Bennie Robinson, senior halfback for the Bulldogs, who broke a bone in his leg at the Eastland game, and missed action in the Albany contest, had the cast removed from his injured limb Tuesday but is not expected to see action in the McCamey tilt.

We predict that Jerry Wharton, star halfback and outstanding guard, Tommy Young who was chosen on some of the all-state teams before the season has ended.

Coach Boone Yarbrough, attired in Bermuda shorts, no less, was pictured in the Abilene Reporter-News Tuesday morning, giving advice to his son, Boone Carroll, Jr., an end for the regional contenders.

Ranger's tilt with McCamey Saturday will draw more fans from the Eastland County area than the Albany tilt a week ago. The demand was so much greater this week that reserved tickets were put on sale in Eastland Wednesday morning. Tickets were being sought from a much wider expanse over the county also.

McCamey fans are so partisan that they have contracted a special train for the trip eastward. The choo-choo will depart at 4 a.m. Saturday. Yep, that's 4 o'clock in the morning.

On the junior college grid level, this season has marked the second consecutive year that the Rangers have failed to place at least one squadman on the Pioneer Conference all-loop team.

There seems to be only one possible explanation. The past two seasons, the Ranger have made miserable showings at San Angelo—probably miserable enough that on votes in any one of the teams' members benefitted from a vote from the Ram camp.

At the Pioneer Conference, where there are only five participating teams, each ballot is a big factor in choosing the final eleven members on the all-star squad.

Also, possibly, the Rangers were not quite colorful enough for the remaining coaches in the Pioneer loop. They were not in the habit of passing for long gains, breaking their backs loose for long touchdown runs nor did they utilize the tricky spreads that became so common in the Southwest a few years previously.

But the fact remains that the Rangers did have a couple of outstanding performers, if not more, and we hate to see the Pioneer loop set a record by ignoring the Rangers in their all-star selections at our expense.

# Guard Program Provides For Construction Here

The Army has announced in Washington a \$2,755,800 National Guard Construction program in Texas which provides for a \$35,000 project at the Ranger armory.

Officials in Ranger said that the program calls for a new drill hall to supplement the armory's only building which will be used exclusively for a motor maintenance shop.

The overall building program was revealed by Senator Johnson, a member of the Senate armed services committee. He said that if no committee members object by Dec. 25, the program automatically will be approved.

The proposed projects include Coleman, \$70,000; Weatherford, \$40,000; Bonham, \$40,000; Deatur, \$40,000; Bryan, \$40,000; Waxahachie, \$35,000; Cleburne, \$35,000; Cisco, \$35,000; Breckenridge, \$35,000; Ranger, \$35,000; Taylor, \$35,000; Belton, \$35,000; Hillsboro, \$30,000; and Mineral Wells, \$100,000.

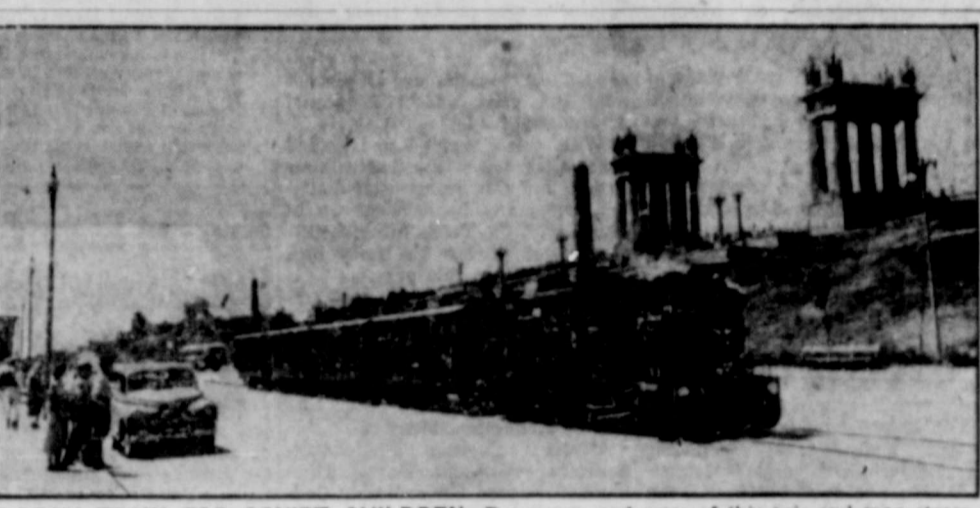
He was born in Ranger March 11, 1882. He moved to Oklahoma in 1909 but returned to live here in 1921. He was a retired farmer.

