Duncan Drilling Company Completes No. 1-B Patterson

Duncan Drilling Company of Big Spring has completed No. 1-B Patterson as a one-half mile south extension to the east portion of the Moore (San Andres) field of Southwest Howard County.

The well pumped 77.41 barrels of 29 gravity oil daily from pay at 3,056-3,165 feet, after 1,000 gallons of acid.

Location is 1,650 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of section 27, block 33, T-1-S, T&P survey.

Pan American Production Company No. 1 Turnbow, north-east offset to the discovery well and lone producer in the North Breedlove (Devonian) field of Northwest Martin County, was making hole below 10,401 feet in lime and shale.

The scheduled 12,300-foot Devonian test has not taken a drillstem test down to its present depth.

Courtney School Will Hold Open House Saturday, May 5

Approximately \$80,000 Spent On Making The Courtney School Plant Attractive

The P-TA is sponsoring open house at the Courtney School on Saturday, May 5, from 4 until 8 p.m. The school has recently undergone extensive remodeling, and the public is cordially invited to come out and visit and inspect the newly improved buildings.

Approximately \$80,000 has been spent on remodeling, equipment and furniture. The main building has been completely remodeled with rest rooms installed; a forced warm air heating system; new drinking fountains; new ceiling; and the floors covered with vinyl plastic tile. Each classroom has been redecorated and book cases installed, and furnished with new modern furniture. In the gymnasium, the cafeteria was moved and completely remodeled with the installation of a steam table and a walk-in refrigerator. The restrooms in the gym are complete with showers and lockers.

Forty-nine years ago when Courtney was organized the county was chiefly a ranching country with the houses few and far between. Today, this community is thickly settled, and with the remainder of the county, is one of the best farming districts in West Texas. There remains some few ranches in the district, however, farming is the primary occupation.

In 1907 the first school building was erected one mile west of the present location. The size of the building was 24x40 and cost \$260. The name Courtney was from John Courtney, who was an uncle of the late S. E. Jones of this community. The people of the community hauled the lumber for this building in wagons from Abilene. The house was equipped with long home-made benches, a home-made desk or table for the teacher and oil cloth blackboards. The playground equipment consisted of one croquet set.

The late Mr. Colwell and Mr. Willingham served as first trustees and there were 15 students enrolled in the first term. There

State Bar Committee Reports . . .

The State Bar of Texas has set up a special committee to study and report on lawyer-client relations as it involves lawyer members of the State Legislature. First preliminary report of the group has now been sent to investigating committees of House and Senate by Maurice R. Bullock of Fort Stockton, president of the Texas Bar. The special committee is not through with its work and other reports are expected from time to time.

Recommendations concerning two bills and one resolution which has been endorsed by the Board of Directors of the State Bar was incorporated in the first committee report.

The first bill would prohibit any member of either legislative house from taking any money or property for appearing before any board, administrative body, agency, commission, etc., for the purpose of influencing any action by such body or doing so while on regular or irregular retainer. The bill would provide punishment of fine or imprisonment, or both, for violation.

The second bill would permit judges to grant continuances in any case in which a lawyer-member of the Legislature may be involved where it would interfere with legislative duty.

The resolution proposes a constitutional amendment which would make the pay of a legislator \$50 per day for 120 days (present compensation \$25 per day for 120 days) with travel allowance of \$2.50 for each 25 miles going from and back to his place of residence to attend a legislative session.

The committee report merits serious consideration of these and other recommendations the committee may make and the Bar agree upon. Members of the committee are Former Governor Dan Moody, Chairman, and the other members are Albert P. Jones of Houston, W. Page Keeton of Austin, William A. Kerr of Midland, and Hutton W. Summers of Dallas.

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Philosopher Likes Soil Bank Idea Including Back Pay

(Editor's note: The Martin County Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm at Mustang Draw discusses soil banking this week, a subject he knows about as much about as he does financial banking.)

Dear editor:

I was out here wandering around over my farm yesterday speculating on where I'd put my soil bank if Congress passes one, as I understand it, if it gets passed, it'll be too late this year actually to take any land out of cultivation, but the government will go ahead and pay us on the basis of fifty per cent down and the balance next year, so a thinking man ought to be figuring out now where he wants his idle land to be located.

