Chambers to Retire

In January, 1928, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde (Dick) Chambers left their home in Omaha for a 30-day visit in Burkburnett with her sick mother.

And they are still here. It hasn't all been a visit, as the Chambers settled down to make their home here, raise a daughter, and to become an integral part of the community.

On the first of February, Chambers will enter semi-retirement after 27 years and one month as Burkburnett City tax assessor-collector.

Plenty of water has gone under the bridge in that time, and Chambers has seen many changes evolve in the city.

For instance, the total tax valuation of Burkburnett was a paltry \$858,000 when he took over the office.

Today, property on the tax rolls is valued at \$10,095,000.

All of this growth has come from new construction during those 27 years, as the city grew slowly but solidly.

The tax rate, \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, is still the same, although it was reduced to \$1.25 for a three-year period.

Chambers has served under 10 city managers, and took over that post, too, on eight different occasions, when changes were being made.

His other municipal duties have included keeping minutes of city commission meetings, serving as secretary of the Volunteer Fire Department for 33 years, and doing some janitorial and sweeping out the city hall.

He served for 17 years as fire marshal, and seven years as city judge, while attending the duties of the tax office.

"Tax department duties are much more complex now," Chambers said, "mainly to the hundreds of new pieces of taxable property, and the increased valuation."

Chambers will work a half day schedule come February 1, but will remain on call as long as needed to help out in the tax office.

He has made thousands of friends in that office, meeting many taxpayers, irate and otherwise.

When a tax bill is changed, it usually brings a question or request for an explanation, Chambers said, but he had never had a serious argument with a property owner.

"Most folks in Burkburnett pay their taxes cheerfully and willingly," Chambers related.

He's had a varied and eventful career, serving with the 307th Cavalry on the Mexican Border in 1918. "Just missed the Pancho Villa excitement," he says.

Then he was transferred to Ft. Sill with the same outfit.

He volunteered for overseas duty several times during World War I, only to be turned down each time. He chafed at the bit as he trained recruits, only to see them embark for France, while he was left behind.

"They told me if they wanted me over there they would send for me," Chambers said.

While at Sill, he met Miss Earlyne Baily at Chickasha, Okla. They married, and after his discharge in 1920, made their home in Omaha, Neb.

Chambers was born in Missouri, and reared in Glenwood, Iowa.

Soon after arriving in Burk, he was employed by a grocery store, and remained there for 17 years, before the city job was opened.

"I thought I'd like it, and applied," he said.

Gary Bean, Burk city manager, had nothing but praise for Chambers and his work. "Dick has been a main cog in the operations of the city. We'll miss him, but will be happy to have his services, even on a part-time basis, for some time to come," Bean said.

Dick has been a member of the Burk Lions Club since 1941, The First Baptist Church, the American Legion since his army discharge, and the volunteer fire department for 33 years. He has served as secretary of the VFD for 33 years.

"I'm way behind on my fishing," Dick said, "and I'm going to do my best to catch up."

Mrs. Chambers is looking forward to his retirement, but wonders if she can put up with him around the house, even half time.

The couple have a daughter, Mrs. Robert Fite, Jr., who lives in Richardson, Texas, and two grandchildren, both married and living in Dallas.

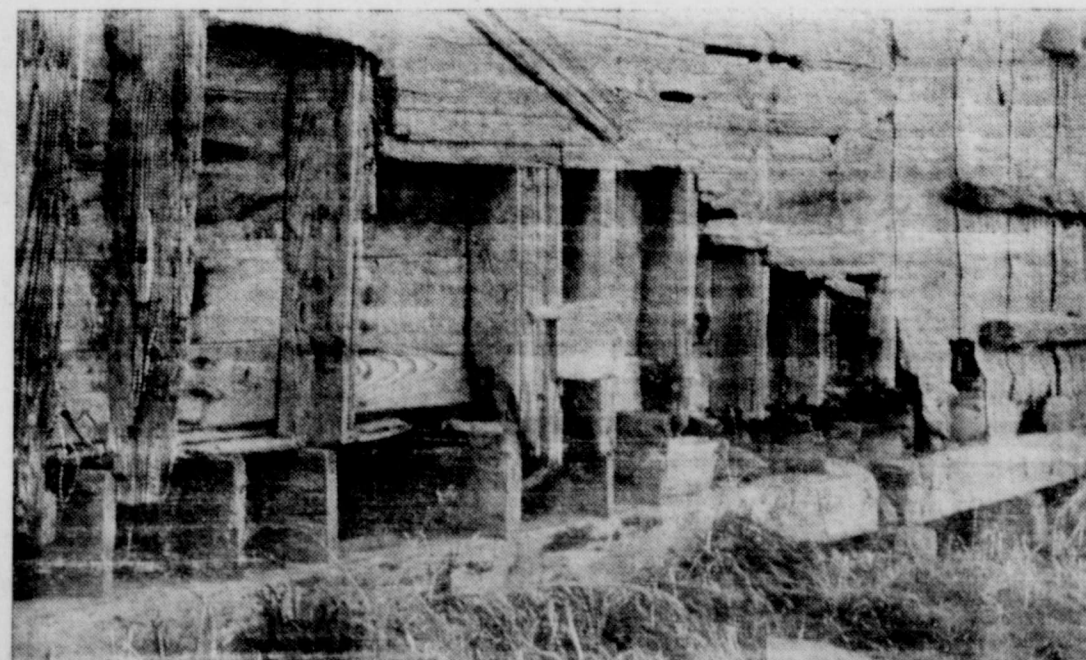

Let's Clean It Up!

