County Wide School Elections to be Held Saturday

Voters Will Name Three Aldermen in City Election April 6

Three County School Trustees And Board Members from All School Districts to be Named

Men in Race; Two for Election

Voters of Perryton will elect city aldermen in the city election to be held Tuesday, April 6. The men have entered the race, including two of the city council who have announced for re-election.

The candidates are Otis Burk, R. B. Orrill, Alton Boxwell and Debs Riley. Boxwell and Riley are seeking re-election.

Major Rufus Boierjack, city clerk, Milam Cudd, alderman, and Holt and Giltner LaMas are another year to serve in office. Sam Hergert, term expires this year, is a candidate for re-election.

City officials are J. N. Conley, presiding judge, J. R. Thomas, Mrs. E. W. Thomas, Maybelle Lawrence and George Rupprecht, clerks.

The first attempt at an office for two of the candidates, Burk and Todd, Burk is president of the Chamber of Commerce last year, is a World War I veteran, owner of Burk Drug, former Ranger and Perryton school man.

Owner of the Todd Produce quite active in the Jaycees and general chairman for the year celebration this year.

Geo. Jackson In Race for Commissioner

Friends of George B. Jackson, present county commissioner from precinct No. 4, have authorized the Herald to announce his candidacy for re-election to that office, subject to the action of the voters in the Democratic Primary next July.

Commissioner Jackson has been serving on the commission since 1940. He was elected to his office in 1939 and took office on January 1, 1940. He was returned to the office in 1942, 1944 and 1946, and is now serving his eighth year. He also served as commissioner for his precinct many years ago.

One of the earliest pioneers of Ochiltree county, George Jackson needs no introduction to the voters, especially in precinct No. 4. He came to this country with his parents when but a small boy over 60 years ago. He has spent his entire life here and is engaged in farming and ranching on Wolf Creek, in the vicinity of where his parents settled among the then few white families in the area.

That he has ably conducted the business of his precinct is shown by the backing of his friends who have kept him in office for the past eight years and have announced him for another term.

Retail Training Clinic Planned For Perryton

Another retail training clinic, similar to the very successful one held in 1946, is being planned for Perryton by the Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce. The dates have not been set, but the clinic will be held in April, either on April 9 or April 16, it is reported.

Miss Gertrude Prince, who conducted the school before in Perryton, will conduct this one. The clinic is designed as an aid to retail sales people and consists of three courses. The first one is "Selling Today," a course for all sales people. The second course is "How to Train an Employee," which helps store owners and managers. The third one is "How to Supervise Employees," a course which sets forth the methods used in employee supervision.

Baummann Will Have Storage Vault for Furs

Workmen started this week on an expansion program at the Baummann Cleaners which will double the floor space of the firm, and which will afford patrons of the Perryton area a complete fur storage service.

The fur storage vault is being rushed to completion, stated Lester Baummann, owner, and it is expected to be ready for use by May 15. All of the special equipment is due this week, and the concrete will be poured within the next few days.

This vault, which has a capacity of 1,300 coats will be used only for fur storage, but for fine woolen clothes and blankets. The vault will be of concrete and steel construction, insulated, fireproof, refrigerated, dustproof, mothproof, with a carefully controlled humidity. It will be 18 by 25 feet and located immediately behind the present plant.

For extra safety, it will have a 4-hour Mosler heavy steel safe door.

When the vault is completed, work will start on the expansion of the present plant. The building will be extended 13 feet to the north and extended all the way back to the alley, making a building 38 by 140 feet. The interior will be remodeled, with the addition of a large customers' lobby, attractively finished office, additional storage racks, and much more floor space for the equipment.

The county service office will be open each day from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., stated Davis, and veterans of any war are invited to use the facilities of this office for any problem they may have regarding disability benefits, hospitalization, GI insurance, educational benefits or any of the other problems.

Pre-School Health Round-Up to Be Held Wednesday, April 7

A Health Round-Up for pre-school children of the Perryton area will be held in the Perryton school auditorium on Wednesday, April 7, Mrs. Virb Conley, chairman of the PTA health committee, has announced.

This clinic, similar to the one held last fall for all school children, is designed to secure a physical check-up for those children that will enter school next fall.

The Round-Up is sponsored by the Perryton Parent-Teachers Association, in cooperation with local doctors and dentists.

Parents of these pre-school children are requested to bring their children to the school at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, and the examinations will last until 11 o'clock. There is no charge for the examinations, as the professional services of the doctors and dentists are being contributed as a public service.

Blue Cross Enrollment Takes In 311 Families, 813 Persons

The community Blue Cross enrollment ended Saturday afternoon with results surprising to almost everyone concerned. The rush began Saturday morning, after moderate enrollments during the week, and at closing time Saturday, a number of persons had to be turned away in order to close the C. of C. office by six o'clock.

A total of 311 families, covering hospital benefits to 813 persons, was enrolled during this week. This figure includes 143 individual enrollments and 166 group enrollments.

A large percentage of the groups that enrolled took out the Blue Shield plan, companion plan to the Blue Cross. There were 77 of these, covering 273 persons.

Jack Payne of the Stewart Printing Co., enrolled the largest group, with 9 children and the parents, making a total of 11 persons covered by his Blue Cross plan.

