Cable TV complaints bring cheaper rate

Responding to a firestorm of customers' complaints that the only package it has here is an elaborate 150 channel one costing \$57 a month, Charter Communications cable television company will soon offer a more basic package for less than \$30 a month.

City Manager Steve Shutt said Monday afternoon that he had just been on the telephone with a Fort Worth executive of the St. Louis, Mo., based conglomerate who said he was sending a letter this week to offer the basic package.

"It will be 25-27 channels for the mid to upper \$20's," the city manager said.

"I will be calling a special City Council meeting to review it. My concern would be that we do this, and three months later we've got another rate increase.

"That's not kosher." Asked if Charter is concerned about his solicitation of written complaints and a petition at City Hall, Shutt said, "I think all the people's calls have gotten their attention.

"A lot have responded to the numbers we put out. The customers are very hot, and rightfully so."

Shutt referred to the City's May 9 publication in the Record of the addresses and tele-

phone numbers of Charter executives in Fort Worth and St. Louis.

Pat Morrow, director of the company's Texas Group in Fort Worth, has not responded to two requests for comments from the Record.

City Secretary Elizabeth Turner said Monday that 31 people had signed the petition and 30 had written protest letters.

Shutt said the City "will be positioning ourselves to be regulatory in whatever way we can" between now and the expiration of Charter's franchise agreement in three years.

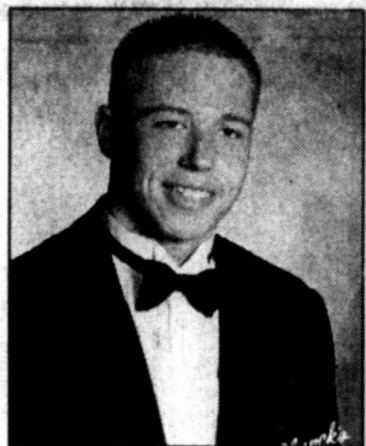

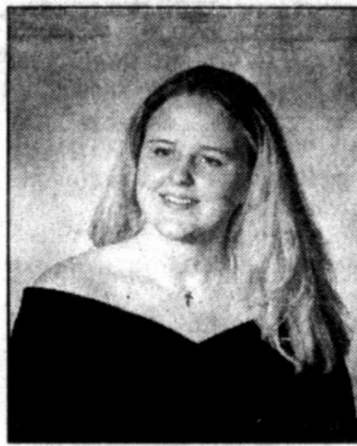

The speaker is not a Westbrook graduate, he said.

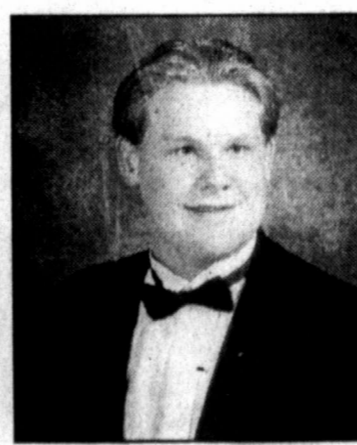

Hospital head proposes sewer line cooperation

The \$236,400 solution to the City-county hospital district political conundrum over a sewer line connection to the new county hospital could be solved with a four way inter-governmental partnership, the hospital's interim administrator said Tuesday.

City officials said last week that the connection will require a deposit to be made in that amount to cover expanding the sewer system.

Bill McKinnon said the situ-

ation is outside his experience as an administrator in Abilene and Jackson and Durant, Miss.

"Every city code is going to be a little bit different," he said.

"If you and I are entrepreneurs and we go to develop a housing development, our responsibility would be to put in the curbs and streets and pay for the sewer line connections to the city mains.

"That's what I have seen in other large developments and

projects like this." McKinnon said it is too late to get a grant to pay for the sewer project and finish it before the hospital-doctor's clinic project is completed at Rogers Road and South Interstate 20 next February.

So he wants a four way partnership with the City, Mitchell County and the County Board of Economic Development (BOED) with an equal division of the extra expense to

Darrin Leverton accepts head basketball duties at Graham

After eight years as the head coach of the Colorado City Lady Wolves basketball team and cross-country coach, Darrin Leverton will be leaving Wolf Country to take on a new challenge as the head girls basketball coach at Class 3A Graham.

Leverton took over a program that like the football program at the time had fallen on hard times.

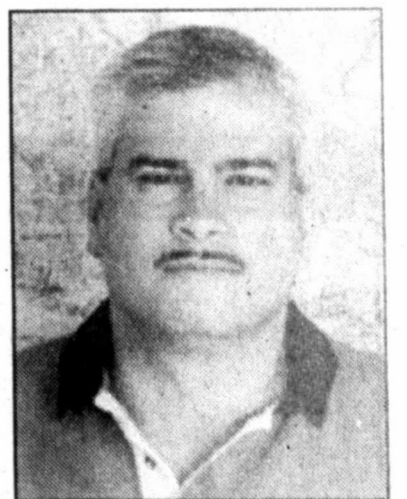
In his first season (1994-1995), the Rotan native took the then Class 3A Lady Wolves to a district mark of 4-6 and 12-12 season record. The team had gotten off to an 0-4 district record.

The next year his team went

through the season at 19-11 and better yet, 10-0 in district play and his first district championship.

During the next six years at the helm his girls would only miss the playoffs one time and only have one losing season, that of the 1999-2000 school year when his team was filled with underclassmen and finished 4-6 in district and 6-23 overall.

His overall record here was 134-94 with a 55-26 district mark as he racked up three district championships and two district runner-up titles. Four times he took his team to the bi-district championship and he had one area championship

C-City Opry box office hit

Mitchell and his wife Debbie, a keyboardist and singer, and their Kickin' Country dance band expanded to performances on the first and third Thursdays in February.

They last played May 16 in the historic Opera House, which was a vaudeville theater in the 1920's.

The twice nightly shows have been at 6:30 and 8:30 p.m. with a 30 minute intermission at 8.

The next show will be a 7 p.m. June 20 performance, and the second this summer in the

theater will be at 7 p.m. July 25.

The theater is owned by the C-City Playhouse theatrical group, which has produced a number of plays and musicals there since the 1970's.

Mitchell, 52, a C-City native who fronted bands in Austin and New Braunfels and played throughout the Southwest, returned in '95 and opened the Hayride dancehall in a former movie theater at 137 Walnut.

He has been building a mobile stage to play on Wednesday, July 3, in Ruddick Park prior to the Fourth of July

Wearing a cap and gown, he will take advantage of a state law passed after the war that allows veterans' old schools to graduate them if they were close to meeting the requirements when they left.

Principal William Clements said the LHS Class of '02 impressed him with its direction.

"This has been a delightful class because they've been aggressive," he said. "They have goals they want to accomplish, and they go out to obtain them."

Clements said three-fourths of the class will go to Western Texas College in Snyder, Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Angelo State University in San Angelo and other area schools.

