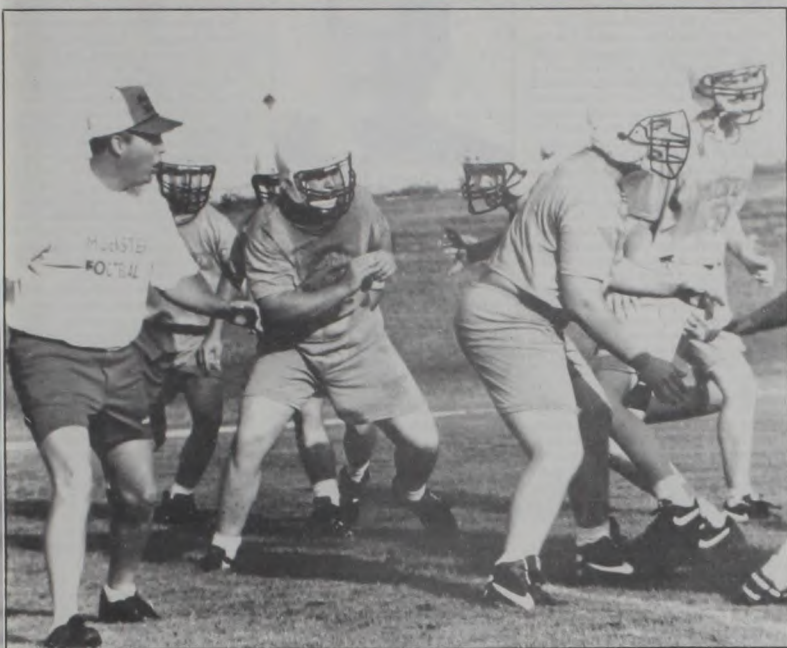

TU presses City to accept rate structure

The Muenster City Council approved the first reading of a new TU Electric rate structure ordinance over the objections of council member Henry Weinzapfel. Vernon Smith, representing the electric utility which currently serves almost all of Muenster, explained that the changes are necessary to offer competitive rates to new or existing commercial/industrial customers.

If approved, TU Electric could offer reduced rates for a limited time to commercial users to keep them from switching to a competing utility or to offer incentive for the business to expand or become more energy efficient. Using reduced rates much like a tax abatement, TU could try to attract new business into their service area. Smith explained that the rate incentive could mean savings for all current customers by allowing them to be more competitive and react to changing market conditions.

Weinzapfel objected to the changeable rates on the basis of equal pricing for electric power for all customers including residential. He argued that if a big customer got reduced rates, someone would have to make up the difference. He wanted to leave the decision to the Public Utility Commission. If Muenster denies the rate change on any of the three readings, TU will automatically appeal to the PUC.

Approval is likely. In addition, most of the municipalities in TU's service area have already approved the plan.

Smith said, "I recently delivered a franchise tax payment of \$71,000.00 to the City of Muenster. Now I'm asking for the opportunity to attract and keep customers." The council approved the first reading by a 4-1 vote.

Continuing their efforts to drill a new water well for Muenster, the council voted to enter into contract negotiations with the engineering firm of Biggs and Mathews of Wichita Falls concerning specifications for a water well and transmission line.

The city will discontinue work with Morris Engineering.

In other discussion or action:

- Purchase of new light bars and siren controls for Muenster police cars was approved.

- Purchase of a used steel wheel packer from Cooke County for \$1,000.00 was approved.

- Discussion was held on working with FEMA and Southtown Partners to establish a 100-year flood plain elevation in the Southtown residential neighborhood. At this time, the actual flood plain elevation is not known. The council approved the project subject to resolution by the City of Muenster.

- The next regular council meeting is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 5, Labor Day.

- A budget workshop is scheduled for Monday, Aug. 15. The budget hearing will be set at that time.

- A rural firefighting contract with Cooke County was approved for \$2,750.00.

- Monthly bills totaling \$58,834.47 were approved for payment.

- The regular meeting was adjourned and the council continued in executive session.

Camp Sweeney provides fun and learning for youngsters

At 6:30 a.m., campers are awakened from their dreams by the sound of a bell tolling. They rub their sleepy eyes as thoughts of the busy day ahead fill their minds. For camp-goers at Camp Sweeney, the three weeks of camp ahead will offer new friendships, a variety of outdoor summer activities, a sense of responsibility and priceless lessons about dealing with diabetes.

