SOVIET TROOPS SMASH GERMAN DEFENSE LINES

KUBYSHEV, Russia, April 15.—Soviet troops have smashed through the first line of German defenses guarding Bryansk, 200 miles southwest of Moscow, and are battling fiercely in the second line, dispatches from the front reported Wednesday.

The direct assault on the fortified lines guarding the key salient barely 60 miles from the frontier of White Russia was said to have developed from an offensive in which numerous communities were recaptured and 3,000 Germans killed in the last two weeks.

The dispatches said Nazi supplies engulfed in the westward sweep of the Russian forces included quantities of new rifles and machine guns apparently moved up for a German Spring drive.

Fierce fighting also was reported northwest of Moscow, where the Germans were said to have lost 1,200 men in the last few days.

VICTORY SURE FDR TELLS 20 S. AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, April 15.—It may take two or three years, says President Roosevelt, but "we are going to come out the winner in the long run."

"And when it comes to cleaning up the mess at the end of this war, after the Axis is defeated," he told a group of Latin American diplomats Tuesday, "we will have again the sobriquet of 'iron' around here to see what we are going to do all over the world, because we will have a very great voice in preventing, in the future, an attack on our American civilization."

The President spoke informally to 20 diplomatic representatives of other American republics who called at the White House on the occasion of the fifty-second anniversary of the Pan American Union.

HUGH JOHNSON DEAD.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Hugh S. Johnson, World War general, famed NRA administrator and noted columnist whose two-fisted, blunt-spoken way of life earned him the sobriquet of "iron pants," died in his Washington home Wednesday of pneumonia. True to the tradition of a fighting man, the 59-year-old Johnson wrote his last column propped up in bed only Tuesday in defiance of a doctor's order to rest. He had been ill for several months, pneumonia setting in last week.

U. S. GIRL CHARGE UNION WOULD NOT CHIEF IS SHY LEAVE DAD MANY MILLION

NEW ORLEANS, April 15.—A little American girl, clinging to an ear in the broad Pacific, spurred rescue in a lifeboat unless it would take her "daddy" too.

Mary Ann Mayer, 11, arrived here over the week-end on a friendly merchant vessel with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Mayer, and a dozen other Far East employees of the Goodyear Rubber company.

They left Singapore for Java under bombing. One day out from a south Java port, a Japanese submarine shelled the ship while passengers hurried into lifeboats. Speedily lowering of their lifeboat filled it with water, Mayer related, and he and his wife and Mary Ann jumped from it and clung to an oar.

A flying shell fragment struck Mayer. "A few minutes later a piece of shrapnel hit her," (Mary Ann), the father declared, "and she said 'I think they've broken my hand.' I said don't cry, honey, and she didn't."

When another lifeboat approached, the officer in charge called, "we are overcrowded and can only take mother and daughter."

Mary Ann, after getting into the boat, began climbing out and said, "I will not go unless my daddy goes too. Can't you see my daddy has been hurt?"

The little girl won. After "a seeming eternity," Mrs. Mayer said, a friendly plane sighted the lifeboat and six hours later a United States warship rescued them.

They rested in an East Indies port and then sailed again in the merchantman, which reached here without incident.

OVER 40,000 AIR WARDENS TRAIN TEXAS

AUSTIN, April 15.—More than 40,000 air raid wardens are being trained at present in Texas, Director Homer Garrison, Jr., of the state police has informed Governor Stevenson.

Garrison, state chairman for defense police mobilization, reported instructors from his department have already given a five-hour general course to more than 10,000 prospective wardens.

FRENCH RELIEF IS HELD UP

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Plans to send American food and clothing to France and French North Africa have been cancelled because of the government shake-up in Vichy, Acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles said today.

Welles was asked at a press conference whether the new developments in France, highlighted by the return of Pierre Laval to power, would have any effect on the announced plans of sending two ships to North Africa and a Red Cross vessel with milk and clothing for the children of France.

He replied that the ships have not sailed and would not be permitted to leave this country pending clarification of the situation involving the return of Laval to government leadership. Welles said some preliminary reports had been received from the American ambassador to Vichy, Admiral Leahy. He added that the reports were not complete enough for detailed discussion of this government's policies in light of the Laval development.

