WORK OF FIRE DEPARTMENT SAVES BLOCK FROM DISASTROUS BLAZE

Chillicothe Eagles' Claws;---Play Seymour Friday

Fire Confined To One Building

\$5,000 LOSS

Local firemen kept a fire which originated in the building occupied by Bartley and Ivey on Main street, from consuming the entire block Monday night about 10:20.

The fire department was notified that flames and smoke were pouring from the building and the fire fighting equipment arrived in time to prevent the loss of the entire block.

The flames, believed to have started from an explosion, destroyed the structure housing a cafe, liquor store and second story hotel in the 100 block on Main street. The sudden blast shattered window glass more than 50 feet and could be heard for several blocks. The damage was estimated at approximately \$5,000.

The building at which the explosion was reported to have occurred was owned by Willis Bartley, who with Dee Ivey and Mutt Holcomb, operated a cafe and beer parlor.

A vacant building to the west suffered damage to its roof and side wall. The City Grocery and Market on the east side was only slightly damaged. The roof and walls received the damage.

Origin of the fire has not been determined but it is presumed that the explosion was caused by an accumulation of gas under the floor.

The building and contents were partially covered by insurance.

SHAFER HOME DESTROYED
The department answered a call at 8:00 o'clock Monday morning to West Main street to extinguish a blaze at the home of Joe Shaffer. The house and contents were practically destroyed. The fire originated from an explosion of an oil stove.

Mr. Shaffer lives there alone. He had lighted the stove and gone back to bed when he heard the explosion. He attempted to throw the oil container out of the window when it dropped on the floor. There was no insurance on the building and furniture.

Rapist Given Life Sentence

CONVICTED UNDER REPETITION ACT

Wichita Falls, Oct. 24—R. L. (Bob) Hash, 62, was given life imprisonment as mandatory punishment after conviction Tuesday afternoon in a jury verdict returned before Judge Irvin J. Vogel in the 78th district court following speedy trial on a charge of statutory rape under the repetition of offenses act. The jury took the case at 5 o'clock, and returned its verdict one hour later.

The defendant was on the witness stand nearly an hour early Tuesday afternoon, the state having rested before the noon intermission. He admitted having been frequently in the company of a 13-year-old girl on the premises of an industrial plant here where he had been employed many years prior to his arrest last July 14. He said she was his "girl friend" for a considerable period.

The girl, presented by the state as prosecutrix, related that for more than a year she had been party to illicit relations with the defendant. She said Hash usually gave her a dollar each time she visited him. Last spring, she said, he bought her a \$37.95 bicycle, and later traded it for another bicycle costing \$41.95. Hash said he gave her the gift just as "a friend."

The state, through District Attorney Z. D. Allen, read to the jury a statement, which Allen said Hash signed, telling of the latter's relations with the prosecutrix.

The defendant was convicted Nov. 14, 1937, in this county on a statutory rape charge. Conviction under the current indictment, made life imprisonment a mandatory sentence because of the repetition of offenses clause.

Morrison's speech will be delivered in connection with the unveiling of a plaque of the U. S. constitution which has been erected in Memorial auditorium. Adj. Hal Ingue of the Salvation Army will offer the invocation at the ceremony.

Wilburn Page, manager of the chamber of commerce, said that most of the ceremonies, including a large parade, would take place between 9:30 and 12 a. m. on November 11.

Huge Parade
The parade will be composed of bands, Boy Scouts, veterans' organizations and floats. Merchants will be invited to sponsor floats for the procession, Page said.

State Fair Breaks All Time Records

Dallas, Oct. 24—Breaking its all time attendance record and going over the million mark for the fifth time, the State Fair of Texas ended here Sunday night with the final reading on the gates, 1,036,938, eight thousand more than ever passed through the gates during a 16-day interval before.

Not only was the attendance remarkable at the 51st Annual State Fair, but a remarkable program was offered in practically every department. More space was sold than ever before, more concessions, and the State Fair offered more new features than had ever before been offered.

