Educational Week to be Observed in Ballinger

American Education Week will be observed in the Ballinger schools beginning with a program next Friday. The first program is supposed to be presented on Armistice Day but due to the fact that the schools and the business house will be closed on that date the program will be postponed until Friday. At that time the local American Legion post will have charge of the program at the high school auditorium.

"Education for Faithful Citizenship" will be the first subject taken up. It is pointed out that this is a good time to stress good citizenship. Boys and girls who, in a few years will be responsible for the destiny of the nation, must have a high sense of their individual duties and obligations to their community, state and nation.

On Tuesday, November 12th the subject will be "Home and School Day," in which it will be shown what the schools are doing to improve the home. Constant emphasis on right relationship and noble attitudes in school, it is explained, create habits which carry over in home life. The home lays the foundation upon which the school builds, and the school tends to lift all homes to higher levels.

The Parent-Teachers Association of Ballinger will be given this day of the week and will furnish the program. On Wednesday, November 13th the theme will be "Know Your School." Parents and others are urged to visit the schools on this date. It is thought that a visit will give a better understanding of the work being done and improvements made. The Ballinger Rotary Club will have charge of the program.

Thursday, November 14th will be known as "School Opportunity Day." Emphasis will be directed on what the schools are doing toward helping young people discover and train their talents and in preparing them for some useful occupation or vocation. Education, assert the promoters of the movement, not only pays in excellence and happiness of life but in greatly increasing earning power. The Masonic Service Association will be in charge of the local program on this date.

Friday, November 15th has been designated as "Health Day" and the Rannels County Public Health Nursing Association will have charge of the program. The program will show what the schools are doing to promote physical vitality, good health and habits of safety. The fundamental habits of health and clean living as taught in our schools will be demonstrated as going far towards raising the standards of citizenship.

Saturday, November 16th will be "Community Day." The school's place in community life will be pictured in this program. Notice is called to the fact that where the best schools are found, there also are found the best communities. The Ballinger Lions Club will present the "Community Day" program.

There are four compartments including the engine room. The car develops good speed and has power to pull several coaches other than itself. On its two runs to San Angelo thus far it has pulled a baggage coach besides passengers in the car itself.

Bridge Will Close Tuesday at 10

G. M. Garrett, state highway department engineer, announced Monday afternoon that the Colorado River bridge at the foot of Hutchings Avenue would be closed Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. Mr. Garrett emphasized the fact that the closing of the bridge would take place on time and that all travel would have to detour after that hour, either to the crossing at the end of Seventh Street or over the old ford below the bridge.

Forms will be built the remainder of the day Tuesday and some time Wednesday the mixer will be started to pouring cement. An extra percentage of cement will be used in the mixture until the pavement is laid to the Lon Mapes corner, a little more than a block west of the bridge. As soon as this mixture will stand traffic it will be opened for that distance and the bridge again be placed in service.

Waybourn Trial is Reset for January

GEORGETOWN, Nov. 4.—Because of the absence of material witnesses and the physical condition of the defendant, the trial of Mrs. Rosa Waybourn, charged with murder in the death of her husband, W. W. Waybourn, today was reset for January 20th.

Today's trial was to have been the second, Mrs. Waybourn having been sentenced to forty-five years of imprisonment in the state penitentiary at the first trial in Bastrop, from which she appealed.

DR. HALE LOSES PROPERTY FROM HIS GARAGE SUNDAY

Dr. F. M. Hale is the loser of a surgical kit, medicine case and an overcoat which were stolen from his car in its garage Sunday night. When Dr. Hale went home he left these articles in his car, the robber entering the garage some time during the night.

Dr. Hale thinks the thief was searching for narcotics, and that the case was thrown away when the contents were removed. He stated Monday that he would be glad to pay a reward for the return of the articles.

THIEVES STEAL AND STRIP AUTOMOBILE

A small coupe was stolen Sunday night from L. L. Strobe from where it was parked beside his home. When the loss was discovered Monday morning it was reported to Sheriff R. E. McWilliams, who located the car a few miles from the city. When found all four wheels had been removed from the coupe and other parts had been taken. Mr. Strobe said his car had been completely stripped.

