

Ochiltree Red Cross War Fund To \$9,239.29

Complete List of All Donors to The 1944 Campaign

In this issue of the Herald will be found a complete report by the Ochiltree County Chapter of the American Red Cross of the donors to the 1944 War Fund. The quota for the county was \$6,800. Collections to date are \$9,239.29, 36 per cent over the goal. The 1944 War Fund of more than nine thousand dollars was subscribed by 658 donors. It is estimated that not more than two-thirds of the family groups or individuals in Ochiltree county gave to the War Fund.

This 36 per cent over-subscription was secured without a single personal call or solicitation, no ballyhoo or pep programs or rallies. Every cent of the more than nine thousand dollars came in strictly free will voluntary gifts.

Subscriptions to the 1944 War Fund will be accepted by Miss Mona Caldwell, chapter treasurer, at the First National Bank.

Binder Twine At 1943 Prices

COLLEGE STATION, April 10.—The price for binder twine this year will continue at 1943 levels, according to information to the A. and M. College Extension Service from the Office of Price Administration. This is made possible because the Defense Supplies Corporation will make the fibers used in producing it available to manufacturers at prices comparable to the cost last year.

Normally binder twine is made from agave fiber (sisal and henequen), but due to a shortage of the regular supply the 1944 twine is being made from a combination of agave and jute fibers. As the only users, the continuance of the 1943 price schedules through 1944 should result in a considerable saving to farmers. OPA estimates that 184,000,000 pounds of binder twine will be used throughout the nation in harvesting this year's small grain and other agricultural crops.

During World War I, when raw fiber and binder twine prices were not controlled, the price of 500-foot twine rose to 24 cents a pound, fab manufacturers' plants. The maximum price for the same length of twine under the present price schedule is 12 1/2 cents a pound when sold to retail dealers in lots of less than 200 bales.

April Bond Quota is Set At \$36,500

The April quota for Series E, F and G bonds for Ochiltree county is \$36,500. Van W. Stewart, Ochiltree County War Finance Chairman, received this information Monday from the state headquarters of the War Finance Committee of Texas.

This amount is the same as the E, F and G quota for March. Reports for the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, as fiscal agents of the U. S. Treasury Department, credits this county with \$28,912.25 in Series E, F and G sales during March.

This is almost ten thousand dollars over the sales as reported last week by this newspaper, following a check of local sales agencies, but it is more than seven thousand dollars short of the quota.

Farm Labor Set-Up for 1944 Outlined

COLLEGE STATION, April 10.—Responsibility for directing the government's farm labor program in Texas during 1944 has been assigned to the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service as a result of recent congressional action.

J. D. Prentiss, acting Extension director, admits the 1944 job is a hard one and says to be successful the program will require the assistance of the public schools, youth groups and many organizations and agencies interested in record-breaking farm production with the least preventable loss and waste.

Within the counties, county agricultural agents will be in charge of the county farm labor program, and they will depend on farmer committees and councils for local policies and adaptations.

Personnel at the state headquarters who will assist with the labor program for the duration of the emergency includes C. Hohn, assistant state agent who will be in charge; John R. Wenzel, who will help direct migratory labor, with D. D. Steele as his assistant; J. W. Potts, who will be in charge of reports and information on the program; and R. E. Callender who will direct youth groups assisting with the labor program affecting prisoners of war.

In 1943, Extension workers in Texas recruited and placed 487,272 workers requested by farmers at a cost of 37 cents per laborer placed.

Poll Taxes Up To 57,257 in 31st District

The 31st senatorial district of 26 Panhandle counties has 57,257 poll taxes compared with 48,634 two years ago. Only Hemphill, Hall and Wheeler counties had decreases in voting strength.

Texas has a voting strength of 1,362,733 compared with 1,141,775 in 1942. Adding 15 per cent to the over and under age exemptions, it is estimated there will be 1,567,143 eligible to vote.

Bexar county has 67,492 polls, Dallas 99,452, Harris 129,454 and Tarrant 55,569.

The 18th congressional district has two more counties, Cottle with 1,837 polls and King with 302, making a total of 59,396. Cottle county lost 20 votes and King county 51 votes.

Ralph Simpson, Co-Op manager, reports nothing other than the tires and one tube stolen, despite the fact that considerable merchandise was stored in the warehouse.

An investigation of the burglary was made by the Sheriff's office and by Sam Port, highway patrolman, but no clue as to the identity of the burglars has been reported as yet.

