Moguls Back In District Race With Recent Win

The Munday Moguls fought themselves back into the playoff picture Friday night in Paducah by defeating the Dragons 8-6.

Munday, Haskell, Rotan and Seymour are tied for second place in District 4-AA with 1-1 records.

Coach Jim Edwards, trying to find a winning combination, made three offensive line changes Friday night. They were Gregg Sanders at quick tackle, Pat Angerer at quick guard, and Neil Waggoner at center. Other changes were made as a result of two players failing to show up in time to catch the bus. The changes were Tim Collier at tailback and Scotty Jackson at cornerback on defense.

Paducah won the toss and elected to receive. The game started out as a defense battle. There were 3 punts in the first 12 plays of the game.

On their second possession, the Moguls took 5 plays to cross the goal line with quarterback Dent Offutt hitting Todd Thompson on a 37-yard touchdown pass play. Tim Collier ran the ball for a two point conversion as the Moguls took an 8-0 lead with 4:26 left in the first quarter.

On Paducah's sixth possession of the game, the Dragons started a drive on their own eleven yard line. Seventeen plays and five first downs later the fighting Moguls stopped the Dragon drive on the Munday two yard line. The half ended one play later.

The third quarter was another defensive battle. Paducah made the only first drive on their 41 yard line. Two minutes in the fourth quarter, quarterback Richard Gregory hit Greg McClendon on a 20-yard pass play for a touchdown. The Moguls stopped Paducah on a two point conversion try, leaving the score Munday 8, Paducah 6.

Munday fumbled on the third play after receiving the kickoff on the 49 yard line. Paducah drove to the Mogul 13 yard line and missed on a field goal try.

With 5:29 left in the game the Mogul offense took the ball, drove down field and ran the clock out.

Water Rates, Employee Benefits, Service Fees Concern Council

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met Tuesday, October 11, 1983 at 8 p.m. at the Munday City Hall in regular session.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen Bob Therwanger, Jessie Tucker and Doris Dickerson.

Members absent: Von Marr and Bobby D. Burnett.

Mayor Reid called the meeting to order. The September 17, 1983 bid opening as budgeted was read; also minutes of the October 5, 1983 special meeting. No alterations. Mayor Reid stated minutes are approved as read.

1. First business was examination of a proposed retirement plan for City employees;

2. Next examined was a hospital insurance plan; (both are T. M. L. plans). Also discussed was City's financial ability as budgeted to meet either 1 or 2 or give an employee raise. Council decision on 1 - cost to City exceeds the budget since City's portion is much greater than anticipated. Decision on 2 - cost to City is acceptable but employee deduction from salary to cover dependents would be over \$100 per month. This would not be acceptable to employees, the council decided.

After discussion, Dickerson moved that a 5% increase be given to City employees with one year or more of service and part-time help classified with machinery operating qualification. Tucker seconded the motion. Voting for were Dickerson, Tucker and Therwanger. Noes, none. Carried.

Mayor Reid next read a letter from North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. Beginning with the next billing the water authority rate to the City of Munday will increase from 75¢ to 85¢ per thousand gallons; also the minimum per month will be raised from \$5,825 to \$6,601.40. This will produce an approximate \$9,500 to \$10,000 per year unbudgeted item. Dickerson moved that the water rate be changed as follows (beginning next billing). Minimum charge to be increased by \$1 per month to each water customer - and all water past 6000 gallon minimum be raised from \$1.00 to

\$1.20 per 1000 gallons; also that the budget be amended to add \$10,000 to water income and deduct \$10,000 for water authority payments. Therwanger seconded the motion. Voting for were Dickerson, Therwanger and Tucker. Noes, none. Carried.

A letter was presented in regard to sewer laterals on private property. Tabled - not necessary for Munday. A letter regarding H.U.D.H.R. 1955 was read. Private investment would be required. Tabled.

A letter from Texas Employers offered an alternate plan to T.M.L. Workers' Comp. Tables. Council not interested at this time.

A letter addressed to Chief Saffell from Tex Martin was read. It was in regard to Crime Stoppers units in Texas. Tabled at this time. Funding and interest by public would be necessary.

In regard to disposal of unclaimed property by Police Department the City Administrator is to secure sample ordinances for a guide and present same to council at a later date.

Action on a Munday Housing Authority letter was tabled until the next regular meeting.

Therwanger moved that the City of Munday vote for the Knox County Appraisal District Board Members as follows: for W. R. Moore Jr., 95 votes; for D. B. Gass, 95 votes. (Clyde Voss, Dwight Burgess and J. V. Carver are also recommended to continue service on the board.) Dickerson seconded the motion. Voting for were Therwanger,

This Land Is Your Land

As Texas Land Commissioner, one of my most important responsibilities is to guarantee that the leasing of mineral rights on state-owned lands brings the highest possible return to the Permanent School Fund.