The action of the Burkburnett City Commission in passing an ordinance to remove or repair unsafe buildings, is, in our opinion, a wise move.

True, many buildings are unsightly as well. But the campaign is aimed primarily at those buildings which are unsafe for occupancy, a fire hazard, a health hazard, or provide an "attractive nuisance" where children are wont to play.

Many such hazardous structures exist in Burkburnett. Luckily, no serious accident or fires have yet occurred in them. But given any more time, they can cause a definite hazard to life and limb.

After reading the ordinance word for word, we cannot find fault with it. A property owner will be duly warned, and he has the right to appeal.

Since most of the buildings are worthless, complying with the ordinance should cause no undue hardships to the owner.

All that now remains is for property owners to comply with the law without undue delay, and clean up those premises for the safety and health of Burkburnett.

Do it now!

FACT AND OPINION

The nation's major electric utilities have spent more than \$604 million on equipment alone to reduce air pollution, according to the Edison Electric Institute. During 1967, the EEI reports, these utilities spent a total of \$127 million on air pollution control. The 1967 total includes nearly \$88 million for new equipment and more than \$41 million for operating and maintaining all air-quality facilities, as well as other steps taken for improving the air.

A noted columnist, Mr. John Chamberlain, commented, "If this country is going to protect its 'image' before the world, it needs some free enterprises who are willing to practice what they preach. If capitalists once accept the idea that government is to be accorded the right to tell a man how he should raise the honest funds needed to finance a business, the whole idea of free enterprise is brought into contempt. You can't have it both ways."

According to the National Association of Manufacturers, it is up to all of us as good citizens to inform both legislators and those in the executive branch of government as to what we expect of them in the coming year. As taxpayers, we can make our messages brief and to the point. Efficient management... sound fiscal policies... a tight clamp on spending... labor law reform... What's your proposal? When voices from home come in loud and clear, your government representatives will get the message.

The federal, state and local governments generate about 23 per cent and rural electric cooperatives about one per cent.

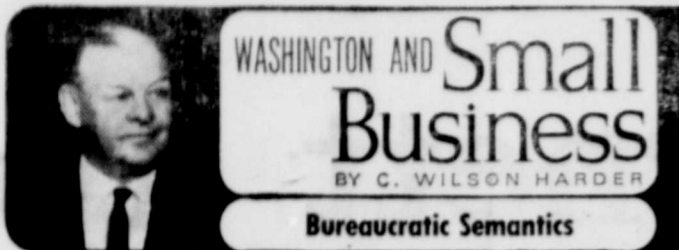

The millions of American families who think they have Danish modern furniture in their homes are in for a shock.

The Federal Trade Commission, one of several Federal agencies which look out for the U.S. consumers' best interests, has come out with an official definition of the term "Danish modern," warning American manufacturers that these words should not be used to describe furniture produced in the U.S.

The official regulation handed down from the banks of the Potomac declares that American firms can use this designation only if the furniture was actually produced in Denmark. Even "Danish designed" and other terms should be applied only to "furniture entirely designed in the Kingdom of Denmark," the Commission said.

Similar furniture made in this country can be labeled "Danish style" without incurring FTC's wrath. But not "Danish modern."

Just why the Commission should devote its energies to such semantics is not clear, but the Danes should be overjoyed at this apparent endorsement from the U.S. government. There's a hint that U.S. furniture patterned after the Danish design is inferior. In truth, it may, or may not, be.

It's almost as if the Commission were warning U.S. consumers not to be misled—"If you want Danish modern, insist on the genuine, imported."

article." Considering the flood of imports (good, bad, and atrocious) that are threatening U.S. industries and the U.S. balance of international payments, it hardly seems appropriate for a Federal agency to help boost imports, intentionally or not.

The joker in this FTC ruling is that furniture companies in Japan, Hong Kong and elsewhere can continue to call their Scandinavian-style furniture whatever they wish, because they are beyond the control of U.S. regulations.

One wonders whether a subsequent FTC order will warn that "Danish pastry" must henceforth come only from Denmark. Local bakeries perhaps could imitate the real thing if they called it "Danish-style" pastry? And what about Great Danes?

