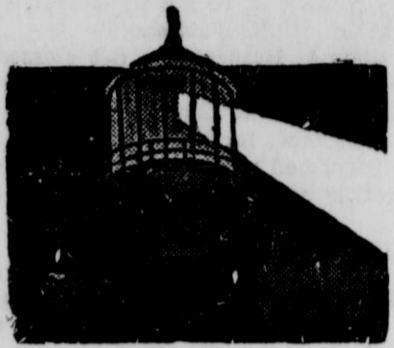

Here is the third installment concerning the amendments to the Texas State Constitution on November 3.

Amendment No. S-J.R. No. 15 (Authorizing the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops).

The proposed amendment to Article VIII, Section 1-d, of the Texas Constitution authorizes the legislature to provide by statute for the establishment of a uniform method of assessing ranch, farm, and forest lands based on the capability of the land to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than on the value of such lands and the crops growing on them. The present provision of the Constitution requires no enabling legislation since it prescribes in detail the procedures of designating land for agricultural use and the assessment of such land for tax purposes on the basis only of factors relative to such use.

Amendment No. 5-H.J.R. No. 28 (Authorizing any county to issue road bonds in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county under certain conditions).

The proposed amendment revises Article III, Section 52, to authorize any county to issue bonds, in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of real property in the county, for "the construction, maintenance, and operation of a macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of the majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county."

Ronald Jones scored three touchdowns for the Bulldogs to lead the scoring. His first TD came in the first quarter when he went over tackle for 44 yards. David Minton kicked the conversion.

Jones scored again in the 2nd quarter when he went in from 24 yards out. Minton ran in the points after the TD. Jones hit pay dirt again in the third quarter when he went in from 7 yards out. Minton again kicked the point after.

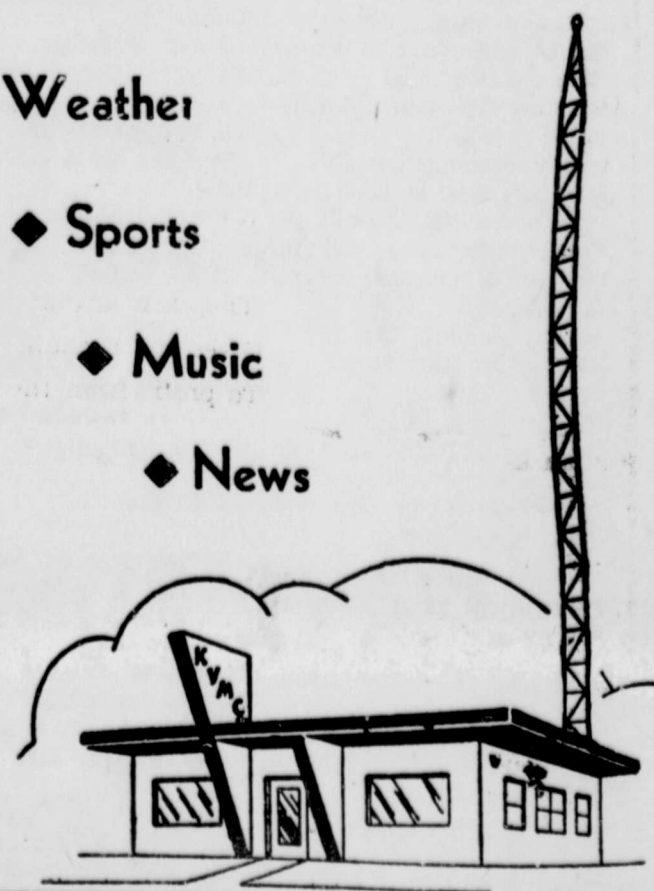

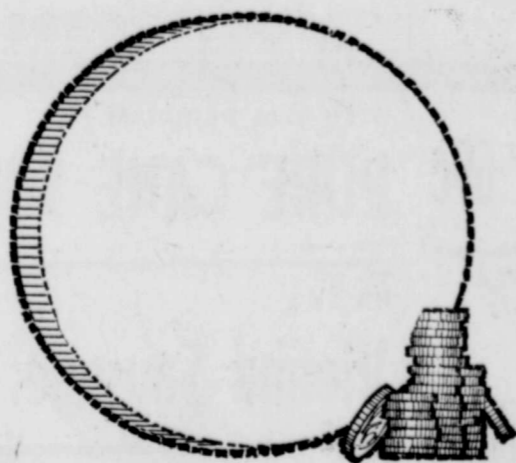