As part of my commitment to run the General Land Office in an efficient, businesslike manner, I have initiated a field-audit program of oil and gas leases on state-owned lands.

The Permanent School Fund will gain an additional \$7 million as a result of the findings of this recently completed audit.

This is the first time in history the General Land Office has conducted a field audit on our active oil and gas leases. In the three-month program that ended August 31, an audit of 42 leases by four different operators resulted in the discovery of numerous contract violations. As a result of the audit we could gain as much as \$7,196,834 in payments to the Permanent School Fund, which means we will have collected \$35.98 for each \$1 spent on the audit program.

The General Land Office currently has over 2,900 producing leases on public lands. The field-audit program, which was authorized by the Texas legislature, conducted studies on only 1.5 percent of all the active leases.

In granting the funds for the pilot field-audit program, the legislature showed its

Impulse Buying Is A Common Costly Habit

Impulse buying is a common and sometimes costly habit, says family resource management specialist Dr. Marjorie Smith.

"People who get down to the end of the month and don't know where their money went, or who fre-

quently wonder why they bought certain things, may have been doing some impulse buying," says Smith, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

The first step in reducing impulse buying is to recognize the many temptations. For example, the attractive displays at the ends of aisles or near check-out counters may encourage last minute purchases, she explains.

Shopping from a list, whether it's for groceries, clothes or gifts, can be helpful in checking the impulse to buy, says the home economist. Even looking through catalogs at home may help prepare a shopper to go to the store with a specific purchase in mind.

Since groceries are a major purchase category, making sure all family members know how to shop for food wisely may reduce impulse spending, says Smith. With the large number of employed women, more husbands and teenagers buy the family groceries, yet may not have as many shopping skills, she notes.

In some cases shoppers can slow down the purchase process to give themselves time to think before taking action. Before buying, Smith suggests asking questions such as "When will I use this?" "Where will I store this?" or "For the same money, would I rather have something else?"

For a major purchase, a consumer can make it a rule to "sleep on it" before buying. A good offer should be just as good the next day.

Consumers should also be aware of their mood when they shop. "If you're tired, hungry or depressed, you may buy things that you don't really need," says Smith. You might be better off postponing a shopping trip until you have rested or eaten a meal.

Being in a hurry can also lead to poor purchase decisions so try to allot adequate time for shopping, she adds.

Shoppers might also try some basic budgeting, says

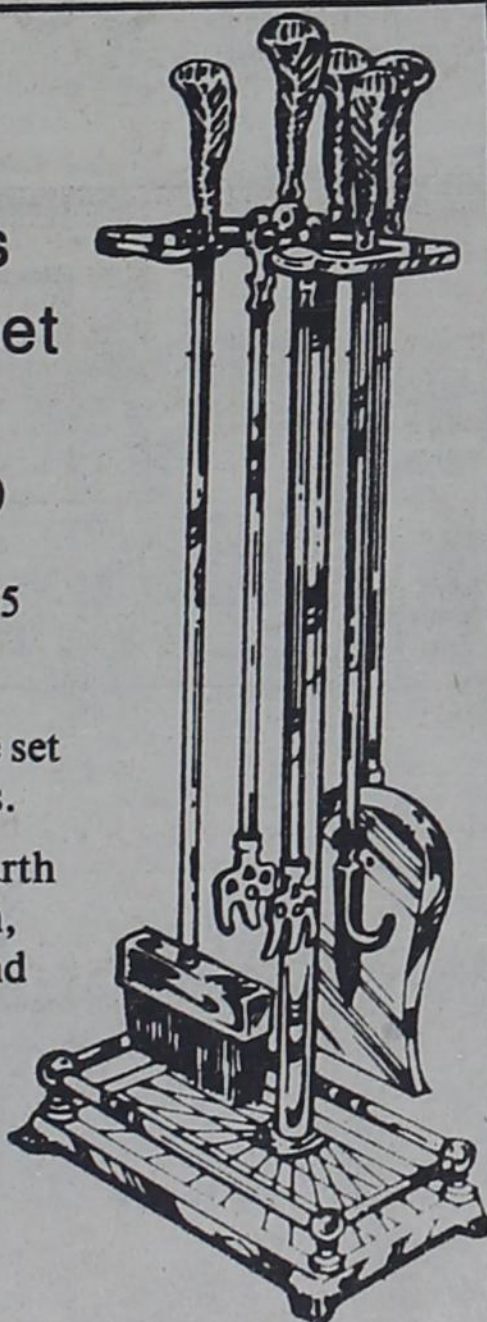

Conversion Tillage Way Of Conserving Rainfall

Doing a better job of conserving rainfall may help farmers cope with dry conditions such as those that have plagued Texas and other states this year.