"The first summer I came, my mom was really worried about me," said one teenage camper. "Now she's more relaxed."

Camp Sweeney, located eight miles east of Gainesville, started out as a dream for Dr. J. Shirley Sweeney, an endocrinologist originally from Gainesville. But, with determination and vision, Dr. Sweeney convinced Gainesville civic leaders to purchase and turn 340 acres of woodland into a haven for children with diabetes. With the help of volunteers, that 340-acre forest was transformed into a camp that consisted of one lodge and two cabins.

Today, 43 years later, Camp Sweeney has grown into six cabins, a chapel, a pavilion, sport facilities and a camp hospital to accommodate the 378 campers that attend each summer.

There are three, three-week

sessions for children ages 6 to 18. Campers are divided into three groups: juniors, intermediates and seniors. Each group is taught to deal with diabetes according to their ages.

"It's (camp) like a vacation," said

one young boy. "It's three weeks away from our parents, and three weeks for them away from us."

An eight doctor volunteer medical staff is present during the entire 10 weeks of camp. Each doctor must work around his or her

medical practice; some doctors even work extra hours during the winter months so they can take time off for camp during the summer. In exchange for their services, the doctor and family may stay and enjoy the camping facility at no

charge.

The campers' days begin with blood and urine tests. The medical staff at Camp Sweeney examines the tests and makes appropriate changes in the campers' diets, if necessary. Campers give themselves blood sugar tests four times daily under the head counselor's supervision.

Each child is given a daily diet menu. The meals are specially prepared for campers' daily calorie needs. Campers are allowed to exchange a food item that they do not like for a more desirable item, within dietary reason, after grace is said at each meal. Snacks are also given during the day to keep blood sugar levels at a normal rate.

Each day consists of six classes of the camper's choice. Four passive classes and two active classes are required for each camper.

Active classes are sport activities. The activity is team-oriented and is usually held outdoors. Campers may choose baseball, football, canoeing or any of the other 12 active classes offered at Camp Sweeney.

Passive classes give participants a chance to relax a little, be with friends, and learn a new hobby. Passive classes include arts and crafts, drama and music, fishing and many others.

Besides their daily required

classes, attendance is required during medical lectures given by members of the medical staff. Campers are then quizzed at random each night over the medical lecture of that day. If the camper answers correctly, a reward such as sugar-free gum, is given. A wrong answer requires the camper to do a less-desirable task, such as bob for pickles. At the end of the week, all campers must take a test. The highest scorer from each age group wins a watch donated by Quicksilver.

In the afternoon, campers usually spend time fishing or canoeing with their counselors. A counselor is appointed to four campers. As a "big brother" or "big sister," counselors make sure the children follow their daily routine, while developing a personal relationship at the same time. In fact, campers and their counselors usually correspond by mail long after camp is over.

Correspondence to family and friends is done only through the mail. At mail call, campers anxiously receive news from home.

Campers are invited to, and usually do, return summer after summer. Many former campers return to be camp counselors during

Our Failed Haiti Policy: Invasion is not the Answer

I am concerned any time American military men and women are put in harm's way. As I write this, Washington insiders are predicting that President Clinton will mount a U.S. invasion of Haiti soon. In my view, this action would cap a dismal series of Administration policy missteps and reversals. In short, the Clinton Administration is on the brink of a disastrous decision.

Just how did we get into this mess? In June 1993, the United Nations imposed economic sanctions on Haiti after their military prevented the country's first democratically-elected president, Jean-Bertrand Aristide, from taking power. Under pressure from the Congressional Black Caucus, the Clinton Administration vowed to return Aristide to his presidency. One year later, after a string of failed policies and idle threats, President Clinton has made no progress on his promise.

Our president would do well to heed the lessons of history. In 1915, under the pretense of creating a democracy, Woodrow Wilson ordered U.S. troops into an unstable Haiti to teach Haitians how "to elect good men." What was supposed to be a quick round trip for the Marines

lasted 19 years — the longest occupation in our history. Tragically, 15 Americans were killed in the process.