Over One Inch Of Rain Sunday And Monday

Rain and more rain. The Perryton area received over an inch of rain late Sunday afternoon, Sunday night and Monday afternoon and evening. The total was 1.09 in., so states Judge Jack Allen who maintains the official government weather station in Perryton.

The precipitation Sunday afternoon and night was .96 in. On Monday afternoon and evening .13 in. fell. This brings the total for April to date to 1.46 in.

Prospects for another bumper crop year are exceedingly bright. Wheat and other small grain crops look fine and unless decidedly unfavorable weather conditions prevail, a good crop is almost insured. The April showers are bringing up the grass on the pasture lands. All in all, it looks like the Perryton area will be able to do its part in providing food for victory.

Farmers Can File Income Tax Forms in Dec.

Farmers are the only federal income taxpayers who have the choice of filing their declarations of estimated 1944 tax by April 15 or waiting until December 15. The Bureau of Internal Revenue says. Farmers as defined by the tax laws are those who receive 80 per cent of their income from agriculture.

Before a farmer decides on his choice for a filing date, the Bureau reminds him that if he files by April 15 he can make his income tax payments in four quarterly installments, but if he waits until December 15, he will have to pay the whole year's estimated tax at that time.

Under the pay-as-you-go system farmers are allowed the choice of filing dates because seasonal farming hazards might make it difficult for some farmers to estimate their income and calculate their estimated tax as early as April 15.

For the farmer whose income is fairly steady through the year, the Bureau points out that it may be advantageous to file early and qualify for installment payments. The farmer who chooses the April 15 filing date may figure his tax either by estimating his prospective income for 1944 or by assuming it will be the same as last year. If he bases his tax on last year's income and this year's rates and exemptions and his payments are made on time, he will not be penalized if his statement falls short. Otherwise, a farmer's estimate will draw no penalty unless it is more than 33 one-third per cent short. In any case, April 15 estimates may be amended June 15, September 15 or December 15.

LIBERAL, KANS., Army Air Field, April 10.—Damage estimated at \$62,500 was caused to buildings and utilities at this army air field by a tornado which struck at 6:45 p.m. yesterday, the public relations office reported today.

No injuries to personnel were reported.

Farm Loan Associations Pay Dividends

The group office of the Ochiltree and Lipscomb county Farm Loan Associations has paid dividends as of record on Dec. 31, 1943, as follows:

Ochiltree county: stockholders dividend of five per cent, \$3,327.25; reserve dividend of 25 per cent, \$16,735.00.

Lipscomb county: stockholders dividend, \$1,709.75; reserve dividend, \$8,548.75.

This is a resumption of dividend payments paid regularly until about ten years ago.

Gasoline Transport Truck Overturns

A Schuster & Boren gasoline transport truck overturned Friday morning about two o'clock on the Highway No. 117, two miles west of Perryton. Dick Holderman, the driver, was uninjured, although his clothing was saturated with gasoline.

The truck, loaded with aviation gas, was enroute from Phillips to a Kansas air base.

The truck rolled over on the top, coming to a standstill with the wheels in the air. It was not seriously damaged. A wrecking truck with crane from the Liberal Air Field righted the truck Saturday.

More Sugar for Home Canning

To get canning sugar in addition to the five pounds per person available with sugar stamp 40, application should be made to the local ration board on Form OPA-R-323, which will be furnished upon request by the office of the local board, OPA announces. The entire transaction may be handled by mail, one application serving for all who live at the same address.

In order to make it necessary to send ration books through the mail, the spare stamp 37 from war ration Book Form A is attached to the application form for each person applying.

Families that preserve and can food at home for sale to others may apply to their local boards for a maximum of 250 pounds for this purpose.

Mrs. J. F. Cox recently returned from Wichita and Mulvane, Kans., where she attended funeral services for a mother and son, both former residents of Ochiltree county. They were Mrs. Frank Horton, age 54; and her son, Ralph Everett Horton, age 34. Mrs. Horton died March 27, and the son passed on six days earlier, March 21.

Both died in a Wichita hospital and were buried in Mulvane, with services at the Mulvane Methodist church.

Mrs. Horton had lived at Mulvane since 1933 and her son resided in Wichita.

The Horton family lived in Ochiltree county for many years. They came to this county from Kansas in 1915 and purchased the old J. T. Fryer place, the present site of Lake Fryer and the Ochiltree park. They lived on ranches on and near Wolf Creek until 1933.

Farmers Bid Up Crop Land Price

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Farmers are putting cash on the line in ever-increasing numbers for additional crop lands—and boosting the price at the same time.

