Funeral Rites For Earle McCreary To Be Held Friday

Funeral services will be held for Earle McCreary, 45, at 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon from the First Baptist church. Rev. Miles B. Hays, pastor will officiate. He will be assisted by Rev. C. W. Thomas, pastor of the First Methodist church.

Mr. McCreary had been in bad health for about six months. He had been seriously ill for several weeks and was brought to his home here Monday morning from the Baylor hospital in Dallas where doctors had diagnosed his

illness as sleeping sickness. His death was sudden and unexpected.

Mr. McCreary came to Burkburnett from Lott, Texas, twenty-two years ago. He worked for R. H. Henry & Co., until about fifteen years ago when he established his own grocery store. He was operating a suburban store at the intersection of Avenue D and Magnolia street at the time of his death.

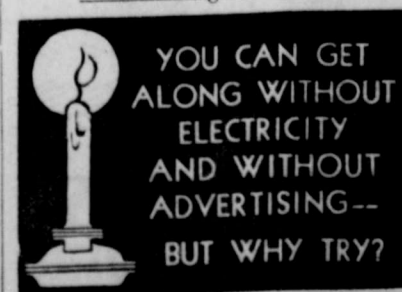
Lions Heard Rev. O. D. Dial

Wichita Man Given High Office In Shrinedom

Baltimore, June 28—Shrinedom installed a 6-foot, 210-pound Texan as its imperial potentate today, and started a 50-year-old Philadelphia publisher along the 12-year climb to the same office.

Husky Walter D. Cline, oil operator and former mayor of Wichita Falls, Texas, succeeded A. A. D. Rahn of Minneapolis, as ruler of some 300,000 fun-loving nobles of Masonry, climaxing business sessions of the annual convention. Memphis, Tenn., won the 1940 meeting.

For imperial outer guard, lowest-ranking official in the national council, the nobles picked William Heim, potentate of Philadelphia's Lu Lu temple. He defeated Harold Lloyd, screen comedian, and John Zink, of Baltimore, director-general of the convention.

All Shrine imperial officers move up automatically each year, with the outer guard the only office open to election. George F. Olendorf, of Springfield, Mo., became deputy imperial potentate succeeding Cline, and becomes imperial potentate in 1940.

Heim will succeed to the highest office in 1951.

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**OBJECT LESSON**

"Take a drive up the river highway," says the Peoria, Illinois Star, "and you can get an object lesson of one of the reasons why railroads are being driven into bankruptcy. The railway has a small army of men engaged in laying new steel . . . These men draw wages. This steel costs money and gives employment in the mills. The railroad owns this right of way and whenever a rail wears out must replace it, at its own expense.

"This right of way is taxed for the benefit of the county, for the city, for its schools and for town government.

"En route you pass a bus or monster truck . . . It travels over a right of way owned by the state and built with the money of motorists. This right of way contributes no taxes. When the trucks wear it out the state replaces it at public expense.

"Come into the city again. The railroad has a depot, and tracks leading to it. It owns both and it pays taxes on them. The bus company on the contrary rents a room and the city furnishes parking facilities on pavement paid for by the residents.

"This same situation could be multiplied a thousand times. It shows one of the handicaps under which the railroads are operating."

As the Peoria Star observes, we need buses and trucks, even as we do railroads. No one advocates legislation which would put the motor carriers out of business, or unfairly burden them in any way. But every student of the transportation problem realizes the need of laws which will treat all carriers equitably, favoring none and penalizing none. If one carrier is to be subsidized, directly or indirectly, all should be. Or all should be forced to stand on their own economic feet, and pay all their costs of operation, honestly computed.

Every citizen is interested in the taxes railways pay and the jobs and orders they create. Present inequitable transportation regulation and taxation harms us all.

SUDDEN DEATH

A curly-haired innocent little girl of 8 years was crossing a street in a Texas metropolis. She was skipping along with a bottle of milk for her breakfast and came to a dangerous intersection. The city's traffic police had placed a warning sign there. Autoists were supposed to look each way before coming into the street.