A wire tied to the front of the car showed how it had been towed to the spot where it was stripped. The thieves are believed to have made a get-away in another car.

No trace of the thieves has been picked up.

FILLS AN OFFICE TWICE MADE VACANT BY FATAL SHOOTINGS

NOCENA, Tex., Nov. 4.—Appointed to fill an office twice vacated in the last year by fatal shootings, R. G. Watson, of Amarillo, has assumed his duties as city marshal here.

A little over nine months ago City Marshal Ed Gooch died "with his boots on" while searching the home of Carl Goodspeed. Goodspeed was convicted of the slaying and is in jail at Henrietta awaiting action on his appeal.

Watson succeeds E. Powell, shot to death recently while attempting to make an arrest.

Deputy Sheriff Stephen Cornett, with several companions went to a remote section of the mountainous country near here to arrest Tom Morton on a prohibition violation charge. Collins, his neighbor, is said to have entered into a conversation with the posse, and was shot fatally after wounding Cornett.

Minority Faction Prison Board Meet

The commission's sub-committee will convene here Wednesday to draw up recommendations to make to the legislature.

Hamilton testified Saturday he had a telephone call shortly before the homicide and that when he attempted to talk the person on the other end of the line hung up or the connection was broken.

Two Ohio Convicts Escape; Third Shot

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 4.—Two Ohio penitentiary prisoners made a successful break for liberty today after beating a guard, while a third, Arthur Brooker, is in a critical condition in the prison hospital. Brooker received a bullet wound in the abdomen.

Brooker, Guy Tennent, and William Miller got away from an "escape-proof" cell block. They scaled a wall, beat Guard John Montgomery and swung over the wall on an improvised ladder. The convicts took a machine-gun away from Montgomery, prison officials said.

A few more cold spells with a little more wet to them will bring on hog killing weather. It is about the season for the appetite to crave country sausage and spare ribs. Northerners have been coming with a great deal of regularity recently and ice will soon be common every morning.

Brady, San Saba and other towns in that part of the state are preparing for a big turkey run this month. The market will open on the 8th and at Brady three large dressing plants are ready to start crews preparing shipments to the eastern markets. The turkey crop is large in that section and great droves of the birds are seen along all highways.

Traffic will be forced to cross the Colorado either at the foot of Seventh Street or at the old ford within a few days. Stakes are being set and the big mixer will soon start pouring cement on Highway 30, beginning at the river bridge. An extra amount of cement will be used in the first stretch laid and it will only require a few days until travel can be resumed on this lap.

A number of Runnels county farmers have finished their cotton picking and are turning the stalks under to get the ground in shape for the next crop. Fields that are being plowed now and which get the fall rains will be in excellent shape for spring sowing. Other farmers will complete the gathering of their cotton within the next two weeks if the weather remains favorable to allow pickers in the fields.

Women Soon to Equal Males in Physical Life

DENVER, Nov. 4.—The time is coming when women will equal men in physical as well as mental strength, with neither sex dominating, in the opinion of Dr. Durca J. H. Ward, Denver scientist and theologian of fifty years standing.

Another prophesy made by Dr. Ward is that dress emancipation will come with knickerbockers for both sexes.

Dr. Ward at present is making a close study of evolution of men and women and their problems, from biological, physiological and sociological viewpoints, and his conclusions, he declares, will probably meet with considerable opposition "from narrow-minded men who want to keep women shackled."

"Styles now are just as foolish as they were generations ago, when women wore ruffles and bustles," according to Dr. Ward. "But they are slightly more comfortable. True dress emancipation will come when both men and women wear knickerbockers."

"Religion is still leaning on the ancients," Dr. Ward opines. "It has not kept pace with the rest of the world, but it has made more progress in the last fifty years than in the 500 years previous to that."

Dr. Ward though seventy-eight years old, still teaches an adult class at the Unity Church here, every Sunday in addition to officiating at weddings and funerals and compiling lengthy volumes on scientific subjects.

Lately he has become a lecturer on history and philosophy for the University of Colorado Extension Division.

