## CATTLE SALES APPROXIMATE MILLION QUARTER

Four thousand head of McCulloch County's finest steers are included in shipments which have just been made by Fred Bowen and associates from McCulloch County to Kansas pastures, where the cattle will be finished for market. The shipments were made up of three- and four-year-old white face Herefords, averaging 1,000 pounds in weight, and the total deal approximated a cool quarter million dollars.

All the animals were grass fed, and were universally given up to be the best that have ever left this part of the country. Their weight was regarded as most extraordinary, especially at this time of the year. While McCulloch County annually ships out thousand of head of premier cattle, none have ever excelled this bunch shipped by Bowen and associates.

H. O. Patterson, wife and daughter, and Homer Livingstone, wife and two daughters, drove through in the Patterson car the following day.

Mr. and Mrs. Westmoreland and some friends were driving from Kingsville to Bishop Wednesday night after the heavy rains in that country. Just out of the town of Bishop the Highway crosses a large creek. The bridge was apparently intact, but had given way at the opposite side and when the party drove onto it, the car went down in the stream.

Mrs. Westmoreland and the other members of the party were able to reach the bank, but it is thought that Mr. Westmoreland was injured when the car went off the bridge, and although he was an excellent swimmer, he was carried down with the current and his body found the following day about three miles below the bridge.

Mr. and Mrs. Westmoreland were married here about two months ago while he was stationed here with a surveying party in the U. S. Geological Survey. She was formerly Miss Dorothy Hodges. After their marriage he was transferred to Robstown where they have since lived.

Deceased was 23 years of age and is survived by his father and mother and a sister. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at Eagle Lake.

**COFFEE AND DRUGS.**

(Wesley Peacock, Ph. B.)  
"Doctor, do you think I ought to give up coffee?" This is a question ever asked and never answered. Is the patient sure that coffee is the cause of his indigestion, or is he only guessing? Does the doctor know that coffee is the cause of his patient's insomnia, or is he only guessing? It is so convenient to blame the goat.

A professor of psychology in Columbia University made a scientific study of the effects of coffee, alcohol, and drugs on 50 student volunteers. Of course, the conditions and procedure were under scientific control, as nearly as possible, and all reactions were studied and recorded.

After one cup of coffee, taken once a day, both mental and physical stimulation was observed; mental processes were quicker and easier; in fact, the subject could write with greater ease, or speak with greater fluency and clarity, after just one cup of coffee. This was followed by no depression, no unpleasant reaction, and no craving for more coffee. More than one cup, however, brought confusion of ideas.

When the same students experimented with alcohol, they found a lack of brain stimulation, mental processes were not accelerated, and idea were not clarified. The reactions were depression, drowsiness, thirst, but not necessarily for more alcohol.

The conclusion was that coffee is not a drug, but may be used as a helpful stimulant without deleterious effect; but that alcohol is only a physical stimulant, with harmful effect, and with the danger of habit formation. Neither coffee nor alcohol is considered a drug, like opium, cocaine, and heroin, all of which exhilarate for a time, then depress, then make a demand for more, establishing a fatal drug addiction beyond the power of will. Dr. Simon says there is no connection between prohibition and the increased use of drugs; as they are separate problems; that a man may be a moderate drinker all his life and never be a chronic inebriate, but he who takes narcotics even for a short time becomes a confirmed helpless, hopeless, pitiful addict.

In Canada May 24 is known as Empire Day in memory of Queen Victoria.

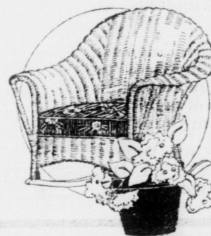

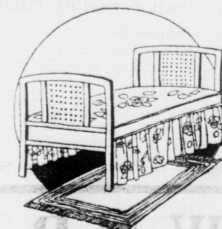

**A PERILOUS RIDE.**

(From Range and Field.)

Once upon a time a young cow boy of 23 years, with \$25,000 in gold stowed away in a money belt around his waist, set out from San Antonio for a horse-back ride of more than 100 miles, and he set out believing that a small group of semi-bandits would be patrolling the roads along which he would travel, doing said patrolling with the intent of depriving him of his guerdon.

This occurred about April 1, 1875. The ride began at night-fall, and the young rider—lightly built, five-feet, five-inches, 120 pounds—rode out of the small town, that San Antonio then was, by a circuitous route, before heading into a byroad leading in the general direction of his goal. He would shun the highway to Fort Mason, his destination, for along that road he believed there was danger for him. Possibly there was danger along the byways, also, but the chance had to be taken.

The young man was a cattle buyer and he was taking the gold to Fort Mason, where now stands the city of Mason. With the bold he was to pay for a string of cattle which had been contracted for in February preceding, and for which a goodly sum of money had been put up as a forfeit. Since the young man, and a brother parting with him had contracted for the cattle, prices had advanced approximately \$10 per head, so the buyers stood to make a splendid profit on the speculation—if the rider ever got to Fort Mason with the money to close the deal.

