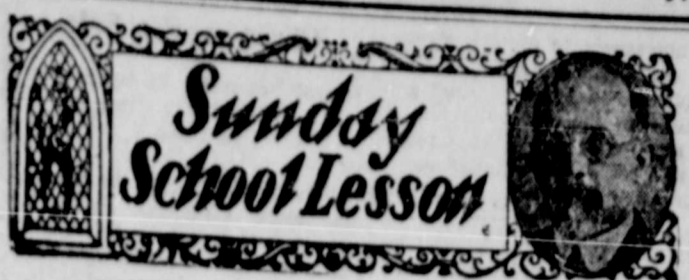

Amarillo Uses Caliche

Caliche Base Pavement Proves Satisfactory For Streets In Panhandle Capitol

A new type of paving recommended and worked out by City Engineer E. N. Stanley and approved by the city commission several weeks ago, is proving highly satisfactory, city officials report.

It is a caliche base with an asphalt and crushed rock topping. It can be put down at approximately half the cost of other standard types of paving, and for all practical purposes is just as good for most streets, it is declared.

The caliche, which is a soft limestone, is mined from a quarry near Cliffside. It is brought into the city and crushed. A coat of 11 inches is poured into the street. Three wettings and as many rollings pack it into a six-inch base.

Three coats of asphalt and two layers of crushed stone are applied. It all cements together, and a fine, smooth street is the result.

On South Harrison street the new paving was recently put down at a cost of \$3.27 per front foot. On Adams another type of paving was put down on a same-width street. The cost was \$6.22. Mr. Stanley reported.

"It makes it possible for hundreds in Amarillo to have paving," Mr. Stanley said yesterday. "Without it paving could not afford the cost of paving."—Amarillo News.

FARM HINTS

A good disinfectant used occasionally in the poultry house not only destroys the germs of contagious diseases, but also many external parasites and some parasitic worm eggs. One of the best disinfectants for this purpose is cresol, one-half pint in 8 quarts of soft water. A 5 per cent solution of carbolic acid also is good.

Hail data collected by the U. S. Weather Bureau over a period of 12 months show that hail is likely

to occur in practically all sections of the United States—the exceptions being a small area in southern California and nearby portions of Nevada, and a few other small areas. Damaging hailstorms appear most frequently in the middle Plains, particularly in Kansas and Iowa.

The beef bull should be well fed at all seasons, but especially just previous to the breeding season. A good ration for an 1,800-pound bull is 20 pounds of silage, 20 pounds of legume hay, and 6 pounds of grain. If non-legume hay is fed, the grain ration should include about 2 pounds of cottonseed or peanut meal. Large quantities of silage should not be fed to a bull in heavy service.

Neat's-foot oil or castor oil, or a mixture of them with wool grease, makes a good dressing for driving harness. For heavy harness a satisfactory mixture is tallow and cod oil, or neat's-foot oil and tallow, or any or all of them with wool grease, mixed to a paste about the consistency of butter. Apply the grease lightly to driving harness and liberally to work harness. The leather should be washed first using luke-warm water and a neutral soap and the warm grease then rubbed into the leather while it is still damp.

One tuberculous fowl may cause the disease to spread through the whole flock if control measures are not applied. Avian tuberculosis, which is particularly prevalent in the North Central States, can be detected by a post-mortem or by the tuberculin test given by a veterinarian. All diseased birds should be killed and burned. The remainder of fowls over one year old should be marketed. The chicken house should be cleaned and disinfected and also moved to clean ground if practicable. Lots and runways should be plowed up and seeded to a grain crop.

If sheep, calves, or pigs have a husky cough, lungworms should be suspected as the cause of the trouble. Good "nursing" is the safest and most satisfactory treatment in most cases, says the Bureau of Animal Industry of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Infested animals should be taken off wet pasture and put on high, dry pasture, or put up and fed dry feed. A safe supply of drinking water and plenty of good feed are of value in tiding the animals over the critical stages of the disease and allowing

the lungworms to die out. Sanitation and pasture rotation, isolation of infested stock, and special precautions in regard to the pasturing and water of young animals are important preventative measures.

