General Election Next Tuesday

General election will be held November 5, 1974. For Titus County's precinct 3, ballot box 9 will be at Talco City Hall with Mrs. Ivy Smith election judge. The Wilkinson community will do their balloting at the community center with Mrs. Christine Harris election judge.

A light turnout is expected since there is no opposition to Titus County incumbents.

The Patman-Farris race is the most hotly contested, with the younger Paris native seriously challenging the veteran congressman.

Red River County is split into two state representative districts, with some of the boxes voting for Hamp Atkinson or Marjorie Thornton, and others voting for George Preston, who is without opposition.

Even though the Republicans will have candidates seeking all state offices and First District Congressman Wright Patman has a strong Republican opponent a light vote is still predicted. The Raza Unida Party has candidates for two state offices, the Socialist Workers Party has candidates for six state offices and the American Party has a candidate for Governor.

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I.B.P.A. Wins School Lunch Battle

Today the Independent Beef Producers of America received encouraging news from Washington. Twenty of our United States Senators have joined I.B.P.A. in its battle to curb imports and increase beef purchases in our school programs. Senator Thomas T. Eagleton from Missouri confirmed this in a letter today to R. L. Moore, President of I.B.P.A.

Through the efforts of I.B.P.A., USDA announced today that effective November 4, 1974 the school lunch program will be utilizing grass fed calves instead of only choice beef. This will help us up our supply of grass fed cattle as it takes at least three fat calves to equal one fed steer in pounds of beef. This will create a larger demand for fat calves and better utilization of available beef supply.

The Rivercrest Rebels suffered their worst defeat of the season Friday night at the hands of the Winnsboro Red Raiders, with the final score 39-0. The idea that Rivercrest could not beat Winnsboro seemed to be dismissed in the first few plays of the game, when Glenn Fulbright made 12 and 21 yard gains against the Raiders. They turned out to be the best ground gains of the entire ball game for the Rebels, with the exception of

a 14 yard run by Curties in the third quarter.

Fulbright carried 18 times for 80 yards against the Red Raiders, and caught two Jimmy Curties passes for 22 yards. Curties was hitting well with 10 completions of 20 attempts, and was intercepted only one time. Gary Neill was a favorite target against the Raiders, catching five for 44 yards. Jerry Curties caught three passes for 24 yards.

The ninth annual Homecoming of Rivercrest High School will be held Friday and Saturday Nov. 1 and 2.