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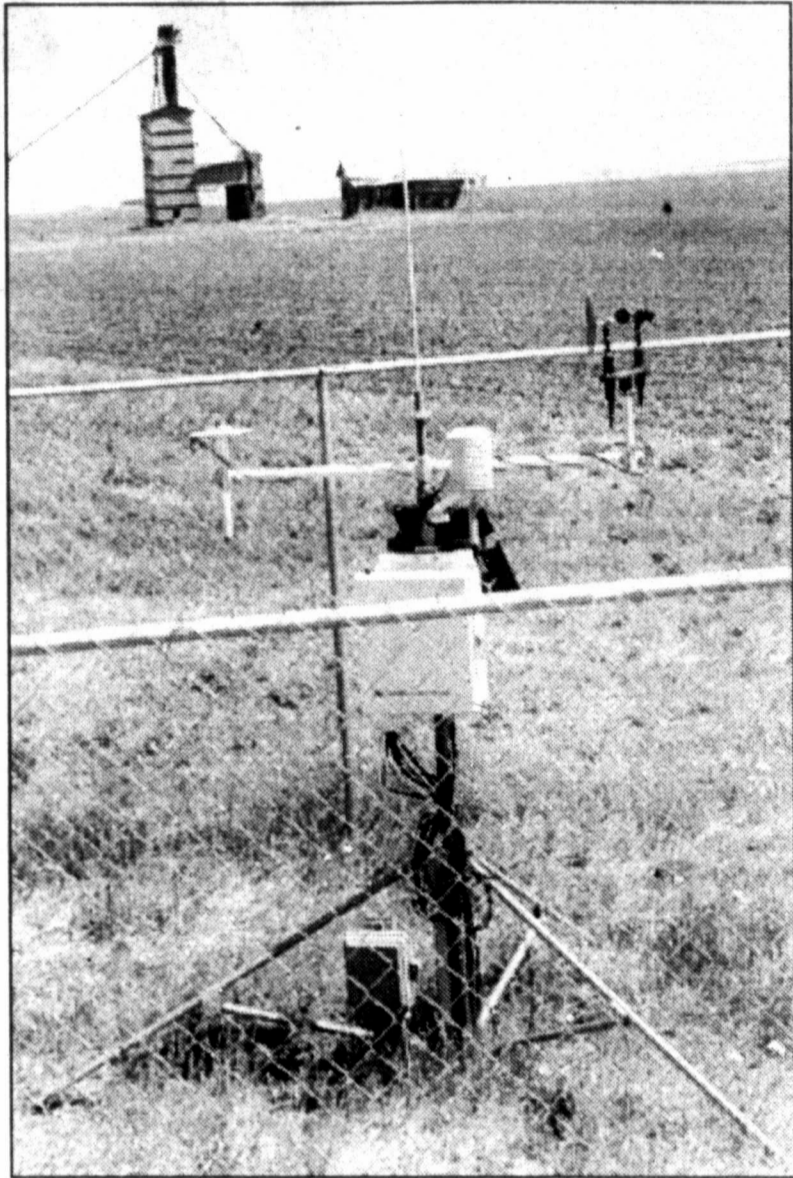

Weather station damaged by storms



THE IPM WEATHER STATION was knocked out, possibly by lightning, on the night of May 3-4. Northwest of Roscoe, it supplies cotton irrigation data for four counties, including Mitchell County.

WASTELLA -- It has always been a guessing game for farmers to know when to irrigate their cotton and how much water to apply.

But it hasn't been since 1999 for producers in Mitchell, Scurry, Jones and Nolan Counties.

Of course, for dryland farmers it is only a question of when to pray for rain and how much to ask for, though the answers are easy -- all the time and as much as He sees fit to send.

Steve Biles of Sweetwater, agent of the four county Integrated Pest Management Zone, in November '98 applied for a \$6,000 state grant to buy a multifaceted weather station from Campbell Scientific Inc. of Logan, Utah.

The 30 year old Abilene Cooper High School graduate assembled the peculiar looking contraption and got permission from Wastella farmer Cliff Etheredge to put it on his land off the west side of U. S. 84.

He built a chainlink fence around it, he says, "because I didn't want some kid from Texas Tech to put my weather vane on his lampshade."

The weather station is in an old railroad right of way just east of the Nolan County Courthouse near the "Four Corners" of Mitchell, Scurry, Jones and Nolan Counties.

It measures air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and direction, solar radiation, soil temperature with a probe eight inches in the ground and rainfall.

Battery powered with a solar panel, the station reports its data each weekday morning to computers in Biles' office in the Nolan County Courthouse and to an ag irrigation engineer at Texas A&M University, Dr. Guy Fipps.

It also gauges a process called "evapo-transpiration."

That's the moisture that is lost through evaporation from the soil and from the leaves of a crop as it moves up from the roots.

night of May 3 was rowdy with lightning, high winds and tornadoes.

He is currently most concerned with insects known as pecan nut casebearers who lay eggs in mid-May and start insidiously working inside the pecans seven to 10 days later.

Traps are being monitored in pecan orchards.

He is also looking for cotton fields to scout this season -- 100 in the four counties.

Biles' office number is 236-9011.

The service is free to producers because several ag related businesses in the counties make generous contributions to the IPM budget, he said.

Lance Rivera of Colorado City will return as his Mitchell County field scout this year.

They are little concerned about boll weevils now that the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation has mostly eliminated that problem.

Teamed with Scurry County scout Nick Anthony of Roscoe, Rivera will work in 50 fields Monday through Thursday in the two counties, watching for other damaging insects like aphids and cotton borers.

Tracy Williams of Roscoe will work in Nolan County, and a new Jones County scout will be hired this year, Biles said.

Nolan County provides him

office space and some supplies, and the ag related businesses make other contributions, possibly to include the weather station repairs.

Mitchell County supporters are Producers Co-Op Gin, the County Board of Economic Development, Colorado Feed & Seed, the First National Bank and City National Bank.

Biles took three degrees from Texas A&M and worked summers at the school's research farm eight miles west of College Station with a cotton physiologist, Dr. Tom Cothran.

He earned bachelor's degrees in agronomy and entomology in 1994 and '95 and a master's in agronomy in '98, when the local IPM zone was established and he was named its manager.

An entomologist is an insect scientist.

"I found out I could take another 30 hours and get a second bachelor's," Biles said.

"I decided to make myself more valuable by getting more knowledge."

He and his wife Jamie have a 2 year old son, Benjamin.

The IPM system was organized by the Texas Cooperative Extension in 1970 with a zone based in Pecos and three other areas.

There are now 26 IPM agents in the state.

install a bigger line.
 "We could each pay a fourth," McKinnon said.
 "There should be immense pride in this city and county that we are going to have the finest rural hospital in Texas.

"There should be a concerted effort to do whatever is necessary to help the project come to a positive end. In other words, we should all work together."

City Attorney Tom Rees Sr. wrote the hospital board last week that Abilene engineer Ken Martin had recommended the \$236,400 deposit -- about a \$10,000 reduction from the previous estimate.

Rees said Tuesday that he did not know of a meeting being scheduled between the two parties prior to the hospital board's regular 6 p.m. Tuesday, May 28, session.

BOED Chairman Woody Anderson said Tuesday that his county affiliated entity wants the problem solved and has unsuccessfully explored various ideas in private meetings with City officials.

"A new hospital and vibrant medical community are certainly a big issue in economic development, and we're interested in seeing the sewer problem worked out," Anderson said.

