2 Business Expansions

Additions For Downtown, Freeway



Future Business Site

Turning first shovels of dirt at the future site of Dairy Queen north of Interstate 20 on Highway 208 (to Snyder), are, left to right, Chamber of Commerce president, J. C. Britton, Colorado City Mayor C. C. (Mike) Burt and Aubrey Williams, who will operate the new business. Williams is currently owner of Dairy Frost.

Ground was broken Friday for a new business venture here and plans were revealed for additional enlargement of an already expanding Colorado City industry.

To be built on State Highway 208 (to Snyder) one lot north of Interstate 20, will be a Dairy Queen eating establishment with Aubrey Williams of Colorado City as partner and manager.

Announcing plans for more expansion while still busy with a remodeling and expansion project was M&T Food Service, owned and operated in downtown Colorado City by Jimmy Moody and Leo Thompson.

Moody and Thompson recently started their second year as M&T Food Service after earlier purchasing Ruffin Food Locker. When their new expansion is completed, M&T will occupy one-fourth of a city block cornering on W. First and Oak.

The original 50 by 150 foot building has been completely remodeled, up-dated with newest equipment conforming to State Health Department requirements.

In addition, M&T had purchased on the north facilities of the former Moser Wholesale Produce, converting that 45 by 100 foot building into dry storage area.

The new expansion will be a 28 by 45 foot masonry building between the original plant and the Moser building.

Construction will begin as soon as final approval of building plans by State Health Department.

Williams, who has owned and operated Dairy Frost Drive-In for more than 4 years, turned the first spade of dirt for the new Dairy Queen building with Chamber of Commerce President J. C. Britton and Mayor Mike Burt.

The principal building will be 1800 square feet, 40 by 45, facing east on State Highway 208 with 22 by 40 foot canopy.

Parking area on the 2.64 acre tract will be ample for between 125 and 160 automobiles.

"Our target date for opening is Sept. 1," said Williams, who moved here with his family four years ago from Snyder where he managed a drive-in restaurant.

Williams will be in partnership with Lloyd Eddebetter of Lubbock in the Dairy Queen franchise. Williams will be operator under the Colgen partnership name.

The new eating establishment will provide inside seating for approximately 60 persons, two walk-up service windows on the east front, drive through and service window on the north and traffic circle on the west returning to State 208 on the east.

Initial investment in the new eating facility will be more than \$82,000, according to Williams.

"We believe our plan for inside seating plus the walk-up and drive-through windows will be popular for our customers, both local and traveling," Williams said.

"With our inside seating and self-service walk-up and drive-in windows we will offer a personal contact that is not possible with curb service."

The new Dairy Queen will have an increased menu (compared to the fare at Williams' present Dairy Frost on Hickory), will offer more variety of treats and ice cream products.

"In addition our staff will add more employees," Williams emphasized.

Downtown at M&T Food Service, Thompson and Moody with earlier improvements and expansions have added three employees to their staff.

With construction of the new 28 by 45 unit connecting the original plant and Moser property, M&T will be able to unload all animals off an alley entrance, away from street traffic and public view.

M&T improvements have been to increase kill and processing operations, offer increased and improved services in its wholesale business as well as its custom processing, and to bring standards of cleanliness and sanitation in line with the most stringent federal and state levels.

Among the improvements are: complete remodeling of the plant's kill floor and vaults which allows increase of sanitary kill to 25 animals per day.

New stainless steel smokehouse and chill room beef hangs at an increased height for most sanitary conditions.

New air-conditioning which maintains a constant 50 degrees temperature in the cutting room.

Overhead delivery of carcass to various areas of processing to assure proper sanitation and cleanliness.

In the last year M&T, which has expanded all areas of its processing and wholesale sales, has tripled its slaughter room. See EXPANSION Page 7

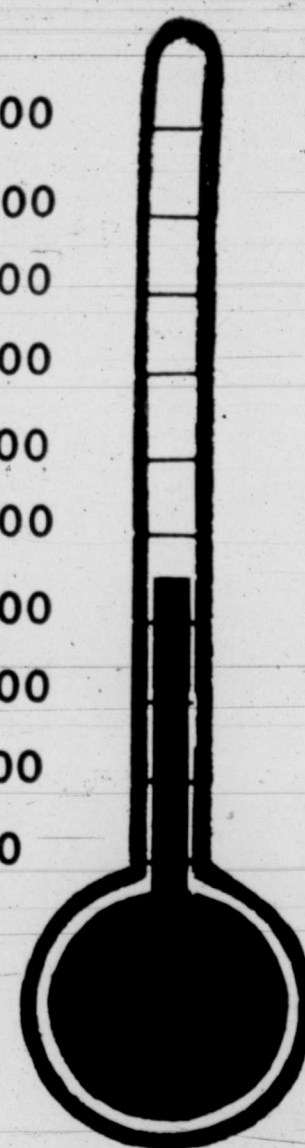
Colorado City chapter ranks second highest in number of state degrees for the immediate area. Brownfield High chapter is first.