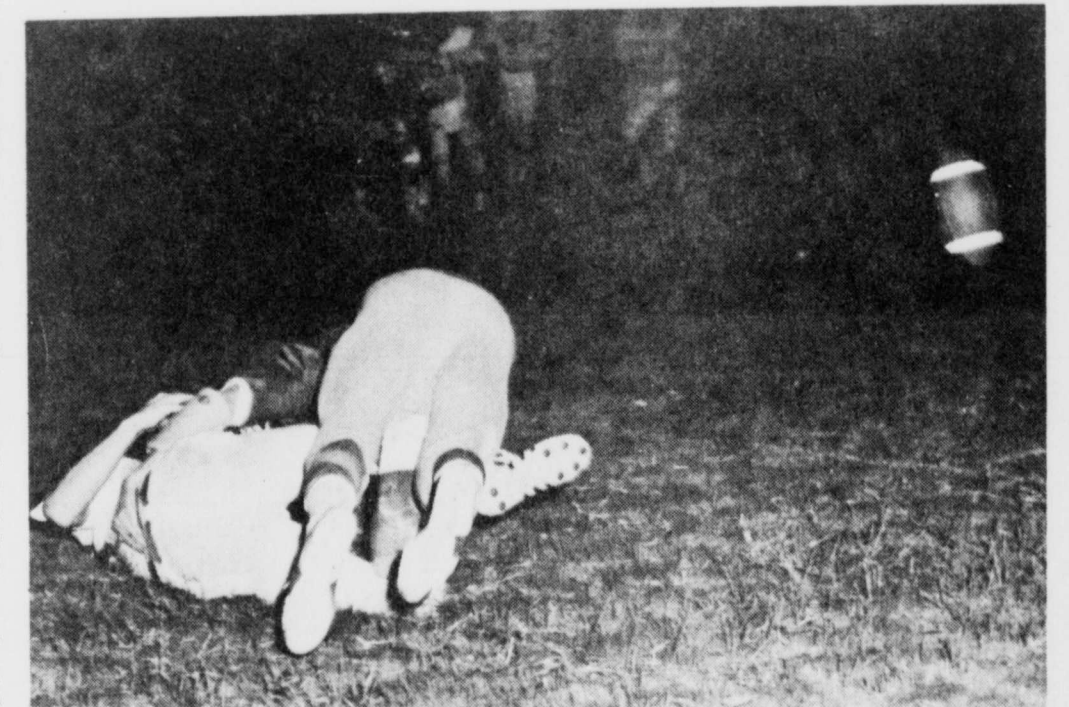

Dial Direct Today In Talco And Save

Effective Thursday, October 31, 1974 customers in the Talco telephone exchange will be able to dial all long distance calls direct, according to Jo Anne Reed, District Manager, General Telephone Company. 1+ dialing enables the customer to dial their own station to station long distance calls. 0+ dialing allows the customer to dial the more expensive person-to-person, collect, credit card and third number billing calls where an operator comes on the line after the number has been dialed to take care of the special service wanted.

"By using 1+ dialing, you

can dial telephone repair service or local directory assistance without a long distance charge", Mrs. Reed said. To reach repair service, Talco customers should dial 1-984-1102. To call local directory assistance, dial 1-411. Customers are reminded to make a note of these changes in the front of their directory for quick reference. This information will appear in the December 1974 directory.

Other information Talco customers may need to know, such as what to do when you reach a wrong number, if you do not know the distant

number, if you do not know the area code, can be found on a special instruction card mailed earlier this week to all telephone users. Also, the operator can furnish this information if needed.

Mrs. Reed added that General Telephone employees have been working for the past few months to complete this installation and provide the new, improved telephone service for Talco customers.

Cattlemen Cull Poor Producers

"Cattlemen must cull the poor producing cows", according to Dr. Randall Grooms, Area Livestock Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Dr. Grooms told the large group of cattlemen attending the livestock meeting last week at North Lamar High School that cows that

are open and cows that wean lightweight calves take the profit away from the good cows in the herd. In short, he said, "If we're going to survive the severe price-cost squeeze, we must do a better job of managing the cow herd."

Grooms pointed out that the biggest nutrition problems are energy, adequate minerals and protein. All of these requirements must be met if the cow is to rebreed, produce milk, grow and maintain body. If the animal fails to receive the proper nutrition, it affects the function in order of above listing.

Since most producers will be depending heavily on hay during the coming months, it is extremely important to know the contents of the hay-protein and energy. At a cost of \$7, producers can have their hay analyzed for both protein and TDN. This could be the cheapest investment one can make at this time.

The nutritive requirements of a 1000 pound dry cow is 1.2 pounds of crude protein (C.D.) and 18 pounds of total digestible nutrients (TDN) per day while the same wet cow requires 2.2 C.P. and 14 pounds of TDN.

T.E. Baxter and Jimmy Fodge of Faulkner recently had their hay tested and found it to be 13.57 percent protein and 50.7 TDN. Twenty pounds of this hay will more than furnish all the requirements for their dry cows. However, it will be a little short in TDN, but will be adequate for protein. One option they have is to supplement with a small amount of grain rather than the more expensive protein supplements.

There is a difference in hay as Pattonville cattleman, David Shelton, will agree. Shelton tested his large round bales and they were 7.95 percent C.P. This is fairly typical coastal bermuda hay and Shelton's dry cows should maintain body weight of 20 pounds. This will not furnish the nutritive requirements of his wet cows.

These are two examples of the value of forage testing. Assistance with sampling is available from any of the Vocational Agricultural Departments or the County Extension Service.

Bull Sale

Maxey breeder, Aud Brown, will once again consign some top Charolais bulls. Aud is a small breeder, but his bulls are always some of the top quality and are well received by the buyers. You will like the three tall, muscular bulls in this year's sale.