Rain began falling near midnight Wednesday and began freezing on trees, grass, utility poles and other objects shortly after noon.

The moisture that had fallen today wasn't heavy enough to be of much benefit to small grains but occasional showers have been forecast for today and Friday.

Rain within the city area here totaled .35 inches.

The weather picture in the entire central West Texas area was similar in most cases. Breckenridge had sleet and some rain Wednesday night. A freezing drizzle was falling at Ballinger, a thin blanket of snow covered the ground at Munday and heavy sleet and drizzle was reported at Anson.

Eastland gauged about the same amount of rain that was reported here which likewise was accompanied with sleet and rain. Haswell had a half-inch of snow.

Though the moisture in most cases was light, overcast skies and the weatherman's predictions gave hope of more rain today and Friday.

Snow flurries were reported during the day Wednesday at Childress, Wichita Falls and El Paso. Sleet, mixed with rain fell over most of the entire West Texas area while the clouds furnishing the moisture stretched beyond Tulsa, Oklahoma Thursday morning.

While on a national level, snow storms that had snarled traffic and socked in areas in Michigan and New York dwindled to flurries Wednesday with overcast skies still in sight.

Jamestown, N. D. was the nation's coldest spot with an overnight low of 21 degrees.

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## Career Package For Navy Told By Tompkins

Getting ready for another month of busy activity, Chief Tompkins, of the Navy recruiting station Abilene, Texas, is wrapping a revised "career package."

"The Navy," he said, "is determined to meet its present manpower shortage with an honest career plan for deserving young men and women, and is certain that the majority of future WAVES and bluejackets will be volunteer regulars and not inductees."

Chief Tompkins added that the revised career plan will offer the most attractive list of benefits and advantages ever assembled for the youth of America.

Outlining a few choice parts of his package, the Navy man touched briefly on the increased pay of the Armed Forces, a \$10,000 free life insurance policy, medical benefits for the service person and his dependents, and new Navy procedures for getting the bluejackets or WAVE in the duty location of his choice.

A special inducement to newcomers to the Navy is the aviation-minded fellows, and girls, into that vital echelon of the Navy, and there is even a "Buddy" plan which allows friends to enlist together and remain together throughout their basic training.

Highly enthusiastic about the improved living conditions in the Navy, Chief Tompkins said that the admirals now are putting special emphasis on this department, and that the new ships and shore stations are as close to homelife as human ingenuity can make it. In the educational department,

the Navy is taking the raw material of youth and teaching it to run the tools of a most complex organization, and Navy taught skills have high market value in civilian life.

To wrap the "package" securely, he pointed out that off-the-study courses now take sailor men and women all the way to a college degree, and moral guidance program in the faith of their choice builds the moral fiber of Naval personnel.

Hard at his recruiting task this month, Chief Tompkins said his "sales" campaign offers a product hard to refuse, particularly if the young person has an eye trained to the future.

## Bronze Star To Sgt. Threet Of 49th Gd. Unit

Sgt. Perry L. Threet, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Threet, Rt. 4, Cisco, was recently presented the Bronze Star Medal "for meritorious action against the enemy" in World War II.

The decoration was presented at a ceremony at the Cisco National Guard Armory by Lt. Col. E. L. Wolfe, senior Army advisor for the 49th Armored Division Artillery. Col. Wolfe was a member of the same regiment in the 75th Infantry Division in which Threet served.

