BRIDGE
MADE EASY

(Abbreviations: A—ace; K—king; Q—queen; J—jack; X—any card lower than jack.)

Overcoming Partner's Bid—4

When you possess the minimum of "normal expectancy" or less, it behooves you to furnish your partner with information as follows:

1—When holding minimum normal support as X X X or A X X or K X in trumps, bid other major only if it is better than an original bid.

2—When holding Q X in trumps, bid (a) other major if the good original bid or (b) no trump with two other suits stopped and total hand worth at least two quick tricks.

3—When holding less than Q X bid (a) any suit as good as K Q X X or (b) a no trump with two other suits stopped and total hand worth at least two quick tricks.

Examples of third-hand bids follow. In each instance the third hand is depicted, and in each instance partner has bid one club. The best bid for third hand is shown.

Spades X X; hearts A Q X X X; diamonds X X X; clubs X X X.

Parents Should Avoid Instilling Fear In Children

Patience and firmness is the key-note of training very young children.

At the time of age most children know the meaning of obedience. At least they know many things that they must not do and things they may do. They know what "No" means.

From this time on, the mother has a foundation of knowledge to build on, not merely sense reaction and elemental emotion. The baby has absorbed by gradual suggestion a sense of his mother's authority, and answers to it.

Guard Against Fear. From this time on, care must be taken not only to cultivate the desirable character traits in the child, such as generosity, kindness, anxiety to please, sympathy and so on, but particular care must be taken at this period to avoid the opposite ones, selfishness, fear and many others.

Be sure not to make him selfish. A baby at this age is likely to begin to realize his place in the sun, and the fact that the household machinery revolves more or less around him. He is beginning to draw heavy dividends from the words, "Oh, give it to him. He's just a baby." Be careful that he does not impose on his kindred.

From this time on, develop his sense of responsibility. Most children at about this age do as at one time or another.

PARIS, June 30.—I always am very strict about sports dresses and greatly disapprove the dreary type of sports dress, but I have at last met a person who, on this subject, is even more decided than I am.

She is Miss Helen Wills. In my opinion there is nothing more ridiculous than a tennis dress with a lot of unnecessary trimmings, and Miss Wills cordially agrees with me. Among all of my clients she has the reputation of being one of the most agreeable among the saleswomen.

She listens to any advice which is given to her concerning her other dresses, but where tennis clothes are concerned she is the most stubborn young person I have ever seen.

Refused New Model

Miss Wills is charmingly stubborn. One of my modelers wanted to make a new design of tennis dress for her this summer, but she finally turned down the suggestion, stating that the model which I had created for her two years ago was perfect from the point of view of the player and that she did not want to change.

This in a way was a great compliment, but a couturier is, of course, always tempted to change a style. Miss Wills knows tennis and her own mind and that is why she wears a two-year-old model. She only consented to allow me to make the dress in silk instead of in cotton, and to add her monogram.

I have come to the conclusion that silk is just as serviceable as cotton for sports dresses, in view of the great progress that has been made in the manufacture of silk making it washable.

The sporting characteristics of Miss Wills are evident in her choice of street dresses. She has a marked preference for tailored clothes. She likes the fashionable colors—yellow, red, and light blue—because she prefers brighter things. She always chooses afternoon and evening dresses in which she is completely at ease physically, and this time she chose silk chiffon in misty shades.

One of the most youthful models Miss Wills chose is one for home wear—a yellow in one of the new, sheer woollens, with lingerie trimming. It has the yoke and sleeves cut in one and the yoke buttoned up to the white scalloped collar.

Kate-Plated, Frock. The body of the frock is stitched down knife pleats which flare below the slanting skirt yoke to a full pleated skirt. Two pockets slanted like the yoke line have scalloped edges. The belt of suede follows the natural waistline and an inserted banding of the skirt points upward in front to form a loop through which the belt runs.

With this she wears a plain flax straw hat, with a yellow banding. One of her new tennis frocks, of white silk serge, has a shirt collar, and a full pleated skirt. It is sleeveless. Topping it is a tailored white flannel jacket, with no decoration save a patriotic insignia that has two tiny tennis rackets crossed under it.

Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST: Raspberries and cream, cereal, poached eggs, with crisp bacon, toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON: Spinach and egg salad, whole wheat bread, steamed cherry pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER: Watermelon, cocktail, veal and rice, rice, hearts of romaine with French dressing, baked plain cake, milk, coffee.

The luncheon pudding provides the only meat dish in the meal. It is quite "hearty" and adds bulk to an otherwise light menu.

Steamed Cherry Pudding. Two cups steeped cherries, 2 eggs, 1 cup granulated sugar, 1-2 cup molasses, 1-2 cup white flour, 1-4 cups Graham flour, 4 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup hot water, 1 teaspoon soda, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon cinnamon.

Cream butter and beat in sugar and molasses. Mix flour and add to first mixture. Add salt and cinnamon. Add eggs, well beaten, and beat batter hard. Stir in cherries and add hot water with soda dissolved in it. Beat well and turn into a buttered mold. Steam two hours and serve with sugar and cream.

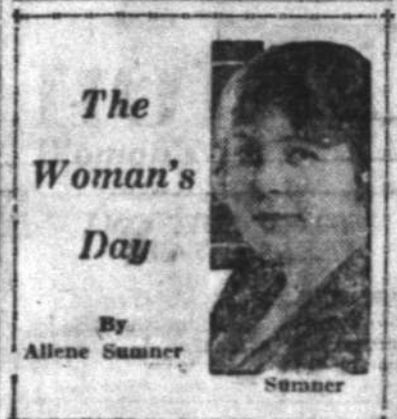
Miss Katherine Powell Has Party Yesterday

One hundred men told Dr. G. V. Hamilton, an eminent psychiatrist, that was wrong with their marriage. The doctor does not think that these 100 men are a cross-section of husbands in general. He explains that if the job were really done right it would mean interviewing tens of thousands of men and women. The men were normal, above average intelligence, able to interpret and analyze; all but 10 were college men and they were professionals and business men.

"Getting these men to talk was not difficult," writes Dr. Hamilton. "Most of us like nothing better than to talk about ourselves—our problems and at great length—if we do it under conditions that make it a safe and dignified thing. The unhappy man and the neurotic are only too eager. The happy and healthy man thoroughly enjoys a few sessions with a psychiatrist who can help him make an inventory of his matrimonial situation."

I wonder if Dr. Hamilton doesn't hit the nail of matrimonial trouble on the head right there. Though perhaps unconsciously. Do we have marriage troubles this modern day because, in the final essence, we rather like the fun of them—the weighing and analyzing and rationalizing and dissecting of our each and every emotion in an attempt to decide whether we are happy or unhappy, satisfied or dissatisfied?

In short, we have time to think about our little pitiful selves today, despite all the hur and cry about the turbulence of this complex age as contrasted with the serene peace and leisure of the age of our fathers and grandfathers. This age puts the emphasis upon individual happiness and peace of mind.

Our ancestors got married, and that was that. There was little time to stop to think whether it was the right marriage or not, whether their temperaments clashed or harmonized, whether they should have married someone else, whether they were the type who should marry at all.

There were fields to till and sow and crops to reap. There was stock to be fed and barns to be built. There were many babies to care for, with every crumb of their food and every stitch on their little backs actually created on the home acres. There were no phones to grocery and dry goods stores in those days. The man and woman had a job together. That job was bigger than themselves. And the very fact that there was a job together helped lead and cultivate the seeds of understanding and comradeship and mutual need one of the other.

One, at least, of the 100 modern husbands who told the doctor what was wrong with their marriage, seems to have recognized this lack, for he said:

"Maybe I'm unhappy a little because we can't work together, can't find a job that we could devote our joint efforts to doing."

Here is a significant finding of the doctor. It seems to me:

"Quite apart from the temperamental and physical adjustments of marriage, two aspects of the common life together have grown rapidly in importance in the United States in the past two generations. These are the social and intellectual. Married couples nowadays tend to set more and more store by personal graces and mental capacities. These things make their mutual life richer and more satisfying. They also enable the couple to make more interesting and flattering contracts with the outside world."

