Austin. — State Health Department's new and unique Drug Abuse Program promises statewide health services that are not now available in dealing with the dope menace.

Program was outlined by a Health Department official at a recent hearing of the House Committee to Study Psychiatric Problems of Youth.

It will be carried out in three steps, offering laboratory services, clinics and an over-view of health factors in the drug area.

Initial action calls for setting up facilities next year in Nueces, Bexar, El Paso, Bowie, Webb and Lubbock Counties (serving 1.7 million people). Beginning in 1972, the program will be established statewide. Cost may be three to five million dollars for the second year period, \$1.2 million for the initial pilot program.

Laboratory services will provide surveillance of drug-abuse patients and detect those needing treatment. Department proposes urine tests of patients to determine if illicit drugs still are being used.

Second stage calls for statewide clinics, especially for the median age 19 group, and informational workshops mostly conducted in schools.

Continual study will use computers to correlate facts from the viewpoint of health personnel who deal with the problem daily.

Department believes the program will fill these three basic needs not presently available and without which little chance exists for success in drug abuse control.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court, following the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, rejected the plea of La Raza Unida party for mandamus directing that its 15 local candidates be placed on the November 3 ballot in Dimmitt, LaSalle and Zavala Counties. Party already has won a place on the ballot in Hidalgo County and will go to federal court to continue its appeal in the other three.

Austin district judge refused to lift restrictions against the Alcoholic Beverage Commission's enforcing the stringent guest rule covering private bottle clubs pending clubs' appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Landowners who oppose building a new University of Texas branch at Odessa filed notice of appeal after District Judge Herman Jones threw out their suit on September 17.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin used General Motors, Ford and Chrysler, claiming they conspired to fix prices and eliminate competition in bids on vehicle purchases for governmental units in Texas.

Martin turned an additional 13,744 to the state in anti-trust recovery from the Brass Mill Tube and Pipe case. Recovery now totals \$11,345.

POLLUTION BOOK RELEASED — Attorney General Martin released copies of an 188-page booklet on the principal pollution laws of Texas, for the guidance of local governments.

Booklet contains regulations governing water, air, oil and solid waste pollution, together with "how to do it" suggestions for preparing a pollution suit and exchanging information with state agencies.

Martin said he hopes the publication will provide closer cooperation between local units of government, the attorney general's office, the Texas Water Quality Board and the Texas Air Control Board.

DRAFT PRIORITY SET — Men whose draft lottery numbers were called by local draft boards in 1970, but who were not ordered for induction, will be the top priority group for calls in the first quarter of 1971.

State Selective Service issued the announcement, as did the White House and national draft headquarters.

First quarter draft calls will go to the carry-overs. If calls do not require all of them, they will be placed in a lower priority. Those whose numbers have not been reached all during the year will be placed in the lower priority group on January 1.

National Selective Service chief said that exposure is limited in keeping with the "12 month draft vulnerability policy."

SMITH HITS REPAIR COSTS Governor Smith called for legislative study of "excessive" auto repair charges.

He said he supports the Democratic platform plank on insurance which includes regulation of holding companies, requiring mandatory pooling for fire and windstorm protection in areas subject to catastrophe, and consideration of investment income in fixing the auto insurance rate base.

"The public cannot be long protected by regulated insurance rates, if there is no regulation direct or indirect of automobile rates," added the governor.

He also announced his support of group auto insurance coverage.

DINOSAURS "HOME" — A symbolic dinosaur family "returned home" amid ceremonies at Dinosaur Valley State Scenic Park in Somervell County.

Governor Smith joined representatives of the Atlantic Richfield Company, the National Park Service and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to formally accept for the park life-size replicas of 70-foot brontosaurus, 50-foot tyrannosaurus rex and two baby brontosaurus with simulated eggs.

SHORT SNORTS House Committee on Charitable Trusts heard criticism aimed at the \$400 million Moody Foundation.

Corpus Christi State School now has resumed operation following Hurricane Celia damages. More than 1,000 are expected here on October 15 for the Governor's Conference on Industrial Expansion.

State Democratic Committee, concerned over Republican organization efforts, held an emergency meeting here to map a giant voter registration campaign.

There's no statistical certainty that the worst of the business slowdown is over, reports the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Parks and Wildlife Department reports a good year in prospect for hunters, although the disappointing white-wing dove season in the Rio Grande Valley is history.