"We have been to a couple of meetings, but we haven't seen any proposal and we certainly haven't been asked to participate."

He said the four member BOED was interested in helping to fund a \$500,000 project to lay a 12 inch line around the west side of C-City to the sewer treatment plant south of the Colorado River and eliminate the City's troublesome lift station at Rogers Road and 10th St.

That was to be in concert with the construction of a third state prison, and when that project was put into abeyance, Anderson said, "Our interest lessened."

If the City and hospital district asked the BOED for a specific amount of money, he said, the board would have to take the request to the commissioners court.

"We don't know how they want us to participate," Anderson said.

He serves on the BOED with banker Bobby Lemons, rural water company president Mike Hemphill and retired county tax assessor collector Mike Burt.

County Judge Ray Mayo said Tuesday that whatever solution is achieved, it will come from the same pocketbook -- local taxpayers'.

"Normally, things go through the BOED to the court," he said. "The BOED expends funds approved by the court."

"Surely there's a solution somewhere. It's going to take taxpayers' dollars. They just have to determine which tax dollars are going to be spent for it."

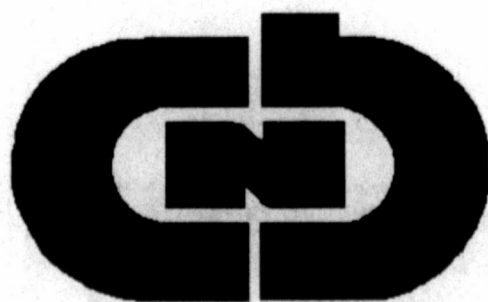

title to his credit.

In addition to his basketball duties he also took pride in coaching the cross-country team where he accumulated four district championships, three district runner-up titles and had four state qualifiers during his reign at Colorado City.

To say he will be sorely missed on the campus is an understatement. He said the decision to leave was not an easy one for him.

"When you have spent the last eight years at one place leaving is never easy," said Coach Leverton. "My daughter Alyssa was only a few months old when we arrived here and she is eight years old now. We have made some life-long friends and have had some very talented girls go through this program."

Coach Leverton said that along with all the good times he has had here there were also some very trying and emotional times.

"I guess that one of my most difficult periods in my coaching career was in December of 1997 when we lost Belinda Miles, a member of our basketball team, in a car accident," said Coach Leverton. "She was not only an integral part of our basketball team but she was just an outstanding student and had a great personality. I don't think she ever met a stranger."

Leverton said it was a tough assignment to get players ready to play again after the accident that happened over the Christmas break.

"I told the girls that despite the difficulty of returning to the basketball court and trying to play again that we had to do it for Belinda," said Leverton. "The girls dedicated the rest of the season to her memory and we always had a rose or her jersey in the chair she would have been sitting in. We went on to have our best season with a 10-0 district mark and a 23-6 season record. It was a season you can never forget."

Among some of his coaching highlights was to have a couple of his former players return after graduating from college to be an assistant coach under him.

"I coached Becky Barnes at Roscoe and she coached for me here a couple of years," said Leverton. "And now we have Krissy (Morris) who was a junior when I first got here

and is now one of our assistants. And I can't say enough about Kendra (Anderson) who will be a senior next year at Hardin-Simmons. She made the All-American Team this year and will make an outstanding coach one day. I look for her to be coaching in the Big 12 sometime in the future."

Now though, his thoughts are on trying to get his house sold and get ready for the move to Graham.

"I'm excited about the opportunity we have at Graham," said Leverton. "It's a large class 3A school that at one time was classified as 4A. They had a young team this year and have a lot of talent returning including a 6'5 girl that has a lot of potential to play at the next level. That helped to make my decision to leave a little easier."

Guest Editorial Stenholm supports farm bill

The big agriculture news last week was President Bush's signing of the 2002 Farm Bill. I was pleased to join other members of Congress and representatives from the nation's agricultural organizations at the White House for a Monday morning, May 13, ceremony where President Bush signed the bill into law.

Contrary to what has been said about it, it is not a budget buster, and in fact the President's own budget provided the spending for it.

It is also worth noting that this six year bill will spend less over that period of time than has been spent in ad hoc emergency payments over the last four years.

President Bush said the bill will eliminate the need for emergency assistance later this year and in the future.

He also believes it will break a bad fiscal habit of passing annual supplemental assistance measures to provide additional money to farmers.

The President thinks those unpredictable payments made it difficult for Congress to live within its own budget and created uncertainty for farmers and ranchers and their creditors.

In addition, he said the new bill will provide a safety net for farmers without encouraging over-production and depressed prices.

More than two years in the making, the legislation had the support of 280 members of the House and 64 senators.

It's the result of hard work on the part of Republicans and Democrats alike who recognized a common purpose and worked together on behalf of U. S. agriculture and rural America.

Our farmers and ranchers have been hit hard in recent years by weather disasters and record low prices that have not been seen since the "Dust Bowl" days of the Great Depression.

A perfect Farm Bill has probably never been written, but this is a good compromise.

It sends a strong message to our producers that the U. S. government stands shoulder to shoulder with them in the international market place.

It is my understanding that some folks have started to call the USDA about the timing of their first checks under the bill, whose official name is the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002.

Farm Service Agency Administrator Jim Little told USDA Radio that it could take months to start sending out checks.

The major provisions of the Farm Bill will not be published until this fall.

Little also pointed out that USDA is making final payments under the 1996 Agricultural Market Transition Act provisions and will continue to until September, when the Freedom to Farm Act expires.

New programs are widespread and will affect many sectors including farm services, natural resources, conservation, rural development, nutrition, food safety, research, pests, diseases and international trade.

Let me emphasize that what is important now is the certainty that payments will be made.

Polyurethane spill closes I-20 west

An early Sunday tractor trailer rig accident involving hazardous chemicals near Westbrook caused minor injuries to a Danham, La., couple but major problems for the DPS and state highway department.

Trooper Jeremy Usener said the westbound Transport Service Co. Freightliner from Hinsdale, Ill., was westbound at 4:15 a.m. when it went off the right side of Interstate 20, back on the highway and turned onto its right side in the median.

Carrying liquid polyurethane, the tanker trailer lay horizontally across the road and blocked both westbound

lanes for nearly 12 hours, Trooper Usener said.

Polyurethane is a thermoplastic or thermocoating resin used for electrical insulation and other resistant coatings.

Both westbound lanes were closed and traffic was rerouted to the north service road until the highway was cleared about 3:30 p.m.

Usener said the driver, 59 year old Cynthia Schexnayder, told him a man had run onto the highway in front of her and she lost control of the rig while trying to avoid him.

Her 56 year old husband Danny was in the sleeper when the accident happened.

The Schexnayders were tak-

en to the county hospital by Mitchell County EMS, where Ms. Schexnayder was found not to require hospitalization.

Her husband complained of back pain and was held for 23 hour observation.

PJ's Wrecker Service of Colorado City and Mike Bownds Towing & Recovery of Abilene went to the scene 6.8 miles west of Westbrook and righted the truck without spilling any of the contents.

"We were told that once the stuff hits oxygen, it crystallizes, so everybody was real careful," Usener said.