One half of the money the young man was carrying was

borrowed. If that coin was moved from his possession never to return, the lad and his brother were automatically bankrupt! Likewise, they would lose the chance to make a "killing" that was their right on their speculation, by reason of not being able to get possession of the cattle at the contract price and sell them at the market price to which they had ascended. Added to these reflections the fact that the lone rider felt quite certain an attempt would be made to rob him enroute, one may perceive that the youth had a task that sat heavily upon him.

The lone cowboy that rode all night to the northwest of San Antonio, guiding his course by the stars and being assisted by moonlight to find the unfrequented paths and roads, lived 300 miles north of San Antonio, due north as the crow flies, in Palo Pinto County. His name was Willie Slaughter, in later life to accumulate a fine, social title and become Col. W. B. Slaughter of San Antonio, where he now lives. He was born to the cattle ranges, and twice already had driven cattle up the trail to Kansas markets. The brother operating with him was J. B., four years older.

Letters of credit and bank checks were familiar in those days as now, and you may at this point begin to wonder why this riding through the night with \$25,000 in gold. Here is the story. When the Slaughter brothers appeared in Fort North Texas, "Boys," the Ft. Mason banker, a man named Ranck, advised his neighbors, when he read over the original written contract between the Slaughter Brothers and the Mason banker, "I don't see how you can get out of this contract in

for the higher price to which the market had ascended. By evading delivery, the holders of the cattle could sell in the market at a profit of \$15,000 on the string of approximately 1,500 cattle. "Why not evade?" they said to each other.

The Slaughter Brothers had contracted for the cattle at \$16 per head, and now the advance had put them up to \$28. The owners would evade delivery if there was a chance. (Many men have made fortunes by such tactics, and, despite the maxims in the copy books, have lived to ripe old ages and enjoyed good health in the meantime.) The young buyers were flushed with success. Had they not played in luck? Was it not a good year? Of course, the price of cattle might drop before the boys got them to the markets of the north, but things looked safe. Accordingly they were jubilant.

"We are ready to receive the cattle," they said. "Let's see the money," said the men who were weeping inwardly at the thought of the \$10 the head they might have made by not having contracted their cattle for sale too soon. The Slaughters took the sellers before the lone banker of Fort Mason and showed him a letter of credit on a Dallas bank for \$50,000. But the Mason banker had only a few hundred cash. "Nothing but cash," said the men who vain would pocket the \$10 than see it go to strangers from North Texas. "Boys," the Ft. Mason banker, a man named Ranck, advised his neighbors, when he read over the original written contract between the Slaughter Brothers and the Mason banker, "I don't see how you can get out of this contract in

this way. I'll credit you in this bank or give you paper on San Antonio where you can get the cash." But the obstinate ones refused to budge. ("Refused to budge is not an original expression). Thereupon followed a parley

of the Slaughter and the Mason banker. Then the parties who owned the cattle would ride to San Antonio, get the cash, and return to claim delivery of the cattle. When the young man reached San Antonio (Continued on Page Seven)

tonio he went to a banker who was destined to become an outstanding figure in the financial and philanthropic life of the city for whom one of the city's high schools and its nationally famous park were to be named. The banker was the late Col. George W. Brackenridge. The young man presented his letter of credit and explained the situation at Fort Mason. Col. Brackenridge at once set relief measures in motion. He produced the gold, and directed the youth where to go to make a purchase of the best type of money belt, and personally assisted in placing the gold coins, of \$10 and \$20 denominations, in the belt.

Also, Col. Brackenridge directed young Slaughter to the horse markets and to where he might buy a saddle. Then he sat down and gave the young man detailed instructions about the by-roads and trails leading out of San Antonio and across the country in the direction which the young man would travel.

The young man rode into San Antonio from Fort Mason on the stage that ran to and from between San Antonio and San Angelo in those days, but he rode out of San Antonio on a humpbacked, unpretentious mustang pony that cost him \$15, using a dilapidated saddle that cost him \$5. And despite that, he was already a prosperous young cattleman, he was garbed in the coarsest, most out-worn garb he could pick up. If anyone inquired of him who he was, he was destined to be a boy in quest of work, coming out of Goliad or Gonzales counties, and headed for a certain ranch on the head waters of the Llano River.

Although the young man expected certain gentlemen to waylay him somewhere on the road for the kindly purpose of depriving him of his burden of gold, he did not expect the waylayers to find him on the highway. As far as he was concerned, the gentlemen of loose morals as regards acquiring coin might have their vigil along the roadside all for naught! There was a great lot of territory on the west side of the highway, and the young man proposed to traverse that territory! And he did! Still, it may as well be remembered that the men who fain would relieve him of his weary load—the gold weighed 104 pounds—were men who knew every cow-trail and river-crossing in the country and might well be supposed to have sense enough to deploy right and left! In those days when a dollar was really worth something, quite a number of fellows might well afford to divide \$25,000 among themselves. We shall see.