Dr. Ward was graduated from Hillsdale College, Michigan. After a post-graduate course in theology he was ordained a Baptist minister in Pierpoint, Ohio, and became pastor of a church at New Lyme, Ohio.

He also was once principal of the Northern Ohio Collegiate Institute.

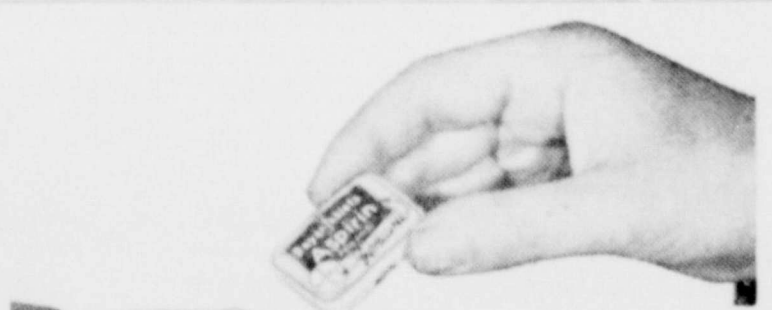

Big Water Project Meeting Nov. 6th

AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—Preliminary plans for the largest water diversion project of its kind in the United States will be formulated here Nov. 6 at a meeting of the board of directors of the Brazos river conservation and reclamation district.

The directors will organize at their session, which will be the first since the district was created by the forty-first legislature.

Some idea of the magnitude of the work which these men will undertake may be conveyed by the information that some 30,000,000 acres in 60 counties, about one-sixth of the state of Texas, are embraced in the project. The land directly affected has a taxable valuation of approximately \$650,000,000.

Whereas the Mississippi and the Miami river projects were planned primarily for flood control, the counties along the Brazos and its tributaries will try to obtain water for irrigation, municipal, domestic and industrial uses, hydro-electric power and recreation in addition to flood prevention.

Members of the board of directors, appointed by Governor Dan Moody on recommendation of the state water board and reclamation engineer, are, W. A. Myrick, Lubbock; C. M. Caldwell, Abilene; R. E. Baskin, Seymour; F. E. Harrell, Cisco; L. E. Seaman, Mineral Wells; Dr. Samuel Palmer Brooks, Waco; Frank Orloff, Marlin; P. L. Downs, Temple; T. S. Henderson, Cameron; F. D. Love, Georgetown; William Hallmark, Dublin; William Sandifer, Franklin; J. M. Lawrence and G. G. Chance, Bryan; Ward Templeman, Navasota; D. C. Giddings, Brenham; Leonard Tillotson, Sealy; G. G. Ulrich, Sugarland; L. Mims, Freeport; H. M. Hull and R. H. Safford of Houston.

John A. Norris, chairman of the board of water engineers, said that the directors probably would consider a plan formulated by the water board three years ago after an extensive survey. The plan contemplates the control of the waters by not less than 15 major storage reservoirs and smaller ones for local purposes and possibly levees on the lower reaches of the river.

Norris said that the territory embraced in the district might be

divided into three divisions, the first from Mineral Wells northwest, the second between Mineral Wells and Waco and the third from Waco to the Gulf.

The purpose of the diversion in the northwest would be domestic, municipal, commercial and irrigation purposes, the second domestic, municipal and industrial and the third flood control and rice and truck irrigation on the coastal plains.

While making it plain that he was not attempting to advise the directors, Norris said that it was his idea that as much water as practicable should be diverted in West Texas. Most of the remainder of the storage could be taken care of in the Mineral Wells section where the board found excellent dam sites, Norris said.

While the development of hydro-electric power would not be one of the purposes of the water diversion Norris pointed out that the sale of water for power purposes would help finance the district and the water could be utilized again for other purposes further downstream.

Plans of the district are expected to require several months for completion and actual diversion work probably will not be started for some time.

Norris pointed out that the cost would depend on the magnitude of the project but he said the district tax would be very nominal. While the expense probably would run well into the millions the sale of water for power and the creation of sub-districts which paid for the water they used might cut down the tax.

Norris said that Texas Congressmen were confident that Federal aid on the project could be obtained.