The agriculture department said today farm real estate values rose 15 per cent during the year ended March 1 and now are 38 per cent above the 1935-39 average.

Preliminary reports indicate the volume of sales during 1943 was at record levels, surpassing the previous high reached in 1919. The department added that there was a substantial movement of land into "active-farmer ownership."

Evidencing an increase in cash income to farmers was the department's report that more than half of all farm tracts sold during 1943 were for cash while down payments on the balance averaged over more than two-fifths of the purchase price.

Compared with the 1935-39 average, farm real estate values have increased almost three-fifths in the east-south-central states, almost one-half in the east-north-central, and more than two-fifths in the South Atlantic, Mountain and Pacific states. On other divisions, the rise in values ranged from one-third in the west-south-central to one-sixth in New England.

In the principal agricultural areas, the department said the "value-influencing forces" are increasing in strength, while the "value-curbings influences" are weakening. It added that many farms are being re-sold after a short period of ownership, to realize a quick profit.

Emergency Hog Support Program To End April 15

COLLEGE STATION, April 10.—Beginning April 15, support prices on live hogs again will apply only to good and choice barrows and gilts weighing from 200 to 270 pounds, according to information from the War Food Administration to the A. and M. College Extension Service. On that date the WFA will terminate the temporary emergency support program for hogs weighing from 270 to 300 pounds.

On December 23, 1943, the WFA extended the price support program to cover hogs within these weights to encourage orderly marketing and to protect farmers from prevailing heavy discount for swine weighing more than 270 pounds. At the same time WFA stated that extension was a temporary measure and would be terminated when the emergency had ended.

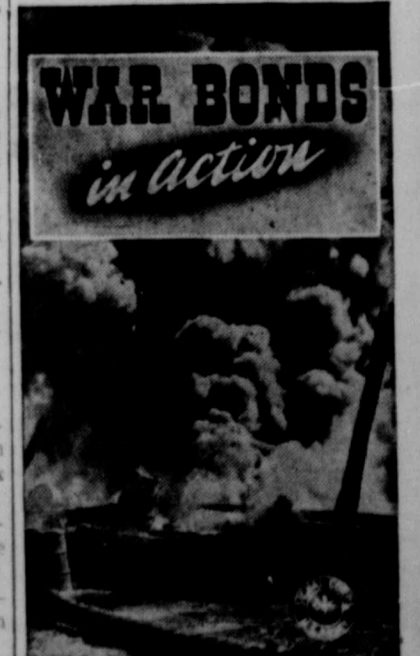

HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB NEWS**County Farm Agent News**

GARDEN

With a little effort and management most families can produce an abundant supply of fresh vegetables for home use during the summer and fall.

Most gardeners will soon have everything planted except warm weather vegetables such as: okra, butter beans, blackeyed peas, and the setting of peppers, egg plant, etc. Inoculation of green and butter beans and blackeyed peas will stimulate early growth and production.

INSECTS

Insects which damage growing garden plants carry on their life's work in different ways. Some dine openly on the leaves and shoots

while others puncture the plant and siphon off the juice. Either approach is bad for the plant but taken in time the bugs can be curbed and the garden crop saved.

Insecticides properly applied will do the job, but to halt the juice-sucking species, they must be hit directly by the poison since there is none that can be absorbed directly by the plant juice without injury to the vegetables or making it unsafe for human food. Fifteenth percent rotenone dust will be available this year for the control of these pests. Local dealers will have a supply of these insecticides.

Start early for the few bugs are easier to control than a large number. Application of poison should be repeated at seven day intervals as long as damage is observed. The poison does not kill the insects' eggs.

The cutworm will probably be the first to give trouble as it usually cuts the plant down just as it shoots from the ground. Cutworms can be controlled by using a poison bait: 1/2 pound bran, 1 1/2 tablespoon paris green, 1 tablespoon syrup, and water to mix. Put this mixture out at night soon after the seeds are planted. The above mixture will cover a plot 100 x 100 feet.

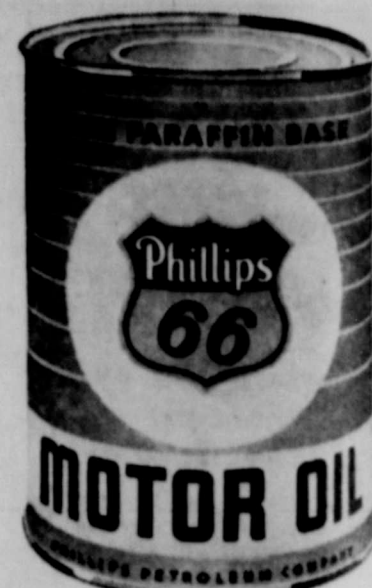

Store Eggs in Freezer Lockers

Eggs tucked away in freezer lockers now during peak production will come in handy for Perryton homemakers when the seasonal decline hits next fall and winter, Roger Q. Meredith, Area Supervisor, WPA Office of Distribution, said today.

