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BEST COUNTY EXHIBIT GOES TO ROOSEVELT

The Portales, Roosevelt county, exhibit was awarded first premium for the best county exhibit, thereby receiving complete vindication for the use of the slogan, in bold letters, "The Garden Spot of the World." A display of cotton in this exhibit is attracting general attention, the great majority of people visiting the exhibit had been unaware that cotton is being grown in New Mexico and bids fair to becoming quite an important crop. The Portales exhibit also includes an excellent display of felterita, on which second premium was awarded. An attractive display of general forage crops in the Roosevelt exhibit, speaks eloquently of the possibilities along this line in New Mexico. This display was awarded first premium. The following is a partial list of premiums awarded the Portales exhibit: Cantaloupes, first and second premiums; cabbage, first; pop corn, first; onion, first; watermelons, first and second; celery, second; mangoes, first; white dent corn, first; yellow flint corn, first; millet, first; felterita, second; milo maize, second; general forage crops, first.—Morning Journal.

FEDERAL COOPERATION FOR GOOD ROADS

(From the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture.) Secretary Houston of the department of agriculture says that the state and federal governments should work together for highway improvement in order that a large proportion of the money annually spent for road construction may not be wasted. In his department the office of public roads has been demonstrating the value of proper road building by the construction of certain object-lesson roads, and the forest service is carrying out his idea of national and state cooperation in road building. The law requires that ten per cent of the gross receipts from the national forest shall be spent in the states in which the forests are situated. This money is expended for road improvement under direct control of the secretary of agriculture.

ROOSEVELT COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Mrs. F. Culbertson, county superintendent of schools for Roosevelt county, has forwarded to the state educational department, the report of the schools in that county. According to this report which embraces 25 districts employing 56 teachers, school will be held in four districts for the full nine months, in five districts there will be seven months school, in five districts there will be six months school, 24 will hold five months and one will only run three months. There are 2523 children of school age in the county according to the 1913 census. The 56 teachers draw monthly the sum of \$2105 or an average of \$37.40 each.—Roswell Morning News.

WHAT TO DO

What the Church Can Do in the Prevention of Tuberculosis

By Philip P. Jacobs, B. D., Ph. D., of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

It needs little argument to convince an ordinary thinking man that tuberculosis is one of the most serious problems that confront those who would endeavor to conserve the health of the nation. Neither does it require very much concentration of thought or observation on the part of the average pastor to convince himself that this same disease produces no small part of the labor which he is called upon to perform. Actual statistics gathered by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, have shown that in over seven hundred churches studied, tuberculosis caused more than 10 per cent. of all deaths that occurred in these congregations.

When the pastor stops to consider that every death from tuberculosis has meant to him or his church visitors, dozens and possibly hundreds of calls, perhaps large sums of money for relief, and finally the exacting service of burial with possibly an added burden of funeral expenses upon the church, the true significance of church deaths stand out much more clearly.

And when the pastor, looking at the problem in the broadest Christian spirit, sees the misery, the want, the suffering, and the loss which this disease has entailed upon this 10 per cent. of his flock who are annually cut off from his church, he must indeed ask the same question which his Master asked of the man at the Pool of Bethesda: "Wilt thou be made whole?"

Here is the problem of the pastor: To make whole those who are broken in health and in spirit; to heal those who are sick and to shield those who are well from the threatening danger of omnipresent infection.

This task demands from the pastor three distinct lines of effort, and not from the pastor alone, by means, but from his whole church, even down to the smallest child in the Sunday school.

The first of these lines of service may be called that of education. One of the important functions of the church has always been, even in the early days of primitive Christianity, to instruct those who are ignorant in the things that they ought to know, not only religious but secular as well. The church has always been the champion of education, especially when she has been living up to her highest ideals. Here, then, is a particular line of education along which she must strive with vigor in co-operation with other agencies, if she would be true to the service to which she is called. I look for the time when not only from the pulpit will lessons of health and tuberculosis be taught, when not only on special occasions will lectures on tuberculosis and health be given, but when even in the Sunday school, instruction in the care of the body and in the prevention of disease will go hand in hand with instruction concerning the Bible and concerning the great missionary progress which the church is today making. The education of the congregation in the principles of the prevention of tuberculosis is as much a function of the church, as is the instruction of the congregation in the methods of work along lines more particularly ecclesiastical. I find my warrant for this somewhat bold assertion in the life and teaching of Jesus himself, who not only went about preaching, but healed the sick and did those things to relieve suffering and prevent disease which he expected his followers to do in later years. The lecture, the sermon, the distribution of literature, the mission study class, the home missionary society, the Sunday school, these are but a few of the means and agencies which can be used to spread the knowledge of tuberculosis and its preventability.