REVISE HOUSTON BUILDING CODE TO FIGHT TERMITES

HOUSTON, Nov. 4.—The city's building code will be revised by Engineer H. L. Shaw for protection against "millions of termites," which he said are chewing away at homes and furniture.

The termite, the city engineer explained, is a curious tropical insect "well equipped for modern warfare. Each is armed with a buzz saw jaw and can fly or walk but prefers the subterranean channels (or trenches) through the foundations of houses and furniture to open warfare.

"They are organized into armies, well trained and well equipped. They have a king at their head, divisions, brigades, regiments, companies, squadrons, generals, colonels, captains and top sergeants."

The common ant, Mr. Shaw added, is a deadly enemy to the termites and Houston needs more of these enemies.

Grain Corporation Heads Farm Board Marketing Schemes

(Farm Editor, Associated Press Feature Service)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—(P)—Its articles of incorporation adopted, the \$20,000,000 Farmers' National Grain Corporation is the first of the central co-operative marketing agencies set up by the federal farm board to get underway in its own right.

The question of policy, as expressed in the articles of incorporation, long has been a stumbling block in amalgamating the interest of the two factions in the grain trade—the farmers' elevator group and the wheat pools. With that out of the way, observers see no apparent obstacle in the road toward ultimate acquisition of bargaining power in the grain market.

The most nearly completed of the other two national commodity corporations is the \$500,000 Federated Wool Growers' Co-operative Sales Agency. Further consideration and perhaps adoption of its articles of incorporation is scheduled at a conference with the farm board in San Angelo, Texas, November 20. The federation seeks to co-ordinate the market activities of wool and mohair co-operatives.

Latest in the national organization movement is the \$1,000,000 National Livestock Marketing Association which on October 24, in Chicago chose a committee of nine to draft the articles of incorporation and the by-laws under which it will attempt to bring powerful individual units into one channel of market operations.

Capitalization of the national agencies together with various facility and supplemental commodity loans, has reduced the board's original appropriation of \$150,000,000 to approximately \$100,000,000. Under the agricultural marketing act it was provided a \$500,000,000 revolving fund, to be appropriated by congress as needed.

Plans to finance cotton co-operatives through supplemental commodity loans pending the organization of a national cotton corporation are expected in some sources to call for the remainder of the first appropriation.

Thus far no other national agencies have been projected.

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Paris to Back Winter Habits; Summer Ends

PARIS, Nov. 4.—Summer has officially ended in Paris and autumn is here, for the old chestnut-man has established his business on the corner of the little cafe-terrace and the flea market merchants are back on the job again after a long holiday. For even the rag-men take a vacation in France. And the coal men and the wood dealers as well. They make money, they argue, so why not spend it? From November 1st until April 15th they are kept rather busy. These are the official heating months in the capital and no furnace-tender dares violate the tradition even though his very finger-tips freeze. Newcomers to Paris wonder why there is no steam on when it is cold, but they soon learn that Frenchmen wait until the cold weather has really come for good. All one can do about the matter is to make the best of it—and probably acquire chilblains.

The world's kindest landlord has recently been found in Paris. He waited fifteen years for the rent that was due him and then decided that something must be done about it.

His flat had been occupied by a German up to July, 1914. When the war broke out, like many another German, he left Paris, hoping to return within a short time. Fifteen years went by before the landlord went to court and got an eviction order.

When the door was opened by a commissary, he found the place filled with dust and spider-webs besides a number of great boxes of various sizes, nailed up and bearing the word "fragile" on them. When they were opened they were found to contain pictures by masters, costly Japanese objects and rare Sevres porcelain. If the man does not turn up to claim the valuable objects, the landlord will not find them amiss in payment for his back rent.

More statues are due for Paris and will fill up the long empty niches in the exterior of the Lyvre Museum, facing the rue de Rivoli. Twenty-six of France's greatest military leaders of all periods will be chosen. A number of French sculptors are now working on those of the six marshals of France of the World War—Foch, Joffre, Petain, Faysolle, Lyautey and Franchet d'Esperey.

The latest issue of French postage stamps is to commemorate the recent achievements of aviation. It is in honor of the air mail service and is of the one franc fifty denomination only. The stamp is engraved with a view of the old port of Marseilles and the Basilica of Notre Dame de la Garde. A plane is seen flying towards Africa and over the whole scene there hovers a headless bird.

