Hangar Talk

Manuel Salinas, of Huntsville, Texas demonstrated his ability as a pilot and how to keep cool in a full blown emergency, when he discovered his landing gear was not down and locked on attempting to land at Cox Field Friday, August 26, 1977.

Salinas was on a business trip to Paris, Texas in his Rockwell Aero Commander 112 making a routine landing when he discovered that there was a malfunction in the landing gear. While circling the field and going over all of the emergency procedures to get the gear down, Salinas contacted flight operations at Cox and advised them of his problem.

Jimmy Wrenn of Wrenn flying service gave assistance to Salinas by flying chase in his Cessna 172 and inspected the disabled aircraft's landing gear.

After it was determined that it was impossible to get the gear down, normal emergency procedure was set up at Cox Field to receive the crippled aircraft. The regular foam fire truck based at Cox and a fire unit from the City of Paris

Department took up positions on the runway.

After all of the fuel had been used up in the right tank of the Commander 112, Salinas made his approach to the main runway. The brisk 25 mph wind slowed the aircraft down to about 50 mph when he put the left main gear and nose wheel on the runway momentarily to test the gear that he had functioning. Salinas added power and took his aircraft back into the air for another attempt. His second attempt at the landing was perfect, the left main gear held and the nose wheel ran straight. Shutting off all power and killing the electrical system, Salinas applied pressure to the left brake and the right wing of the aircraft settled to the concrete very gently.

The Commander 112 slid off of the runway, hitting a light and traveling about 100 feet, coming to a stop with only a dent in the right wing and a few scratches on the underside.

After 31 years of flying without an accident Salinas, remembered his early training, followed emergency procedures to the letter and kept cool.

Cox Field Runway To Be Resurfaced

The Cox Field Airport Advisory Board announced Tuesday night that all preliminary work has been done and the decision to advertise for bids for the overlaying of hot mix on the main runway will be made by the Paris City Council on Sept. 12.

The \$450,000 overlaying project is 90 percent funded by state and federal funds and 10 percent funded by local funds. Work on the project is expected

to begin in late October.

Airport manager Jim Collier said that approximately 75 transient aircraft use Cox Field daily, using 6,000 gallons of jet fuel a month and 10,000 gallons of 80 and 100 octane fuel. Profits from the sale of fuel go to the City of Paris. In addition to the transient aircraft, two agricultural spraying companies operate out of Cox, along with two flight training schools using three aircraft. Approximately

20 privately owned aircraft are permanently based at Cox.

One of the agricultural spraying companies has approximately 50 operations a day, while one of the flight training schools has 23 operations a day. Metro Airlines, a commuter service, flies six aircraft in and out of Cox Field every day.

Advisory board member Bill Booth reported to the board that the procedure for permits

to operate out of Cox Field appears to be working and recommended that the wording of the ordinance not be changed. The essence of the ordinance is that a commercial or flight school based at Cox Field needs a permit to operate, while instructors not based at Cox Field do not have to have a permit.

Airport manager Jim Collier reported to the board that progress is being made on the

installation of an Enroute Flight Advisory Service at Cox Field by the FAA. The cost to the City of Paris to prepare the north office of the new T-Hangars will be approximately \$2,000. The FAA will lease the office for \$3.50 a square foot, and expects to occupy the remote radio facility by October 1.

The EFAS, "SAFE" spelled backwards, will be operated remotely out of Fort Worth, and

will provide pilots with Flight Watch services, the latest weather information and pilot reports.

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Gorley of Paris have formed the Tammy Corporation, dba Paris Flight Center, and Gorley, along with flight instructor Bill Howard reported to the board on the formation of a Cessna Pilot Center at Cox Field. Howard presently has approximately 30 student pilots working toward private pilot licenses, and will have a lease agreement ready for the approval of the Paris City Council on Sept. 12.