And that last paragraph means the very same thing as the fact that the 100 men were only too glad to become articulate about their marriages—it means a tendency to dissect one's emotional and psychic state so constantly that nothing even grows steadily and well. It's like so much weeding of a garden that the seeds and bulbs and sprouting flower shoots are grubbed out with the wild mustard and dandelion.

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Small Schooner Racing Over The Atlantic Is Lost

Crew of Rofa, Smallest of Three Craft in Contest Over Ocean, Reported Safe in Radio Message.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 10.—The schooner Rofa, smallest of four yachts that started on June 30 from Ambrose lightship for Santander, Spain, in the race for the Queen Victoria cup, has been lost at sea. Her crew, including Mrs. William Rook, of Peñon Manor, N. Y., wife of the Captain and owner, have been picked up by the steamer Tuscara, enroute for New York.

The captain of the Tuscara sent a radio message that the Rofa's crew was safe aboard and well.

A later message received by the New York Times from Mr. Rook and Captain Hart of the Tuscara said:

"10.15 a. m. July 6, 800 miles east of New York, both masts carried away. At 8 p. m. sighted Tuscara with intention of being towed into port. Captain of Tuscara strongly urged, owing to storm warnings, that it was imprudent to stay on board and have Rofa towed. Towed Rofa until 2.30 a. m. when she broke apart and was lost."

A wireless message to the Associated Press from R. W. Johnson of Newark, N. J., master and owner with his brother of the schooner Zedias, one of the entries in the race for the King Alfonso cup which got under way last Saturday, said his ship was becalmed.

Gerrard B. Lambert, of Princeton, N. J., and St. Louis, owner of the record-holding yacht Atlantic, in a wireless message to the Associated Press, reported favorable weather on a day's run of 24 nautical miles.

The position given was approximately 600 miles southeast of New York, the farthest point reported by any of the competing yachts.

The Elena, also in race for the King Alfonso cup, is owned by William S. Bell of New York.

NEED THIRD PARTY

This Is Statement At Meeting In Chicago

CHICAGO, July 10.—Keynote speakers at the prohibition-farmers-labor convention here today proclaimed a need for a new party. Dr. D. Leigh Colvin, of New York, chairman of the prohibition national committee, declared a new party is needed, because neither the democratic nor the republican parties can completely enforce prohibition because each is part wet and part dry.

Laura Hughes Landy, of Chicago, opening the farmers-labor meeting, saw a need for party re-alignment because of what she termed "the domination of the privileged few." The parties will name candidates for the presidency and vice-presidency tomorrow.

"Dare" Causes Man To Leap Into Sea

Cast Self Into Ocean, From Deck of Ship, Responding to Jest From Girl

NEW YORK, July 10 (AP).—A dare uttered in jest by seventeen-year-old Elsie Ekenren, of Washington, D. C., caused Morton Hoyt, 29, of Washington, to jump overboard from the French liner Rochambeau while the ship was off the Grand Banks last Friday evening. Miss Ekenren said today when they arrived. Hoyt is a son of the late Henry M. Hoyt, United States solicitor general under the Taft administration. He was rescued in a dense fog and arrived in the ship's hospital. He refused to see reporters.

Miss Ekenren was returning from a finishing school at Lucerne, Switzerland. She said she was responsible for Hoyt's act and denied that he had tried to commit suicide.

"I didn't seriously dare him to jump overboard, it was done in a spirit of jest," she said. "And I never dreamed he would take me seriously and do it. I was astonished when he jumped overboard. I feel very badly about it, but it was a very brave thing to jump into the fog like that."

Captain Leon Rollin, commander of the liner, said the Rochambeau was in a dense fog that restricted visibility to fifty meters when he heard the cry of "man overboard."

The liner turned in a complete circle while a lifeboat was lowered and made ready for instant launching. Hoyt, swimming feebly and crying for

help, was discerned finally and the small boat put out. Hoyt was picked up semi-conscious.

REVIVAL TOPIC

Ten Commandments Form W. R. White Subject

Application of the Ten Commandments to practical problems of modern life is the subject on which Rev. W. R. White, First Baptist church pastor, is preaching during the revival under the new tabernacle this week.

