Artesia Teams and Initial Vaccine Shots

Artesia's National Guard unit received a "superior" efficiency rating in the execution of last night's surprise mobilization of guardsmen throughout the nation.

Capt. C.N. Perkins, commander of battery C here, said "90 per cent of the unit's 91 men and four officers were present or accounted for in the first hour after the alert was sounded."

Some 200 others in outlying communities will receive the shots this week, due to the illness this week of Mrs. Naomi Buckout, public health nurse.

The second shot, as recommended by Dr. Jonas Salk, developer of the vaccine, will be administered here in two to four weeks.

George White, co-director of the program, said date for the second shot will depend upon the arrival of more vaccine.

The third shot will not be given until late in November or early December, again due to recommendations by Dr. Salk.

Most of the youngsters getting shots yesterday took them calmly and without fear or violence. Needles were short and sharp. To most of the children "it was no worse than stinging."

Artesians Denounce Colonialism of Chinese Commies

ANDUNG, Indonesia (AP)—The Minister Sir John Kotelawala, Ceylon denounced "Communist colonialism" at the Asian-African conference today. Red China's premier Chou En-lai, obviously alarmed, immediately demanded to make a reply.

Mr. John, appearing before a session of the political conference, demanded that the concept of colonialism, including Communist domination of satellite states in Central and Eastern Europe, be repudiated.

Delegates said that Sir John rebuffed Chou's leap to his feet and demanded that Ceylon's statement be circulated to all delegates of the 29-nation conference so Chou could reply to it tomorrow's committee session.

Earlier debate the committee of Chou express the opinion of peaceful coexistence between systems of different systems was able.

Mr. John, who had already taken part in a proposal made for the conference for creation of an independent Formosa, told delegates that colonialism and the Asian nations should oppose both.

Other attack on colonialism from Prime Minister Saif El Hassan of Yemen, who won the right of Britain to retain her colony of Aden and its adjoining Yemen.

LAS CRUCES (AP)—Nils Vaughn Cottorp, 26, is on his way back to the state penitentiary for passing worthless checks in violation of parole rules.

But for awhile the kicks were good and fast for Cottorp, who police said posed as a member of a Norwegian Delegation to the United Nations and a member of the Norwegian embassy in Mexico City.

For six months he lived with local families, dated local girls, spoke to civic clubs, and took

Within minutes, a pre-arranged plan of contact involving every man in the unit was put into operation. Inside of an hour 83 men had assembled at the armory.

Regular drill activities were carried out following the mustering-in.

Actually, 100 per cent of the Artesia unit was "present or accounted for." Those who weren't on armory premises had called in from out-of-town or out-of-state. This had been approved earlier as an acceptable method of carrying out the plan "in order not to impose undue hardship on guardsmen."

Thieves Found Before Family Misses Loot

An Artesia family got a "pleasant but unpleasant" surprise this morning from local police.

A telephone call from headquarters informed them that their hub caps had been stolen. It was news to the victims.

That was the unpleasant part. The pleasant part was that the police had captured the thieves and found the hub caps.

"That's what I call efficiency," said the lady of the house. "The loot was in hand even before we knew it was gone."

The alert had its lighter side, too. One man showed up explaining breathlessly that he had been at his brother's wedding when the alarm came.

"And the police stopped me when I tried to hurry over here," he said. The man still wore civilian clothes and a big white carnation.

Sgt. Ovel Fleming of Southwest Potash Co. said he was at home, 912 W. Texas, when the call came through. On a hunch, he said he was "mentally prepared for the alert" and made his report in short order.

Cole said he and Mrs. Cole would not be able to go because of his health. He currently is resting at home after a heart attack.

County Purchase Of Bonds Higher

Residents of Eddy county purchased \$53,975 worth of U. S. Savings Bonds, Series E and H, during March, L. B. Feather, North Eddy county chairman, announced today.

