A second hearing is scheduled for Monday, Dec. 8, at 7 p.m. in City Hall, according to Mrs. Owen Norfleet, councilwoman.

In speaking of the upcoming meeting, Mrs. Norfleet states that City Council is making an effort to interest everyone in the community in studying existing needs. "We need further representation and a more complete analysis of community problems" she added. "We hope many concerned citizens will be present for the public hearing."

The City now has the opportunity of applying for a Community Development Non-Metropolitan Discretionary Block Grant. The primary objective of the Grant would be for expansion and improvement of the quantity and quality of community services, princi-

pally for persons of low and moderate incomes.

In our city needs have been expressed for additional paving and sewer facilities. The public is invited to attend the Monday night meeting as needs are evaluated.

Childress 'Cats End Hopes Of OHS Mighty Mustangs

The Childress Bobcats ended the Olton Mustangs hopes for a state AA football playoff berth with a 22-8 win in Plainview last Saturday night.

The Bobcats were aided by five Mustang turnovers and five Mustang penalties, and they took advantage of two of those turnovers for scores. Childress dominated every statistic, except in the passing department where the Mustangs held a slight edge.

With the win, Childress continued District 3-AA's regional victory drought, and the Cats will take on Slaton - a surprising winner over Alpine - in Plainview. Olton's Jimmy Parker booted the opening kick-off out of the endzone, so the Bobcats began play from the 20. From there, they put on a 50 yard drive. On the drive, the Cats picked up two first downs and were aided by a third down unsportsmanlike conduct penalty against J.D. Caudle.

But on third and five from Olton's 30, Bobcat QB Robert Sims fumbled to Mustang Ed Garcia.

The rest of the first quarter belonged to Childress, as their ball control offense kept the ball for most of the quarter, limiting the Mustangs to only eight offensive plays and eight total yards.

The Mustang offense began to show signs of moving the ball in the second quarter, but they never really got untracked. Because of the Bobcats fierce pass rush, Jimmy Parker never really had proper time to throw and Childress picked off two of his passes to kill drives.

The Cats, though, were unable to turn any of those breaks into scores. When the teams went into the locker room at halftime with the score 0-0, penetrations and first downs went through everyone's minds as a possible bearing on the outcome of the game. Statistics showed that neither

team had a penetration and the first downs were even, with four apiece.

But the Bobcats scored on their first possession of the second half. The Cats gained possession after Michael Franks could only manage an eight yard punt because of a bad snap. A pass from Robert Sims to David Miller capped the eight play - 35 yard drive. Ricky Smith added the PAT and with 5:23 left in the third quarter, Childress was out in front 7-0.

On second down after the ensuing kick-off, Jimmy Parker was sacked for a four yard loss, and in the process fumbled to the Cat's Greg Buckley at Olton's own 18.

The Mustang defense held Childress to only two yards in three plays and on fourth down, Ricky Smith came in to attempt a 32 yard field goal. The kick was good, and with 3:58 showing on the clock, Childress had jumped out to a 10-0 third quarter lead.

Childress had another drive going late in the quarter, but Mark Stroebel

stopped it at the Mustang nine with an interception. But on the first play of the first quarter, Cat Rusty Riddell picked off a Parker pass at Olton's 24. Six plays and two minutes later, Jody Hernandez plunged over from the two to make it 16-0.

The Mustangs immediately retaliated with an eight play - 46 yard drive. Glenn Johnson capped this drive from 14 yards out. Parker ran over the extras, and Olton had cut the Bobcat's lead to 16-8.

But Childress put the game out of reach with 2:49 left in the game, when Hernandez scored from the one to make it 22-8.

The Mustangs had the ball as time ran out, and, on the last play of the season for Olton, Glenn Johnson closed out his outstanding four seasons in a varsity uniform with a five yard run.

Also playing their last games for Olton were: Jimmy Parker, Mark Stroebel, Kevin Workman, Chris McClure, Ed Garcia, J.D. Caudle, Ray Rodriguez, Mark Watt, Larry Kirk and Michael Franks.

