ROBS GRAVE; BURNS BODY TO FEIGN DEAD

(By Associated Press)
ST. LOUIS, Sept. 29.—The police today announced that they were fully convinced that Harry R. Brenn placed the body of Miss Celestine Schneider in his garage near here shortly before the garage was destroyed by fire last Tuesday.

Brenn has been missing since the fire, and it was at first thought that he was burned to death in his garage, but later an examination of the charred remains of the body showed it to be the remains of a woman. Simultaneously with this discovery it developed that a grave in the cemetery had been robbed, and the remains of a young woman who had just been buried removed, and further examination convinced the authorities that Brenn robbed the grave, placed the body of Miss Schneider in his garage and set the garage on fire

for the purpose of making it appear that he had been burned to death.

Brenn carried \$16,000 life insurance. An order for his arrest has been sent to all parts of the country.

MOVE TO IMPEACH PORTO RICO GOV.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Felix Cordova Davita, resident commissioner of Porto Rico, announced today that he would leave here shortly for San Juan to obtain documentary evidence on which he would ask congress to impeach Governor E. Montt. Davita said, "the administration having failed to act on the plea of the people of Porto Rico for the removal of Montt, the only course by which this may be brought about is through the institution of impeachment proceedings."

CAT KILLS BIG RATTLESNAKE

Rev. and Mrs. Doss are visiting in Tennessee, and Judge Doss and family drive out daily to feed the chickens and cats and look after the place, and when they went out Thursday afternoon they found the big cat in battle royal with the rattler, and had just about put the snake to death when Judge Doss arrived on the scene. The cat killed the snake where the children run around and play every day when they go out to "Granny's."

The snake had five rattles and was an ugly customer. Judge Doss says he watched the sensational fight and that the cat killed the snake by clawing it on the head.

FAIR DIRECTORS ADMIT CO. AWARDS UNFAIR

ABILENE, Tex., Sept. 29.—The directors and officials of the West Texas Fair Association admit that Runnels county did not get a square deal at the hands of the judge who made the awards in the county exhibits.

Runnels county was awarded fourth place, Callahan getting first, Lubbock second and Mitchell third. The committee in charge of the Runnels county booth filed a protest and asked for a hearing, contending that the judge was incompetent, that the judging was not according to the rules, and that sufficient time was not devoted to the judging.

The directors and officials of the fair admitted that the judge was incompetent and that enough time was not devoted to judging the county exhibits, and also admit that Runnels county's entry was entitled to a higher place than fourth, but laid the situation before the Ballinger committee, asking that the committee co-operate to prevent dissatisfaction among the other counties.

The Ballinger committee yielded to the request of the fair directors and agreed to take no further action, and will accept the unjust verdict of the incompetent judge.

The Ballinger delegation here attending the fair today gathered at the booth, and after seeing all

the other exhibits, supports the committee's contention that the Runnels county exhibit is the best in the Abilene fair.

The directors of the fair association expressed their appreciation for the attitude the Ballinger committee assumed in the controversy, and say that the exhibit made by Runnels county speaks for itself.

The committee from the Young Men's Business League which entered the agricultural exhibit at the West Texas Fair at Abilene and later protested against the manner in which the awards were made in the county division states that there was no protest against the treatment received at the hands of fair officials or directors.

The secretary of the Abilene fair was hard pressed for judges and used the director of the Judging Department, who did not pose as an agricultural expert. After judging the individual entries the judge looked over the county booths for a few minutes and made his awards. Exhibitors and farm experts present both stated that the judging could not well be done in less than half a day. The awards were not based on scoring as provided in the catalogue, and from the time devoted to the judging neither variety nor quality could have been taken into consideration.

CARMEL, N. Y., Sept. 29.—James A. Stillman, former president of the National City Bank of New York, was denied a decree in his suit for absolute divorce against his wife, Anne U. Stillman, by Daniel J. Gleason, referee in the case. The legitimacy of baby Guy Stillman was also affirmed. This is a complete victory for Mrs. Stillman.