It gave the southwest the greatest livestock show ever seen, which was headed by the National Hereford Show. Hardly had the livestock moved off the grounds, Sunday, but livestock leaders were busy planning a "bigger and better" show for next year.

More than seventy county exhibits were shown and made one of the most astounding pictures of farm life ever seen any place. The county exhibits were augmented by individual farm exhibits, future farmer and 4-H club exhibits.

The Poultry show was filled to capacity. The day this department opened more than 1700 en-

Blessings Under Democracy

It is well for our people to remember that under the benefits of our Democracy the cause of labor is represented by various organizations, in laws for the protection of labor, organized or unorganized, enacted by the Congress of the United States and by the legislatures of the States, and by a department whose leader is a member of the President's Cabinet and by labor departments in the various states of the Union. But back of the organizations, behind the laws and secretaries and commissioners of labor, stand the men and women of labor's increasing ranks.

Since men first undertook to break the bonds of slavery under every country on the globe and in every state in the Union, it has been fully demonstrated that when toilers by hand and by brain stand united, unselfishly and courageously strive together—and do not sit down—they conquer, they triumph, they succeed. Labor, wisely led by statesmen and patriots, is invincible. No more can labor divided against itself survive than can a house divided against itself stand the driving storm.

In 1932 an overwhelming majority of our population demonstrated by their votes that they were discontented with conditions under the administration of the Republican party. Labor expressed itself at the polls then and again expressed the same sentiment four years later. The people wanted security of livelihood—a chance to work. The unemployed wanted jobs or unemployment insurance. Those employed wanted adequate wages and security in their jobs. The farmers wanted protection from exploitation. They wanted at least cost of production for their crops and a decent standard of living for themselves and their families. The small industry and merchant asked safeguards against destructive competition of billion dollar corporations and the oppressed minority asked a chance in this democracy.

American producers, industrialists, clerical and professional, farmers and farm workers and labor the nation around are keenly interested in the policies and actions of the U. S. congress, of the legislatures and of labor departments. As President Roosevelt recently declared: "Special unrest and a deepening sense of unfairness are dangers to our national life."

I Give You Texas

More memories of a newspaperman:

The time when, as a small town editor, it was my good fortune to scoop the star journalist of Texas in his own newspaper. He was sent to Eastland by a metropolitan newspaper to "cover" the trial of the Santa Claus bank bandit but, figuring the jury would be out a good while, the staff correspondent wandered over to Breckenridge. The jury came in unexpectedly and, seeing that he wasn't there, I called his paper by long distance telephone and gave the verdict. The first he knew of it was when he saw the big headline in his paper.

But I know how he felt: As the one-man news department of the Ranger Times, I okayed the first copy of the paper off the press one afternoon, then I sauntered up town to a friend's office. A few minutes later, I heard a newsboy yelling, "Ranger man commits suicide!" Knowing I had handled no such story I ran out, bought a paper and—sure enough—there it was.

Here's the way it had happened: Right after I left the office George Manning, the advertising manager (now publisher at Overton), came in with the news as he had been passing right after the man had shot himself; then Ernest Glazner, linotype operator, wrote the story, Joe Thompson set it up; Whitley Hicks, the foreman, wrote the headline, pulled out a feature yarn on Page 1 to make room for the suicide story, and there it was—the editor scooped in his own paper. The only consolation was that it had taken four men to do it!

Which calls to mind the story of the negro accused of beating up a negro woman. The defendant explained to the judge:

"Yoah honoh, she promised me ef I would git her a set o' false teeth that she'd marry me and I got her a set of teeth whut cost me \$40 and then she thowed me ovah. Yistiddy I seen her wid anoder niggah and she grinned at me—grinned at me wid my own teeth, and I knocked h— out o' her!"