Now here's the thing—it looks like the proposed bill is liable to be discriminatory. You take a man like me, who foresees the surplus coming years ago and let a lot of his land lay out, it seems to me I ought to get the full payment this year. If the purpose of the bill is to pay a man for refusing to contribute to the surplus, it seems to me the farmers who are already in the swing of the thing could be paid this year.

I can show you pieces of land out here on my farm which haven't contributed to the surplus in years, and I believe I'm entitled to some back pay for my far-sightedness. Furthermore, as I understand the bill, the idea is to take some land out of cultivation, then plant some soil-building crops on it, lock the cows out, and let the fertility accumulate, with the government footing the bill. Keep your crops in an underground soil bank instead of in a price-depressing warehouse, is the idea.

Now this is a fine program, but I hope the government is thinking ahead and is prepared to stay in the soil banking business for a long time. This can't be no fly-by-night scheme. You let farmers build up a part of their land to where it'll produce twice as much as it is now, and then in a few years close the bank and let them start planting on it again, and the surplus we've got now will look like the end of seven years of want in Egypt by comparison to the one we'll have then.

As I see it, either the country has got to learn to eat and wear more, or when Congress writes that soil bank bill it had better put in a requirement that the land still in use be farmed in the worst manner possible, rows running down hill and the land exposed to washing, so when we switch over to the built-up land, we won't be right back in the surplus business. It looks like what we need is for half the farmers to be soil bankers and the other half soil bank robbers, if this thing is ever to come out even.

As it is, it looks like Congress is fixing to pay us for being better farmers, surplus-producing farmers with a vengeance, five years from now, when what we really need is worse farmers non-surplus-producing farmers. Personally, I'm glad I'm not a Congressman.

Suffering Brings Fellowship In Christ

When Jesus hung upon the cross, one of the two thieves between whom He was crucified reviled Him, urging Him to save Himself and them. The other thief rebuked his fellow, reminding him they were suffering justly for their misdeeds, whereas Jesus was suffering for His innocence and goodness. The penitent thief had the reward of hearing Jesus say, "This day thou shalt be with me in Paradise."

It is the distinction between two kinds of suffering which Peter emphasizes in his writings that does so much to encourage suffering Christians.

The Christian who suffers is a partaker of the sufferings of Christ. Instead of being embittered, he may well glorify God.

Certainly as we observe life, we can not very well say that the ideal life is entirely free from suffering.

We have seen those who have accepted the way of suffering patiently and in subjection to the will of God ennobled by their experience, finding a deep satisfaction in life often denied to those whose ways have been easier and more pleasant.

Peter brings this philosophy of endurance of suffering into the realm of Christian faith and practice, emphasizing the part of humility and the strength that comes to men through casting all their cares upon God.

The mystery of pain has never been solved. We do not know why the innocent suffer with and for the guilty. We do know,

1956 Guide For Cotton Insect Control Ready

Cotton producers who apply insecticides at the proper time may expect an increase in yield of at least 100 pounds of seed cotton an acre for each treatment. This is a return of about \$8 for each dollar spent for insect control, says F. M. Fuller, extension entomologist.

As an aid for cotton farmers in their fight against insects, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has just released its 1956 Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects. It is L-218 and is available from the offices of local county agents.

Covered in the guide are suggestions on early and late season control and early stalk destruction and farm cleanup; timing of insecticide applications; seed treatment with systemic insecticides and general information on spraying and dusting.

Also listed are the insects which are best controlled by early season or late season programs along with the recommended dusts or sprays for the control program. The recommended amounts and or mixtures of the various insecticides for both dusts and sprays are given along with timely suggestions on timing of applications and when to begin and stop the use of insecticides.

Farmers Advised To Be On Alert For Hopper Signs

Farmers should be alert to the possibility of severe grasshopper infestations this spring and summer and be ready if necessary, to take the proper control measures in time to stop heavy crop damage, says Freeman M. Fuller, Jr., Extension Entomologist, Texas A&M College.