According to Ambassador Leahy's cables, Welles said, the composition of the new French government will not be announced for another two days. Vice Premier Designate Laval is in Paris, discussing selection of his cabinet colleagues, and until the composition of the new government is announced, and until it has taken over control, Welles continued, there will be no basis upon which to announce America's policy.

They will take the oath of office and be formally inducted at the meeting of April 25.

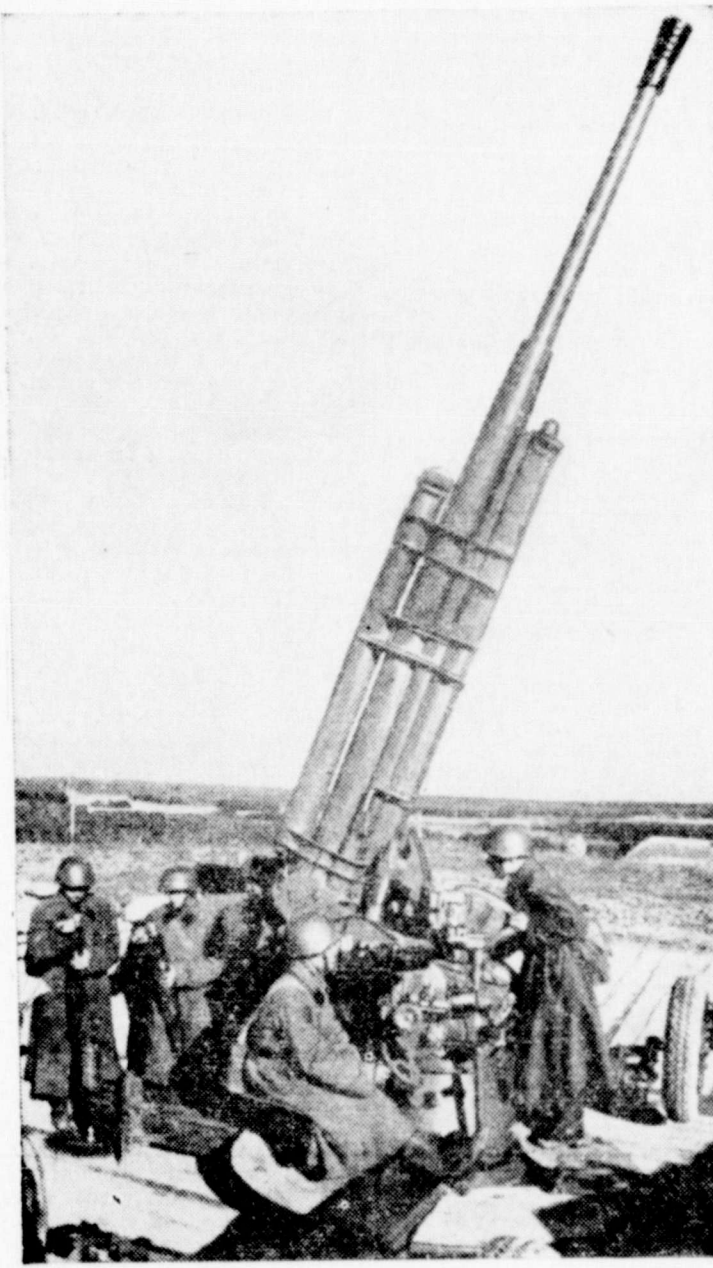
Present last night were G. P. Mitcham and City Commissioners Edward Lee, Neil Lane and A. V. Clark. Mr. Kleiner was absent from the city.

CISCO BOY, 22 IS NOW MASTER SERGEANT, U. S.

13 PLANES IN 4,000 MILE TRIP; 1 LOST

Gen. MacArthur's Headquarters, Australia, April 15.—Thirteen American bombers, including three flying fortresses, smashed Japanese shipping, airfields, docks and aircraft and spread "dismay and destruction" in long-distance attacks on three Philippine islands, a communique said tonight, striking some 2,000 miles from Australia to Manila, under the personal command of Brig. Gen. Ralph Royce.

Thus the American planes inaugurated on Monday night counterblows which General MacArthur promised would one day drive the enemy from the Philippines.

The bombers attacked Nichols Field, near Manila, the important port of Batangas on southern Luzon island, Cebu, capital of Cebu island, on which the Japanese landed 12,000 troops, and the important Japanese-held port of Davao on Mindanao island.