The citation issued by the Adjutant General of the Army read in part, "For action against the armed enemy on or about 19 February 1945, while a member of the 290th Infantry Regiment, 75th Infantry Division." The action referred to in the citation was the near disastrous Battle of the Bulge.

Threet was also presented the Army of Occupation Medal for Germany at the same ceremony.

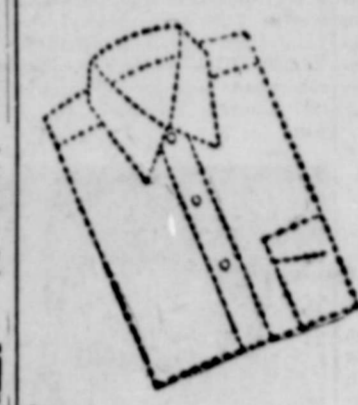
He served in the occupation forces between the VE Day and March 1946.

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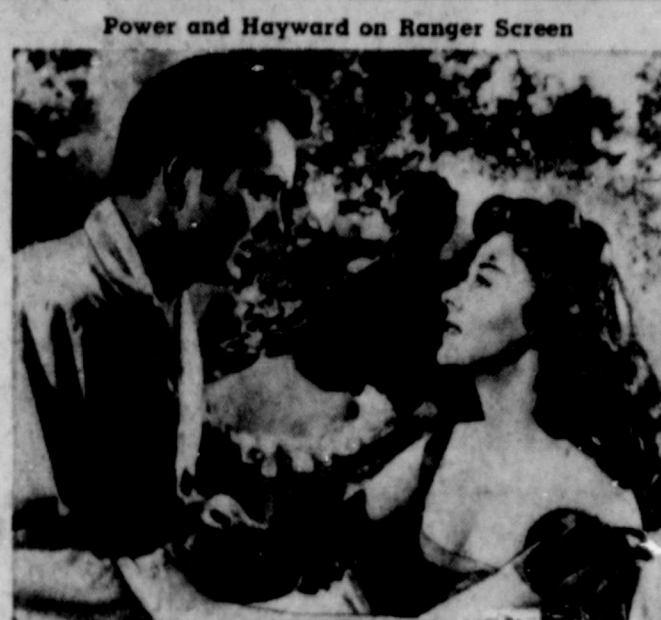
### Sub-Deb Club Holds Meeting

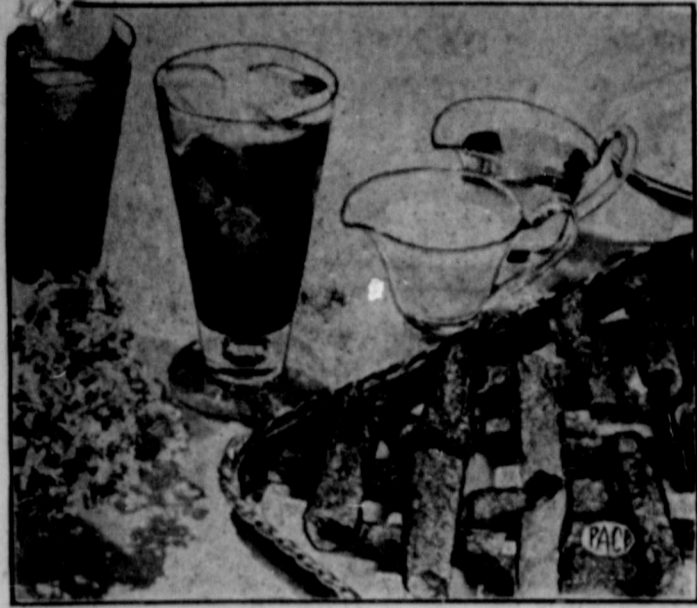

 1 cup sifted instant coffee 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 cup sifted cake flour 1/2 cup molasses  
 1/2 cup shortening

Mix and sift first 4 ingredients. Heat molasses to boiling point. Add shortening and stir until melted. Add flour mixture slowly, stirring constantly. Drop by teaspoons, 3 to 4 inches apart, on greased cookie sheets. Bake in moderate oven, 350° F., 8 to 10 minutes. Let cool about one minute. Remove each wafer with a wide spatula and roll quickly around handle of wooden spoon. Slide off quickly, seam side down, onto a wire rack to cool. If wafers cool too much to roll, return to oven for a minute or two to soften. Makes about four dozen.