USDA reports indicate that farmers will need to be on the lookout for hoppers in Panhandle and southward along caprock and from the Red River into deep Central Texas.

If conditions are favorable, young, wingless grasshoppers will begin hatching during this month, and during June. Applications of insecticides should begin as soon as possible after hatching, and if the insects are numerous, several applications may be necessary. In applying insecticides, farmers should look for hatching grounds on roadsides, field margins, ditch banks and unused land bordering croplands. Treatment of these areas will prevent hoppers from moving into the fields where such operations as plowing and disking may already have cut down the number of hatchable eggs.

In the use of any insecticide the instructions of the manufacturer should be carefully followed to avoid harmful residues on crops. County agents are a good source of information about specific measures to be used in any particular region or situation.

A number of insecticides now available are effective in grasshopper control. Aldrin, dieldrin, heptachlor, and toxaphene are among those listed.

Vet Death Claims To Be Handled From Lubbock

Beginning this month, the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Lubbock, will assume the responsibility for processing death claims for veterans whose death occurs in the 79-county area served by the Lubbock office, Robert W. Sisson, Manager of the Lubbock VA Office, has announced.

Prior to January 1, 1956, this function was performed by the Denver District Office for veterans residing in the Southwest, Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast states. On January 1, 1956, the Dallas, Texas Regional Office assumed this responsibility for all veterans residing in the state of Texas. Recently the Administrator of Veterans Affairs further decentralized this function to the five regional offices in Texas.

In the future death claims will be processed by the Veterans Administration Regional Office serving the territory in which the veteran's death occurs. After the transition period is over it is felt this complete decentralization will result in more expeditious service to beneficiaries.

The Lubbock Regional Office will handle all activities connected with death claims including payment of National Service Life Insurance policies, pensions, and statutory burial allowances.

Notices have already been sent to all funeral directors located within the area served by the Lubbock office. To expedite the processing of these cases after the veterans death beneficiaries should contact the Lubbock Regional Office, any VA Office within the regional office territory, veterans organizations' service officers, county service officers, or chapter representatives to obtain assistance in filing claims.

To aid the Veterans Administration in processing these cases, beneficiaries should if at all possible, furnish the veteran's service serial number, claim number if any, and the policy number of his National Service Life Insurance.

The decentralization of death claims activities to the regional office level now enables field stations to offer complete "one-stop" service to veterans and their dependents, Sisson stated.

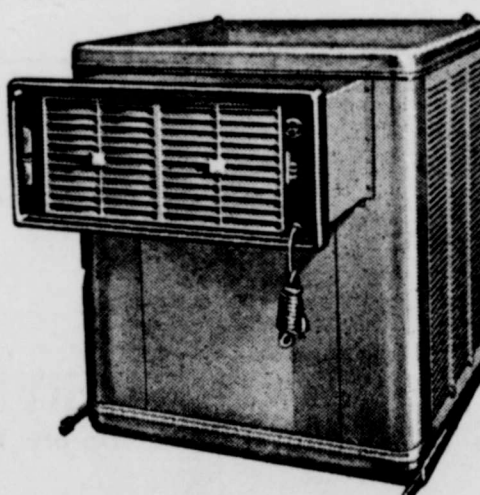

Hays stated that he made the transfer request because of the better facilities at Carver.