The second line along which the church should strive in the prevention of tuberculosis is that of supporting movements for more hospitals, more dispensaries, and better provision generally for tuberculosis cases. It is indeed an anomalous situation and in inconsistency on the part of the church when she sits by idly watching while the community is stirred to its depths in an effort to secure a county or a municipal hospital for tuberculosis patients. Why should not a pastor be asked to appeal to his congregation as voters, as citizens, as men and women, as a church, to support a movement of this sort? Why is it not a function of the church to undertake to lead the movement of this sort rather than to stand back and look on idly or to fall in the rear? Truly, no Christian man can reconcile such dilatory tactics with the teaching and practice of his Master. He can find no warrant for such action in New Testament scripture, nor in Old Testament practice. If the church can not stand in the front in every movement that seeks to conserve the health of the community, how can she consistently preach the gospel of good news and peace to all mankind which she professes to preach? How can she preach peace, when she sits by and condones conditions which produce disease, unhappiness, and misery in her own ranks?

The third line of effort which I would suggest, is probably the one which has always seemed most obvious to the church and to church progress, but the one which, to my mind, is of least importance to the church as an institution. I speak of the relief problem. When one mentions to the average churchworker the duty of the church in the anti-tuberculosis campaign, he is usually confronted with the response that his particular church has joined the campaign because they have, I smooth, given a few dollars or a few baskets of provisions to some poor sufferer from this disease. I will not attempt to discuss in this place the division of responsibility between private and public philanthropy. Suffice it to say that while the church can do much, and has done much, in the actual material re-

lief of suffering, the time has come when she should realize that she can get better results for the same amount of labor and money in other fields of constructive and preventive philanthropy than in the strictly relief field. This does not mean, however, that the church should withhold any support from those who are needy and who cry for aid. Perhaps in some cases the expenditure of \$100 in paying the board of a tuberculosis patient in a sanatorium and caring for his family at home, would produce much greater results than the same amount of money expended in another form. As a general rule, however, the giving of relief as the chief means for the prevention of tuberculosis has proven ineffective.

There are many who feel that the church is losing her grip upon the masses because she does not preach a more militant and regnant gospel of salvation. I am in sympathy with those who feel this way, and I think that much can be done to add positiveness to the wavering religious consciousness of the average community. On the other hand, I quite disagree with those same persons who insist that here the church should stop her endeavors, and that she should confine her work only to this one field. If 10 per cent. of all of the deaths in our church congregations are due to this one disease, tuberculosis, is not the gospel of health just as vital a problem to the church as the gospel of salvation? What good can the church do to dead men, and (f how much service to her are those who are afflicted with tuberculosis, and who lie for months and

possibly years on beds of suffering? Is it not a sounder Christian and economic policy for the church to heal the sick and prevent disease while she preaches to men the gospel of salvation, both of soul and body?

There are many problems of social significance in which the church should today interest herself, but there are few, if any, which are of such vital and every-day significance to her as this problem of prevention of tuberculosis in her own ranks. Even the problems of child labor, the saloon, political corruption, and many others lack the vital touch upon the life and heartstrings of the church that this problem of tuberculosis brings, with its annual slaughter of men, women, and children, going on relentlessly, steadily, and seemingly without any stay. The church must take up this problem, and she must take it up as a church, and in her own ecclesiastical capacity. She must inform her people how to prevent tuberculosis. She must help to secure adequate relief for indigent consumptives; and she must do anything and everything that will assist the community in which she labors to stamp out this disease.

Cooking Recipes

By Mrs. E. M. Aldrich, Using Layton's Health Club Baking Powder.

GOLD SPONGE CAKE.

