CHANGES IN TEXAS LAWS

Specifically the changes in Texas laws, Mr. W. F. Adkins, Texas, writes:—
The land laws, while good at the time they were made have become antiquated. Take the 200-acre homestead law, for instance. It was fine when land was worth \$200 or more an acre. It is very unjust to the creditor and the man who has 200 acres of the poorer sort of land that is worth over \$20 an acre. A man who has 200 acres of poor land is worth \$200 per acre. A voluntary petition in bankruptcy and claim his 200 acres exempted the same as the \$20 per acre.

'statute of limitation' laws are being played into the hands of the landowners. When lands were being sold, the population was small, and it was not so difficult to say that when a man owned land and cultivated and enclosed it, he gave him a limitation title. But now that lands are valuable and the population is so great, that law has been changed not for the benefit of the landowner, but for many others.

Mr. J. T. Barnes, Rt. 4, Colville, Colville County, Texas, writes his views as follows:—
The fault in our rental laws exists in a landlord charging a bonus for doing this year. The great fault I find in tenant farming is the laws, but is in lack of cooperation between landlord and tenant. There is too much contention and I do not blame the landowner for this condition, as I think it is the renter who has caused the trouble. The renter who must make a start to remedy matters. The landlord moves too often. He should stay on one farm and try to raise most of his living. I think most of the landowners will do their part if the renter will do his. Most all renters put in each time going to town to get a piece of land and a small piece of land, and cussing landlords, and hard times. I do not think we need more laws. HARVEY MONTGOMERY LOVETT

Harvey Montgomery Lovett was born at Lineville, Wayne County, Iowa on July 18, 1845 and at the time of his death in this city on November 6, 1924, was over 79 years of age. The deceased was the first white male child born in Wayne County, Iowa. Mr. Lovett made his home in this city with his daughter, Mrs. J. N. Schollenbarger, moving to this city from his farm near Gray in Beaver County. On July 21, 1877, he was united in marriage to Miss Essie Harris, who preceded him to the great beyond a number of years ago. To this union was born seven children, five of whom are living. They are Joseph Lovett of Washington, D. C., Miss Elizabeth of Chicago, Illinois, Jno. H. Lovett, Mrs. J. N. Schollenbarger and Mrs. M. R. Todd, all of this city. He is also survived by two brothers and one sister: T. J. and D. G. Lovett and Mrs. S. E. Saylor, all of Lineville, Iowa.

Mr. Lovett was a college graduate and at one time was actively engaged in the mercantile business, operating a string of five stores. Later he was in the hog business. He left Iowa with his family in 1900, moving to Beaver County where he homesteaded and lived until he moved to this city four years ago. He was a member of the Masonic and Odd Fellow fraternities.

The remains were laid to rest at the Ochiltree cemetery on Thursday afternoon of last week, Rev. W. C. Bryan of Gray having charge of the services. Mr. Lovett had always been a just and upright man, ever a real neighbor and friend to his fellow man. He had lived a long and useful life. BACK TO SCHOOL

Just at this time every business man should make it a part of his business to encourage boys and girls in his community to go back to school "one more year at least."

The school is there for him and the youngster who doesn't take advantage of it is sleeping on his right and will live to rue the day that he decided to leave school to accept a job.

Many surveys have been made in an effort to determine the value of education, and the results have been nothing short of startling.

For instance, in one State, at age fourteen a certain group of boys quit school to go to work. Another group stayed in school four years longer. When all the boys were twenty-five years old, the boys who had been working eleven years were averaging \$688.00 a year and the boys who went to school four years and had been working seven years, were averaging

\$1,550 a year.

At twenty-five the boys who stayed in school four years longer were receiving almost \$900 a year more salary. And, at twenty-five though the group that went to school had worked four years less time, they had received in total salary \$2,250 more than the boys who quit school at 14 to take "a good job."