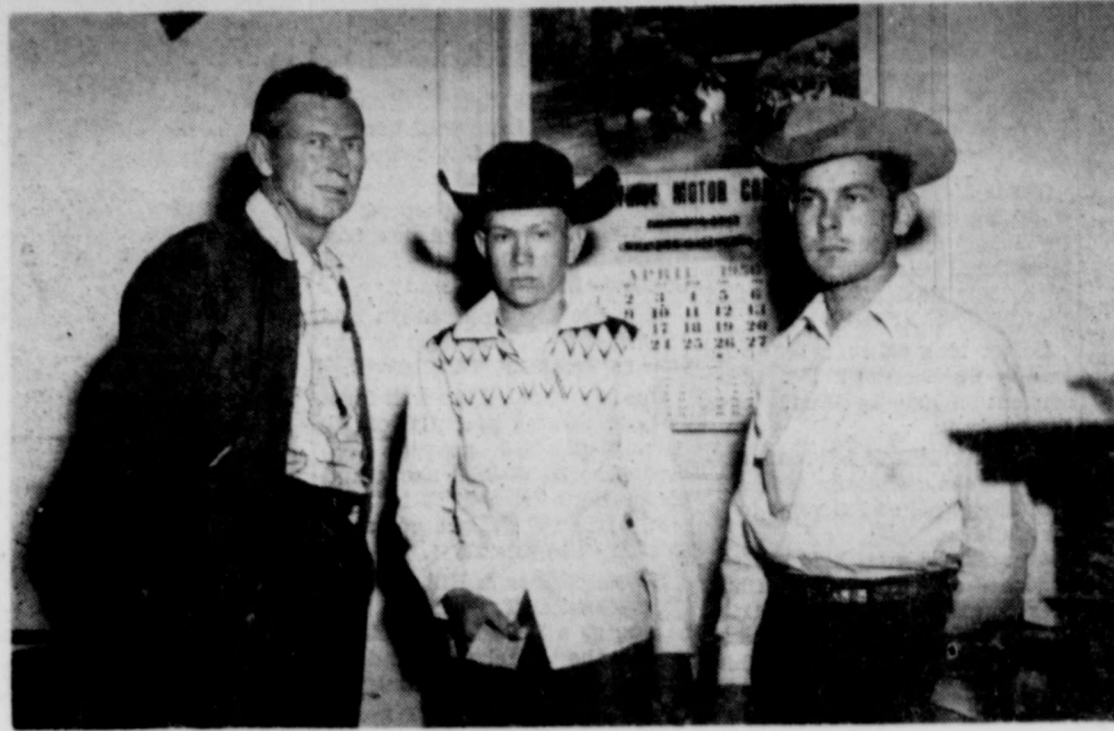

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Johnson Grass Control Plan Announced Here

County Agent Gerald Hanson said today that cotton producers in 104 Texas counties used the spot-oiled method for controlling Johnson grass last year on 73,637 acres of cotton.

According to Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist, the control method was first recommended last year and its popularity and value have already been well established. When compared with other commonly used control practices, spot-oiling requires less hand-labor, the oils used are readily available and comparatively cheap in price and the gravity-flow hand sprayer used for making the applications is inexpensive.

Elliott says a mixture of half naptha and diesel oil is best for crown-oiling in cotton and corn. A squirt applied to each crown before the Johnson grass plants are six inches tall and followed by from four to six additional applications should give 98 per cent control. Cost per acre will vary depending upon the amount of Johnson grass infestation. Few crop plants are killed by the mixture.

Both naptha and diesel oil may be purchased from bulk oil dealers, says Elliott. Plans for the gravity-flow hand sprayer may be obtained from the local county agent or the Agricultural Information Office at College Station. The local county agent can supply information on where a ready-to-use sprayer may be purchased. He can also supply additional information on the practice and on other practices which involve chemicals for weed control on the farm. Ask him for a copy of B-808, Spot-Oiling Johnson grass and L-174, Control of Johnson grass.

Hanson stated that he was having a sprayer constructed and it would be on display this week. He is anxious to have interested farmers drop by his office to pick up plans for a sprayer if they are interested in building one after seeing it in operation.

The Commission has also announced that there is an acute shortage of stenographers and typists. Vacancies exist in all Federal agencies in the Wash-

ington, D. C. area. Most stenographer positions pay \$66 a week; most typist positions, \$61 a week. Persons interested in taking the Stenographer - Typist examination should consult civil service examination announcement no. 434 for further information.

Examination announcements and application forms may be obtained from many post offices located throughout the country, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications for these examinations must be filed with the Commission's Washington office.

