FREE ENTERPRISE DAY

Just about every day of the year has been set aside
for observance of an event, an institution or a notable
figure in the nation's history. A day of this kind is sched-
uled on the calendar for October 2—an occasion that not
one person in a thousand will note or will be aware of. In
the catalog of "days," October 2 is identified simply as
Free Enterprise Day, whose purpose is: "To show appreciation
of America's Free Enterprise System, by reminding
ourselves of its benefits and pledging its continued support."

We have all heard the term free enterprise, but in the
day of super-government, high taxes, crushing public debt
and detailed regulation of nearly every human activity,
free enterprise has lost much of its meaning. It has ceased
to exist in the pure traditional sense and sadly enough be-
cause of that, basic liberties have been circumscribed to a
far greater extent than most of us realize. In fact, many
writers and commentators shy away from the expression
"free enterprise," because they feel it has become mean-
ingless.

Free enterprise is far from meaningless. It is inseparable
from representative government. Officially, it is de-
fined by Webster as "an economic system in which pri-
mary reliance is placed upon private business operating
in competitive markets to satisfy consumer demands and
to maintain equilibrium in the national economy and in
which government action in this respect is restricted to
protecting the rights of individuals rather than acting as a
direct economic force." Thus, Free Enterprise Day holds
genuine meaning for all of us.

in a government of the people, like the United States, and
it is important for voters to study public issues and make
up their minds about policies for their country. When those
in authority put into effect what they think is the right
approach to solve an issue, it is easy, for critics to

the volume of cat-calls, but whether the critics offer an
alternative that seems to possess a better chance of suc-
cess."

Southern States Industrial Council**LBJ AND THE RIOTS**

Looking back at the disas-
trous Detroit riot, Americans
properly may be dismayed at
President Johnson's highly po-
litical reaction to the disorders.
Whereas the White House in the
past has been quick to send
federal troops into Southern
states at the earliest opportu-
nity, Mr. Johnson delayed and
delayed sending soldiers into
strife-torn Detroit. The delays
persisted despite pleas by Re-
publican Gov. George Romney
of Michigan and the Democratic
mayor of Detroit.

When the troops finally were
dispatched into the city (and
they constituted only a fraction
of the massive force President
Kennedy used to overwhelm
the small town of Oxford, Miss.,
in 1962) he employed a nation-
wide television address to ex-
plain his extreme reluctance to
employ federal troops.

Under the circumstances, this
explanation seemed peculiar. If
there ever was an occasion for
federal assistance, this was it.
The troops were requested by
state and local authorities. The
havoc being committed in De-
troit was equal to what an ex-
ternal enemy of the United
States might achieve in a mas-
sive bombing raid.

Mr. Johnson apparently was
trying to get off the hook with
"civil rights" groups. But the
vast majority of the American
people are not politically-
minded "civil rights" activists.
They are people who expect the
President to assist the states
in upholding law and order. The
only thing Mr. Johnson needed
to say in his television address
was that he intended to prevent
Detroit and other American
cities from being turned into
jungles. There was no valid re-
ason, as The Charlotte News
has said, for the President to react
"half apologetically to each link
in the chain of disaster." The
President of the United States
does not need to explain him-
self to "civil rights" organiza-
tions when American cities are
under siege.

In the aftermath of the riot-
ing, Mr. Johnson has asked the
country to pray for domestic
peace. He also has appointed
an investigative commission to
inquire into the cause of the
riots.

Prayer certainly is in order
as a proper avenue to reconcil-
iation. On the other hand, Amer-
icans cannot overlook the fact
that the liberal clergy is partly
to blame for the disorders now
shaking this nation. In recent
years, hundreds of liberal pri-
ests, ministers and rabbis have
given their endorsement to civil
disobedience and to protest
movements which trample on
municipal and state laws. In
Selma, Ala., there was an inva-
sion of clergymen from the
North. One wonders: where
were these clerical voices of
"conscience" when the rioting
broke out in Detroit and other
cities? How is it that Martin Lu-
ther King didn't invade the
streets of Detroit to call for
non-violence? There is a dis-
tinct smell of hypocrisy in this
situation.

