WILLIAMS MILLS

The following obituary is taken from the Neosho, Missouri, paper. It is an old time resident of Perryton, living for a number of years on the farm, which is now owned by M. Cummins. Mr. Mills is the son of Mrs. Edgar Witt of Perryton.

William Mills was born August 22, 1848, in Madison, Indiana. He died August 22, 1924, being at the time of his death 75 years, 6 months and 10 days. He was married to Katie Olden on September 23, 1875. Six children were born to this union, every child of which he loved and tried to serve, to their dear father as he passed the river to rest under the shade of the trees. He was considered almost to the last, asking blessing on his dear loving wife and children in the everlasting city. His children are as follows: Mrs. Witt, Perryton, Texas; Mrs. Aron, Wichita, Kansas; Mrs. Jean, George Sleveland and Ray of this city.

He came to Missouri when about 15 years old and spent the remainder of his life here, except eleven years in Ochiltree, Texas. He united with the Methodist Church in Perryton, Missouri, about forty years ago. He was a man loved and respected by all who knew him, honest in his dealings with his neighbors. For many years he was a successful farmer, finally coming to Neosho to await for the call to a higher life.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at two o'clock at his home in Neosho, Missouri, conducted by Firestone and Rev. Stephens of the church. Music was furnished by the Male Quartet. After the funeral an impressive service, all that of Mr. Mills was carried to the City of the Dead. Burial was in the O. O. F. Cemetery, Neosho, Mo.

\$3,000 FOR HOPPER POISON

MEADE, Kan.—Western counties of Kansas in particular, those where the grasshoppers are prevalent more or less every year, buy poison with which to kill the hoppers out of county funds, according to C. S. Merty, county farm agent at Meade, Kan. "Money for this purpose is included within the county budget, just like other necessities," said Merydith today, "and it is paid for by the taxpayers. The county of Meade spent \$3,000 this year for this poison. Other counties follow along the same line. In that section of Kansas the hoppers were worse in 1923 than this year, according to Merydith.—Wichita Eagle

COUNTY AGENT NOTES

The bunt, closed smut or crease smut of wheat; the closed smut of barley, the closed or loose smut of oats, and the kernel smuts of kafir sorghum and broom corn are easily preventable. The spores of the fungus which correspond to the seed of higher plants, are very small, and easily adhere to the out side of the grains. These spores are so small that the human eye cannot detect them except when they are present in large groups.

The bunt smut balls are broken up more or less during harvesting and threshing and the loose spores find lodgement on the out side of the grains and remain on the out side especially among the hairs at the upper end or in the crease. The smut beginning to germinate or grow when the wheat germinates, and at once infects the plant, living inside the tissue. The infected plants are not noticeable, so that the damage by smut from a casual observation is usually underestimated.

It is plain that any treatment which will destroy the delicate spores on seed with out destroying the seed germs will prevent the disease. Of several methods of treatment, using formalin or formaldehyde is probably the best. Formaldehyde can be obtained from any druggist for about 50c a pint. It should be guaranteed to be about 40 per cent strength. A pint of formalin in 40 gallons of water makes a solution strong enough to kill the spores. If 40 gallons is not the amount needed, it can be made up in any amount by using 2 ounces of formalin to 5 gallons of water.

The solution may be applied to the grain by dipping the grain in it or sprinkling it over the grain. A wagon box is very convenient for the latter so that the grain may be thoroughly stirred and completely wet. After the grain is wet it should be piled and covered for 2 or 3 hours to hold the formalin gas which kills the spores. It is then necessary to spread the grain out in layers or shovel it over several times to prevent the gas from killing the germ of the grain. Keep the grain in the open and exposed to air until dry, then it may be stored or fed to live stock, if more grain is treated than is needed.

TEXAS NEEDS BETTER HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS

Fort Worth, Texas, Aug. 30.—Texas must have better trained high school teachers, says Dr. George A. Works, director of the Texas School Survey. In the first of the reports on the findings of the survey, the director suggests that legislation be set in motion to require high school teachers of academic subjects to have college degrees.

This could be accomplished gradually, according to the recommendation, which asks that the percentage of members of the staff teaching academic subjects in any high school who do not hold college degrees shall not exceed 20 per cent in 1925; 15 per cent in 1926; 10 per cent in 1927; 5 per cent in 1928; and that thereafter no certificates to teach academic subjects in a high school be granted to anyone without a college degree.

Small city high schools show a low rating in number of teachers with degrees, according to the statistics submitted. The larger cities where better salaries are paid, claim most of the degree teachers.

Algebra is receiving undue stress in Texas schools, says another section of the report of Dr. Works. It points out that more students study Algebra than study all sciences put together, and he condemns this condition and urges a change be made. The present status is accredited to the influence of the University of Texas, since it requires a large amount of mathematics in its own curriculum.

The natural sciences, chemistry, botany, physics, physiology, and hygiene, geography and nature studies, are of equal value in mental discipline, and of more practical value than algebra, says Dr. Works.