The largest group enrolled was the 13 county officials and employees. The teachers in the Perryton schools, 24 of them, have the largest group in the county, but they were enrolled before this community enrollment.

Other firms whose employees have enrolled in the Blue Cross plan are Perryton Furniture Co., Woolwine's, Perryton National Bank, First National Bank, Sanford Drug Triple Supply, Stewart Printing Co., Daley Glass Shop, City of Perryton, Burk Drug, Boxwell Bros., Farm Bureau, Perryton Lumber Co., Foote Truck and Tractor Co., Ellis Grain, Bob Schuster Pontiac, Kent and Apple, McGibbon Motor Co., and Southwestern Associated Telephone Co.

The community enrollment is now closed and Blue Cross will not be offered to individuals again until the advisory council decides to hold another enrollment, not sooner than six months.

However, a firm employing five or more may join the Blue Cross at any time.

There were a number of people from surrounding counties in Perryton last Friday and Saturday, inquiring about Blue Cross and how they might join. A group from Gruver, led by Rev. Charles Fike, minister of the Gruver Methodist church, seemed especially interested.

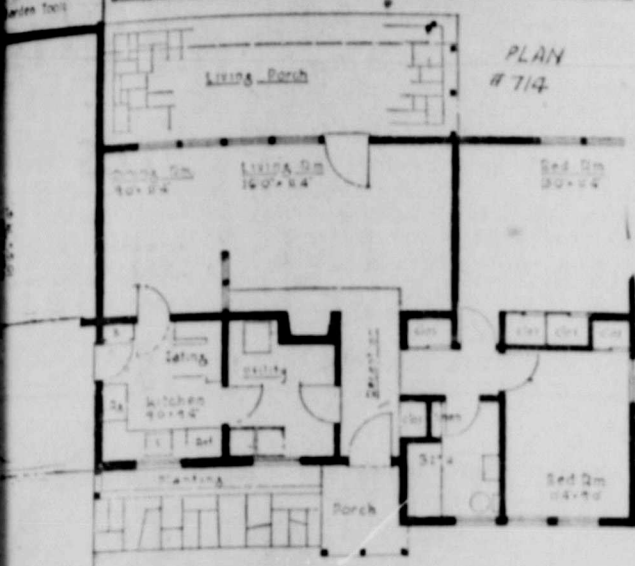

Rangers to Hold Football Camp in Oklahoma Park

The Ranger football team will hold a fall training camp in Craterville Park, near Cache, Oklahoma. It was announced this week, after the Perryton school board approved of the camp.

The camp is expected to start around August 15, and will last approximately two weeks. The park is about 239 miles from Perryton, in the vicinity of Lawton, Okla. Coaches Floyd Murry and Lewis Emerick have inspected the camp facilities, and state that everything is there that is needed for serious training.

Craterville Park is used annually by a number of football teams, and the Vernon squad will be there at the same time as the Rangers this year, affording a chance at scrimmages.

The boys will be housed in Army barracks, there are ample football practice grounds, and a swimming pool is available. Proceeds from the annual intramural boxing tournament will be used to defray the cost of this camp, the first out-of-town training for the Rangers in several years.