Advised by government nutritionists that frozen eggs are easy to handle, store satisfactorily, and require a small amount of storage space, Meredith urged all homemakers with freezer lockers to help relieve congested markets by buying and storing several additional dozen eggs now for future use.

For freezing, eggs are broken. Whites and yolks may be preserved together or separately. In either case the eggs must be fresh and handled under extremely sanitary conditions to assure high quality frozen products. The color of the shell does not indicate the food value. White, brown, or speckled shells are equally satisfactory.

Whole eggs should be beaten lightly before they are placed in the locker. If stored separately, the yolks should be seasoned slightly with a small amount of sugar, corn syrup, honey or two percent glycerin if they are to be used in baked foods, such as cakes and custards. A small quantity of salt should be added if they are to be scrambled or used in other foods which require salt instead of sweetening.

Eggs should be stored in water-tight containers such as jars, cans, or heavily paraffined paper cups, the size of the container depending on family needs. Each container should be properly labeled, indicating date, quantity, amount of seasoning, and whether whole or separated. Under proper refrigeration, eggs will retain high quality for about one year.

The time required for eggs to thaw at room temperature is about 10 minutes and under no circumstances should they be refrozen, he warns.

Navy Fliers Miss Schedule by Only Thirty Seconds

Flying above clouds which hid the ocean nearly all the way, a flight of 12 Navy patrol bombers flew toward their destination—a tiny Atlantic island, 1,250 miles away.

"And we arrived within 30 seconds of the time estimated before our take-off," said Lt. T. D. Martin, USN, of Ashland, Va., describing the trip in an interview in the Navy Department recently. Lt. Martin was illustrating the possibilities of aerial navigation, as taught by Navy instructors.

"Immediately after takeoff we went up to 9,000 feet, above the overcast, which stayed with us nearly all the way," Lieutenant Martin explained.

"The 12 planes kept within sight of each other, and the leading plane gave the others data on position and fuel consumption at regular intervals. All navigation was by celestial methods."

"When we let down through the clouds, we were only 2 miles off course and we landed within 30 seconds of the time we had estimated before starting out."

"Radio bearings from our point of departure and our point of arrival were taken every two hours, but we did not make any course corrections by them. There are many times in the experience of a Navy flier when radio aids are not available, and it's of great value to him to know that he can get where he's going entirely on his own by careful use of the navigation methods he has been taught. It takes just one experience of that kind to make a man 'navigation conscious' if he wasn't that way before."

Naval Flier, Adrift 21 Days, Runs Into School of Whales

Being nudged about in a small rubber life raft by a playful whale was only one of the thrills Lieutenant (jg) George Henry Smith, Navy flier of R. F. D. No. 1, Elmhurst, Ill., had to relate to his companions when he was rescued recently after being adrift twenty-one days.

Attached to a fighter squadron at Guadalcanal, he was forced down at sea when his gasoline supply became exhausted. By careful application of the Navy's safety rules, he landed without injury and quickly placed his emergency equipment in the inflated raft. Lieutenant Smith climbed aboard and settled back to conserve his energy and supplies.

Two days later, in a perfectly calm sea, he heard a roar which sounded like breakers. He discovered he was in the midst of a school of spouting whales. One of the more inquisitive whales edged over to the boat and started pushing it around with his nose. After several minutes the whale apparently tired of the strange sport and slid away—much to the relief of Lieutenant Smith.

Almost as a harbinger of good fortune, an albatross lit on the raft a few days before Lieutenant Smith was rescued. The big bird sat quietly for four hours while the flier stroked its back and talked to it.

"I named him Oscar," Lieutenant Smith said. "He was very tame and would peck my hand lightly as if to offer some consolation for my plight."

Other sea fowls were shot by Lieutenant Smith to provide food. With the grease from the birds he was able to keep his pitot oiled and prevent corrosion by the salt water.

Lieutenant Smith first was sight-

ed by New Zealand patrol bomber which dropped emergency supplies. A storm prevented his immediate rescue. Two days later he was located by a Catalina flying boat. Lt. Smith had high praise for the crewmen, who landed the big plane on the rough sea, took the fighter pilot aboard, and took off without difficulty.