This illustrates the folly of trying to protect American consumers through government regulations. Protecting the public's health and safety and prosecuting the unscrupulous merchant is justified, but no government can protect millions of consumers every step of the way in the market-place. Consumer protection has to start with the consumer himself.

The controversy over national product origins had an amusing side recently when Representative Melvin Laird of cheese-rich Wisconsin pleaded for government action to limit imports of Mozzarella cheese from Italy, lest the pizza pie no longer be considered "an American dish."

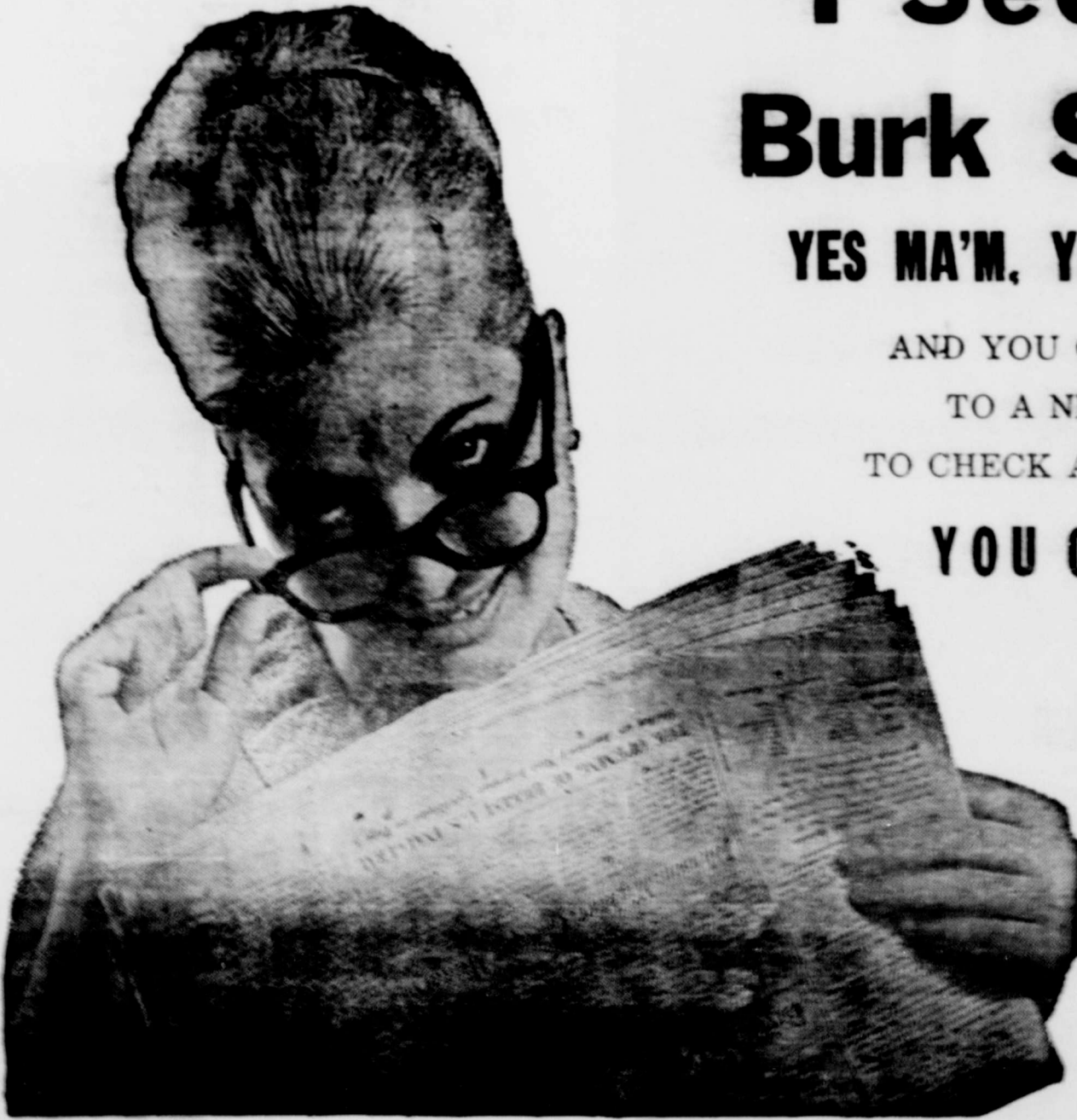

LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 292
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PARAGRAPH ONE OF SECTION FOUR OF ORDINANCE NO. 252, COMMONLY KNOWN AS THE ELECTRICAL CODE OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS, REGULATING ELECTRICAL WORK; PROVIDING A PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS;

That paragraph One of Section Four of Ordinance No. 252 be and the same is hereby amended so that it shall hereafter read as follows:

