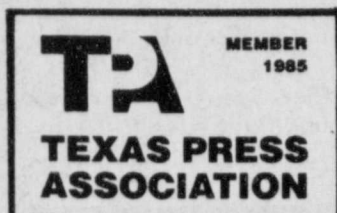

The Lamplighter

The subject today is letters to the editor. Or, at least the first part of the column will be devoted to the subject. Our policy in the future relative to letters to the editor will be essentially as follows:

First, we want to encourage as many letters as possible. We want to hear our readers' views. It is your paper, up to a point. But here will be the ground rules under which letters will be published. If you have a gripe, or if you have praise, about governmental policies at the city, county, state or national level, and if you feel strongly enough about your views to wish to share them with your fellow citizens, write us a letter. It will be published, providing you sign your name, and providing your letter does not reflect upon the personal honesty of people mentioned in your letter.

If you have views about what would be best for the community, concerning directions our city, county, state, or national leaders should follow, your letters will be welcomed and published.

If you have views on how we are doing our job here at the Hesperian, or at the Beacon, send them in. They too will be published. If you agree, or disagree, with the way we are doing our job, or positions on public policy we take here, your letters will be welcomed and published.

But there are things that must be understood by all concerned in this process. The letters should be as short as possible and to the point. The Editor has sole discretion over whether letters will be published, and that will be determined by several factors, including the length, the clarity, and the subject matter.

For instance: We will not become a sounding board for an argument between private citizens over issues that are not matters of public policy, and public concern. Those arguments can best be settled in other forums. If you are a farmer, and your neighbor insists on using your land as a turning area, don't complain to us and expect to see the letter published. We would certainly publish a letter in which one citizen sets forth his views on the practice itself, but we are not going to publish a letter in which farmer Jones complains about his neighbor, farmer Brown. The reasons should be obvious; we have no way of knowing who is right, and who is wrong in that kind of a situation, and we do not wish to become a party to any libel suit that might arise out of a squabble between two private citizens.

So I repeat, we welcome, and encourage letters to the editor. It would suit us fine if we were inundated with them each week. We feel that our subscribers are thoughtful people, interested in the affairs of their community. If they were not thoughtful people they would not be subscribers. And the community always benefits from hearing the views of thoughtful people.

I must confess that despite the many years I knocked around in the world of politics, I never have really understood the inner workings of the true blue politician's mind. Just when you think you have it figured out, they do something that confuses the picture.

Our governor is now in a snit because a couple of his Commissioners over at the Texas Employment Commission have decided to spend a lot of money to remodel their offices, and hire some more people. There is a dispute whether they are hiring eight more, or two more, or what ever. He vows he is going to make them explain the situation. The whole thing, naturally, was front page news down in Austin.

The money that the commissioners are blowing on this venture comes from the employers of Texas, people who pay into the TEC a "tax" on their employees salary, with the fund going to provide income for people who get laid off, or whose jobs are terminated. If an employer is late with his "tax" he is hit with a "penalty" and that money goes into a separate fund. I've never known what it is supposed to be used for, but now that fund has reached some \$4

Winners recognized at banquet

With 219 parents, 4-H, and FFA members in addition to the county agents, ag teachers, and stock show board members present the 41st annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show and Sale events came to an end last Tuesday night at the Farm Bureau sponsored Awards Banquet.

Highlighting this year's banquet was the awarding of the Sweepstakes trophy to Floydada FFA student Brent Williams. Along with the award this year a \$100.00 scholarship was also given by Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Burleson in memory of their son, Dusty. The scholarship fund was established by the Burlesons and will be given annually to the sweepstakes winner. County Agent Richie Crow has reported that money is already being donated for the scholarship to be given next year. In addition to the traveling trophy Williams was also given a plaque.

Another highlight of the banquet was the naming of the Stock Show Sweetheart, Kelli LaBaume. She received a

trophy and one dozen long stemmed red roses donated by Williams Florist in Floydada. Other contestants included Sherre Kinard, Nicki Race, and Lisa Smith.