All but one of the 13 bombers returned safely from the 4,000-mile flight.

EX-SERVICE CLUBS WORK IN COMMUNITY

Aid to their communities in solving war-time problems is the project occupying the spotlight for American Legion auxiliary units this month, according to Mrs. H. N. Lyle, community service chairman of John Wm. Butts Unit of the auxiliary.

Auxiliary units are cooperating with other organizations in community service work of many types, or sponsoring projects of their own. With the curtailed use of automobiles will come increased emphasis on the home community, the auxiliary believes, and is seeking to help make the community as attractive and interesting as possible.

Both legionnaires and auxiliary members are assisting with the service men's club at the USO auxiliary. The ladies are working on committees, furnishing magazines, cookies and in other ways. Two legionnaires are to be present each evening the club is open to assist the hostesses.

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IMPORTANT APRIL

February is not the only month of famous birthdays. April has them, too. Washington Irving, of The Sketch Book. Peter Cooper, inventor and founder of the Cooper Union. Dorothea Dix, to whose interest in the insane is due much of their modern scientific treatment. Henry Clay, too. Thomas Jefferson and U. S. Grant. Charles Chaplin first saw the light in April, and so did Martha Fainley, author of Elsie Dismore, her parents, her cousins and her aunts.

Wars have often been started in April, for the obvious reason that spring seems the time to initiate campaigns. There was the American Revolution opening up at Lexington, the Civil War and the Spanish - American war. The United States entered World War I April 6, 1917.

The Civil War ended in April, with the surrender of Lee on the ninth and the death of Lincoln six days later—gallant soldier and great president. The American Revolution ended in one April, and the Mexican war came to its stay of arms in another.

Willis Thornton has gathered up dozens of interesting things like this in his "Almanac for Americans." Thornton has now gone to war, leaving his fellow-editors to delight in his book.

The Mormon church was organized in April, and the North Pole discovered. La Salle reached the Mississippi and called the valley Louisiana. Later by 121 years—also in April—Louisiana was admitted to the Union.

Easter this year came on April 5, Army Day on the 6th. Arbor Day sees several states planting trees in April. On April 27 all men between 45 and 65 must register with the federal government.

And, by the way, April is the birth month of W. J. Donovan, W. J. Armstrong and Wyatt Jacobs, of Cisco.

PLASTIC AND PLYWOOD

The Navy has completed an experimental training plane made of plastic and plywood. It is made nine-tenths of wood and plastic glue, with only one-tenth metal. If it proves airworthy, it will be but one of several new types to be put into mass production to provide new training planes for naval air cadets.

The inventors of the new construction believe it will prove stronger than steel. The plastic glue impregnates the wood, working its way into the pores and keeping the plywood from warping or buckling. The riveting and overlapping of plates in older forms of construction always cause an airdrag, which it is hoped may be eliminated in these new planes.

If shipping can just take a brace and utilize the results of the new research, so that the United Nations can move the stuff which has to go by water faster and ever faster, it will not be too many months before the edge which we are beginning to have on the Axis powers will be wide enough to mean something.

DEADLY CONFUSION

The failure of the British-Indian negotiations has been a hard blow to everybody concerned, including our own country. This is a time for agreement and cooperation among all nations that favor international decency and order. The break-down is so much to the advantage of Hitler and his Japanese ally that presumably they both had a finger in that pie.

It is so much to the advantage of both the Indians and the Allied Nations that the long steps taken toward voluntary cooperation for Indian defense cannot be allowed to fail. Britain is now so far committed to Indian government with Dominion status after the war, and half-way concessions until then, that Indian leaders should confidently expect a square deal. Additional reassurance and support on that point may well come from our own country. Our representatives are in India working for a settlement.

Meanwhile the Japs, urged on by Hitler, are pressing into India with their bombers and spies to

capitalize the confusion. The Indians cannot defend themselves in their present unarmed state. Domination of India by the aggressive powers would delay the war for years, immensely increasing the burden of Britain and America. That cannot be allowed to happen.

VERSATILE ARMY

This is a cosmic army we are creating, an army fitted for service anywhere in the world, able to fight in any kind of climate, at home or under the sea, in the air or under the sea. Little is said about it in official places. But from casual information it seems likely that while not yet so large as our army in the last war, it may be better prepared to do more different things effectively than any other army in history.