(1) Licenses: All persons, firms, individuals, co-partnerships, or corporations, (excepting public telephones, telegraph and messenger call, light and power companies having a franchise granted by this City who are doing work on their own properties) desiring to engage in the business of installing wires, appliances, apparatus, electrical equipment, electrical signs, and fixtures for a profit as a master or contracting electrician shall, before doing such work, pass an examination by the City Inspector or the City Electrical Board, make an acceptable Surety Bond to the City of Burkburnett, Texas, and take out a license. The license shall be issued by the City and the fee therefore shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) payable in advance for both Master and Journeyman and five dollars (\$5.00) payable in advance for Helper's license. Said license shall be renewable at a fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00) for Master, ten dollars (\$10.00) for Journeyman and two dollars (\$2.00) for Helpers per annum payable to the City in advance. Any license granted hereunder may be revoked at any time without notice or hearing on the part of the licensee, for the violation of any provision of this ordinance and without refunding any portion of the license fee paid. All present licenses are to continue through the current year without any further changes, and under their present bonds. All present licenses will be renewed at a fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00) for Master, ten dollars (\$10.00) for Journeyman and two dollars (\$2.00) for Helpers. New applicants for licenses shall comply with this ordinance, beginning with the effective date of same. The licenses shall be issued by the City and the fee therefore shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) for Master, fifty dollars (\$50.00) for Journeyman and five dollars (\$5.00) for Helpers payable in advance. Said license shall be renewed at twenty dollars (\$20.00) for Master, ten dollars (\$10.00) for Journeyman and two dollars (\$2.00) for Helpers per annum, and may be revoked at any time by the order of the Mayor

and the City commission for the violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance. The offending persons, firms, or corporations shall be prohibited from engaging in such work in the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett for a period of one (1) year. All licenses shall expire December 31 of the year of issuance and no license shall be issued for more than one (1) year.

That any person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall upon conviction in a court of competent jurisdiction, be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

The fact that improper electrical wiring within the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett, jeopardizes the peace and health of the citizens of said City, creates an emergency, and this Ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure on the grounds of urgent public need for the preservation of peace, health and safety of property; and the rule requiring the reading of ordinances on three separate days is hereby suspended, and this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and approval, and after same has been published.