Pat Wright, chapter chairman of the Wildflower Ninety-Nines, international organization of women pilots, asked for approval of the board to have a spot landing and flour bombing contest at Cox Field Oct. 23. The contest will be open to all pilots and divisions will be set up on a basis of pilot ratings. The board approved the event and turned the matter over to the airport manager.

A \$5 entry fee will be assessed each pilot and cash prizes will be awarded the winners.

The Blossom Lions Club Annual Labor Day Fish Fry will get underway at 11:00 a.m. Monday, September 5, at the community center in Blossom. The fish will be served until 7:00 p.m. according to Al Stewart, president of the club. Advance tickets are \$2.75, and will cost \$3 per person Labor Day.

Lion members are also selling \$1 tickets for a barbecue turkey, \$10 worth of groceries, and AM & FM radio to be given away Labor Day.

A county-western band will provide entertainment throughout the day.

Proceeds will be used for the summer baseball program in Blossom.

Bonds Pass By Landslide

The Deport City Council canvassed the ballots in the Deport municipal sewer bond election and arrived at a final vote of 110 for and seven

against the proposal.

The vote will allow the sale of \$125,000 in sewer bonds to finance the city's part in the construction of a new sewer plant for the city. The price tag for the sewer plant is \$211,000 with the Environmental Protection Agency financing 75 percent of the plant and the city financing 25 percent of the project.

Hunter and Associates, the engineering firm that first drew the plans for the sewer plant several years ago, will be in charge of the construction. At the time the plans were drawn, the late E. E. Kirkland

was mayor of Deport, and the plans included a sewer lift station north of the business district because of the flooding problem with Deport Creek.

The lift station was eliminated from the final plans drawn by Hunter because the city has now acquired funds and completed plans for the construction of a dam north of Deport to control the flooding creek. The sewage will be lifted from the site of the present plant to the site of the new plant near FM 1503.

Construction on the dam is scheduled to begin in September. Construction of the sewer plant is scheduled to

begin after the first of the year.

Retirement of the sewer bonds will require that sewer rates be raised slightly, but the cost will be shared equally by everyone who uses the system. Property taxes will not be raised to pay for the plant.

City councilman Duane Glover said Tuesday that the council was extremely gratified by the election results and viewed the election as an expression of appreciation for the work done by the council in securing funds from governmental sources for the completion of local projects and for the time and effort spent by city officials.

