HUNDREDS DEAD IN ARMENIA QUAKE

INSANE FATHER SLAYS 3 CHILDREN WITH AXE

(By Associated Press)
BROCKTON, Mass., Oct. 23.—James Stoddard, a laborer, battered to death with an axe three of his four children as they slept in a cheerless little third story apartment here early today. The children slain by the insane father were: Mildred, aged seven; Edna, aged eleven; Florence, aged thirteen. Marion, the fourth daughter, and the eldest of the four children, fled to the street, where she was protected and pedestrians passing the scene of the tragedy gave the alarm.

Stoddard is 36 years of age. He has a long police record, having been frequently charged with intoxication and arrested for drinking. Recently charges were filed against him for failing to support his children. The man's mother is said to have died in an insane asylum, and Stoddard himself has been under observation for sanity for several years.

GANGSTER KILLED WITH EXPLOSIVES

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—Premature detonation of explosives in a doorway of a West Side store today, trapped and killed "Three-Fingered Pete" Kosinski, aged 29, a liquor gangster.

Police believe that Kosinski was on a safe-blowing mission and was killed in an attempt to obtain defense funds for Joe Saltis, clique chieftain, who is awaiting trial for murder.

NORTHER WELCOMED IN BALLINGER TODAY

The norther which followed much thunder, lightning and a little rain here early Saturday, was greeted with open arms by the citizens of Ballinger. The first cold spell was not enough for Ballinger citizens as it turned out to be a false alarm and summer weather again prevailed but Saturday's blow was a real one and was welcomed here.

NEGRO WOMEN "CHOC" MAKERS BEFORE COURT

Maud Russell and Johanna Harris, two negro women, were haled before Justice of Peace C. H. Willingham Saturday by members of the sheriff's department, and the judge heard their cases. The women are charged with vagrancy. They were in the possession of 50 bottles of "choc" beer when arrested.

The Russell woman was fined \$12.70 and paid off. The Harris woman became hostile in the judge's office and he ordered her confined in the county jail, after she had proceeded to give the officers a low talking.

Five gallons of the beer in a large bottle was poured out when the women were arrested.

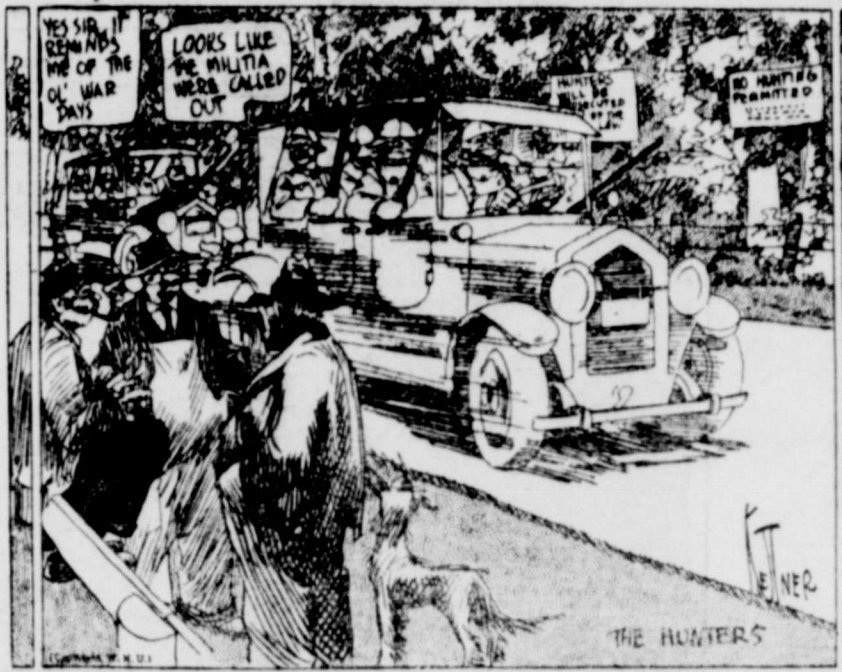
DAN MOODY ILL WITH INFLUENZA

NO EXCUSE FOR MEXICAN KICK

AUSTIN, Oct. 23.—International complications which arose between the United States and Mexico over the killing on September 7th at Raymondville of Tomas Nunez and two of his sons, are expected to be removed when Secretary of State Kellogg receives a formal report from Gov. Ferguson.