The first group of commandments Dr. White said, deal with man's relation to God and the second group deal with man's relation to man. The speaker said that when God was explained away that more problems, mysteries and uncertainties were created than existed with reference to God. Without God who created man and the universe, he said, existence becomes a riddle and a maze through which no man can see reality. God, he continued, is the only fundamental thing in the universe and the only man can understand the universe.

"You may leave God out of your life but you'll pay a awful price," Dr. White said.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, July 10.

One hundred and twenty-two insurgents have accepted amnesty and surrendered without arms to the marine post at Conal, Nueva Segovia. Nineteen of the men had operated directly under Jose Leon Diaz, a notorious rebel leader, and the others under his sub chiefs.

BEQUEST TO CAT

Will a \$1000 To Take Care Of Feline

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP).—To insure her pet cat proper care in its declining years, Miss Nell Hebbard, who died recently, willed the animal and the income for a \$1,500 trust fund to Mrs. Joseph D. Beck, Viroqua, Wis., wife of Representative Beck. The will, filed today provided, however, that if Mrs. Beck does not care to serve as custodian for the pet, the feline shall go to Miss Alice D. Hebbard of La Crosse, Wis., a niece. In addition to getting the income from the \$1,500 fund, Mrs. Beck will receive \$750 of the amount when it died.

CRUDE PRODUCTION

Daily Average Shows A Slight Decrease

NEW YORK, July 10 (AP).—The daily average gross crude oil production in the United States decreased 800 barrels for the week ended July 7, totalling 2,383,850 barrels, says the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. Oklahoma, 584,900; Kansas, 103,600; Panhandle, Texas, 84,300; North Texas, 83,400; West Central Texas, 57,500; West Texas, 337,050; East Central Texas, 22,350; Southwest Texas, 25,100; North Louisiana, 42,650; Arkansas, 91,950; Coastal Texas, 195,650; Coastal Louisiana, 28,250; Eastern, 111,500; Wyoming, 55,800; Montana, 10,450; Colorado, 8,400; New Mexico, 2,050; California, 649,000.—Totals 2,383,850.

Daily average imports of petroleum at principal ports for the month of June totaled 227,584 barrels compared with 225,389 for the month of May, and for the week ended July 7, daily average imports were 224,142 barrels compared with 232,286 for the previous week.

SHERIFF INDICTED

Held for Alleged Duplication of Accounts

EL CENTRO, Calif., July 10 (AP).—Sheriff Charles L. Gillette of Imperial county today was under in-

dictment for theft, having been accused by a county grand jury of 216 cases of fraud involving a shortage of \$52,800 in his accounts. The indictment which also accused Gillette of practicing fraud by duplicating his accounts, resulted from a year's investigation.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, July 10 (AP).—Black rust spreading in Canada and entering a more serious phase in the American northwest tended to give a substantial life to grain values today. Government crop estimates issued after the close of today's trading were construed as bearish as to wheat but corn and oats estimates were bullish compared with recent unofficial reports.

Closing quotations on wheat were

strong, 1 3-8c to 2 3-8c net higher. Corn finished 1c to 1 3-4c up, oats 1-8c to 1 3-8c advanced, and provisions varying from 7c decline to a rise of 30c.