Most vivid recollection of the 1938 campaign: Ralph Yarborough's closing speech in Austin's Woodridge Park the night before the first primary. In the midst of his address, a heavy rain struck but the candidate, bare-headed and unsheltered, kept on speaking as the program was going over the radio. Most of the audience ran to their cars and listened there, honking their horns when the candidate for Attorney General made a telling point. But fully 200 persons huddled under the scant protection of the trees and, though soon dripping wet, they laughed and cheered. With such devotion as that from the home folks, no wonder Yarborough received 71 per cent of the votes in his home county against four opponents.

Interesting facts about Texans: N. H. Pierce, Menard publisher, used to be a wrestler; look at his Gibraltar-like figure, 240 pounds, and you won't doubt that he went two hours to a draw with a grappler who had held Champion Strangler Lewis to a tie.

Captain Aldrich of the Texas Rangers has one of the finest collections of Texas books in existence.

Amon Carter used to sell crayon enlargements of photographs.

And I should like to be recognized long enough to express my bitter resentment at being charged 15 cents for a hamburger in Austin—at a sandwich stand, at that. Any place so snooty that it

feels called upon to charge more than a dime for a hamburger is too high-toned to be selling such a plain, democratic product as a hamburger, anyway.

One of the most interesting hotels in Texas is the Excelsior at Jefferson. Part of the structure was erected before the Civil War. Between the hotel and the lone-some old Federal building (Jefferson once had a population of 30,000 but now has only a few thousand inhabitants), there are Texas fushias, like red rose-buds; the variegated pinks and yellow of lantanas; and periwinkles, white roses, marigolds, Mexican sunflowers and morning glories—(somebody told me what the flowers were, all but the morning glories—we had those in Arkansas, too.)

On the veranda is a large cage containing a hundred canaries. Their ancestors were there 50 years ago, twittering and fluttering about.

Some of the furniture is 150 years old and the register contains the names of General Grant, Jacob Astor, W. H. Vanderbilt and Jay Gould. At the bottom of a page, Gould wrote "End of Jefferson, Texas." The railroad builder was angry because the city wouldn't provide the bonus he thought it should for building a railroad and that marked the beginning of Jefferson's decline.

The rooms of the Excelsior have no keys and have never been locked—not even when the town experienced a recent oil boom.

Parents Urged To Immunize Against Diphtheria

One preventable disease, diphtheria, has been responsible for 1,279 deaths in Texas during the past four years, according to the records of the Texas State Department of Health. The majority of these deaths were among children less than four years old, and were all preventable had these children been properly immunized prior to contracting the disease.

Prevention of diphtheria in children is a simple matter of inoculation with toxoid. If your child is six months old or more, take him to your family physician and have diphtheria toxoid administered. The technique of in-

oculation causes the child no discomfort. In approximately 99 per cent of children receiving toxoid, there will be established a life-time immunity to the disease.

To be sure that this immunity has been established in your child, six months after the first dose of toxoid, he should be taken to the physician to be Schick tested to determine his positive immunity against diphtheria. The test consists of injecting a few drops of diphtheria toxin between the layers of the skin. If the child is immune no reaction will be noted. If not, there will appear some redness at the site of injection in three or four days.

Increased education of the general public on the importance of diphtheria inoculation has resulted in decreased death rates from diphtheria. Year by year mortality from diphtheria is decreasing, as witness the fact that in Texas 457 children died from

diphtheria in 1935; 351 in 1936; 238 in 1937; and 233 in 1938.

You can help the Texas State Health department attain a goal of not one death a year from diphtheria, and protect your loved ones by seeing that they are immunized at once.

This house is now on display in the International Building at Rockefeller Center, New York. For the first time, a series of rooms has been built around the washable idea. In the house, which includes a living room, dining room, bedroom, kitchen, laundry space and numerous closets, all wall coverings, draperies, curtains and fabrics are washable.