But a young motorist, intent upon reaching an unimportant objective further down the street, thoughtlessly entered this intersection — at the wrong moment — and without looking.

His automobile felled the innocent little girl. A tragic death ensued, a family was thrown into mourning — and all because a young motorist was not safety conscious.

In public school he had not received an auxiliary course in safe driving — and the golden rule of conduct had not been properly impressed upon him. His own life was blighted with the dreadful memory of his thoughtless accident.

"Driver's license laws must be strengthened," Pierce Brooks of Dallas, President of the Texas Safety Council, said in discussing this tragedy. "Responsibility of drivers must be impressed upon the young man and woman of high school age. The great responsibility that is theirs when they are behind the wheel of the modern powerful automobile must be impressed vividly upon them. This year 2,000 Texans will die from automobile accidents. All these could be averted. A large proportion of them will be innocent children."

Driver's license laws should be uniform in all the States and their revocation should be for thoughtless driving, speeding, drinking of operating cars without adequate brakes, tires and lights.

Mr. Bice is receiving scores of letters daily from highly enthusiastic users of the new product. Each letter praises the spray for its deadly effect, ease of application and cleanliness. The new spray is applied with a spray gun onto the body of the animal or poultry and reports disclose that insect pests are killed within three days.

It is quite an improvement over the old vat dipping process and is more economical, since a three-gallon spray gun will treat as high as 2,000 head of sheep and goats an hour. The spray is odorless, colorless, and harmless to persons, livestock and poultry. It has also been reported that goats treated with "Tic-Ded" produce hair weighing a little over one-half pound more than those of other treatment.

SPEEDING UP VITAMIN TESTS



St. Louis, Mo.—The "man in white" has triumphed again. Biologist and research chemist have joined forces with electrical science to produce a new laboratory instrument that measures, to the millionth of a gram, the amount of vitamin A (Carotene) in feedstuffs for poultry and livestock.

"Vitamin A" is essential to the healthful existence of man, bird and animal," says Lamar M. Kishlar, manager of Research for Purina Mills. It is known as a resistance builder. It helps the body to function normally and resist certain types of disease.

"For years after the discovery of the importance of this vital element in poultry and animal nutrition, the only way to measure the Vitamin A (Carotene) content of feedstuffs was by actual feeding tests on

"But now after many years a speeding up process in vitamin testing has been developed in the Purina Agricultural Research Laboratories. 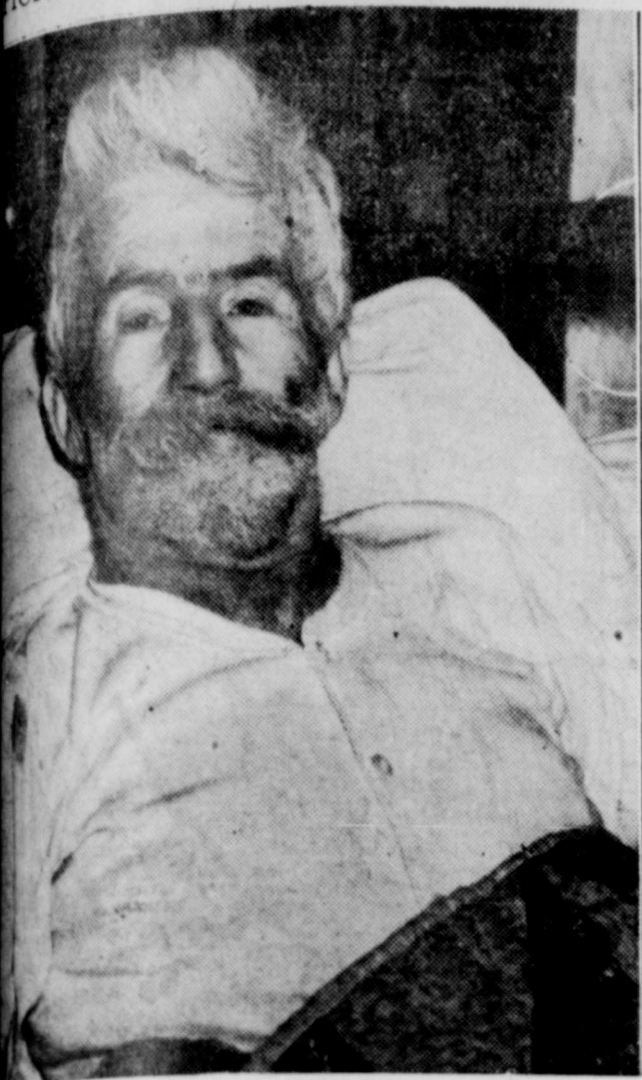