Four Oklahoma Supreme Court Justices Named

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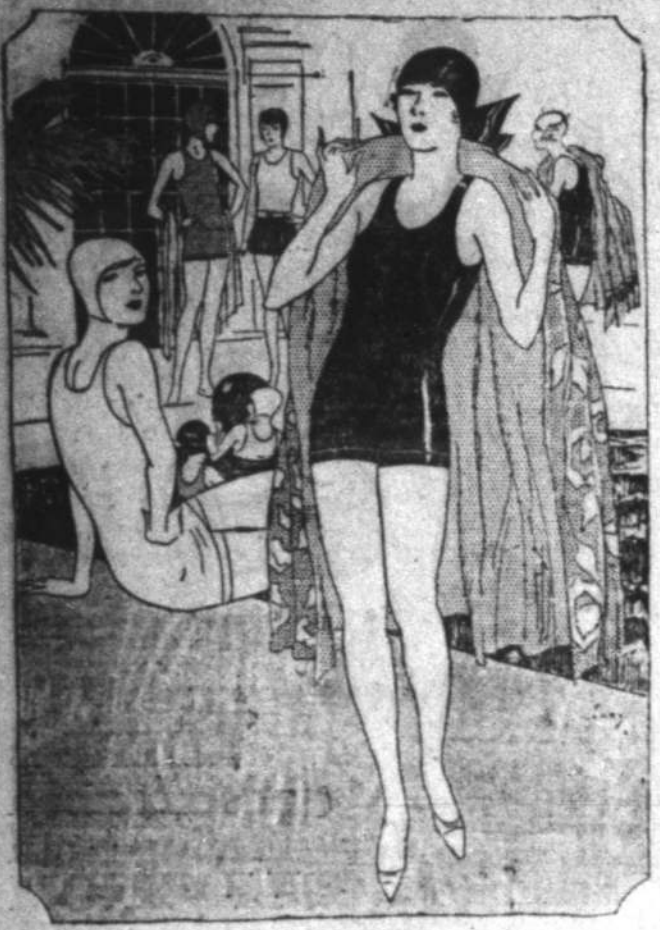

Accused Slayer Of Denver Youth Remains In Jail

Wealthy Denver Theatrical Man Awaits Filing Of Formal Charges by Prosecuting Attorneys.

DENVER, Colo., July 10 (AP)—Alpheus E. Dickson, wealthy Denver theatrical owner who has admitted killing a Missouri farm boy, he found with Mrs. Dickson, today remained in jail while prosecuting attorneys drafted formal charges.

After a coroner's jury yesterday found Dickson guilty of inflicting the wounds which caused the death of Herbert H. Powell, the prosecutor indicated that charge of murder would be filed against the 31-year-old theatrical man.

While Dickson did not testify at the inquest, he told police that he did not intend to kill Powell, who met Mrs. Dickson several months ago while delivering groceries at her home.

"I didn't mean to kill him," Dickson said. "I only wanted to talk things over with him. I meant to ask him if he wanted my wife, or if he would leave her alone. I wanted to get a trap and catch them. If they were guilty, I wanted a divorce."

Dickson drew pistol. Dickson said when he unexpectedly returned to his home Sunday and found the 19-year-old boy with his wife, he covered Powell with a pistol because he feared the youth was armed.

"We struggled and the gun went off twice," Dickson said. "The bullet struck him. He dropped."

Mrs. Dickson described her meeting with Powell as "an innocent flirtation." She said she loved her husband and meant no harm by her acquaintance with Powell.

At the conclusion of the inquest Jack Powell, 27, a brother of the dead youth, attempted to attack Dickson. Powell, who had sobbed throughout the inquest, hurled a chair at the producer and attempted to fight his way to Dickson's side when the coroner announced the verdict.

first meeting tomorrow with the candidates for the presidency and vice presidency to decide on a plan of battle.

Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas, candidate for vice president, arrived a day ahead of his running mate, Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, who broke his journey from Albany after the annual Boy Scout outing at Bear Mountain.

The Arkansas Senator issued a statement in which he urged the national committee to consider advisability of establishing a southern headquarters to combat what he said as an organized effort in several southern states to defeat the democratic national ticket.

Have Balance of \$200,000. With Senator Robinson was Jesse H. Jones, director of finance of the national committee. Jones issued a statement summarizing the final report he will make tomorrow. This showed that the campaign committee will start its labor with no "inherited" debts and with a bank balance of about \$250,000.

One of the latest arrivals of those who will attend the council of war was Clem Shaver, selection of whose successor as chairman of the national committee tomorrow will be one of the first acts of the committee.

Senator Robinson said he could not speak with any certainty about his campaign activities until after tomorrow's meeting, but he said there was no doubt he would make a number of speeches in the West and middle West.

Asks Southern Headquarters. After advocating establishment of a Southern headquarters the Senator continued in his prepared statement as follows:

"An organized effort is in progress in several Southern states to defeat the national democratic ticket and while the force and volume of this movement is not yet known, I am of the opinion that sound policy should prompt our party members to meet this opposition decisively and promptly."

