Coin Telephone Service Now 10c In Burkburnett

Ten-cent coin telephone service will be inaugurated in Burkburnett January 16, 1957, according to C. A. Deuschle, Manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Beginning on that date, telephone users here will make coin telephone calls by depositing two nickels or one dime, he said.

This is the first increase in the rate for calls from public telephones in the history of Burkburnett and it does not affect any other telephone rates here, Deuschle said. Higher postwar operating costs have made it necessary to increase the public telephone rate, he explained.

"The 10-cent rate now is in effect in 47 of the 48 states," Deuschle pointed out. "In addition, the new 10-cent rate has been authorized in more than 200 other Texas cities and will be placed in effect in the very near future."

Farm Bureau to Give Program On Ag. Research

The Wichita County Farm Bureau will present "Today's Research is Tomorrow's Progress", one of the most outstanding agricultural programs that has been presented, in Wichita County on Tuesday, January 8, at 7:30 P. M., in the Wichita Valley Community House.

In making the announcement, Joe C. Price, Jr., president of the county organization said, "This program is designed to present a comprehensive picture of the job research is doing and can do to promote progress in the various phases of agriculture. Agricultural research laboratories are doing basic work in Fundamental Research, Applied Research, Developmental Research and Interrelated Research. The findings through these programs will result in the future in protection of resource and economic gains, provide more profitable marketing, reduce natural hazard risks and promote better use of soil and water."

Lester E. Brooks, Supt. of the Wichita Valley Experiment Station at Iowa Park, stated that this meeting will give the farmers of this area the opportunity to analyze the need for more adequate research and education in agriculture through the eyes of men that actually work in these respective fields.

Appearing on the program will be Dr. Gerald W. Thomas, Research Coordinator of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations for West Texas; R. J. Hildreth, Association Professor, Agricultural Economics and Sociology, Texas A. & M. College; H. O. Kunkel, Assistant Professor, Animal Husbandry and Biochemistry and Nutrition, A. & M. College; J. Roy Quinby, Supt. of the Experiment Station at Chillicothe and Mr. Brooks, B. T. Haws, County Agent, will also present Lee C. Coffey, Associate Agronomist for the Extension Service, who will discuss the certification of planting seed.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, Minn., Daily Journal: "No national government should do what a state can do; and no state government should do what a local government can do. Pursuing the same idea, no government should do for a man what he can do for himself."

CHETEK, Wisc., Alert: "In 1928, when Herbert Hoover was President-elect of the United States, he remarked that in a nation as great as ours there should be two chickens in every pot and two cars in every American garage. The bubble-headed politicians, made sport of Hoover for suggesting such a goal for this country. The United States should be thankful for statesmen of faith like Herbert Hoover who has lived to see most of his detractors proven wrong by the events of history."

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Park Record: "This is a very fine time to be thankful (for the) patience of all the people who have to put up with our boners every week, and who, we hope, realize our mistakes are mechanical, never intentional. Seems lately we've been having more than our share. We ask your added patience in remembering that the lawyer sends his mistakes to the pen; the doctor buries his; the farmer plows his under. We put ours in the newspaper."

WHERE JOE IS BIG BUSINESS

We often hear it argued that big business is the enemy of little business. So something said in a leaflet issued by The American Economic Foundation is of unusual interest.

It deals in a major field of enterprise in which there are both big and little businesses, retailing. It says: "Joe's Supermarket is typical of little business, but in his shopping area Joe is big business."

"In his small puddle Joe is just as big a frog as the 'giant' chain store across the street."

"In fact, the chain stores have taught him how to run his business better, and Joe can always get his share of the customers by giving extra service."

"If Joe works hard and watches the store, he can build a substantial estate for himself and his family without any help from the politicians."

The big chains and department stores didn't start big, instead they started as small operation, often of a family nature. They grew because people liked their methods of doing business and patronized them. In towns all over the country that is happening today, stores are starting up on a very modest scale and expanding as their trade grows.

Penalties aimed at big business would ultimately prove most damaging to little businessmen with the ambition and the ability to get ahead in the world.

HOW TO PREVENT FAMINE

An executive of one of the leading farm equipment manufacturers says: "As I see it, this country may be faced with two farm problems that are rather paradoxical. For the short range we have the problem of surplus; for the long range we may have the problem of a shortage of food."