As for the presidential inves-
tigative commission, no doubt
the members, according to their
lights will search for answers.
It would be a mistake, however,
to expect much of the commis-
sion. In general, the members

share the social outlook which
has prevailed in places of pow-
er in the last generation. That
is to say, they believe that up-
lifting of backward people and
the ending of public discipline
problems can be solved by mas-
sive federal expenditures. Thus
it would be very surprising if
the commission came up with
anything but a recommenda-
tion for vast increases in gov-
ernment anti-poverty spending.

Mr. Johnson certainly has in-
dicated his approach to the
riot problem. He has spoken of
the riots in Detroit, Newark
and other cities in such a way
as to employ these tragic situ-
ations as arguments for salvag-
ing his Great Society programs.
In other words, the American
people have been listening to
him hoping to hear a crystal-
clear demand for law and or-
der, and instead have received
a stone in the form of a politi-
cal message for more Big Gov-
ernment spending in metropol-
itan centers.

The ordinary citizen, in the
aftermath of a period of savag-
ery and rampant looting, cer-
tainly knows the score. It is
likely that Mr. Johnson will feel
the sting of a real law and or-
der backlash if he persists in
trying to end street revolution
by bowing to the blackmail of
Negro militants who try to pre-
surrender the country by using fire-
bombs and snipers' bullets.

What Do You Know About Braces? Why does it cost hun-
dreds—sometimes thousands—of dollars to get your child-
ren's teeth straightened? When should braces go on? Why
and when are they necessary?

Check the following statements and see how much you
know about orthodontics.

Only one child in 10
needs braces. The answer is
False. Approximately one
third of all children need
some orthodontic work for
overcrowded, poorly spaced
teeth or jutting or receding
jaws.

Teens are the time for
braces. Not necessarily.
Many teenagers and even
twenties end up with braces
because of dental neglect
in childhood. Early ortho-
dontic measures—such as a
space maintainer on "baby"
teeth—can prevent later
troubles.

Braces can cause tooth
decay. This is only true if
oral cleanliness is neglect-
ed. A well cemented band
actually protects the teeth
it covers; however, patients
must take special pre-
cautions to ensure that no
food particles are retained
by oral appliances. The
American Dental Association
advises brushing three
times a day with a stee-

fluoride toothpaste, such
as Crest, the first to win
their recognition. Fluoridat-
ed toothpastes actually
help prevent cavities by
strengthening the tooth e-
name.

Braces can be used just
at night. Some can. If the
problem is not too serious
your dentist may advise
just wearing an oral ap-
pliance at night.

Orthodontic treatment is
just for kids. Not so. One
in five patients is an adult
and some amazing improve-
ments have been made in
people over 30.

Why are braces so ex-
pensive? Not all of them
are, but each oral appliance
has to be custom made and
sometimes changed as the
mouth changes. Orthodon-
tists usually require a down
payment before they make
the initial appliance, after
that they will usually ar-
range monthly payments to
fit your budget.

day, September 16.