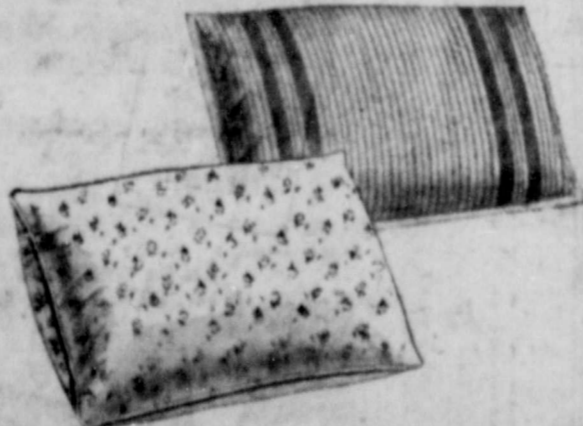

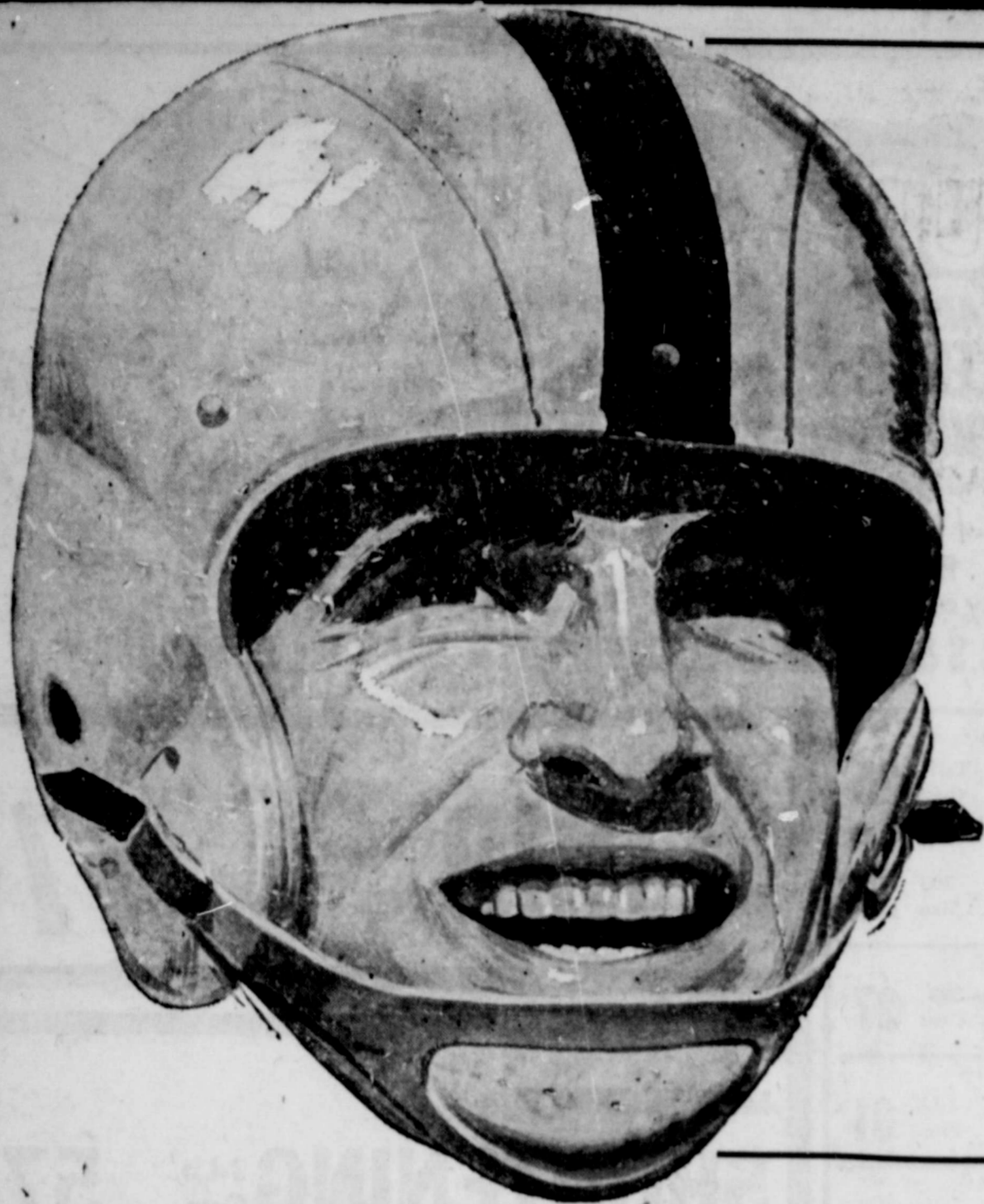

# Yule Mailings Are Growing Steadily; 3 Rules Suggested

Postmaster A. E. Crawley announced today that there has been a steady increase in the flow of Christmas cards and packages through the Post Office the past few days. He said he was glad to see that many people are getting their Christmas gifts for distant points into the mail this week pointing out that packages addressed to folks living in other states should all be mailed before December 5th and those for nearby points before December 10th.

"Packages addressed on one side only" was urgently requested. Stressing the need for everyone to cooperate on his 1955 "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, Postmaster Crawley says that by following these three simple rules, you're certain to have your gifts delivered before Christmas Day: Wrap them securely, address them correctly, and mail them early.

He went on to say, "Of course early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is a big factor in getting everything delivered before Christmas. Keep in mind that careful packing and correct addressing is equally important. Every year many poorly wrapped packages break open despite careful handling and we often have to puzzle over addresses which are

incomplete or simply cannot be read at all."

He urged that patrons ask for free copies of a new publication, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing," now available at the local post office. Advance care in preparing gift packages for the mails and making sure that all addresses are legible and complete will prevent disappointment to sender and receiver alike.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. "The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package from."