In English the survey finds that formal phases are emphasized to the loss of practical application, and that grammar and composition receive too much attention in comparison with American and English literature. Spanish and Latin receive more attention than literature in the English languages.

Ancient and medieval history are over stressed in Texas, to the great loss of modern and American and Texas history and civics. This should be reversed, according to the recommendations of the report.

THE FIRST PNEUMATIC TIRE

It was John Boyd Dunlop's love for his sickly son that created the first pneumatic tire. The Belfast, Ireland, veterinary surgeon's boy was afflicted with spinal trouble. Tricycle rides were almost his only means of healthful enjoyment. But the bumps of the uneven sidewalks, transmitted through the hard rubber tricycle tires, tired the youngster's infirm back. John Dunlop determined that his boy should not be robbed of the joys of his tricycle. He would create something that would soften the sidewalk shocks.

Out of this tender longing of the father to aid his ailing boy came the first pneumatic tire. The forerunner of the luxurious modern automobile tire was little more than a crude air bag fastened to the tricycle rim with a strip of cloth torn from an old dress belonging to Mrs. Dunlop. That was in 1888.

For all its crudeness the first tire contained the principles that founded the pneumatic tire industry. The basic idea of the inner tube and casing was there, and the commercial organization which took over John Boyd Dunlop's creation, and perfected it through the successive stages of the tricycle, bicycle and down into the era of the modern automobile; that organization now encircles the globe.—Texas Highway Bulletin.

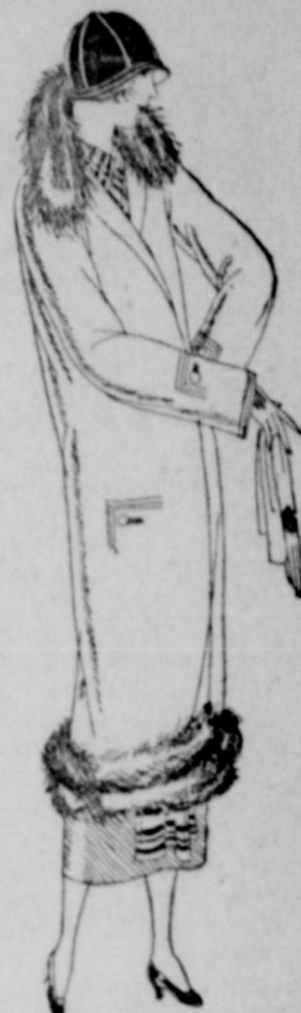

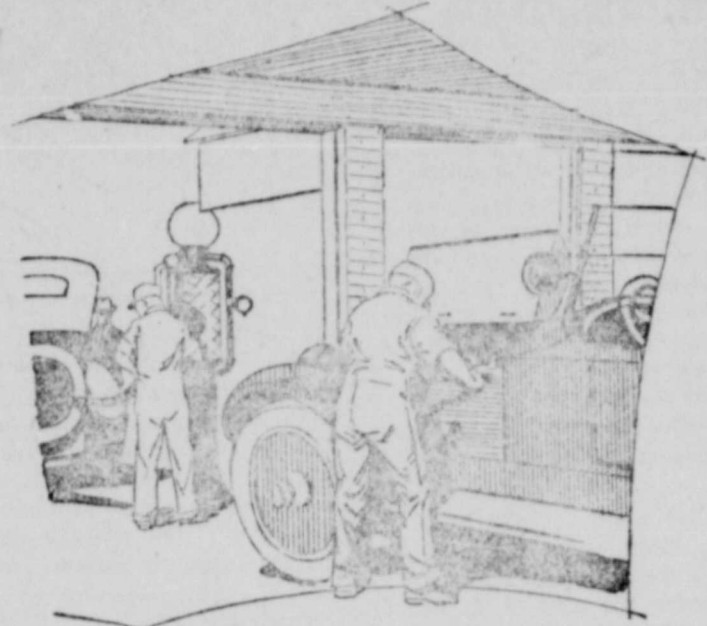

PATRIOTISM IN THE ROUGH

General Calles, president-elect of Mexico, who will assume the reins of government in December, before sailing for Europe gave to New York something of a new vision of the North American republic, bringing home rather pointedly the difference between politicians and patriots. Seemingly the fundamental difference between the rebel and the patriot is the difference between success or failure if we may rely on world judgment from time immemorial, running the gamut from Lenin and Trotsky through our own George Washington and back into the ages. Calles is essentially a patriot—for Mexico. He likes the United States and appreciates its marvelous accomplishments, but he is for Mexico, and he sounded his keynote when he stated as his conviction that "the Indian must not be exploited."
The Indian in Mexico—and he is there by the hundred thousand—works for ten cents a day. Time was

when he worked for three cents a day. Calles, who has much of Indian blood in his veins, worked for three cents a day. He never wore a pair of shoes until he was sixteen years of age. He has passed through the mill of suffering and want. The net of his living—for Calles has lived a red-blooded life—is his election as the head of his nation—and the net for the people will probably be an administration solely for Mexico. Calles plainly means that he will not permit the Mexicans to work for ten cents a day to fill the coffers of Wall Street. If he were an American patriot and not a Mexican patriot, instead of saying the Mexican shall not work from sunrise to sundown and receive only ten cents for his labor, he would probably say the American working man shall not receive fourteen dollars a day and loaf half of his time. A real patriot can do much to make living costs bearable.