One of the newer breeds, Limousin, will once again be represented in the sale as Keith Parsons of Pattonville will be consigning a half dozen. His half blood bulls

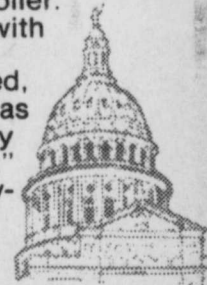

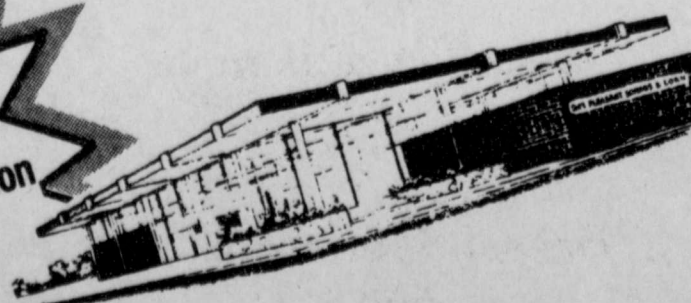

- In 1973 and 1974, Wright Patman insisted on an investigation of the Small Business Administration's misuse of loan programs. The investigation stopped widespread abuses and put the SBA funds back to work for worthy small business borrowers.

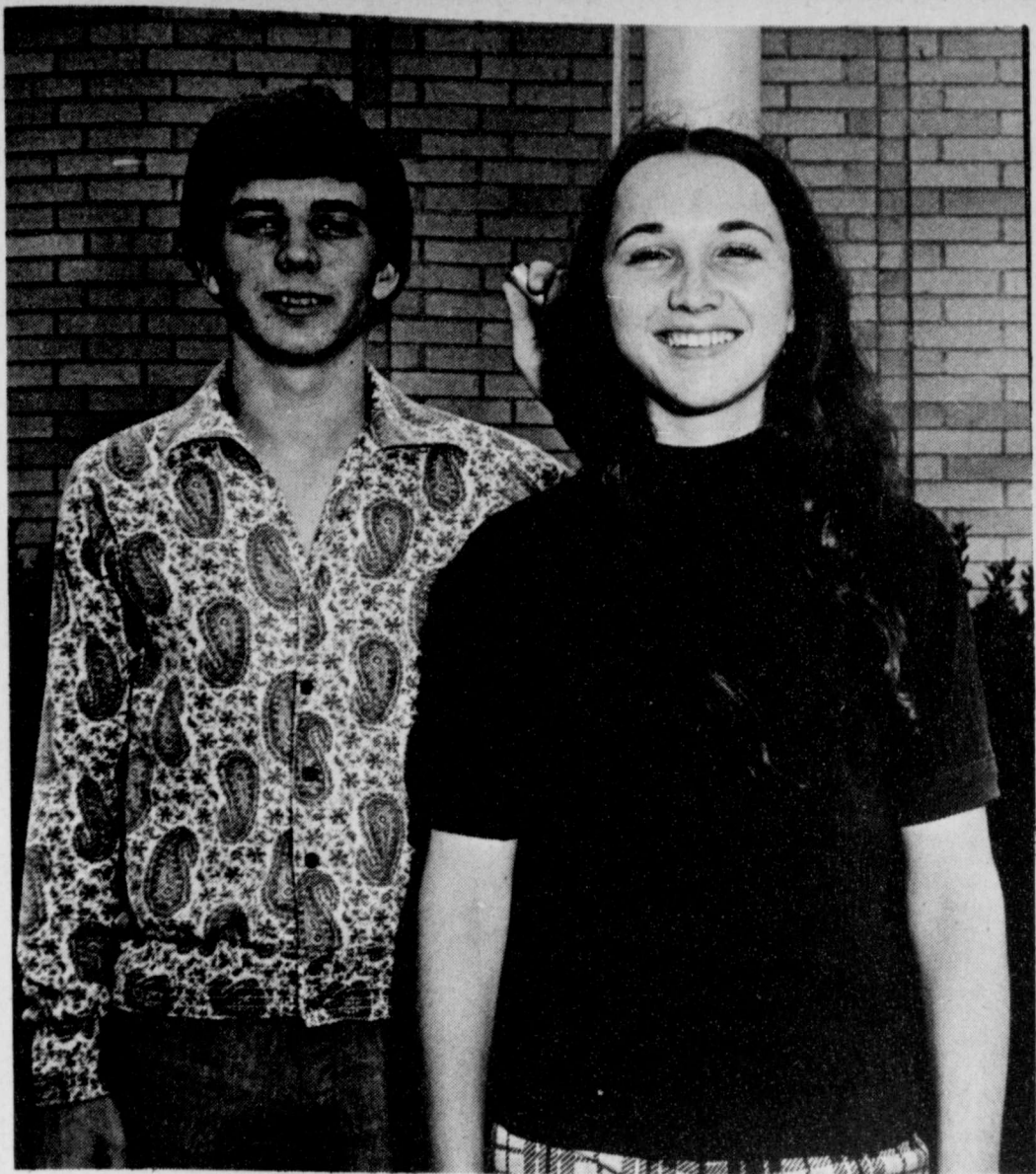

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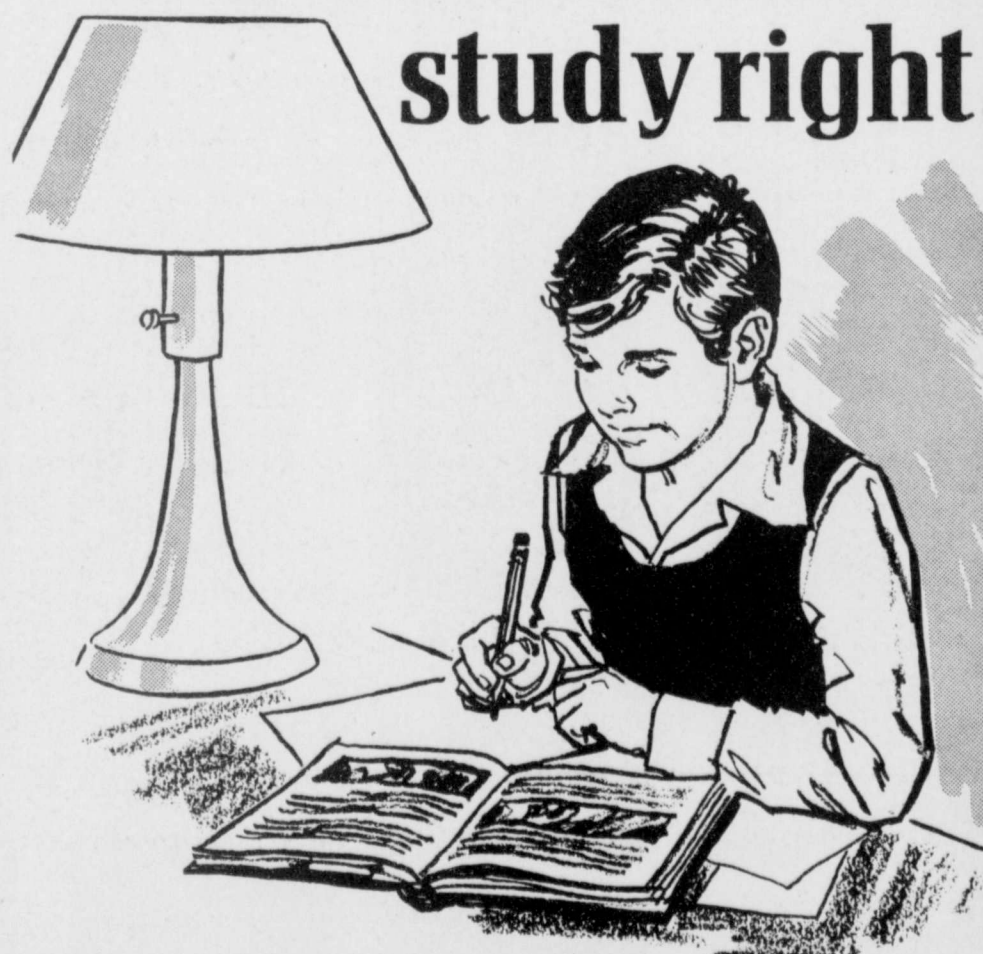