You could take units out of this army and put them in the Arctic, or on a mountain top in a howling blizzard, and they'd eat it up. You could put other units on the hot desert in Africa and they'd feel at home. Others would be ready to wipe up an enemy in northern woods or a tropical jungle. Others are skilled paratroopers or swimmer or tank fighters. And so on until you get dizzy with the variety of their skills and equipment.

"Join the navy and see the world," enlistment posters used to advertise. But sailors never saw a lot of things this army is going to see.

OTHER EDITORS

Should Keep Right Names

San Angelo Standard - Times: WHY DO THEY CHANGE THEIR NAMES, these fellows who come to this country from Europe, and begin to stir up trouble almost as soon as they land. For instance one Homer Barchy, who changed his name to Homer Brooks, but did not change his ideas of changing this government, and who was twice on the Texas election tickets as a candidate for governor, in the column set aside for the Communist party.

To be sure he had no expectation of being elected, but he was given a measure of prominence, both among his own ilk and the general public, and perhaps thought he would be able to make some converts to his scheme of government. Now he is in trouble with the federal authorities, because he failed to report for induction into the army and did not advise the draft board of his change of address.

Arraigned before District Judge James V. Allred, he said in reply to question by the judge that he had been a candidate for governor in one of the elections in which Judge Allred said he would not hear the case of Barchy alias Brooks, but would ask Judge Kennedy to do so.

It is fortunate that Brooks was not inducted into United States army, for induction would have changed his theory of government and as a Communist he would have taken every opportunity to foment dissatisfaction. Communists in Russia, where that is the system of government, are in the right place, but there is no place in the United States for them, especially in the army or in official positions.

Under Brooks' system of government Judge Allred would have been eager to try him and send him to the penitentiary. That is just another of the differences between our government and that of the Brooks or Barchy school of thought, if any.

OPEN FORUM

The Defense Guard

To the Citizens of Cisco: After Pearl Harbor there was a mass meeting attended by approximately ninety-five men, who volunteered to do anything reasonable to assist in the protection of our lives and property here in case of an emergency. There was discussion at this meeting the organization of a Defense Guard and the question as to the purchase of uniforms arose. Due to the fact that a number of our men are out of employment, there were, and are, a number who would be glad to train, but who are unable to buy uniforms. Also there will of necessity be other necessary expenses in connection with this.

At this meeting Charles J. Kiener stated that he would pay for uniforms for those who desired to give their time and effort to this work, but who were unable to pay. Notwithstanding this patriotic offer, several other citizens felt that it would be taking advantage of Mr. Kiener's patriotism and generosity to permit him to carry this burden and it was suggested that every citizen be asked to do his or her part in connection with this and an appeal was made by the Defense Council.

Several who are in as good a position as Mr. Kiener is in to help, have used his offer as an excuse for not doing anything, their attitude being "let Mr. Kiener do it."

GOOD NEWS FOR CORPORATIONS

Babson Says Standardization Increases Profits and Lowers Prices.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15.

—Rationing is becoming a familiar word in our speech. Now standardization is to be its twin in the vocabulary of our war economy. We "aint seen nothing yet" in the way of actual rationing of standardization. The necessity of doubling our industrial war production every twelve months and the importance of eliminating waste in luxury and non-essentials will shortly strip us of many things. Our heretofore free indulgence and mode of life, characterized by material abundance, should slowly but surely pass from the American family scene.

Face Facts, Forget Fancies.

The U. S. A. has the greatest industrial production facilities in the world. It is also a large agrarian country although exceeded in this respect by India and Russia. Our industrial activity in the past has been devoted to the production of goods of a peaceful nature. Almost overnight we have been obliged to about face and turn our industrial capacities and our agricultural output into a vast coordinated machine for waging an offensive war.

Great Britain and the United States have been such powerful peace-time nations that they have underestimated the war preparations of other countries. Furthermore, they have relied too much upon sending a boy to do a man's work. This has been true in diplomatic functions, in the handling of production problems, and in the strategy employed in battle areas. The jolts and jars of recent weeks have done much to wake us up. We now face facts rather than a continuance of fancy living. No longer will it be possible or fashionable to have two cars in the garage, two maids in the kitchen, and two mortgages on the house!

Frills Are Out.