Award recipients from Lockney included Matt Mitchell who received the sheep showmanship trophy, Troy Bigham the Grand Champion Barrow, Keri Dee Lusk the Reserve Grand Champion Lamb and Colt Golden the Reserve Grand Champion Steer trophies.

Other trophy recipients included Clay Harrison for the Reserve Breed Champion Chester White and Heath Rexrode the Reserve Breed Champion Duroc, Wymon Rexrode the Breed Champion Berkshire, Scott Howard the Breed Champion Chester White, Troy Bigham the Breed Champion Hampshire, and Boyd Jackson the Breed Champion Spotted Poland China, all barrows. Clay Adrian was the winner of the Swine Herdsman trophy.

In the lamb division Keri Dee Lusk had the Reserve Breed Champion

Hampshire, and Lisa Terrell the Reserve Breed Champion Finewool Cross.

Colt Golden showed the Breed Champion Angus and Troy Bigham the Reserve Breed Champion Angus.

In the judging contest Lockney had two boys that placed in the top three places. Matt Mitchell had second place in the lamb division. He had a total of 139 points in the lamb contest and an overall score of 344. Clay Adrian was 3rd in the steer judging. Clay had a perfect score of 100 points as did the other two boys and the tie was broken by the total scores from the contest; Clay had 322. Overall winner in the judging contest was Tate Harris who had a total of 354 of 400 points.

Serving as the Master of Ceremonies for the evening was D.K. Jackson who entertained the gathering with several jokes and short tales. Those attending enjoyed a complete Mexican meal of enchiladas, salad, tacos, beans, and cherry cobbler prepared by the lunch room staff of Lockney Elementary School.

3 elections set for April 6

On April 6, 1985 Lockney voters will be at the polls to elect or reelect citizens to serve on the city council, school board, and the hospital board.

On the city council three seats are up for election. They include those presently held by Kenneth Wofford, the Mayor's seat presently held by J.D. Copeland, and the seat vacated by Gail Kring when he left Lockney in 1984. Both Wofford and Copeland have signed up to run for reelection to their seats and Dan Smith has also signed up to run for the city council. Others wishing to run for a seat on the city council may sign up at the city office. Deadline for filing is March 6, 1985.

The Lockney Independent School Board of Trustees will have two seats on the board on the ballot. They are presently held by Jim Bob Martin and

Eddie Teeter and both men are seeking reelection to their positions. Deadline for filing in the schoolboard election is also March 6, and those wishing to file may do so by filing with Jackie Lou Holt in the superintendent's office.

The Lockney General Hospital Board of Directors will have two seats on their board on the ballot. Kenneth Tate and Rusty Bacus will both be leaving the board and will not seek reelection. Deadline to file for the hospital board is March 6. Those wishing to file in this election may see Terry Keltz at Lockney General Hospital.

All three of these elections will be held April 6. The city council election will be held in the council chambers of the city hall and the hospital and school board elections will be held at the main entrance of the Lockney High School building.

Chamber banquet set for Friday

The annual Chamber of Commerce banquet is set for this Friday evening at 7:00 p.m. at the Lockney Elementary Cafetorium. Tickets for the event will be on sale for \$7.50 and may be purchased from the First National Bank in Lockney, at Mayor J.D. Trout is a world renowned speaker, having addressed groups and clubs in Europe, Asia, Africa and also in 44 states in the U.S. He was the guest speaker of the Lockney Rotary Club in November of 1984. He was scheduled for departure the following week for Zambia as the guest speaker for a commencement exercise there. He was also the guest speaker at the University of Texas commencement exercises in 1982.

He has addressed over 1000 public schools and has presented over 500 lectures on college and university campuses. Four different states have recognized him for his work with the youth and he is listed in the "Leaders of American Science".

Trout is a member of the Board of

Directors of the Dallas Council of World Affairs and for the past 14 years the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce has selected him as the annual Goodwill tour speaker.

He began his work as a philosopher of Christianity and scientific thought at Cornell University in 1956 and was a preacher for 38 years. He retired as a preacher from the Skillman Avenue Church of Christ in Dallas in March of 1983 and since that time has devoted his full attention to speaking and writing endeavors. He has written for various newspapers for the past 30 years.