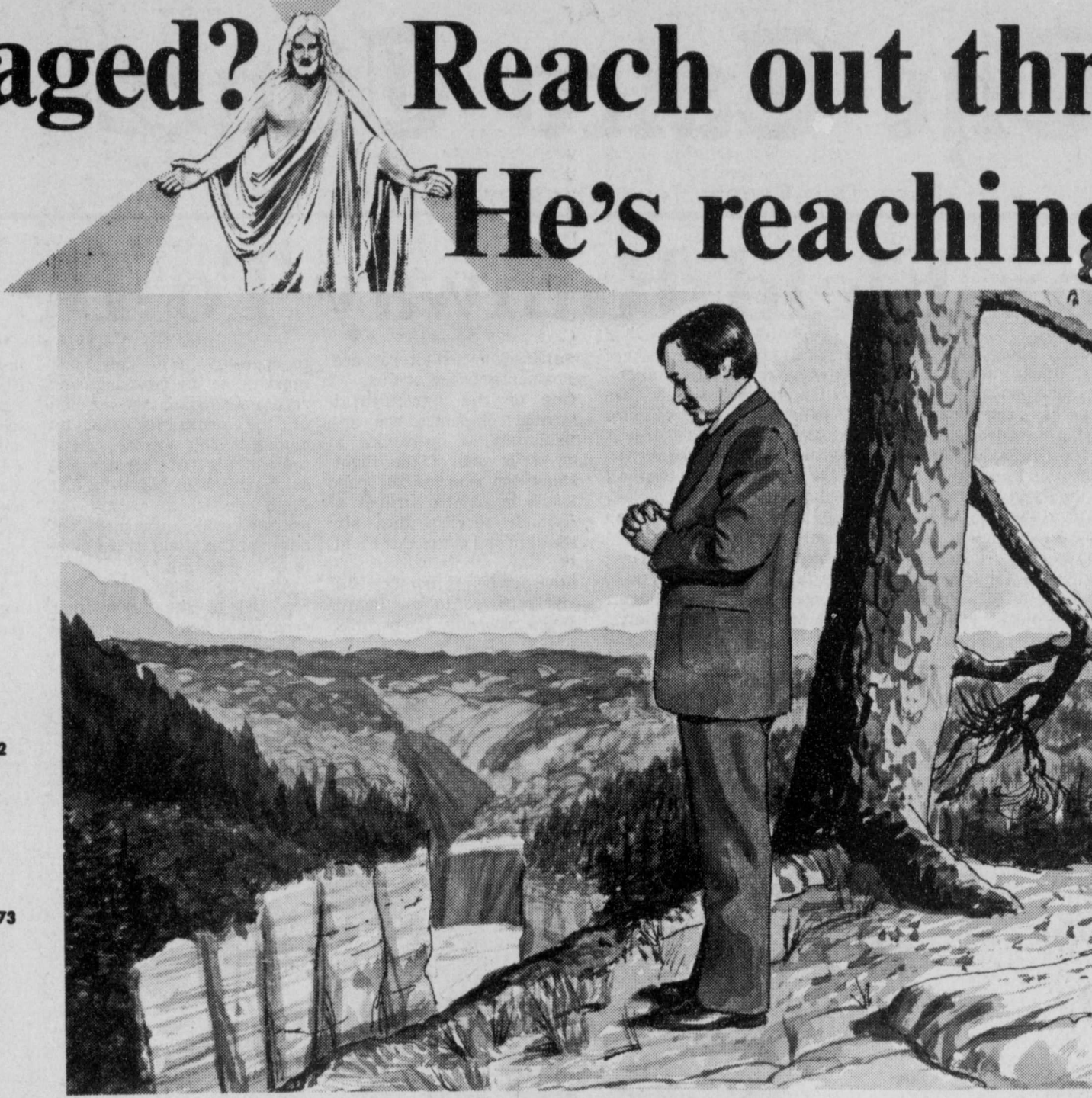

Ten Lepers Healed

Luke 17: 11-19

Wherever Jesus went, He always found occasion to help someone who was in need, and what is better than to have the inward feeling of compassion to help a troubled or distressed person. In Jesus Christ, all the fullness of the Godhead tabernacled among men, and when He laid down His life on the cross it was the paying down of His unsearchable riches as the redemption price of our soul. His miracle of healing in this nameless village while on the way to Jerusalem has for us heart searching thoughts. Let us look at the situation as the Word relates to us, the need of the individual and the Master meeting the need.

First of all we can see a pitiful sight, lepers, 17:12. As he was traveling there came to him ten lepers. In scripture, leprosy is the outstanding type of sin. These men were bound together by misery, and utterly unable to save themselves. Although there were ten of them, this did not lessen the suffering of each of them. Although we may have many friends in sin, because of the number does not make each of

their sins less guilty. Sin is sin. Like sin, leprosy brings uncleanness (Lev. 13:45). The true lepers cry (unclean). We are taught to speak the truth when we are asked to make confession of our sins. Like sin, leprosy leads to separation 17:12. They stood afar off. The place appointed for them by the law of God was afar off. A sense of our spiritual leprosy should make us very humble in all our approaches to Christ. Who are we that we should draw near to Him that is infinitely pure? Far off is the position of those who have not been cleansed by the blood of Jesus Christ (Eph 2:13). To be cleansed is to be drawn near to the Lord. Their life and character alienates them from the life and fellowship of God. Like sin, leprosy is humanly incurable. Man has no remedy for leprosy, he can only attempt to relieve the suffering of the plague. Also man has no remedy for sin, but God does.