The best manner in which to offset the opposition in the South is, of course, largely for determination by the national committee, and it might be that some more effective manner than that herein suggested will be devised. I wish to give emphasis to the advisability of meeting the conditions referred to aggressively."

TUCSON, ARIZ., July 10 (AP)—Twenty-two airplanes competing in the national reliability air tour tonight, were parked at the Davis-Monthan Field after all but one had made perfect flights on the hop from El Paso, Texas.

southeast higher, relatively, than from Chicago and points in that general territory."

The petition shows that the following articles would have an increased carrying charge:

Carbonic acid, pyrolytic acid, sulphate of alumina, anhydrous ammonia, bakery goods, baking or yeast powder, books, clay retorts, bottles, cans, fibreglass, carpet lining, felt, coating for iron or steel pipe, horse collars, fibreglass pails, copper, brass, or bronze, copper, brass, zinc, lead, tannery dry extract, wood fasteners, ferro-manganese and ferro-silicon, fluorspar, fuller's earth, clay furnaces, plate, and polished and wired glass, wood-handled, knif, underwear, and hosiery, calcium arsenate, insecticides and fungicides, sulphate of copper, lime sulphur solution, paris green, concrete road joints, iron and steel slabs, spigotless, pig-iron, lamp chimneys and lantern globes, leather, collars, harness, artificial leather, lignin liquor in tank cars, lime, phosphate of lime, cast iron or gas meters, sewing machines, grass and straw matting, creosote oil, wall paper, pipe coils and headers, cast iron radiators, and boilers, soda ash, bicarbonate of soda, caustic soda, sodium soda, caustic and concentrated lye in metal cans, sodium soda, silicate in tank cars, salt cake in barrels, sodium phosphate building stone, silica rock, tacks, tobacco, cigarettes, vehicles, auto parts, fence gates, stretchers, poultry netting and woven wire field fencing and a number of other commodities used in Texas.

A number of examples of what the increase in freight rates would be in case the petition was not granted were included in the petition. Freight charges on automobile parts would have been increased from \$1.15 to approximately \$2.00. Plate glass rates would have been increased from \$1.75 to \$2.16. Other commodities would have had a similar increase.

LOWER YIELDS SEEN

Believe Increased Acreage To Be Offset

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—While farmers of the country have planted slightly larger acreages of their principal crops as compared with last year there are indications, the department of agriculture announced today in commenting on the July crop report, that the increased acreage may be more than offset by lower yields per acre. The composite condition of the 35 principal crops on July 1 was 5.8 percent below their average of the last ten years on the date.

BANKRUPTCY DENIED

Coral Gables Petition Refused by Court

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., July 10 (AP)—A petition of involuntary bankruptcy filed by creditors at Coral Gables, at Miami, Florida's most extensive real estate development, was denied in federal court here today by Judge Lake Jones, who also held the present directors were efficient and capable of managing affairs of the corporation.

Judge Jones in denying the receivership asked by Walton Spencer and company of Chicago, with claims of \$3,000 and a number of smaller creditors with claims ranging from a few dollars to more than \$100, ruled that the unsecured creditors would not benefit through a receivership.

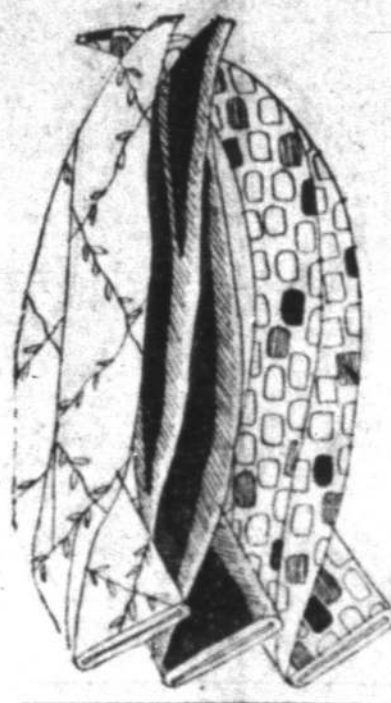

plane to land. But with the aircraft smashed, the sick and suffering engineer had to be left on one of the wings of the machine until the next day. Then the tent and the whole camp were moved to the plane and the shelter was spread over Cecconi's couch on the wing of the plane.