Trout promises to be a very interesting and humorous speaker for this week's Chamber banquet.

The evening will include a Mexican food dinner. Kim Hernandez will be providing the dinner music for the event.

This is a time to come and enjoy time with friends and neighbors and to see those special citizens honored.

Among his decorations are the Star, the Legion of Merit, and

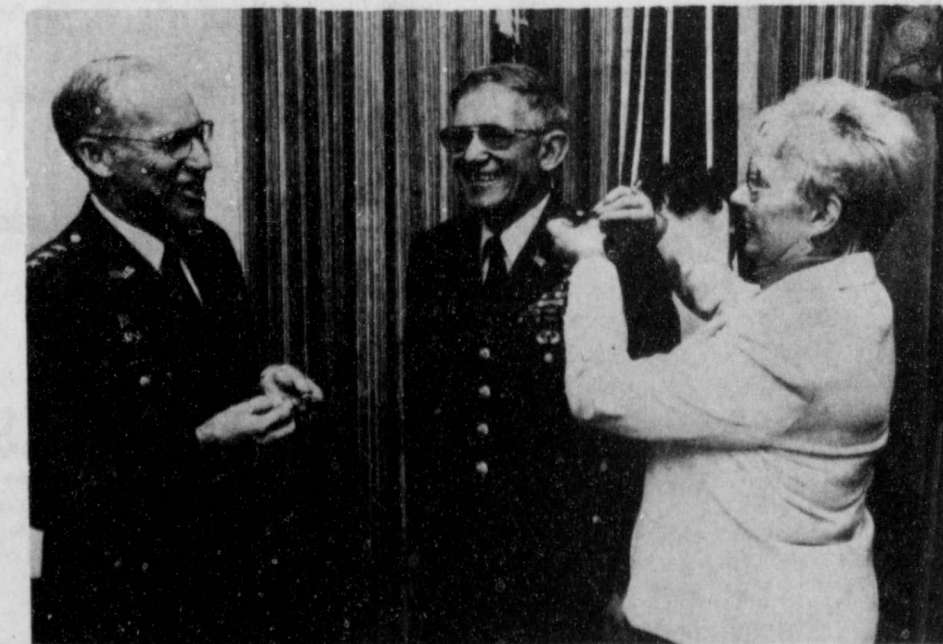
Bronze Star Medal with V device (valor), (one oak leaf cluster.)

It was a generation ago that Cuba fell under Communist control. The island was once committed to rapid industrialization and an end to dependence on agriculture. Fidel Castro in the past year has begun to adjust Cuban economic priorities to try to satisfy pent-up consumer demand.

Today factory managers are being encouraged to circumvent central planners in Havana and work out deals with each other. A new law allows Cubans to own their own homes. Supermarkets are opening that only sell scarce consumer goods at high prices, part of a drive to spur worker output. Foreign investment

is being courted. So are tourists.

One high official explains that Castro deliberately is trying to stimulate domestic consumption in an effort to make Cuban factories eventually outpace U.S. plants. Such policies fool few in Cuba. It is faced with massive debts to Moscow, the inability of the Soviet Union to offer much additional help, and a longstanding U.S. trade embargo.

Also behind the Cuban leader's calculation is a concession to reality unthinkable even five years ago. This concession was that without access to American trade and technology, Cuba will continue to be backward.

million. The money is evidently burning a hole in the commissioner's pockets, and they had to spend it. What better way to spend it except improve their offices and hire a few more friends? The idea of giving it back to those who paid it probably never entered their minds.

The expenditures, as we say, made big news. The governor is on a money saving kick this year, so it was only normal for him to get into the act in the role of the taxpayer's guardian.

But has the governor forgotten? Or does he think we have forgotten? Or does he suppose that a good offense is the best defense?

At the end of last year, Governor White's own staff had grown from the 186 people he inherited from Governor Clements to 239 people. The cost of his staff had grown from \$403,665 in December of 1982 to \$551,845. He said he had to have more people to answer his mail, and run the Department of Community Affairs, and things like that. We, being trusting souls, believe him.