The elimination of waste in all forms is an important factor in winning the war. We should voluntarily give up the luxuries and non-essentials, the production of which interferes with war needs. It is necessary to provide labor supplies and productive facilities and storage space for the most important needs of war production. Hence, we have restorations and standardizations in many, many lines of consumer goods.

Women's skirts will get shorter and their stockings will disappear. Men's suits, while pretty well standardized, will be cut on new lines to conserve cloth. Many liquid foodstuffs will appear as dried varieties packed in paper rather than in metal containers. Plywood and plastics will become standard substitutes for many metal products. This will help certain wood working and chemical companies which are now being liquidated into sources of new supplies.

Get Accustomed to Changes.

Consumer goods, especially personal and household effects, will show marked changes. Living and standards must be revised for the duration. Only in a broad general fashion do householders and civilians now know what's ahead for them. To the casual shopper, most department stores and other retail shelves appear comfortably filled. Watch out,

and banks all over Texas and in fact, the United States have the greatest deposits that they have had since 1926 or 1929, if not in all history.

Our country is in the greatest crisis it has been in since the Civil war and it is possible that we are in worse condition than we were in at that time. We have more millionaires and more wealthy people, and a number of the wealthy people live in Cisco at this time. Some of them do not have sons or relatives who will be called upon and they seem to have no interest at all in the crisis now before us. Their attitude is that they are very liberal with other people's sons and relatives and the lives of their neighbors' boys and it will be alright for our young men, those men who can drill, and Mr. Kiener, to protect them.

I would appreciate all of you giving some thought to this and instead of holding back because Mr. Kiener made this kind offer, get the right attitude; that is, get we do not ask him to go more than his part and "get in the collar" ourselves.

There has also been some criticism among some of you, who are hunting for an excuse for not cooperating, in the method of drill and the manner that the work is being carried on. Your captain and officers will appreciate any suggestions and, instead of staying out, come in and make suggestions. This letter is written without the suggestion, knowledge or consent of Mr. Kiener.