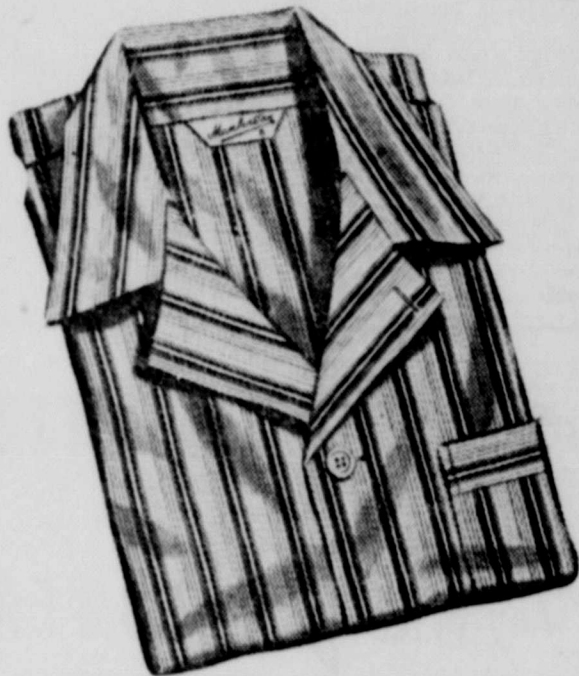

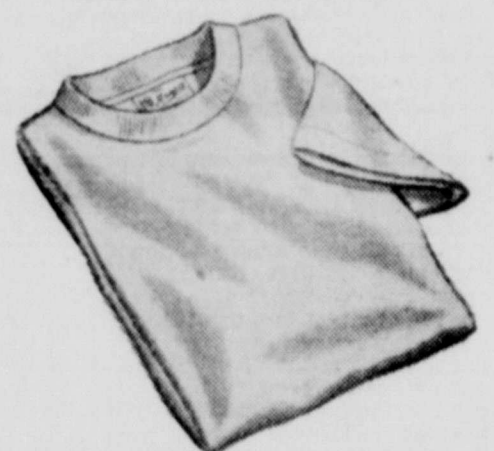

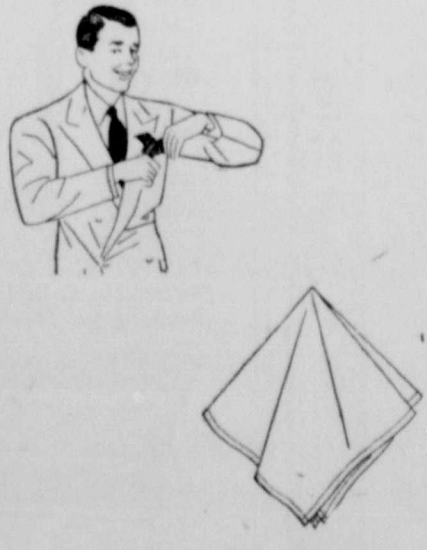

Measles is considered a "childhood disease," but people in any age group may catch it. Children are most often its victims because most adults have had it in childhood and acquired a lasting immunity with that first attack. However, there are other diseases that greatly resemble measles. They are sometimes confused with measles and in the case of German measles, even have in part the same name. But they are caused by different viruses and do not produce immunity to measles and measles does not produce immunity to them. Mistaking one of these other diseases for measles is the chief reason for so-called "second attacks" of measles.

Washington Better

WASHINGTON—Because of 12 years' work by a bachelor, millions of school children get a hot noonday meal and milk for a dime or less every school day.

Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.) saw his hopes realized with the passage of the National School Lunch Act in 1946. Under the act the states are assisted through federal grants-in-aid and other means in operating non-profit school lunch programs.

This year Congress appropriated \$65,000,000 for this purpose. Later Senator Russell asked for a \$6,000,000 deficiency appropriation. He got \$5,000,000.

Despite rising food costs, this amount is less by \$11,000,000 than the sum appropriated for the last school year.

Advocates of the school lunch program say children getting

better meals today grow up to be better citizens tomorrow. They develop good food habits which carry them through later years.

There were 50,000 schools participating last year. States have primary responsibility for developing their own programs. For every dollar of federal funds allotted, the law requires the state to spend a dollar. In matching the grants, food and labor supplied by the schools may be counted. Some states in which the average income is lower than the national average also pay less than the federal share.

Senator Russell has spent so much of his life in public service that one of his secretaries says he's "never had time to do any courting."

Born 50 years ago in Winder, Ga., he is one of 13 children and the eldest son of the late chief

justice of Georgia. He was 15 years in the Georgia senate, speaker of the state house of representatives four years and Governor of the state from June 1931 to January 1933.

He was elected to the U. S. Senate Nov. 8, 1932, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Sen. William J. Harris. He took his seat Jan. 12, 1933, after the expiration of his term as governor.

During 1943 he was appointed chairman of a congressional committee to visit World War II battlefronts. The trip took nine weeks and covered some 47,000 miles.

Currently he is leading southern Democrats in the fight against President Truman's civil rights proposals.

Charming, gentle and full of humor, he is much liked by children, especially by his 32 nieces and nephews.

In Washington he divides his

time between his hotel apartment and the home of a sister. Though he is in demand for many social functions, he avoids big dinner parties, settling for a meal of scrambled eggs.

Measles

Because measles is so common among children, many of us regard it too lightly. Some of us even joke about it and tease the young patient about his spotty complexion. Unaware that measles frequently results in serious complications, many mothers purposely expose their children to it to "get it over with."

Measles is rarely a direct cause of death, it is true. The healthy child usually recovers easily and quickly from measles and rarely suffers serious complications, but the disease is a particularly serious threat to children under five years of age.

An attack of measles can weaken the patient, especially a young child, to such an extent that he is easy prey for pneumonia, serious infections of the ear and other grave complications. So mothers should take every precaution to protect children of pre-school age against the disease, rather than deliberately expose them. If an older child in the household contracts measles, it is wise to ask the doctor what measures might be taken to protect other members of the family. He may advise inoculation, particularly of a baby or delicate child in the family.

Measles, one of the most easily spread of all diseases, is caused by a virus. Its early symptoms are similar to those of a cold: red, watery eyes, running nose, sneezing and fever. It is in this early stage that measles is most contagious. The characteristic rash usually does not appear until about four days after these first signs. Therefore, it is a mistake to put off precautionary and protective measures until the rash appears.

At the slightest suspicion of measles, the patient should be put to bed in a well-ventilated room, away from other members of the family and visitors who might bring into the room other germs to complicate his illness. The doctor should be called immediately.

another dangerous practice. It is
important to remember that the
law requires labels to be attach-
ed to drugs and medicines in or-
der to protect the public.

Dr. Cox urges people to follow
the simple rule of reading the la-
bel before using anything from a
carton or bottle, either as food or
as medicine. In brief, his advice
to the public is: "Be sure you
know what you are taking, and
when in doubt—DON'T TAKE
IT."

Ancient Art of Spading Gets Modern Science O. K.



Drive spade straight down to get maximum depth.

Gardening begins with turning
over the soil. This ancient practice,
dating from prehistoric times, has
been attacked by critics like most
traditional methods in agriculture.
But recent scientific tests have
proved again that spading in gar-
dens, and plowing for larger areas,
are the best methods of condition-
ing soil for planting.