Highway Improvements Noted

Road construction in Lamb County is included in the 1975 Farm to Market Road and Off-Federal System Programs approved recently by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer, Mr. George C. Wall, Jr., of Lubbock, Texas, said the program includes:

From FM 168, 5.0 miles south of US 70, east to end of proposed FM Road at Hale County Line, a length of 2.8 miles, to provide relocation

assistance and construction, grading, structures and surface. Estimated cost of \$169,300.00.

Statewide, the program provides \$38.1 million for the development of 582.5 miles of secondary roads.

Most projects are for the development of routes previously under county or other local jurisdiction.

Texas' FM/RM system has been called the world's best secondary road network. Under the familiar FM Road Program, the state provides for all the construction and maintenance while

counties provide right of way and utility adjustments.

The new Off-Federal System Program will use federal funds on a 70 percent Federal-30 percent State basis as provided by the 1974 Federal-Aid Highway Act. The "Off-Federal System" designation refers to routes not on the federal-aid system.

In all, the projects provide for 299.8 miles of new FM/RM designation including 203 miles which are rural mail routes. Of the 299.8 miles, 194.2 miles are school bus routes.

Two Young Boys Injured In Mishap

Two OHS Future Farmers were injured late Tuesday afternoon in a one vehicle accident on a rural road east of town when the brakes of their pickup truck failed.

Rodney Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Landon Smith, and Monty McFadden, son of Mr. and Mrs. Royce McFadden, were delivering fruit which they had sold as an FFA project. Brakes in the pickup owned by the elder Smith failed as the two youths neared a dead-end intersection and the pickup hurtled across a freshly graded bar ditch.

The two were able to crawl through the broken out windshield and began walking for help. Suzanne Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hoyt Taylor, drove

upon the scene and went for help for the youths.

Young Smith was treated and released at Central Plains Hospital in Plainview. He suffered bruises and lacerations with a severe laceration on one wrist. He also received a broken nose.

McFadden remains in Central Plains Hospital where he is expected to be kept for about two weeks. He received a cracked vertebrae and a chipped vertebrae. In addition to lacerations, he also had several teeth knocked out.

Young McFadden's parents were in Kansas City at the time of the accident and arrived home Wednesday morning.

We Interrupt This Program

We had a busy day. We just finished a good supper, and it is time to relax. We get all stretched out and propped up in our favorite chair.

Feeling all comfortable and contented, we lean back to watch a bit of T.V. and to enjoy a peaceful night at home.

Our programs along with their commercials blink "on and off" with the regularity with which they were scheduled. We begin to unwind. Our bodies begin to feel the effects of the busy day. The tired bones, the good food, the comfortable chair and the regular rhythm on the set begin to lull us to sleep. The eyelids begin to droop. The head begins to nod. The breathing gets regular and heavy, and just as we are about to drift off...

"WE INTERRUPT THIS PROGRAM TO BRING THIS SPECIAL NEWS BULLETIN." Immediately the head snaps up. The eyes open wide, and all of our attention is focused on that tube... expecting bad news! Now that bulletin does not have to be bad news, but that is what we usually expect from any abrupt interruption. When the loud

speaker interrupts us at a football game, telling us to call home, what do we expect? When a phone call wakes us up in the middle of the night, what do we expect? Telegrams, sirens, squealing tires, anything that breaks abruptly into our work... we expect bad news.

That expectation is not so unusual. Centuries ago some shepherds felt the same way and expected the same thing. They were relaxing after a hard days work. They had settled down for the night to keep watch over their sheep, but God interrupted their night with a special announcement. They expected bad news, and "they were sore afraid" (Luke 2:9).

But this bulletin was far from being bad news. It was good news. It was the Good News. God interrupted their life to announce not judgment or damnation but deliverance and salvation.