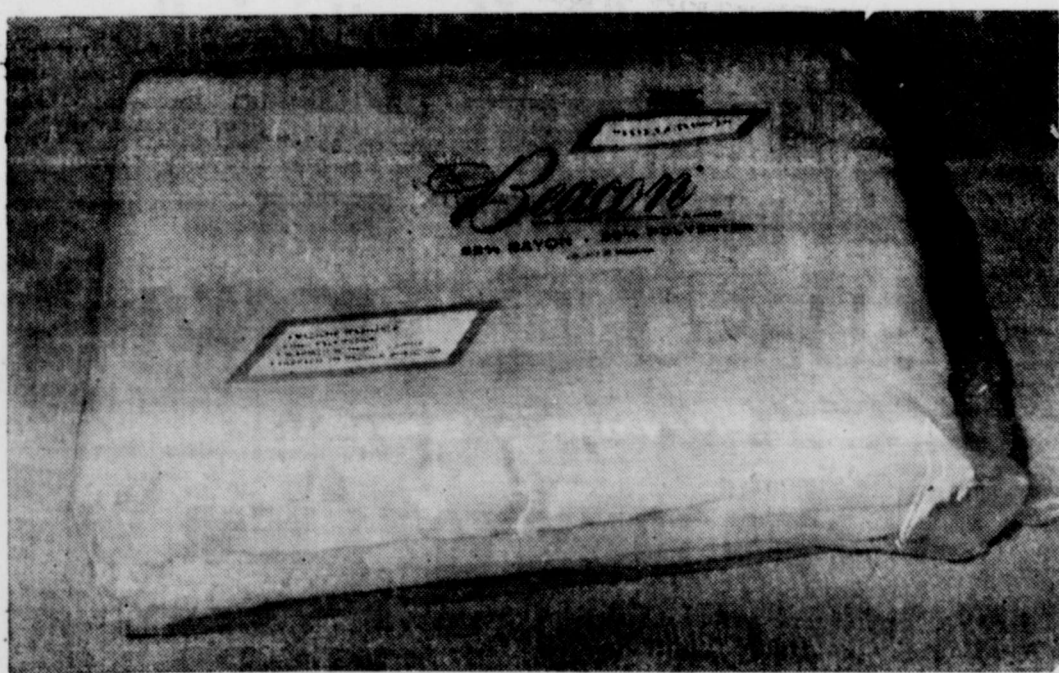

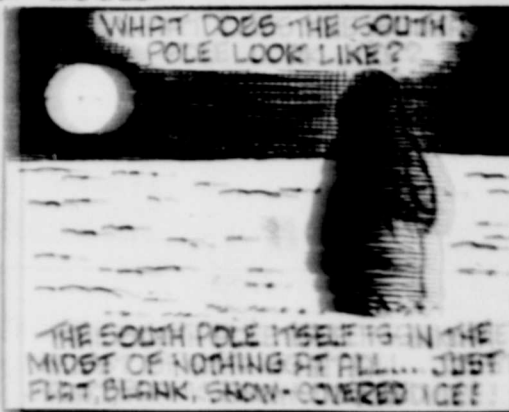

Inflation:
Another Notch Higher

A steel strike has been avoided at the cost of an 8-percent wage increase the first year and about 5 percent for each of the two succeeding years. That means that 2 years from now steel wages will be 18 percent higher than at present. Hopefully, there may be a productivity increase of from 6 to 9 percent during the next three years. From 9 to 12 percent will surely be wage inflation followed, of course, by rising steel prices. Already the first moves have been made in that direction. Other wage increases have been greater; notably, aluminum and automobile workers, not to mention the extremes of building trade workers, particularly plumbers and steam fitters.

Steel, however, is in a vulnerable position. Competition from abroad, where wages in some countries are not more than a quarter of the scale in the United States, is rapidly reducing both our domestic and export markets. It would not be surprising if the number of jobs available for steel workers would decline during the next 3 years.

From April, 1967, to April, 1968, unit labor costs of manufacturing in the United States rose more than 4 percent. During the last 10 years, the rise was just under 10 percent. The only way we can hold our own in competition with other industrial countries is to hold the price line and, if possible, reduce it. This can be done only if wages are stabilized.

It is said that wages account for about 40 percent of the cost of making steel, but wages are also a large factor in the cost of raw materials which the steel companies must buy. Since taxes are used mainly to pay wages to government employees, it can be argued that the largest part of the tax bill goes to pay wages. Directly and indirectly it is probable that more than 75 percent of the cost of making steel is paid out in wages. Some students of the matter, with reference not only to steel but to other manufacturing, maintain that wages are about 90 percent of manufacturing cost.

Failure to compete successfully with foreign producers will further augment the adverse balance of payment and add to the claims against our gold, already more than three times greater than our gold reserves. The inevitable consequences of a trend of that kind will be wage and price fixing, a static and far less productive economy. To enforce fixed prices and wages would also mean a vast growth of state power—another long step toward the totalitarian state with a loss of freedom.

When all is said and done, the only satisfactory answer to the wage-price problem, and the only way to maintain freedom and prosperity, is to do away with government regulation and controls and to reactivate the free market accompanied by renewed allegiance to the moral law. If men wish to be free and self-governing, they must learn to be fair, honest, just, generous, truthful and to refrain from coveting and stealing.

Ordinance Published

Full details of the new Burkburnett city ordinance concerning hazardous buildings are published in today's News.

The ordinance, passed as an emergency measure by the city commission last week, calls for the repair or destruction of buildings which are deemed hazardous or a health menace.

The ordinance states that all buildings or structures or any nature which are found to be dangerous, calculated to increase the fire hazard, that injure, hurt or harm individuals or which endanger health of life or violate state laws of decency shall

be deemed dangerous buildings or structures.

Following inspection by the city inspector and fire chief, buildings found unsafe shall be so marked and the notice shall not be removed until the notice is complied with.

The owner will be notified of the unsafe conditions by registered mail, and if no compliance is offered, shall be subject to a fine not more than \$200. Each day will constitute a separate offense.

The ordinance takes effect with the official publication today.

DOWNTOWN MAIL PICKUP
CHANGES ARE ADVANCED

Cooperation of the public in their Christmas mailing was commended today by Burkburnett Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman.

19 Accidents
On Rural Roads

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 19 accidents on rural highways in Wichita County during the month of December, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in six persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$56,760.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1968 shows a total of 204 crashes resulting in nine persons killed, 172 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$192,292.00.

The final date of the 1969 motor vehicle inspection period for all motor vehicles registered in Texas is drawing near. The Sergeant stated,

The mail that can be mailed at noon or early afternoon will be appreciated, Zimmerman said.

The effective date of the pickup change will be Monday, January 20.