Depth of spading has long been
a subject for debate. English garden-
ers, with the experience of cen-
turies behind them, are strong for
"trenching," which means turning
over the soil two spade lengths
deep. Since the standard garden
spade has a blade twelve inches
long, this loosens the soil to a depth
of two feet.

For roses, perennials, and some
annual crops, private gardeners in
this country often practice trench-
ing. It is a good way to prepare a
perennial bed, where the plants
are to grow for several years with-
out disturbance.

But for vegetables, and annual
flowers, trenching seems to be not
necessary. Turning the soil to a
depth of twelve inches is sufficient.
By the time you have turned over
a hundred square feet, on the first
warm day of spring, you will be in-
clined to settle on that basis.

Spading, in fact, can be over-
done, especially that first day.
When muscles are soft after a win-
ter's rest, they must be broken in
with caution. It is important, how-

ever, that you do not skimp on the
depth of spading. Drive the spade
straight down, never at an angle,
so that you get the full advantage
of its 12-inch blade. If you want to
take it easy, and it is advisable that
you do, limit the area that you
spade each day, rather than lessen-
ing the depth to which you dig.

One hour's work a day for eight
days will turn over to spade depth
1,500 square feet, and leave its
owner without even sore muscles.

Spading loosens the soil, lets air
into it, and leaves it in the best
condition for both water and air
to enter. Spading also can be used
to mix with the soil coarse mate-
rials which will improve its condi-
tion. Good soil, Ohio State experi-
ments showed, is composed of 25
per cent "pores," containing air,
25 per cent "pores" containing wa-
ter, and 50 per cent solid matter.

Heavy clay soil has particles so
fine that there are not enough
"pores" in it. But it can be made
good by mixing one inch of fine
cinders or very coarse sand, an
inch of manure or a substitute such
as compost or peat moss, to four
inches of clay soil. This will give
an idea of the quantity of coarse
material needed to loosen heavy
garden soil. Spread it evenly over
the garden, and try to mix it evenly
with the soil, so that it will cre-
ate "pores" all through it, and
thus improve aeration and also wa-
ter retention.

Fabulous Bookworms in India Will Die

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—India's
archeological department has
ordered from the United States
a modern 300 cubic foot gas cham-
ber to kill India's bookworms.

The prowess of Indian bookworms
has become legendary. They can eat
everything under the sun except cast
iron, it used to be said jocularly. They
have scant respect for devices that
kill their fellow animals. They are
known to thrive on deadly aconite,
arid wormwood and aromatic carda-
mom.

Laziness is not in the dictio-
nary of the Indian bookworm. When
it is not eating, it is reproducing.
One female worm lays annually
nearly one million eggs which take
about five days to hatch.

Veteran Enrollment Drops at Texas U.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Spring semester
registration at the University of
Texas is 16,220, a decrease of 573
from the 1947 Spring semester
enrollment. There are 323 fewer
men and 250 fewer girls register-
ed this semester than last year.
Veteran enrollment fell from 10,
641 to 9,605.

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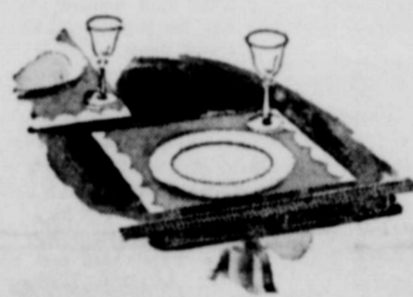

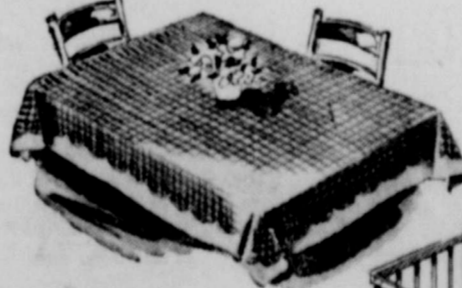

Prophet Among Exiles

Lesson for April 4, 1948

THIS quarter we study the Captivity and Return of the Jews, using the Books of Ezekiel, Daniel, Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther, Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi. Sunday's lesson is found in Ezekiel 1-4 and 39:1-9.



Dr. Newton

It would be well for us to read again the history of this most interesting man Ezekiel—how he came to be among the captives by the river Chebar. He is one of the most attractive personalities in the Old Testament—a man of surpassing culture and charm—and yet enabled to "sit where they sat."

A MESSENGER OF GOD

EZEKIEL could never have adapted himself to the role of ministering to the captive slaves apart from the knowledge that he was the messenger of God—the messenger of God's hope to broken, beaten souls.

God spoke to his people through Ezekiel. He speaks to his people today through chosen messengers—parents, teachers, the Bible, the Holy Spirit. God may be speaking to you today.

HEAR YE THE WORD

EZEKIEL'S approach to the Jews in captivity was by the authority of God's direct message to them through him. Ezekiel was faithful to God's appointment and mission. He knew that what he had to say to the Jews meant their hope of release and return.

He studied their plight. He studied their mood. And then he spoke to them. But not only did he speak to them, telling them what God wanted them to know, but he moved among them. He loved them.

He had God's message, and he went in God's mood of compassion. We cannot help people until we understand them and love them.

GOD'S WATCHMAN

EZEKIEL reminded the people that he had been sent from God as a watchman, and he told them what terrible responsibility was upon him in warning them to repent and return unto God. Read Ezekiel 33:1-9.