A repeat of this debacle is not the answer to Haiti's current instability. So what should we do? We should lift the economic sanctions that have been so destructive to the poor and middle class people we want to help. In return for lifting the sanctions there should be a new, internationally-monitored election for the people of Haiti. Most important, we should use all diplomatic and economic means available to cripple Haiti's current military regime — without committing American troops.

It is no wonder two out of every three Americans oppose a U.S. invasion of Haiti. It is not the role of the United States to risk the lives of its soldiers in each and every regional conflict or civil war that may arise. I am not prepared to spill one drop of American blood in a situation that does not pose a threat to our national security. Period.

After winning the Cold War, it is now more important than ever that the United States stakes out a principled, consistent position in the international arena. Unfortunately, our Administration is increasingly portrayed as having little interest in, and even less resolve for, a strong and coherent foreign policy.

Before the Administration risks the lives of American men and women, a military action should pass one important test: President Clinton must be ready to look into the eyes of our troops' families and solemnly tell them that their sons or daughters died in the best interests of their country.

An invasion of Haiti does not come close to meeting this test. It is for this reason that I strongly oppose the widely-expected invasion. I'm confident that if the Clinton Administration exhausts all economic and diplomatic means, then jeopardizing the lives of American men and women will not be necessary.

Latest unemployment rates released

Cooke County's unemployment rate rose for the second consecutive month, according to the latest employment statistics released this week by the Texas Employment Commission in Austin.

Cooke County's unemployment rate for June was 5.8 percent, a half percent jump over the 5.3 percent rate for May. The rate was also an increase over April's rate of 5.1 percent.

For the month of June, the Cooke County civilian work force was 15,405, with 14,510 employed and 895 unemployed for the 5.8 percent rate. That compares to May's statistics which reported a total of

15,241 people in the civilian work force with 14,430 employed and 811 unemployed for the 5.3 percent rate.

Despite the June rise in unemployment, Cooke County's rate remains below that of two of its neighboring counties. All neighboring counties reported a jump in their unemployment rates from the preceding month. June is typically a month when more people join the labor force looking for summer jobs.

For the same reporting period, Montague County had an unemployment rate of 6.9 percent, compared to a jump from 6 percent

in May. Grayson County's unemployment rate for June was 6.8 percent, a jump from 6.3 percent for May. Wise County's June rate was 5.6 percent, compared to a May rate of 4.7 percent. Denton County retains the healthiest unemployment rate in the area, reporting a June rate of 4.8 percent, compared to 4 percent in May.

The monthly employment figures calculated by the TEC in Austin is based on a 40-step analysis to determine the unemployment rates for the 254 Texas counties. A heavy emphasis is placed on the number of unemployment insurance claims that were filed during the month.

Haywood says Carriker living in void

Citing an article in the Austin American Statesman on July 26, 1994, Tom Haywood, GOP candidate for Texas Senate, blasted his opponent for not supporting an ethics bill in the last legislative session.

"My opponent's ethical void is exemplified by his opposition to a

simple bill that would have prohibited state legislators from representing clients before the very state agencies whose budgets they control. Typical of Mr. Carriker is his response to the public that if we would only pay our legislators more money, they wouldn't have to do unethical things. He's got it

backwards," Haywood said. The statesman article explained a common practice where state legislators represent for pay private business interest in hearings before state agencies. The practice 'smacks of intimidation,' said State Senator Teel Bivins, author of the legislation that was defeated.

He was born on May 22, 1905 in Teutopolis, Illinois to Fred and Anna (Schumacher) Hoedebeck. On April 23, 1931, he married Marie Theresa Yosten in Tishomingo, Oklahoma in St. Anthony's Catholic Church.

Legislative leaders look to budget savings to buy school books

Legislative leaders will look to a second round of budget savings Thursday to buy school books on the State Board of Education's top priority list for the new school year.

The plan was worked out by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Chairman of the Legislative Budget Board and House Speaker Pete Laney, Vice-Chairman of the LBB.

The Budget Board is expected to come up with \$11.8 million of \$28.8 million needed for new high school math and elementary science books and readers previously delayed until the 1996 budget. A new high school business law book also is included. The \$11.8 million transfer will come from the State Treasurer's unclaimed money fund. The \$17 million balance will be paid with a deficiency grant levied by the Governor from the Available School Fund.