"And the angel said unto them, Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all the people: for there is born to you this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:10-11)

"The Saviour"... and that is good news for we need a saviour. The world needs a saviour for all men, having

sinned, face the reward of their crimes, death. (Romans 3:23; 6:23). It is good news to know that this "Saviour" can do what we need him to do. "He is able to save to the uttermost them that draw near unto God through him..." (Hebrews 7:25). That is good news of great joy.

"The Christ"... and that is good news. To the Jews. To the Jews this Christ meant deliverance and victory. This Christ is God's anointed, His chosen, His king. The Christ was the fulfillment of God's many promises, and for us the knowledge of His Christ is good news, once again being assured that God is faithful to keep his promises.

"The Lord"... and that is good news. He rules with the power of God over the wind and the seas, over the spirits and the demons, over the living and the dead, over the Church and the nations, over the world and the universe. (Ephesians 1:19-23; Colossians 1:15-18).

He rules over all with a rod of iron (Psalms 2) with which he is able to bring judgment the disobedient and to deliver from trouble them that are his. (2 Thessalonians 1:7-9)

To those shepherds that must have been such good news, to know they now had a King that would not only protect them from their enemies but one who would deliver them from their bondage of death.

Unless I miss the boat completely, you and I are in the same boat as they were. We need that Saviour, God's chosen king, who is Lord of lords, and who has him.

So when God interrupted the program with a special

announcement, those shepherds did not have to tremble at the expectation. They could rejoice at the salvation brought nigh by God's "only begotten son".

There will be no anxious waiting for us for he has already wrought great deliverance for all men, and he now lives to forgive those who obey. (Hebrews 5:8-9) That is good news... Rex

Sharing and caring with our Aggies - what better word describes such pleasure than "thanksgiving"?

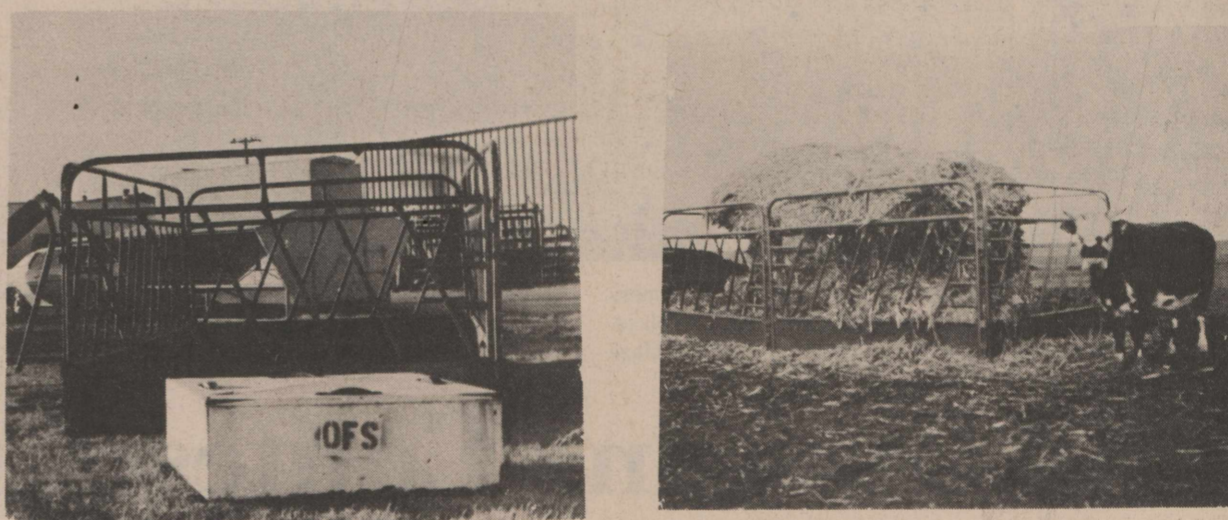

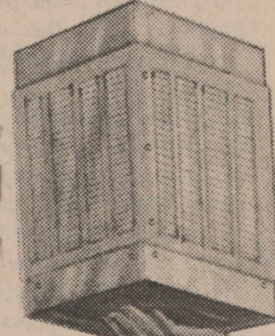

Dear Editor:

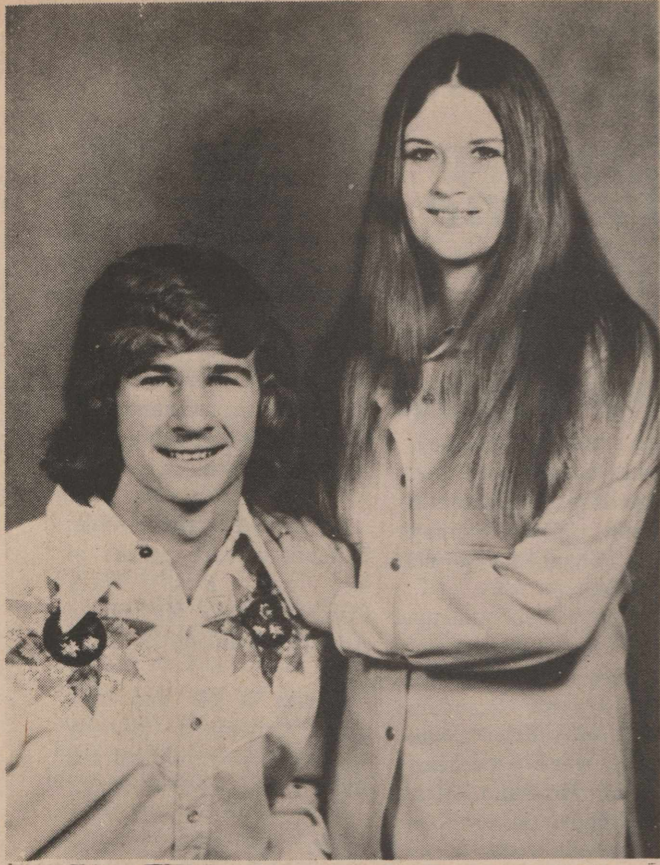
Could you please help us get word around Olton that our little pet, "Pugs" is lost somewhere in Olton and our hearts were broken to have had to come back home without him.

Maenette Houston's CHRISTMAS CUT-OUT COOKIES

- 2 c sugar
- 1 t soda
- 1/2 t salt
- 1 cup butter (1/2 shortening)
- 2 eggs
- 4 T cream
- 1 t almond flavor
- 1 t vanilla
- 4 1/2 c flour

Cream eggs, butter and sugar; add other ingredients except flour, beat well. Stir in flour. Roll out on floured board, bake on greased cookie sheet in 350 degree oven.

freezes well and can be allowed to thaw in the refrigerator overnight and set out 4-5 hours before baking.

TURKEY WITH DRESSING

Roast 12 lb. turkey or boil three fryers in salted water until tender. Cool and de-bone. Boil giblets in 3 qts. water with 1 t. salt. In 4 cups broth, cook until tender:

- 1 c green onions (use some tops)
- 1 c regular onion, chopped
- 2 c lightly packed celery (use some tops)

Bake 3 packages cornbread mix. Toast 10-12 slices bread cubes. Crumble cornbread and place breads in large container. Add celery and onions. Add 1 can cream of chicken soup 1 c water (room temp.)

- 1 1/2 t salt
- 1 t sage
- 4 t sugar
- 1 1/2 t pepper
- 2 1/2 sticks oleo
- 1 1/2 t poultry seasoning

Slowly stir in 2 c water or broth. Add 1/2 lb. good mild sausage (uncooked) (Note: if you do not add sausage, increase sage to 1 1/2 t).

Fold in 6 beaten eggs and mix well.

In large greased baking dish, place layer of dressing, layer of dark meat, layer of light meat and top with layer of dressing. Bake in 350-400 degree oven until lightly brown on edges. (25 to 45 minutes)