If the watchman faithfully warns the people, and they refuse to heed the warning, their blood will not be on his hands; but if he fail to warn the people, their blood will be on his hands. Here is a lesson for every teacher and preacher and parent today.

And in this same 33rd chapter, Ezekiel goes on to declare God's attitude toward all sinners. "Say unto them, As I live, saith the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked; but that the wicked turn from his way and live—turn ye, turn ye from your evil ways; for why will ye die?"

A WATCHMAN UNTO EXILES

"SON of man, I have made thee a watchman unto the house of Israel," Ezekiel 3:17.

This was the explicit commission of God to Ezekiel. And grandly did Ezekiel accept and execute to the limit of his ability that commission.

The Jews were far from their beloved home. They were driven by hard masters. They could not sing the song of the Lord in a strange land. They had hanged their harps on the willow trees.

With a sensitive soul, Ezekiel comes to them with the word of hope. He reminds them of the goodness and mercy of Jehovah to their fathers, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. He lifts their drooping spirits with clear and ringing words of promise. He pleads with them to confess their sins and claim the pardoning mercy of a loving God.

He used numerous means of gaining their attention—symbols of their former communion with God. Patiently he traced the dealings of God with them and their fathers before them.

They listened, and all who heeded the pleas of the faithful watchman were saved and restored to faith in the goodness and mercy of God.

We, too, are watchmen among exiles. Let us learn the high art of Ezekiel in our ministry as watchmen.

The churches will fail if the lessons of Sunday are forgotten on Monday and are laid aside for special observance on only one day of the week.—Wayne Morse, U. S. senator from Oregon.

MOSCOW—The crystal detector receiving set is back again in the Soviet Union.
 Many U. S. boys have made crystal radio receivers. But there are Russian farms without electricity and it is impossible to manufacture tube sets in a few years sufficient to put one in every home here. So Soviet inventors have turned to the same principle as the "one you made yourself." But it has some improvements which make it almost unrecognizable.
 New sets have a "constant" crystal which does not require continual readjustment. And the design has been so improved that some models use a small loud speaker. The range is also broader.

Young amateur radio enthusiasts in Pioneer clubs and Komsomol clubs manufacture the sets.
 Nobody here envisions crystal sets as a permanent substitute for radios using tubes. But the local attitude is that it will do until it is possible to meet the demand for tube sets.

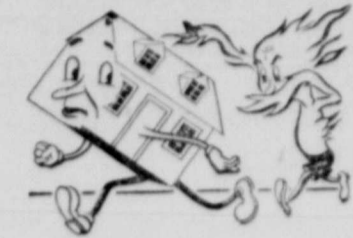

Campaign Year Warning

There are two aspects of the coming political campaign—yes, it's almost that time again—about which the public should be informed. One is the campaign newspaper place free in every rural box and tossed onto every urban front porch in Texas. Second is the mailing of candidates' pictures on poles of utility companies.

Newsprint is extremely scarce. Editors, who day after day have to capsize the news and turn down advertising, don't want to see newsprint wasted. Neither do their readers and advertisers. Candidates buying paper, in the black markets or otherwise, to blanket the state with their blatant self-appraisals, reduce even further the short supply of paper that should be used for the printing of unbiased news.

Smart candidates are realizing that self-produced outpourings such as those we see in campaign sheets create only a reaction of disgust. On the other hand, they are learning that messages placed in a legitimate paper carry weight because of the responsibility of the publisher who works to protect his readers from misinformation and libelous statements. Responsibility is important to thinking readers.

Have you ever seen a utility repairman's spike slip, as he climbed a pole, leaving him hanging by his safety belt? The candidate who drives the nail which a workman's spike may hit is guilty of more than just mutilating private property and creating a public eyesore. He is setting a trap that may cost a life.

In addition, he is insulting the intelligence of all voters who pass. He implies that they base their vote upon a fleeting glance at a face on a pole rather than upon an honest evaluation of his qualifications.