The referee confirmed Mrs. Stillman's charges that Stillman miscondacted himself with Florence Leeder, a former show girl; and that a Mrs. Leads had borne two children, alleged to be the children of Stillman. The referee stated that Stillman's evidence tended to establish the untruth and falsity of testimony that Mrs. Stillman had miscondacted herself with Fred Beauvais, the part Indian guide, who is alleged by Stillman to be the father of baby Guy.

CONFERENCE MAY AVERT TURKO-BRITISH FIGHT

(Associated Press Dispatch)

Mustapha Kemal Pasha in replying to General Harrington's telegram for a conference, has sent a message declaring that the Turkish troops would not advance further, and says that he desires no incident to occur, and that he will see Gen. Harrington as soon as possible.

The Greek army in Thrace and the army corps in Epirus have joined the revolutionary forces. The revolutionary committee has decided to submit to King George the names of a new cabinet with Alexander Zaimis as Premier, and M. Politis as Minister of Foreign Affairs. The general elections will probably be proclaimed next week.

Constantine is not imprisoned by the revolutionary forces, but the committee has not decided what shall be done with him.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 29.—General Harrington, commander in chief of the British forces in the Dardanelles area, plans to leave here this afternoon for a conference with Mustapha Kemal Pasha. The conference will probably be held at Mudania on the seacoast of Marmora.

The British leaders are confident that if the next twenty-four hours can pass without the firing of a shot in Chanak, or other points along the Dardanelles, all immediate danger of hostilities between the Turks and British will be averted.

By the recent invasions the Turks have completed occupation of the neutral zone in defiance of Great Britain's ultimatums, and it is believed that the climax is swiftly approaching and that actual combat will start soon unless good results come from the conference between General Harrington and Kemal Pasha.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—Former King Constantine, of Greece, was held prisoner in Athens pending arrangements for sending him out of the country, according to messages received at official quarters here today.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—Former Premier Venizelos received a telegram today saying that the revolutionary committee had expressed its entire confidence in him, charging him with the defense of the national cause. The telegram solicited his immediate co-operation.

BALLINGER COTTON MARKET HOLDS TOP

There has been no complaint at the Ballinger cotton market this season. Ballinger spots hold right along with Dallas spots, cotton selling on the street here as high as the Dallas quotation on the local exchange, and within fifty and seventy-five points of the Houston and Galveston spots markets. Up until the last day or two cotton had not sold on the Ballinger market for less than twenty cents. Dallas spots Thursday were quoted at 19.35 and cotton was selling for 19.50 on the Ballinger street. The Ballinger cotton exchange posts quotations on all markets, and the farmers are free to see for themselves what cotton is selling for on the larger and distant markets.

FAMILIES OF BRITISH SAILORS GET PENSIONS

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Sept. 28.—J. Havelock Wilson, Member of Parliament, general president of the National Sailors' and Firemen's Union, has received official notification from the treasury that 5,000,000 pounds (\$25,000,000) of German reparation money has been finally earmarked for distribution among the dependents of 17,000 British seamen who were done to death by the German sink-at-sight submarine campaign.

During the war merchant seamen on unarmed ships did not rank for pensions or compensations under any naval conditions. Their work in manning food ships was accompanied with great loss of life, and the prime minister, thru Mr. Wilson, gave an undertaking that in the event of victory, the first payment from German reparation money should be for compensation to the dependents of this class of seamen.

GRACEFUL NEGLIGEEES FOR FALL ARRIVE IN DISTINCT GROUPS



"NEGLIGEE" should be given a broad construction because it includes several distinct types of dresses for wear at home and each type is intended for a special kind of service. These types must be reported separately since they have so little in common that what applies to one is not true of another. For instance, the kimono and the tea frock are so different that they cannot be considered together, yet they are both negligees.

Negligees are conveniently classed, first as kimonos or as belonging to the kimono group, which includes all those intimate garments intended for wear in the bedroom. Then come breakfast coats, or lounging robes in which one is presentable in the house, and finally, more formal negligees that are described as tea frocks, or hostess gowns. They are the lovely and picturesque affairs in which women spend their leisure with friends who drop in and drink a cup of tea.