Days of Despair. Lieut. Lundborg gave his vivid description of dreadful days of despair which followed. Fog prevailed daily and prevented rescue parties from seeing them. Shifting winds loomed the ice around the camp and the rising and falling of the ice added to the depressing misery of the party. The food began to run low and they were placed on short rations of chocolate, corned beef, biscuits and polar bear meat.

The ice breaker Krasin was expected but failed to appear. To make their distress more acute, they could see Cape Leigh Smith on North East land, only ten miles away but miles of such risk and tragic possibility that they dared not attempt to cover them. "I am glad now," said Lieut. Lundborg, "that I resisted the temptation to try to walk to land, a temptation to which Dr. Finn Malmgren, Captain Alberto Mariano and Captain Philippe Zepi succumbed."

After telling of his own rescue by Lieut. Rhyber, Lundborg continued:

"The whole tragedy now seems the greatest in the history of modern arctic exploration. Every day now more or less fog and planes are handicapped in their rescue work."

"It is now forty-one days since Dr. Malmgren and his two mates set out on their fatal walk toward the land that seemed so near to them. They were poorly equipped in every way and must certainly have perished."

"The Italians in the ship who drifted away after the gondolas was torn loose, must also be considered lost. There were six men in that group."

"The dog team expedition of Captain Sora, with the Norwegians Varming and Vandengen, in all probability perished."

"There is very little hope of finding alive Roald Amundsen and the five men who were with him in the French plane piloted by Rene Guilbaud."

"The five survivors of the Italia under Lieut. Vigliani have now been camping on the ice forty-five days and the chief hope for their rescue is the ice breaker Krasin."

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, July 10. (AP)—The cotton market recovered today a god part of yesterday's decline. Further liquidation was readily absorbed, prices advancing to 21.94 for October contracts in late trading on covering of rebuying of recent sellers. October closed at 21.91, the general market closing very steady at net advances of 26 to 32 points.

The opening was firm at an advance of 7 to 16 points in response to the relatively firm showing of Liverpool and reports of further rains in the eastern belt. Initial buying was quickly supplied by further liquidation inspired by the unexpectedly large government acreage figures yesterday, but the market seemed to attract an additional amount on comparatively moderate setbacks. Offerings tapered off in a manner which some local traders regarded as indicating that the bulk of the long cotton disturbed by yesterday's developments had been liquidated, and this view of the technical position, no doubt, contributed to the advance which followed.

The detailed weather reports showing considerable precipitation in eastern belt sections, together with the outlook for further showers in that part of the south, encouraged the rally, while there may have been some buying on private figures estimating the world's consumption of American lint cotton for May at 1,263,000 bales compared with 1,167,000 for April and 1,428,000 for May last year.

Pink Parrish President Of New Residence Area

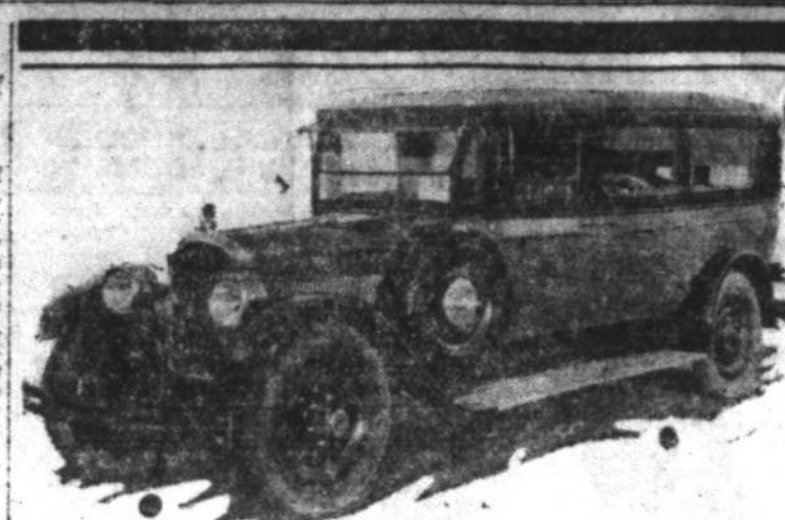
