ENGINEERS SET HI-WAY MARKS IN GRADE WORK

Work of setting stakes for the widening and grading work on Eighth street is going forward today by the state highway engineers department, preparatory for team and scraper work which is to begin shortly.

The new highway will be sixty feet between curbs throughout the city limits, but triple asphalt will be only 20 feet wide west of I avenue, said assistant engineer, T. H. Landon, today. The hill at this point is to be lowered in the grading work, some three feet, he said. Many curbs and some nice trees in the western part of the city will be disturbed, Mr. Landon said, but the highway will be worth all the disturbance from a point of civic improvement to the city. The asphalt may be spread at some later date, Mr. Landon continued.

JOB OUTLOOK BRIGHTER FOR '36 GRADUATES

BERKELEY, Cal., May 29 — (U.P.) — University graduates of 1936 at last will begin to come into their own as far as jobs are concerned, according to the Bureau of Occupations of the University of California.

As a result of a nationwide survey of the leading American universities it is announced that all parts of the country have experienced a pickup ranging from 20 to 100 per cent for college and university graduates.

In addition, salaries will range from \$5 to \$20 a month more than the June figures for 1935.

The Universities of Oregon, Washington and South Carolina report a demand for capable graduates averaging 100 per cent over that of last year, while the demand for certain categories is even greater.

Heavy Gain in South
The demand is particularly heavy in the South. The Louisiana State University, favorite educational institution of the late Senator Huey Long, reports the demand for graduates approximately four times greater than that of a year ago.

The unprecedented stimulus in building, which extends through the so-called "heavy industries," such as concrete, timber, iron, and steel, is making a sharply increased demand on engineering and technical institutions.

However, marketing and sales offer the most numerous openings.

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NOW GOES TO PRESIDENT FOR APPROVAL

WASHINGTON, May 29 — (U.P.) — The house today completed congressional action on the \$526,000,000 peace time record-breaking navy appropriation bill by improving the conference report.

The bill, carrying the increases for personnel airplane and ship strength, go to the white house for signature. The senate adopted the report last Monday.

Approval of the bill boosted appropriations for national defense at this session of congress to more than \$1,000,000,000.

FINANCE COMMITTEE VOTES COMPROMISE
WASHINGTON, May 29 — (U.P.) — The senate finance committee voted today to approve the new compromise tax bill, including a one per cent increase on income surtaxes starting at \$6,000 and extending up to \$50,000.

The compromise measure rejecting President Roosevelt's suggestion for higher graduated tax on undivided corporate profits, was estimated to raise as high as \$700,000,000 including surtax increases and the windfall tax, but fell short of the administration's request for a total, permanent and temporary residue of \$1,137,000,000.

The committee decided to change the flat eighteen per cent rate on corporate earnings to a graduated rate from 15 1/2 to 18 per cent and to drop the proposed \$1,000 exemption for corporations for under \$15,000 income.

The organization is suspected of causing the deaths of a number of persons which had been called suicide.

Drivers of 33 Cars Face Vital Fuel-Speed Gamble In Classic

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29 — (U.P.) — Although cars and drivers will grind out 500 miles in a little less than four hours over Indianapolis Motor Speedway's bricks tomorrow, the 24th annual Memorial Day race will be won in the pits, a majority of the contestants believe.

Two factors are responsible for the rising esteem for the pits—a series of unromantic concrete stalls at the inside edge of the track along the main stretch of the two and one-half mile oval. They are:

1. Revisions to the four turns speeds than ever before attempted.

2. Reduction of the gasoline allowance to 37 1/2 gallons for the grind.

The improved turns encourage the drivers to push their machines to speeds at which the powerful little motors gulp the fuel supply.

Must Watch Gasoline
While the drivers concentrate every faculty on keeping the pace in the fastest company in the world, it will be the job of the pit handlers to hold them within limits they are sure will conserve enough gasoline for the closing rush toward the finish line.

As result of the new fuel restrictions, five gallons less than was permitted for the 1935 race, opinion among the drivers is divided almost equally as to whether this year's event will produce a new record for the 500 miles.

Kelly Pettito, smiling little Italian-American who took his driving lessons piloting truckloads of perishable fruit across Rocky Mountain passes, set a record of 106.865 miles an hour in winning last year's race.

Cocksure young drivers whose creed is "push your foot to the floor and go" are confident they can beat that mark.

Older heads, especially those mechanical engineers who build their own machines and have a greater respect for the fuel limitations, are not so sure.

DePalma Sponsors Youth
In keeping with the greater importance of the pit management, the 1936 race sees the return of one of the outstanding drivers of retired now to engineering. He brings a newcomer, Henry Banks, 24, Royal Oak, Mich.

Harry "Cotton" Henning, probably the most publicized of the mechanics, will supervise the pits of three of the pre-race favorites, the entrants of Mike Boyle, Chicago sportsman.

The cars Henning will direct will be driven by Bill Cummings, Indianapolis, winner of the 1934 race, and Al Miller and Chet Miller, both of Detroit but no relation and both ranked with the most consistent of conservative pilots.

TEXAS RIVERS THREATEN TO LEAVE BANKS

Five days of heavy rains sent most Texas streams surging threateningly toward flood stage Friday. Particularly in south Texas the flood threat was acute as the lower Brazos river spread over low lands near East Columbia blocking several highways and the Guadalupe and Colorado rivers continued rising.