Again, it has been shown that the time spent in high school is worth \$9.02 a day, minimum, to the student. This has been arrived at over a work-high school and high school graduated men.

"Who's Who in America," issue of 1923-24, recently issued has, the sketches of over 25,000 men and women who have distinguished themselves in America. Over 77 per cent of those listed either finished college or had some time in college after finishing high school.

Without education one in every 161, 290 achieves distinction; eighth grade

education, one in every 40,841; with high school education, one in every 1,606; with college education, one in every 173 achieves distinction.

The man with a college education has more than 900 times the chance of achieving success than the man without education.

All these facts and figures show the dollars and cents value of education. There is another side—the happiness and personal satisfaction side—to education that cannot be estimated by the dollars and cents yardstick. Education is a magic key that opens the door to incalculable realms of happiness and satisfaction.

Some succeed without education, but the odds are against them. Be safe; go back to school.

COMMUNITY INTEREST

Figure as you will, you can't get away from the idea of community interest. We who constitute the local community are intensely dependent on one another. When we buy our merchandise from out-of-town concerns, we take that much business away from local business firms. If enough business is withdrawn from them, they'll eventually have to quit. Then Perryton would shrivel up. Clerks and labors and tradesmen would have to move away. That would directly affect the value of our homes and farms. Then, who would pay the taxes that support our public institutions, build and maintain our streets and roads and pay the interest on public indebtedness already incurred?

Our self-interest, the safety of our property investments demand that we trade at home and support our local business men. If anyone thinks he can refute this argument, I will give a year's subscription to the Ochiltree County Herald for a logical argument in favor of trading with the mail order house.

We the undersigned Jury of Freeholders, citizens of said Ochiltree County, Texas, duly appointed by the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree County, Texas, at its June Term, 1924, to view and establish a first class Road from the points designated below and having been duly sworn as the law directs, hereby give notice that we will, on the 29th day of November, 1924, assemble at beginning of said proposed road and thence proceed to survey, locate view, mark out and establish said road the field notes of said proposed road being as follows, to wit: the S. E. Cor. of Sec. 50 and the S. W. Cor. 39, both of said sections being in Block 11, Ochiltree County, Texas, Thence due south on section lines about 2 1/4 miles to the N. E. Cor. of Sec. 46 and the N. W. Cor. of Sec. 43, running along the east lines of Section 49, 48 and 47, and the west lines of 40, 41 and 42 all in said Blk. 11. Thence due east along section lines to the west line of the corporation limits of the city of Perryton, Texas and running along the south lines of Sec. 42, 25, and 20, and the North lines of Secs. 43, 24 and 21 all in said Blk. 11.

The section lines to be the center of said proposed road. Said road to be a first class 50 foot road.

Thrifty Tips FOR THE HOME

by J. E. CUDDE

This newspaper will publish "Thrifty Hints" in this form at regular intervals. We suggest you clip this column and paste it in your recipe book.

Salt Shaker:—To prevent damp salt corroding the top of salt shakers heat paraffine and spread it inside the top. While the paraffine is cooling open the holes with a toothpick through which the salt will pass easily.

Tiled Floors:—Warm water and soap is the best thing to use in cleaning tiled floors. After drying well with a soft cloth, rub with a cloth which has been dampened with linseed oil. An old piece of silk is better than cotton material.

Boiled Potatoes:—If you want potatoes to look snow white after they have been boiled, try this. Lay a piece of white cloth on top of them, before putting on the lid. You will be pleased with the results.

Bread:—If, instead of greasing your bread after taking it out of the oven, it is greased before baking, it will be much softer.

Grease: To remove automobile grease, tar or any ordinary grease spot soak the material in gasoline and then wash with soap in the usual way.

Mustard:—When mixing mus-

tard add a drop of salad oil. It will greatly improve the taste. It will mix more readily.

Pies:—When baking pies juicy, put a very thin layer of breadcrumbs on the lower crust putting in the fruit. This will keep the juice soaking through.

