AIR RACERS REACH FORT WORTH

FOUR MEN HELD FOR MURDER OF BOY

NEW YORK LAD IS KIDNAPED THEN CHOKED

ABDUCTED TO FORCE SISTER'S AFFECTIONS, POLICE DECLARE

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Four men were under arrest today in investigation of the kidnapping and strangling of a six-year-old boy at Coney Island.

The body of Salvatore Santomaro was found in the rear of his brother-in-law's house wrapped in a burlap bag and covered with stones.

Four men were charged with homicide, including Luigi Panora, husband of the boy's sister, Nancy 15. Panora, police said, admitted kidnapping the boy in an effort to force his estranged wife to return to him, but blamed the other three men, Jerry Ferne, John Martono and Pasquale Borella, for the killing. The three denied the story.

Police said Panora's entire family and his eight-year-old brother, Thomas, to his home, intending to hold them hostage for his wife's affections. Thomas was allowed to return home but Panora was placed under the care of Panora's three friends. Panora said the three murdered the boy and then gave him the body to dispose of.

TWO EXECUTED FOR ASSAULTS

DIE CALMLY, DENYING THEIR GUILTINESS TO THE LAST

(By Associated Press)

HUNTSVILLE, Sept. 7.—Convicted of having attacked a San Antonio high school girl, Clemente Rodriguez and Enrique Servin calmly walked to the electric chair here early today in execution of their crime.

Rodriguez, first to be electrocuted, was the calmer of the two. Smoking a cigar, he bade goodbye to other convicts along "Death Row" just before he was seated in the chair by his guard on the small railing which separated the spectators from the chair and said: "I am sacrificing my life and trusting in God."

He kissed a crucifix held by Father M. P. Moriarty of San Antonio, at 12:25 a. m. He was pronounced dead, seven minutes after he had been strapped in the chair. Servin also made other prisoners farewell, and just before he was strapped in the chair said: "I am dying innocent. I am sacrificing my life and am trusting to God for mercy."

The prison physician pronounced him dead at 12:30 a. m. Rodriguez is to be buried in the prison cemetery, while efforts are being made to locate relatives of Servin.

The men pleaded guilty to criminal assault in July, 1927, after three attacks on San Antonio high school girls and were sentenced to death. A third suspect, Enrique Mendonza, pleaded guilty to robbery and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Movie Strike Ends With Mutual Peace

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—Peace reigns and the music in Chicago movie theaters still lives.

A 24-hour conference between officials of the theater owners and the Musicians' Federation ended today in "victory for both sides" and assured the public a threatened strike of all union theater employees would not take place.

The theater owners met the demands of the musicians by agreeing to employ an orchestra of four men in theaters which had installed the "talking movies" and the musicians met the demands of the owners by agreeing to a working schedule for a season ranging from 10 to 44 weeks instead of a full time 44 week schedule.

Blazing Tar Claims Three

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—Three workmen were believed to have perished under blazing hot tar spread over a portion of San Francisco bay last night by an explosion. Three others were injured, and the woodwork of a \$2,000,000 pier under construction was badly damaged.

The explosion occurred while a crew of about 20 men was applying the tar to the pier. A blow torch ignited a cauldron of tar and the ensuing blast threw the mixture in every direction. Four men on a barge were forced to dive into the bay. Only one of these had been accounted for.

LOCATE OFFICE OF ANTI-SMITH GROUP IN CITY

TEN SUCH OFFICES TO BE OPENED IN STATE EARLY NEXT WEEK

DALLAS, Sept. 7.—B. D. Martin, campaign manager for the Anti-Smuth League of Texas, announced today that regional headquarters would be opened in ten Texas cities next week. The personnel of each office will consist of a manager and stenographer.

Regional headquarters will be located at El Paso, Lubbock, Waco, Austin, Lufkin, Corpus Christi, Sulphur Springs, Beaumont, Orange and Laredo.

Adams Hearing Set For Next Wednesday

DALLAS, Sept. 7.—Preliminary hearing for Ray Adams, Bartlett farmer, under indictment for murder in the death of Orville Mathews, bank clerk, who was shot to death on Dallas' busiest corner last Saturday, will be held before Judge C. A. Pippen next Wednesday.