All these different types are shown in new developments. The kimono appears in the regulation kimono cut, and in the cut style and wrap model, all opening down the front. There are some slip-overs shown among them and some of them have a giraffe or sash about the waist. Designers have seized upon the new "blistered" cottons and cotton mull, for making them. Old-time albatross and

French flannel are also used in addition to the regulation silk and cotton crepe weaves.

In breakfast coats, corduroy and quilted silks divide interest with tattered silk and matelasse. The corduroy has made departure in style and appears in Persian and checked printed patterns. These coats open at the front, are bloused at the back, or all around, and have long girdles of the material, often ending in tassels, that tie at the front. Their sleeves are capacious, usually of the square type, and many of the coats are provided with pockets.

AMERICAN MULE REIGNS SUPREME IN ARMENIA

(By Associated Press)

ERIVAN, Sept. 28.—The American mule is 2.08 times as efficient as the Armenian ox, and 2.68 times as efficient as the Caucasian horse, according to figures reported by the American farming experts in charge of the agricultural program of the Near East in the Caucasus.

These computations are made on a cost-efficiency basis, taking into consideration capital investment, upkeep, length of service, and amount of work accomplished. The mule beats even the tractor in small farming operations, but farms of more than 500 acres bring down tractor costs per unit of work done to a basis below that of the mule.

American mules were introduced here about a year ago. American relief organizations now use 300 of these animals on their various agricultural relief projects. Plans for the breeding of the American type mule on Armenian soil will be shortly carried into effect in Northern Armenia.

CHEAPER POSTAL RATES FOR CENTRAL EUROPE

(By Associated Press)

ROME, Sept. 28.—Austria, Rumania, Italy, Czechoslovakia and Hungary have come to an agreement by which the letters exchanged between them will pay a postal rate 25 per cent less than those addressed to other foreign countries.

The object of this agreement is to keep closely bound together all the new states which have sprung out of what was once the Austro-Hungarian Empire, with the addition of Italy and Rumania, both of whom have very considerable interests in common with the signatories of this new postal agreement.

TURKEY CROP SLIGHTLY SHORT

The turkey crop in Runnels county is not as good as it was last year, in the opinion of E. A. Jeanes, head of the Jeanes poultry packing plant, who has made some inquiry concerning the outlook for turkeys this fall.

Mr. Jeanes states that he finds that turkey growers experienced considerable bad luck last spring, and suffered heavy losses of young turkeys. However, Mr. Jeanes thinks the market will be good and that much money will be turned loose here for turkeys. Chickens are more plentiful than turkeys, but the market is on the drag at present, this being the off season in the poultry market.

Eggs are looking up, the local market paying as high as 30 cents recently, but the prevailing price is two-bits. The supply is only sufficient for local demand, very few eggs being shipped out. Both eggs and poultry will begin to move the last of October and early in November. Mr. Jeanes stated that his packing plant would be put in operation early and both turkeys and chickens dressed out for the early holiday trade.

BIRD HUNTERS CAUSE DAMAGE

"If there is not a let up on damage being caused to our high line we are going to be forced to employ guards," said Chester Cherry, local manager of the Ballinger Light & Power Company. "We have been losing from six to a dozen insulators a day," said Mr. Cherry, "and an investigation shows that they are being shot off."

Mr. Cherry stated that in most cases he believed that the insulators were shot off accidentally, or carelessly by bird hunters who were driving along the road and shooting doves from the cross beams of the high line poles. He stated that the linemen had been called out twice this week at night to replace insulators on account of damage and causing the current from San Angelo to be cut off. Nine insulators were broken Tuesday evening after the high line had been inspected, showing that the damage was done late and only a short time before night, and the greatest damage has been a few miles South of the city.

There is a heavy penalty for such devilment where maliciously committed, and if accidentally committed there is danger of someone getting in serious trouble.
