organizations as Rotary, Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Foundation and hospital board. He is past state president of the Beautify Texas Council.

McKinney is a member of the International Platform Association which is the Who's Who of the speakers and entertainers on the American Platform. 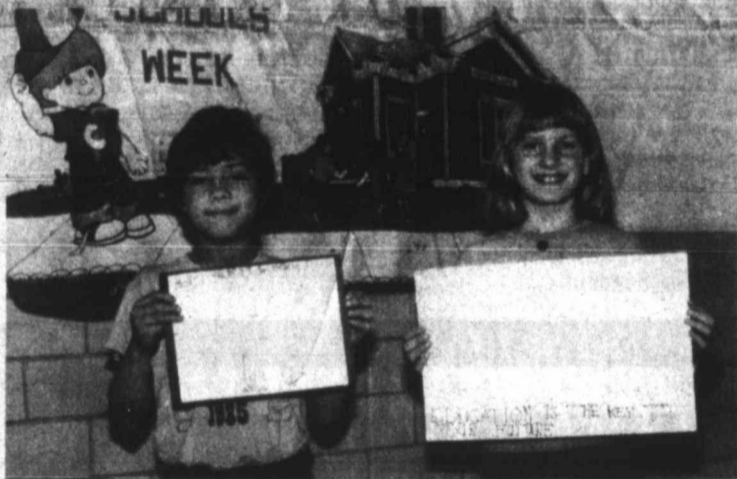

## Parents urged to visit CISD schools during week

The Colorado Independent School District is among 1,069 public school districts in the state observing Texas Public Schools Week March 2-6.

"Although parents and the public are invited to visit our schools throughout the year, a special invitation is being extended during Public Schools Week," said Charlie L. Uselton, superintendent of schools.

"Share Our Success" is the statewide theme for this year's Public School Week activities.

"All classrooms, elementary through high school, will be open during this week and everyone is invited to see first-hand how the school district operates," Uselton said.

Texas Public Schools Week was organized in 1950 by the Masonic Lodges of Texas to recognize the contributions made by the State's free system of education. It coincides with or follows the Texas Independence anniversary on March 2 each year.

During the past 37 years, Public Schools Week has encouraged parents to visit their children's schools, increased public knowledge about schools, and helped the public gain an appreciation of what schools are doing for them.

School officials are asking parents and the public to not only visit, but they are also asked to have lunch with the children, observe classroom sessions, and ask questions.

Teachers attending the three-day convention heard Gov. Bill Clements give his first major address to an educational group. Participants also had an opportunity to attend mini-conferences on legal and legislative issues, the teacher appraisal process, education reform, the new tax laws, public relations and stress management.

The association presented its annual Friend of Education Awards to Land Commissioner Gary Mauro and San Antonio

home builder Ray Ellison. Mauro was honored for his involvement in a suit that saved millions in oil and gas royalties for the state's public school system. Ellison was honored for a billboard campaign that praised Texas teachers.

TCTA State President Eva Jo Kasinger, Abilene, praised convention participants.

"Educators face more complex issues than ever before," she said. "Along with keeping abreast of the latest developments in all areas of education, they must be informed about new laws, regulations and court decisions. They must be able to anticipate changes before they happen."

"By participating in a meeting such as this, we can assure the people of Colorado City that

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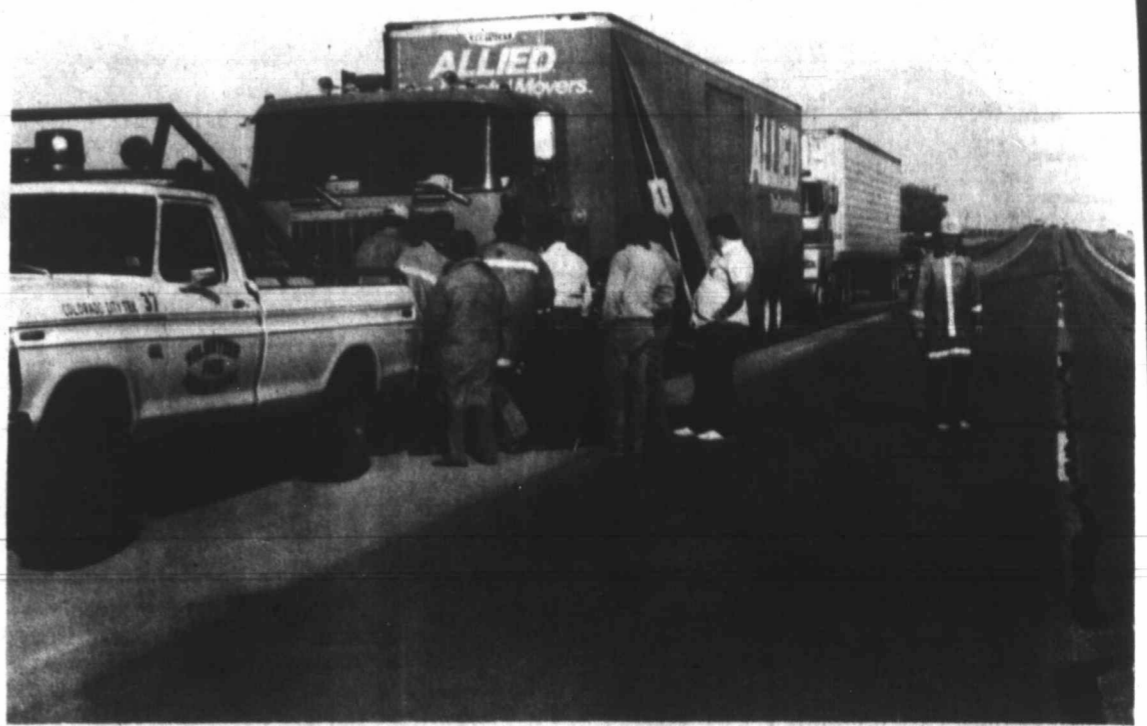

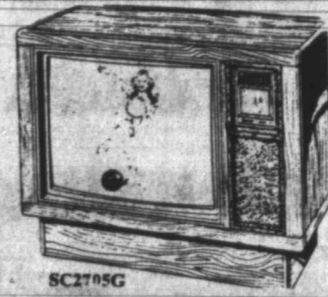