The yolks of 6 eggs beaten stiff. 1 cup of sugar, creamed with the beaten yolks. 1 teaspoon full extract. The whites of six eggs beaten and folded into the creamed yolks and sugar. 1 cup of flour. 1 tablespoon baking powder. These to be sifted together five times, cut and folded into the previous mixture. If desired and 1 cup of chopped nut meats. Leave oven open the first five minutes. Bake in a moderate oven.

LADY BALTIMORE CAKE.

1 cup butter. 2 cups sugar, creamed together. 3 level cups flour. 3 level teaspoons full Layton's Baking Powder. Baking powder and flour sifted together five times. Whites of six eggs, beaten stiff. Add to the creamed butter and sugar, one cup of milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract or rose extract, and the beaten whites, the folded flour and baking powder and bake in 2 or 3 layers.

Filling.

2 cups of granulated sugar. Boil until it forms a hair 1/2 inches long, and pour slowly over the beaten whites of two eggs. To 2-3d cups of the beaten mixture add one cup of ground nuts, one cup of ground raisins, five figs (round) beat until right consistency to put between the layers.

MOCK ANGEL.

Health Club Special. 2 cups flour. 2 level teaspoon full baking powder. 1 1/4 cup sugar. These are to be sifted together five times. Beaten whites of four eggs stiff. Pour over the sifted flour and baking powder, add one cup of scalding milk, one teaspoon full vanilla, stir smoothly, and into this cut and fold the beaten whites. Bake in layers in a moderate oven.

Marshmallow Filling.

2 cups granulated sugar. 1 cup water. Boil until it will hair. Pour over the beaten whites of 2 eggs and to this add 10c worth of marshmallows, beat until creamy and of the right consistency to put on the cake.

MEAT PIE.

Get 25c worth of mixed pork and

beef ground. Put in a kettle with 3 medium sized potatoes cut in small dice. Season with pepper and salt, and onion if desired, and let cook until tender. Make a short biscuit crust as follows: 2 level cups of flour. 2 level teaspoon full Layton's Health Club Baking Powder. 1 level tablespoon full salt. 1/4 cup butter. 1 cup lard. 3/4 cup sweet milk or water. Cut and fold until smooth. Line your pan with crust. Now to your meat add 1 cup of sweet milk or enough to make a sufficient gravy.

Gravy. 1 tablespoon full butter creamed together with flour, let come to a boil and pour into a pan and place the crust over the pie. Bake in a moderate oven.

There is a bridge across the Pecos river at Santa Rosa, and this taken together with the many miles of unimproved roads that can be gotten across the plains will make this a very attractive route, and will connect the automobile roads being built out of Amarillo with the roads being planned and built out of Albuquerque and will eventually become a link in the transcontinental line. World News

Hon. Miguel A. Otero, who has been governor for nine years of the Territory of New Mexico, was married in Santa Fe Wednesday of last week to Mrs. Maud H. Frost. Hon. Frank W. Parker, associate justice of the supreme court, performed the ceremony.

NO RECEPTION FOR MRS. PARKHURST.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 2.—No reception of any sort, cordial or otherwise, awaits Mrs. Emmeline Parkhurst from Pennsylvania suffragists upon her visit to this country. This was the dictum voiced today at the headquarters of the equal franchise federation here.

\$1,000,000 FROM TARIFF DUTIES.

New York, Oct. 4.—After the bonded warehouse closed tonight it was announced that receipts for the day amounted to \$920,000, a sum representing an approximate increase of 100 per cent over the average Saturday receipts on bonded warehouse withdrawals.

AMERICAN CITIZENS RELEASED.

Mexico City, Oct. 2.—Esterben E. Pierra, of Laredo, an American citizen who was arrested recently at Saltillo, and imprisoned into the Mexican army, will not have to serve. The order commanding him to enter the ranks was rescinded today on representations made by the United States embassy.

FIRST STATE BANK CLOSES AT TUCUMCARI.

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 3.—The First State Bank of Tucumcari voluntarily closed last evening and asked the state banking department to take charge of it. L. B. Wooters, assistant bank examiner, took charge today. The bank is a small one with total resources in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

Rome, Oct. 3.—After the fall of the temporal power, the pope issued an order forbidding Catholics throughout Italy to participate in the political elections. The present pontiff, at the last general elections, waived the prohibition in certain constituencies, where Catholic candidates opposed anti-clerical socialists.