In March a year ago the total for those two series was \$48,250 and \$66,256.25 in March, 1953.

State-wide investments in these bonds totaled \$1,195,864.05 last month, \$603.46 less than that of March, 1954, but 51 per cent better than that of March two years ago.

Senate Sends Colorado Bill To House Fight

WASHINGTON (AP)—Carrying resounding Senate approval, the authorization bill for the gigantic upper Colorado Basin project today faced the toughest half of its path in Congress.

The bill cleared the Senate easily late yesterday, 58-23, but its course in the House is rated as extremely hard.

The House reclamation subcommittee has held some hearings on the billion-dollar-plus bill that would affect five states and criticism of the proposed undertaking has been considerably more than that which was developed in Senate hearings.

In addition, it is generally expected that the arguments of conservationist groups which oppose Echo Park Dam one of the key projects in the overall program, will carry more weight among House members than they did in the Senate.

THE dam is projected for construction in Dinosaur National Monument, a federal park area in northwestern Colorado. Its reservoir would partly flood the preserve. Conservationist groups contend this would destroy the monument's scenic beauty and fossil riches.

Another argument used against the dam is that its construction would signal an "invasion" of the national park system for commercial purposes.

Both contentions were argued by Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) yesterday but to little avail. His amendment to strike Echo Park from the bill was defeated, 52-30. He later voted for the bill on its final passage. (Continued on page 4)

Brown Counters Rumors, Names New Assistant

State Democratic chairman Tom Brown of Artesia this morning countered rumors he will resign with the announcement John Joe Wilkinson of Portales has been named his administrative assistant.

Rumors in Albuquerque and Santa Fe declared Brown would resign his post because of ill health.

Brown said he has been ordered by his doctors to get complete rest.

The state Democratic party office in Santa Fe will be reopened by Wilkinson, Brown said. It has been closed since the Artesia Democratic leader became ill during the 1955 legislative session.

Asked if there were any precedence for the Wilkinson appointment, Brown said most chairmen in the past had administrative assistants. He has had none until today.

Wilkinson is Roosevelt county Democratic chairman and a Portales attorney.

Brown is resting at his home southeast of Artesia.

Superintendent Opposes Use Of School Fund for Building

SANTA FE (AP)—The permanent funds of the New Mexico public schools would save them if a crisis developed through falling tax revenues. State School Superintendent Georgia Lusk said today.

Mrs. Lusk referred to yesterday's testimony by Albert K. Nohn, executive director of the New Mexico Taxpayers Assn., before the U. S. House Committee on Education and Labor. Nohn contended New Mexico's school building needs could be solved in New Mexico and said hopes of federal aid advocates vastly had overestimated school construction needs in the state.

It seems to me that this is what Mr. Nohn is advocating in his testimony.

"We already have reports of a falling off of the school tax revenues. If this happens, the income from the permanent school fund will be a lifesaver of our school program."

High Storage Forces Cut To 39 Barrels

SANTA FE (AP)—The New Mexico oil conservation commission today announced a cut of two barrels in the basic unit production allowable for May, from April's 41 barrels to 39.

The total daily overall basic allowable for May was pegged at 262,887 barrels, including 11,000 for new production. This compared with 264,836 in April.

The reduction was made necessary by extremely high amounts of oil in storage. The state of Texas also made a heavy cut in her production allowable this week.

The daily production allowable per unit had been 41 barrels since January. It was 40 in November and December, 39 in October, 38 in September, 39 in August.

R.N. "Dusty" Rhodes, commission engineer who makes production recommendations after industry spokesmen have presented their testimony, said the New Mexico stocks of crude oil are high. Nationally, crude stocks "are virtually out of sight for this season of the year."

He said there are 10 million barrels too much gasoline in stock in this country at present.

"It looks as though we are building up to a tremendous top-heavy situation in the oil business," Rhodes said. "Production in the United States during March exceeded withdrawals from stocks by approximately half a million barrels per day, so the crude market is getting awfully soft and there is a very good possibility that if the present production level continues, the pipeline companies will have to institute pipeline rationing in certain parts of the state."

