BANKER AIDED FARMERS WHIP DROUGHT YEAR

BLUE HILL, Neb. (UP)—The story of the growth made by the Commercial State Bank in this town of 565 is indicative of the comeback that has been made in other communities which once were in the heart of the nation's dust bowl.

Back in 1935, when dust clouds blotted out the sun for days at a time, the deposits of the Commercial State Bank were only a quarter-million dollars. In September this year they were \$2,237,131.23.

Farmers may have been discouraged, but they did not despair in those drought years when fine topsoil drifted fence-high behind Russian battleships. One of the reasons was Edgar McBride, the bank's president.

There is the story of one farmer who in 1935 didn't have enough to pay interest on a note at the bank. He was feeding tumbleweeds to his cattle. There was no other feed.

McBride and the farmer sat on the fence and talked things over. The bank carried the farmer along, says McBride, the farmer probably has \$15,000 to the good.

The Blue Hill banker believes in getting out among his patrons. He believes the "fellow you do business with likes to know you're interested in his welfare."

The bank makes no pretense at being anything other than a country-town bank. The shades go down at closing time, but the customer with business that can't wait gets in the front door. And the bank never closes Saturday afternoons.

McBride, who is finishing his term as president of the Nebraska Bankers Association, also heads his county's soil conservation group, takes an active interest in 4-H club work, and is chairman of Blue Hill's village board. Recently, he was elected district American Legion commander.

His father, the late Edgar McBride, Sr., started the bank in 1905. Today it is one of three in the county and has 1,700 depositors in an area 80 miles from east to west and "quite a way north and south."

Pioneer, 82, Divides 50 Year Old Collection

LAUREL, Neb. (UP)—Mrs. Susie West, 82, Laurel pioneer, ended a 50-year hobby when she recently gave her collection of 13 scrapbooks to friends and relatives.

The scrapbooks include clippings covering a period of 50 years and a variety of subjects, such as a "Family Album," "A History of Laurel," and a "Travelogue" of one of Mrs. West's daughters. One contains a complete history of all servicemen from this area in World War I.

Others have a number of newspaper clippings, news of Laurel's schools, and one on pioneers.

Mrs. West began her collection in the '20's when one of her sons asked for a "piece to speak" at rural school. After an hour-long hunt for a suitable poem, she resolved such a situation would not happen again.

Some pages of clippings have been sent across the nation to answer questions. Other volumes are almost falling apart from constant use.

Mrs. West has joined a daughter at Sedalia, Mo., and she took one scrapbook with her—the first one.

UNIONS SEEK VOTE ON PRICE OF PRODUCTS

WASHINGTON (UP)—A Labor-Management conference committee today studied suggestions that unions have a voice in the pricing of products and location of new plants.

The committee on management's right to manage was seeking to determine whether such innovations were feasible and whether they would contribute to better industry-labor relations.

Those were among the 35 or 40 issues still facing this one committee alone. An employer member said the questions reflected the scope of the many tough problems being threshed out by the three-week old conference.

Despite the complex job ahead, two spokesmen predicted that the conference called by President Truman to minimize industrial strife would come up with a procedural formula that will help achieve the goal.

The optimistic forecasts came from President Eric Johnston of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce and Conference Secretary George W. Taylor.

Meanwhile, the National Association of Manufacturers attacked the recent report by economists in the office of reconversion which held that industry could give labor a 24 per cent wage increase without a price increase.

Walter B. Weisenburger, NAM executive vice-president, said in an editorial in the NAM news that the report was based on "incredible assumptions."

Among these, he said, were assumptions that there will be 8,000,000 unemployed from private industry through all of 1946—that the 10,000,000 persons released from the armed services by next January will remain unemployed all of next year, and that the 1,500,000 civilian employees released by war and navy departments will likewise remain unemployed.

SUPERFORT BREAKS WORLD FLIGHT RECORD

WASHINGTON (UP)—A U. S. Superfortresses arrived here from Guam today, setting a new world's nonstop distance flight record of an estimated 8,198 miles.

The flying time was 35 hours and five minutes.

The plane landed at National Airport at 12:35 p. m. CST. It left Guam at 2:30 a. m. EST Monday.

Manned by a double crew and stripped of excess equipment, the B-29 came on to Washington after exceeding the old record for nonstop distance flight as it passed over LaCrosse, Wis., at 9:30 a. m. EST.

The former record was held by British fliers who flew 5,158 miles.

Funeral services for Arthur S. Crossley were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the First Baptist church in Eastland with Rev. H. B. Johnson officiating. Interment was in the Eastland cemetery and arrangements were by Klingensmith Funeral Home.

Mr. Crossley who died at his home in Dallas early Saturday morning, was born in Sipe Springs, November 19, 1881. He had resided in Eastland county for 45 years prior to going to Dallas four years ago to make his home with a daughter.