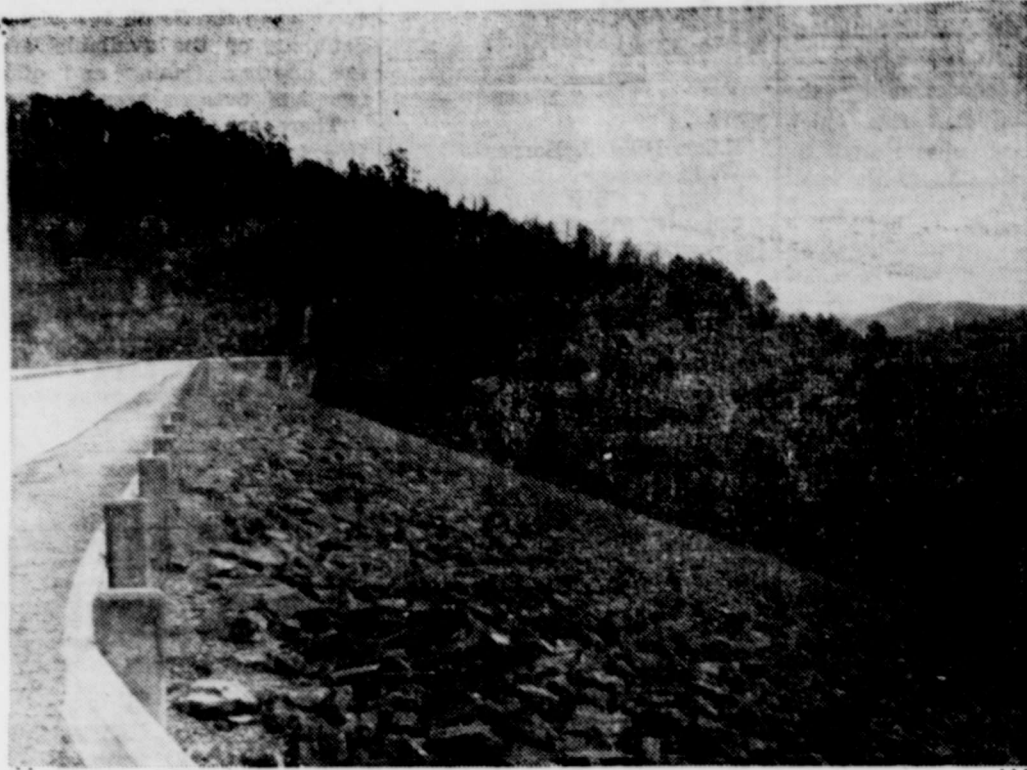

ORDINANCE NO. 293

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE VACATION, REMOVAL, REPAIR OR DEMOLITION OF ANY BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES WHICH IS OR THREATENS TO BECOME A PUBLIC NUISANCE, OR WHICH CONSTITUTES A FIRE HAZARD OR OTHERWISE DANGEROUS TO HUMAN LIFE OR WHICH IN RELATION TO EXISTING USE CONSTITUTES A HAZARD TO HEALTH, MORALS, SAFETY OR GENERAL WELFARE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, AND PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT, INSPECTION, DEFINING WHAT IS DANGEROUS, DECLARING A PUBLIC NUISANCE, SETTING UP STANDARDS, PRESCRIBING DUTIES OF BUILDING COMMISSION, CITY INSPECTOR AND FIRE CHIEF OR FIRE MARSHAL, PROVIDING FOR ABATEMENT OF BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES CONSTITUTING A MENACE TO PUBLIC SAFETY AND FOR THE ASSESSMENT OF THE COST OF VACATION, REMOVAL, REPAIR OR DEMOLITION AS A MUNICIPAL LIEN AGAINST THE PREMISES, PROVIDING FOR ADMINISTRATIVE APPEAL, PROVIDING A FINE FOR VIOLATION, PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, there exists or may in the future exist, buildings or structures which are dilapidated, unsafe, dangerous, unsanitary or which constitute a fire hazard or otherwise dangerous to human life or which in relation to existing use constitutes a hazard to health, morals, safety or general welfare of the people of Burkburnett, and which are a public nuisance thereby creating a situation that must be remedied.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT:

SECTION I. DANGEROUS BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES.

All buildings or structures of any nature that are found to be dangerous structures or buildings or dilapidated buildings or structures, buildings or structures calculated to increase the fire hazard, that injure, hurt or harm individuals or that may hurt or annoy the lands, tenements, hereditaments of another or which endanger life or health or violate laws of decency or obstruct the reasonable and comfortable use of property or are subversive to public order, decency or morals and which have any one or all of the following defects, shall be deemed "dangerous buildings or structures."

(a) Those which, exclusive of the foundation, show thirty-three percent (33%) or more of damage or deterioration of the supporting member or members or fifty percent (50%) of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting enclosing or outside walls or covering.

(b) Those which have been damaged by fire, wind or other causes so as to have become dangerous to life, safety, morals or the general health and welfare of the occupants or the people of the City of Burkburnett.

(c) Those which have become or are so dilapidated, decayed, unsafe, unsanitary or which utterly fail to provide amenities essential to decent living that they are unfit for human habitation or are likely to cause sickness or disease so as to work injury to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of those living therein.

(d) Those that have light, air and sanitation facilities which are inadequate to protect the health, morals, safety or general welfare of human beings who live or may live therein.

(e) Those having inadequate facilities for egress in case of fire or panic, or those having insufficient stairways, elevators, fire escapes, or other means of communications.

(f) Those which have parts thereof which are so attached that they may fall and injure members of the public or property.

(g) Those which have a foundation that is not so free of holes, cracks, buckling, crumbling and defects as to support adequately the dwelling structure.