"THAT, of course, is a rather serious situation, and so the oil conservation commission reacted in the appropriate manner and reduced the allowable."

Gov. John Simms, a commission member who was not present for yesterday's session at which testimony was taken, said he was "not particularly surprised" at the reduction.

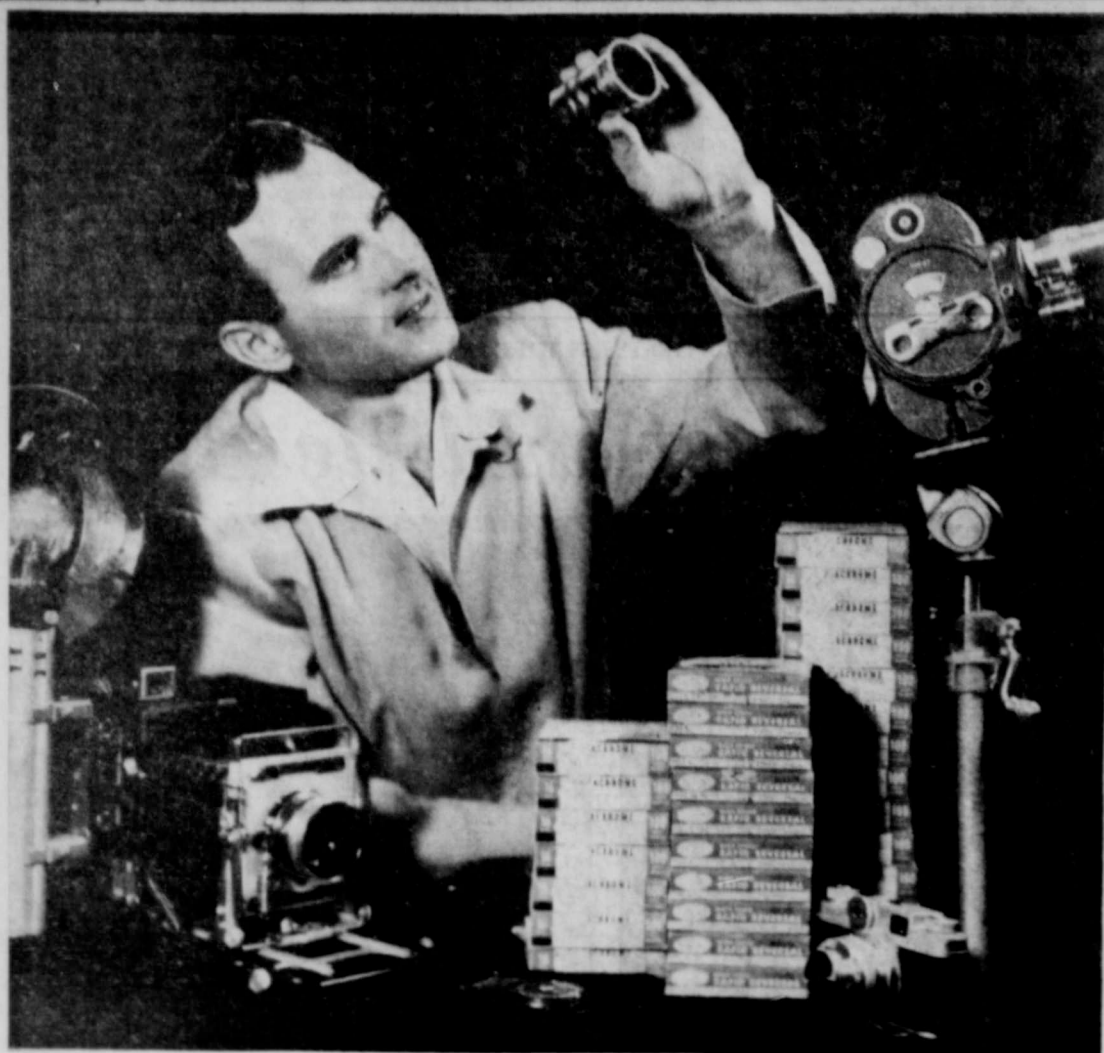
Leaving the comment for the experts, he said he imagined the status of reserves in storage made the cut necessary.