12 Say They Weren't Counted

A Chamber of Commerce sponsored effort has revealed already 12 families not counted in the county's recent 1970 U. S. Census.

The campaign to seek out residents within Colorado City and all of Mitchell County missed in the census will continue, according to Chamber of Commerce President J. C. Britton.

"We know our local census crew was efficient and diligent in their assignment," Britton said, "but there can be misses for various reasons and this is the purpose of our efforts

to find those who were left out.

"Want to make sure that every citizen within our community has been counted. It is important to our city and county."

"Maybe there are some who were away from home during the period... or there was a mix-up of some kind and a census questionnaire was not returned. There may be any number of reasons for a family being missed.

"But the important point," Britton emphasized, "is that we want to be sure any of those

who were missed... that they are counted."

Mitchell County is credited with 2,377 drop in population from 1960 in the preliminary 1970 Census report.

This report, which can be corrected before final tabulation, showed Mitchell with 8,879 persons. In 1960, the official count was 11,255.

Colorado City Record and Radio Station KVMC are cooperating with Chamber of Commerce in alerting citizens to the need for being certain no person is missed in the 1970 Census.

Accurate Census is important in business and industrial development, for school and governmental programs and grants in addition to accurate planning and investments by local business, professional and industrial firms.

The Record is printing brief "Are You Counted?" forms for persons who have not been counted, or for persons who know of families not included.

These forms can be delivered to the Chamber of Commerce which will compile an accurate listing to be submitted to the U. S. Census Bureau.

Saw the headline in the Big Spring Herald and got all "shook up". Not THAT again, spoke the heart which lived and ached through the great "Depression" times of the thirties.

Only reason some of us didn't stand on the corner selling apples during that "Depression" was we didn't have the money for investing in a supply of apples. And even if we had, the kids would have devoured the apples before there was time to wash and shine 'em up for sale.

TURNED OUT that Buchwald's new game people play now is called "Depression" because its sole object is to depress other people before they have a chance to depress you.

Then the witty writer listed dozens of depressing statements for people of all ages to use for winning the game of depressing other people.

"Depression" as he used it means to lower the high spirits, to go around killing joy wherever people may find it.

Art Buchwald thinks that nearly everybody goes around playing "Depression" whether they realize it or not.

THINK MAYBE he's right, but right with qualifications. There are exceptions.

This world is full of exceptions. . . people who are brave in the face of personal tragedy. . . people who have faith. . . people who smile greetings even when life is at low tide.

Personally, would have to say that there are more heroes and heroines going their quiet ways than all the cowards you're ever apt to meet.

For every joy - killer going around saying that the world is going to pot, that the kids are turning to pot, and that "The Government is going to the bad" place with all expenses paid, can introduce you to ten people who have that natural talent for looking on the bright side.

DIRECT OPPOSITE of the "Depression" game players are the ones who play "Smile, Darin' You Smile," no matter what.

There may be more "Depression" players in this generation

than there used to be. But we've always had them with us, one way or another.

Remember, anybody: how that old tale about the old woman sitting on a rock at the foot of a mountain used to go?

There was once this old woman, sitting on a rock crying and crying and wringing her hands.

Then a Good Samaritan came along and stopped to ask, "Can I help? Why are you crying out so pitifully?"

And the old woman said, "No body can help. I just can't help thinking about it."

"Thinking about what?" asked the Good Samaritan, gently.

"About what if my three little children had fallen off that high cliff and into the river and

drowned," the old woman sobbed.

"Ah, dear lady, that is terrible news! Did you lose your children, then?" said the Samaritan.

The dear lady stopped wringing her hands and looked at him in anger. "No," she said. "It so happens I never married and never had three little children. But WHAT IF?" Then she cried and cried some more.

ALL HUMAN grief is not that imaginary. Some of it is real. Some of it is worth sitting on a rock and crying about.