Judge Pippen set the date for the hearing after attorneys for Adams had filed application for a writ of habeas corpus, in which they alleged their client was being illegally restrained of his liberty in being denied bond.

Adams has been in jail since the morning of the shooting.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7.—National ramifications of a Philadelphia rum ring were revealed by District Attorney Monaghan today.

GERMAN LAYS DISARMAMENT UP TO LEAGUE

SAYS SESSION FAILURE IF PROBLEM IS NOT FINALLY SOLVED

(By Associated Press)

GENEVA, Sept. 7.—The League of Nations will be a failure itself if it fails to solve the problem of disarmament, said Hermann Mueller, Chancellor of Germany, in an address before the assembly today.

Herr Mueller prefaced this with a statement that Germany could not indefinitely continue disarmed while other nations have the right to build up powerful military and naval machines.

The Chancellor won applause when he said that never in the history of world have conditions been more favorable to peace. The applause increased when he assured the assembly that his government would adhere to the foreign policy of friendliness laid down by Gustav Stresemann, secretary of foreign affairs, and expressed faith in principle of the Kellogg-Brand pact.

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Sept. 7.—The report that John Coolidge is to take a position with the New York Haven and Hartford Railroad is "true as far as it goes," John said today, although he declined to confirm it outright.

Anything further would be embarrassing to the railroad, he added.

Morrow Leaves For 'Loaf' On Hacienda

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 7.—Dwight W. Morrow, United States Ambassador, left the capital today for a two days' "loaf" on the ranch of Hal Mangum near the Texas border in the State of Coahuila. He was accompanied by General Manuel Perez Trevino, governor of the state, who has been put forward as one of the chief candidates for presidential election. The British minister, Edmund Grey, was also in the party.

BIG INCREASE FORECAST FOR RURAL PUPILS

(By Associated Press)

With attendance near the 3,000 mark, the twenty-four rural schools of Lubbock county which opened yesterday are in the best condition they have ever been.

W. M. Pevehouse, county superintendent, said this morning.

"From the standpoint of teachers, qualifications, interest, scholarship, equipment and buildings the schools of this county were never in better shape," he said.

Although the total enrollment had not been compiled today, Mr. Pevehouse predicted that it would reach the 3,000 mark. Total enrollment last year was 2,180, but an increase this year is a safe prediction, Mr. Pevehouse said.

He inspected five of the schools yesterday and resumed his inspection tour this morning.

The opening was attended by the trustees and many of the patrons. Three new teachers are in the Caldwell school this year.

Ask Resignation Of Mexican Legislator

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 7.—(P)—Resignation of Ricardo Topete as president of the Mexican chamber of deputies and leader of the majority bloc in that body has been requested by his followers. This maneuver, which became known today, is construed as increasing the possibility that Emilio Portes Gil, secretary of the interior, will be chosen as provisional president of the republic.

Topete's bloc, formerly called the Oregon bloc, is said to have swung to the candidacy of Portes Gil. He has personally been favoring General Manuel Peres Trevino, governor of Coahuila for the succession to President Calles.

It is said that Topete refused to change his attitude and the majority bloc thereupon repudiated his leadership.

\$10,000 In Hat Suspected Bribe

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Ten thousand dollars in bills which authorities described as the first installment of a \$35,000 extortion fee was found in the straw hat of an internal revenue agent, and today he and a fellow agent were under arrest.

The agents were Edward F. Brown and Elmer F. Andrews, who were accused by Reginald W. Ragland, counsel for an unnamed Wall street concern, to have agreed to approve the firm's claim for a \$250,000 tax reduction if they were paid \$35,000.

TRUETT URGES PROBE IN STATE BAPTIST FUNDS

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Sept. 7.—Dr. George W. Truett, of Dallas, at a meeting of the executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas here today recommended that the affairs of every home mission board in the state having money should be investigated to the fullest extent.

Dr. Truett returned yesterday from Atlanta, where he and former Governor Pat M. Neff sat upon the board which uncovered a shortage of \$150,000 in the accounts of Clinton S. Carnes, former treasurer of the Baptist Home Mission board.

