

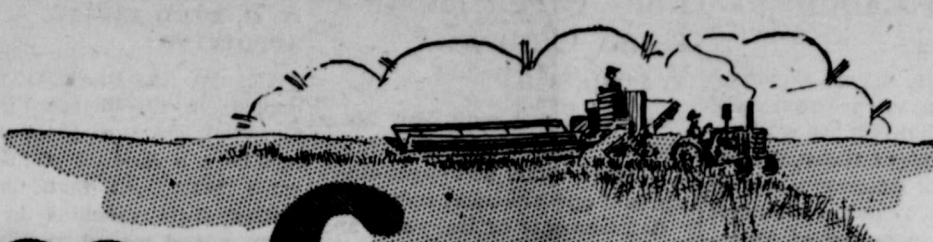

Engineer Visited Proposed Sight For Dam

M. G. Barclay and H. B. Southwood of the Bureau of Reclamation from Oklahoma City visited here last Thursday. The two engineers visited the proposed site for a dam on the Tule Canyon.

A Tule Canyon Dam Association was organized here in August and committees have been studying the possibilities for some time.

The two men were from the Bureau of Reclamation and Mr. Barclay is in charge of the Oklahoma City office. Mr. Southwood is Reports Writer for the Oklahoma City Division.

The engineers spent several hours here last Thursday conferring with local men and visiting the site. They were impressed with the natural site for a dam. The possibility of providing water for irrigation at a reasonable cost was the main problem that Barclay pointed out. He suggested however that the site would make a very good state park and that further study and work should be carried on in regard to the matter.

October 10, Closes Dove Season

Dove season will close at sunset October the 10th. The season on Brant, Coot, Ducks and Geese will open November 5 to January 3, both dates inclusive. Exception: no open season on black-bellied tree ducks.

Shooting Hours: On Nov. 5, from 12:00 o'clock noon to sunset; all other days of season one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag and Possession Limits are as follows:

Coot: 10 Per day or in possession.

Ducks: 5 per day, 10 in possession, including no more than one wood duck, and not more than one hooded merganser.

Exception: American and red-breasted mergansers: 25 singly or in the aggregate per day, but no possession limit except on opening day. Hooded merganser or wood duck, one per day or in possession.

Geese and Brant: 5 in the aggregate per day or in possession, including in such limit not more than either 2 Canada geese (or its subspecies, Hutchins or cackling goose), or 2 whitefronted geese, or one of each.

F.H.A. Loans Set New Record For Year

Farmers Home Administration Loans in Fiscal 1954 Reached Record of \$292,452,800.

Farmers Home Administration lending operations reached an all-time high in fiscal 1954, Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson said today.

Loans made and insured by the agency totaled \$292,452,800, an increase of about 28 percent over the \$228,701,000 advanced in fiscal 1953, the year ending June 30, 1953. The 1953 total had been the largest amount loaned in any one year by the Farmers Home Administration or its predecessor agencies.

Approximately 131,000 farm families received loans from the agency during fiscal 1954 compared to about 108,000 in fiscal 1953. Including farmers who already had loans, some 243,000

families worked their farms during 1954 with Farmers Home Administration.

About two-thirds of the money advanced during 1954 was used by small farmers to improve their farms and farming operations. About one-third of the funds loaned were used by cattle-men and other farmers who had been hard hit by the drought and needed emergency credit to continue their operations. No loans of any type were made to farmers whose credit needs could be met by banks or other lenders.

A large proportion of total advances were made to veterans and other young farm families who are establishing better farm setups, and whose greatest needs were for adequate credit and some help in developing sound systems of farming and adopting efficient farm management practices.

Loans to help small farmers buy equipment, fertilizer, seed and pay other costs of improving their farm and home operations totaled \$147,354,700.

Despite the materially increased lending operations, the Farmers Home Administration cut its annual administrative costs by about \$4,000,000, Secretary Benson said. Combining four area finance offices and the national finance division into one national office located in St. Louis accounted for a large part of the savings. Reorganization of the national and State offices also contributed, as did other streamlining activities including elimination of duplicate forms and files. Administration of the Agency's program is being placed closer to the farmers by giving county supervisors the power of final approval on a large number of loans.

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon



Drop rounded teaspoonsful about 2 inches apart on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake at 400° F. for 8 to 10 minutes.

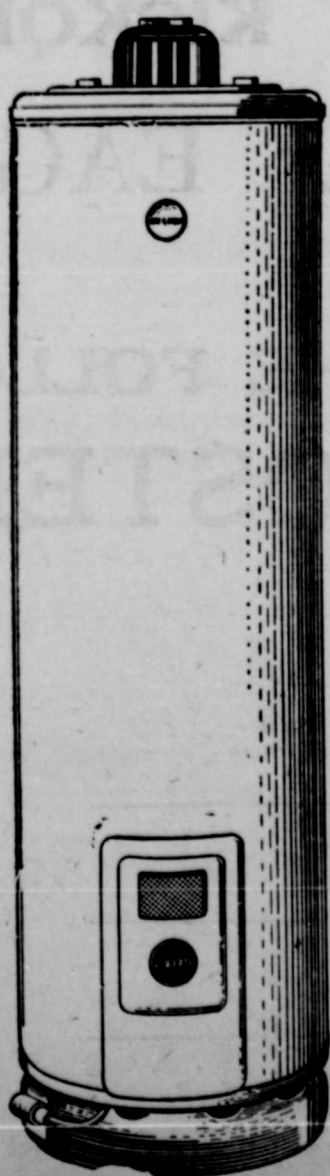

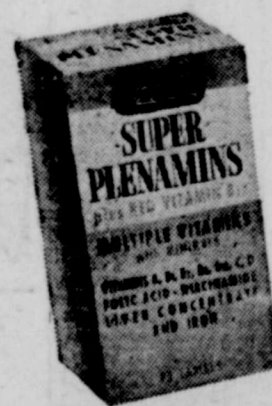
