BAPTIST REVIVAL CLOSED LAST SUNDAY

Rev. Kelley is at Segovia this week in a meeting with Rev. Bierschwale, which began last Friday, and will continue this week. He will be here for the regular services at the Baptist Church Sunday morning. The Baptist pastor from Menard will be here to preach in the evening.

FEDERAL ENFORCEMENT MEN VISIT KERRVILLE

As the result of evidence secured by a secret service man in the employ of Federal prohibition officers, numerous arrests were made in and around the city last week. Report is that the officers were operating out of San Antonio on orders issued from the head office in Washington.

Monday night seven arrests were made and Tuesday morning the officers left for San Antonio with three white men, two white women and two negro men in custody, together with a quantity of contraband liquor.

Wednesday afternoon the officers paid a return visit to this city for the purpose of making other arrests on evidence secured by a spotter, but as the Sun went to press it was impossible to learn the number of arrests made. Neither was the Sun able to verify the names of the parties arrested in Monday's raid, as the Federal officers operated independent of the county enforcement officials.—Mountain Sun.

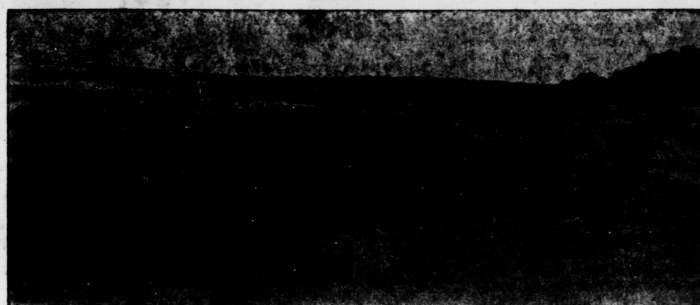
SPENCER, LAST OF FUREY GANG, GOES TO PRISON

W. B. Spencer, last of the Joe Furey confidence gang which swindled J. Frank Norfleet out of his fortune several years ago in a Fort Worth hotel, was taken to the penitentiary last Sunday afternoon by State Penitentiary Agent Bud Russell.

Spencer is under sentence of eight years for his complicity in the Norfleet swindle. He was returned to Ft. Worth recently from Kansas City, Kan. After his release from Leavenworth penitentiary on completing a term for violating the narcotic laws, Spencer was rearrested for Texas authorities, but released on habeas corpus writ by a federal judge. Later, he was turned over to local authorities, but has been appealed to the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals.

Nineteen other convicts were in the party leaving Ft. Worth for the penitentiary.

Like all other insect and animal life, there is an optimum or ideal condition whereby that particular form of life will develop to its best. In the case of the sticktight flea and other fleas in this section, the temperature and humidity this year seems to be close to the ideal. For the last month or so conditions have prevailed in the lower country whereby the flea has been developing to its best and is now gaining a foothold in the higher ground covering the territory in and around Sonora, El Dorado, Ocala and surrounding sections. It has been very conservatively estimated that this year has suffered a loss among poultry amounting to at least 20 per cent due to the severe attacks of the sticktight flea.

FLEA PEST MAY CAUSE 20 PER CENT LOSS IN POULTRY IN THIS SECTION

The sticktight flea is named for its sticky tight while attached to the host. The flea, though very minute, is undoubtedly one of if not the worst flea pests we have in this section of the State.

Fleas form a group of the insect kingdom all to themselves by having their bodies flattened on the sides. This enables them with other characteristics to easily glide here and there quickly among the feathers or hair of whatever host is being attacked.

Fleas have sucking mouthparts, hence feeding by sucking. Most fleas do not remain attached to their host after feeding, however, the sticktight flea is an exception, they remaining attached apparently until death.