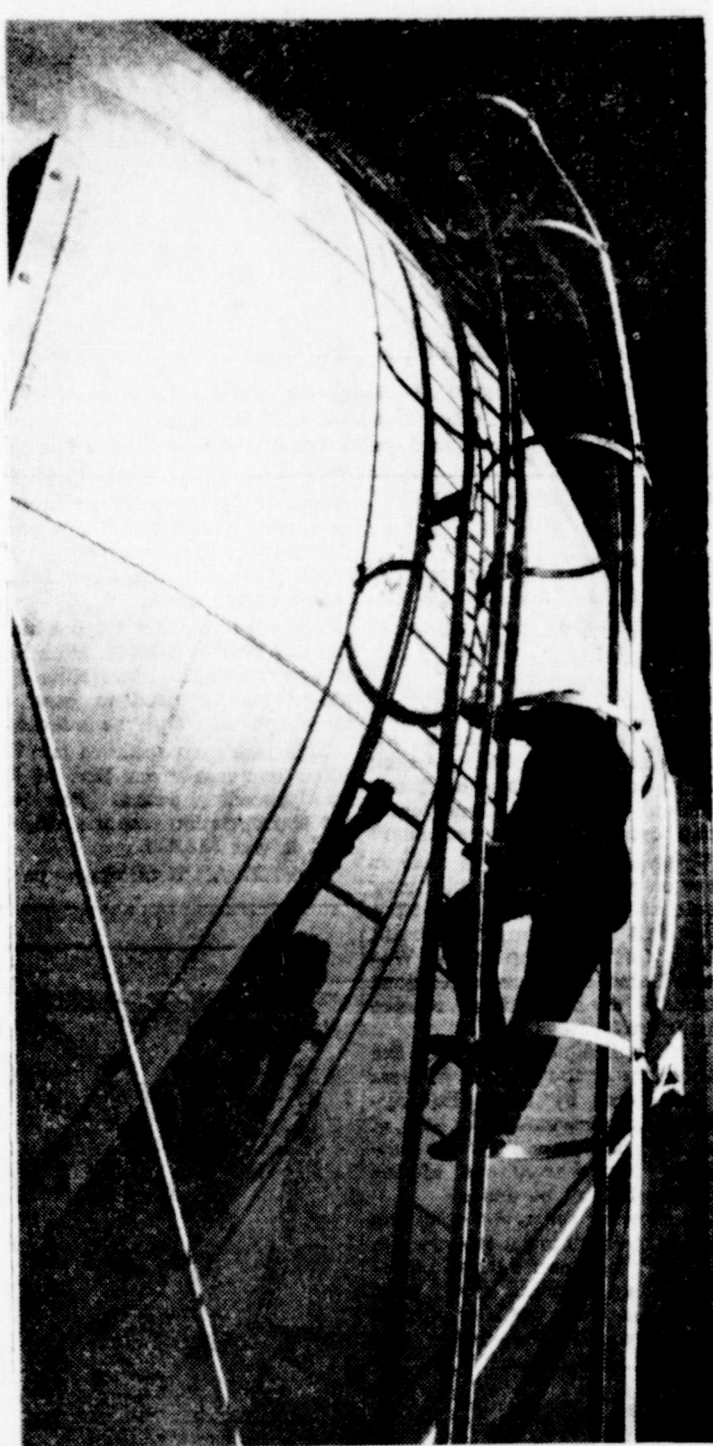

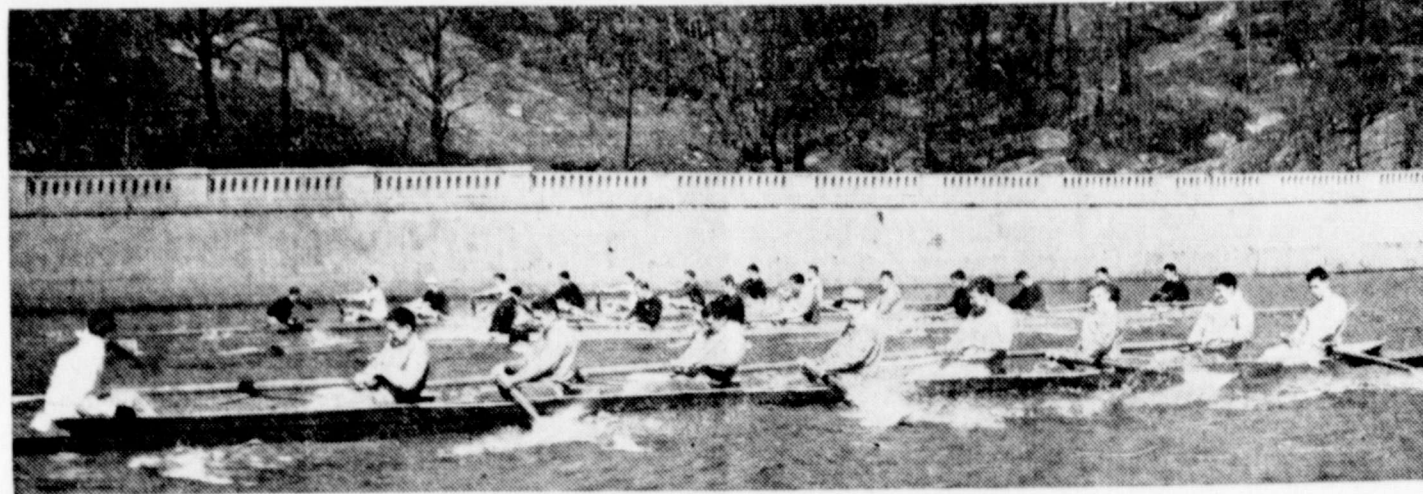

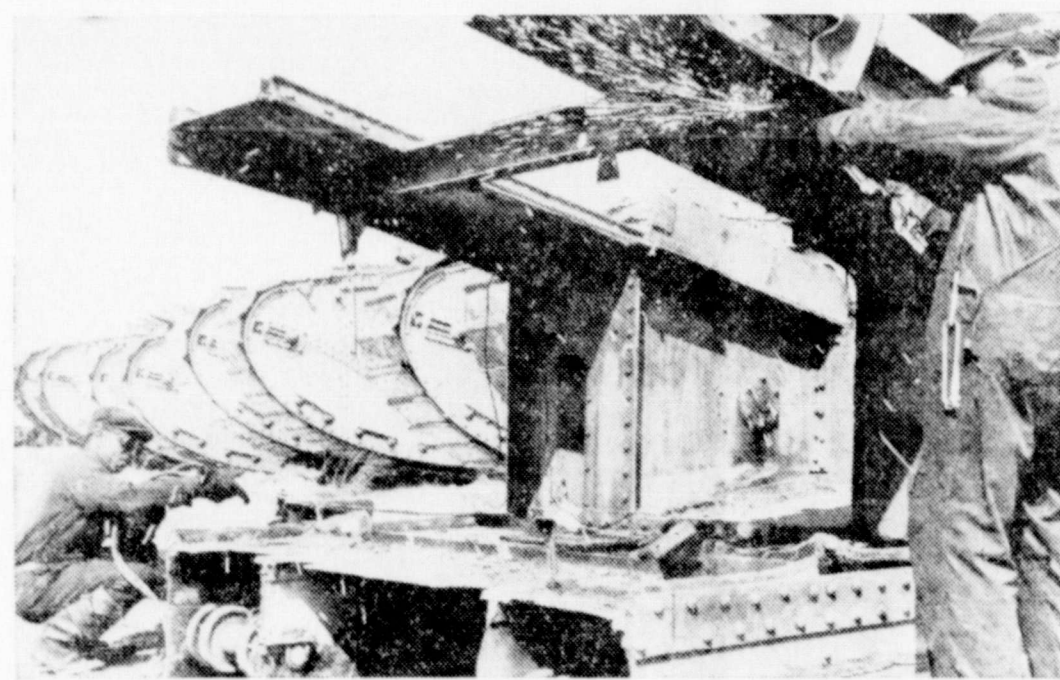

TEXAS CONFEDERATE HOME HAS 7 VETS

AUSTIN, April 13.—Confederate Veteran Lucius M. McAdam, 97, this week asked the question: "Why does the state of Texas maintain a costly Confederate home to care for seven veterans?"

Veteran McAdam says that in these war times the sensible thing would be for the state to close the home and move him and the six others to the Confederate Women's Home, or pay them pensions adequate to have them receive proper care elsewhere.

An unwillingness to disturb the tranquility of the few old soldiers at the home by the politically-minded has prevented any step of that sort, but now that the suggestion comes from one of the veterans it may be done.

To care for the seven men the state is maintaining a 26-acre site and more than half a dozen buildings. One of these, the most modern, is used while emptiness echoes through the halls and

rooms of what was once a crowded main building and numerous detached cottages where veterans lived, played checkers and fought the war over again.

The appropriation for the home for this year is \$16,906. For 1943 it will be \$2,000 less. Nine employees are required to care for the seven men and the buildings.

This year's expenditure is a decided decrease from that of the two preceding years. For 1940 the appropriation was \$45,625, for 1941 it was \$38,625.

Supt. J. A. McCutcheon pared