Talco - Bogata Board Meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session on Tuesday, Oct. 6, 1970 at 8:00 p. m. at the Johnstown Vocational School. The vocational teachers, Morris Trimm, L. P. Taylor, Craig Ingram, and Kenneth Pirtle, conducted the Board on a tour of these facilities and gave brief descriptions of the various vocational programs.

Previous meetings of the Board have been held on the campuses of the Bogata and Talco Schools for the purpose of inspecting these facilities. The Board feels that by meeting on the various campuses that they have a much better knowledge as to the overall condition and needs of each school building.

At the request of the City Council of Bogata, the Board agreed to make the school tax roll information for the city of Bogata available to the Council for the purpose of establishing values for city property in Bogata.

The superintendent reported that the drive and walk-ways on the Bogata campus have been completed with only minor road work in front of the junior high building still under construction. As soon as sufficient bids are received, plans are to construct a cover over the various walks from each of the buildings on the campus to the cafeteria.

It was also reported that work has begun on the all-weather track to be built on the Rivercrest campus but work has been delayed temporarily because of wet conditions.

There was a brief discussion of the feasibility of combining the junior high football teams of Bogata and Talco for the 1971-72 school year. It was mentioned that the Talco-Bogata School is the only school in our football district with two separate junior high teams making it necessary to compete with some districts larger than ours who have only one junior high team. A number of other advantages as well as the disadvantages were discussed. The average daily attendance of the school district for the last six weeks was 799 as compared to 806 at this same time the previous year.

In other business, the Board approved the bills to be paid and accepted the reports of the cafeteria and tax assessor-collector. Approval was also given to investing \$12,000 from the Building Fund and \$11,000 from the Interest & Sinking Fund in 90 day certificates of deposit.

Archery Deer Season Open

Oct. 1 marked the first day of the first archery season for deer in Titus County. The archery season will continue through October 17. Hunting hours are from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset. Limit for the season is one buck deer only.

No gun will be allowed in possession of the hunter while archery hunting. If the hunter kills a deer in Titus County during archery season, he is not allowed to kill a deer in Titus County during the regular season.

The state limit is two deer, so one deer may be killed in some other county other than Titus County.

Regular deer season will open in Titus County Nov. 14, according to Jesse May, Texas Parks and Wildlife representative in Mt. Pleasant.

If the hunter has not already killed a deer in the archery season, the limit is one buck deer.

Rebels Beaten By New Boston

The Lions of New Boston, after a slow start, came down hard and heavy at New Boston Friday night on the Rivercrest Rebels as the Lions roared to an impressive 24-12 win.

The Lions took the opening kickoff and promptly fumbled the ball away on the first play from scrimmage. The Rebels moved the ball down to the Lions own five-yard line before returning the favor on a fumble.

The Lions managed to move out to their 30-yard line before being forced to punt.

The Rebels took the ball on the Lion 48-yard line and managed to move to the 20-yard line before giving the ball up on downs.

The Lions again fumbled the ball away to the Rebels on the next series of downs. Fine running plays by the Rebels resulted in six points as halfback Willie Simpson took the ball over from the 5-yard line. The kick for the extra points missed the mark.

New Boston took the kickoff and gained short yardage on ground plays. On third down, quarterback Mudrock dropped the big bomb to halfback John Gladney for 69 yards and the score. Extra point attempt failed.

The Lions scored again after a 70 yard march and at halftime the score was Rivercrest 6, New Boston 12.

After a no-gain ground play, Rebel quarterback Troy Brown lofted the ball to Larry Harville for the touchdown. The kick for extra point sailed wide and the score was tied 12-12 with 5:50 left in the third quarter.

A determined Lion offense took the Rebel kickoff and ground out 70 tough yards for the go-ahead score with Murdock reaching paydirt on a one-yard plunge. The two-point conversion play, a pass from Mudrock to Gladney, failed. With one minute left in the third quarter the score stood New Boston 18, Rivercrest 12.

After the Lions kickoff Rivercrest failed to get a first down. Once again the Lions began to grind out good yardage on the ground. Murdock caught the defense looking for another running play and flipped a 13 yard pass to halfback Terry Barber to put the icing on the cake. The point after touchdown kick failed.

Rivercrest, now 1-3 for the season, takes on Jefferson this week at Rivercrest.

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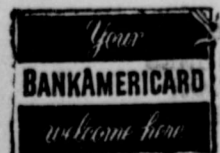