"If any person connected with a church organization does not beg for an investigation of his affairs after the scandal in Atlanta, he should be discharged in fifteen seconds," declared Dr. Truett.

His statement was greeted by shouts from 200 Baptist leaders attending the convention.

While 50 per cent of the money collected in Texas goes to Atlanta for disbursement, the remainder stays in Dallas and is disbursed from here, it was explained.

Thought Dead Thirty Years, Man Appears

NEW ORLEANS TRADING

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 7 (P)—Too much rain in the eastern belt and a bullish weekly review of Texas crop conditions caused the cotton market to advance slightly here. First trades showed losses of five points, but a rally soon set in which carried October to 18.44 and December to 18.51, 7 to 8 points above the opening and 2 to 3 points above yesterday's close.

Two additional crop estimates were issued, one making the crop

14,295,000 bales and the other 15,000,000.
Prices gradually improved on shorts covering and trade buying due to continued wet weather in the eastern belt and fears of damage from flooded streams in that section. October advanced to 18.50 and December to 18.57, 13 to 14 points above the earlier lows and 8 to 9 points above the previous close.

At mid-session the market was steady and at or near the high.

NEW YORK TRADING
NEW YORK, Sept. 7 (P)—The cotton market opened steady at unchanged prices to a decline of 5 points under selling promoted by relatively easy cables from Liverpool and prospects for more favorable weather in the South.

Hedging was reported, as well as commission house liquidation, but offerings were light, and the market soon steadied on renewed covering. December sold up from 18.91 to 18.98 or back to about yesterday's closing quotations, and the general market was about net unchanged to 3 points higher at the end of the first hour.

Two more private crop reports were issued, one placing the condition at 61.3 and the indicated yield at 15,000,000 bales. The other made the condition 58.5 and the indicated yield 14,395,000 bales.

Private cables said trade calling and covering had been supplied by hedging and Bombay selling in Liverpool, but that there was a better feeling in the cotton cloth business at Manchester with home trade improving.

The market was steadier after early offerings had been absorbed, with prices working up a few points on covering attributed to continued unfavorable crop advices from the South, and uncertainty as to the showing of tomorrow's government report. At midday, October was selling around 18.15 and March 18.92, or 3 to 5 points net higher.

Stocks And Money

WALL STREET STOCKS

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 (P)—The unexpectedly small increase of \$54,000,000 in brokers' loans, brought a flood of buying orders into the stock market overnight, and the opening was unusually strong. Purify Baking advanced 3 points to a new peak at 117 and initial gains of 2 points each were recorded by General Motors, Curtiss, Wright and Montgomery Ward. U. S. Steel common, Chrysler, Westinghouse Electric, Houston and Lambert each advanced a point or more.

A sensational advance of nearly 20 points in Montgomery Ward, which touched a new high record at 243, featured the opening. So great was the volume of trading that the ticker quickly fell behind the market.

Further accumulation of the Steel shares lifted U. S. Republic and Central Alloy to new high records. U. S. Steel common also attained a new 1928 high at 197.

One block of 10,000 shares of Briggs Manufacturing changed hands at 47 3/4 followed by an advance to 47 3/4, up 1 1/2 and a new high record. Purify Baking preferred, Brunswick, Halsa Collieries and Motor Wheel also moved into new high ground.

American Linseed quickly ran up more than 4 points and Missouri Pacific common, Gold Dust, Vanadium Steel and Commercial Solvents climbed 2 points or more.

Foreign exchanges opened steady, although sterling cables eased slightly to \$4.85 1/2, a new low level for the year.