According to news dispatches from Washington, Bernard S. Rodey, of Albuquerque who for several years has been United States attorney at Nome, Alaska, has resigned. His resignation was telegraphed to Washington several days ago, having been requested by Attorney General McReynolds, it is said.

THE BIBLE STUDY ON THE REPORT OF THE SPIES.

Numbers 13:1-3, 17 to 14:25—Oct. 19. "If God be for us, who can be against us?"—Romans 8:31.

THE Israelites' first journey was from Egypt to Mt. Sinai, where they remained about a year. Their second journey began after Miriam had been received back into the camp. Their journey led through a barren wilderness scorched by the sun, very different from Sinai's valleys, in which they had rested. The distance to Kadesh-Barnea, on the border of Canaan, was approximately 180 miles. The journey was beset with unknown dangers—serpents, wandering bands of Arabs, lack of water, etc. The Israelites, including women and children and possessions, household goods, cattle, sheep, etc., necessarily travelled slowly. Apparently on or two months were spent on the way, as they arrived at the time of the first ripe grapes—July. Kadesh-Barnea, their objective point, is a delightful place, well watered—a sharp contrast to the Desert of Paran. Here they rested and refreshed themselves. Moses, full of faith, proposed that they proceed forthwith to enter Canaan, the Land of Promise.

But the Israelites were timid. They had no knowledge of war, excepting a little experience with the Amalekites near Mt. Sinai. Their caution overbalanced their faith. They urged upon Moses the sending of the twelve spies. These apparently were divided under two leaders, Caleb and Joshua. One party went the length of the land, and returned in forty days; the others took a shorter journey and returned sooner.

The spies were cautious men and gave a truthful report of the land, declaring that "its cities had high walls and would be difficult to overcome. They reported also that they had seen giants. The report of the ten is described as an evil report because they presented the matter from the viewpoint of its difficulties, as in contrast with the report made by Caleb and Joshua, which was styled a good report, because encouraging. The spies really should have considered themselves as a committee of ways and means for entering Canaan, rather than for deciding whether it was possible to enter. The possibilities were already determined by God's promise; hence Joshua and Caleb left these out of account. If God could deliver them from the Egyptians and the Amalekites He surely could fulfil His promise to bring them into Canaan.

Did God Encourage War?

In studying this lesson, many are perplexed. They say, It seems unreasonable to believe that God gave such a message to Moses and the Israelites. Contrast this with the Scriptural declaration that God "will make wars to cease unto the ends of the earth." Agnostics inquire, Where is the justice of commissioning the Israelites to steal the lands of the Canaanites, and to exterminate utterly all the people? To understand the Bible, we must view it from its own standpoint, and not from that of our creeds formulated in the darker days, nor from that of our own imperfect reasoning. The Bible is beautiful, consistent, Godlike, only when viewed in its own light. We must remember that the Bible antagonizes the theories of our creeds, which tell us that those slaughtered Canaanites went straight to an eternity of torture because they did not know the true God and Jesus Christ, the Savior. The Bible tells us that all mankind are children of Adam, and all perishing because of his death sentence. When they die, they are not alive anywhere. They are dead. They are suffering the penalty that God pronounced, "Dying, thou shalt die."

It matters not, therefore, in what way we die, or very much whether our experiences be longer or shorter. In the case of the Canaanites, God declared that their iniquity had come to the full. That is, God determined that they were merelyumbering the earth. God was using the Israelites as a typical people, and shadows of coming making types and shadows of coming blessings. He would give Canaan to Israel, to illustrate the destruction of the works of the flesh and the Devil, which His people would accomplish in themselves by fighting the good fight of faith and overcoming the evil tendencies of their own flesh. Although God is not bound by Justice to give future life to anybody, He has arranged to do so. To this end Christ has already died for the sins of the whole world—including the Canaanites. Aside from this Plan of Redemption the whole race would have perished. But by God's grace we are to be recovered from death.

So we read, "God so loved the world that He gave His Only Begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him might not perish, but have everlasting life." Messiah's Kingdom—the Redeemer and His Church. His Bride, the members of which are now being selected from the world—will for a thousand years bless, uplift and restore all the nations of earth—from sin, degradation, death.