The reason for this paradox, of course, is the rapid rise in population, not only in this country, but throughout the world. World population is increasing at a rate of about 36.5 million a year, and some scientists believe that the "explosion point," where known resources would no longer suffice to feed all human life could be reached as soon as 1987.

There are many possibilities for solving the food problem, running the gamut from scientifically controlled weather to the use of the plankton and algae in which the seas abound. Whether or not such revolutionary steps will prove feasible or possible is now a question mark. However, as the spokesman for the equipment maker said "there is one avenue for improving food supplies that we can be sure holds promise. That is the avenue of continued research to improve farming techniques and increase yields on land now under cultivation. This approach to the problem will call for continued research to develop better and harderier plants and animals, research to develop better fertilizers, research to point the way to more economical farming practices, and research to provide better farm machinery."

We don't have to run the risk of eventual famine here!

TOWNS ARE PEOPLE

In 1957, the town of Martinsville, in southwestern Virginia, may well become the best-known community in America, as a result of the systematic effort of the citizens, themselves, to improve the human values of the town.

More than a year ago, Martinsville established a voluntary, citizen, staffed "Mayor's Commission on Human Values" with the duty of studying the needs of this growing industrial city that was bursting its seams in expanding its areas from three square miles to nine almost overnight. Yet the human problems of Martinsville differ only in degree and emphasis from those of any other American community — whether it is suffering growing pains or is in need of a civic pulmotor.

Under the direction of T. N. Barbour, a native and executive

of the local furniture factory who accepted the arduous post of General Chairman of the Commission, action began in December 1955. Committee chairmen were chosen to investigate ten different areas of community needs and services, including teenage problems, education for all ages and for non-normal children health and welfare program; law enforcement, court procedures and prison administration; recreation guidance, library and cultural activities — human needs that were considered coequal with such physical needs as street lighting, water, sewage, streets and zoning.

The Commission and its ten committees were staffed from the top down with citizen volunteers. Working girls volunteered to serve one night a week as committee secretaries during the year-long study. So there could be no possibility or suggestion of administration domination, no single public official was permitted to serve on any committee. To finance this extended survey, Chairman Barbour raised a fund of \$5,200 through donations of private citizens. Not a cent of public money was spent by the commission.

Just the other day the Commission on Human Values handed its voluminous and detailed report to the Mayor and City Council. "The studying is over," said Mr. Barbour. "The recommendations have been made. Now it is time for action. We are agreed," he said, "that none of the recommendations is too big for the community to handle, and none so inconsequential to human welfare as to be ignored."

As matters stand at the beginning of a new year, the citizens of Martinsville have rendered conspicuous service to their town. And this evidence of devotion to civic duty is the best assurance that action will follow their recommendations. It should provide for other communities across the nation an inspiring example of what people can do to make a good town better.

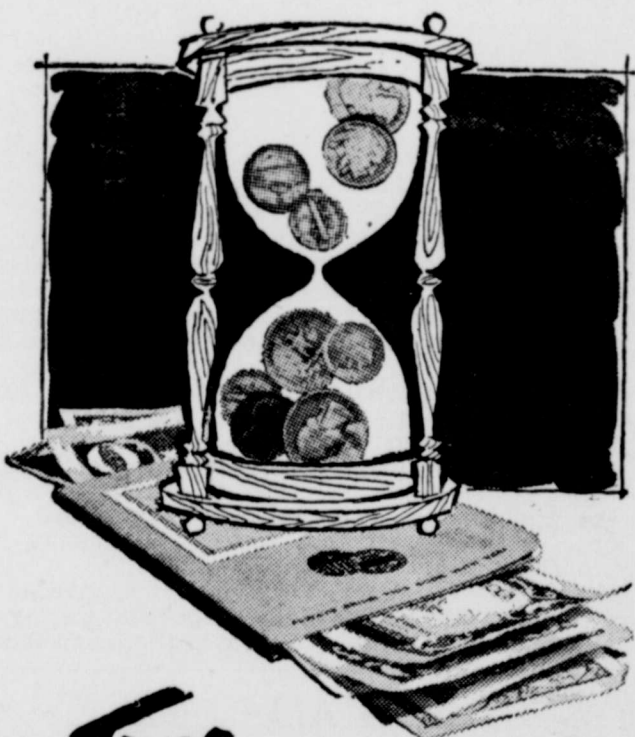

Texas Safety Association

The past eighteen years experience of the Texas Safety Association reveals that many Texas drivers and pedestrians have a misconception about traffic laws. Here are seven such misconceptions—how is your score? Driver on the right always has the right of way at an intersection. Not so; Texas law says that the car entering the intersection first has the right of way. When two cars approach an intersection from different directions at approximately the same time the driver of the vehicle on the left shall yield the right of way to the vehicle on the right.

