Jeter Intercepts Pass And Scores in Last Quarter

Revealing some of the finer points of football, which the Class "A" Tivy Antlers of Kerrville were not up on, the Junction Eagles ran roughshod, and incidentally over a very hard field full of ravines, for a 26 to 6 post season victory in Kerrville Friday afternoon.

There was hardly a handful of Kerrville fans present to witness the Antler massacre—hardly as many as attend an average basketball game here.

Junction scored first when Leonard Dunbar took a pass from Captain Lawson Johnson and gained 21 yards for a touchdown. Harry Witt carried the ball over for extra point.

After a scoreless second period, Witt plunged over two yards for the second touchdown. He plunged the line for the extra point, making the score 14 to 0.

And in the fourth quarter, Captain Johnson plunged thru for the third touchdown. Ragland failed by inches to make the place kick for extra point.

In the last period, Tivy made their lone touchdown when J. C. Brown caught a 27-yard pass while standing on the Junction goal line.

The last touchdown of the game was the thriller for the Junction fans, but was more than just a touchdown for one of the players on the team who has been fighting all season, taking the blows and seldom being cheered by the fans. The touchdown that made a little individual football history for Wilbur Jeter, valuable center, started when Tivy tried to throw a forward pass. It somehow happened that the Tivy pass found a resting place in the arms of a Junction player that doesn't make a practice of lugging the ball. But he caught the ball on the 44 yard line, and raced the distance to the Tivy goal line and scored the final touchdown of the game and of the season for the Eagles. But it was the first touchdown for this hustling youngster that has learned a lot about football in the last four months. It was a treat for the Junction fans to see Jeter stretching out that 44 yards.

While the game Friday didn't offer much balm to the Eagles in a financial way, it gave them another decisive victory over an old foe of the gridiron. The football history of the Junction and Kerrville teams since 1923 is given below:

Hill and Combs Awarded Contract For New High School Building

Kimble County Teacher's Institute Held Here Thursday And Friday

Thursday morning at nine o'clock the Kimble County Teacher's Institute was convened at the courthouse in Junction with 24 teachers present.

An interesting program for the two-day session had been prepared by County Judge J. B. Randolph. The session was opened by a prayer and talk by Edgar McLendon, which was followed by addresses by Messrs. W. M. Bierschwale, N. H. Skaggs and Judge Randolph. During the morning and afternoon sessions, a round table discussion was held, when the teachers talked over the various problems which confront them in school work.

On Friday morning, Mr. Henry Bierschwale opened the session with a talk, and Mrs. Coke R. Stevenson read a Christmas selection. Mrs. W. P. Riley talked to the teachers of the importance of a Parent-Teacher's Association to a school and community.

Messrs. E. G. Alexander, G. W. Crofoot and Rankin Kothmann made short talks. Mrs. Olney Patterson gave an O'Henry selection and Marie Tracy gave a reading. A County Interscholastic League was formed on Friday and Mr. Orlan Stewart, principal of the Ivy School, was named the County Chairman. The various directors selected were: M. B. Bethel, county director; E. E. Morrison, athletic; Mrs. L. E. Stockard, Essays; Miss Eldon Claire Gough, Declamation; Guy C. Moses, Debate and Extemporaneous Speaking; W. L. Cooper, Spelling; Orlan Stewart, Threes R's; Miss Mary Hodges, Picture Memory Contest; Miss Ellouise Emery, Music Memory.

Judge J. B. Randolph, in closing the Institute, made a farewell address to the teachers, as he is retiring from office on January 1.

Construction Will Start On Or About First Of January

TO USE HOME LABOR

Light-Colored Face Brick Selected by School Board

At a meeting of the Junction School Board, held Friday evening, the contract for the proposed new high school building for Junction was awarded to Hill & Combs, General Contractors, Junction, Texas. Their bid was \$59,245.00, which was approximately \$1,550 lower than the average bid.

In a statement made by Luther Hill, home labor will be employed to as large an extent as possible, which will aid in a large measure in relieving the unemployed in Junction.

Phelps and Dewees, of San Antonio were architects for the building, and they are recognized as the foremost school architects in the state.

Construction on the building will start on the first of the year, or soon thereafter, and according to Mr. Hill, the building will be completed within six months after construction starts.

The structure will be of reinforced concrete with face brick and tile. Light colored bricks similar to the type used in the new courthouse have been selected. Floors will be of cement and composition tile and wood. An auditorium on the first floor will seat 500 people.

By choosing this particular time to build, contractors estimate that the school board is saving the people approximately 25 per cent on the building.

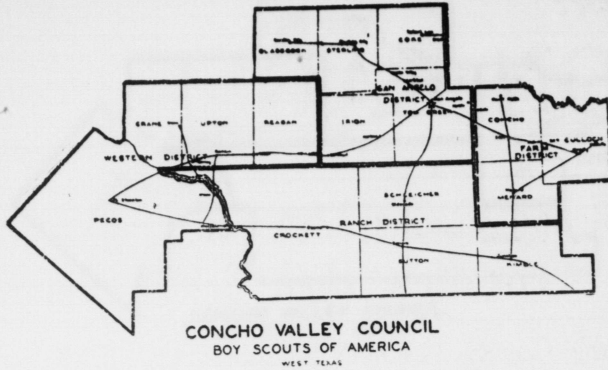

This map shows the territory which is included in the Concho Valley Council of which the local Boy Scout organization is a part.