He said no one was found at the scene to substantiate the driver's account.

"You need a 17 inch. Your crotch should be two inches above the crossbar when you're standing with your feet on the ground." He had to special order it. I was glad when it finally came in. I love it. The brand name is GIANT. It is silver. Beautiful. Nothing rattles when I ride it. It has shock absorbers on the front fork and on the seat.

Back in the days when you braked a bicycle with a pedal I was a bicycle riding whiz. Nothing like the bicycle daredevils you see on TV today, but pretty good for the time.

When I was a cub scout, growing up in Fort Worth, my reputation as a bicycle rider was well known. One of the great events back then was a Scout Circus. All ages of scouts performed tricks and stunts at the Will Rogers Coliseum. They asked me to ride a bicycle through a hoop of fire. I was flattered. They darkened the coliseum for that. The applause was stimulating. I felt like the star of the show.

I used to ride my bike a lot. I had a speedometer on it and loved to go down hills to see if I could make the speedometer go past fifty miles an hour, which is all the speedometer would register.

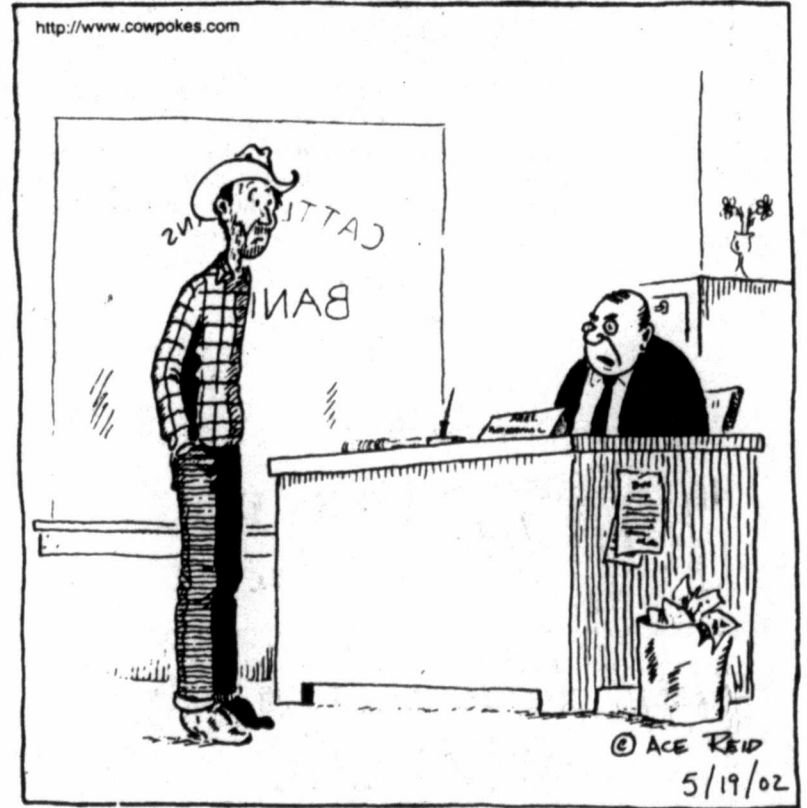

I came down that hill lickety-split and had trouble steering the bike. I slammed into a fire hydrant at full speed. Ouch.

I'm much more conservative these days. Even though my new bike has no fenders and I brake with a lever, it's still fun to ride. I love to go down hills.

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PUBLIC NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO ESTABLISH RATES

Pursuant to Section 104.103 of the Texas Utilities Code, TXU Lone Star Pipeline (TXU LSP), a division of TXU Gas Company, hereby gives notice of intent to establish a supplemental firm transportation rate and an interruptible transportation rate designed to recover the costs of constructing and operating a 76.5-mile, 24-inch pipeline extending from the Bridgeport area in Wise County to the junction of Lines W and W7 in Denton County and then in an easterly direction to the junction of Lines D 17-9 and D9 in Collin County, hereinafter called the "Northside Project." The supplemental firm rate and interruptible rate are proposed to be charged upon the initiation of service on the Northside Project. The proposed supplemental firm rate constitutes a major change and will result in an annual increase in the revenues of TXU LSP of approximately \$9.8 million. These revenues will represent an 8% increase in the total revenues of TXU LSP.

The proposed supplemental firm transportation rate will be applicable to all firm transportation customers contracting for capacity on the Northside Project. The only current customer directly affected by the supplemental firm transportation rate will be TXU Gas Distribution. No other customer has agreed to contract for firm capacity on the Northside Project. The supplemental firm rate may, however, indirectly affect all residential and commercial customers served by TXU Gas Distribution in the state of Texas. The supplemental firm rate will be assessed to TXU Gas Distribution for its contracted capacity on the Northside Project in addition to the city gate rate approved in the Railroad Commission of Texas (Commission) Gas Utilities Docket (GUD) No. 8976. The supplemental firm rate may then be passed on to TXU Gas Distribution's residential and commercial customers. If any other transportation customers contract for firm capacity on the Northside Project, those customers may also pay the supplemental firm transportation rate in addition to any other applicable rates charged such customers.

TXU LSP also proposes an interruptible transportation rate for the use of the Northside Project. To the extent that shippers other than firm transportation customers use the Northside Project, they will be charged this interruptible rate. TXU LSP proposes to reduce the proposed supplemental firm transportation rate charged to firm customers on the Northside Project through an annual revenue crediting mechanism based on revenues from the interruptible rate approved in this proceeding.

Construction of the Northside Project is estimated to be completed in approximately 23 months after approval of this rate application. The proposed supplemental firm rate and interruptible rate will be effective on June 4, 2002, but will not be charged until the initiation of service on the Northside Project and will be charged for an initial seven year period. TXU LSP further proposes to reconcile the projected capital costs with those actually incurred and to adjust the supplemental firm transportation rate and interruptible transportation rate accordingly.

A Statement of Intent to make such change has been filed with the Commission in GUD Docket No. 9292 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office at 1701 North Congress, Austin, Texas, and at the offices of TXU LSP at 301 South Harwood, Dallas, Texas. Copies of the Statement of Intent have also been sent to the appropriate city official of each incorporated city served by TXU Gas Distribution. Any affected person may file written comments or a protest concerning the proposed changes in the rates with the Docket Services Section of the Office of General Counsel, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, at any time on or before June 17, 2002. Any person or agency that has a justifiable or administratively cognizable interest in this proceeding who desires to be designated as a party may petition for leave to intervene and request to become a party to this proceeding. The final date for intervention in this case shall be June 17, 2002.