(h) Those which do not have a floor, exterior wall and roof that is so free of holes, cracks and loose, rotten, warped or protruding boards as to protect the occupants of the dwelling or dwelling unit reasonable from weather elements and from danger of collapse.

(i) Those buildings or structures existing in violation of any provision of the Building Code of the City of Burkburnett or other ordinances of the City of Burkburnett.

SECTION II. STANDARDS FOR REPAIR, VACATION OR DEMOLITION.

The following standards shall be followed in substance by the City Inspector, Fire Chief and the Board of Commissioners, acting in its capacity as Building Commission under the terms of this ordinance, in ordering repair, vacation or demolition:

(a) If the "dangerous building or structure" can reasonably be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of this ordinance, it shall be ordered repaired.

(b) If the "dangerous building or structure" is in such a condition as to make it dangerous to the health, safety, morals or general welfare of its occupants, it shall be ordered to be vacated.

(c) In any case where a "dangerous building or structure" is fifty percent (50%) or more damaged, decayed or deteriorated from its original value or structure, it shall be demolished, and in all cases where a building or structure cannot be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this ordinance, it shall be demolished. In all cases where a "dangerous building or structure" is a fire hazard existing or erected in violation of the terms of this ordinance or any ordinance of the City or Statutes of the state of Texas, it shall be demolished. Included in the term demolished in this ordinance is the cleaning of the property and removing all debris and trash.

(d) Upon receipt of a report of the City Inspector and Fire Chief as provided for in Section IV, Subsection (e) hereof, written notice by certified mail is to be given to the owner, as shown by the Tax Records of the City, to appear before said Commission on a date specified in the notice to show cause why the building or structure reported to be a "dangerous building" should not be repaired, vacated or demolished in accordance with the statement of particular set forth in the Inspector's and Fire Chief's notice provided for herein Section IV, Subsection (d).

(e) Hold a hearing and hear such testimony as the City Inspector and Fire Chief and the owner or any other person having an interest in said building as shown by the Tax Records of the City, shall offer relative to the determination of the question of whether the building or structure in question is a dangerous building.

(f) Make written finding of fact from the testimony offered, pursuant to subsection (b) as to whether or not the building in question is a "dangerous building" within the terms of Section I hereof.

(g) Upon a determination that the building or structure in question does constitute a "dangerous building" within the meaning of Section I hereof, to issue an order based upon findings of facts made pursuant to subsection (c) commanding the owner of any other person having an interest in said building as shown by the Tax Records of the City to repair, vacate or demolish any building found to be a "dangerous building" within the terms of this ordinance.

(h) In the event the owner fails to comply with the order provided for in subsection (d) hereof within thirty (30) days, the Building Commission shall report the fact of non-compliance to the Office of the City Attorney; the City Attorney may file an appropriate action for injunction in the District Court of Wichita County to compel said owner to abide by the Commission's order or take whatever legal action the City Attorney deems expedient to enforce the order.

(i) If at the expiration of thirty (30) days from a final judicial determination that a building or structure is to be demolished and same has not been destroyed, it shall be demolished at the expense of the owner thereof by the City or its contractor. The materials of such building shall be sold and the net cost of the demolition shall be charged to the owner, and, if any balance remains, it shall be held for the owner or any other parties entitled thereto.

(j) If deemed necessary, place a notice on all "dangerous buildings" upon a judicial determination, reading as follows: "This building has been found to be a dangerous building by the City Inspector and Fire Chief. This

All "dangerous buildings and structures" within the terms of Section I of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be public nuisances and shall be repaired, vacated or demolished as hereinbefore and hereinafter provided.

SECTION IV. DUTIES OF THE CITY INSPECTOR AND FIRE CHIEF:

(a) Inspect or cause to be inspected, when necessary, all public buildings, schools, halls, churches, theaters, hotels, tenements, or apartments, other multi-family residences, commercial manufacturing buildings for the purpose of determining whether any conditions exist which render such places a "dangerous building or structure" within the terms of Section I of this Ordinance.

(b) Inspect any building, wall or structure about which complaints are filed by any person to the effect that a building wall or structure is or may be existing in violation of this Ordinance.

(c) Notify in writing, by certified mail, the owner and all other persons having an interest in said building as shown by the City's Tax Roll, or any building found by them to be a "dangerous building or structure" within the standards set forth in Section I of this Ordinance, stating that (1) the owner must vacate or repair, or demolish said building or structure in accordance with the terms of this notice and this ordinance;

(2) the occupant or lessee must vacate said building or structure or may have it repaired in accordance with the notice and remain in possession; (3) the owner or other persons having an interest in said building or structure, may at his own risk, repair, vacate, or demolish said building or structure or have such work or act done, provided that any person notified under this subsection to repair, vacate or demolish any building or structure shall be given such reasonable time, not exceeding 60 days as may be necessary to do or have done, the work or act required by the notice provided for herein.