Lamp Chimneys:—New lamp chimneys in soapy water with the chimney over steam with a cloth. Then rub with which has been sprinkled with kerosene. This will prevent soot from adhering.

Iron Rust: To remove iron rust from the stain and square lemon juice on it. Leave the stain in the sun. If it does not come first time, repeat the treatment.

Pies:—Instead of greasing the pan to prevent pies sticking, carefully with flour. The pie will come out easily without the least trouble.

WHAT THE FARMER NEEDS

Jonathan M. Davis, Governor of Kansas in Kiwanis Magazine.

We find that in January of this year according to the department of agriculture a special survey was made touching 2,339,000 farmers in fifteen wheat and corn growing states, which showed that in 1921 and 1922, 600,000 of them went bankrupt. One hundred eight thousand of these lost their property by foreclosure; 122,000 lost their property by default, and 373,000 though bankrupt, retained physical possession of their property through the leniency of creditors. The statement is made, with seeming authority, that in 1923 more than one million farmers were driven by reason of financial distress, from the farms of the United States. This is practically 100,000 per month. That would mean that about 23 1/4 % of the farmers of the United States met with such financial reverses during 1923 as to make them insolvent. The process seemingly is still going on.

There has been, as a consequence, a great number of bank failures in all of the agricultural states. This has no doubt affected the retail trade and the wholesale trade in every line, and no doubt has had an effect upon the manufacturing activities. As proof of this, I submit a statement taken from the figures compiled by the United States government on the manufacture of farm implements, in 1914 and 1922:

Plows	1,335,104	431,409
Harrow	764,666	264,458
Corn cultivators	378,934	89,633
Mowers	274,521	80,484
One-horse cultivators	254,158	58,619

In going through the entire list of implements used on the farms, it is perceived that something less than one-third as many implements were manufactured in 1922 as were manufactured in 1914, showing directly the effect of the agricultural depression upon this line of manufacturing. This

will certainly come to every other manufacturing and credit business in a greater or smaller degree unless agriculture is restored to prosperity.

The wonder is, in the face of the severe depression that swept over this country in 1921, and which has continued in a more or less acute form since, that general business has held up as well as it has. I am of the opinion that it can not continue to permanently hold up, unless some relief is brought to the farming industry. There have been proposed measures of extended credits, but those remedies have not yet reached the ill and cured them. There are evidences, and we are quite frequently told, that times are getting better. I hope they are. I rejoice as much as anyone in the signs of improvement that are apparent, but as yet no improvement has been made sufficient to relieve entirely the dire situation in which the farmer finds himself.

Numerous efforts have been made in congress to effect a remedy for this situation. No doubt the sponsors of these different measures have been sincere in their desire to aid the agricultural industry, nevertheless nothing has been done to greatly alleviate the trouble. In my opinion, the whole situation can not be remedied by legislation. The return to prosperity of the farmers can be assisted materially by the farmers themselves, mainly through developing a better marketing system, such as is under way in Kansas today. While this marketing system is being developed, if the special privileges that have been extended to the favored few are discontinued, and if taxes through the nation are reduced, if transportation rates are reduced in a measure along with interest rates, I think there need be no fear but what agriculture will readily regain the position it once held, and by so doing, will bring about a more stable and lasting prosperity to every industry.

A careful survey made by the Farm Bureau Federation shows that our present tariff will cost the farmers of the United States annually \$301,000,000 more than it benefits them, and that it will cost all of the people of the country \$4,000,000,000 per year while it yields in revenue to the government less than one-eighth that amount. It should be remembered that the Farm Bureau Federation is composed of men of both political parties, so there can be no charge of partisanship in their statements. If you will take this estimated tariff cost of \$301,000,000 over and above the benefits received, and divide it by 6,500,000, the number of farm families, you will find this tariff costs each farm family almost fifty dollars. There are 165,284 farms in the state of which I am governor. Therefore, Kansas farmers will contribute to big business and greedy manufacturers the sum of \$8,264,300. This is an indirect tax, but it is one that is charged up to our products just as surely as though the tax gatherer had collected it in December. The president says the tariff act "has been productive of an abounding prosperity." Possibly it has brought a measure of prosperity to the privileged few, but certainly not to the people who pay the tariff taxes. A comparison of the net return on capital invested of the three great industries—transportation, manufacture and agriculture—shows that manufactures far outstripped the other two in the percentage of net income. Yet that same industry, highly organized, has demanded and has received at the hands of our government the greatest favor ever granted any industry or interest.