It is called the House Beautiful Ivory Washable House, the research facilities of the Proctor and Gamble laboratories having been used to test the furnishings. All materials included were tubed, scrubbed, checked and tested for wearability, color-proof standards, fade-proof qualities and general appearance after washing.

In the development of this functional idea of easy cleaning with pure soap and water, decoration improved rather than suffered. It is now possible to use light and formerly fragile colors freely, with the assurance that they will stay "fresh" indefinitely and can be easily renewed. The colors in the house are especially arresting.

A convenience room is House Beautiful's special contribution to the housewife's peace of mind. The small room with its snowy white walls and blue flowered draperies is the homemaker's office. It houses her sewing machine in an attractive mahogany cabinet and has shelves for cookbooks, account books and other paraphernalia, as well as a large, subdivided, departmentalized closet with a place for all the awkward equipment requisite to home management, including garden tools.

The washable idea in decoration is certain to find immediate favor with all progressive homemakers and particularly in homes where there are children who are apt to take heavy toll of less practical decoration.

Decorators and housewives alike who have feared that washability would impart a clinical atmosphere to a home will be impressed by the beauty and livability of all furnishings in the display. The House Beautiful Ivory Washable House is a functional working model, adaptable to any part of the country, all climates and geographical conditions and to a large range of incomes. The display will be open to the public until the close of September.

TEXAS OUT-O-DOORS

Austin, Oct. 24— (Special) —

Texas continues to be one of the leading duck hunting states in the Union, a report received by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission discloses. The Lone Star State was fifth in the sale of Federal duck stamps for the fiscal year ending June 30, with 58,704. Minnesota showed the way with a total of 116,461; Michigan was second, having a total of 80,458, and its neighbor, Wisconsin, was third with 79,688. California ranked fourth with a total of 63,394.

During the last five seasons hunters purchased almost three and a half million of the duck stamps. Over that lengthy period, Texas ranked sixth with a total of 208,100. Duck stamp sales show that each year since 1935 there has been an increase in the number of sportsmen who attempted to bag migratory waterfowl in the United States. Last year a total of 1,002,715 stamps were issued.

Just because the season is open is not a sign that all, even ardent, sportsmen take the field. It is generally recognized that in many sections of Texas the doves are still nesting when the season opens in September. Therefore, a group of men who are known as the "Knights of the Sixteen-Gauge Guns" who live in Weimar, Texas, are opposed to hunting birds when the feathered tribe has not finished its job of family raising. So numerous Weimar hunters are awaiting another date on the calendar— December 1, when the quail season gets under way.

While it is still some time until the duck season gets under way, November 15, a good many sportsmen are purchasing their Federal duck stamps early, according to reports received by the Game department. Many postoffices report double their sales at the same time last year.

Cooperation plus— The telephone company at San Angelo, Texas, now includes in its telephone directory a full page of State game and fish laws.

Now is the time for landowners to start thinking about feeding quail during the rugged days of winter. With a marked increase in bobwhites being reported from most sections of Texas, it is more necessary than ever to leave food standing for these birds, it is pointed out by the Executive secretary of the Game department. A few rows of grain left standing at the field edges, close to natural cover, is the best insurance possible for carrying over the game and insectivorous birds.

Emergency feeding is not nearly as effective as proper preparation against food shortages, the Executive secretary pointed out. One of the best plans is that of leaving small grains near the edges of the fields. Hundreds of farmers in Texas are building shelters for quail under the supervision of the Game department and all indications are that quail are in for a healthy cycle in Texas.

Boys in Austin, Texas, are giving a vivid demonstration of how birds can assist small and large landowners alike. This group of hustling boys rent ducks to housewives who turn the birds into their gardens. The ducks make a clean sweep of all insects without destroying the plants, and, incidentally, bring their owners 50¢ per day in rental fees. Texas has a large number of insectivorous birds and it is estimated by biologists that the birdlife of the State is worth 16¢ per acre for every acre in the Lone Star state due to their insect devouring habits.