Pedestrians must yield to cars at intersections where there are no traffic lights. Wrong. Law gives pedestrians the right of way, with certain limitations, at all marked crosswalks. When a school bus stops to pick up or discharge children, drivers must stop if you are behind it and traveling in the same direction. This is only correct. Texas law requires you to stop in such cases no matter in which direction you are driving.

You don't have to stop on a red light when a traffic signal is changing from green to red. Wrong! The caution, or yellow, light is a signal that the red or green light will be exhibited immediately thereafter and vehicles crossing the intersection on the red or stop signal is illegal.

You can make a turn any time as long as you signal. That's correct. To make a turn, you must have to be in the proper lane and you are required to

signal at least 100 feet before you turn.

6. You may pass any time you see an opening. Wrong again. Texas law says that you have to give a car coming from the opposite direction at least 100 feet clearance after you have passed. You cannot pass at all when approaching within 100 feet of a bridge, viaduct or tunnel; or railroad crossing. The passing laws, of course, contain many other specific limitations.

7. Drivers must watch out for pedestrians walking on the roadway. This is a good idea, but the law says a pedestrian must walk on the left side of the road or on the left shoulder. It is also illegal to walk in a roadway if a sidewalk is provided.

From Your STATE CAPITOL

Politics were everyone to a puzzle. Gov. Allan Shivers took his first political tumble when Sen. Lydon Johnson won control of the May Democratic convention. Price Daniel won over Ralph Yarborough for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in a narrowest ever margin of a little more than 3,000 votes. Daniels gained shaky party control by getting a most friendly executive committee at the September Democratic convention. But he held to the Senate seat too long. Shivers wouldn't buy the election now, resign later plan, and Shivers came to the end of his historic seven year tenure as leader of the again triumphant Democrats for Eisenhower.

Drought in its seventh year, grew steadily worse. Crops turned up. Streams stopped flowing. Reservoirs dwindled. State Water Board had its hands full trying to referee squabbles over water rights. Agricultural groups banded together in the Texas Drought Emergency committee finally gained expanded federal relief. All but five of Texas' 254 counties were designated disaster areas. Texas water resources committee, a legislative study group, put in a report of overtime reading a state wide water program for the next legislature. Suggestions: a \$100,000,000 bond program to help finance local projects, fish and boat taxes to buy water storage space in federal reservoirs, "rainmaking" research

at Texas colleges. Federal Legislation had Texas repercussions. Eisenhower supporters groaned when he vetoed the natural gas bill. But the federal highway building bill passed. It means \$57,000,000 a year more for Texas road building. Texas Highway Department started using it at once, predicted an era of unparalleled progress. To move things faster, it reversed its long time policy, is now buying right of way for interstate roads. This brought a new headache, a hue and cry from county officials for help in buying land for state highways.

Integration vs Segregation made news on many fronts. Voters overwhelmingly approved three pro-segregation interposition referendums in the July primary. But no one was sure what would come of them. At Mansfield and Texarkana citizens blocked efforts at federal court ordered school integration, and Gov. Shivers sent Texas Rangers to maintain order. Atty. John Ben Shepperd took on the NAACP in a Tyler district court and won a temporary order banning the organization in Texas.

Investigation by legislative committees into US Trust and Guaranty Co's \$7,000,000 downfall brought demands for new lobby laws, controls on legislators' dealing with state agencies US Trust's many creditors are still unpaid. It's all tied up in their numerous lawsuits for priorities.

Insurance. Industry under went a statewide solvency check. Seven percent, out of more than 1,300 failed to qualify for new licenses.

Polio Vaccine restrictions were completely removed in late summer. But with plenty

for everyone, an indifferent public let vaccine supplies stack up. Some 80 percent went unvaccinated. Unless interest increases, Texas will have to return nearly half of the state's \$3,000,000 federal vaccine allocation when the fiscal year runs out next June.

Business Level Holds Capital expansion, the building of new and growth of old industries, has kept Texas' 1956 business index at its 1955 high.

