Pageant Set

Nazareth's annual Nativity Pageant is scheduled for two presentations, Sunday and Tuesday, Dec. 21 and 23. Both services are at 8 p.m. in Holy Family Church.

Residents of the community have been busily preparing the ninth annual

presentation. Visitors from all over the Panhandle-South Plains area have attended each year. The program is open to the public with no admission charge.

All performers in the pageant are local residents. The production's elaborate costumes and stage settings are made by Nazareth residents. The choir, under the direction of Sharon Brockman, has been rehearsing the special pageant music for several months. Music composed especially for the production will be heard, along with traditional hymns of the season.

The pageant portrays prophecies of Christ's birth, his infancy and childhood. The same general program of stage action is followed each year, but additions and improvements are made constantly.

Mitchell Dies, Interim Sheriff To Be Appointed

Memorial rites were held Tuesday in First United Methodist Church in Dimmitt for Joe Ben Mitchell, sheriff elect of Castro County.

Mr. Mitchell died Sunday in Plains Memorial Hospital of an apparent massive heart attack.

According to District Attorney Jimmy Davis, the State Constitution calls for county commissioners to appoint an interim sheriff to serve until the next election in 1982.

Commissioners were to meet Wednesday to name an interim sheriff. At press time Tuesday, two applications for the post had been received by the court.

Exceptional Children Aided By Special Education

Hart schools, in cooperation with other schools in Castro County, have been providing educational programs and services that meet the needs of exceptional children for the past seven years through a unique delivery of special services known as Plan A.

Under Plan A, educational services are delivered to handicapped students, ages 3 to 21. Most of the children who are in this program are learning disabled, some have minor speech problems, and a very few are severely handicapped. The earning disabled children received special assistance in resource rooms for brief periods each day with teachers trained to work with these type students.

Hart schools have an Early Childhood unit under Plan A. In this unit children who are ages 3-5 received special help that will prepare them for regular school kindergarten. These children are placed in this program to overcome handicaps of a developmental nature, mostly, such as speech.

Speech Therapy is provided in Hart ISD by a speech pathologist who screens all children in the district through grade six. Those children who exhibit the greatest need for speech therapy are placed in therapy until the disability has been corrected.

At the present time, some 110 students ages 3-21 are in special education in Hart. Most of these children have minor disabilities that have the possibility of being alleviated by the programs and services provided by regular and special education.

Hart is a member of the Castro County Comprehensive Educational Cooperative. This cooperative was formed to give all children an opportunity to have access to programs and services that are appropriate for each student's educational needs.

Recipe Revue

Recipes for good eating during the holidays or at anytime. Clip them and save.

Myrt Loman shares these simple but delicious goodies.

TING-A-LINGS

2 pkg butterscotch chips
1 6 oz size can sm cocktail peanuts, chopped
1 can chow mein noodles, 4 1/2 - 5 1/2 oz size, crushed slightly

Melt chips over hot water. combine peanuts and noodles with melted chips. Drop by spoonful on waxed paper. Let cool and store in cool place.

PEANUT CORN FLAKE CLUSTERS

28 caramels
2 T water in double boiler.
Combine caramels and water and melt stirring constantly. Add 1/2 c salted peanuts crushed over 7 c corn flakes in a big bowl. Toss until covered. For each cluster, dip out large spoonful. Drop on greased baking sheet and let stand until firm.

SCOTCH KRISPIES

Melt over hot (not boiling) water 1 6 oz pkg (1 c) Nestle's Butterscotch morsels and 1/2 c peanut butter. Stir until morsels melt and mixture is smooth. Transfer butterscotch mixture to large bowl. Add 3 cups Rice Krispies. Mix well. Press mixture into long flat baking dish. Let cool and cut into squares.

Patsy Warren shares these recipes that have been taste approved by her family.

FRUIT AND BOURBON COOKIES

Patsy Warren

1 c brown sugar (packed)
1/4 c butter or oleo
3 c flour, sifted
2/3 t soda dissolved in 3 T sweet milk
4 eggs, slightly beaten
1 t cloves
1 t allspice
1 t cinnamon
2 lbs pecans, chopped
1 lb candied cherries
1 lb candied pineapple
1/2 lb raisins

2/3 c bourbon

Mix all ingredients. Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet and bake 30 mins. at 250°.