Meanwhile the brother left at Fort Mason was not occupying a position any too pleasant. For one thing, he heard rumors that certain gentry of the country side planned to hold up the stage on its return with the younger brother. Also, they would maintain a sort of blockade, to see that the young man did not in any otherwise enter town without first being considerably molested.

The young man carrying the coin had picked a tough and wiry cayuse, and the lack of fine appearance was the thing he lacked immensely. His

beard grew while he was coming down in the stage coach, and it grew more the day he spent in the city. Then it continued to grow while he was making the 100 mile ride back. The old, worn-out clothes he picked up in San Antonio, from hat to boots, aided the disguise. Then, as a further aid to the success of his expedition, he rode the open range. The hamlets of Boerne and Fredericksburg were left several miles to the east as he journeyed.

Through the first night the boy rode safely, and at the same time the brother left at Fort Mason slumbered none. He was taking no sort of a chance. At daylight Willie Slaughter rode his horse into a secluded glade, where he staked it out to graze on the fresh April grass, and then went a hundred yards into a dense thicket where he slept until three p. m. Cautiously, he went out, watered his pony at a stream, restaked it, and went back into his thicket for another slumber. At nightfall he was out on his way. The brother had slept some that day, too.

The second night—it was moonlight time—the solitary horseman rode as he had the night before, briskly, galloping part time, and "gaiting" it along at a lively clip the rest of the time. "That pony had every known gait," said Col. Slaughter recently.

About every 15 miles Slaughter dismounted and unsaddled, whereupon the pony would wallow on the ground and then graze a bit. This for only 10 minutes or so, and the journey would be resumed. Meanwhile, at Fort Mason, the brother was not sleeping!

About the fellows whose palms itched to caress that guerdon of gold, nobody knows, exactly. Somewhere along the line, near Mason, the stage was met by a couple of men, who scanned the passengers, remarking that they were expecting a friend "most any day, now. How many outside by-ways were watched, there is no record.

At 10 o'clock on the morning after the second night out, young Slaughter made the goal safely. He did not ride into Fort Mason from any expected direction. He had crossed the Llano River eight or ten miles up from the highway crossing, and had come into town, and into the waiting arms of his brother and the banker, Ranck, from the northwest. The brother may have been expecting him from that direction, but he had never once looked in that direction. And straightway there was a crestfallen group of men who saw their schemes fade as the morning mist before the ancient sun.

### Pirate Who Became a Judge

IT IS difficult to characterize the anomalous career of the pirate known as Captain Cobham of Poole in Dorsetshire. Perhaps "cherchez la femme" would be one way to do it, for back of most of the deviltries of this pirate leader appears the sinister form of Maria Cobham, one of the most notorious of women pirates, and certainly the most bloodthirsty. But not all of the blame for Cobham's cruelties can be laid to the tigerish Maria. He was well drilled in infancy before ever he took her aboard his ship to become his partner in crime.

He had started young. At the age of eighteen he was a notorious ladies' man and accomplished smuggler. On one occasion he landed a cargo of 10,000 gallons of French brandy at Poole after successfully evading the king's patrol boats which were attempting to put a stop to the smuggling. A little later, however, his boat was captured and this so annoyed the young smuggler that he bought a cutter at Bridgport, placed an armament of 14 guns on her and became a pirate.

His first exploit in piracy was an unusually daring and successful one. Off the Mersey he intercepted a big East India merchantman, boarded her and made the crew prisoners. From this ship he took more than 40,000 pounds; then he scuttled the ship and calmly watched the crew drown. Next he put in at Plymouth and it was there that he met Maria who was willing enough to accept his invitation to come aboard with him.

By this time his fame had spread so that the English channel became too dangerous for his operations. So he sailed across the Atlantic and lay in wait for ships between Cape Breton and Prince Edward Is. He took several prizes and invariably disposed of the crews in some heartless manner. On one occasion he sewed up the unfortunate sailors in sacks and ordered his viliains to toss them overboard.

Eventually Cobham decided to retire from piracy, but Maria would have none of it, for he had not yet secured enough wealth to satisfy her. So he reluctantly continued his career until he had gathered together a considerable fortune. Then he purchased a large estate near Havre, and after one final fling at the trade settled down to a peaceful retirement. He not only settled down but became eminently respectable, and to cap the climax of his strange career was made a magistrate and presided at the county courts. When he died at an advanced age, he left many descendants who, we are assured by one historian, "were moving in the first grade at Havre!"