Once Pyle died, leave the campus in January, 1923, he stayed away for 21 years. He loved the university but said he wanted to remember it as he had known it in his youth. He came back only once in his lifetime—to take an honorary degree in 1944. A few months later he was killed by a sniper's bullet on Ie Shima.

BUT today the possibility of the shy, brooding farmboy who became the greatest battle reporter of his generation dominates his old school.

A \$500,000 journalism building has been named in his honor. A plaque commemorating his achievements has been set up by Sigma Delta Chi, national professional journalistic fraternity.

In the lounge of Ernie Pyle Hall are collected a number of mementoes of the correspondent. They include the trenching tool he used to dig his own foxholes, a beat-up dress cap he wore in London, his battered portable typewriter, his medals, and one of the last columns he wrote before his death.

"The students are quite proud of 'the Pyle tradition,'" said John E. Stempel, chairman of the journalism department, who himself was a friend and classmate of Ernie's. "They asked that the building be named after him."

"We still have the desk Ernie used when he was editor of the paper. It is being reglued right now, so it will last for another 30 or 40 years."

A memorial fund of more than \$50,000 raised by newspaper admirers has provided some 60 Ernie Pyle journalism scholarships during the post-war years. Many of them went to war veterans, and Stempel said most of the winners have gone on and done well in newspaperwork.

"Ernie himself had a good academic record while he was in school," he remarked.

Standing before the glass case that holds his typewriter, the same typewriter I had so often seen Ernie beat out his copy on during the war years, I had a haunted

Win Min says that of course most Burmese girls start off with good straight backs, the heritage of their ancestors "who balanced big weights on their heads." But the girls practice their walk just like our New York fashion models do. Says she:

"A beautiful walk is an important asset for a woman. It is the difference between looking like a lady and not."

Win Min who is 5 feet 6, has a charming voice that spills out like the melodious rhythm of a rippling stream.

Smog Greatest Single Lung Cancer Cause

PASADENA (AP)—Smog is the greatest single cause of lung cancer, says a top research scientist in the field of air pollution and its relation to public health.

"Atmospheric pollution holds the answer to lung cancer more than any other single agent," Dr. Paul Kotin, University of Southern California pathologist, declares.

His connecting smog with lung cancer climaxes more than four years of animals under a U. S. public health service grant. Dr. Kotin and his research team conducted the experiments at the USC medical school and the Los Angeles county general hospital.

The scientist said the study showed that smog "has a prolonged accumulative effect" as a tumor inducer.

"We have no concept of the dosage of smog required," he added. "But I feel that the amount encountered during an ordinary day in many cities may be too much."

His experiments have all been with animals subjected to artificially created smog.

The pollutant which is the most important causing the cancer, he explained, is at least one type of hydrocarbon in the oxidized state. Hydrocarbons are found in auto exhausts, industrial emissions, and in gasoline vapors.

His conclusions will be the basis for new experiments aimed at detecting which hydrocarbon is most and what chemical state it is in when it does the damage, he said.

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Crow Shooting Top as Spring Sport Diversion

The outdoors seems to be fun for crows this time of year. And because of this, the outdoors can be even more fun for shotgun operators who have kept their powder dry all winter.

Especially if they like targets fast as teal, elusive as pigeons and, occasionally, at least as smart as the hunters.

The latter qualification is the reason a wing shot — however neutral when first introduced to crow shooting as a sport — is likely to become passionately addicted to it: injured pride.

But this is the time of year the currents of spring inspire crows to give hunters a sporting chance.