Some Post Offices cannot accept packages that are more than 72 inches in combined length, a 4 girth, nor more than 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limits go up to 100 inches in combined length and girth and 70 pounds in weight. It is always better to use corrugated cartons for shipping your gifts especially where there are a number of various sized objects. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper in the cartons for extra protection against shock. Complete each package by wrapping in heavy paper and tying it with strong cord.

As an extra precaution against loss, the Postmaster advised placing both your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped. It was urged: "Don't seal your parcel unless you include a notice reading 'Contents merchandise—may be opened for postal inspection along with your return address and the recipient's address on the mailing label. If you use Christmas stickers or seals put them on the back of your Christmas cards and packages so they will not conflict with the address on the front. Before you release your packages be sure that proper postage is firmly affixed to each. This information can be obtained from another free publication, "Domestic Rates and Fees."

## Plug Back For Area Well Is Being Planned

Lone Star Producing Co. has announced plans to plug back one of their Mississippi lime oil wells a mile north of Cisco and attempt to re-complete it in the Ranger sand. The well, which is in the Kleiner pool, was drilled some five years ago.

The Mississippi producers are about 4,000 feet deep. The Ranger sand in that area is from 3,585 to 3,694 feet. Location of the well—Lone Star's No. 3-A J. E. Kincaid—is 800 feet from the south and 200 feet from the west lines of Section 81, H&TC Survey.