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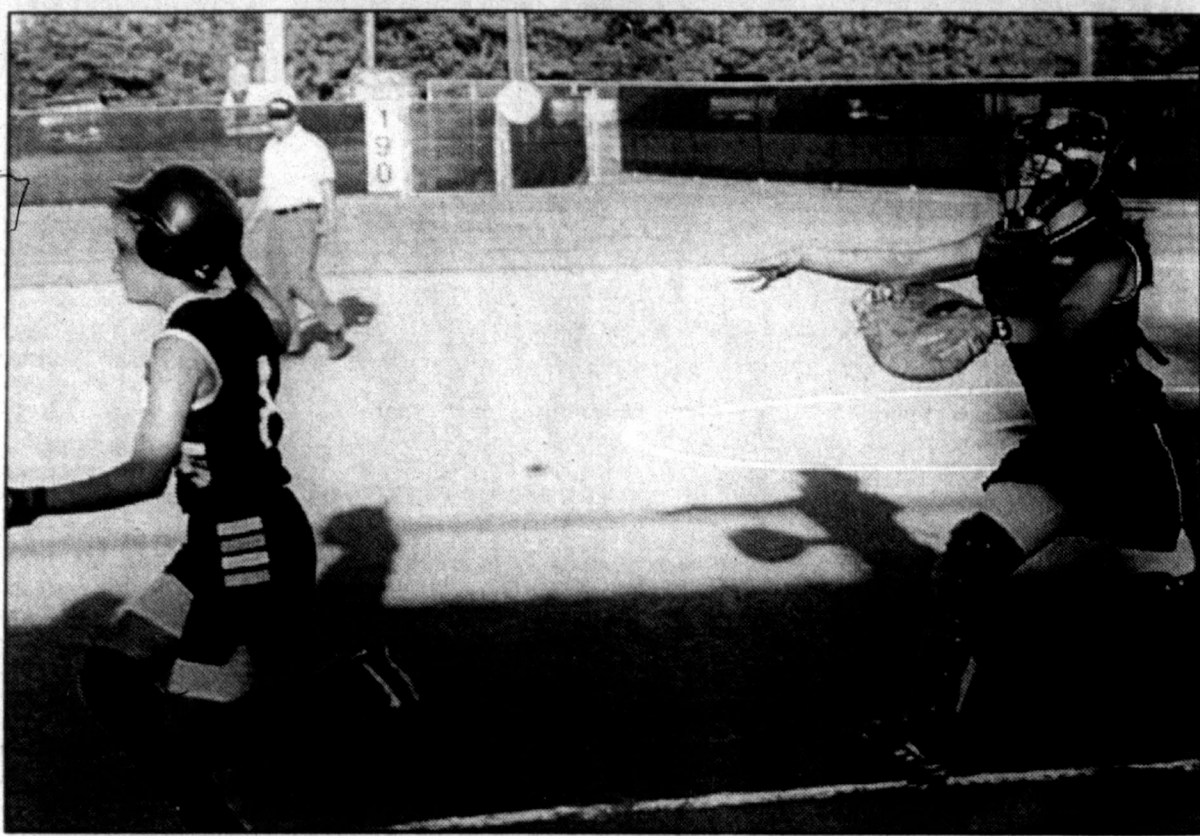

Ms. Bodine said an adult literacy program was operated here from 1990 to 2000, when it was discontinued and its left-over funds donated to the county library.

His wife of 66 years, Lena, died 1 1/2 years ago.

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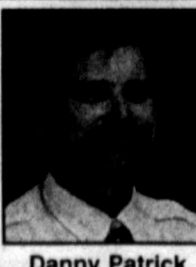

The early May show featured a bevy of singers backed by previously recorded instrumental tracks.

"We did the karaoke because we had so many singers, but the people let me know that they far prefer the live band," Mitchell said. "They said it will be all right if we have to do that every now and then, but they prefer the live music to be there."

"They like watching the musicians play the various instruments."

Tommy Wright plays one of two recurring characters on the show and is its sponsorship announcer.

He portrays "Scoop Flash" and Roland Graham of Loraine the countryified "Wild Willie, the Opry Stage Hand."

The band did the first few

shows gratis, but Mitchell has begun paying the musicians a nominal fee.

Fiddler B. D. Griffin of Fort Worth, who has performed on the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville, and world champion fiddler Shane Key of Midland have played here.

Others are fiddler Valerie Green of Snyder with her family group, the Crossfire band of Sweetwater, Cross Country of Roscoe and singers Bridget Hayes of Lubbock and Jayson Steelman, Russell Wall and James Quinney, all of Snyder.

Also, Sarah Petty of Westbrook and Gail Younger, Tammy and Lorena Turnbow, Curtis Rogers, Faye Ross Gonzales, Charles and Helen Ezzell and Charlsa Hall and Tim McCallay, all of C-City.

Durwood McAdams and The Lord's Voices, both of Loraine, have performed.

With a little crossover, there is a sharp difference between the Opry crowds and those who attend the Mitchell's Saturday night BYOB dances at the Hayride.

"We had never done too many stage shows -- a few county fairs and intermissions at rodeos," he said. "It was something I had in the back of my mind for a long time."

"Some of the church people I know asked me if maybe we could do something some time in an open environment, not at a dance or honky tonk, where they could come out and enjoy our music, too."

Also an auctioneer and volunteer firefighter, Mitchell has been running in several directions at once, working the Opry and Hayride and attending to the recent hospitalization of his 85 year old mother Geneva.

"I thought it would be just one show, but it went over so great that we just decided to keep it going," he said.

The first shows are consistent sellouts, but there are usually seats available for the second ones.

In addition to Mitchell County and the area, fans have come here from El Paso, Sonora, New Braunfels, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Abilene, Lubbock, Arkansas and Louisiana.

"It was the first time Joanie had ever played in a room full of complete strangers."

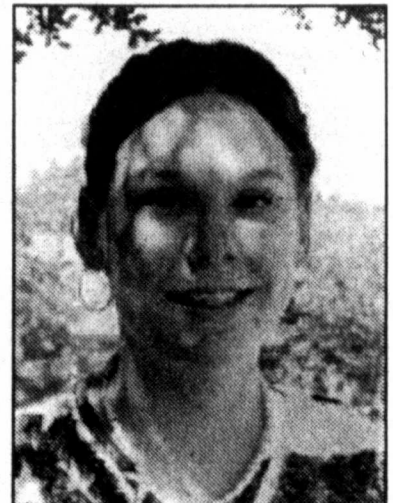
Miss Clay also earned a "superior" rating for her piano duet with fellow Baldwin student Sydney Wright of Snyder.