There are four district organizations within the council. The western district is composed of the counties of Crane, Pecos, Reagan and Upton. The farm

district is composed of the counties of McCulloch, Concho, and Menard, and the Ranch District is composed of Crockett, Sutton, Schleider, and Kimble counties. The San Angelo district is composed of Tom Green, Coke, Irion, Sterling and Glasscock.

Concho Valley Council is 259 miles long and 129 miles wide, and contains 35,500 square miles. There are 35 units or troop organizations in the towns of the council. The Boy Scout Council is composed of 160 men of the towns of these counties and is governed by a body of eight directors.

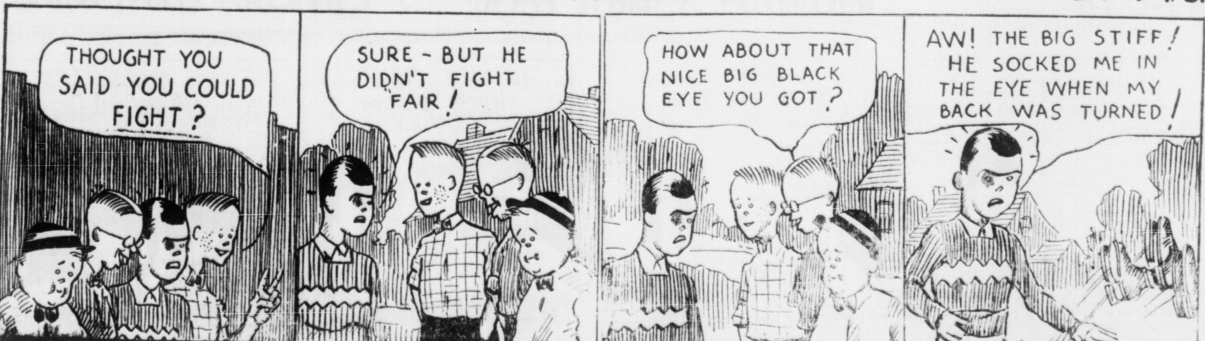

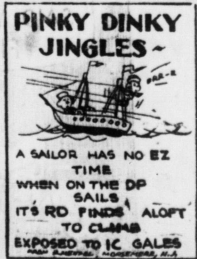
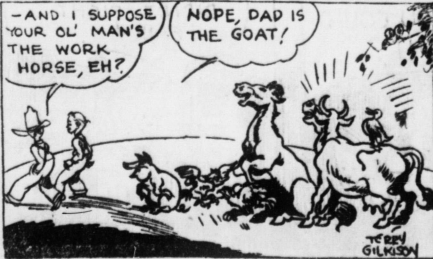

"The Home" Is Our Greatest Institution

It is estimated by reports to the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection that there are nearly 48,000,000 persons under the age of eighteen in this country. Upon the training that they receive depends the future of the nation. The question of whether or not tomorrow they will come into their maturity well equipped, with strong bodies, a good education and high ideals, ready to take their place in the industrial, political, and social life of the government, is largely determined by those who today are in position to direct their destinies.

The institution that exerts perhaps the largest influence over the lives of these future citizens is the home. Its trend in recent times can hardly be said to be encouraging. With the popularity especially in the larger cities, of the small apartment, in many cases both parents working, and the numerous outside attractions, the existence of a real home life is seriously threatened. It is now the exception to find a home in which the family altar is maintained. It is a far cry from the day when most families gathered around the fireside each evening to discuss family problems or to listen to passages read from the Bible. Now, one is more apt to find the mother and father at the bridge club, the older children at some night club, and the younger at the movies.

No doubt, this trend is reflected in our national life. The results can be seen in the fact that more than two hundred thousand of the juvenile population get into the courts in a year, and that 3 per cent of the elementary school enrollment are behavior-problems.

What can be done to remedy the situation? It is a field that legislation by the government, even if possible, would be of little avail. The responsibility of maintaining a home that furnishes a beneficial environment for the child must be borne by the individual parents. It is a duty that parents owe to the child and to the nation. The preservation of America's greatest institution—the home—is one that should demand the active interest and serious attention of every citizen.

ENCOURAGE THE PULLETS

The pullets in the poultry flock can be "egged" on to increased egg production in the winter by good housing conditions and regularity of feeding. Artificial lights may also be used, but the limit should usually be a 12-hour working day, and the length of day should be very gradually worked up to this point. Green feed in the ration tends to increase their appetites and to make them eat more mash. Remember that a good ration for laying stock should include scratch grains and a mash, meat food, green food, mineral food, grit, and drink. It is a good plan to give layers a daily supply of sprouted oats in the winter. The morning feed should be a light one so that the hens will be kept scratching most of the morning; and the evening feed of scratch grain should be sufficient to have the birds go to roost with full crops. The best material for the floor litter is wheat or oat straw, about 4 inches deep. Renew the litter when it gets damp and dirty; damp and dirty litter is not conducive to good egg production.

KNOW TEXAS

Texas gained 136,736 scholastics in the present year, bringing the total to 1,563,595—1,395,380 white and 258,215 colored.

Texas had 3,689,000 acres terraced on January 1, 1930 against 50,000 acres in 1916, demonstrating its interest in soil conservation.