In early spring, the crows congregate freely. A drive down muddy country roads of an afternoon will show the prospective hunter patches of woods popular with the crow family for roosting areas. Or he can take to a field at dusk and follow a flight back from its daytime forays.

Crow hunting borrows something from the marsh tactics of the waterfowl specialist. The hunter will do well to build a blind fully as good as his pet duck ambush, for crows have excellent vision.

Then he can set about his decoy layout — a stuffed crow perched on a nearby branch, or even a live crow in a cage. Best of all is a stuffed owl, because crows like to torment owls.

Then the hunter can sneak into the blind. Oldtimers insist that if any crows see the hunters, it's best for the latter to make two or three trips in and out, because while the crows know perfectly well what a hunter is they lose count of how many are going back and forth.

The crow call comes into play here. Experts are as careful with these as with duck calls, and have a long list of special calls to imitate. However, the neophyte may bring the birds with a minimum of practice.

The hunter who waits them out, even as the mallard expert may drop one or two the first time around. Thereafter, the crows may keep right on coming back, but they'll give the kind of twisting, dashing shot that makes skeet look easy.

Unlike the hunter who must feel a little guilty after a day that provided him with a full bag of scarce game, the crow hunter can shoot with a clear conscience. If he hits consistently, every dead raven marauder means that dozens of songbirds, game birds and even small game animals that the crow would destroy thus are saved.

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You Should Make the Decision

Come next September the voters will go to the polls to ballot on several important constitutional proposals but none more important than the one providing for a five-man elected public corporation commission.

The trouble with the proposed constitutional amendment is not that it just provides regulatory powers for this commission but it also provides control over all matters coming under the public service commission and the corporation commission.

The United States government and the 48 state governments have too much control now over private business and private enterprise for the good of this nation and for the good of private industry. We do not believe we want any more.

For some years there has been considerable talk about providing one board or commission to handle matters coming under the two commissions we have now. Perhaps all of this should be handled by one board or commission. Today we have a three-man corporation commission of elected members and a three-member public service commission of appointed members.

We will probably differ as to whether the members should be elected or appointed but there shouldn't be any difference between us concerning the matter of control.

All, we feel sure, are interested in the commission having full regulatory powers over public utilities but we are not in favor of them having control over these utilities.

Today we find that the most active discussions concerning the constitutional amendment are being made by the members of the corporation commission. One of those speaking favors the amendment and the other opposes it.

We believe the decision to be made as to whether we have a five-man elected corporation commission is one to be made by the voters and not to be made by the members of the corporation commission or of the public service commission.

It is a matter for the voters to determine what kind of a government they have and what branches of that government they want set up. It is not a matter of those serving in these offices to tell the voters what they want or what they should have.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The process of winning an Academy Award is a war of nerves, says Edmond O'Brien, who managed to win the war this year.

O'Brien was handed an Oscar a fortnight ago for his performance as the scheming press agent in "The Barefoot Contessa." It's lucky that he's an easy-going Irishman or he might not have made the grade.

In an interview he told me how it all happened. When he arrived in Rome a year ago to play in "Contessa," producer-director, writer Joe Mankiewicz warned him that the role was Oscar bait. Mankiewicz told him the part had a telephone scene, that was a lulu. And he reminded him that it was a telephone scene that won as Oscar for Luise Rainer in "The Great Ziegfeld."

"Study this scene so you know it perfectly," the director said.

O'BRIEN took him at his word. When the time came, he was ready. He did the scene in one take. Ten pages of solid dialogue. The really nervous period started early this year. O'Brien was selected as the best supporting actor of the year by the Hollywood foreign correspondents, trade papers, and other polls.

"This is just the teaser," he told himself. "Naturally I won't win the Oscar."

Then he started getting communications. The first was a wire from the Academy: "As one of the possible nominees, you are requested to be present for the nominations telecast at Ciro's . . ."