A. Wroe of Austin, treasurer of the association, asking them to support the campaign against tuberculosis through the purchase of these seals.

"We know from experience that every thoughtful person who has, himself, enjoyed good health during the year wishes to do his part to help prevent unnecessary suffering or death. Tuberculosis causes a great deal of unnecessary suffering and death. One-fifth of all deaths that occur among those who are between 15 and 45 years of age are caused by tuberculosis," Mr. Wroe stated, to emphasize the need of relief funds.

WHY RAISE MORE HOGS IN WESTERN TEXAS

By Frank R. Phillips, Head of Department of Agriculture West Texas State Teachers College

At the Master Dairy Farmers' banquet held in Amarillo recently, the statement was made that hogs were essential to the dairy business. At the Canyon College Dairy, over one hundred dollars worth of hogs are sold per month. More money is cleared on hogs than from the dairy proper. Cows certainly require more labor than hogs. It is the plan to put more land under hog fence and to double the number of hogs next year. It is expected to do this without buying any additional feed unless it be tankage.

Recently Walter Barlow, manager of the Great West Mill and Elevator Company, said:

"The thing I do not understand is why farmers do not raise more hogs in the Panhandle. Is there not money in hogs, with all the grain sorghum that we have? The answer was that the College Farm at Canyon showed greater net profit from hogs than it did from the dairy enterprises. Attention was then called to the value of hogs in West Texas, when Colonel C. T. Herring of Amarillo remarked that the reason we have no greater packing industry located here is that the packers claim that they cannot get enough hogs; that cattle alone do not make a packing plant profitable.

Last week a Randall County farmer stated that there is more money in selling grain sorghum at twenty dollars per ton than in feeding it to hogs. The reply to such statements is that experiments in Kansas and in Texas stations contradict his figures. Perhaps one reason why few hogs are produced in West Texas is that farmers here have not kept up with the modern hog feeding experiments, but have accepted their father's belief that corn is required to produce profitable pork.

Danish dairy farmers owe much of the progress made in their farm enterprises to their hogs. The Panhandle farmer has now reached the point where he needs to give more attention to the marketing of his products in a finished condition. Grain sorghum fed to hogs offers a simple plan whereby this desirable marketing step may be taken.

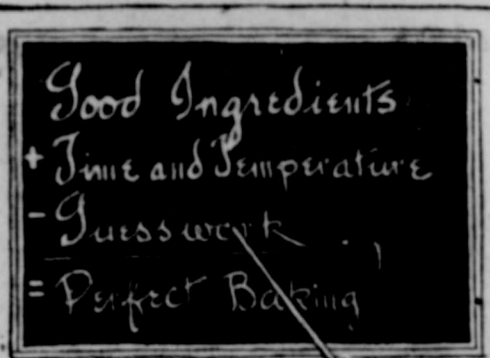

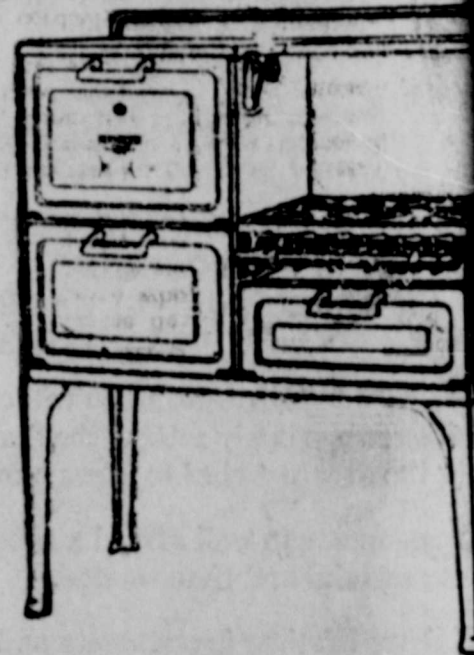