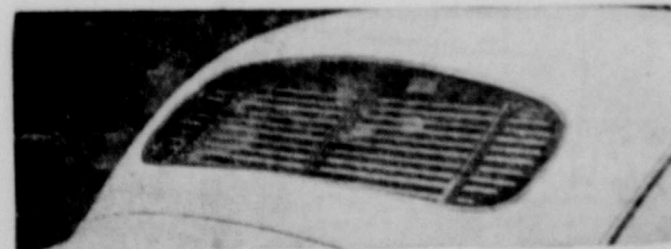

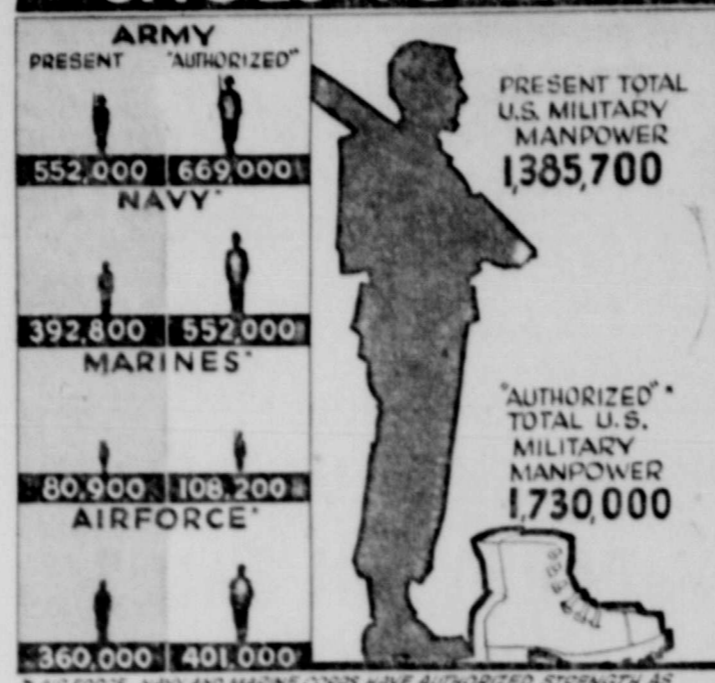

Babson Discusses The Marshall Plan

ROGER W. BABSON, Editor-in-Chief

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 26—People ask me, "As a businessman, what do you think the Marshall Plan would mean to American business?" The answer I should like to make is, "As a man, what do you think the Plan would mean to humanity?"

Operation Rat Hole

I have read letters to various newspapers written by supposedly intelligent people. They refer to the Marshall Plan as "Operation Rat Hole" and say, "we will be pouring our millions down the drain." The suggestion is that the project is hopeless from the start. The writers imply that they would rather keep tight hold of their cash than to give it away.

The same people have the impression that the Plan is merely an over-sized charity. They fear that we would ship overseas the food which we ourselves might need and would send to Europe money which we could spend at home. Even if this were true, could we, as the world's richest country and as a Christian community wholly refuse to share?

What is the Marshall Plan

Most of the arguments against the Marshall Plan have been advanced by people who seem to have little idea what it means. The Marshall Plan is a program

for the investment of money and goods, not for Europe's relief, but for her recovery. At present, Europe is nearly helpless because she lacks such essentials as food, fertilizer, coal, steel, and transportation. These were destroyed or used up by the war. They can now be replaced—but not without our help. You, yourself, could not plant a garden if you had neither spade, fertilizer, nor seed. You couldn't start a trucking business without a truck, gasoline, or money. Nor can Europe.

What the Marshall Plan proposes to provide is the capital for refinancing an ailing business. That some of the capital will be in the form of tractors and some of it in the form of wheat does not alter the case. European laborers cannot now produce to capacity because they are hungry. When they have full stomachs and are able to work, and when they have tools to work with, there will be coal to run the factories to produce the steel from which to build the tractors to plow the gardens to feed the workers.

Can We Afford It?

But can we afford the Marshall Plan? Can we part with the twenty and a half billion dollars, which has been estimated as its cost? Can we ship overseas seven or eight percent of the food we raise? Can we aggravate present shortages by sending steel, fertilizer, railway cars, coal? Can we spare any?

The answer is that we can afford the Marshall Plan because we cannot afford to reject it. What the program will cost us has only been estimated, but what its rejection would cost can scarcely be imagined. There is, of course, no guarantee that this plan will save Europe; but without it Western Europe will go down into chaos and Communism. We cannot live alone in the world. We must not give Europe over to the other camp. For the sake of our way of life, for the sake of the institutions which mean most to us, for the sake of our business and our future, we cannot refuse to make the attempt.

Conclusion

As a businessman, then, I think that the Marshall Plan is a good gamble, and, what is more, I think that the alternative is a poor gamble. But one thing I insist on. Let's see that after the countries of Europe receive our aid, they get busy and produce. Production is the only lasting solution to their problems or to our problems either.

And Now They Put Inflation Into U. S. Zoos

Newsfeatures SAN DIEGO, Calif.—Speaking of high prices, a couple of automobiles would be cheaper than a baby gorilla.

This note on inflation comes from Mrs. Belle Benchley, in charge of the San Diego zoo.

Gorillas that are babies (with only an outside chance of living in captivity) now cost around \$5,000, she said.

Two-year-olds bring \$7,500 and a healthy, adult 200-pounder \$10,000.

They used to cost less than half of that, Mrs. Benchley recalled.

A pair of Egyptian shoebills (species of stork) reaching the zoo this week are valued at \$3,000. They used to market at \$600 to \$800 apiece.

Elephants that once were available for \$3,000 in Africa now cost \$ 6,000 plus transportation charges.

In pre-inflation days, chimpanzees could be had for from \$250 to \$300. They now cost from \$600 to \$900.

Time was when you could buy a pair of gaurs (Indian buffaloes) for \$2,500. A dealer in India has offered Mrs. Benchley one for \$9,500—just one gaur.