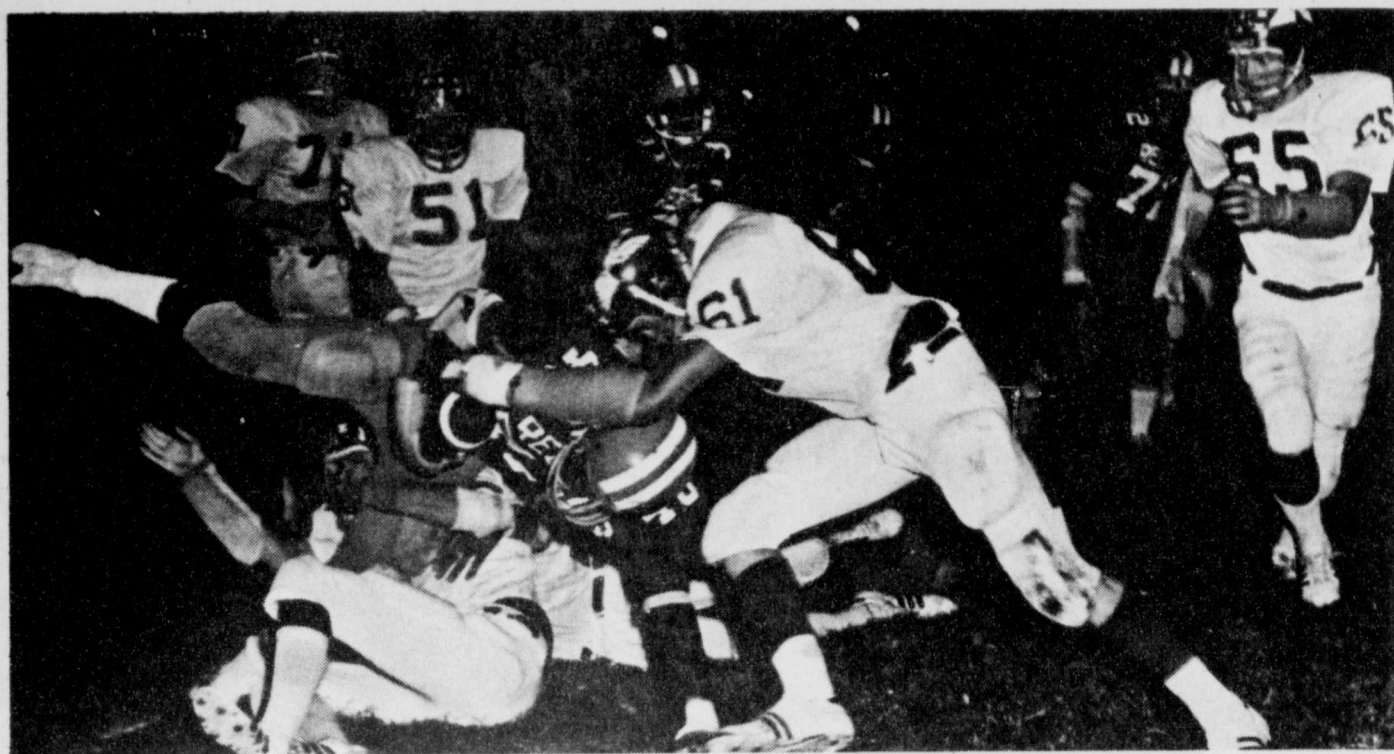

Coaches Corner

We should have had these articles to write the last two years. That way you would have got to read eighteen winning articles and two losing articles. This year we're running out of things to say because we have lost so many games. I would like to write some about winning just to see what it would sound like. Well, we have been very fortunate the last couple of

years and you can't win every year.

We started against Winnsboro like we were going to battle them all the way. Glenn Fulbright took the opening kickoff and almost broke it all the way. Then our offense got in high gear and moved for three downs to the Winnsboro 35 yard line. Winnsboro killed our drive by stopping us on four downs. They took the ball

and we held them to a punting situation on fourth down and four yards to go. Winnsboro punted and we thought we would have the ball; but no, bring it back, and give Winnsboro a first down because we lined up offside. This mental mistake kept us from having the ball and they scored. These mistakes have hurt us all year. Another situation we had was Winnsboro punting on fourth and twelve yards for a first. We blocked below the waist and we get a fifteen yard penalty and they got a first down and scored again. We fumbled on our own seven yard line. Winnsboro recovers and scores again. This then rubbed off on our inexperienced players and caused a complete breakdown of our team. We realize that we have played four good solid football teams in the last four weeks, but we did not see them being over one touchdown better than we. Had we been able to minimize our mistakes plus keep a high emotional level, then we would have been in all four games. Now our problem is we need a big win to pick us off the ground and get us going again. If we don't get that when we are going to struggle to win any of the last three games.

