## \$105,000 in Damages Asked by Patrolman

Among the cases to be tried in 91st District Court in September will be E. M. Rogers V. Robert William Rosson, Rogers suing for the amount of \$105,141.39 in damages and for injuries which he received on Feb. 27, 1965, when the automobile driven by Rosson struck Rogers as he was directing traffic on Highway 80, east of Ranger.

Rogers, who was at that time a highway patrolman in Eastland County, was directing traffic around vehicles involved in an accident and was without warning, struck by the car driven by Rosson. He received injuries to his knee joint, his right ankle, a fracture to his left hand and multiple abrasions and lacerations.

Rogers was confined to hospital until May 15, 1965. He alleges that Rosson failed to keep a proper lookout, drove his car at a great speed than permitted by law, drove his automobile at a excessive rate of speed under circumstances existing, failed to drive the car to the south, around the highway patrolman and failed to stop the car before reaching Rogers.

Mr. Rogers recently transferred to Midland where he is employed as a Highway Patrolman.

The trial is set for Sept. 12, also on which date the case of J. G. Evans V. Lloyd Mann et al, will be tried.

Part of the 16 proposed amendments to the state constitution on which voters will decide Nov. 8 will be published in this newspaper.

Among the proposals causing the most discussion are those authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board; voting requirements for armed forces personnel; and repeal of the poll tax.

A chronological list of the proposed amendments is as follows:

- 1 - Taxation of agricultural land.
- 2 - Creation and operation of Airport Authorities.
- 3 - Withdrawal of Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.
- 4 - Terms of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.
- 5 - Establishment of a Statewide Cooperative System of Retirement.
- 6 - Payment to survivors of firemen.
- 7 - Repeal of poll tax.
- 8 - Voting residence requirements for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and all state-wide races.
- 9 - Create five - member Court of Criminal Appeals.
- 10 - Invalidation of school taxes by any change in boundaries.
- 11 - Texas Water Development Fund.
- 12 - Dissolution of hospital districts.
- 13 - Consolidation of functions of government for any county with more than 1,200,000 population.
- 14 - Armed forces personnel voting requirement.
- 15 - State participation in privately-financed programs.
- 16 - Establishment of date on which newly-elected members of the Legislature shall take office.

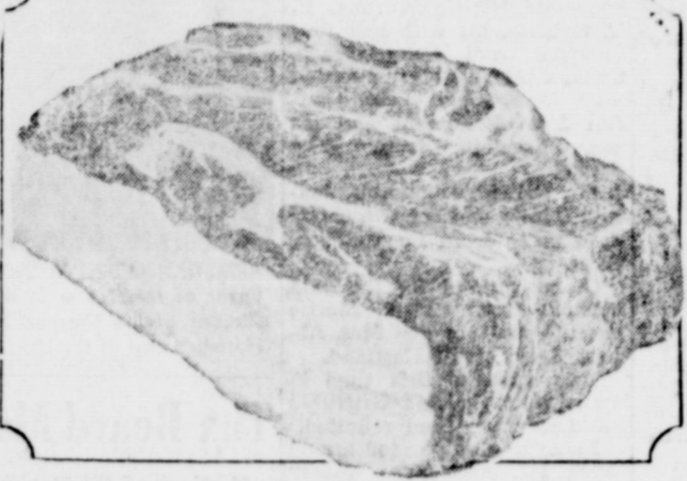

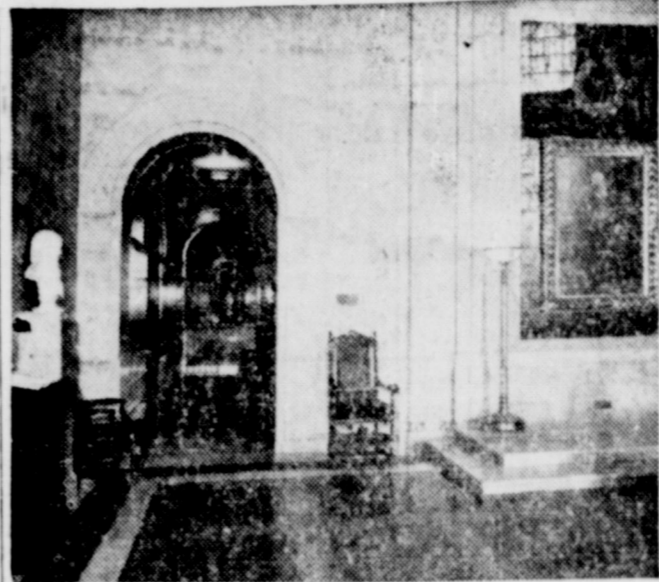

## Hints Offered On How To Beat Summer's Heat

Is the heat wearing you down?

It's hot in most of the United States in mid-summer. In the desert and in the south, it's even hotter, but by late July and August it's often hot even in the mountains.

Regardless of whether one blames the heat or the humidity, it's still hot.

There's nothing you can do about the outside temperature. Unless you're fortunate enough to have an air conditioned office or shop, home and auto, there's nothing much you can do about it inside either.

But there are some things you can do to be more comfortable — things that can help you beat the heat.

Stay out of the sun as much as possible, especially during the middle of the day when rays are hottest. Wear light, loose clothing, the less the better. Get up early in the morning to do your heavy work on the lawn or garden. Or work at dusk in the evening, but try to avoid heavy exertion during the hottest hours of the day.

You need exercise in the summer as well as in the winter, but don't overdo it, especially on extra hot days. Don't overdo physical exertion, whether at work or play.

The more relaxed outdoor life of the summer months has many advantages to compensate for the heat. Stay relaxed and use common sense, and you can beat the heat — at least somewhat.

# State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, Tex. — How you drive that automobile during the next 12 months will determine what you pay for car insurance a year from now. Traffic violations, as well as accidents, will appear on your experience record and will count against you.

New plan designed by the State Board of Insurance will hit where it hurts the most — the purse.

Or conversely, if you care

to look at it that way, it will lighten the load on those who are penalized by higher rates because of the carelessness of others. And that's the way it really is, since some kind of increase is necessary.

Penalty points now are being assessed motorists for accidents and major violations including speeding.

One penalty point will mean a 15 per cent hike, two points 25 per cent, three points 40

per cent and four or more points 90 per cent.

Major violations — like driving while intoxicated, negligent homicide, hit and run or felony driving offenses will cost drivers three points.

To points will be assessed for driving while a license is suspended or for violations resulting in suspension.

for accidents where there is injury or death or property damage over \$50 — and for not counted until after one or two "free convictions" in the preceding year or three years.

After 1969, penalties will be based on driving records over a 36 month period.

"Points" rule are listed, however, and one of them includes accidents in which the driver is not at fault.