(d) Set forth in the notice provided for in Subsection (c) hereof, a description of the building or structure deemed unsafe, a statement of the particulars which make the building or structure a "dangerous building" and an order requiring the same to be put in such condition as to comply with the terms of this Ordinance within such length of time not exceeding sixty (60) days as is reasonable.

(e) Report to the Board of Commissioners in its capacity as Building Commission any non-compliance with the "notice" provided for in Subsection (c) and (d) hereof.

(f) Appear at all hearings conducted by the Board of Commissioners in its capacity as Building Commission and testify as to the conditions of "dangerous buildings."

(g) If deemed necessary, place a notice on all "dangerous buildings" upon a judicial determination, reading as follows: "This building has been found to be a dangerous building by the City Inspector and Fire Chief. This

notice is to remain on this building until it is repaired, vacated or demolished in accordance with the notice which has been given the owner as shown by the Tax Records in the City Tax Office. It is unlawful to remove this notice until such notice is complied with."

SECTION V. DUTIES OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS ACTING IN ITS CAPACITY AS BUILDING COMMISSION.

(a) Upon receipt of a report of the City Inspector and Fire Chief as provided for in Section IV, Subsection (e) hereof, written notice by certified mail is to be given to the owner, as shown by the Tax Records of the City, to appear before said Commission on a date specified in the notice to show cause why the building or structure reported to be a "dangerous building" should not be repaired, vacated or demolished in accordance with the statement of particular set forth in the Inspector's and Fire Chief's notice provided for herein Section IV, Subsection (d).

(b) Hold a hearing and hear such testimony as the City Inspector and Fire Chief and the owner or any other person having an interest in said building as shown by the Tax Records of the City, shall offer relative to the determination of the question of whether the building or structure in question is a dangerous building.

(c) Make written finding of fact from the testimony offered, pursuant to subsection (b) as to whether or not the building in question is a "dangerous building" within the terms of Section I hereof.

(d) Upon a determination that the building or structure in question does constitute a "dangerous building" within the meaning of Section I hereof, to issue an order based upon findings of facts made pursuant to subsection (c) commanding the owner of any other person having an interest in said building as shown by the Tax Records of the City to repair, vacate or demolish any building found to be a "dangerous building" within the terms of this ordinance.

(f) If at the expiration of thirty (30) days from a final judicial determination that a building or structure is to be demolished and same has not been destroyed, it shall be demolished at the expense of the owner thereof by the City or its contractor. The materials of such building shall be sold and the net cost of the demolition shall be charged to the owner, and, if any balance remains, it shall be held for the owner or any other parties entitled thereto.

(g) If deemed necessary, place a notice on all "dangerous buildings" upon a judicial determination, reading as follows: "This building has been found to be a dangerous building by the City Inspector and Fire Chief. This

notice is to remain on this building until it is repaired, vacated or demolished in accordance with the notice which has been given the owner as shown by the Tax Records in the City Tax Office. It is unlawful to remove this notice until such notice is complied with."

SECTION VI. ABATEMENT OF BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES CONSTITUTING A CLEAR AND PRESENT MENACE TO THE PUBLIC SAFETY.

Notwithstanding all other provisions of this ordinance, nothing herein shall be deemed a limitation on the duty of the City of Burkburnett to summarily order the demolition of any building or structure where it is apparent that the immediate demolition of such building or structure is necessary to the preservation of life and property in the City of Burkburnett.

SECTION VII. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS.

(a) The owner of any dangerous structure or building who shall fail to comply with any notice or order to repair, vacate or demolish said building or structure, such notice or order given by the authority of the Building Commission shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) for each offense and each day the violation continues shall constitute a new offense.

(b) The occupant or lessee in possession of any "dangerous building or structure" who fails to comply with any notice or order to vacate such building or structure and fails to repair such building or structure, given by authority of the Building Commission, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) for each offense and each day the violation continues shall constitute a new offense.

(c) The fact that the present ordinances and regulations of the City of Burkburnett are inadequate to properly control "dangerous buildings or structures" in the City of Burkburnett creates an emergency for the immediate preservation of the public business place, property, health, safety and general welfare of the public which requires that this ordinance shall become effective from and after the date of its passage and publication and it is accordingly so ordained.

SECTION VIII. WHERE OWNER ABSENT FROM CITY.

In cases, save those that constitute a clear and present danger as defined in Section VI, where the owner is absent from the City, all notices or orders provided for herein shall be sent by certified mail to the owner and all other persons having an interest in said building, as shown by the Tax Records of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, to the last known address of each and a copy of such notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the building or structure in question. Such mailing and posting shall be deemed sufficient notice for the Building Commission to hold its hearing.

SECTION IX. SAVINGS CLAUSE.

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this ordinance are severable and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional, such constitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of this ordinance.

SECTION X. EMERGENCY.