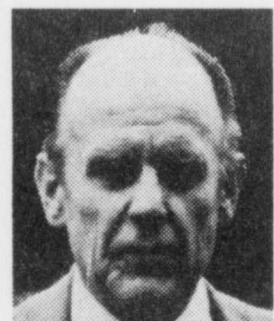

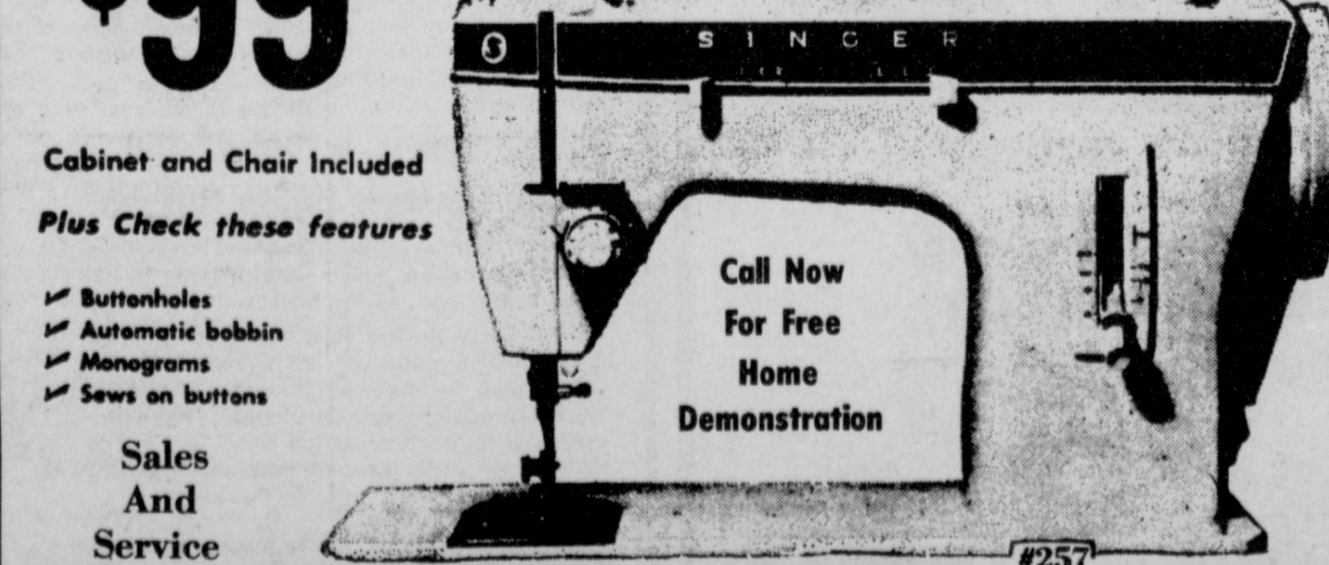

Gardening Made Easy

By Barrie L. Kridler

Fine fall weather is upon us
with warm days and crisp
cool nights. Marigolds, dahl-
ias, zinnias, copper plants and
the glorious mum family
seem to be trying to out do
each other in a wild
color-bash of beauty. If you
missed planting the lovely
cushion mums earlier in the
summer, it's still possible to
add them now to flowerbeds,
pots and planters, by the front
steps, along and in between
the front shrub border, or as
quick center pieces and room
decorations in the house for
special occasions or club
meetings. Chrysanthemums
are as much a part of the fall
season as the falling
leaves and the plants you buy
this year will furnish a wealth
of new plants in the spring
that can be spread all over
the landscape in sunny spots
for next fall's return.

Spring bulb planting should
be well under way with
plantings of daffodils, narciss-
us, hyacinths, dutch iris,
crocus, snowdrops, and ran-
unculus in the ground. We still
have several weeks that we
can plant but remember that
the sooner you get them in the
ground the sooner they begin
root growth and start sending
up sprouts with flower buds to
bloom at the first sign of
spring. Early planted bulbs
have more and larger blooms
and anyway the soil is in
perfect shape and the weather
lovely to be out planting in.
Tulips should be bought now
and stored in the vegetable
crisper of the refrigerator
until the end of November—we
plant ours between Thanks-
giving and the beginning of
the Christmas rush and this
finishes off the bulb planting
season. I think that few things
are as rewarding as the
miracle that takes place with
the planting of brown sleek
bulbs and spring breezes.

We're very fortunate to live in
a world that can bless us with
such beauty, bounty and the
wonderment of changing
seasons—none of us should
ever be bored!