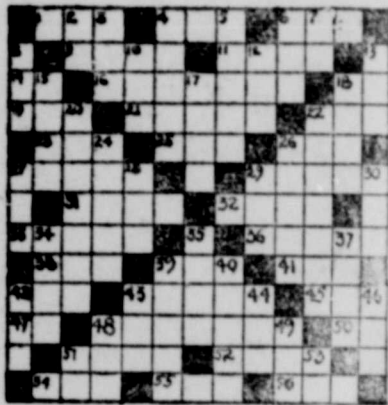
A comparison made of the net income of the three industries shows that transportation enjoyed the second largest percentage of net income. By what right did that highly organized industry demand and receive from our government a so-called guarantee of

6 per cent on the capital invested, and thus provide for the means with which new equipment, some of which is not actually needed, can be purchased and put into use, while the farmers throughout the country are repairing and patching up old machinery to use another year?

These are the phases of the problem that confront us. The problem is primarily a producer's problem. Dependent on the readjustment and restoration that will again place the producer of intrinsic wealth upon the proper plane, is the carrying out of our schemes of progress and development that constitute us a civilized people. It is a problem that to my mind is an analogy to that other problem that confronted the early day patriots when we were first launched among the nations of the world as a separate nation. Then our calculations were made in hundreds and thousands. Now they are made in millions, billions, and even trillions; sums too large for the mind to readily grasp. Yet if we will but remember that principles and ideals are the unchanging things of this world, that the same degree of thrift, economy, application to work and the full realization of the just rights of individuals will bring the same results now as they brought then, we will be able to solve our problem, and to guarantee the perpetuity of our splendid nation and its institutions as a blessed heritage of liberty to our children, the same as it has been to us from our fathers.