'Fair Trade' Bill Author Attacks Ruling By Mann

San Antonio, June 28—Action of Attorney General Gerald Mann in declaring his fair-trade bill "invalid" today was branded as absurd, ridiculous and "absolutely goofy," by Bexar county's State Senator J. Franklin Spears.

The bill, under provisions of which manufacturers would contract with retailers to maintain minimum prices on trade marked products aroused a bitter controversy in the legislature.

It was sponsored by Senator Spears.

Since the legislature is no longer in session, there is nothing more that can be done about the measure should Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel choose to veto it at this time, Spears pointed out.

The opinion was requested by the governor, who has been studying the bill since its passage.

All In Readiness for Stamford Rodeo

Graying cowhands who pioneered the development of the west, sun-browned cowboys just in from the spring round-ups on Texas ranches, eager tender feet from all over Texas and likely from half the rest of the states of the Union are making preparations to be in Stamford Monday for the opening of the Tenth Annual Cowboy Reunion.

And Stamford, after weeks of preparation, is ready to receive the crowds, which based upon previous attendance records, will likely number 65,000 to 70,000 for the three days, July 3, 4 and 5. The Reunion is rated as the largest gathering of cowboys in the world.

One of the highlights of the opening day will be the grand parade, "which gets under way at 11 a. m. In the procession will be several hundred cowboys, cowgirl sponsors and other horseback riders, chuck wagons, an old stage coach, seven bands from neighboring towns, decorated floats and individual entries. The procession will be headed by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel and other distinguished visitors, expected to include Paul Whitman, Judge Jas. V. Allred, Lieutenant Governor Coke Stevenson and Amon G. Carter.

Beginning with the matinee at 8 o'clock Monday morning, three performances of cowboy rodeo will be held each day. Afternoon show is at 2 o'clock and night performance at 8. Some 300 cowboys will likely compete in the contests in riding and roping and the special cutting-horse contest and calf-roping for oldtime cowboys. Fifty or more girls will compete in the cowgirl sponsors' contest. Prizes amounting to \$2,600 are offered.

Square dances will be held each night at the new Roundup building, which is just being completed. Sponsors' dances will be held at the sponsors' pavilion above the exhibit hall every night. The annual old fiddlers' contest will be held at the cowboy bunkhouse at 8:30 a. m. July 5 and is free entertainment.

Gossett Urges Hardin College As Pilot Site

Washington, June 28—Representative Ed Gossett conferred with chairman Robert H. Hinkley of the civil aeronautics authority again today to urge that Hardin Junior college of Wichita Falls be one of those schools selected for a student pilot training course. Gossett has discussed this with CAA officials previously and has been assured that the college will be considered.

He said Hinkley told him no further plans are being made until congress passes an appropriation for the program, but that when the money is available and the time comes for drafting the new program and selecting schools the request of Hardin Junior college will be given a hearing.

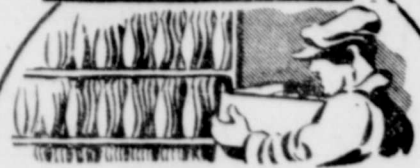

MAHATMA GANDHI

The World's Best Known Man Carries False Teeth In His Loin Cloth

Every so often, out in India, a little brown man, wearing a loin cloth, lays himself down on a cot, refuses to eat, and threatens to fast until he dies. The newspapers all over the world feature the story because Mahatma Gandhi is one of the leading figures of this generation.