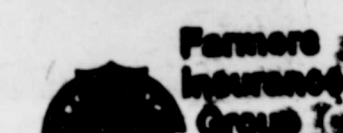
A former resident of Burk-

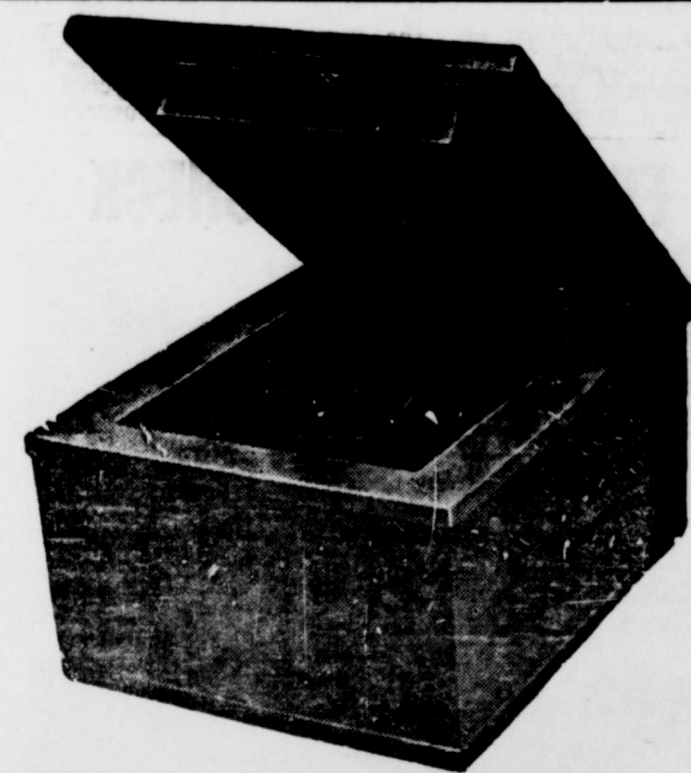

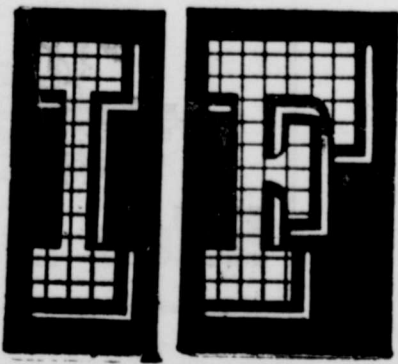

County H-D Agent News

September brings a rash of duties, as every mother knows. And it's time to begin thinking in terms of school clothing for the children again.

Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, has some suggestions that may lighten the work load.

Back-to-school shoppers find more and more items of clothing for both boys and girls made of fabrics which have the permanent or durable press finish, Miss Wirges says. Garments of this finish lighten the work load of the busy homemaker. They are satisfactory if laundered and dried properly with an automatic washer and dryer.

The home demonstration agent suggests taking the youngster along on the shopping trip to be sure the garments fit. Do not buy an item with the idea of letting down the hem or easing out seams. All stitching lines and creases are set permanently and cannot be removed by pressing. Seams and hems can be taken up however.

To simplify clothing problems, Mrs. Floyd Rogers has planned and is building a sewing room to keep all family sewing well organized. It will not only make sewing easier but will provide a place which encourages Mrs. Rogers to use her time to the very best advantage. The sewing room will provide storage, a place for the machine, iron and ironing board, as well as work space.

Leather belts are back on the fashion-go-round for fall, riding high low, and even at the waist.

Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, tells a new belt story of many leather textures. Chief among them are smooth, grained, waxy, harness and suede leathers. Widths, say the Leather Industries of America, vary from the skinniest strip to a fanciful five inches.

A woman can again show off her waistline, circled by one to three-inch leather belts. Grained, waxy or split cowhide styles accessorize a casual costume. The belts are brass-buckled or brightened with coins, studs and even over-sized zippers, running sideways around the waist. Also featured is the cyclist's friend — a leather-and-chain affair with leather minipurse clipped on.

For business wear, Miss Wirges suggests smooth leather, suede, or "hair-on" calf leather belts. The latter is stenciled as leopard, tiger, or zebra. These dress belts may sport nail-heads, leather-covered or gold buckles, bows — or even a watch that actually runs.

For after five, a leather cummerbund may be worn between waist and bosom. Or, leather sash belts, buckled or bowed, give a feminine look.

Col. Strozier Assumes New Duties At Sheppard Technical Training

SHEPPARD AFB, Texas — Col. Buddy A. Strozier assumed duties as executive officer of Sheppard Technical Training Center Friday (Sept. 1).

He came to Sheppard from an assignment with J-3 at Headquarters United States Forces, Japan, a subordinate of the United Command of Pacific Forces (CINPAC).