This is about the last call on
seeding hardy annuals like
bluebonnet, pansy, pinks,
poppies, plox and perennials
like columbine, delphinium,
daisy, foxglove, and sweet
william and still expect bloom
next spring. If you have
greenhouse or coldframe for
them to grow in you can plant
much later and the plants will
grow faster and still have
time to mature. Try to get
clean-up chores done during
mild weather. Start a com-
post pile—DON'T BURN
THOSE LEAVES! Get in all
tender house plants and start
to dig caladium bulbs if the
plants are dying down. Above
all enjoy this season—
outdoors! HAPPY GARDEN-
ING!

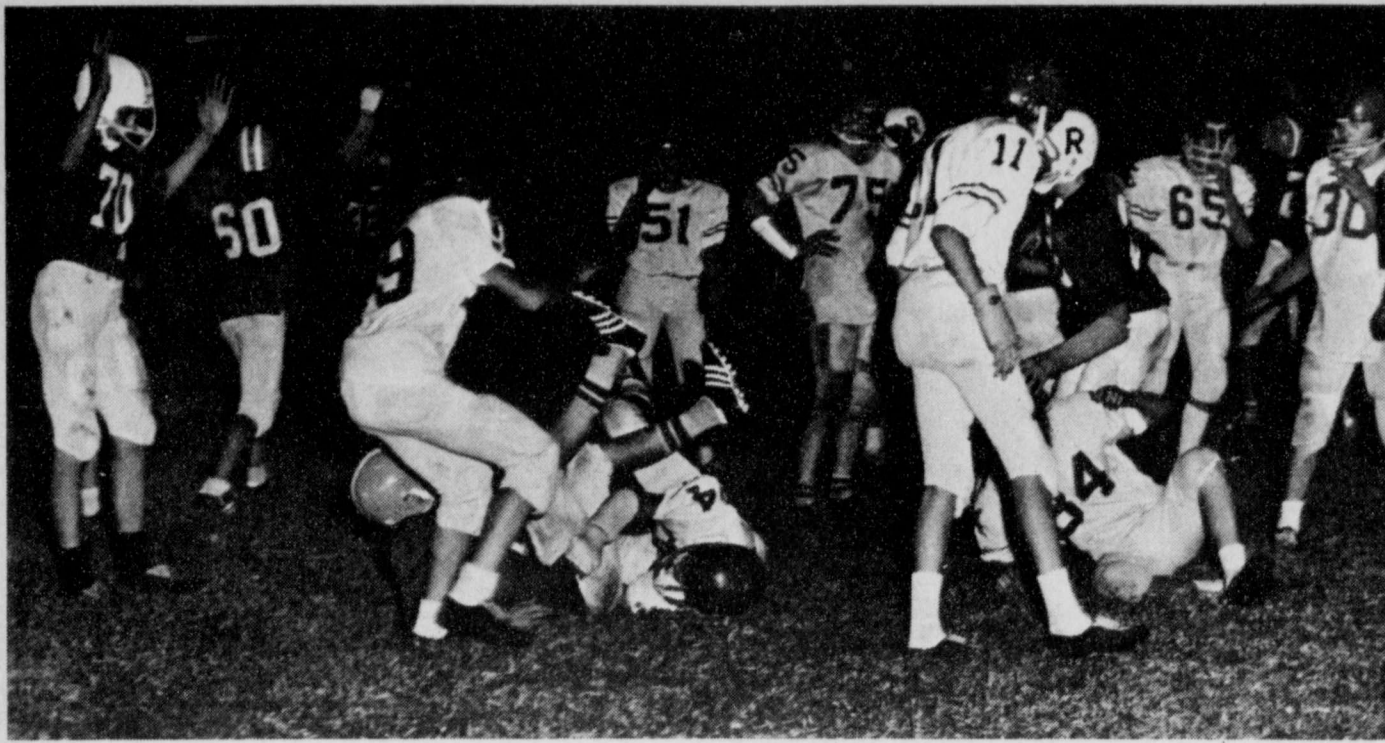
An Imperial Meal

- 1 cup chicken bouillon

Split, skin and bone the
chicken breasts. Cut in thin

about 1 hour. Turn occasion-
ally to season evenly. Weave
meat strips on small metal
skewers or moistened bamboo
skewers. Grill on hibachi or
in oven broiler about 2 min-

