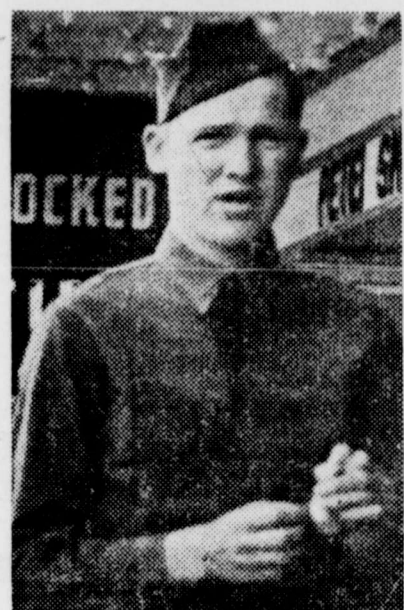

Rites Held Here For Wreck Victim

Funeral services for Roland S. Fuchs, 26, Lovington, N. M., rancher killed instantly Friday morning when the car he was driving collided with a school bus near Monroe, were held at Abernathy Methodist church Sunday afternoon and burial was in the local cemetery.

Rev. U. S. Sherrill, Methodist minister of Dimmitt, and an uncle of Mrs. Fuchs, officiated and was assisted by Rev. H. E. McClain, local Nazarene pastor, and Rev. J. Frank Nix, Baptist pastor here.

Pall bearers were Arthur, Marvin, Vic, Walter and Frank Struve and Joe Durham. Flower bearers were Mrs. Joe Durham, Vernon Smith, Dennis Barker, Dutch Craddock, Tom Smith and E. H. Hobson and Elizabeth Goebel.

Fuchs, who was visiting relatives in this area, is survived by his wife, a daughter, Eva Laverne, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Fuchs of Lovington; seven brothers, E. H. of Abernathy, Lt. Rudolph, Camp Lee, Va., Herman, Avenger Field, Sweetwater, Geo. Lovington, Vernon, Portland, Ore., Capt. Marion, Abilene and Port. Marco, Liberal, Kans.; two sisters, Mrs. Gertrude Day, Portland, and Mrs. Carolina Park, Cross Plains. Reports of state highway patrolmen said no one else was injured. Fuchs was alone in the car. He was driving north toward Abernathy, after having been in Lubbock that morning to see a physician. A school bus of New Deal was being driven southward by E. L. Foster, but no students were aboard.

Fuchs' coupe probably skidded into the path of the bus on a slight curve and the left front fenders of the two machines smashed together in what was "almost a head-on collision." Neither vehicle was being driven fast, witnesses stated. Foster suffered only bruises. J. R. Whitmire and Allen Z. Gamme, highway patrolmen, said driving conditions at the time were hazardous, as a thin coat of ice covered the road. The victim suffered both arms broken, broken neck, crushed chest and internal injuries.

Roland was born April 27, 1917 at Marble Falls and his family moved to Abernathy the next year. The Fuchs family moved to New Mexico in 1926. He married Miss Avis Barrick, daughter of Mrs. C. M. Barrick of this community, June 22, 1941.

RATIONING TOKENS IN USE SUNDAY
During the three-week period of Feb. 27-March 20, in changing from the old rationing program to the simplified token plan, two sets of stamps, green and blue, will be used for processed foods, and two, brown and red, for meats and fats. The old stamps, brown and green, will continue to be used exactly as in the past at their regular value through March 20. The token plan will be entirely in effect on March 21. Beginning then, processed foods can be purchased only with blue stamps and blue tokens, and meats, fats and oils only with red stamps and red tokens. The blue and red stamps, effective Feb. 27, are valued at 10 points each. All tokens are valued at one point each and will be given for change only when a purchase is made—never more than nine tokens need be given as change in one transaction.