Commissioners said stations in the past have issued licenses to car owners without proper tests, and to discourage such practices a provision to cancel without notice any license was written into the county record.

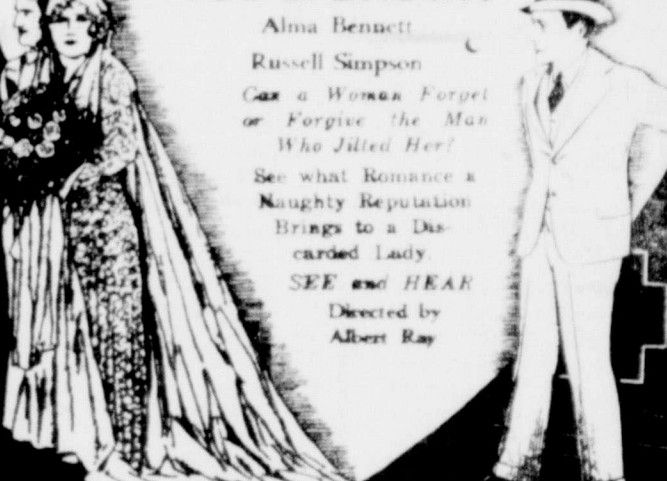

SWINK, Colo., Nov. 4.—Some easterners say turkey, the southerner asks for mo' turkey and the westerner calls it tur-r-key.

But it's the same bird all over the country when it's turned out brown on Thanksgiving and Christmas.

With those festive occasions near, turkey growers of the United States are preparing to meet the demand.

Glen Osborn, chief turkey

grower of the Arkansas valley, has borrowed some hints from science to produce his share of holiday birds. He grows his turkeys in tents and treats them to ultra-violet rays.

Osborn exposes the eggs to full sunlight after the tenth day of incubation. He says this exposure in ultra-violet rays of the sun produces more hardy poult.

The tents give the poult a maximum of ventilation, sunshine

and protection from the weather, and are less expensive than permanent wooden structures. The tent houses have board floors, and are mounted on skids so they can be moved.

On eight acres Osborn raised 2,200 turkeys this year. When October 1 came he placed the birds on alfalfa pasture, expecting to increase a tom turkey's weight from 19 to 28 pounds by Thanksgiving.

Better Chance For Young Now Says Vopicka

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Maybe the kids of this generation are not taught to be moral puritans, but intellectually they rate ace-high.

This hopeful pronouncement on the modern child was made by Charles J. Vopicka, former United States minister to the Balkans and veteran trustee of the Chicago School board. He retired recently after a personal tour of most of Chicago's 400 schools with the intention of observing at first-hand student conduct, mannerisms and loyalty to social institutions.

Summarizing his impressions Mr. Vopicka declared that this new standard of intelligence on the part of boys and girls is noticeable not only in school room but also in the universal demand for young men and women in business.

Interpreting this opinion more fully, he held that the restrictions of the old method of family life prevented youth from coming into competition with their elders until the old fellows were shelved.

He pointed out that modern inventions, mechanical arts and even devices of popular entertainment have all had their part in this telescoping of time and space

and the production of a generation wise beyond its years.

"Instead of parents telling their children to wait until they are older before they ask questions about intricate matters, they are given now to treat all inquiries seriously," he stated. "The children are not sent off to a separate room to play or study but go with their parents to the movies, help repair the motor car, drive it themselves, and in general participate in the family activities and social arrangements."

"These things make the children bright. Their minds get as much exercise as their bodies. The dullards, too, are benefited even if the differences between mental caliber are more obvious because of the change."

"Family discipline has grown less with the years, but a new companionship between parents and children has taken its place in many cases," he said. "While comradeship may play havoc with parental control, it has greater value to the child because repressions are built up and courage and alertness take the place of fear and dependence."

"Children of the age of 9 years today are as far advanced as were those of 13 when I became a school trustee 25 years ago, and in all my observations it became apparent that while the stream of life is no purer or better than formerly, the mind of youth has become much keener."