One way to "stretch" rainfall is through conservation tillage, suggests Dr. Ed Colburn, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Conservation tillage systems often produce higher yields per inch of available water," notes Colburn, "thus making the best use of this valuable resource."

Conservation tillage generally results in tillage operations that reduce water evaporation losses and increase

water infiltration into the soil.

"Conservation tillage helps improve soil moisture conditions by increasing water infiltration and slowing evaporation," points out Colburn. "Heavy crop residues help reduce runoff and erosion. Chiseling or subsoiling deepens the root zone and leaves the soil surface in a rough state to store more water."

A deeper root zone generally increases the soil water storage as a result of deep chiseling and improved soil organic matter levels, says the agronomist. This may give an extra inch or two of stored moisture that can help carry the crop through low rainfall periods.

"Although conservation tillage practices won't give overnight results, they can improve soil conditions and can start paying dividends in several years," says Colburn.

The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Knox County wells made an important contribution to the county's economy in 1982 and accounted for \$45.1 million of the \$41.1 billion wellhead value of Texas petroleum production last year.

In its annual survey of the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association reported that the county ranked 150th among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of value of its marketed petroleum production. Such production includes condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced

duced 1.4 million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$44.7 million, and 174.1 million cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$363,579. Owners of royalty in the county received \$5.6 million as their share of the output, the Association noted.

"The figures cited in this survey offer graphic evidence of the continuing importance of petroleum production to nearly every county in Texas, a situation which should continue indefinitely," said the Association's chairman, Joe C. Walter, Jr., Houston independent producer.

"There are a number of encouraging signs indicating that the oil and gas industry's protracted slowdown in activity is coming to an end. A general economic recovery in the United States and other industrialized countries will increase the demand for petroleum products, thereby stimulating geophysical and drilling activity here and abroad. The domestic petroleum industry stands ready to drill more wells as drilling projects become economically feasible," Walter said.

In addition to paying property taxes to cities, counties and school districts, producers in the county supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$2.1 billion, according to the Association survey. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$2,058,491, while natural gas levies totaled \$27,268.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 30 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$1.1 million in 1982.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the coun-

ty, oil and gas producers spent a reported \$19.2 million in the drilling of 154 wells, including 38 wildcat, or exploratory, wells. This effort resulted in the completion of 62 oil wells, although some \$9.7 million was lost in the drilling of 92 holes. As of April 1, 1983, there were 426 producing oil wells in the county.

Petroleum processing also contributed to the county economy, with two natural gasoline processing plants, having a total daily capacity of 11.3 million cubic feet of natural gas.

Elderly May File Affidavit To Postpone Paying Late Taxes

A taxpayer aged 65 or older may take advantage of a special type of property tax relief - deferred payment of delinquent taxes on his homestead - by filing a sworn affidavit at the office of the appraisal district in which he lives.

If a lawsuit has already been initiated to collect delinquent taxes on the elderly taxpayer's homestead, an affidavit asserting age and ownership of the property must be filed with the court in which the suit is pending.

According to Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), the Texas Property Tax Code provides that, after an "over-65 tax deferral" affidavit has been properly filed, taxing units may not press or initiate delinquent tax suits on the homestead involved as long as the applicant owns and resides at that property.

Graeber said that forms for the deferral affidavit are available from appraisal district offices. The form should be completed and signed by the applicant and his signature witnessed by a notary public or other official authorized to take oaths.

For the elderly homeowner considering application for tax deferral, Graeber stressed that it allows postponing payment, but that a lien re-

mains on the property for delinquent taxes, penalties and interest. "Those amounts continue to accrue during the period of deferral," he said. "Once the applicant no longer qualifies for deferral - that is, if he no longer owns or resides at the homestead - all those accrued amounts become due and payable. Taxing units at that time may sue and foreclose on the accrued delinquent taxes, penalties and interest."

The over-65 taxpayer may pay, or fail to pay, any taxes due on the homestead without altering the protection of the deferral.

The woman went away sorrowfully.

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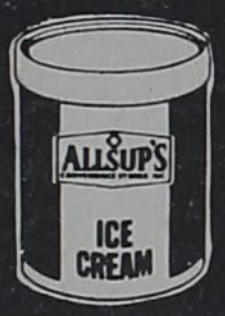

Beginning November 1, 1983, and for the next fiscal year, the water authority rates for the City of Munday are changed as follows: 75¢ per thousand gallons to 85¢ per thousand gallons; also minimum is increased from \$5825.00 per month to \$6601.40.

To raise this approximate \$10,000 per year, Munday's water rates are increased from \$11.00 to \$12.00 monthly minimum. Water used past the 6,000 gallon minimum will be increased from \$1.00 to \$1.20 per thousand gallons.

We regret this action is necessary, however West Texas Utility Electric increase and chemical increased costs caused the water authority rate to go up.
