, which give hospital personnel the authority to turn off life-support systems.

■ Nurses at St. Paul's Catholic Church provided training for volunteers who visit the elderly at home.

The nurses gave lessons in helping frail elderly get out of bed, helping them walk about, and other comforting acts. They have sponsored CPR training and a bereavement course for people dealing with grief, and prompted the addition of decaffeinated coffee and low-calorie syrup to monthly church pancake breakfasts to help lower blood pressure.

The idea of parish nurses evolved from the health concepts of the Rev. Granger Westberg, a Lutheran pastor who established a health care center in a Chicago suburb in the 1970s.

Westberg envisioned churches with medical clinics to deal with the physical as well as spiritual needs of members, especially the poor.

But clinics are costly, and Westberg modified his concept to parish nursing.

Historically some churches have provided health care and education for members and for the poor. Some still do, especially in-

ner-city and rural congregations. In the early church, priests and nuns often acted as community physicians and nurses. As medical technology advanced, religious orders and later denominations developed hospitals and clinics.

But today, experts say, such care is reactive and expensive, while parish nursing emphasizes preventive medicine in convenient church settings. As health care costs spiral skyward, parish nurses become important cords in the safety net for the poor and in the uninsured working class, Ms. Christoffel said.

The concept is relatively new in Houston churches. Those that have started programs have been overwhelmed by the needs of congregants.

"It is frustrating because there are a lot of things to do," said Lucy Gill, a parish nurse for St. Bernadette's. Since volunteer parish nurses usually work fulltime, they have little time and energy left for church programs, she said. In addition, congregations need comprehensive education in good mental and physical health.

## Black churches gain confidence

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — America's black churches, which once felt self-conscious because their beginnings in slavery and segregation, now are "self-confident and satisfied" with their distinctiveness,

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# American Airlines plans to layoff 1,250 groundworkers

FORT WORTH (NYT) — After nearly a decade of consistent and sometimes frenetic growth that propelled it to the top of the U.S. airline industry, American Airlines is preparing for a major round of layoffs.

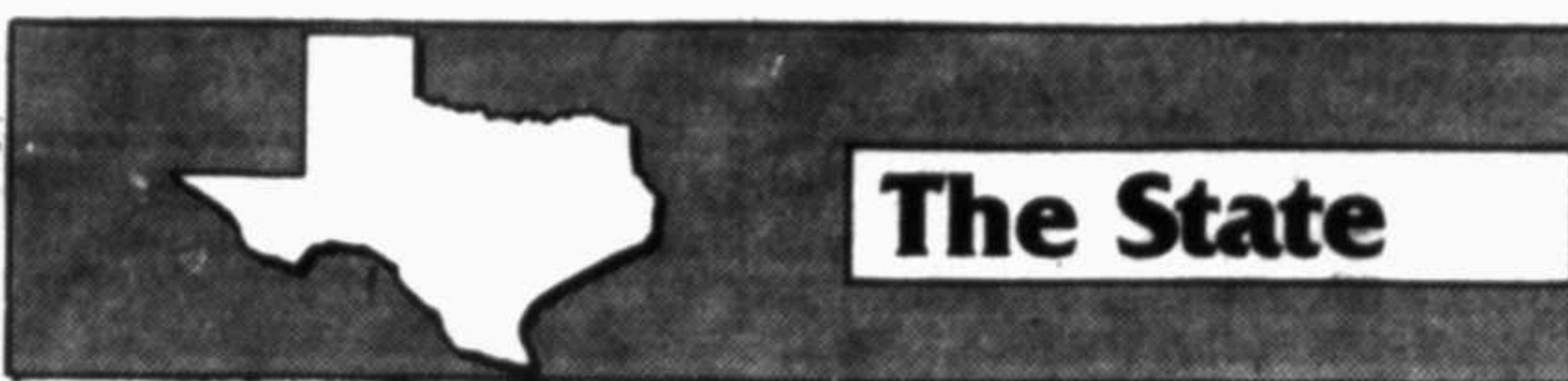
Citing rising industry costs, the Fort Worth-based air carrier said Friday it will lay off more than 1,250 groundworkers — most of whom have been at American only about one year or less — in February.

"We've got a big cost problem," American spokesman John Hotard said. "Costs are going up faster and higher than we can afford. So we've just got to find ways to work smarter and save on some of our

costs." American said it will give notice next week to the affected employees. A year-old federal law requires employers, in most cases, to give workers at least 60 days notice of layoffs.

Hotard estimated about three-fourths of the laid-off employees will be baggage handlers, airplane cleaners, and other airport ramp workers represented by the Transport Workers Union. Certified aircraft and engine mechanics, also represented by the union, will not be included in the layoffs.

The rest of those to be laid off will be airport ticket counter and gate agents, who are not members of unions.



Most of the layoffs will occur at American's six domestic hubs: Dallas/Fort Worth Airport; Chicago; Nashville, Tenn.; Raleigh/Durham, N.C.; Miami; and San Jose, Calif.