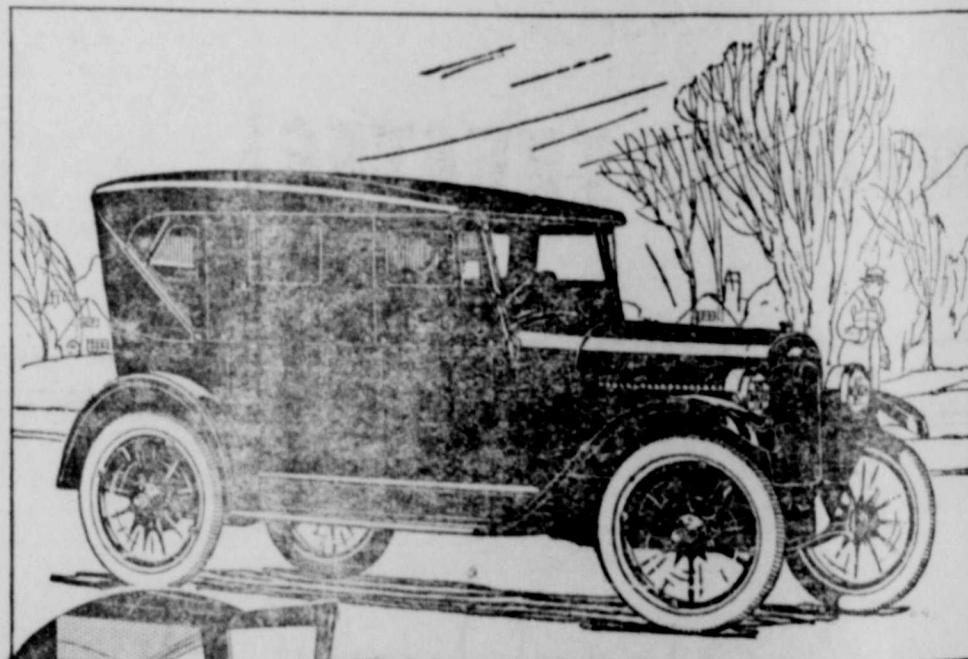

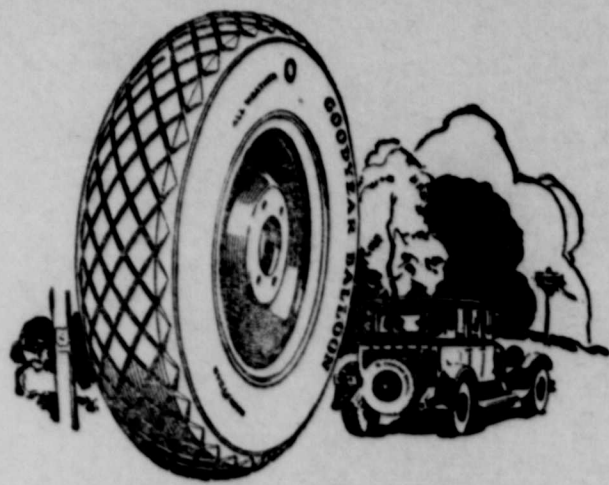

LET'S FORGET IT

The election of 1924 has passed into history. A lot of people are pleased some of them naturally are disappointed. The serious disappointments may be fewer than usual, because this year more than usually the result was pretty thoroughly forecast and even a lot of the politicians who were valiantly proclaiming their coming victory were not so sure down in their own hearts.

But now that the votes are cast and counted there is nothing the country needs quite so much as for the people to forget about politics and get back on the job. Election campaigns constitute a very considerable disturbance to the orderly progress of the country. Money invested in business is a cautious sort of a thing. Its owners want to know what they may expect in the way of laws and working conditions.

Most of us are glad that election day is over, and when we accumulate a little of that lost sleep we are going to get busy on our normal affairs and forget all about politics. Then business will start to improve.

LOYALTY TO THE JOB

Loyalty is the obligation to give the best that is in us. When we are loyal to our business connections we must be every principle for which it stands, with a fidelity which nothing can swerve or deflect, and our loyalty must flow out to every individual who has a part in its activities as well as to all who may be influenced.

WRITE FOR IT

The American Council of Agriculture has prepared a leaflet pointing out the inequality that has been imposed on American agriculture through legislative enactments favoring other lines, and is calling upon farmers and their friends to help remedy it. The Council was created at a conference of national and state agricultural organizations in July at St. Paul, Minnesota.

Its first undertaking is that of continuing the campaign which was waged before the last session of Congress to secure for agriculture the same benefits of the American principle of protection that has been extended to American industry and labor. Candidates for election to Congress are being asked to pledge themselves to "vote for and actively support legislation that will give American agriculture equality with American industry and labor". The circular being distributed by the Council urges that "Men and women alike should actively support candidates, regardless of their party affiliation, who do so commit themselves, and should defeat those

who do not."

The leaflet contains the principal points of two addresses on the agricultural situation. One, by F. W. Murphy, lawyer and farmer of Wheaton Minn., was the key-note address of the St. Paul farm conference. The other was given by George N. Peek, president of the Council, at the Iowa State Fair. These point out what the Council believes must be done before American agriculture can stand upon a sound foundation.

Two maps are used in the leaflet with very graphic effect. One shows how members of the House of Representatives voted on the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill, while the other shows the vote on the tariff bill of 1922. On the latter, agriculture is shown to have stood by the industrial east, but the east failed to stand by agriculture on the farm relief measure.