It is rather unusual how sportsmen from the communities band up in picking their sites for hunting. As an example, of 258 Dallas sportsmen checked on their file cards in the office of the Game department, only seven hunted deer in the Trans-Pecos last year, the remainder going to the Hill Country. Of the 208 Fort Worth sportsmen checked, 54 hunted in the Hill Country and the remainder in the Trans-Pecos.

Whether the cutting of large trees is detrimental to the squirrel crop in Texas will be determined by Regional Game Biologists who have started a squirrel and squirrel nest count in Robinson and Leon counties, where considerable logging is being started.

The total squirrel populations of these counties will be determined before a large amount of timber is taken and another count will be made when the woods have been considerably thinned by the felling of large trees to be made into ties, crates and boxes.

It is not definitely known

whether the cutting is detrimental or is an aid. It is possible that the thinning of timber will increase the available food supply for the little "nut-eaters", or again it may be that too many suitable nesting sites are removed and the squirrel population will be hard hit.

When a train conductor stops his string of freight cars almost daily and uses the hoboos riding the train to sweep out grain so that wild turkeys may be fed, the Game department feels that it is getting cooperation of the highest caliber. That is exactly what is happening in Archer county. The state Game Warden at Wichita Falls recently noticed the train halted near a river and dust flying out of the doors of several cars. Upon investigation he found that the conductor had about half a dozen hoboos sweeping out grain from grain cars to feed a bunch of wild turkeys that use that area. Questioned, the conductor said that he had heard the warden's plea, last winter when snow was on the ground, about feeding wild life and decided that every time he had any empty grain cars on his train he would make use of the hoboos riding by having them sweep out the cars at a place where he knew turkeys were ranging. There are approximately 40 turkeys in this bunch which are being fed in such an unusual way.

Several ring-necked pheasants released in Colorado county last year have nested and brought on 41 young birds, it is reported to the Game department. It appears Colorado county may be one of the few places in Texas where pheasants will survive.

The State Game department has issued a warning to hunters that erroneous information concerning the bag limits on ducks and geese has been printed on the backs of the State hunting licenses. Between November 15 and December 29, the season on ducks and geese in Texas, sportsmen will be allowed 10 ducks in one day or 20 in possession. They will also be allowed 4 geese a day or 8 in possession. However, canvasbacks, redheads, buffleheads and ruddy ducks have special limits. Only 3 of any one of these kinds or an aggregate of 3 of them may be taken in one day and 6 is the possession limit.

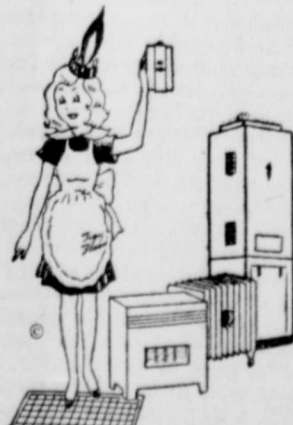

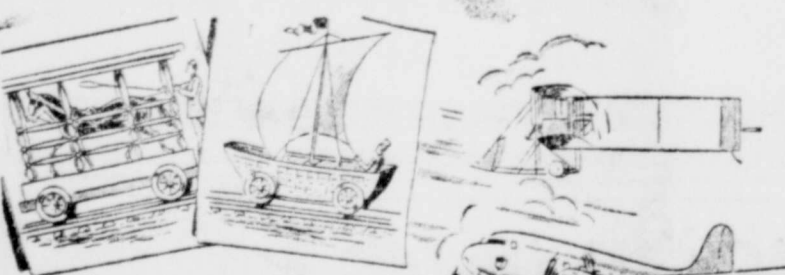

WHAT IS AUTHORITY?

By O. D. DIAL, Minister

No doubt one of the greatest
errors in our modern times is the
failure of many to recognize au-
thority, and their failure to sub-
mit to it. The great question is,
"What constitutes authority?"