We are not taking up the cudgels for the Texas Employment Commission. As far as we are concerned, there is only one person on the Commission worth keeping. But it does somehow gail us that the governor who was so hot about raising taxes, spending tax dollars on a playground for his kids, buying himself a new airplane at state expense, and generally living the good life during his first two years in office, should suddenly and ostentatiously become cost conscience when he gears up for reelection.

Missionary conference set at First United Methodist Church

Annual missionary conference at First United Methodist Church of Lockney will be held Saturday and Sunday. Church pastor, the Rev. Bill Beachy, invites everyone to attend any of the activities.

The conference actually begins Friday at 6 p.m. with a prayer meeting that will conclude early enough to allow attendance at the Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Saturday's schedule begins with a men's prayer breakfast at 7 a.m. Ladies and children will gather for a salad luncheon at 11:30. The schedule that night will include a fellowship meal at 6:00, followed by a worship service.

As church attendance is dwindling, we pride ourselves in our new technology, the latest acquisitions, and our upward mobile society. We are too busy for the things that truly count in life: our children, our community, and our selves.

We throw up our hands, shake our heads and are perplexed at the "attitude" of our young people-why they do not appear to care about anything anymore.

As examples, we need to stand up and look in the mirror. People, we deserve everything we get.

The show will bring this problem to the attention of the American public and illustrate the high technological nature of modern agriculture - an industry that employs 22 percent of the nation's working population.

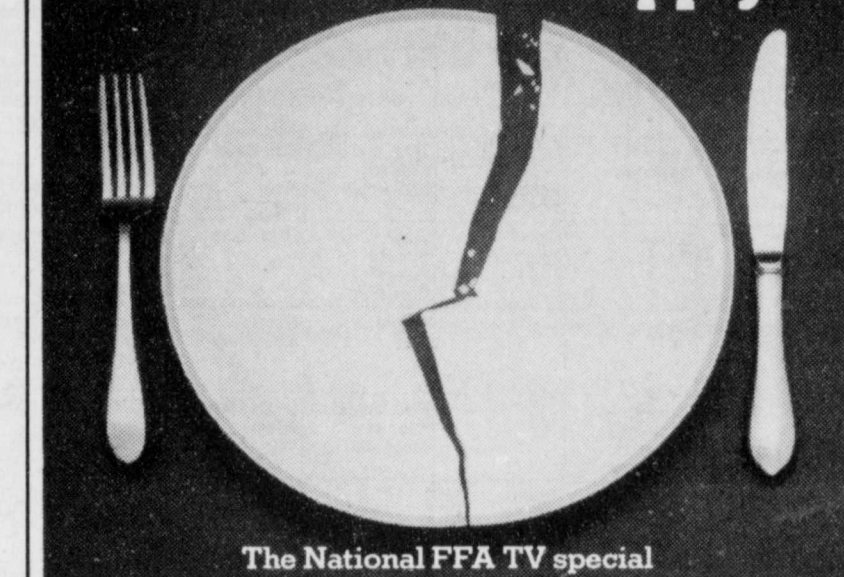
As Senator Robert Dole (R. Kan.) says in one segment of the program: "If

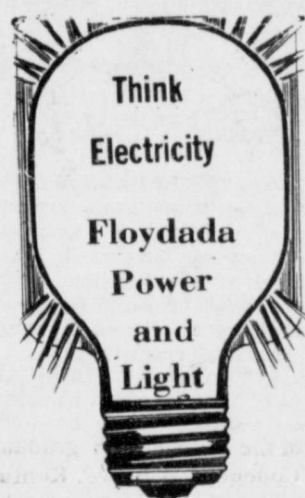

House of Representatives at the State Capitol while the Alamo flag or "New Orleans Gray" is in the hands of Mexican authorities.

The so called New Orleans Gray battle flag was made by some Texas ladies and given to the volunteers as they marched into Texas near the Sabine. A banner on the blue silk read "First Company of Texas Volunteers, From New Orleans, God and Liberty." It was captured during the fall of the Alamo, and although diplomatic negotiations for its trade have taken place, the Texas battle flag remains in a Mexican museum today.