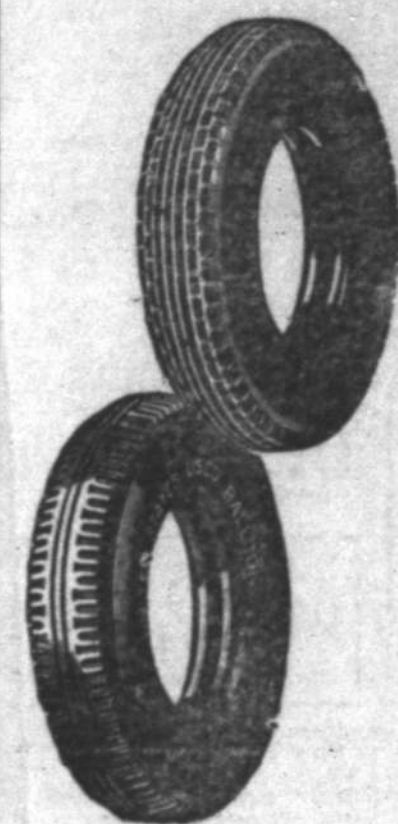

SOUTHWESTERN COACHES MEET TO DISCUSS GRID RULES TODAY

STRIBLING STARTS LONG TRAIL TO HEAVYWEIGHT THRONE

VARIOUS DOOPS IN STATE HAVE COACHES THERE

KNOTTY QUESTIONS ON RULES PUZZLING TO FOOTBALL MEN

(By Associated Press)
PORT WORTH, Sept. 7.—More than 200 southwestern football coaches and officials gathered here today to discuss the 1928 football rules. Many college and high school coaches will begin training Monday.

The greater part of the discussion centered on the difference between an incomplete lateral pass and a fumble; when a ball is dead at the point of recovery and when it can be picked up and advanced by one or both teams; position of the opposing teams on the kick-off; and definite understanding of the limitations placed on shift plays.

With the exception of the University of Arkansas all members of the Southwest conference were represented as were all Texas conference and T. I. A. A. universities and colleges. The Razorbacks' absence was explained by the fact that Arkansas state is holding its own rules meeting at Little Rock and Coach Francis Schmidt is attending it.

Roy Henderson, athletic director of the Texas Intercollegiate league, is here representing all high schools.

This fall the Southwest will place no special interpretations on its rules, it was decided. The national rules interpretations will be accepted. Practically all the morning session was devoted to questions put by coaches and officials and answered by Bible.

Many high school coaches were noted among those present. Among them were Paul Tyson, mentor of the 1927 state champions, Waco High Tigers; Harold Lee of Temple; all the Fort Worth high schools; Jimmy Klitz, one time Southern Methodist star; of Athens; Johnny Pierce of Corsicana; H. S. Parker, of Cleburne; J. E. Willis, of Marshall; C. G. Henderson of Highland Park; Dallas; M. E. Bachtel of Palestine.

Several prominent players of the Southwest, among them Jake Williams, T. C. U. captain; Ralph Dorsey, star halfback of Texas A. and M.; Chaskey DeWitt, Texas Tech. captain, were present. J. W. Ward, one time Central High and Texas University high star, represented Austin College; Randolph College of Chico sent its new mentor, H. R. Garrett.

EIGHT YEARS OF REPUBLICANISM GIVEN ATTACK

ROBINSON OPENS THREE
DAY SPEAKING DRIVE
IN TENNESSEE

(By Associated Press)
NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 7 (AP).—The eight year record of republican-ism at Washington came in for at- tack by Senator Robinson in open- ing a three day speaking drive through Tennessee—the one south- ern state so far selected by Herbert Hoover for a campaign address.

Using direct phraseology as was employed at Dallas and Cisco, Tex- as, the democratic vice presidential nominee said he did not claim "sole credit" for all that was done by his party during the Wilson adminis- tration, but that it had conducted the government "far better, more honestly and more efficiently" than the republicans had under Harding and Coolidge.

After a journey to the hermitage, home of Andrew Jackson and one of the shrines of democracy, Mr. Robinson here declared last night that Governor Smith, the party's 1928 presidential nominee, by his "utterances and official acts" was entitled to mention among the great leaders of the party once headed by Jackson.

The senator said that, while mak- ing "no attack on the personal character" of either Harding or Coolidge, he doubted if an "unpre- judiced and reliable survey of the last eight years will fail to arouse enthusiasm in any patriotic bosom because the method in which the details of the government's busi- ness has been transacted."