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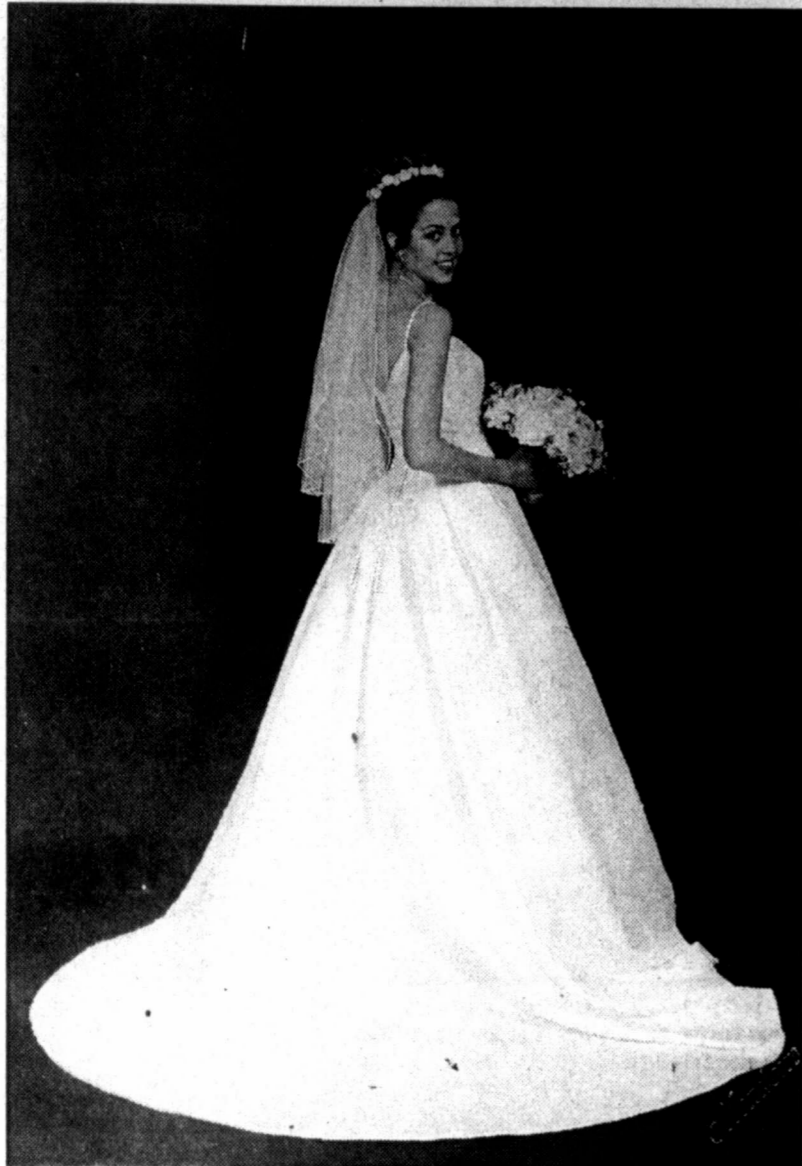
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Waldrip, Wood united in marriage

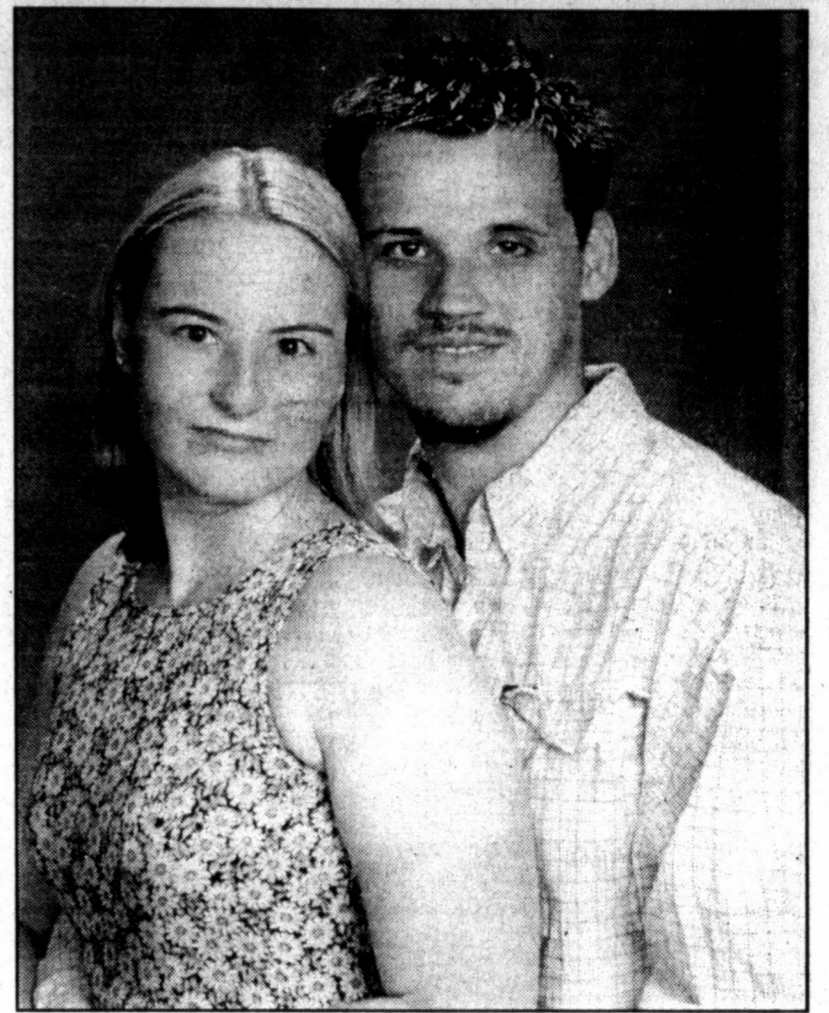

After a honeymoon trip to Hawaii, the couple will reside in Lubbock until August and then move to Abilene.

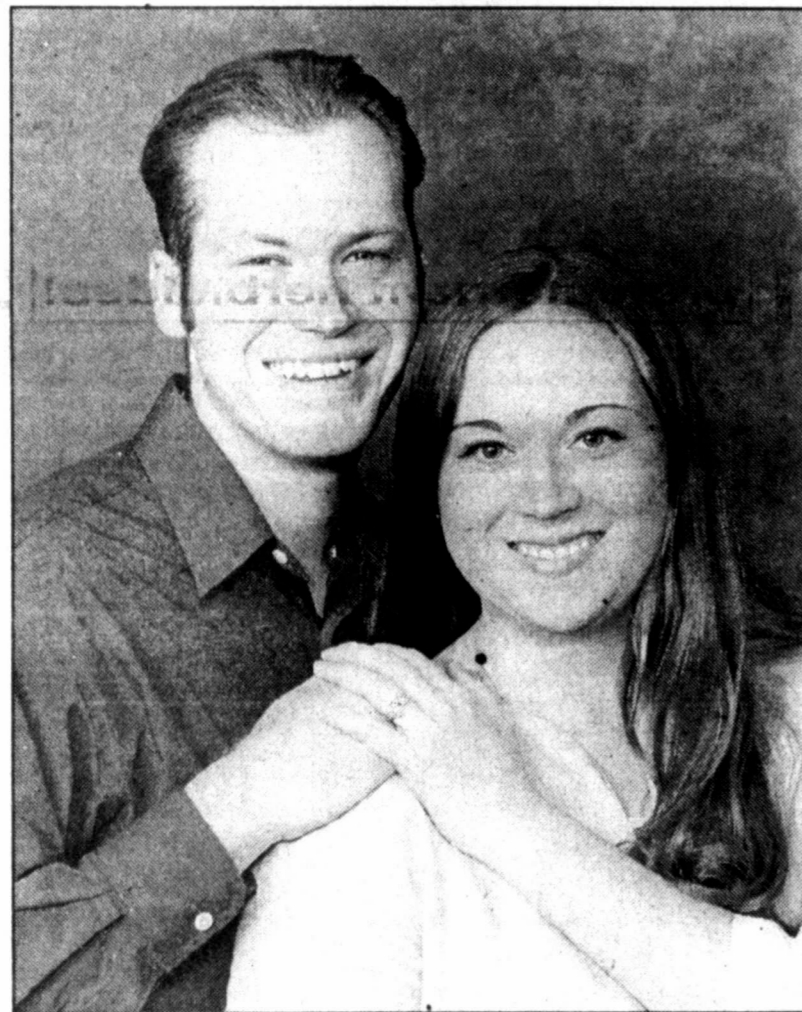

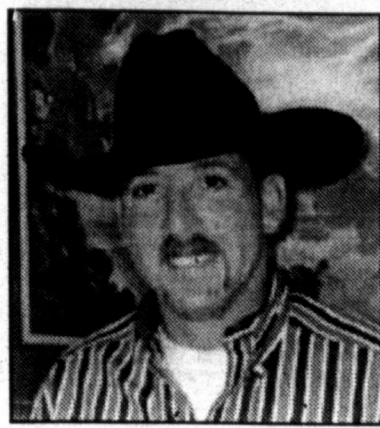

Time to control pecan nut casebearer

One of the most potentially devastating insects for pecan enthusiasts is the Pecan Nut Casebearer and it appears that