Let's listen to the earnest prayer of these lepers 17:13 "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us". This may have been a hoarse cry through the throats of lepers, but there was music in it to the ears of our Master, for it came from the heart and was needful to them. They did not ask to be healed, but for the

Master to have mercy on them. Those that expect help from Christ must take him as Master.

Now what did Christ do? He did not heal them immediately. He sent them to the priest. He didn't promise that they would be healed. In Leviticus 14, the lepers were required to go before the priest so he could see if they were healed. These lepers, had faith in Jesus, for when they left him, they believed he would heal them. This was a trial of their obedience. Those that expect Christ's favor must accept them in his way and method. As they went, they were cleansed.

Two things were absolutely needed: (1) faith in the Word of Christ 17:19, (2) obedience to the Will of Christ. If they had waited until they felt better, they would never have gone. It is while we believe and obey that we enter into life 17:15. And one, when he saw that he was healed, turned back and glorified God. Personal healing is something we can only see by experience, and something we should be thankful for. It was a moral impossibility for this man to glorify God in the terrible bondage of leprosy. It is only when we are made free from sin that we can glorify God. The mercy of God not only

made this man thankful, but made him humble. He fell on his face at Jesus' feet. Humility and thankfulness are characteristic of those saved by the grace of God.

Christ took notice of this, the one that gave thanks was a Samaritan and the others possibly were Jews. The Samaritan had not the pure knowledge and worship of God among them that the Jews had, and yet he glorified God. The Jews showed here that they took God for granted. He asked, Were there not ten, but where are the nine? How poor are we in our returns. Ingratitude is a very common sin. Of the many that receive mercy from God, there are but few, very few, that return to give thanks. How many times, the least expected are the ones who glorify God. The great encouragement Christ gave him, 17:19. The rest had their cure, But Christ spoke especially to this man. "Thy faith hath made thee whole." The rest were made whole by the power of Christ, in compassion to their distress, but he was made whole by his faith and then humbling himself to Christ. Have you been made whole? If you have, then you will want to confess it, Romans 10:9. Also you will seek the will of God and the follow his will.

Articles of value may be engraved to provide identification in case of theft. There will be no charge for the engraving and the public is invited to attend.

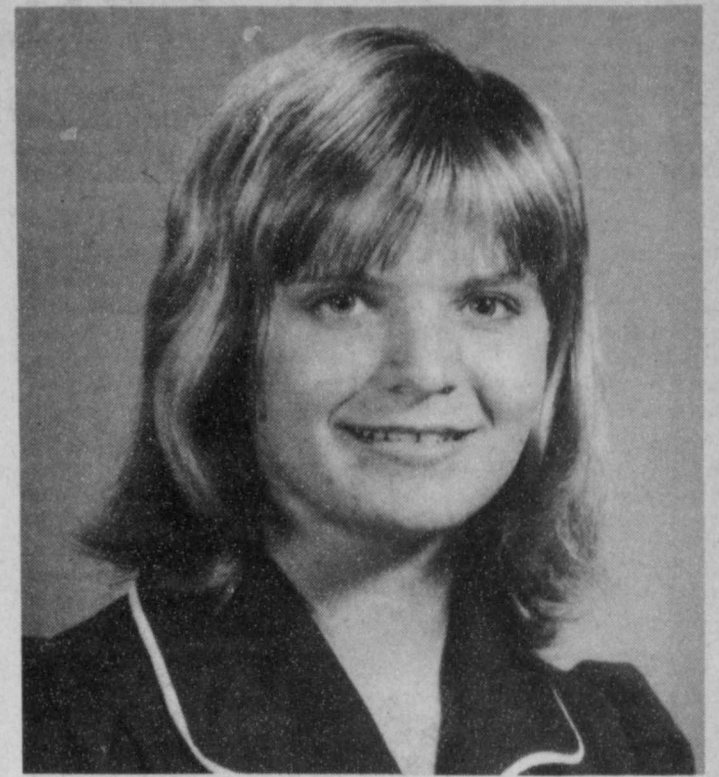