He went to Japan in July 1964 and worked as assistant chief of staff, J3 Division, Chief of Programs Division and executive officer, special assistant for counterinsurgency and special activities, Organization of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

A native of Cameron, Okla., Colonel Strozier entered the United States Army Air Corps in November 1940 as an aviation cadet. He trained at Randolph and Brooks Fields in Texas, receiving pilot wings and commission as a second lieutenant at Brooks Field in July 1941. He then was assigned to the 71st Pursuit Squadron, 1st Pursuit Group, at Selfridge Field, Mich.

In May 1942, the colonel was assigned duty to assist in organizing the 82nd Fighter Group, and in September 1942 became operations officer of the 96th Fighter Squadron of that group at Glendale Airfield, Calif.

He went overseas with the 96th in October 1942 and stayed with that group until November 1943. He was operations officer in the United Kingdom

and Italy, and as plans officer, Headquarters U.S. Air Forces, Europe (USAFE) in Germany.

When he returned to the United States in August 1954, he became commander of the 479th Air Base Group at George AFB, Calif., where he remained until May 1956. He then became associated with the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps (AFROTC) program. For the next three years he was professor of Air Science at the University of Oklahoma, and subsequently, until June 1961 as assistant commandant, Headquarters Air Force ROTC at Maxwell AFB, Ala. During the latter assignment he was also awarded a master of arts degree in political science from the University of Oklahoma.

Following his service at Maxwell AFB, Colonel Strozier was assigned to duty with the Joint Chiefs of Staff, where he remained until going to Japan in 1964.

Colonel Strozier's decorations include the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with eight Oak Leaf Clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Presidential Unit Citation with one Oak Leaf Cluster, Croix de Guerre with one palm, American Defense Service Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Occupation Medal (Germany), National Defense Service Medal, and the European Theater Medal.

We have several general gardening books, the most complete being the Bush-Brown AMERICA'S GARDEN BOOK. It covers everything — vegetable and herb gardens, orchards and hedges, walls, shrubs, vines, soil, insects, grafting, house plants, patios, even penthouse and roof gardens, and

the pictures are inspirations. You know you can do it. I'm going to buy it for my husband. I know he can. Another good general book is THE ROCKWELL COMPLETE GUIDE TO SUCCESSFUL GARDENING.

While we are considering the general garden picture, let's take a look at the books on landscaping. If you garden you landscape too, or wish you had sometimes. An especially good one, at least as far as pictures and plans are concerned, is THE ART OF HOME LANDSCAPING by Eckbo.

EUDGET LANDSCAPING may be what you are looking for. It is practical, fathomable, and affordable.

There are two books about

perennials, one on tree care, one about rhododendrons and azaleas, books on evergreens, cacti, and iris. THE HOME GARDEN BOOK OF HERBS AND SPICES is unique-part history, garden and cook book. Two books about house plants, one devoted entirely to African violets, and THE JOY OF GERANIUMS are specialties in these plants.

We have small field books on trees and flowers by the prolific Dr. Zim and on the reference shelf the 13 volume NEW ILLUSTRATED ENCYCLOPEDIA OF GARDENING and the large one-volume TAYLOR'S ENCYCLOPEDIA OF GARDENING.

Probably not the least of

your garden problems is insects. We have two comprehensive, rather formidable volumes on insects and Dr. Zim's handy little INSECT PESTS. You can identify with Dr. Zim and control with THE GARDENER'S BUG BOOK or the U.S. Department of Agriculture's yearbook on insects.

But before you spray everything to death, read a chapter or two of Rachel Carson's SILENT SPRING. It is revealing and terrifying and may lead you to read Janet Gillespie's PEACOCK MANURE AND MARIGOLDS, a non-poison guide to a beautiful garden, and Ruth Stout's HOW TO HAVE A GREEN THUMB WITHOUT AN ACHING BACK, both enter-

taining and informative. The no-spraying, no-weeding sounds so easy. Ask me next year how effective mulching is, to the degree advocated by the "green thumb" book. I'm going to try it on a small scale.