The report will show that Nunez and his two sons were American citizens. The report is en route to Washington.

TRAIN HIT CAR; SIX ARE DEAD

KENOSHA, Wis., Oct. 3.—Six persons, the occupants of an automobile, were killed today when their car was struck by a train on the Chicago & North-west Railroad at a street crossing here.

The party of six, all from Kenosha, were on their way for a day's outing. Four of the victims have been partially identified. They were Mrs. Mary Maxim, her five-year-old son; Joe Sinderwich and Frank Yonchevski. The others were a man and a woman who are unidentified.

One body was picked up eight blocks from where the accident occurred.

FIVE INJURED IN TRAIN COLLISION

HOUSTON, Oct. 23.—Five members of train crews were injured, one seriously, when a Gulf Coast Line passenger train ran into an open switch near Bloomington today striking an engine and caboose standing on a siding.

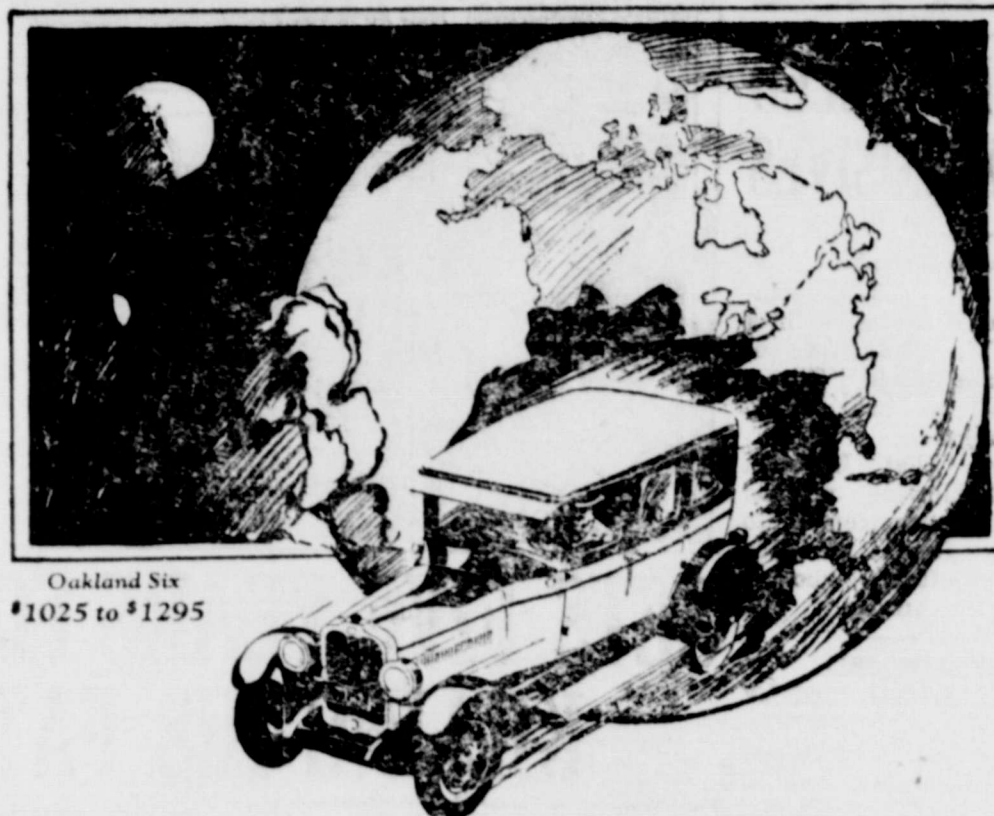