TWO CROPS IN SEASON OBJECT OF EXPERIMENT

RESEARCH EXPERT GET
LILACS BLOOM AHEAD
OF USUAL TIME

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Having gassed lilacs into blooming before their time, Dr. F. E. Denny, re- search director of the Boyce Thompson Institute at Yonkers, be- lieves it possible to produce two crops a season.

Dr. Denny told members of the Society of Chemical Industry that chemical treatment of certain plants during the annual dormancy or "rest period" had almost the effect of an alarm clock upon a sleeping person. The plants, he said, were thus awakened almost immediately to vigorous growth dur- ing the several months nature had set aside as time for their relaxa- tion.

By placing lilacs in a room filled with chemical vapors for 24 to 48 hours he caused them to bloom be- fore Christmas, he said, something they had never done before in this part of the country. He expects this season to produce a second crop of Irish potatoes from the seed pota- toes of the first crop.

Dr. Denny asserted that if these methods proved worthy of general adoption it would mean material gain for the farmer through two crops in a season, would enable the horticulturist to meet the Christ- mas demand for certain flowers not now obtainable at that season, and provide more liberal supplies of food and flowers for the public.

Potatoes, he said could be treat- ed for 5 to 10 cents a bushel and plants for one to five cents a plant.

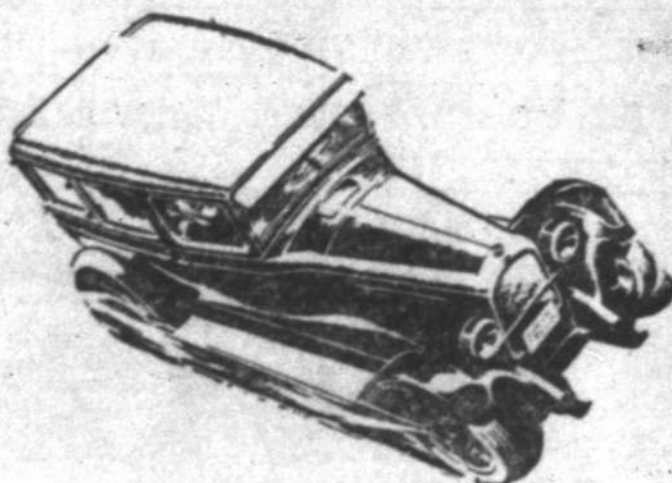

SMITH TO MAKE STRONG FINISH FOR CAMPAIGN

SEVEN WEEKS PRIOR TO ELECTION DAY WILL SEE HASTY TOUR

By D. HAROLD OLIVER
(Associated Press Staff Writer)
ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 7 (AP).—A firm believer in a strong finish, Governor Smith will devote the seven weeks preceding election day to an extensive campaign for the presidency.

Although he will not leave Albany until a week from Sunday to open his drive in the center of the corn belt at Omaha, September 18, the democratic presidential nominee is expected to make up for the relatively late start by a series of speeches that will keep him on the jump right up to week before election.

Twenty—possibly thirty or more, are estimated as the number of ad-

resses he will make before November 6. The smaller figure is based on the fact that three speeches will be delivered during the first week of his trip and on the theory that this average at least will be adhered to for the six weeks following. But if the nominee runs true to form, there are some who believe he will speed things up a bit later on in the campaign and probably make a speech a day, thereby running the total close to a score and a half.

From Omaha, home of "Jim" Dahlman who, as a democrat, has been elected mayor of that Nebraska city more times than the democratic presidential candidate has been chosen governor of New York, the campaign schedule carries south into Oklahoma City for a speech September 20, and then on to Denver for a third address two days later.

Can Carry States, Belief Democratic leaders are of the opinion that all three states to be visited can be placed in Governor Smith's column, despite the fact that Coolidge won out in Nebraska and Colorado four years ago. Twenty-four electoral votes will be the prize in the trio of states and in only one, Nebraska, is a senator up for re-election.

Belief of party chieftains that the New York executive has a good chance to gain Nebraska's eight, Oklahoma's ten, and Colorado's six

votes in the electoral college also is being made in the face of a convention delegate lineup which showed only one, Colorado, as solidly behind Governor Smith for the nomination. This state gave him all of her twelve convention votes, but Nebraska's 16 stood up until the last for its favorite, son candidate, Gilbert M. Hitchcock, Omaha publisher and former United States senator, while Oklahoma's twenty developed a split which carried on through the balloting.