American said it has not yet determined the city-by-city distribution of the layoffs, and could not say with certainty how the decision will affect the airline's 27,000 employees in the Dallas-Fort

Worth area. The airline also said the number of layoffs could change.

"That 1,250 number is a moving number," Hotard said. "It could be impacted by the number of people in the affected job categories who opt for (unpaid) leaves of absence."

Hotard said American will reduce its levels of ground staffing at each of its gates at its domestic

hubs from seven workers to six, with a small pool of workers available to move from gate to gate to help handle flights with higher passenger or cargo loads.

"We are hopeful that we can do this, work smarter and more efficiently, so that we can save some on our costs without affecting the quality of our service product," Hotard said.

American had no choice but to lay off the employees, Hotard said. Through the first nine months of this year, American parent AMR Corp. reported a \$115 million net loss, compared to a \$175 million net profit in the same period in 1990.

But primarily because of a 200

percent increase in the price of jet fuel during Operation Desert Shield, AMR lost a record \$215 million in the fourth quarter last year and ended 1990 with a \$39.6 million net loss.

Securities analysts' estimates for the company's current quarter range from a small profit to a small loss.

The layoffs announced Friday were the airline's largest since the early 1980s when American — battered by its own high operating costs and low-cost competition from other carriers — cut its employment from a peak of 40,000 workers in 1979-80 to a low of 35,400 in 1981-82.

## El Paso Electric near failure

EL PASO (AP) — El Paso Electric Co. was forced to borrow \$208 million Friday to meet creditors' demands, and has one week to repay the money or face bankruptcy.

In addition, the utility said it would need additional financing to pay \$55 million in loans and leases due by Jan. 2. In all, the utility owes about \$900 million and its creditors could demand payment because of Friday's actions.

Through the first nine months of the year, El Paso Electric has lost \$26.7 million, after losing \$33.7 million last year.

The utility, which serves 248,000 customers in El Paso, West Texas and southern New Mexico, has been struggling to recover from a

\$1.5 billion investment in Palo Verde Nuclear Generating Station near Phoenix, Ariz.

Friday's action came after eight creditors demanded that the utility pay off a lease agreement reached when it sold its interest in the nuclear plant's No. 2 unit.

To meet the demand, the utility drew on letters of credit with several banks and an institutional investor. El Paso Electric has until Dec. 31 to repay \$26.7 million to the institution and until Jan. 3 to repay the banks \$181.7 million.

The utility did not name the creditors nor the banks who had covered Friday's transaction.

In addition, El Paso Electric said Friday's action could lead other creditors to demand payment.

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## Ruby Red crop hits the stores

FORT WORTH (AP) — Grocers say the Ruby Red grapefruit, back now in limited numbers after a 1989 freeze hampered production, is a popular item even with its increased price.

The Dallas Farm Market recently sold out of 40,000 pounds in two days, even though Texas Ruby Reds are selling for 89 to 99 cents a pound, up from former low prices of 49 to 59 cents per pound before the Christmas 1989 freeze.

"The outside is not as pretty as they have always been, but they are cutting very nice," said Fort Worth produce manager Boyd Phipps.

Phipps said he bought enough grapefruit to keep the Roy Pope Grocery in Fort Worth stocked another three weeks.

Last year, Rio Grande Valley grapefruit growers had no harvest as farmers planted new trees and tried to repair damage from the 1989 freeze, said Jack Carithers, vice president of the Texas Citrus Exchange.

"This is a much better, redder piece of fruit than you can get from Florida, and it eats a lot sweeter," Carithers said.

Carithers said the exchange's 300 orchards expect to ship between 100,000 and 150,000 40-pound crates to markets this season, down from a 1983 peak of 18 million crates.

Carithers said Texas growers were producing between 8 million and 10 million crates per season before the freeze. He estimated growers would need until 1994 or 1995 to fully recover.

"Texas at one time was considered the Cadillac of grapefruit, the world over. It was exported to Europe in gift boxes, shipped by the boatloads," said Dallas produce broker Richard Worzer.

Carithers said a normal harvest season runs from October through early March, but this year's harvesting season started Dec. 1 and will end in another week.

## Time Warner buys Six Flags

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Officials at Six Flags Over Texas are welcoming the amusement park's acquisition by a group headed by Time Warner Inc., saying the purchase will provide stability and help the park retire a large debt.

"This is great news," said Bob Bennett, president and general manager of Six Flags Over Texas. "It's a terrific marriage, a perfect fit."

Six Flags has been struggling to stay out of bankruptcy for several months. The company lost \$25.4 million last year on revenues of \$431.3 million, and lost another \$18.1 million on revenues of \$179.6 million in the first six months of 1991.

The transaction was announced Thursday, and includes a \$150 million infusion from Time Warner Inc., the Blackstone Group and Wertheim Shroder, allowing Six Flags Corp. to retire almost all of its high-interest indebtedness, officials said.

Bennett said Six Flags personnel are working with Warner Bros. on developing attractions for the park for its 1992 season.