now is the time to take action to scout your pecan trees and take action to control this pest if situations occur.

According to trap catches, monitored by our Entomologists, our 2002 Casebearer moth trap catch numbers indicate that the time has come to take action to protect pecans against this unwanted pest.

Casebearer moth numbers in traps in the last week have begun to increase and indicate that egg lay has begun. Therefore, now is the time to scout your pecan trees and carefully examine the nutlets for eggs. If eggs are found, they will hatch about 7-10 days later and that would mean that nut entry would follow about 10-12 days later. Careful scouting is critical to properly time in-

secticide applications and prevent damage to the small nutlets and dramatic decreases in production.

Insecticide control choices are very limited for homeowners and would include either Confirm T&O or Malathion 50% EC. Confirm is very difficult to find but is to be used at the rate of 1/2 to 1 teaspoon per gallon. Malathion 50% EC is more readily available and is mixed at the rate of 2 tablespoons per gallon.

Although we have seen a large number of untold different species of moths, it appears that some of these moths are the beginning of the Casebearer. Casebearer moths are only active at night when they mate and lay eggs on pecans. Each female is capable of

laying from 50 to 150 eggs during her 5 to 8 day life.

The eggs, deposited on the nutlets are greenish-white to white, changing to pink or red prior to hatch. The eggs hatch in 4 to 5 days and the larvae crawl to nearby buds below the nuts to begin feeding. The empty egg shell is white and remains on the nut, which is a good indication of application timing. The tiny larvae feed on the bud for a day or two and then enter the pecan nut, normally tunneling in at the base. Once inside the nut, the larvae are safe from insecticides, making control measures very ineffective. Larvae are olive green in color and reach a length of about 1/2 inch. The larvae feed inside the nut for 3 to 4 weeks - easy

to see why they can be so devastating on a pecan crop. Depending upon the temperatures, the full grown larvae pupate in the nut and the adult moths emerge about 9 to 14 days later.

The Casebearer completes several generations each year. The generation we are approaching is the overwintered generation. Second generation moths begin egg lay usually in mid-summer about 42 days after nut entry by the first generation. This round of moths lay their second generation eggs in grooves on the tips or bases of nuts or, on buds. The third generation moths normally lay their eggs from July to early September. These larvae feed only on the shucks if the pecan shells have hardened to prevent penetration into the kernel. Many third generation larvae do not feed but crawl to the base of a dormant bud and build a tough, silk-like cocoon to spend the winter in and prepare for a first generation emergence the following spring.

To properly scout these in-

sects, carefully examine nutlets for eggs and apply insecticides 2 to 3 days after the first eggs hatch. If properly timed, often a single application of chosen insecticide provides adequate control for first generation Casebearer. A second application may be required if unhatched eggs are found 7 to 10 days after the first application.

Hopefully, this information and background will allow you to monitor your trees, protect your pecans and keep your sights set on that ever-popular pecan pie during the holidays.

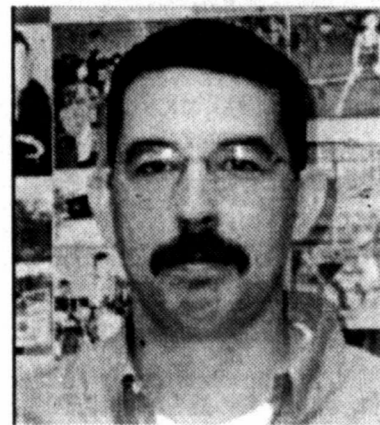

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TB status due around June 1

Public Service Announcement from the Texas Animal Health Commission on Tuberculosis

Texas livestock health officials are alerting cattle producers, veterinarians and livestock markets that the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) will strip Texas of its "Free" status for cattle tuberculosis (TB) eradication on or around June 1. The TB status downgrade will mean that the 150,000 or more breeding cattle hauled out of Texas each year must have a negative tuberculosis skin test prior to being moved. The USDA has placed a moratorium on additional restrictions until at least January 2003, when the state's feeder cattle must be identified with official ear tags before being transported out of state.

"Since late February, we have worked with the USDA and cattle industry groups to prepare for the loss of Texas' TB-free status, which we initially thought would occur as early as April," explained Dr. Linda Logan, Texas' state veterinarian and executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency. "The downgrade in TB status comes as a result of the diagnosis and subsequent depopulation of two TB-infected cattle herds during 2001," she said. "Both infected herds were detected by slaughter plant inspectors, who found carcasses with internal lesions indicative of TB. Lesion samples were submitted to the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) for examination, and we began skin-testing the herds where the animals originated. We closely examined the carcasses of test-positive animals from the herds and submitted lesions to the NVSL for examination and confirmation of TB."

Dr. Logan said the two infected herds, found in South Central Texas in summer 2001, and in Southwest Texas in fall 2001, have been depopulated. More than 130 other herds have been tested, as TAHC and USDA officials search for the origin of the disease outbreak, and where it may have spread. No other infected herds have been detected, and veterinary epidemiologists have been unable to pinpoint the source of infection.

"Federal regulations man-

date a loss of TB-free status when a state has two or more infected herds disclosed within a 48-month period. Texas will move from the TB-free status it has held since November 2000, to modified accredited advanced status, the second highest rung in an international five-tier ranking system for cattle TB eradication," said Dr. Logan.

She said it will take at least two years without an infected herd for Texas to regain its coveted TB-free status enjoyed by all other states except Michigan. The loss of status will immediately impact producers who move or sell breeding cattle out of state, explained Dr. Logan. Breeding animals are bred heifers, bulls and cows. Since many cattle sold at livestock markets are hauled out of state, producer groups have struggled with logistical problems sure to be encountered when untested animals are presented at livestock markets.

She said breeding cattle are exempted from the interstate testing requirement only if they are from TB accredited-free herd (a herd that is tested for TB yearly and is enrolled in the TAHC's accreditation program), are moving to an approved feedyard, or are consigned directly to slaughter.

"If sellers arrive at the livestock market with untested breeding cattle, the market will need to designate the untested animals as 'Texas-only' cattle, restrict the cattle to slaughter only, or they will have to make arrangements for having the animals tested so they can move interstate," explained Dr. Logan. "Producers can

avoid delays in moving their cattle, if they'll have their accredited veterinarian test animals prior to sale."