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In studying the habits of this pest one is more able to cope with the situation by taking advantage of the insect's weakest point. In the chicken or sticktight flea we find that the eggs are dropped wherever the host happens to be the eggs falling at random. It is a suitable situation in nature, otherwise it will very likely perish. Temperature is an important factor, as it requires from 4 to 14 days for a flea egg to incubate. After hatching into the maggot stage we find that they will develop in from 14 to 21 days, after which time the larvae enters a resting or inactive stage

while transforming to an adult flea for a period of 5 to 8 days.

To sum up, from the time the flea eggs are laid until the adult flea dies, we have a developmental period of 30 to 45 days at least. Further study has also developed the fact that in the case of the sticktight flea, the flea maggots must feed at least to some extent upon the pre-digested blood or in other words the blood that the flea sucks from the chicken, dog or cat, etc., is digested and what is not utilized by the adult flea, is passed off as waste material. It is this once digested blood that the flea maggot must have, apparently, before it is capable of spinning a silken cocoon in which to pass the dormant stages and later emerge as an adult flea. After the mature fleas become attached to the host they remain there from 14 to 19 days before falling off.

Although the flea is difficult to crush or mash, yet they really have tender bodies. By taking advantage of these weak points they may be controlled by the following methods:

1. Cleanliness. Clean up and burn all straw material in poultry house. Especially is this true with setting hens as here there may soon be an excellent breeding ground for maggot development.
2. Treat the nests and roosts with Antihroline oil carbolicum mixed with kerosene 1-2 and 1-2 as recommended for bluebirds.
3. Compel all poultry to roost in the poultry house.
4. Cover the entire floor of the poultry house with salt (rock salt). See that the ground is white with salt.
5. Wet down and keep wet from 10 to 12 days. Do not wash away the salt while wetting down.

Keep chickens, dogs, cats, etc. from roosting and sleeping under the house or porch. In case of a barn infestation use your own judgment according to circumstances.

As the flea can not stand an excessive amount of moisture the salt method will kill all flea eggs, maggots and pupae.

The adult flea on the host will all be dead from 10 to 15 days or less.

The fatal killing point for sticktight fleas seems to be a minimum temperature of 50 degrees F. and a maximum temperature of 100 degrees F.

hence it is that fleas are usually found in protected places and in chicken houses, beneath houses, etc.

CAR STOLEN SUNDAY NIGHT AT BRADY

A daring theft was reported to local officers Sunday night by Jas. Hobbs, whose car was stolen while he was attending services at the local Baptist church. The car was a new Ford touring and had been in use only about three weeks. Theft insurance was carried by Mr. Hobbs. So far, no trace of the stolen car has been found.

That the thief or thieves had first picked another car was evident from the fact that the car belonging to F. S. Erickson had been backed out of its place and left parked across the street when it was discovered to have a flat tire. —Brady Standard.

COMMON SENSE WITH GOATS

Goat raising at haphazard never gets good results. One reason herds do not increase faster in the Northwest is the lack of care, unscientific breeding, poor salting and no dipping or medication. Stomach worms, hoof-rot, and wild animals take their toll. In the neglected flocks lice reduce clip and put the goats off their feed. Good flock headers raise the quality and weight of mohair, but grade bucks, coarse-haired and kempy, regardless of size, tend to lower values.

Oregon hair is getting coarser instead of finer. Yet Oregon has a number of pure-bred herds that would supply the very best type of bucks if growers made up their minds to have only the best.

Pasture in Oregon never is a problem; rains are abundant, yet there are not as many Angora goats in Oregon as five years ago. Why? Neglect! Use of any old buck, trading bucks and letting the herd care for itself.

Worst setback mohair has had in the Northwest is that old and oft-repeated saying: "Turn 'em loose—they'll take care of themselves." They will not.

Nature opposes itself against a neglected flock—and wins.

Watch drinking water, even springs, for liver-fluke. If goats show signs of cough, eyes drooping, from worms, change pasture or drench with a tablespoonful of gasoline in a half-pint of milk, bottle at side of mouth. On good pasture the liver may function correctly without drenching. But a congested liver soon drops the goat. Losses in winter, 1923-24, were heavy in Willamette valley counties, owing to lung worm and liver leach. Stomach worms are expelled at once by the gasoline treatment (half strength or less for kids.)