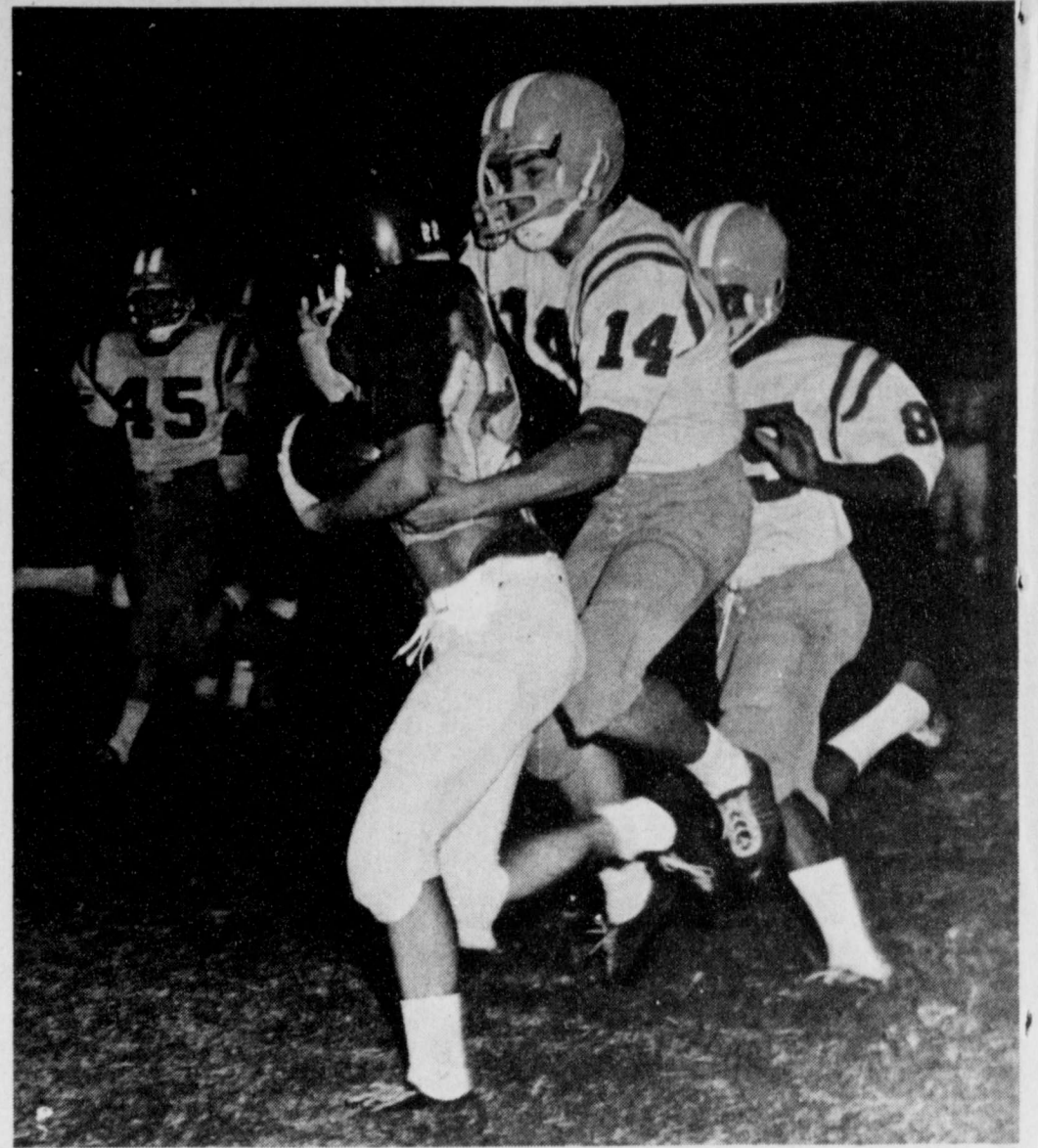

But when it comes to helping them what does he do?—In 1970 Patman voted against a 5 percent increase in Social Security Benefits.

4. Patman is a tool of the Big Eastern Union Bosses

Although Patman misses almost two out of three votes, when he does vote he votes the way the big labor bosses back in the East want him to.

6. Patman Voted Against the Prayer Admendment
