WITHDRAWAL OF STATE HIGHWAY AID FROM LUBBOCK COUNTY IS EXPLAINED BY JUDGE ELY, MEMBER OF COMMISSION

The State Highway Commission in no manner asking discriminatory action against Lubbock county in withdrawing temporarily on construction projects and expects to be in position to re-evaluate the county in the very near future to aid in improvement of all main highways according to a dispatch from W. R. Ely, member of the state commission received Saturday in reply to a query as to the attitude of the commission in withdrawing aid.

There is in the banks of this state more than \$15,000,000 of county money waiting to be matched with state and federal aid, the dispatch said, and you can readily see that it would be impossible for this department to carry on new projects to the extent that it would like, and with so much money it will be impossible to meet all the demands made upon the department this year.

Ely Explains Situation Mr. Ely explains that the Federal Department withdrew Federal aid from Texas because maintenance of the highways had fallen below the standard of maintenance required by the department, and that since no Federal aid is yet available, the state department does not now have this money. Announcement was made this past week that the Federal department now has agreed to return to the state, but when the money will be available was not yet disclosed. "As soon as Federal aid can be secured, it will be the purpose of this department, as has often been stated in the news, to all in important cases on our primary system of highways in the state, so that we may have a connected system of roads," Mr. Ely said. "Referring to your inquiry as to our attitude toward Lubbock county, you are advised that your county shall have the same fair treatment as every other county in the state and we hope to be able to soon start construction in your county on our most important roads, along with other projects of a like character in other sections of the state."

It is apparent that the general opinion here, despite statements of a few to the contrary, that the state is not taking an attitude of discrimination against this county, and Mr. Ely's frank statement, according to his friends here, may be accepted as the sentiment of the entire commission.