the cost of maintaining the large premises to the lowered figures. He cut the force from about 30 employees to nine. His reward was a decrease in pay from \$2,250 to \$1,800.

By an act of 1939, the state legislature authorized turning the property into a home for soldiers and sailors of later wars. The state board of control was authorized to enter into negotiations with the federal government for admittance of soldiers and sailors with proviso that pensions and compensation payable to such ad-

mitted veterans would go to the home to pay the expense. Balances above the cost of their care were to be returned to the veterans.

So far nothing has come of the offer.

The Confederate home resulted from activities of John B. Hood, Camp of United Confederate Veterans, named in honor of the commander of Hood's Brigade which wrote a Texas record of bravery and accomplishment in the War Between the States.

The home was opened in 1887 as a private institution. In 1891 it became a state institution, although for several years after it was turned over to the state, the only funds for its operation came from donations and transfer to it of fees.

After a permissive constitutional amendment was passed, the legislature began making biennial appropriations for its maintenance.

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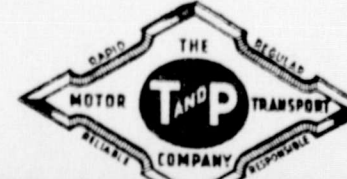
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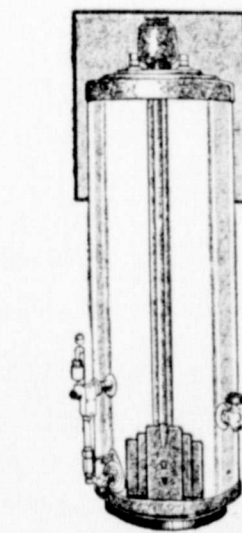


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