Authority is divided into two
classes. The first is prime or ab-
solute authority, and the other is
"delegated" authority. Of course,
to God belongs the first, since He
is the Divine Creator, possessor,
and ruler of the universe. By de-
legated authority, we mean au-
thority that God has delegated
to others. For instance, God has
delegated "civil authority" to the
civil government. To direct civil
matters, God has authorized civil
government and has delegated
authority to it to direct and con-
trol all civil matters.

God has therefore ordained civil
government and binds upon all
men allegiance to this authority,
just so long as the civil govern-
ment does not exceed its dele-
gated authority. Civil govern-
ment then must never go beyond
civil rule. It must never venture
into the realm of spiritual or re-
ligious matters, for God has not
delegated to it that authority.

Just so long then as our civil au-
thorities stay within the bounds
of civil matters, God has com-
manded all to recognize and sub-
mit to this authority. We trans-
gress God's law when we fail to
obey our civil law. Let no one
dare to abuse those authorities
who have the rule over us. Let
those who curse and abuse the
government remember that God
commands our allegiance to our
civil government. This includes
all authorities from the president
of the nation down to the con-
stable in our precinct. Please
read carefully the following scrip-
tures. Rom. 13:1-7. 1 Pet. 2:13-14,
17. Mt. 22:21.

We will of course remember
that this duty of submission to
civil authority is when civil
authorities do not exceed their
authority. Fascism, Nazism, and
Communism, exceed their author-
ity, and venture into spiritual
and religious matters. In this case
read Acts 4:13-21. Ocs 5: 28-29.

Let us remember that the
church, as such, must not attempt
to rule in civil matters, nor must
the civil government attempt to
rule the church. Each have sepa-
rate and distinct fields in which
to work. Christians may as "citi-
zens," we are sure, have a voice
in civil matters, but let him do it
as a citizen and leave the church
out of it. Let preachers and
churches as such, stay out of po-
litics and all civil matters, and
let all civil authorities, as such,
stay out of the religious field. Let
neither tread upon the authority
of the other. It was the error of
connecting state and church in the
days of Constantine, that later
led to the corruption and horrors
of the dark ages.

When we come to spiritual mat-
ters, there is but one authority,
and that is Divine authority. God
has, since the death of His Son,
delegated all spiritual authority
to His Son, Jesus Christ. Mt. 28:
18. We must then, today, hear
him. Mt. 17:5, Heb. 2:1-3. Christ
has supreme power and author-
ity and he has laid down his law
in his word. No one has the au-
thority to alter or change that
word, in any sense, to add to it
or take from it any portion. No
man has the authority to go be-
yond that which is written.

Not even a pope, priest, synod,
conference, preacher, pastor, or
layman, has been given the au-
thority to change the word of
God, either by addition or by
subtraction, or going beyond the
word of God. No individual or
group of individuals has ever been
given the authority to change the

Nobody's Business

By JULIAN CAPERS JR.

The firm belief that there will be no special session of the Texas legislature was virtually unanimous among political observers at Austin, following the visit of Lieutenant Governor Coke Stevenson, of Junction, and his statement to the press after the conference with Gov. O'Daniel. Stevenson told reporters that unless an agreed plan of taxation can be worked out in advance of a special session, it "would be a waste of time" to call the session.

Stevenson is a conservative in his legislative views, holding to much the same beliefs as the large interests which have been seeking ever since O'Daniel was inaugurated to write into the fundamental law of the land. He represented a conservative constituency, made up of large ranch owners while in the house. He believes in a sales tax, and in his strenuous runoff campaign against Pierce Brooks, the large interests of the state which have long sought to replace ad valorem state taxes with a sales tax, came loyally to Stevenson's aid. Gov. O'Daniel endorsed Stevenson, and the belief of many observers here is that the endorsement was a major factor in Stevenson's winning.