Three flags, including the Long Expedition flag with thirteen stripes and a white star, showed the evolution of the Texas Lone Star Flag. When Texas became the twenty-eighth state in the union, the Republic of Texas flag was retired to become the state flag that is so familiar to all.

Although most flag replicas were painted, at least one was applied. Robert O. Simpson did the art work, such as painting the eagle on the New Orleans Gray and the cannon on the Gonzales flag. Mrs. Simpson, who was seamstress as well as researcher for the project, revealed that, depending on its complexity, it sometimes took as long as a week to finish one flag. Her daughter, Joye Huff, a state board officer of D.R.T., has helped make some of the flags and will be giving programs in the Odessa area.

Being a direct descendent of Emily Austin, sister to Stephen F. Austin, has heightened Mrs. Simpson's interest in the early days of Texas. Mrs. Simpson plans to give her program next to the General James Smith Chapter of D.R.T. in Lubbock on March 25.

DRT flag program presented to Lockney students

Waving not one but fifteen historical flags, Mrs. R.O. Simpson of Levelland, recounted their colorful past to four Texas History classes at Lockney Junior High School on February 12.

The project carried out by Mrs. Simpson, her husband and daughter was planned as a sesquicentennial project for her chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas chapter, General James Smith of Lubbock. The group encourages the preservation of early Texas History and promotes an awareness of its Texas heritage.

The students saw ten battle flags of Texas, each linked to an important

phase of the history of the Republic of Texas. The first flag of the Texas Revolution was the Gonzales battle flag of October 2, 1835. Made of white cotton, in the center was a painted black cannon, above it was a lone star, and beneath it, the words "Come and Take It."

The San Jacinto flag was made of white silk with the figure of a woman, Liberty, painted in the center. One hand holds a sword over which is draped a streamer with the words, "Liberty or Death." This flag and the Alamo battle flag are the only ones that are still in existence. The San Jacinto flag hangs behind the desk of the Speaker of the

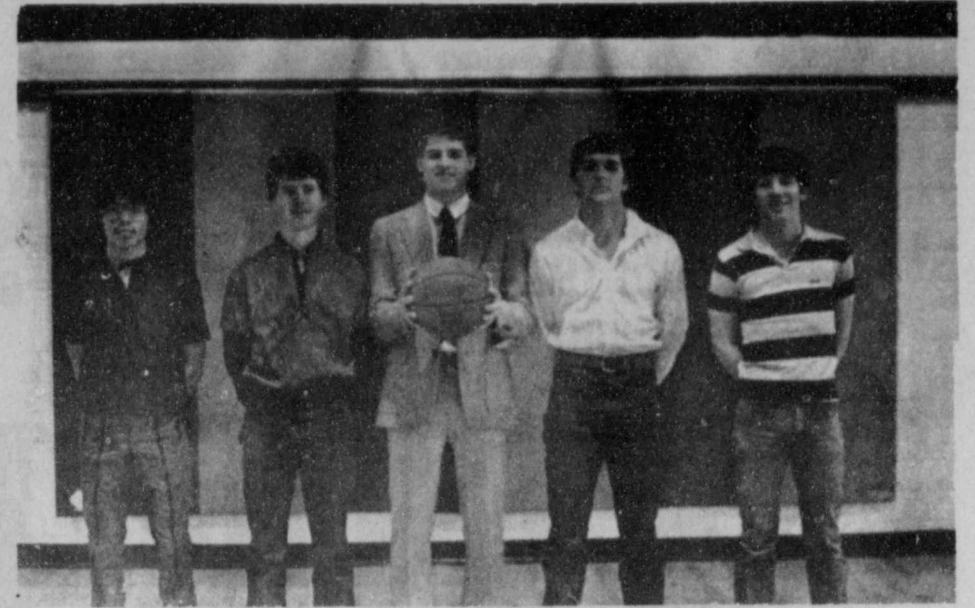