Do not keep bred does in pens. They need exercise, but do not run them with herd dogs nor too fast and far for forage.

Salt is best at corral or bed ground—the brown rock salt carrying iodides—pure clear water and good shelter. These mean all the difference between scrawny and robust does, spindling and husky kids, stringy and yolkly mohair. The difference between profit and loss in the mohair game.—Angora Goat Journal.

AS TO OUR PRIMARY SYSTEM

T. W. Davidson, in announcing that he will not be a candidate for governor in 1926, refers to the Texas Primary Election Law as a failure. We don't see it that way. We think more of the primary election law than we ever did before. There are some inconsistencies in it that should be corrected to be sure but the fact that a few dates conflict does not argue against the theory of the law. If we are to nominate by legalized primary, the present law is as good as can be devised.

There were eight candidates for governor in 1924 and several of those candidates have referred to the primary system as a failure. Would they have a law that would nominate the entire eight? It would seem so.

Wise commentators on our election forget that in an election there is a dual object in view, viz: to fill an office and to settle an issue. The majority of all the people voted in all elections of 1924 with the KuKlux issue uppermost in mind. The election law of Texas afforded an opportunity for expression upon that question. It was not the first time in history that the personality of candidates has been overlooked to take care of an issue.—Lockhart Post-Register.

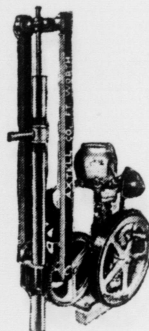

Tennessee has passed a law which makes it unlawful "to teach any theory that denies the story of the divine creation of man as taught by the Bible, and to teach instead that man has descended from a lower order of animals." When the governor signed the bill he wrote: "It will put our teachers in jeopardy. Probably the law will never be applied. It may not be sufficiently definite to permit of any specific application or enforcement. The youth of Texas would thus not be compelled to attend school, and would be free from the terrible and immoral influence of modern education. —Wisconsin Journal of Education.

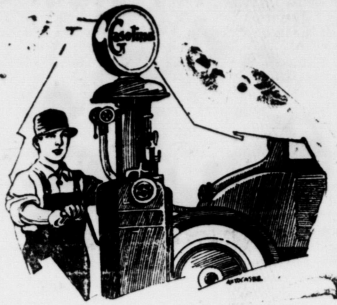

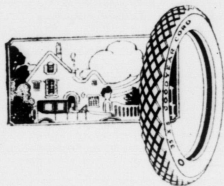

MORE FINE POULTRY

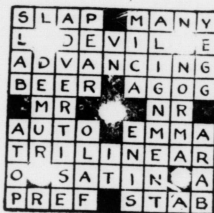
Mrs. Harry Hubbell is the owner of what is doubtless the finest lot of chickens in this part of the country. Last year Mr. and Mrs. Hubbell, who live on the Junction Hardware Co. farm just east of town, started in the poultry game as a side line with only fair success, but this year decided to produce only thoroughbred chickens and on the 1st of April this year took the first hatch from the incubators. During the next few days about 465 thoroughbred chicks were to be seen around the place. They had remarkable success in raising this number and after selling the cockerels they have about two hundred fine pullets for winter layers. The fact is they are already beginning to lay, although less than four months old.

Recently they received one of the highest priced pens—one cockerel and four young hens—that have been bought by local people. The cockerel cost \$35 and the hens \$20 each and are from one of the best known breeders in the state. This pen won prizes at the state fair last fall.

Mrs. Hubbell expects to continue the poultry business on a rather large scale and her success will be watched with interest and will likely be the means of starting more people to raising more and better chickens in Kimble County.

A prize hen was rescued from a death of strangulation when its owner performed an operation on its neck. Its neck was cut open, the crop was opened and a wad of alfalfa, weighing four ounces, was removed. The incision was then sewed up and the hen is on the road to recovery.
