T/Sgt. Vernon L. Petty, above, informed his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Petty, that he is somewhere in Africa. Printed below are two letters received from him Sunday and Tuesday, respectively.

Vernon, a former employee of Abernathy First State Bank, was graduated from high school here in 1938. He enlisted in the Army July 27, 1940, and was sent to Ft. Bliss, Ky., then to Aberdeen, Md., and back to Ft. Knox. He experienced desert warfare conditions at the Desert Training Center at Camp Young, Indio, Calif., and from there was sent to Ft. Bragg, N. C.

Here are the letters received this week by his parents:

Somewhere in Africa, 12-14-42.

Dearest Mother, Dad & All:
Just a line to let you know I am well and happy. I cannot tell you where I am, but it is not so bad after all. I hope this reaches you by Christmas and wish you the happiest and merriest of all Christmases and the best of New Years. I have written before, but I don't know when you will receive the letters. Give my love to all. Your loving son, Vernon.

Dec. 15, 1942.

Dearest Mother, Dad & All:
I just wrote you the air mail letter yesterday. Guess you will have gotten it by the time you get this one. This leaves me o. k. but a little cold today as it is raining here now. I wish you could see this place I can't tell you anything about it now, but will when I get home. I thought I had seen everything until I arrived in Africa.

I received your letter No. 2 the other day, should be getting some more any day now. But, you know how the mail situation will be.

Mother, I would like to have some cigarettes and some chewing gum. If you will try to send me 1 carton of cigarettes per week and 1 carton of chewing gum every two weeks.

Guess everything is decorated up for Christmas there now. Maybe next year I will be there. Eat lots of turkey for me. We are planning a very nice dinner here, but it won't be like it is at home. I am in charge of the kitchen now as well as working in the office. We are getting good eats all the time.

As soon as possible, I will send some souvenirs home. You will probably have to pay more tax on them than they are worth, but it will be something to keep.

Well, there isn't much to say except to wish all of you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. With love, Vernon.

P. S. Be sure you address your letters to me just as I have put it on the envelope. Tell Andy Reid I will write him soon. V.

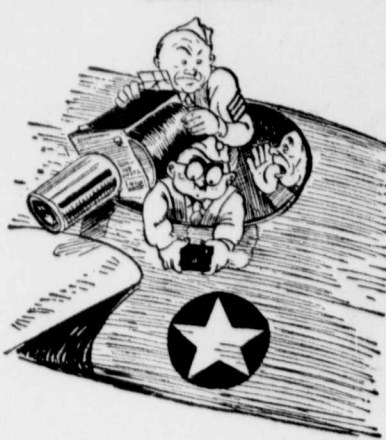
P. S. Have received only one issue of the Review since we got overseas, and boy, do I miss it. I feel sure it'll start getting through soon, tho.