Factors behind the sharp boosts include higher pay for native trappers in such places as India and Africa. Mrs. Benchley said it has increased from the equivalent of around 20 cents a

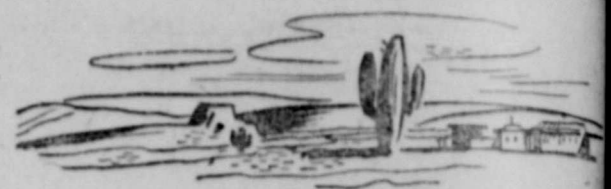

Japanese Textile Output Gains

TOKYO (AP)—Japanese textile makers produced more than twice as much cotton yarn and fabrics in 1947 as during the preceding year, headquarters reported today. Cotton fabric production in 1947 was 661,380,000 square yards compared with 251,000,000 square yards in 1946. In 1947 cotton yarn production jumped to 296,000,000 pounds from 127,000,000 pounds the previous year. Raw silk production increased from 88,000 bales in 1946 to 100,000 bales in 1947. Blood Injections Are Said to Help Duodenal Ulcers

Newsfeatures

MOSCOW — Soviet doctors are reported to have developed a method of treatment of stomach and duodenal ulcers by injections of human and animal blood.

Evening Moscow reports that the director of the Central Insti-

tute of Hematology and Blood Transfusion, A. A. Bagdasarov, attained very positive results by his method. "X-rays," said Bagdasarov, "frequently showed a complete healing over of the ulcer."

The institute said that blood-plasma of animals and humans as well as whole blood has an effect on ulcers.

The Kiev Institute of Blood Transfusion also reports experiments in the use of human blood plasma in intramuscular injections and in injections under the skin. A positive effect on ulcers is reported.

Small doses of plasma introduced under the skin relieved pain after the second injection, it was said, and further doses reduced stomach acidity to normal.

U. S. Savings Bond Campaign Pushed By Unpaid Expert

WASHINGTON — Vernon Lawson Clark joshes about being a loafer, yet he's currently handling one of the biggest jobs in the government—the task of getting a nation of spenders to save. And he doesn't get paid for it.

Heading the Treasury Department's new "security loan" drive to "fight inflation," Mr. Clark donates his services to Uncle Sam.

An official of a Des Moines cabinet veneer wood company, he has been guiding the peacetime selling of bonds since Jan. 1, 1946, when he was appointed national director of the U. S. Savings Bonds Division. Close to \$7,000,000,000 worth of bonds were bought last year.



The new drive, an intensification of the usual bond sale efforts, revives some wartime bond selling campaign techniques. It is one of the measures President Truman listed in his anti-inflation proposals to Congress last November.

These are the same bonds, purchasable at the same rates as Americans bought during the war and after.

Mr. Clark says he felt the call to serve the government a challenge that no public-spirited American could refuse to accept. "We are a nation of spenders. We want to have everything we want. Yet everyone wants security," he says.

Goals for the drive are to be set at a conference here March 18-20 which will be attended by leaders of volunteer savings bonds salesmen and saleswomen to be mustered over the nation.

Mr. Clark estimates some 6,000,000 men, women and youths will make up the volunteer forces. He urges Americans to:

1. Invest in payroll savings, buying the security bonds on the installment plan at the place where they work; and (2) sign up at their banks for regular systematic bond purchases from their checking accounts.

A handsome man in his early

60s, with keen grey eyes and a sunny smile, Mr. Clark was born in Salem, Nebr., brought up and educated at Des Moines. He worked in the advertising departments of Des Moines newspapers, later sold flour and finally got into the lumber business.

He is a widower with one son, Robert V. Clark. He lives in a Tudor style home surrounded by 50 acres on the outskirts of Des Moines. He'd rather have his friends come to see him than go places to see them. He's an enthusiastic tennis player, likes bridge but says he'd rather not talk about his game.

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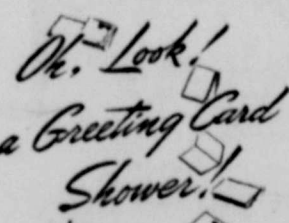

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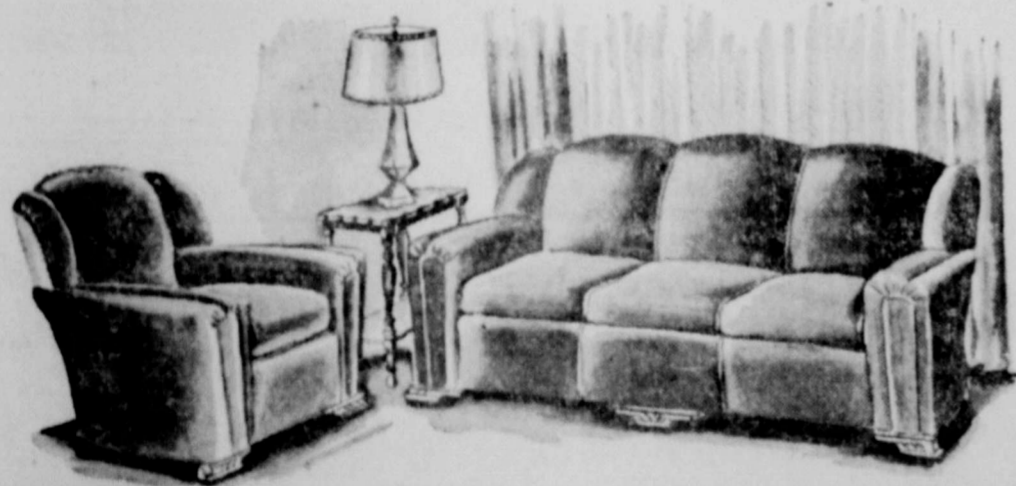