Senator Ashurst called on President Wilson last week, says the Associated Press dispatches, in an effort to enlist his support in an attempt to remove the internal revenue collector's office from Santa Fe to Phoenix.

R. P. Donoho, of Tucumcari, has been appointed special deputy of the state banking department, and placed in charge of the First State Bank of Tucumcari, which closed its doors day before yesterday.

NO MORE NIGHT HUNTING.

Read the official announcement in this column of the operating of the federal migratory bird law. No more hunting of ducks from sunset to sun-up. The federal only effects New Mexico as regards ducks.

FOREIGN CORPORATION ENTERS.

The Railway Ice company, of Newton, Kansas, a foreign corporation, has entered the state, and has filed the necessary papers with the state corporation commission. Its agent is B. D. Oldham, of Clovis, N. M.

EXPRESS HEARING.

An informal hearing on intra-state express rates in New Mexico is being held this week before the state corporation commission. The whole matter of express rates in New Mexico including merchandise and special rates is under discussion, and it is said to be extremely likely that a reduction in most of the express rates in the state will be made as a result of today's meeting.

EXPRESS RATES IN NEW MEXICO ARE REDUCED.

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 6.—Reductions in the express rates both interstate and intrastate ranging from 27 to 60 per cent, have been agreed upon between the state corporation commission and the Wells Fargo, Adams, Globe and United States Express companies all operating in New Mexico, and the new tariff will go into effect in from sixty to ninety days.

FEDERAL GAME LAW IN EFFECT

The president signed the migratory bird law last Thursday week. The wording of a telegram received by the state game warden, and follows an announcement sent out the night before from Washington, that the new federal game law would not go into effect October 1st, as had been contemplated. However it went into effect so immediately after the first of October that it made no difference to New Mexico as its only effect here is to shorten the migratory water fowl season, ducks, etc., to Dec. 16th instead of March 31 as the state law provided. It also protects these birds from sunset to sunup, prohibiting night hunting.

COURT SCORES CRUCE FOR HIS ATTITUDE

Judge Doyle of Oklahoma in Opinion Criticizes State's Chief Executive.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Oct. 4.—What is regarded as the severest criticism an appellate court ever administered to the Governor of a State is contained in the written opinion of Judge Thomas H. Doyle of the Criminal Court of Appeals, touching the Crump habeas corpus cases, filed in open court today, upholding the Lieutenant Governor's authority to issue pardons during absence of the Governor from the State.

During the absence of Gov. Cruce, on Aug. 2, Lieut. Gov. McAlester issued five pardons, four of which Gov. Cruce undertook to revoke upon entering the state a few hours later. One of the prisoners, George Crump is serving seven years for forgery, brought on feedings for writ of habeas corpus, presenting the one issue that the Lieut. Governor became the acting Governor for all purposes when the Governor left the State. The Criminal Court of Appeals granted the writ in an oral opinion by Judge Doyle, releasing Crump from custody of the penitentiary officials. The written opinion deals with the question in some length, holding that the Governor loses his official prerogatives the moment he steps beyond the State's borders, and the mantle of executive authority falls upon the Lieut. Governor.

WOMEN PRAISED BY BREWERS' ASSOCIATION

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 4.—The United States Brewers' association today adjourned its fifty-third annual convention to meet next year in New Orleans. The organization declared itself in favor of granting more political power to women and praised the work done by them in wiping out disorderly houses which, it was asserted, were a detriment to the brewery interests. The association also accorded the vigilant committee's report which placed the organization on record as favoring the movement for civic improvement. Concentration of the organization to meet the attacks of prohibitionists was declared to be one of the policies of the officers elected today.

Edward A. Schmidt of Philadelphia, was elected president. Among the trustees chosen were Adam Mueller, of Portland, Ore., and Gustave L. Becker, of Ogden, Utah.

TAKING CHANCES.

(New Mexican.)

On a recent Saturday night, as the parade went up and down a busy street, about 100 young girls hovering around that fascinating and dangerous age, "sweet sixteen."

How many of 'em, do you suppose, had their cheeks bedaubed with paint or powder? How many seemed on the way to trouble?

Exactly 42! Nor were they, so far as casual scrutiny could determine, the kind, the pathetic, pitiable kind, known as "painted ladies."