Reckoned in terms of money, Gandhi is a poor man. If he sold all his earthly possessions, they probably would not bring him seventy-five cents; yet he is more powerful than any millionaire on earth.

Physically, he is weak; and he refuses to use force or violence; yet his teachings and his spiritual influence are more potent and powerful than a hundred battle-ships of England.

One person out of every six on earth lives in India. And for centuries, these people of India have been asleep; now this little frail man, who weighs less than a hundred pounds is arousing India to a sense of its own gigantic power. He is instituting reforms that may have far-reaching effects on the history of the world.

There are many curious things about Gandhi. For example, he has a set of false teeth, which he carries in the fold of his loin cloth. He puts them in his mouth only when he wants to eat. After his meal, he takes them out, washes them and puts them back again in his loin cloth.

He speaks English with an Irish accent, for one of his first teachers was an Irishman. He wears nothing but a loin cloth now, but for years he lived in London and wore a silk hat and spats and carried a cane.

He was educated at London University and became an attorney. But the first time he attempted to make a speech in

court, his knees trembled, and he was so frightened that he had to sit down in confusion and defeat. As a lawyer in London he got nowhere at all. He was practically a failure there.

Years before, when he first came to England, his Irish teacher made him copy the Sermon on the Mount, over and over again, purely as an exercise. In English, Hour after hour, Gandhi wrote, "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. . . . Blessed are the peace-makers for they shall be called the children of God." and these words made a profound impression on him.

Presently he was sent to South Africa to collect some huge debts; and he tried to apply there the philosophy of the Sermon on the Mount. And it worked. Clients flocked to M. H. Gandhi because he settled their claims peacefully out of court and saved them time and expense. Gandhi soon had an income of fifteen thousand dollars a year. The meek was inheriting the earth.

But was he happy? No. Because he knew that untold millions of his fellow countrymen were living in misery. He had seen thousands die of starvation and world-wide success seemed cheap and unimportant. So he gave up all his money, and took the vow of poverty, and since that time, he has consecrated his life to helping the poor and the downtrodden.

Millions regard Mahatma Gandhi as a saint. Others believe that he is the reincarnation of a Hindu god. In a world filled with sordid greed and selfishness, I, for one, feel like standing with bowed head before this man who is seeking nothing for himself but is willing to die in order that others may live.