During legislative budget hearings in 1993, TEA initially estimated \$365 million was needed for textbooks. Due to statewide budget constraints, TEA agreed to a reduced request of \$270.3 million, telling the Legislature that the purchase of the additional books

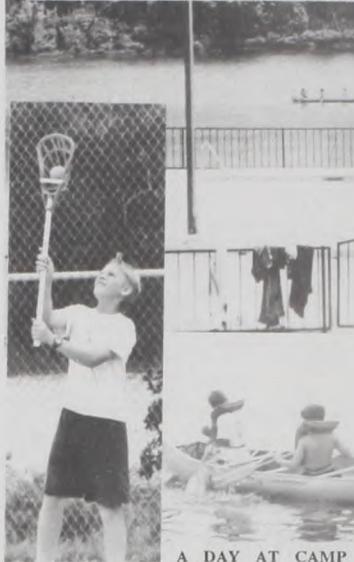
could wait. "There has never been any doubt that Texas schoolchildren need and deserve all of the resources the state can muster," Bullock said. "The Budget Board's action will reinforce the legislature's commitment to public education."

The new \$28.8 million purchase will cover books from the education board's top priority list that can be delivered to students by the fall semester.

"It is of the utmost importance for schoolchildren to be able to take their textbooks home at night to study," Laney said. "It was never the intention of the Legislature to have it any other way."

TEA recently purchased \$5 million worth of seventh grade science books for classroom use. Part of the additional money will provide individual books for science students in each class. The rest will pay for the other top priority texts.

The \$28.8 million in new funds will bring to \$299.1 million the total given the Texas Education Agency for books in the current budget cycle.

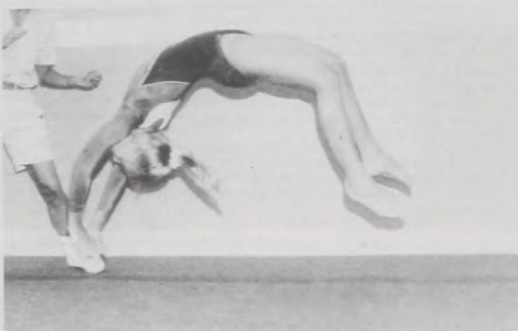
GRADY ROLLER, head coach for the Muenster Hornets, works with the offensive and defensive ends.

"Play execution should be a strength with a 4th year starter," commented Coach Nasche. "Jason threw for 1,451 yards last season." Nine hundred of those yards went to returning receivers Neil Berres, John Klement and Scott Frost.

Returning starters for the offensive back field will be Hess, Berres and Frost. Two solid returning performers, tackle Mike Schilling and center Toby Hess will lead Sacred Heart on the line. The Tiger coach said the other 3 positions are still wide open, depending on who steps in.

Sacred Heart's strength will be in their team speed. "After a good track season, the boys are a quicker, faster team," said Nasche. "Our big weakness has been giving up the big plays because we were slow. Now we will be able to run with our opponent and not let them by."

With all their skilled players returning, Nasche also sees the passing game as a strength. Again the Tigers weakness will be their size and numbers. The Tigers now have 4 seniors on the team - Jason Hess, Neil Berres, Mike Schilling and Todd Johnson.

Sacred Heart's opening game will be Friday Sept. 2 with Savoy after scrimmaging Windthorst and Notre Dame the two weeks before.

MOSS LAKE: Water clear, normal level; black bass are fairly good; catfish are good.

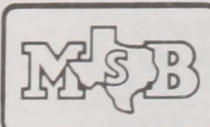
RAY ROBERTS: Water clearing, 83 degrees, 5 feet low; black bass are good to 8 pounds on Bumper Stumper buzz baits in shallow water near the flooded grass; white bass are good in the creek channels near the trees and over brush in 12-18 feet of water on minnows; catfish are good on shrimp and minnows.

TEXOMA: Water clear, 81 degrees, normal level; black bass are fair to 8-1/4 pounds early and late with the largest fish caught on Power worms after dark; white bass are good on small spoons and slabs with some topwater action on popping corks; striped are good to 13 pounds on slabs, topwaters and live baits in deep water suspended at 30 feet; crappie are fair in 15-20 feet of water; catfish are good from the banks on blood bait, night crawlers and shrimp.