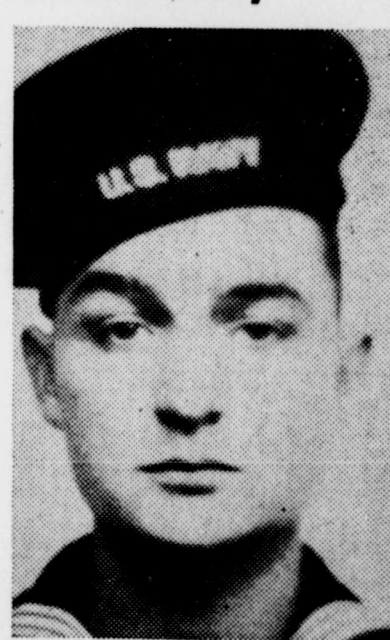
Quota for Hale county is \$14,900, double the 1943 quota, and this community's part in the current drive will be proportionately greater.

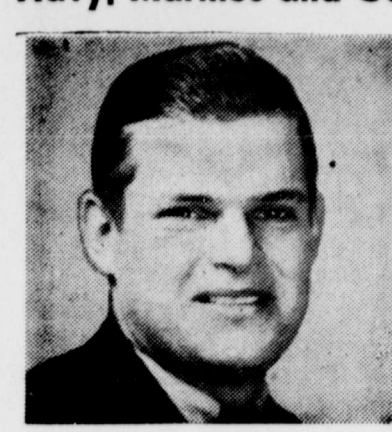

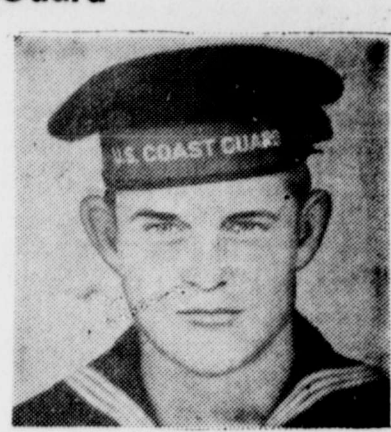

Kelley was the scoring leader of the game, putting 9 points to nose out Sneed, his team mate, who finished with 8, as the pair accounted for 17 of the 19 Idalou points. Hobgood topped the scoring for New Deal with 6 points.

Officials called 11 personals on Idalou and 18 on New Deal and at the final gun had coaches warning up substitutes. New Deal held Idalou to three points in the first 14 minutes of the ball game while piling up the early lead. The score at the end of the first frame was 7-4 and 13-9 at the half. Veterans and members of their families will find much of interest in a radio program prepared by the Veterans Placement Division of the U. S. The program will deal with the many problems of finding suitable work for vets as they are released from the armed services, including mustering out pay, the possibilities of rehabilitation and training and other adjustments that may be necessary as veterans return to civilian life.

Rate of payment for the first three months is 5c per lb. on butterfat and 40c per 100 lbs. on whole milk, and for January, 6c per lb. on butterfat and 50c per 100 lbs. on whole milk.

PRE-INDUCTION QUOTAS FOR HALE COUNTY ENLARGED

Hale county's pre-induction quotas for military service have been increased 40% for February and upped 50% in March. Men are not called for duty until at least 21 days after their pre-induction physical examinations. The increase in pre-induction quotas does not necessarily mean that more men will be called for service in March and April than would have been called under the previous pre-induction quotas, draft board officials state.

Increased pre-induction calls for 126 men instead of 90 Feb. 24, and 220 instead of 147 in March. March calls are for the 9th and 17th, with 94 and 126 respectively. The pre-induction quotas for Negroes was 10 on March 2, but has been increased to 15. The only induction dates now scheduled for Hale county for February is on Saturday when 14 will be inducted in the navy and on the 26th when 6 will be inducted in the army. In March, 24 men are to be inducted in the army on the 24th and 26 men in the navy on the 25th.

We would be lost without them, and we are thanking God that they are standing behind us.