Survivors include the following sons: A. Gerald Crossley of Hawthorne, California; Phillip G. Crossley of the Army of occupation in Germany; Arthur E. Crossley with the U. S. Navy in Okinawa, Lannie W. Crossley with the Navy in Norfolk, Va., and Darwin B. Crossley with the Navy in Tokyo Bay; three daughters, Mrs. Mildred Hogan, Clearwater, California, Mrs. Maebell Wilder of Dallas and Mrs. Ernest F. Shelton of Ranger. Two brothers, M. V. Crossley of Carbon and J. P. Crossley of Lubbock and a sister Mrs. Sarah Kitchens of Colorado City, also survive.

Fallbearers were Will Van Gern, Roy Lawson, Weaver Hagus and Ralph Copeland all of Eastland and A. B. Reddell and J. C. Kelley of Ranger.

ADMIRAL TELLS COMMITTEE HE SOUGHT MOVE IN EARLY '40

WASHINGTON (UP)—Adm. J. O. Richardson said today that Adm. Harold R. Stark, chief of naval operations, agreed with his arguments against basing the fleet at Pearl Harbor in 1940 but that the late President Roosevelt overruled them.

Richardson was commander of the U. S. Fleet from January, 1940 until he was relieved on February 1, 1941, by Rear Adm. Husband E. Kimmel. He told the congressional Pearl Harbor investigating committee he strongly opposed keeping the fleet in Hawaiian waters because it could not be effectively defended or supplied there.

He also testified that he never heard until today of a letter sent in January, 1941 by the late Secretary of Navy Frank Knox to former Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson in which Knox said it was "essentially possible" that Japan might start hostilities with a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor.

The Knox letter was made public last August when results of the Army and Navy investigations were released by President Truman.

Richardson said Stark agreed with his fears about keeping the fleet at Pearl Harbor where the witnesses said, army defense arrangements were wholly inadequate.

In the course of his testimony on defense preparations, Richardson told the committee that the Army in Hawaii was ordered on the alert for an air raid in the spring of 1940 but that he never was able to find out whether it was a drill or the real thing.

His efforts to get an explanation from Washington were unavailing, Richardson said, and he assumed it was a drill.

The Knox letter was a summation of the defense situation at Pearl Harbor and was written as a result of Richardson's previous reports.

In the letter, Knox listed the dangers of a Japanese attack, in order of their probability, as follows: "1. Air bombing attack; 2. air torpedo plane attack; 3. submarine; 4. submarine attack; 5. mining; 6. bombardment by gun fire."

Wendell Surles Enroute Home From The Pacific

Pearl Harbor, T. H.—Wendell M. Surles, USN, USN, husband of Mrs. Gladys O. Surles, of 701 Young St., Ranger, Texas is on his way home.

Surles is one of 2,000 high-point Navy veterans whom the "Magic Carpet" is bringing back to the States aboard the U.S.S. Hornet.

The U.S.S. Hornet—one of more than 250 carriers, battleships, cruisers and attack transports in the Navy's famed "Magic Carpet" fleet—left Pearl Harbor, Thursday, November 8, and is scheduled to arrive in San Francisco about Tuesday, November 13.

Passengers will go directly to the Separation Centers nearest their homes to complete the formalities of obtaining their discharges before returning to civilian life.

C. J. Moore Back From Hudson Show In Dallas

C. J. Moore was in Dallas Monday to attend a dealers' private showing of the new Hudson automobiles.

He stated today that they are the finest cars that he has ever seen and that exterior to the Commander model looks like a "queen's vanity box". The pickups, he said, are in a class by themselves. The three-quarter ton pickups have large bodies and tires and are something to see, according to Moore.

Moore, who has been in the automobile business for 24 years and with the Hudson company since 1933, expects to have both pickup and passenger cars sometime next week.

Settlement Of French Political Crisis Likely

PARIS (UP)—Hope for a peaceful settlement of France's political crisis rose today after a "reconciliation" meeting of Gen. Charles De Gaulle and the leaders of the three main parties.

Informed political quarters believed De Gaulle now was prepared to make sufficient concessions to enable him to form a coalition cabinet in which the communists would be willing to participate.

Plane Carrying Submarines Seen By Ranger Man

Mrs. Ethel Gilmore has received a letter from her son, Henry Harold Gilmore, seaman second class with the United States Navy who is stationed on a LSD in Tokyo bay, in which he tells of being anchored within a hundred yards of the Japanese submarine aircraft carriers.

According to the letter the submarine carriers had been built by Japan for the purpose of bombing New York and the Panama Canal. The submarines were designed to carry two or three planes and the pilots of the planes would have been kamikaze, or suicide fliers.

Information on the under surface carriers was obtained from an officer of one of the subs.

Twenty Nazis Go On Trial For Their War Crimes

NUERNBERG (UP)—Twenty fallen leaders of the Nazi regime went on trial before a United Nations tribunal today listened anxiously to a shocking indictment holding them directly responsible for the death and misery of World War II.

The portentous trial that for the first time in history sought to prove aggressive warfare a crime against all mankind opened in an atmosphere of grim, cold legality in Nuernberg's ancient Palace of Justice.

Here's another bit of verse that is an old-time favorite, author unknown—called "One Step at a Time":