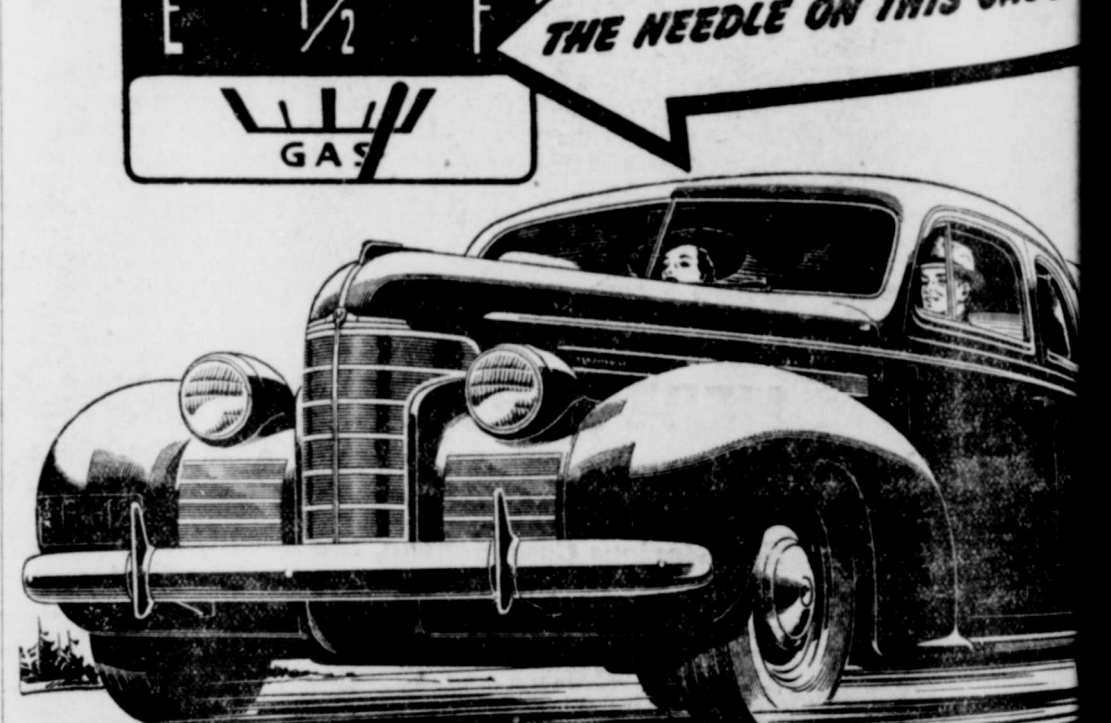

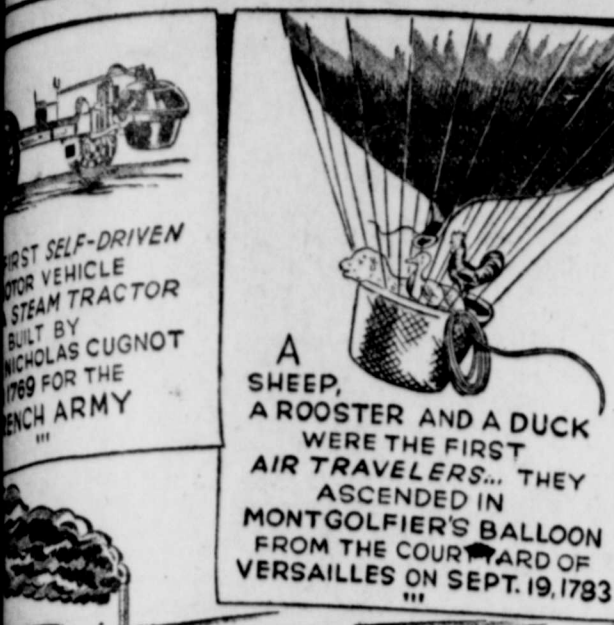

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

PICTURING FLOWERS



Beautiful flower close-ups, such as this, are easy to take if you follow a few simple rules.

IN EARLY summer, our attention naturally turns to flower pictures. Few camera subjects are more pleasing, and good flower pictures are not difficult to take, provided you observe a few simple rules.

Any camera may be used for picturing flowers, but a focusing model with anastigmat lens is preferable. With a box camera or set-focus folding camera, you will need a portrait attachment. Slip this on your lens, and you can take pictures with the camera only about three feet from the subject. The attachment is also useful for more extreme close-ups with a focusing camera.

Plain backgrounds are attractive in flower pictures. Use sheets of cardboard, white, gray, or black, which you can obtain inexpensively at most printing shops or stationery stores. The card is placed behind the flowers you select for a picture. It should be of the correct shade to afford pleasing contrast.

Flower pictures should be taken during the two hours after sunrise, and the two hours before sunset. Sunlight is soft and pleasing at these hours, but around mid-day it is too harsh for pictures of delicate blooms.

Use a small lens opening for flower

"close-ups," and make sure the distance between subject and camera is correct. Film of the panchromatic type is preferable for picturing flowers, especially if they are brightly colored. You can use either a high-speed "pan" film or a fine-grained type. The high-speed film enables you to make shorter exposures, while the fine-grained film yields enlargements of superb quality.

Exposure should be ample, rather than too short. With high-speed film, try 1/25-second shutter speed at lens opening f.16. With fine-grained film, try 1/10 second at f.11, or 1/25 second at f.8. For box-camera pictures, the high-speed film is preferable. Use a firm camera support, such as a box or chair, for any shutter speed longer than 1/25 second.

Generally, your camera should be placed or held at about the level of the flower. Light should come from the side, as this emphasizes the shape of the bloom. Take care that direct light rays do not strike the camera lens.

Try to build up an album of flower pictures this summer. Practice makes perfect, and with experience you can produce splendid results—well worth your while.