A TB skin test takes 72 hours to complete and must be conducted by an accredited veterinarian, who injects tuberculin into the skin near the animal's tail, in a site called the 'caudal fold'. After a 72-hour waiting period, the veterinarian examines the injection site for a response, such as redness or swelling. Animals without a response can move.

If a response is detected, Dr. Logan said a second test must be applied on the animal's neck by a state or federal regulatory veterinarian. This comparative cervical test also requires a period of 72 hours after injection before it can be read, she said. Animals with negative results on the comparative cervical test also are free to move.

"One or two percent of animals will test positive on the caudal fold test but then are cleared for movement with a negative comparative cervical test," said Dr. Logan. "If the animals have skin reactions on both tests, however, they need to be slaughtered and closely examined, as there is strong evidence that the animal has been infected with TB."

Veterinarians from the TAHC and the USDA in Texas will work with private veterinary practitioners and producers to conduct all needed comparative cervical tests as quickly as possible," said Dr. Logan. "Preventing bottlenecks and keeping Texas livestock moving will be a key goal for our staff."

Dr. Logan said that cattle industry groups continue to

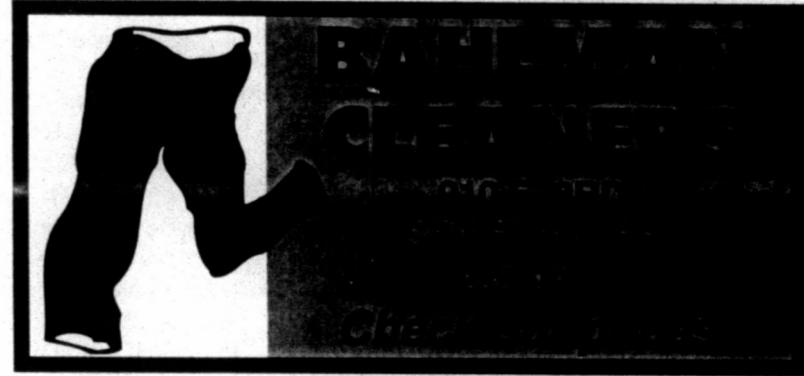
develop plans to address federal TB requirements that will apply to Texas feeder cattle as of January 2003.

"More than 1.5 million feeder cattle leave Texas each year, and each of these animals will have to wear an official identification ear tag," said Dr. Logan. "Currently, official tags are used to identify animals tested for brucellosis, and these must be applied by private veterinary practitioners, or state or federal staff. We are working with industry and the USDA to develop an acceptable ear tag that can be provided and applied by the cattle owner. The identification tags improve the ability to trace animals back to their herd of origin."

"Additionally, it is anticipated that feeder heifers and most bull calves in interstate movement will also have to be TB tested, unless they go to an approved feedlot or directly to slaughter. This is to prevent untested heifers or bulls from being moved from the feedyard back to the ranch. In order to regain our state's TB-free status, we must conduct stepped-up surveillance to ensure that we do not have additional undetected TB infection," declared Dr. Logan.

"We are trying to find an acceptable alternative to testing the 750,000 feeder heifers that move, as this would require a greater number of veterinarians than are currently available to conduct the testing," said Dr. Logan.

"We hope to strike an agreement with the USDA to allow approved pastures or feedlots in other states that would accept untested heifers.



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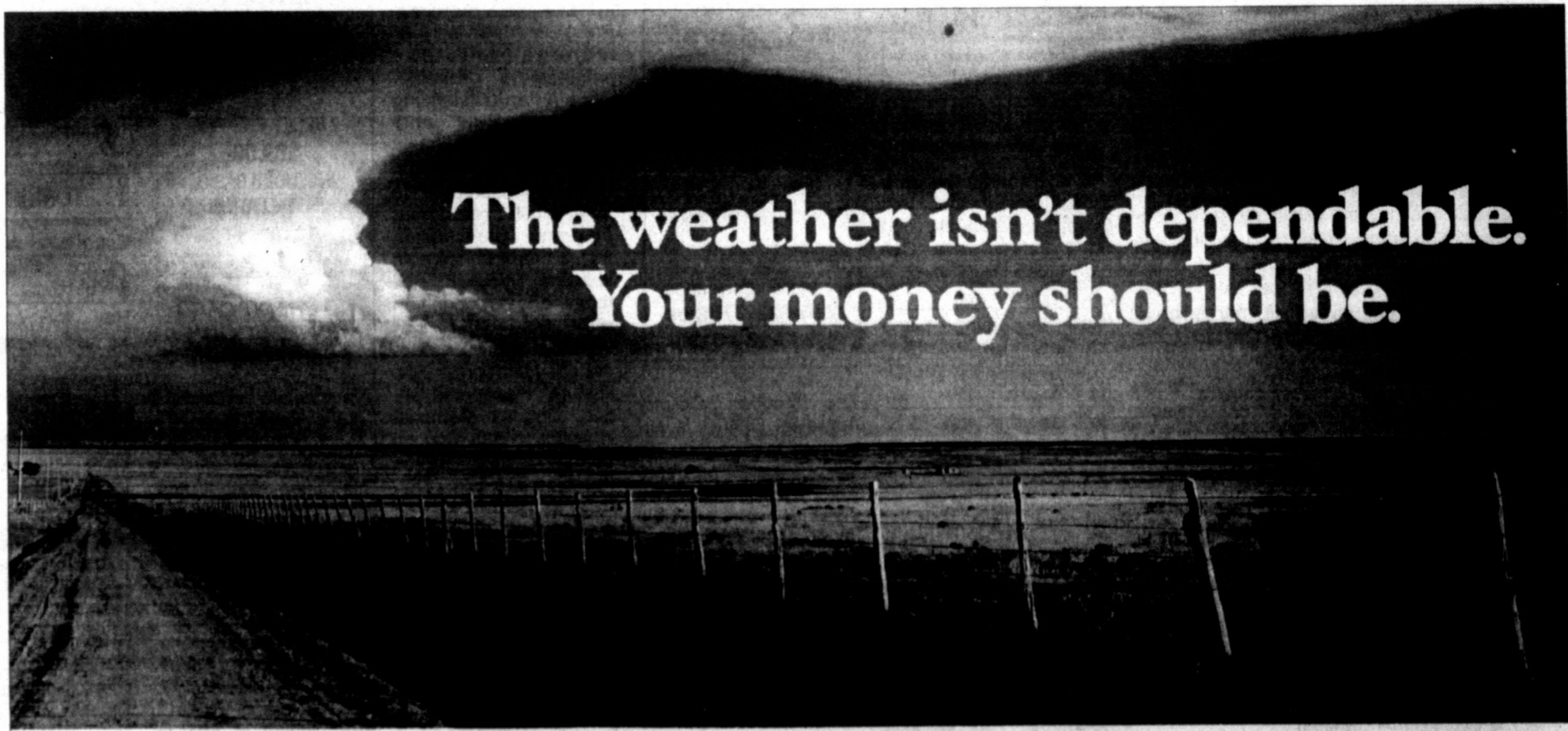