Coke's Position Curious

There is some disposition to wonder, however, how the Lieutenant Governor, who is an able lawyer and a real authority on the Texas constitution, can consistently advocate that the legislators abrogate their constitutional oath of office, waive their rights as law-makers, and commit themselves blindly in advance to a taxation bill proposed by the chief executive. Observers feel reasonably certain that a majority of neither house nor senate will do so. The logical step then, for O'Daniel, is to announce this fact, declare he cannot get the legislators to agree, and refuse to call a session. The political strategy of such a course is good. The vast

majority of laymen do not understand the legal separation of the functions of the executive and the legislative branches. They do not know that the legislators are supreme in matter of taxation, and that the constitution inhibits any such subversive course as O'Daniel requests, even if they were willing to accede to his request.

Freight Rate Action

The Texas Railroad Commission made history this week when it ordered abolished on intrastate freight shipments the 15 percent differential now charged in certain West Texas territory and the Rio Grande Valley by the railroads. The roads imposed this extra charge years ago, on the theory that a higher rate was justified in a sparsely settled region. Population increases in the valley and West Texas have largely eliminated the excuse for the gouge, and the Commission ruled it could no longer be collected by the railroads.

Mann Rides Again

Jerry Mann, the triple-threat Attorney General, scored another large gain for the farmers of Texas, unless the courts later declare the play offside, when he filed suit against eleven rice milling concerns, charging violation of the state's anti-trust laws. Mann accuses the rice millers of

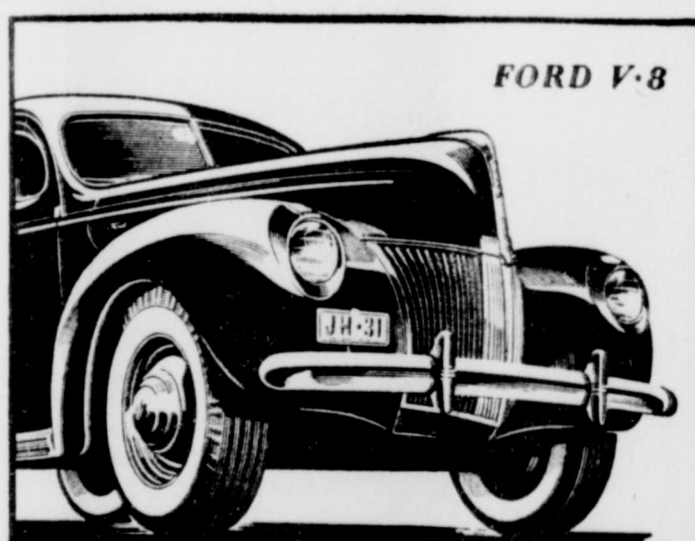

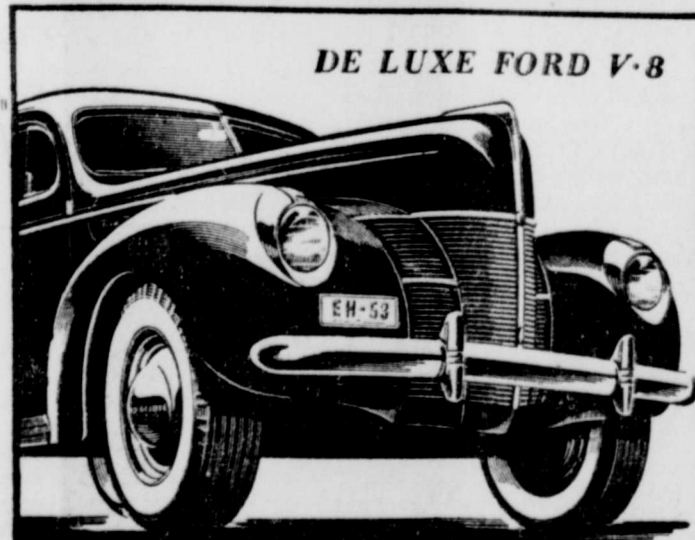
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