University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported the 1956 11 month total as the same as 1955. Rapid industrial expansion has kept the average up, says the bureau.

It offsets declines in residential building, consumer spending and farm employment.

Crop Value Down—value of Texas' 1956 crops is estimated at \$1,100,000, nine percent below last year and the 10-year average.

US Dept. of Agriculture said reduced production is due to drought, acreage restrictions and the soil bank plan.

Increased irrigation accounted for some bright spots. Per acre yield of cotton was the highest on record, 278 pounds. But dryland farming reached new lows. Corn crop of 27.4 million bushels was the shortest since 1873. Sorghum, with half the total acreage irrigated, produced 124 million bushels, fourth largest crop in history.

Other reports: rice, smallest crop since 1949; wheat, double last year's crop, but half the 10 year average; peanuts, smallest crop since 1934; oats, 19 percent under last year; barley, about average; hay and forage, about two thirds of average; commercial vegetables, up 13 percent from last year.

Oil Record Predicted—an all time production peak in 1956 and continued heavy demands for the first quarter of '57 are foreseen for the Texas Oil Industry.

Texas Railroad Commission pegs 1956 production at 1,075,829,000 barrels, an increase of more than 54 million barrels or 5.3 percent over 1955.

A commission report said closing of the Suez Canal seems likely to be reflected in two ways: (1) decreased importing of oil into the U. S. and (2) increased

demand by other countries for U. S. Oil. Both would mean heavier demands on the Texas Industry.

But, it noted, above ground storage of gasoline stocks is still "quite excessive."

Whodunit?—Austin city officials promise every effort to find out who, if anyone set fire to O. Henry's Honeymoon house.

People over the state and nation took sides in the local fight over the house where the famed short story writer took his bride. History lovers moved it to a residential area park, planned to make a shrine.

But nearby homeowners howled. They called the 80 year old frame cottage a "pile of junk." Suit was filed to have it removed from the neighborhood.

Then a swift nighttime blaze completely destroyed the house. It wasn't likely accidental, said Austin's fire marshal, but probably set by some mischief-maker taking advantage of the already heated controversy.

Short Snorts—Leonard Mohrmann has been named public information officer for the Texas League of Municipalities.

For the past four years Mohrmann tant to Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey. Has been administrative assistant Texas Employment Commission latest report shows many of the state's industrial workers taking home bigger pay checks.

Some weekly averages: in apparel and fabrics, \$41.06; stone clay and glass, \$69.97; metal, products, \$76.43; chemicals, \$98.52; petroleum and coal products \$106.27. Austin State Hospital has improved tremendously in the past six months, reports Dr. David C. Gaede of Washington, D. C., president of the American Psychiatric Association. He made an intensive survey of the hospital's operation last April.

His follow-up report noted substantial increases in trained personnel and many added services.