We are slowly, but surely, pushing the Japs north and out of these islands, and some day, in the near future, we can hit at the heart of Japan. Good night. A friend, Cpl. J. D. Upchurch.

Jan. 30, 1944.
Somewhere in New Guinea.
Dear BFD: Well, I hope this finds you and the family fine. I have been doing O. K. ever since I have been over here. I had quite a time coming over on the boat. You know, Buford,

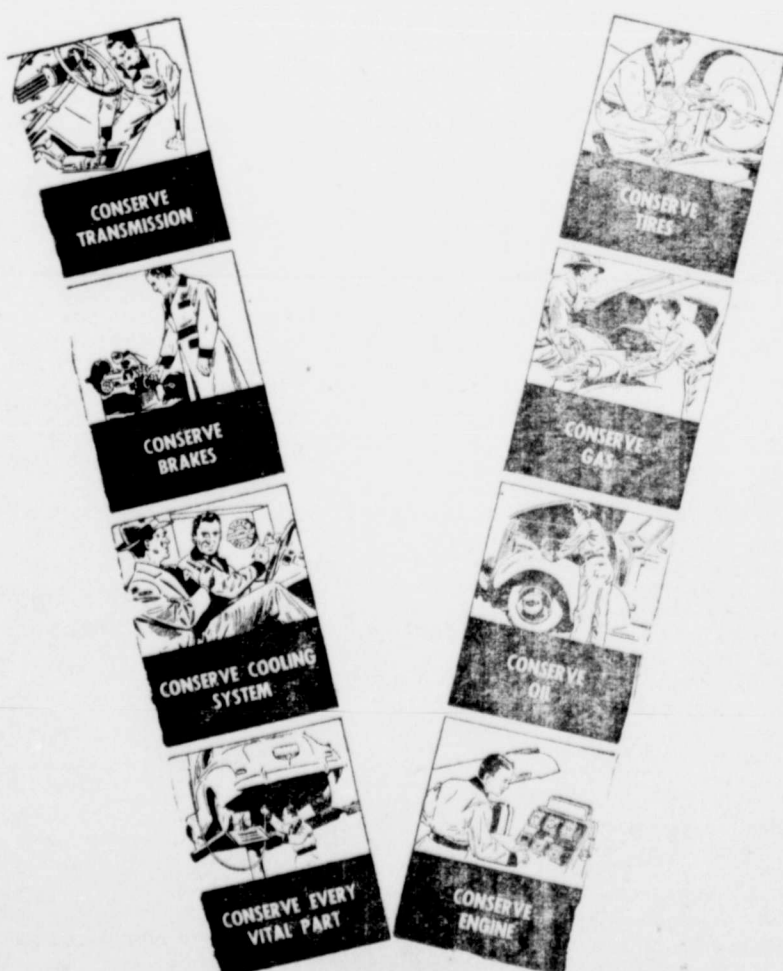

Petersburg theatre, Wednesday and Thursday nights.

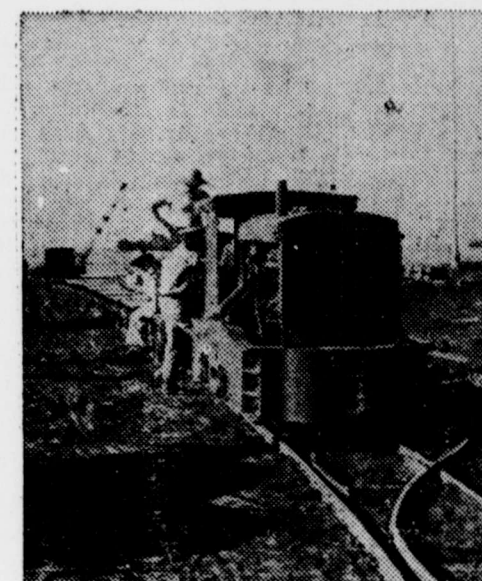
The New Ritz, Hale Center, Friday afternoon and night and Saturday night.