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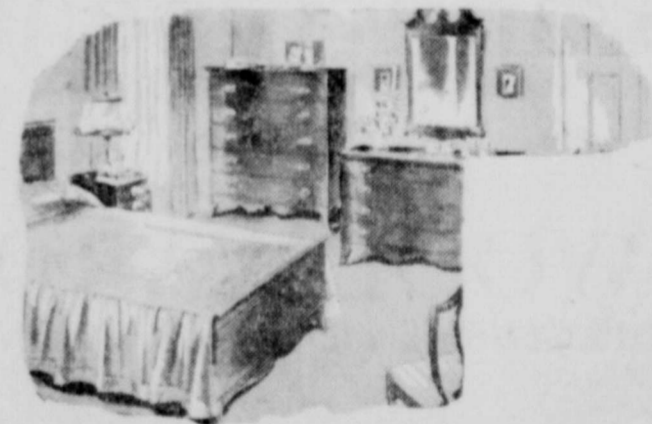
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Vets at Tech Lead Others In Scholarship

Common Reaction to President's Speech is that It Didn't Go Far Enough with Russia

is significant of the current mood of this country that a number of prominent newspapers and people criticized the president's speech to Congress on the grounds that it did not go far enough—that he had made it even clearer that the Soviet Union, its satellite and the European nations are still holding out for the onrush of communism that we are no longer going to permit our friends or ourselves to be pushed around. Some take the extreme position we should draw a line on a map of Europe and inform that if she crosses it war result. That, of course, is not generally held view, and in indeed circles the feeling that prolonged peace is possible still exists.

In any event, Mr. Truman's message was framed in strong and direct language for the chief official person to bulge his muscles at a nation with which theoretically, we are on friendly terms — it is a very different thing when it is done by those who must bear the heavy responsibility of formulating policy and evaluating risks. The fact that Mr. Truman was so unequivocal in his mention of the Soviet Union is just one more indication of the extent to which American patience has been stretched. And the fact that both parties in Congress gave the President heavy and sustained applause is another barometer of the thinking that is going on in high circles.

Mr. Truman's three suggestions—for speeding up approval of the ERP, for compulsory military training, and for a temporary renewal of selective service—are not new. Approval of ERP is now a foregone conclusion. The last two, however, are of a highly controversial nature and a number of leading figures in Congress said after the speech that they would have to be given overwhelming proof that the measures are necessary before voting for them. Even a few months ago, it seemed unlikely that the subject of military training would be brought up at all in this election year, and it seemed next to impossible that it could be approved. But the pace of official events has been immensely accelerated and the picture has changed a great deal in a short time. It is the view of the Administration, and of the chief military men, that voluntary enlistments cannot keep the services at even their present authorized strength, and that a draft unpleasant as it may be, is the only solution. Going further, they are also certain that the only alternative to a huge standing Army, which has always been repugnant to this country for reasons of principle as well as reasons of money, is a trained civilian reserve.

It is a good sign that everyone in an official position, from the President on down, frankly admits that the policies advocated are risky. The ultimate risk is war, and it is being talked about openly. The usual rumors to the effect that this top official or that has confidentially stated that we will be at war with Russia in a matter of weeks or months, are floating about. But, as well as one can judge now, the final crisis is nowhere near as imminent as that, and for several reasons.

Booker Voters Pass School Improvements

Voters in the Booker Independent School District have approved three proposals submitted in an election held Saturday, Mar. 20, by a vote of 151 for and 28 against.

The proposals carried were (1) to raise the tax levy in the district from \$1 to \$1.50 per \$100 valuation (2) voted \$115,000 in school bonds to build an addition to the school, including a modern gymnasium and more class rooms (3) voted to mutually assume the bonded indebtedness of the Booker Independent School District and the First Creek Common School District.

The Booker district has been enlarged during the past year by the addition of a portion of the Huntoon district and the First Creek district. The present school building was built in 1921 and patrons of the schools have long felt the need for a modern gym and additional classrooms.

A remodeling and repairing job will be done on the present school plant.

TEXANS IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON (AP)—The top government official at the San Jacinto Day dedication of the U.S.S. Texas as a shrine will be Assistant Secretary of the Navy Mark Edwin Andrews.

The occasion will be of particular personal interest to him, for Houston is his birthplace and home. The permanent berthing spot of the battleship will be in the Houston Ship Channel.

Forty-four years old, slender and youthful looking, Andrews took over his present post Jan. 16 when the Senate confirmed his appointment. His special qualification is in the field of procurement (purchase) of equipment and supplies.

"When you're faced with an emergency situation," he says, "you can't fool around with red tape and slow cumbersome methods in building up a fighting force."

As he talked, he sat at a big desk in a large private office which adjoins that of Secretary of the Navy John L. Sullivan. Around the room are models of ships, planes, and such naval gear as brass clocks and pilot wheels.

During the war he had been a naval captain, and became chief of a division handling contract negotiations. After the war he served the navy for a while in a civilian status, and was chairman of a special committee which drafted post-war procurement legislation.

When the war ended, the navy was faced with the legal requirement of advertising for bids of all kinds of armament and equipment. It meant delay and meaningless moves to advertise for bids on a particular item which was made by only one

"The only sensible thing to do was to enact legislation allowing us to negotiate for equipment under such circumstances," he continued.