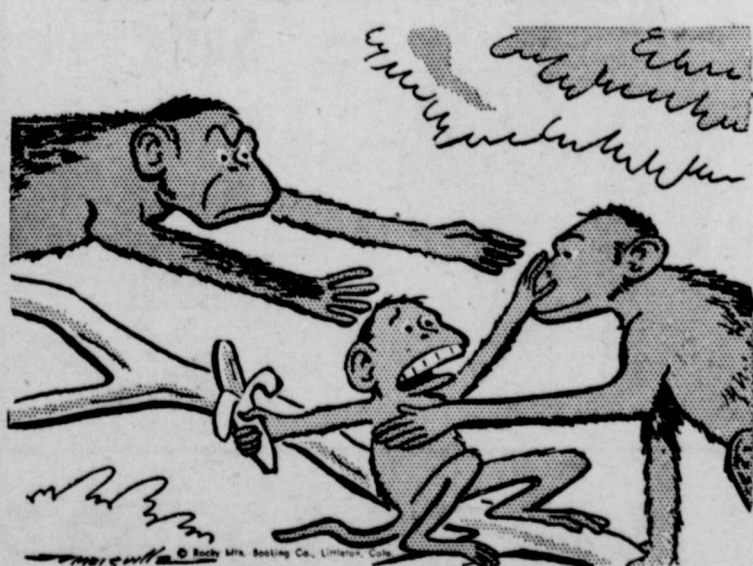

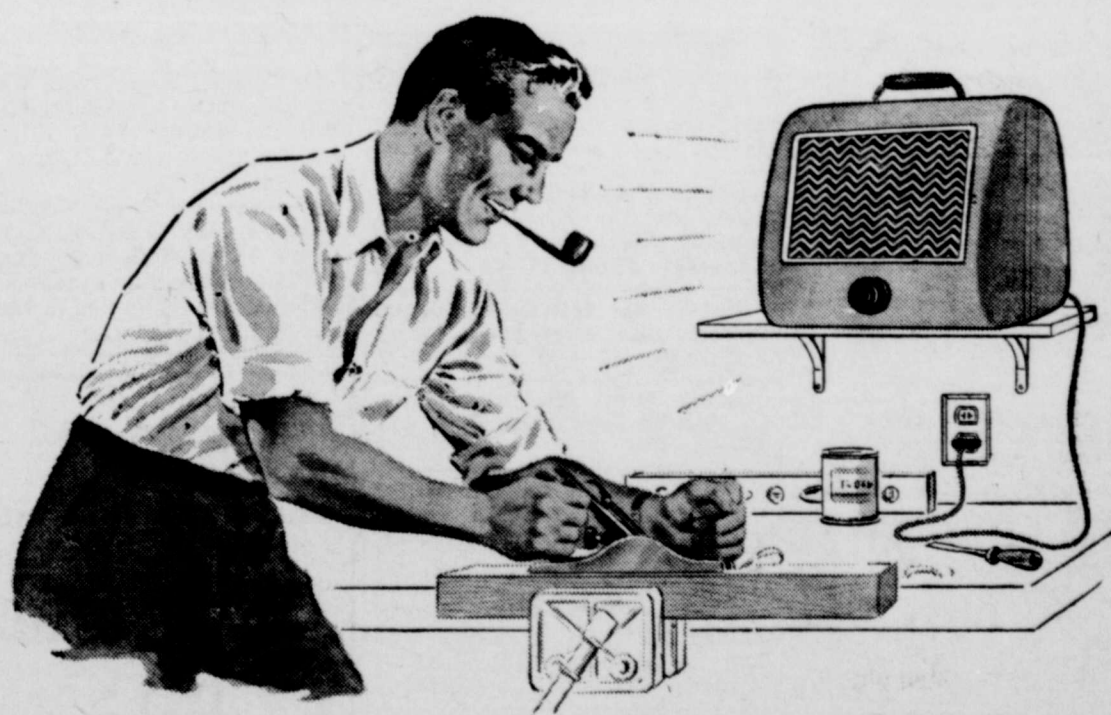

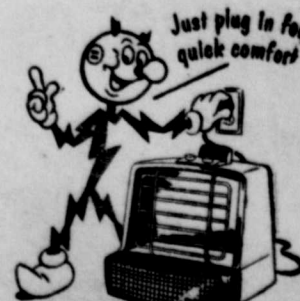

Annual Income Questionnaires Of VA Mailed

Annual Income Questionnaires have been mailed to more than 14,000 veterans and widows and children of deceased veterans in the Dallas Veterans Administration Regional Area who are receiving pension, Scott B. Harrington, Manager, announced today.

Those in the Dallas area are among 1,200,000 throughout the nation who will receive the questionnaires.

Mr. Harrington urged those who receive the questionnaires from the Dallas office to fill them in completely and return them immediately to the V. A. Office, 912 South Ervay, Dallas, Texas. Those who receive the questionnaires from the V. A. offices should return them to the office from which they were received. Unless completed questionnaires are returned to V. A. within 30 days, pension payments will be stopped. Mr. Harrington stressed.

Questionnaires are mailed out yearly because disability and death pensions are subject to annual income limitations. The current questionnaires request data on 1956 income and anticipated 1957 income.

Pensions are payable to certain eligible veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict period who are permanently and totally disabled from causes not connected with their service in the armed forces, and to certain widows and children of veterans of these wars who die of nonservice-connected causes.

In both cases, the annual income of those receiving pensions must not exceed \$1400, without dependents, or \$2700 with dependents.

Only dependents allowed for a living veteran for pension purposes are a wife and minor children, and for a widow, only minor children.

For income purposes, payments from V. A. for disability or death including proceeds of GI insurance need not be reported. However, all other payments, including gifts, employment, commercial life insurance, social security, annuities and retirement benefits must be reported.

Those receiving pensions should report immediately any increase in income which would raise their annual income above the statutory limitations. Overpayments are recoverable by the Government.
