Requirement Of Sales Tax Permit Slated

Every person in the business of "selling, leasing or renting tangible personal property" needs a sales tax permit.

That directive came Tuesday from State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. And though many thousands of Texans who will help collect the tax starting Friday will not have a permit, their liability will begin anyway. The permits will be issued later.

Calvert said a permit will be required at each place of business. Applications must show the name and location of the business and be signed by the owner, a partner or executive officer.

The permit cannot be transferred. It is valid only for the person named, and the specific location. A single permit will suffice when two or more businesses are operated under one roof by the same person.

The permit must be conspicuously displayed at the place for which it is issued. Calvert said. An organization of salesmen would need a permit only for the central office.

Persons who fail to comply with the law may have their limited sales tax permit revoked or suspended but only after a hearing before the comptroller. A new permit would be issued to such person only after the comptroller is convinced that the applicant intends to obey the law and regulations regarding the sales tax.

Award Contract Titus F-M Road

A contract for what is hoped to be the first link in state highway route from Mt. Pleasant to Clarksville has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

A contract for 3.0 miles of construction on F. M. Road 2681 in Titus County has been awarded to a Dallas firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Flenniken Construction Co., Inc., submitted the low bid of \$269,995 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing from County Road north to F. M. Road 71 at Wilkinson is expected to take 160 working days, according to G. A. Youngs, District Highway Engineer at Atlanta. J. H. Crawford, Resident Engineer at Mt. Pleasant, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Drivers License Increase Sept. 1

Austin. — The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texas drivers today an increase in license fees has been ordered by the Legislature effective September 1.

The Texas operator's license on and after that date will be increased from \$2 to \$3 for a two-year period, the commercial driver's license will increase from \$3 to \$4.50 for a one-year period, and the chauffeur's license will go up from \$4 to \$6 per year.

The fee for a duplicate of a lost license will remain at 25 cents.

"We urge all drivers to be sure they send the right amount in with their renewal applications," said Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director. "Those which are accompanied by the old fee after September 1 will have to be returned to the sender, causing unnecessary delay and inconvenience."

He said the \$3 two-year operator's license will still be lower than the fees in -12 other states, and will be exactly the same as in five other states. He reported Texas now has 4,838,000 currently-licensed drivers.

"Incidentally," said Garrison, "we would like to urge drivers to take care of their licenses, in spite of the fact that it only costs 25 cents for a replacement. Last year we received 85,000 applications for duplications of lost or mutilated licenses."

Dove Season Opens Friday September 1

Friday, September 1, is the first day of the dove season. The North Zone season this year will start at 12 noon September 1 and close at sunset October 30.

Bag limit will remain the same as last season, 15 daily and 30 in possession after the first day.

It will be necessary to have a new 1961-62 hunting license to hunt on Sept. 1. New fishing licenses are also on sale and new ones will be needed after Friday.

The new hunting license costs \$3.15 for a resident, \$25.00 for the non-resident, and fishing licenses cost \$2.15. People under 17 require neither of the licenses, nor does the person over 65.

Austin. — Gov. Price Daniel, pointing to the record of most other states that have a general sales tax, warns Texans that without concerted efforts to shave state spending the Texas tax could grow to three or four per cent in the future.

More than that, he said, unless there is "prudent economy and reorganization of state funds and services," a state income tax might become law.

To make his point, Governor Daniel reported that two-thirds of the 34 states that have general sales taxes have increased the rate to three per cent or more, and there are now four states charging a four per cent sales tax.

He again made clear his dislike for the two per cent Texas tax, but added:

"So much for the good and bad which will result from the new tax bill. On September 1 it will be the law of our state, and as long as the law is in effect, it behooves all of us, whether we like it or not, to cooperate in its enforcement. This I shall do, and I believe every good citizen will do likewise."

Meanwhile State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert is being swamped with questions about the new tax. After checking with other states which have pioneered in this field, he has become reconciled to the likelihood that confusion will reign for some time to come. A spokesman for his office pointed out that "California and Illinois got a sales tax in 1933, and they're still issuing rulings."

The Texas Research League has noted that the tax bill exempts sales of animals ordinarily eaten by humans. Also feed for such animals. Exempt too are seeds and plants edible by humans and raised for sale, fungicides and insecticides for such plants, and fertilizer used on lands where such food is grown. But the researchers say this exemption would not apply to tropical fish, grass seed and fertilizer for lawns and rose bushes.

Vehicle Law Changes Told

Only vehicles which can operate on public roads without registration after Sept. 15 are farm tractors, implements of husbandry and farm trailers or semi-trailers with a gross weight not exceeding 4000 pounds, according to County Tax Assessor-Collector. This is a part of House Bill 1082 recently passed by the Texas Legislature.

All others now are required to be registered, including water well drilling units and road machinery such as tractors, air compressors and drag lines. This also includes all vehicles owned by political subdivisions of the state even though they are exempt from paying the prescribed fees.

The applications are available at the county tax assessor-collector's office. A photograph of each piece of equipment must be attached to the application.

The law becomes effective Sept. 15. Annual fee for each piece of equipment is \$5.

Mobil Ladies Club were hostesses to their husbands at a picnic Tuesday night at Dellwood Park in Mt. Pleasant.

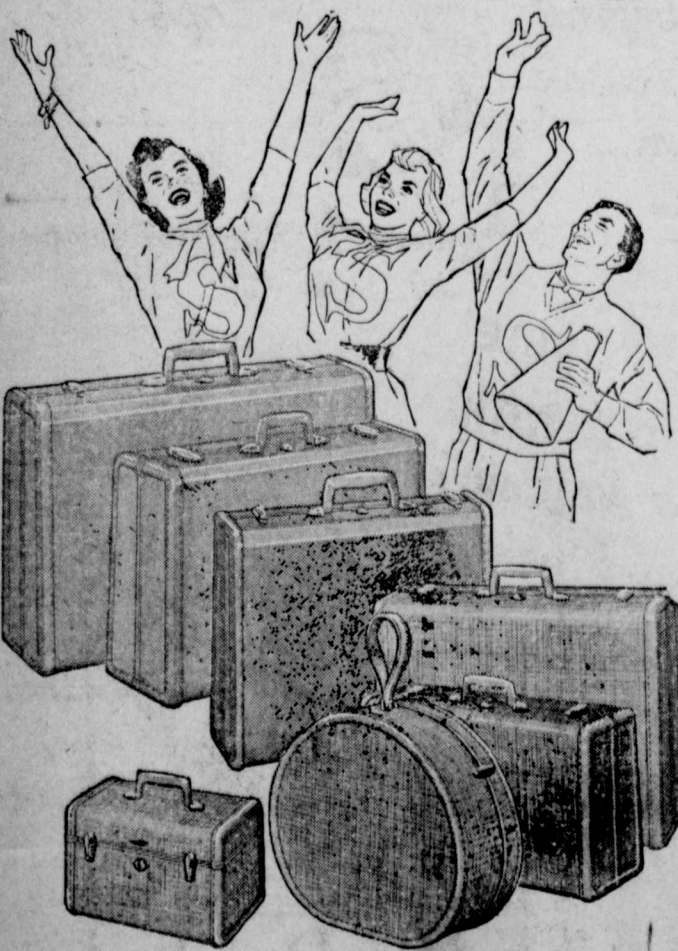