If you're a gardening addict you probably have your own garden library, but if you are an amateur, as I am, or need to solve a special problem, use our facilities. Perhaps you can enjoy a garden bonus of watching the brilliant Bullock's orioles systematically working the June corn for worms or a pair of quail bug hunting and weed-seeding in the rows of the fall garden-prettier and easier than DDT.

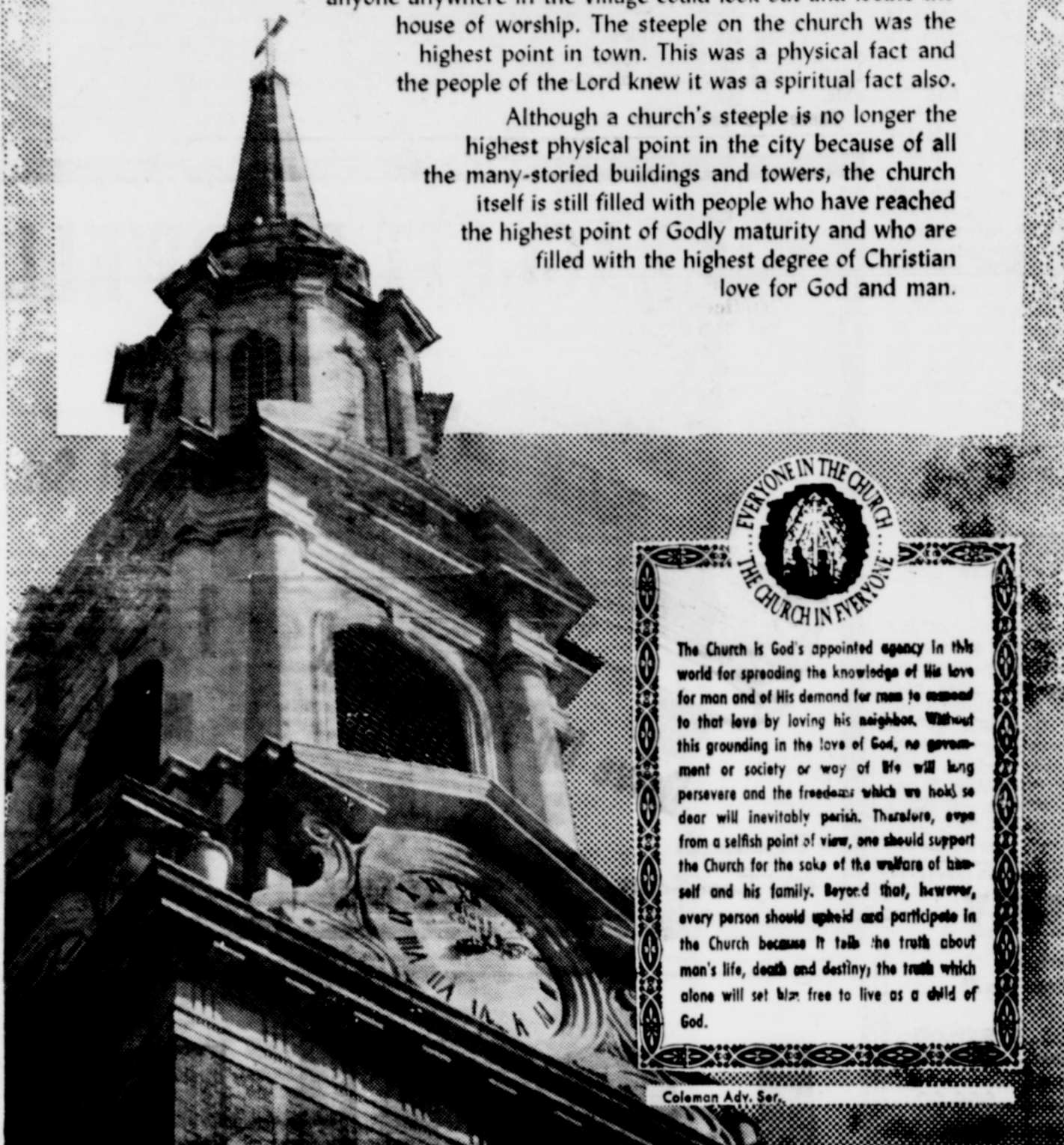

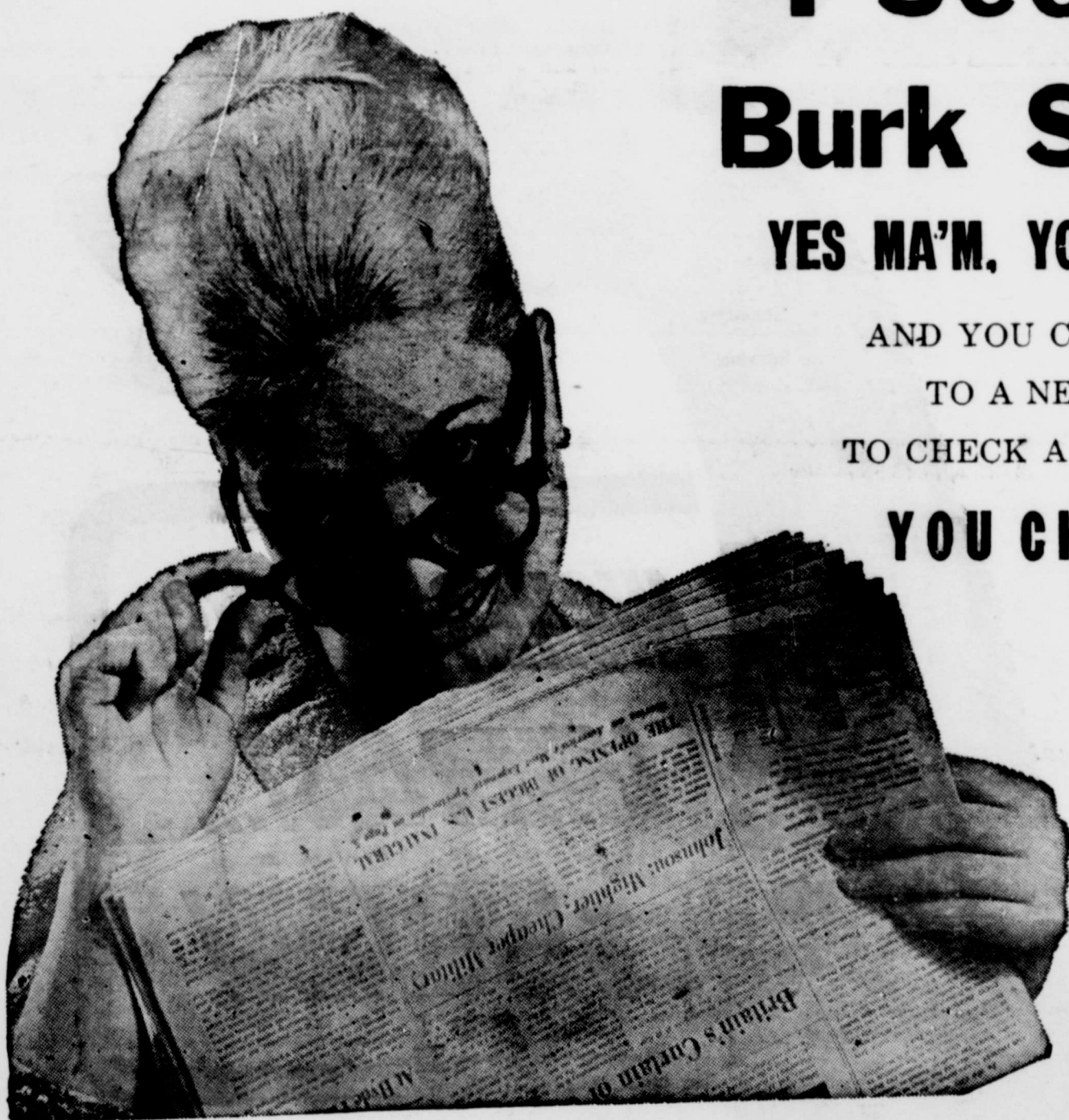