So he appeared and happily got his nomination. Then came another series of notices. A message from the Academy requesting that if he should win, would he refrain from using the Oscar for advertising unless the Academy granted permission. A formal invitation. A notice asking him to be one of the presenters of the awards. Another telling him to report for rehearsals the night before the big event.

By the time the actual event arrived, the usually calm O'Brien was in a mild state of shock. He was convinced he would lose and became more so as it appeared that "On the Waterfront" was going to sweep the honors.

When his own name was announced, he was amazed. He had muddled over a number of things to say if he did win, but they all escaped him. He said the first thing that popped into his mind: "This can't be March 30; it must be March 17 (St. Patrick's Day)."

Here in a rich, populous area which includes Tampa, Clearwater, St. Petersburg, Bradenton, and Sarasota, baseball is dead and gone. There is talk of reviving the corpse, but nobody seems to take it very seriously. Ironically, both this city and Clearwater have just dedicated modern new baseball parks which in their appointments equal anything in the major leagues. Yet neither was erected with any real thought of housing a local team. It is probable that neither ever will.

The locker room were constructed to specifications supplied by the clubs which use them for a month in the spring, the Chicago White Sox and the Philadelphia Phils. The distances of the fences were even made to match as closely as possible those in the Sox's and Phil's home parks.

The farm system has, of course, corrected that, and the few independent owners who have survived the tentacles of the big fellows are harassed individuals, working at a terrific disadvantage against the other clubs in their leagues which just now are receiving reinforcements from the mother teams by every bus and train.

Sgt. Dollahite is area chief in Mal-jamar, and had the job of rounding up 10 other men in the area "before he could report in." Some of the men he called, others he had to "run down" in his car.

At that, he arrived in the first 90 minutes of the alert and had all his men present or accounted for. He said he drove about 75 miles "over good and bad roads" to accomplish his mission.

It may be days before reports are in from the 5,600 guard units listed to take part in the big test. But the National Guard Bureau estimated early this morning that 280,000 men were at their battle stations or assembly points within two hours of the zero hour which was known in advance to only a handful of officers.

This turnout represented 8 out of every 10 citizen soldiers who were on the "alarm" lists prepared by the state guard organizations for this first continental-wide mobilization test in peacetime history. Officials stressed that it was a test only, with no cause for alarm.

Some 50,000 of the guard's current total strength of about 400,000 men were excluded from the alert because their units are undergoing reorganization.

Units were advised several weeks ago there would be a test but the date and time remained a closely held secret. Not until about 6 p. m. last night did the Pentagon planners give the word for an alert to start a half-hour later in the East and at staggered times in other time zones.

Prime Minister Runs Turkey As Virtual One-Man Show

By FRED ZUSY
ISTANBUL (AP)—Prime Minister Adnan Menderes is an expert politician who runs Turkey as virtually a one-man show. He is extremely sensitive to criticism.

He explains it's all right for his enemies to say his government is dragging Turkey to the brink of ruin.

"But the law will be invoked against those who say, 'These infamous and treacherous people are dragging the country to ruin,'" he says.

Te means that such name calling will invoke stringent press laws, which he holds necessary to protect the dignity and honor of the nation. A number of editors have gone to jail for various reasons over the last year or two.

Menderes' country has received about two billion postwar dollars from the United States, mostly as military aid. Just now he is en-

gaged in a vast building program; one of the local papers calls him Adnan the Builder.

Since his party swept to power five years ago, Menderes has pushed an unprecedented program of industrialization.

The development program now takes nearly 25 per cent of the government's budget. Turkey is constructing seven big dams and power stations costing from 35 to 50 million dollars each, and improving seven ports at a cost of 10 to 20 millions each.

Roads and grain silos are going in all over the country. The government is building sugar, cement and textile factories, processing plants for meat, fish, wheat, macaroni and canned goods are going up in more than 30 areas. There will be new assembly plants for tractors and trucks.