Distribute Hoover Buttons In Texas DALLAS, Sept. 7 (AP).—More than 150,000 Hoover buttons and 100,000 windmill stickers have been distributed in Texas and demand is such that 250,000 more have been ordered for immediate delivery. It was announced at the office of the Associated Hoover Clubs of Texas here, work of raising funds for the campaign to carry the state for Hoover and Curtis has been started, Leonard Withington, executive secretary, said. Every county will be given opportunity to participate in this drive for funds.

When collected, the money will be used for a two-fold purpose, Withington said: In the constructive drive to bring the availability of the two nominees before the greatest number of Texans; to educate those who want to vote for Hoover and Curtis, but also want to vote the democratic ticket otherwise, as to how they may mark their ballots so as to avoid the danger of having them thrown out.

Spray Rails With Oil To Fight Sand RAYMONDVILLE, Texas, Sept. 7 (AP).—A stretch of Missouri Pacific railroad track between Yturria and Rivera about 65 miles in length, is being sprayed with specially prepared oil to keep down the sand. The oil is put on by a machine run over the track. The first application did so much good that the officials are now applying the oil for the second time, and believe that a solution for this annoying problem has been found.

This stretch of railroad runs through a section of shifting sand dunes and is especially annoying in excessively dry years. The sand is very fine and the dunes, formed of glistening white sand and covered with wavy ripples, afford a pleasing spectacle to the traveler, but have long been a serious problem to the railroads. For a number of years after the road was first built it was difficult to keep the sand off the track, and men with shovels were employed in the work.

DE LRIO, Sept. 7 (AP).—John Crosby, Jr., who had been held incommunicado in the jail at Piedras Negras, Mexico, since Monday, when he surrendered himself as "living bond" for Forrest Whitehead, who was alleged to have inflicted injuries upon John Kastner, of New Braunfels which resulted in the latter's death, was released today under 1,000 pesos bond, approximately \$500 in American money.

Crosby was given preliminary hearing and charges with aiding a criminal to escape from Mexico. It was at first believed he would be forced to stand trial for murder, although he was in no way connected with the affray which caused Kastner's death.

HOOVER PLANS TO MAKE FOUR TALKS IN EAST

DECIDES TO SPEAK WELL AND INFREQUENTLY IN HIS CAMPAIGN

BY JAMES L. WEST
(Associated Press Staff Writer)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Business and economic conditions, the tariff, water power, industrial problems and labor will be the central themes of the four speeches that Herbert Hoover will deliver in his campaigning in the East and South. Prohibition, generally regarded as the outstanding issue of the presidential contest, may be treated in one of the addresses which the republican candidate will deliver in his final drive as he swings back across the continent to his California home.

Meanwhile, a series of statements, dealing with this subject will be issued through republican national headquarters here. The first of these will be made public this week under present plans. Hoover's decision to limit to four the number of his speeches on the Atlantic seaboard has puzzled his party leaders and the public alike, but to those who know the man and his methods the explanation is comparatively simple. It is not that he is adverse to

public speaking and facing crowds; the answer is found in the time he devotes to the preparation of each address and his abiding conviction that it is better to speak infrequently and well than it is to speak frequently and not so well.

Since starting out in quest of his elective office, the republican candidate has developed a literary style peculiarly his own and in some respects as unique as some of the ideas he has brought to the conduct of the campaign. Ideas that have shocked some of the old timers in the game of politics.

His vehicles of expression rather delight his advisors and when they are called upon to review the results of his efforts they are careful to leave intact the somewhat peculiar but nevertheless forceful phrases he evolves as he works in the quiet night hours in his study.

Perhaps few candidates for the presidency within the last generation have devoted more time and pains to the preparation of addresses than Hoover. He writes and rewrites, edits and recedes un-

til each sentence and each phrase is entirely to his liking.

Perhaps the nurse who swam the English Channel the other day was only trying to be a wet nurse.