MRS. DIRK'S CAKE

3 T lard
3 t cocoa
1 c sugar
2 eggs
1 t soda
1 t vanilla
1 c buttermilk or sour milk
1 c flour
1 t cinnamon
1 t allspice
1 t cloves
1 c raisins
1/2 c nuts

Mix all ingredients well. Add nuts and raisins. Pour in 8x8 greased and floured pan. Bake in 300° oven for 40 mins. Double recipe for 13x9. Ice with white plain icing if desired.

This recipe was my grandmother's. She got it from a Mrs. Dirk, so we always called it the Mrs. Dirk's cake.

PEANUT BRITTLE

3 c sugar
1 c white corn syrup
1 c water
2 1/2 c raw peanuts
2 T oleo
1 t salt
1 t soda

Cook sugar, corn syrup and water until it forms a hard ball in cool water or 250°-260° on candy thermometer. Add unblanched peanuts and continue cooking until mixture turns a golden brown or 300° on thermometer. Remove from heat and stir in oleo and salt. Stir in soda. Pour in 2 round buttered pizza pans or 2 large pans. Work with back of spoon till all foam is out. (unless you like it foamy) Cool and break in pieces.

When using the round pizza pans they make 2 large peanut patties which make great gifts.

DATE CAKE

1/4 c oleo
1/3 c oil
1 c Sugar Twin (3/4 c Sprinkle Sweet)
2 eggs

2 c flour
2 t soda
1 t cinnamon
1/2 t salt
1 lg box dates (unsweetened if available)
1 jar unsweetened applesauce
2 med bananas
pecans to taste

Beat sweetener, butter, eggs and add flour, soda, cinnamon and salt. Beat until well mixed. Stir in dates, applesauce, bananas and pecans. Bake in 350° oven 60-70 mins.

MAGIC COOKIE BARS

1 stk oleo, melted
1 1/2 c graham cracker crumbs
1 c walnuts or pecans, chopped
1 pkg chocolate chips
1 can flaked coconut
1 can Eagle Brand milk
Pour melted oleo in 13x9x2 pan. Sprinkle crumbs evenly over oleo. Sprinkle evenly with nuts. Scatter chocolate chips over nuts. Sprinkle evenly with coconut. Pour milk over all. Bake in 350° oven 25 mins. or until lightly browned on top. Cool in pan 15 mins. and cut into bars. Makes 2 dozen 1 1/2x3 bars.

Mrs. E.E. Davis' recipes are goodies for any time of year.

HONEY BALLS

1 c oleo melted
1 t salt
1/2 t salt
1/2 c honey
2 c flour
2 t vanilla
1 c (or more) chopped pecans
Cream together and chill 1 hr. or longer. Shape into balls and place on cookie sheet. Bake in 325° oven 20 mins.

BISCUIT MIX

(Keeps for months)
Mix thoroughly 8 c flour, 1/3 c baking powder, 2 t salt, 6 t sugar (optional),

and cut in 1 c shortening to a mealy consistency. Store on shelf or in refrigerator.

To make biscuits: Combine 1 c mix with 1/3 c milk. Roll out and cut as desired or use as drop biscuits. Delicious either way. Bake in 425° oven till desired brownness.

SHAKE AND BAKE MIX

4 c flour
4 c cracker meal
4 T salt
2 T sugar
2 T garlic powder
3 T paprika
2 T onion powder
1/4 c oil

Mix all together thoroughly. Store in air tight container in refrigerator or on shelf.

Edna Kittrell shares recipes for all cooks who have microwave ovens. These candies are easy to make and taste as though you spent lots of time making them.

FANTASTIC FUDGE

1 can sweetened condensed milk
18 oz chocolate chips
1 t vanilla
1 c chopped pecans
Microwave milk and chocolate on HIGH 2 min. Stir in vanilla and pecans. Pour into buttered dish. Chill. Cut into squares.

CHOCOLATE PEANUT CLUSTERS

4 oz semi sweet chocolate
4 oz milk chocolate
1 t oil
2 c cocktail peanuts (remove some salt by shaking nuts in strainer)
Combine chocolate and oil in glass bowl. Microwave on HIGH 1 1/2 min. Stir in peanuts and mix until coated. Drop by tablespoons onto waxed paper. Chill until firm. (You may use raisins, pecans, walnuts or granola instead of peanuts for an interesting variation.)

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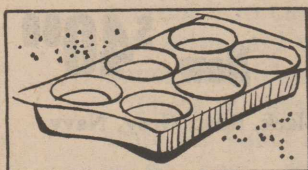