BULL MARKETS.
FUTURE TRANSPORTATION.
THE DAWES PLAN.
OF WHAT WOULD YOU THINK?

"Wheat prices jump in wild bull market."
That headline was predicted in this column a long time ago. You read it yesterday and you will read more like it.

"May wheat" sells above \$1.40 in Chicago. One dollar and fifty cent wheat isn't far off. And that is not bad news for Calvin Coolidge.

As for corn, its high price means wealth for farmers lucky enough to raise any, and high cost for the meat that is fed on it.

Steel common above 110, corn worth more than \$1 a bushel on the farm, twenty cents more than that in Chicago; wheat for delivery next May selling at \$1.40, stocks crawling up so that brokers, afraid to buy, rub their eyes saying to themselves "It can't be real." SOMEBODY thinks were is a boom coming.

Lieutenant Donald Phillips flew 1,300 miles from Texas to Ohio. You may say, "That's nothing, everybody does it." But notice the size of his flying machine, called "Alouette," spread of wings 18 feet, total weight including motor, 480 pounds.

That machine does 20 miles on a gallon of gas, goes 105 miles an hour, and could take a traveling man from New York to Chicago in 9 hours across the continent in 30 hours. "Alouette" could be stored on an "upper shelf" of a garage, the earth car below, flying car above.

Next width will be cut from the wings, weight taken from the engine, speed more than doubled. And the individual transportation problem will be solved.

The Dawes plan will have its trial and the world will see what happens.

Germany gets four years to prepare big reparation payments expected to amount to \$650,000,000 annually.

We thought it pretty big when we built the Panama Canal in several years. Germany will pay those that conquered her enough to build three Panama Canals every year, if this plan goes through.

What books would you take to a desert island?

What would you do if you knew you had only one more year to live? What would you do if you had twenty million dollars? Helen Stein, intelligent young secretary of Nathan Straus, replied to that last question, "I'd go crazy."

Those are old questions. Here is a new one, based on the experience of three Italian mountain climbers, that, held by a rope, hung for five hours over a mountain precipice, waiting to be saved.

What would you THINK about hanging for five hours below the edge of a precipice? Would you review your sins and mistakes, vowing better conduct, if spared, or would you just HANG OVER THE PRECIPICE?

We are all hanging over the edge of one steep precipice, called death. A great majority of us "just hang" and think about it very little.

What story of loneliness, despair and, perhaps, jealousy, lies back of a dreadful murder and attempted suicide reported from Lindsey, Ontario? A mother twenty-eight years old, in her husband's absence, erected an improvised gallows, on which she hanged her two children aged seven and eight. She then cut her throat, and was found bleeding to death by her own husband when he returned to their lonely, isolated farm, from "a visit to the city."

After she had hanged the children, the mother dressed them in their best clothes and laid them out. Then she cut her throat. She may get well. The woman said nothing but "they are dead," when her husband questioned her.

Reading about that may by comparison comfort some who think they have serious troubles.

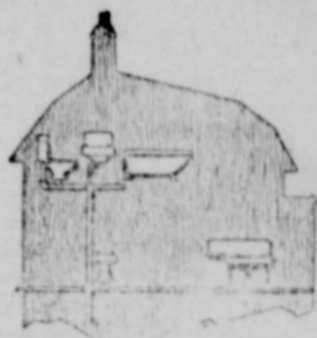

HORSEPOWER

Horsepower or "H. P." is so frequently used that many have been puzzled as to just what it means and how the words were originated.

The originator of the term "horsepower" was a Scotch engineer, James Watt. (1736-1819) who invented the modern condensing steam engine.

He selected a heavy dray horse, a dozen muscular men, and by means of a rope and traces, beginning with four men, added man after man pulling against the horse, until he found that when eight men were pulling they balanced the horse's strength.

Then continuing his experiment he found that a horse could lift, by means of block and tackle, 330 pounds at a rate of 100 feet per minute, which, of course, was the same as lifting 33,000 pounds one foot a minute, or 550 pounds in one second; accordingly he designated his steam engines and sold them on that basis. That is known as mechanical horsepower.

745,940 watts is equivalent in electric units to one mechanical horsepower; in practical calculations the basis of a horsepower, however, is 746 watt, hence a kilowatt (1,000 watts) represents 1.3405 horsepower of mechanical work.

One should keep ever in mind that when an automobile and a human body meet in violent contact, the automobile will emerge the more cheerful of the two.