The Trinity, swollen by heavy down pouring of upper watershed above Fort Worth, reached a stage of 27.3 feet at Dallas Friday morning and was expected to top 28 foot level by nightfall, then was expected to begin falling.

Government weather bureau reports showed that every station in Texas except that at El Paso reported rain within the twenty-four hours ending at 7 a. m. Friday.

State To Examine Tax Valuations

AUSTIN, May 29 — (U.P.) — Intangible values of railroads and bridge companies in Texas were set at the same amount as in 1935 by the State Tax Board today. Pipe line intangible valuations were increased from \$49,723,700 last year, to \$58,606.

The valuations pronounced today are preliminary. Hearings will be conducted between June 10th and 15th to hear any protest from rail or bridge companies. A hearing on the pipe line valuation will be after June 15th. Final valuations will be set after the hearing.

The total for railroad companies is \$35,385,115 and for bridge companies, \$200,000.

Power Companies To Contest Court Acts

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 29 — (U.P.) — Eighteen major power companies are ready to re-open the attack on the validity of the supreme court's approved Tennessee valley authorities, the Birmingham Post said here today.

A new suit far more sweeping than those that have gone before was to be launched in federal court here and in Knoxville, Tennessee. Probably this afternoon, the Post said.

Dallas Is Ready For Gala Day At The Texas Centennial Opening June 6

DALLAS, May 29 — (U.P.) — The Texas Centennial \$25,000,000 Exposition will be opened June 6. Promptly at noon entrance turnstiles will begin clicking and it is estimated that before midnight 300,000 persons will pass through the gates.

Foremost among a distinguished array of visitors during the next few days is scheduled to be President Roosevelt. He tentatively has set June 12 for his major southern speech at the exposition.

During the morning of June 6 a gigantic parade, largest ever held in the southwest, will pass through the downtown section of the city. The route of march probably will be lined by 450,000 spectators.

Dallas pledged more than \$9,000,000 in cash and property to obtain the Centennial Exposition, which will close Nov. 29. The state and

FORT WORTH POULTRY PLANT IS DAMAGED

FORT WORTH, May 29 — (U.P.) — An explosion at a Fort Worth poultry and egg company today killed one person, injured eight and caused damage of \$15,000.

V. R. Yancy, 25, egg sorter was killed when caught under falling debris and asphyxiated by ammonia fumes. His body was found after the blast.

Firemen probing the ruins in gas masks to protect themselves from swirling ammonia fumes, said they believed the blast was caused by a leaking ammonia compressor in the creamery department located in the rear of the plant.

Three hundred employees of the company had just reported for work when the explosion blew out the roof and a wall, sending workers running for safety. Ammonia fumes hissing from broken pipes spread rapidly through the building.

Eating for Pleasure

The "Eat More—" advertising, once so popular in the food trade, seems to be yielding place to a saner and more constructive type of publicity. Food producers and processors are growing more considerate of each other's feelings and less inclined to knock competing commodities. We read less about the advantages of vegetables over meat, or vice versa, and of fruits over both meat and vegetables. Cooperative groups are coming to realize that their most dangerous competitors are not other groups in the food industry, but certain schools of diet that take the joy out of eating in general.

Recently the spice trade, through its national association, began urging the entire food industry to lay more stress upon flavor. "American cookery," the spice men say, "is flat and insipid." If the people can be taught to appreciate the importance of well flavored meals everybody in the food trade will be the gainer.

One has only to study contemporary food advertising to realize that this movement, started by the spice trade, is having its effect. Apparently the food industry has begun to see that its worst enemies are the faddists who scare us with bugaboos about this and that comestible, and dyspeptics who cherish the idea that anything that tastes good is bad for us.

There must be millions of Americans, especially those of middle age, who sigh for the good old days when one of the chief joys of life was the "square meal." To the food men who subscribe to this new theory of product promotion, we propose this slogan: "Back to the Pleasures of the Table."

Blanton Supported In Expense Cutting

Defying President Roosevelt and supporting Rep. Tom Blanton (D. Tex.), the House today insisted that the Federal contribution to District expenses be cut to \$2,700,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The House action, in the form of approval of a resolution offered by Blanton earlier in the day, probably means the death of the 1937 District supply bill. Senate conferees on the measure apparently are unshakable in their stand for a \$5,700,000 Federal share.

Has Same Features

The only alternative to a supply bill would be a resolution continuing current operating expenses for the next fiscal year and Blanton has introduced such a resolution but has included the very features that have deadlocked the supply bill conference.

Sen. Thomas (D. Okla.), chairman of the Senate conferees, has indicated that the Senate's position would be the same on the continuing resolution. And the president has said that relief funds cannot be allotted for municipal expenses.

Blanton's resolution approved Tuesday also insisted on the House amendment banning "outside work" by District government employees receiving more than \$2400 a year, and on the elimination of public school character education funds.

Would 'Quit' F. D.

Arguing his case to the House, Blanton referred to the report that the president last week urged passage of a District bill with a \$5,700,000 Federal contribution.

"I'm one of the best friends the president has," yelled Blanton, "but if my president were to forget himself so far as to try to tell Congress what appropriations to make, I'd quit him in a minute. I wouldn't stand by a president that invaded the privileges and rights of Congress."

"The president didn't say that and the press knows it."

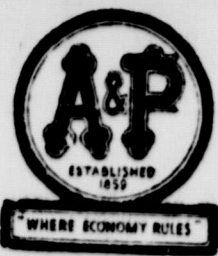