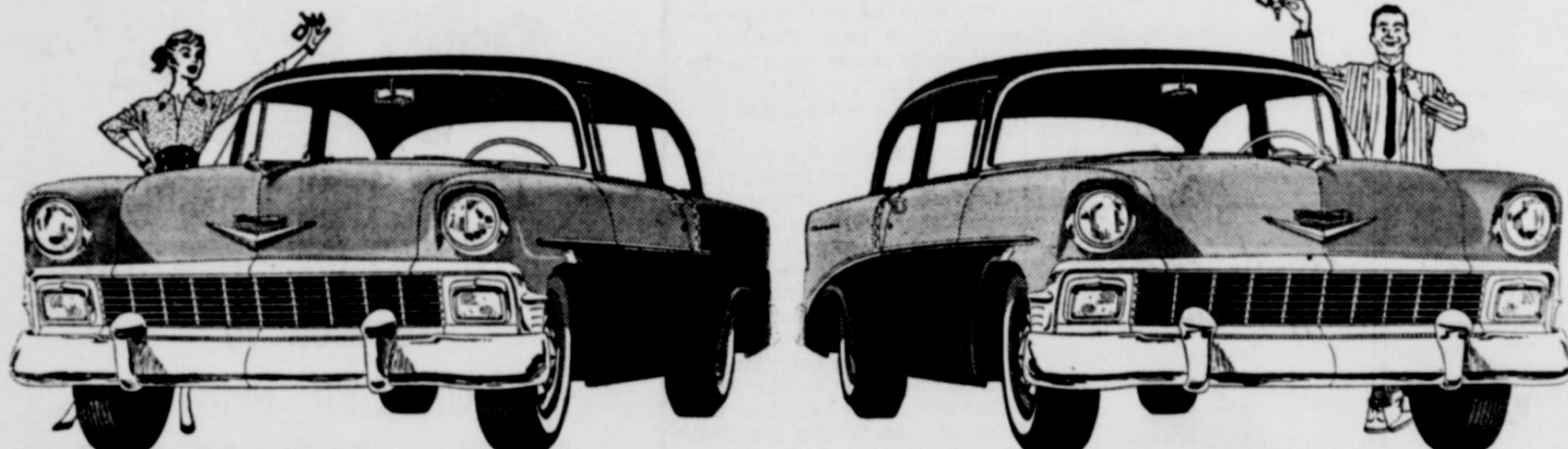

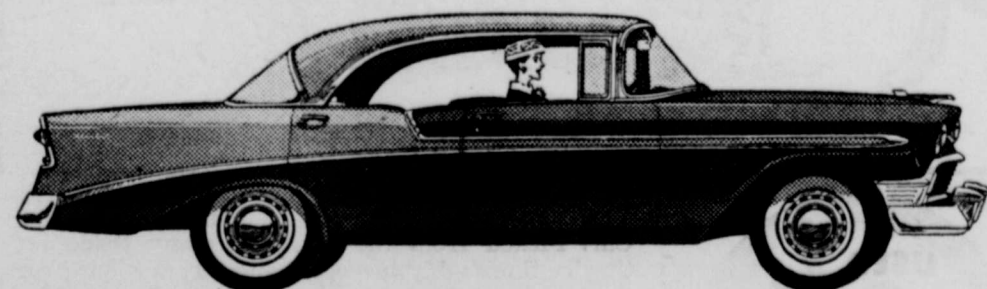

"We in America have the highest standard of living the world has ever known, we have the greatest productive capacity, we have the strongest spiritual ties, yet the size of the free world is shrinking mainly because our way of life isn't getting the job done."

"That means there is something wrong either with the system or the way we are trying to sell it," Elwell declared.

The American Revolution was an economic as well as a political revolution, the speaker stated in explaining it was out of this revolution the nation's free enterprise system was born. The system worked, he said, for a long, long time, in fact until 1929 and the depression years, when many persons lost faith in the system and in business because they "lost everything else."

Now, the businessman must assume the responsibility of helping others regain faith and confidence in American business, he said.

"Members of a chamber of commerce have a sense of responsibility to their community," the speaker said, "but we as businessmen must assume even greater and more far-reaching responsibilities in preserving our

Last year, due to a limited number of students, and the requirements to be met by the state, it was decided that high school should be transferred to Stanton.