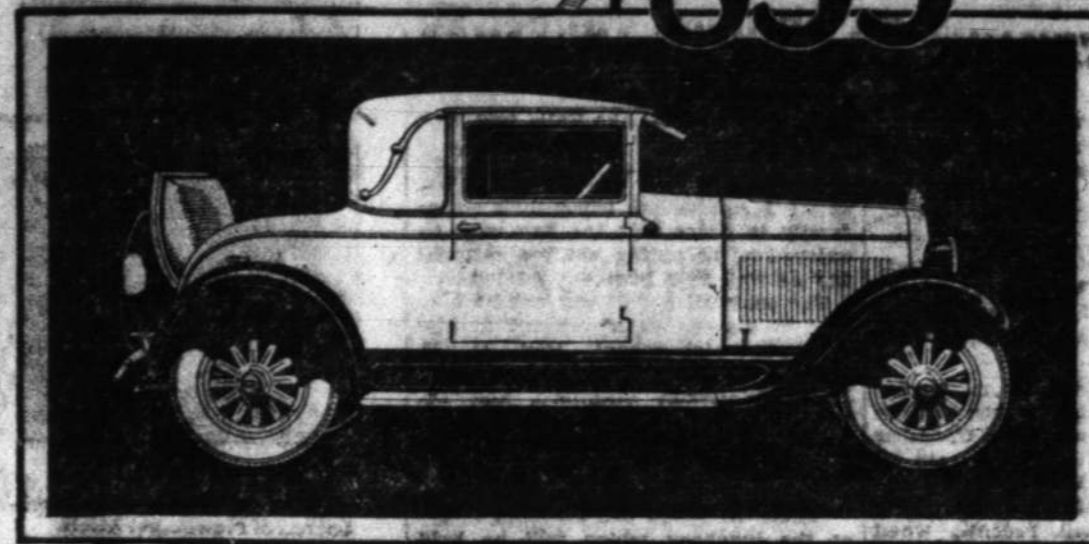

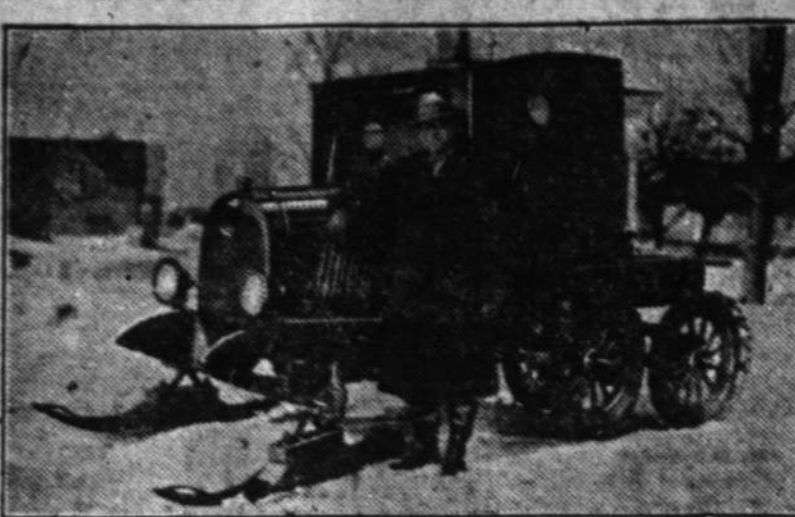

WORLD WAR VETS MAY NOW RECEIVE LOANS ON INSURANCE THROUGH U. S. VETERANS BUREAU; PLANS COMPLETE

Veterans of the world war in this part of the state, who heretofore have been dependent upon banking institutions of the country for loans on their adjusted service compensation insurance policies, are now permitted to file their applications direct to the U. S. Veterans bureau, with the promise that the money will be available within three or four days after filing of the application. Despite the veto by President Coolidge of the bill appropriating an amount believed by congress sufficient to finance what loans are believed probable, plans have been completed by the Veterans bureau to handle the loans.

The American Legion, through its state service officer, who recently was appointed by Governor Moody following passage by the legislature of an act stipulating that such an office should be maintained by the state, and service officers of local posts throughout the state, now is in position to be of much assistance to veterans in this connection, and is daily helping veterans, not only in this particular phase of the aftermath of the war, but in many other ways.

Whitacre Displays Records
Records of Chas. Whitacre, service officer of the Legion post here reveal that loans have been through his office during the past sixty days to the number of 206 for a total amount of \$21,724.30, an average of \$105.50 each. This amount, the larger amount of which has been brought into this city and county, is in turn passed on by the veterans in payment of their bills, and in one instance, when a portion of a loan was followed through various sources, it was found that it had paid no less than six bills, satisfying as many creditors in passing through the various hands.

Many Loans Handled
In addition to city and Lubbock county veterans, loans have been handled here for veterans from all portions of this section of the state, with an occasional application for ex-service men from Oklahoma and Colorado. One was received from a disabled vet in Wyoming, who is now in a hospital there.

While Legion officials and other interested citizens are discouraging as far as possible, the veteran in securing the loan, the greater number of applicants are those men who are actually in need of money, records disclose, and according to Legion officials, the organization, having in a large measure been instrumental in bringing about the loan feature, feels that it is in a way responsible for continuation of the service.

The loans must be handled through a service officer of the Legion, or the postmaster at any point in the state, and postmasters, in the opinion of John E. Vaughan, postmaster here, feel that the Legion official is in a better position to help the veteran than himself. For this reason, Mr. Vaughan has asked that the Legion official here handle the matter.

Orders Effective Friday
The order transferring loan accounts from banks to the Veterans Bureau became effective April 1, last Friday, and all accounts henceforth will be handled through the bureau, it was said. The rate of interest on loans that will be charged will be approximately the same as that required of them. The rate will be two per cent more than the discount rate of the Federal Reserve bank in the district in which the loan is made. Loans are available under the present plan only to the veteran himself whose name is on the certificate, and may be redeemed at any time on or before maturity date by payment of interest to the date of redemption.

CANYON MAKES WAR ON HOT CHECK WRITERS

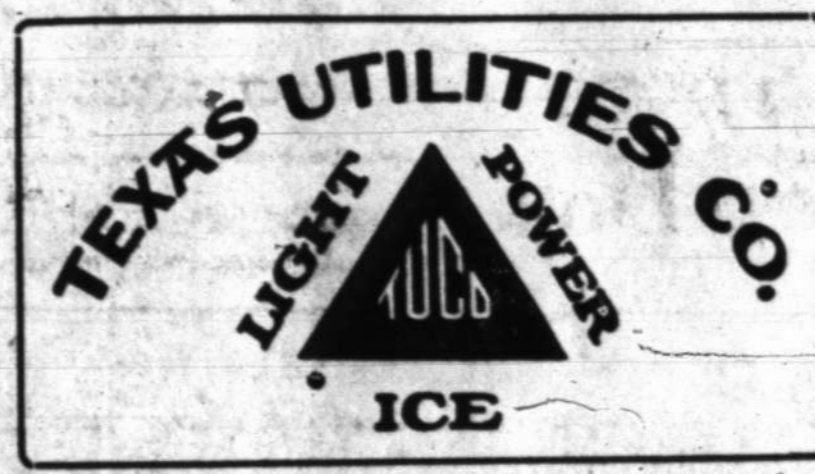
